The M. W. the Grand Master delivered his annual address, as follows:

Grand Master's Annual Address.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Bruns-

GREETING:-First of all allow me to congratulate the craft not only within the city and county of St. John, but throughout the whole province, on the fact that Grand Lodge, now for the first time in its

history, meets within the walls of a building which shall be dedicated and consecrated to Freemasonry; owned by the fraternity and which, when completed, will be their head-quarters within New Brunswick.

Only seven months have elapsed since the last meeting of grand lodge, therefore there is not the same variety of business to be presented to grand lodge as if a whole year had passed away; but even seven months have brought their changes, their sorrows and their pleasures. We have alluded to the pleasure which we have of meeting in our new "Masonic Hall." The room now occupied is, it is true, comparatively small, but it is only to be occupied temporarily; yet the fact that we are in the building, that so much progress has been made, justifies the hope that at no distant day we shall be able to meet in the great hall fitted up in a manner worthy of grand lodge. I will not trespass upon your time my brethren by enumerating the difficulties through which the "Directors of the Masonic Hall Company" have struggled in order to bring the work to its present state; difficulties intensified by the depression of the times. This much I may say, however, that we should do all in our power to assist the directors in their good work; we should look forward, if possible, to a time when grand lodge will own the whole property and hold it entirely for the uses of the craft. Grand Lodge is committed to an annual payment of five hundred dollars a year for twenty years, five of these payments have been made, leaving fifteen still due. It would be of immense advantage to the board of directors and would materially relieve the present pressure upon them if we could anticipate the payment of these annual instalments, to a certain extent, by an immediate payment by grand lodge to the extent of say three thousand dollars. This sum might be borrowed by grand lodge, provided the suggestion, upon further consideration, be deemed expedient. The advantage to the directors will be at once apparent and there would seem to be no difficulty in grand lodge promptly paying the interest upon the loan and in also making provision to extinguish the liability when the same matures, which I presume would be in five years from date. In aid of the "building fund of the hall" a masonic fair, to take place in September next, has been projected by the directors, the management of which is now in the hands of a very efficient committee, representing all the masonic organizations in the city. The readiness with which the craft responded to the call to help the "fair" was most gratifying to me, as it cannot fail to be to you. Invited to assist in that undertaking I cordially assented, and I nominated as the representative committee of this body,

the Grand Master, Past Grand Master B. Lester Peters and R. W. William F. Bunting, the Grand Secretary. I have no doubt the affair will not only be a great success, but will prove to be of great interest to the whole body of our citizens.

Since our last meeting one of the most prominent, and in his prime, one of the most active, earnest and intelligent members of the craft in: the maritime provinces has been called to his eternal rest. I allude to Past Grand Master Robert Gowan, who died at the City of Fredericton on the 30th January last past, in the seventy-sixth year of his age, after a residence of over fifty-six years in this province. Bro. Gowan was no ordinary man. When able to do his duty, whether civil, social or masonic, no man could do it better. The country gratefully remembered his long and faithful service in the Crown Lands' Department and eased his declining years with a comfortable pension. Our grand lodge honored him with the highest honorary rank, that of a past grand. master, when the last of the Scottish lodges, over which he ruled as Provincial Grand Master, united with us. Long before there was a central authority of any kind in the province, Bro. Gowan's views and opinions had all the force of authority, and what he thought of any particular matter largely influenced the decision upon that matter. A diligent student and strong in his own individuality, he never failed to have a decided view upon every question that came before him, and to any courteously expressed application for information or instruction, he never failed to cheerfully respond. Social, kind, charitable and genial, honorable in all his dealings, the good that he did will live afterhim and the remembrance of his many virtues will long linger in grands lodge.

Among other brethren who departed during the year, I notice, with much regret, the name of R. W. Bro. Rev. Charles H. Titus, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, who died in October last.

Among the papers that will be submitted to you will be the final report of the committee appointed to administer the relief sent to our own brethren in St. John, who suffered by the great fire. The whole amount received footed up to the round sum of \$8,431.35 and is a noble example of the wide-spread beneficence of our craft. This sum has been judiciously expended as will be fully shown by the report to which I have referred, prepared by R. W. Bro. William F. Bunting, who so efficiently discharged the onerous duties of secretary to the general masonic board of relief.

I received with much regret the resignation of R. W. Bro. H. M. Alexander, of his rank and status as representative of this grand lodge mear the Grand Lodge of Quebec. The resignation was tendered in consequence of his removal from the jurisdiction. I had no alternative but to accept it. The correspondence will show that Bro. Alexander parted with his trust with as much regret as I received the return of it. He was one of the very few of our representatives that visited St. John, and many of us had experienced the pleasure of his personal acquaintanceship. He was never tired of doing kindnesses towards brethren from New Brunswick who visited Montreal. His ways were so pleasant, his manner so hearty and so cheery that it was a gratification of the keenest kind to meet with him. At least, we can unite in wishing him prosperity in his new home in Toronto. I have appointed as his successor near the Grand Lodge of Quebec, V. W. Bro. Thomas P. Butler, P. M. Victoria Lodge, No. 26, Montreal.

Upon a request from the Grand Lodge of Kentucky for an exchange of representatives I have appointed as the representative of this grand lodge, R. W. Bro. William H. Phythian and have no doubt that he will efficiently discharge any duties that may be required of him. The Grand Lodge of Kentucky has appointed R. W. Bro. Thomas J. Robinson, P. J. G. Warden and P. M. Victoria Lodge, No. 26, Milltown, to represent it near this grand lodge.

I issued a dispensation on 3rd February last, authorizing W. Bro. William J. Logan to instal the officers of St. Martin's Lodge, the worshipful master not having installed his successor at the proper time. which duty Bro. Logan faithfully discharged.

I have issued a dispensation for a new lodge to be located at Hopewell Corner, in the County of Albert, which will be called Albert Lodge. I submit herewith the report of the grand secretary as to the opening of said lodge under dispensation.

To M. W. Bro. Robert Marshal, Grand Master of Freemasons of New Brunswick:

M. W. SIR AND BROTHER :-Acting under authority and instruction from you I visited Hopewell Corner, Albert County, and on the twenty-third day of January, A. D. 1879, instituted Albert Lodge under the dispensation issued by you.

By my direction the lodge has since been visited by the grand secretary and I believe it has made such progress that the prayer of the officers and members asking for a warrant may be fairly considered at this session of grand lodge. I have referred the whole matter to the following committee, viz.: R. W. Bro. William F. Bunting, R. W. Bro. B. Lester Peters and R. W. Bro. Edwin J. Wetmore, who will submit a report upon the subject for the decision of grand lodge.

The two lodges located in the City of Fredericton, viz. : Solomon's Lodge, No. 6, and St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 29, have agreed to unite under a new name and with a new warrant. The movement has my hearty approval and the decision so unanimously arrived at by the brethren will, no doubt, receive your official sanction. The new lodge will, I presume, be given the number on the roll now held by Solomon's Lodge No. 6. This may properly raise the question as to the course which grand lodge should adopt with regard to vacant numbers, whether they shall be allowed to stand vacant or whether on the issue of a new warrant a vacant number shall from time to time be given to such new lodge, and thus keep the roll complete. I have no fixed opinion upon the subject and only mention the matter that it may be discussed in grand lodge.

I have no foreign matters of special importance to submit for the consideration of grand lodge. I may mention, however, that a communication has been received from the grand lodge of Illinois, informing us that that grand lodge has interdicted masonic communication with the Grand Lodge of Scotland in consequence of the latter's invasion of the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Quebec. I had hoped to have been able to report to you that Scotland had retired from its unjust attitude as regards Quebec, but am not yet in a position to do so; it is, however, in my judgment, only a question of time. We all [April.

must deeply regret the delay of Scotland in retiring from a position which is practically opposed to the true spirit of masonic jurisdiction within territory legally occupied by a duly recognized grand governing body. Some communications have been received from the Grand Lodge of Manitoba shewing that a mischevious and turbulent spirit is abroad in that jurisdiction; as, however, we are in friendly communication with the only lawful masonic authority in that province, no action on our part may be deemed necessary.

In the province harmony prevails, and if the lodges have not done a large amount of work during the year, they have made fair progress in the good work of our time honored institution.

Brethren, I rejoice to meet you at this the twelfth annual communication of grand lodge under auspices so favorable. In closing, permit me to recur to a subject which must be very dear to every true mason within our jurisdiction. Past Grand Master B. Lester Peters in his address, delivered in grand lodge on the 22nd January, 1868, remarked:-"The erection of a masonic temple in this city, for the honor of our ancient craft, is a work in which I feel satisfied that the brethren in all parts of the province would be interested, and I trust that some measure will be adopted by grand lodge, having in view an object so desirable." From that time continued effort has been made. with greater or less success, and as a result we meet to day, for the first time, in our own "hall," Much, however, remains yet to be done in order to the successful accomplishment of the great work so nearly completed, in the interests of which I would like to invite every brother within the province, whose name is on our roll of membership, and who has not yet given material aid to this undertaking, to at once subscribe for at least one share in the stock of the "New Brunswick Masonic Hall Company." If this appeal be generously responded to, the question of providing the necessary funds for the successful completion of the great work will have been accomplished and the craft in New Brunswick will have a building comparatively free from incumbrance, which any grand lodge in Canada might be proud to call its own. With these brief remarks, I leave the matter in the hands of the brethren throughout the province, not doubting the result.

In the assurance that your deliberations and decisions will continue to be characterized by a just appreciation of your great responsibilities, permit me to conclude with these words: "Establish Thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish Thou it!" It was moved by R. W. Bro. John V. Ellis, P. G. M., and

1. Since the annual communication of September last, the receipts of his office amount to fourteen hundred and twenty dollars and forty cents, viz.:

3. In order that the brethren may have a knowledge of the growth of the craft in the jurisdiction since the formation of grand lodge, he has prepared the following statement for their information:

From these figures it will be seen that there has been a steady increase each year, except in the year 1876 when there was a slight falling off. Nevertheless, there have been added to the membership, over one thousand in ten years; an increase of some importance in a small jurisdiction.

- 5. He issued, upon special and the regular annual returns, one hundred and fifty-eight certificates on parchment. A number of these were duplicates to replace the originals destroyed in the great fire of June 20th, 1877.
- 6. There have been received and sanctioned by the M. W. the Grand Master, amendments to the by-laws of Albion Lodge, No. 1, Saint John's Lodge, No. 2, Carleton Union Lodge, No. 8, Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10 and Alley Lodge, No. 14.
- 7. Commissions have been issued under the seal of grand lodge, to V. W. Bro. Thomas P. Butler of Montreal, as the representative of this grand lodge at the Grand Lodge of Quebec, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of R. W. Bro. Henry M. Alexander who has removed from the Province of Quebec, also to R. W. Bro. William H. Phythian of Frankfort. Kentucky, as the representative at the Grand Lodge of Kentucky. The reception of these commissions and the acceptance of the trust in each instance, has been acknowledged by these brethren.
- 8. He received March 20th ultimo, a commission from the grand secretary of Kentucky, accrediting R. W. Bro. Thomas J. Robinson, Past Junior Grand Warden and Past Master of Victoria Lodge No. 26, Milltown, as the representative of the grand lodge of Kentucky at this grand lodge. He mailed the commission to Bro. Robinson who will no doubt present it in due course.
- 9. The contract for the printing and publication of five hundred copies of a reprint of the proceedings of grand lodge, covering all its transactions, constitutions, etc., from its organization up to and including A. D., 1876, was completed on the fourth day of January last. The reprint forms an 8 vo. volume of 616 pages, with a copious and well digested index. The typography and binding reflect much credit upon the contractors and compare favorably with many of the volumes issued by sister grand lodges.

The Grand Secretary congratulates grand lodge upon the completion of this important work which, although undertaken under many disadvantages, progressed as well as circumstances permitted. He feels confident that if grand lodge had deferred its decision to publish, many years would have elapsed before its accomplishment. And now that the work is fully completed, there are ample reasons for supposing that the craft in the jurisdiction will justify grand lodge in the outlay.

Copies of the volume have, by order of grand lodge, been presented to each lodge in the jurisdiction, to each grand lodge with which this

grand lodge is in masonic intercourse and to several brethren who have materially aided in the re-establishment of our library.

The board of general purposes has fixed the price at two dollars per copy.

The many flattering notices received in reference to the book reflect great credit upon the printer and the bookbinder.

10. The lodges in the jurisdiction, alive to the importance of possessing suitable halls for the due exercise of the rites and ceremonials of our institution and for properly carrying on the business and other concerns of the craft, are securing from time to time, increased accommodation and more suitable apartments.

He has received a notice from Campbellton Lodge of Campbellton, that it has removed to a new and properly furnished hall erected by the members.

Howard Lodge at Hillsborough has also given notice of its removal to another hall.

- 11. Many applications having been made to him by grand secretaries and others in sister jurisdictions, for copies of our back proceedings, he found himself, in consequence of the losses sustained by the great fire in Saint John, of June 20th, 1877, unable to supply the wants of applicants. In this emergency he was induced to address a circular to the secretaries of the respective lodges, asking them to favor him with such copies as they could, without detriment, reasonably spare. Several responded in the most courteous and fraternal manner to his request, and he was thus enabled to supply the wants of those who had applied to him.
- 12. On the eighth day of March ultimo he received a lithographed circular, dated December 23rd, from the grand master of the body claiming to be "The Grand Lodge of New South Wales," urging its claims to recognition by the grand lodges of the world. This document, by direction of the M. W the Grand Master, he handed to the committee appointed at the last annual communication to consider and report upon the propriety of entering into fraternal intercourse with this and other grand bodies.
- 13. The Grand Secretary feels that his report would be incomplete without a reference to the library. Every member of the fraternity fully realizes the many advantages to be gained by and the great importance to be attached to, a well stocked and judiciously selected library. Locking forward to the day when accommodation will be provided in our new Masonic Temple for the library, when its contents

can be placed at the service and made available to the craft in every section of the jurisdiction, he has been and continues to be unceasing in his efforts to gather together, either by purchase or solicitation, books, pamphlets, etc., on masonic and kindred subjects.

As a partial means in furtherance of this object, he compiled a list of the proceedings of sister grand lodges already received and of those wanted to complete the files. This list he issued in the form of a circular on the twenty-fifth day of February last, and addressed a copy to grand secretaries and others. Several responded promptly to his call, and assurances have been received of further responses.

Let each member of grand lodge constitute himself a committee of one in furtherance of this important masonic auxilliary, and before the lapse of many years grand lodge will be in possession of a library of respectable proportions, and the brethren generally have the means of gaining "pleasure and profit thereby."

It affords him great pleasure to acknowledge the reception of the following contributions since the annual communication of September

From R. W. Bro. John D. Caldwell, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Ohio, the proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Ohio for several years.

From an unknown brother, the proceedings of the Grand Lodge of New York for several years.

From R. W. Bro. Jacob H. Medairy, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, the proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Maryland for a number of years.

14. A notice has been filed in his office of a proposition to offer at this communication an amendment to the constitution providing for a change in the time of holding the annual communication from the last Wednesday to the fourth Tuesday in April in each year.

Another notice has been filed of a proposal to alter and amend sections twenty-six, twenty-seven, twenty-eight and twenty-nine, page thirty-five of the constitution relative to the mode of dealing with members of lodges in arrears of dues.

The Grand Secretary respectfully calls the attention of grand lodge to what, in his opinion, is an insufficiency of notice and publication of proposed alterations in or amendments to the constitution. Under the present law, in this respect, it is required that all notices of proposed amendments shall be filed with the grand secretary not less than thirty days previous to the annual communication. They are thus filed in the grand Secretary's office and are known to few until his report is read in grand lodge. It would seem right and proper, in an important matter affecting the government, and possibly the wellbeing of the craft, that the utmost care should be exercised and the fullest publicity given to it, to enable the members of grand lodge to discuss and vote understandingly and intelligently. Would it not be well to have all such proposed amendments, or a synopsis of them, printed and distributed with the usual notices to representatives? And would it not also be well to refer such proposals to a special committee to be appointed at each annual communication, or to the board of general purposes?

15. A petition has been received by him from the members of Solomon's Lodge No. 6 and St. Andrew's Lodge No. 29 of the city of Fredericton, with a proposal to unite the two lodges into one, under the name of Hiram Lodge. The documents contain the articles of agreement between the two lodges and the terms upon which they ask grand lodge to sanction their unification.

16. He has received a petition from Albert Lodge working under a dispensation at Hopewell Corner, Albert County, asking for a warrant of confirmation.

The petition is accompanied by copies of by-laws, the records of the lodge from its opening and a report of the paraphernalia possessed by the lodge and its present condition and future prospects. By direction of the M. W. the Grand Master, this petition and accompanying documents have been referred to a committee consisting of R. W. Bros. B. L. Peters, E. J. Wetmore and W. F. Bunting to report upon.

17. Through the good will of D. Pottinger, Esq., Superintendent of the Intercolonial Railway, an arrangement has been made whereby brethren attending grand lodge at this communication, are enabled to obtain tickets to and from St. John at all points on the line of railway, at one-half fare.

18. He feels gratified in being able to announce to grand lodge that masonic matters in all sections of the jurisdiction appear to be in a satisfactory and harmonious condition; there are no delinquent lodges to report nor no cases of appeal, disagreement or lodge discipline. It is his earnest desire, as it is no doubt of all the fraternity, that it may always be so.

19. He herewith submits his books, correspondence, files of papers &c., for the inspection of grand lodge.

On motion of R. W. Bro. B. Lester Peters, P. G. M., the reports of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary were tabled.

The R. W. the Deputy Grand Master, as president of the board of general purposes, submitted the annual report of the board, as follows:

Report of the Board of General Purposes.

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The board of general purposes have been called on to consider so few matters during the short term of their office that this report is necessarily short. They, however, have very great satisfaction in reporting that no case of complaint or masonic irregularity has come under their consideration. That so far as they have knowledge of masonic work within the jurisdiction of grand lodge, the greatest harmony and good feeling exists, and that grand lodge is still holding a strong place in the affections of the craft.

At the meeting of the board held on the 2nd October last, the board was duly organized: V. W. Bro. James McNichol, Jr., being elected Vice President.

The question of aid to the sufferers by the yellow fever in the Southern States referred to the board at the last session being considered, it was thought advisable in view of reports from the afflicted districts that ample funds for present needs were being received, to allow the question to remain under consideration until reports of want of money aid should reach the board.

[April]

No further information has been received, and the board have not disbursed any funds in connection with this matter.

The active efforts of R. W. Bro. W. T. Wilkinson, P. J. G. W. of this grand lodge and the representative at the Grand Lodge of Ireland, in procuring aid for freemasons who were sufferers by the fire of June 1877 and for other acts in furtherance of the cause of Masonic charity, were felt by the board as deserving of some suitable recognition.

The board on consideration of the subject resolved that a junior grand warden's apron, collar, and jewel would be a most fitting recognition, and these were procured and duly forwarded to Bro. Wilkinson who, in acknowledging their reception and in conveying to the grand secretary his thanks for the gift, expressed his fraternal feelings in the following words:—"It is only due to myself to say, that in any act of mine of which the members of the board of general purposes have been pleased to express their high approval, I had no motive but the discharge of my solemn and bounden duty and obligation, no object in view but to assist those who stood in need of my aid, and no reward before me but the approbation of my own conscience. I accept the splendid gift of the board with profound gratitude. I shall preserve the articles with the utmost care, and cherish them as highly prized family treasures."

The board fixed the price of the reprint of the proceedings of grand lodge since its organization at two dollars.

The board feel that this work is one of very considerable importance to the craft and commend it to their careful perusal, so that the contents, finding a place in "faithful memories" may inspire them with zeal to work out in New Brunswick the grand purposes of those whose watchful eyes, clear intellect and noble hearts in masonry saw the dangers, conceived the remedies and animated the generous impulses which have carried masonry to the high and honored place it occupies in this jurisdiction.

The report of the audit committee on the accounts of the grand secretary and grand treasurer since the last meeting of grand lodge is herewith submitted.

To the Board of General Purposes F. & A. M. of New Brunswick :

The committee appointed by the board to examine the books and audit the accounts of the grand treasurer and grand secretary for the past masonic year having attended to the duty entrusted to them, have much pleasure in reporting that they find the accounts orrect, and the books kept in a neat and systematic manner.

By those statements it was shewn that the total contributions placed at the disposal of the board amounted to \$8,431.35 and the disbursements to \$6,768.20, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,663.15.

Since the annual communication of September last the balance on hand at that time has been expended and the account closed up. Strike out the words "his suspension" fourth line, and insert in lieu thereof the words "being so suspended or struck from the roll." After the word "suspended" fifth line, insert the words "or struck from the roll."

4th. Section twenty-nine, page thirty-five—after the word "suspended" first line, insert the words "or struck from the roll of membership."

The brethren have supplied themselves with the necessary furniture and paraphernalia to enable the lodge to perform its work in accordance with the requirements of grand lodge.

The committee believing that the brethren are quite prepared to sustain and properly conduct the lodge, recommend that a warrant of constitution be issued to them, and that the lodge stand on the roll of lodges in this jurisdiction as "Albert Lodge No.—." They further recommend that the lodge be constituted under its warrant as soon as arrangements can be made for that purpose.

The Grand Secretary read the following letter, report and petition of the members of Solomon's Lodge, No. 6, and St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 29, of the city of Fredericton, which documents, on motion of R. W. Bro. E. J. Wetmore, P. D. G. M., were ordered to be received, viz:

Fredericton, N. B., 23rd December, 1878.

V. W. William F. Bunting, Esq., Grand Secretary Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, F. & A. M.:

DEAR SIR AND BROTHER.—The Freemasons comprising the two lodges here have come to the conclusion to amalgamate in the interests of the order generally for many reasons, among which are that it would be better financially, and that it would put an end to some small jealousies which are unfortunately constantly arising. The terms of amalgamation are set forth in the report presented by a committee appointed to consider the matter by both lodges, and adopted by each lodge, as appears by the copy of such report duly certified under the seals of the respective lodges and which I enclose herewith. I may say that the report was unanimously adopted by Solomon's Lodge, and that only three or four members in St. Andrew's dissented. Bros. A. N. Burchill, Samuel McKee and Richard Pindar from St. Andrew's Lodge, and Bros. Harry Beckwith, H. C. Creed and myself from Solomon's Lodge were appointed a committee to carry out the details. of the amalgamation, and I, as Secretary and Chairman of the joint committee, was appointed to correspond with you. We desire that the enclosed copy of report and certificates be laid before the Board of General Purposes, and that we be informed as to the proper method of carrying out the object. We hope that no objection will be raised to the amalgamation just as we propose it in the report. I may here say that the lodges desire that every provision and detail in the report with the exception of the name of the new lodge, shall be acceded to by

the grand lodge. If it is likely that any difficulty will be presented to any provision or detail we wish to be heard before the board of general purposes, and in that case we would have to be informed of the time the board will meet to consider, when Bro. Burchill and myself will attend. We are satisfied that we can shew good reason for every provision in the report, and would like to be heard if any difficulty arises. But if no difficulty arises or is likely to arise we do not wish to go to St. John unnecessarily. As to the name of the lodge, "Fredericton" was suggested and adopted by St. Andrew's, but left open by Solomon's The committee appointed to carry out details by a majority vote adhered to the same name, but we concluded to refer the matter to the board of general purposes, not to be bound by the selection by the board, but so that we could present the name selected by the board to the members of the lodges when they meet to carry out the final details. The other name suggested is "Hiram."

Upon being apprized that the board of general purposes will aid us in amalgamating on the basis proposed, and being directed what course to take to have the amalgamation completed we will proceed to take the necessary steps to surrender our old charters and apply for a new one.

At a regular communication of Solomon's Lodge, No. 6, F. & A. M., held at the Masonic Hall, Fredericton, December 10th, 1878, the following report of the committee on amalgamation of Solomon's and St. Andrew's Lodges was read and adopted unanimously, reserving the right to change the name proposed.

"The undersigned members of the joint committees appointed by Solomon's and St. "Andrew's Lodges, F. & A. M., to consider the propriety and advisability of amalgama-"ting the two lodges, beg leave to report: That they have considered the matter sub-"mitted to them and are of opinion that such amalgamation would very materially con-"duce to the prosperity of Freemasonry in Fredericton and the surrounding jurisdiction,

"and they would therefore strongly recommend such amalgamation.

[&]quot;In order to avoid difficulties which might arise by either lodge surrendering its "charter, and to secure to every member of each lodge in good standing, admission to "the lodge as amalgamated, your committees suggest that arrangements be made with "the grand lodge by which the charters of the respective lodges may be surrendered and "a new charter issued to a new lodge, to be called by and registered under a new name

"the charter members of the new lodge to be all the members of the old lodges in good "standing in their respective lodges at the time of surrendering their charters. The "numerical rank of the new lodge to be that of Solomon's Lodge, and all funds and "property of the lodges so surrendering their charters, to be given up by grand lodge to "the new lodge and to be its property, grand lodge of course to retain the usual fees for "issuing the new charter. As the title to the land on which the hall stands and to the "hall itself is vested in trustees and it is desirable that such title should in some way be vested for the use of the new lodge, it will be necessary to contrive some plan by which this object may be attained. Your committee, however, feel satisfied that, on investigating the title of the trustees, such a transfer can be made as to effect this object, should the lodges determine to amalgamate. Your committee would also suggest "that 'Fredericton Lodge' would be an appropriate name for the new lodge."

We the undersigned being regular registered masons of the lodge, the name of which is written and mentioned at the head of the column in which our respective names are written having the prosperity of the craft at heart are anxious to exert our best endeavors to promote and diffuse the genuine principles of the art; and for the conveniency of our respective dwellings, and other good reasons which are hereinafter stated we are desirous of forming a lew lodge to be named "Hiram."

The following are the reasons hereinbefore referred to for our desire of forming a new lodge. Your petitioners are all members of either Solomon's Lodge, No. 6, or of Saint Andrew's Lodge, No. 29, both of which lodges have their head-quarters and place of meeting at Fredericton. It had for some time been considered that an amalgamation of

these lodges would materially conduce to the prosperity of Freemasonry in Fredericton and the surrounding jurisdiction. Accordingly a committee was appointed from each lodge to meet and consider the matter and report to their respective lodges. These committees met and reported to their repective lodges recommending an amalgation, and with that view suggested that arrangements should be made with the grand lodge by which the charters of the respective lodges might be surrendered and a new charter issued to a new lodge under a new name, the charter members of the new lodge to be all the members of the old lodges in good standing, under certain conditions mentioned in the report. This report was regularly adopted in both lodges and a certified copy of the report and a certificate of its adoption was duly forwarded from both lodges to the V. W. Grand Secretary, and your committee would respectfully refer the M. W. Grand Master to such certified copy of report and certificate for full information as to the terms upon which they desire to surrender their charters and to obtain a new one, only suggesting that in choosing the name of the new lodge, we desire the M. W. Grand Master to be governed by this petition and not by the said report. In consequence of this desire, we pray that a surrender of the respective charters of the said lodges may be accepted and for a warrant of constitution empowering us to meet as a regular lodge at Fredericton, in the County of York on the first Thursday of every month and there to discharge the duties of masonry in a constitutional manner, according to the forms of the order and the laws of the grand lodge, provided that the terms and requests set forth in the report of the said committees be complied with and acceeded to; and in that event we have nominated and do recommend Brother Alfred F. The committee on the Grand Master's address submitted a report, which, on motion of R. W. Bro. Henry Duffell, P. S. G. W., was received and the several recommendations adopted, viz.:—

Report of Committee on Grand Master's Address.

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The committee to whom was referred the address of the M. W. the Grand Master at this annual meeting, beg leave to report as follows:—

They congratulate the craft throughout the province on the progress made in the erection of the new freemason's hall, and they cordially approve the diligence of the directors of the masonic hall company in prosecuting the work to its present condition. They hail with emotions of pleasure the fact that a permanent home for freemasonry is now established in our chief commercial city—a home of which every mason within our jurisdiction may justly feel proud.

Your committee recommend that that part of the address referring to an immediate payment by grand lodge of the sum of three thousand dollars to the New Brunswick masonic hall company be favorably considered and that grand lodge do authorize and empower the M. W. the Grand Master, with the board of general purposes to negotiate a loan of \$3,000 to aid the company in the completion of the building, and to give such security under the seal of grand lodge as may be found necessary to carry out that very desirable object.

Your committee have learned with feelings of profound sorrow of the death of our late esteemed brother, Past Grand Master, Robert Gowan, and submit the following resolution for the consideration of grand lodge:

Resolved, That this grand lodge desires to place on record an expression of their sense of the loss which the craft in this province sustained in the death of Past Grand Master Robert Gowau, who, for so long a period of years gave to freemasonry the benefit of his great masonic learning, laborious work, and loyal regard: who by his regular and

upright conduct as a man recommended to the outside world the principles which bound him as a mason; and who by the zeal and constancy with which he ever upheld the great tenets of our profession, has left behind him a memory which his large circle of friends long will cherish; an ever widening influence that will long endure; and an example that every true mason will do well to imitate.

Further Resolved, That a suitable memorial page be published with the proceedings of grand lodge, in affectionate remembrance of our deceased brother; and

Further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded under the seal of grand lodge to his sorrowing family as a mark of the sympathy of grand lodge in their bereavement.

Your committee recommend in reference to the amalgamation of Solomon's and St. Andrew's Lodges that the surrender of the existing warrants be accepted by grand lodge and that a new warrant issue to be named Hiram and numbered 6, and further that the perfecting of any detail relating to the union, be left to the board of general purposes.

The following letter from New South Wales was read and referred:—

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick:

Sydney, New South Wales, 23rd December, 1878.

Most Worshipeul Grand Master, Officers and Brethren:—Permit me to recall your attention to my letter under date January last, wherein I notified the establishment of the Grand Lodge of New South Wales and my own election and installation as Grand Master; and further, requested the recognition of that grand lodge by the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

It will, I think, be conceded that the Grand Lodge of New South Wales has evinced no desire to press too urgently for a reply to that communication. It has, on the contrary been desirous that ample time should be allowed for the full consideration of a matter involving so many questions of importance and placing so many interests at stake.

It is now thought that in the year which will have elapsed between the receipt of that communication and the delivery of the present one, such an opportunity will have been afforded. And consequently I beg to renew the application for the recognition of the Grand Lodge of New South Wales, the formation of which has in every respect been constitutional and regular and in strict accordance with usage of time immemorial. It is thus entitled to the recognition it seeks, and to the supreme and undivided jurisdiction held to be the inherent right of every grand lodge so established. Its claims to such I have again submitted to all regular grand lodges throughout the world; and I hold to the hope that the matter will be speedily brought to satisfactory issue, for we cannot close our eyes to the fact that by the present uncertainty of its position, the true interests of masonry are materially prejudiced and a feeling of antagonism engendered, greatly to its discredit.

We desire that every grand lodge should be in possession of facts by which it may be guided in its decision upon the appeal made. Therefore, as representing the Grand Lodge of New South Wales, I beg to submit the following statement:

We admit that the movement resulting in the formation of the Grand Lodge of New South Wales met with much opposition, but we confidently assert that the opposition would have been of little moment but for the course pursued by certain brethren who, from motives not difficult to detect, caused instructions to be forwarded to every lodge, even the most remote, not to entertain any of our communications, or those of the convention, the purpose of which was misrepresented, coupled with a threat of masonic pains and penalties if they individually or as lodges held masonic intercourse with us. Thus were we debarred from placing ourselves and matters in true light before the craft; and as the majority of the brethren were young and inexperienced masons, ignorant in fact of the existence of any recognized system of jurisprudence, it is by no means surprising that, under the circumstances, they kept aloof from us, some for a short time only. We have no hesitation in asserting that had it been practicable to canvass the craft individually and they had been in a position to adopt, without fear of consequences, such course as their judgment or inclination prompted, the result would have shewn that the proposition to establish a grand lodge within the colony was in very general favor. But severe, and in some instances illegal action was taken to prevent the spread of the too evident disposition to support the movement. Yet in the face of all opposition, the originators of that movement persevered in their efforts, and met with great success, as was proved by the presence in convention of a far greater number of regularly warranted lodges than was absolutely necessary to give legality to such a course. The result was communicated to your grand lodge by my letter first referred to.

Since that period the Grand Lodge of New South Wales has duly, yet moderately, exercised its functions, not attempting to interfere with those who preferred to remain under the pre-existing relations. It has not only fully maintained its position, but has made sure and rapid progress. Although it has only recently entered upon its second year of existance, there are already nineteen lodges holding charters thereform, and sufficient indications to warrant the anticipation that within a very short period that number will be largely increased. During the past week an application has been forwarded by a lodge under English warrant for one under the seal of the Grand Lodge of New South Wales. This is the first English lodge that has been bold enough to transfer its allegiance, and the example now given will, almost to a certainty, be followed by many others. Independently of those lodges that assisted in the formation of the Grand Lodge of New South Wales, there have been new ones inaugurated, and all are working most successfully. More than six hundred regularly made masons have given in their adhesion to the Grand Lodge of New South Wales. Considering the very small masonic population of the colony the proportion may be regarded as quite equal to, if not beyond, the average on such occasions. We hold it to be evidence of a tone of feeling encouraging in the highest degree. A form of constitution has been adopted and printed, rituals have been framed with a scrupulous regard to landmarks, and the prejudices or predilections of brethren who may long have been accustomed to work the ceremonies after some time honored form not universally observed. All necessary boards. committees and sub-committees have been established, and have already done good service. A monthly journal designated "The Freemason" has been brought into existence and is in very wide circulation as the exponent of the new order of things. And lastly, an interchange of friendly communications is maintained with some of the grand lodges of the United States and in British America.

I mention these facts solely to shew that the entire organization of the Grand Lodge of New South Wales is complete and regular, and that all that remains to be desired is recognition by sister grand lodges.

I will not impute unworthy motives to our opponents; but I should fail in my duty to the grand lodge I represent were I not plainly to assert

that great misrepresentations have been resorted to in certain quarter to influence the grand lodges of England, Scotland and Ireland in their decision upon the question of recognition. We have good reasons for the belief that from such misrepresentations, those grand lodges our masonic parents, retain the impression that "The Grand Lodge of New South Wales" owes its origin to the individual and consequently irregular action of a few brethren, and not to the combined action of certain warranted lodges assembled in convention. But if due weight be allowed to the "Report of Proceedings in Convention" and to the "Manifesto of the Grand Lodge of New South Wales," subsequently issued, both which documents were forwarded to every grand lodge. there will be found therein a sufficient refutation of all such misstate ments. Under the conviction that truth must in the end prevail we are not only content to wait for our due, but have patiently submitted to personal revilements, that never should have disgraced the uttern ances of any member of an institution, which requires him to be an charity with all men, more especially with his brethren in masonro. With a reckless disregard of truth, the most opprobious terms have been applied to the Grand Lodge of New South Wales, the "so called grand lodge! All its adherents have been held up to public contemnt and ridicule. Many of its more active supporters have been placed under the ban of "Suspension from all Masonic Rights" and the without even the pretence of any of those formalities universally prescribed for observance before condemnation or punishment can be lied just or regular.

The older masonic journal, The Australian Freemason, a paper edited by a reverend brother has been refused to us, as a means of justification and has been entirely monopolized as a channel for the grossest invative, and the wildest misrepresentation. Law and propriety have the utterly disregarded in the one absorbing desire to crush a bodywill existence is most unpalatable to a few brethren of position and infli ence in the craft.

Though we are quite willing to believe that some have taken the stand against us from an honest conviction of the impropriety of all conduct, we are well aware that many more have done so, simply base cause they regard our action as premature only. This is a matter of opinion, one in which every one is at liberty to entertain and temes ately to express his views. But it is a somewhat significant factation the most energetic of our opponents are brethren holding offices. honor or emolument under constitutions hitherto legally exercising

The following letter was read and received:

TORONTO, October 14th, 1878.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Grand Officers and W. Brethren of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick:

Most Worshipful Sir and Wor: Brethren, — Having moved my residence and business from Montreal, and now resident in Toronto permanently, I feel it wholly incumbent upon me to acquaint your

grand lodge of the fact, being your representative near the grand lodge of Quebec, so as that your grand body will not suffer through my change of residence, and that you will take such action in the matter as your wisdom may direct.

Though retaining my masonic connections with Montreal, I cannot give your grand lodge interests that attention, which is demanded by the growing close business as well as masonic connections, pre-eminent between the Provinces of New Brunswick and Quebec.

I have endeavoured, whether successful or otherwise, to do my duty in the high and most honorable appointment given me, and resign it with feelings of the utmost regret. It was in my estimation the appointment to be most coveted, as it was of ready intercourse, and from brethren whom to know was to love. I feel assured there are many emiment brethren in the grand lodge of Quebec, who would feel, and esteem your trust in the highest degree, and I have no doubt that our M. W. G. M., with his usual wisdom, and recognising the importance of the representation, will suggest an appointment worthy in a high degree your confidence.

I cannot refrain, in handing my resignation to your grand body and enclosing my credentials, from soliciting a favour from you, if it is according to usage, and that is, that you countermand my appointment on the face of my credentials, and return the document to me as an heirloom, and also as a reminder of the many friends I often regret not meeting as frequently as I would desire. With many thanks to your grand body for the high honor conferred upon me, and for the kind consideration always shewn me when in the boundaries of your jurisdiction and praying that the choicest blessings of the G. A. of the U. may rest and abide with you always.

The committee to whom was referred the papers and documents relative to certain grand lodges applying for recognition, report:

That in the case of the Grand Lodge of the Indian Territory there appears to be no reason whatever why recognition should be longer withheld, all of the original objections to its recognition by the grand lodges making them, have been removed.

The committee further report in the case of the Grand Lodge of New Mexico that the said grand lodge has been duly organized.

The committee offer the following resolution:

To the Grand Lodge, F. & A. M. of New Brunswick:

The committee to whom was referred the applications for recognition of the Grand Lodge of Cuba and of Colon submit the following report:

In regard to the "Grand Lodge of Cuba" the committee have to In regard to the

In regard to the "Grand Lodge of Cuba" the committee may to state: There is a difference of opinion between learned masonic jurists in the United States as to whether or not this grand lodge is

entitled to recognition. In the Grand Lodge of New York, where there is an intelligent and well informed foreign correspondence committee recognition has been accorded. On the other hand, the Grand Lodge of Maine, the chairman of whose foreign correspondence committee is Brother Josiah H. Drummond has withheld recognition. Both committees appear to have fully examined all the facts submitted and each has arrived independently at its own conclusion.

The recognition of the Grand Lodge of Cuba is resisted by the "Grand Lodge of Colon" which claims to be the legitimate head of the craft in the Island of Cuba. The Colon Grand Lodge was formed in 1859 by the subordinate lodges holding of the Grand Lodge of South Carolina. The New York committee says that "this organization was undoubtedly regular, and its right to establish and govern symbolic lodges in Cuba unquestionable and indefeasable." After a time a supreme council over the degrees of what is known as "the ancient and accepted Scottish Rite" was established, which authority emanated also from Charleston, South Carolina, and did not include the three degrees of masonry, but commenced with what is called in the rite named, the Fourth Degree. In course of time, either from the same brethren being prominent in both bodies, or from the brethren in the Grand Lodge of Colon not thoroughly understanding masonic government as it is understood in England and in America, or from some cause, the grand lodge and supreme council united in a grand orient "of which each" to quote brother Drummond, "became a Section the grand lodge governing the symbolic degrees, but yet connecting them with the so-called high degrees in such a manner that symbolic masonry and its governing power became subordinate to or dependent upon the supreme council." Still, the grand lodge kept up an existence. It adopted a new constitution in 1868; it held an election in 1870, in 1873, and 1874, and in 1875 it held meetings. Some times it appears to have been imbued with a proper spirit of independence; sometimes it seems to have contented itself with merely registering the decrees of the supreme council. It chartered lodges, however, and had an undoubted and continued existence, although at times, as declared by the Grand Lodge of New York, it was nothing more than a bureau of the Supreme Council. In addition to the grand lodge, however, the supreme council itself seem to have exercised by deputy, or through a delegated authority to a provincial mother lodge in the west part of the Island, the power to issue warrants. This provincial mother lodge had a short existence, when it was abolished, but in April, 1875, the grand lodge itself instituted a provincial mother lodge and disolved it the next July. Thus it will be clear to grand lodge that there was a divided authority, and apparently great masonic confusion in the Island. Yet, the Grand Lodge of Colon kept up an existence, for it held meetings on the 6th, 10th, 12th, 16th and 26th days of August, 1876, and at the meeting on the latter day declared itself free from all other authority, a sovereign body, with full and unlimited powers over its subordinates.

This action, however, was hastened by an event which had taken place on the first of August, when the representives of nine chartered lodges and of four lodges under dispensation met at Havana and formed the Grand Lodge of Cuba. We are asked for recognition by both bodies. It may be well to note that when the Grand Lodge of Colon met at St. Jago de Cuba on the 6th or even on the 10th August 1876, it was not aware of the action of the lodges at Havana, but it was aware of that action on 26th August, when it declared itself a Sovereign power. It is also well to note that the thirteen lodges which met at Hayana and established the Grand Lodge of Cuba were not a majority of all the lodges on the Island. In a balustre of September 4, 1876, the Grand Lodge of Colon claims to have on its register thirtysix lodges and 8,000 members. There is nothing to show that the Grand Lodge of Cuba was formed after a convention of all the Lodges in the Island had been called. Indeed it would seem pretty clear that the grand lodge at Santiago was unaware of the movement until after the new grand lodge had been organized. The question then arises, was the Grand Lodge of Cuba legally formed, even supposing the Grand Lodge of Colon had entirely gone out of existence. But it is also a question whether that grand lodge had gone out of existence at all, although it does seem to have allowed its authority to be usurped in a manner that will seem strange to most of us who understand masonic government as practised on the sure foundations laid down by the masonic authorities of England and the United States.

Then, again, what were the constituent elements in the formation of the Grand Lodge of Cuba? Thirteen lodges united in the formation as we have already said. Bro. Drummond is the authority for the statement that some of these lodges were created by the old grand lodge, some by the provincial mother lodge of the Supreme Council, some by the provincial mother lodge of the old grand lodge. It is urged as a reason for the formation of a new grand lodge that the old grand lodge had become extinct, "or had formed such relations with the Grand

Orient as authorized it to be treated as extinct." "But," says the brother, just named, "it was a good enough grand lodge to create lodges which could take part in forming a new grand lodge; and the question is a very serious one whether a portion of its lodges, acting through a convention and not in the grand lodge itself, can create a new grand lodge."

In the judgment of your committee it is not clear that the Grand Lodge of Colon was in such a condition as to justify the formation within the jurisdiction claimed by it, of another grand lodge.

It does not appear to the satisfaction of your committee that whatever changes were necessary in the system of masonic government in Cuba, could not have been made by reforms and improvements in the Grand Lodge of Colon.

Neither is it shown that the call for the formation of a new grand lodge was a general call to all the Cuban lodges.

The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick has not entered into fraternal relations with any masonic government in Cuba. But it cannot withhold sympathy from the effort that is being now made by the Cuban brethren to lay solidly there the foundations of the craft. The Havana movement was undoubtedly well intended, its object being to free craft masonry from a dependence upon any other masonic system. But to recognize the Grand Lodge of Cuba would be—even if there were no other objections—to practically declare irregular the large number of lodges and brethren who in the troublous times of the late revolution on the island, and through many difficulties have been, and are now, steady in their allegiance to the original authority of the Grand Lodge of Colon. Not to formally recognize either will be no disadvantage to the true interests of the craft in the island. It ought not to be difficult for the freemasons of Cuba to heal their differences, to form one reliable governing body for craft masonry according to the ancient constitutions and the present practices of the society, and thus present to the world the pleasing picture of unity and harmony in that fair and favored land.

The committee offers the following resolution :-

Resolved, That the committee be discharged from any further consideration of this subject.

Social, kind, charitable and genial, honorable in all his dealings, the good that he did will live after him, and the remembrance of his many virtues will long linger in grand lodge."

Grand Master's Address.

Standing Resolutions, Decisions, &c., having the force of law.

Resolved, That any lodge within the jurisdiction of this grand lodge, whose aprons, collars and jewels, or either of them, may not be in accordance with the provisions of the constitution, shall be permitted to wear such aprons, collars and jewels, or either of them, until they may require a new outfit.

-Grand Lodge, January 1868.

Resolved, That the work as exemplified this evening, be adopted for the lodges, they being allowed to use odes authorized by the Most Worshipful Grand Master, instead of scripture readings, and that a committee be appointed to whom the subject of work shall be referred, such committee to report at the next annual communication of grand lodge.

-Grand Lodge, January 1868.

Resolved, That the board of general purposes be authorized to prepare suitable forms and ceremonies for the purposes of grand lodge and its subordinates, and have the same printed for distribution when they deem it advisable.

-Grand Lodge, September 1868.

Whereas, By the constitutions of the grand lodge, power has been delegated to the board of general purposes to order the payment of accounts against grand lodge, together with the incidental expenses of the grand secretary's office:

Therefore resolved, That the board is empowered to make such regulations as it may deem expedient, as to the manner of drawing moneys for the payment of its orders, etc., and the grand treasurer is authorized and required to honor and pay out of the funds of grand lodge all orders and drafts so made upon him by the board.

-Grand Lodge, September 1868.

Resolved, That in the system of representation with other grand lodges no higher rank than that of past senior grand warden shall be conferred by this grand lodge, upon representatives from such grand lodges.

-Grand Lodge, September 1868.

Resolved, That no higher title than "right worshipful" be conferred on any past grand officer.

-Board General Purposes, October 1868.

Resolved, That the board of general purposes be directed to prepare annually a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of grand lodge up to the first September of each year, and have the same printed and placed in the hands of the members of grand lodge on the first day of each annual session.

-Grand Lodge, September 1869.

Resolved, That the sole right of issuing the constitution is vested in grand lodge.

-Grand Lodge, September 1869.

Resolved, That the board of general purposes be empowered to employ from time to time, such brother or brethren as may be competent, to instruct lodges in the work, and that the sum of two hundred dollars be appropriated out of the funds of grand lodge, to aid lodges requiring such lecturer, the distribution to be made as the board may deem advisable.

-Grand Lodge, September 1870.

Resolved, that the term "seafaring men," in section two of the constitution, under the title "Proposing Members," does not extend or apply to persons employed in vessels known as "coasters," or in any vessels trading or plying between ports on the Atlantic seaboard of North America.

—Grand Lodge, September 1870.

Resolved, That the grand secretary address a circular to the respective lodges to the effect, that they must not employ any brother to impart instruction in the ritual, for remuneration, unless it be a brother authorized by the grand master or board of general purposes.

-Board General Purposes, February 1871.

Resolved, That the work exemplified during the current session be the work and ritual of this jurisdiction, and the respective lodges are hereby required to make themselves fully acquainted with it, and to practice it for the time to come.

-Grand Lodge, September 1871.

Resolved, That applications for dispensations or the transmission of any masonic matter by telegram is hereby deprecated, and that no notice be taken of such telegrams by the grand master or grand secretary, unless they convey applications of the most extreme urgency.

-Board General Purposes, August 1873.

Candidates must be physically qualified to fulfil all the requirements of initiating, passing and raising, and that however much it may be regretted that in particular instances the craft is, by an adherence to the ancient regulations, deprived of the membership of otherwise worthy applicants, the interests of freemasonry are best conserved by a due observance of the ancient landmarks of the fraternity.

-Grand Master, 1873.

Resolved, That the various lodges be required to have the petitions of candidates read in full.

Resolved, That the applications of candidates be handed to the investigating committee who will be required to append their report thereon.

Resolved, That when more than one lodge holds concurrent jurisdiction, the lodge rejecting a candidate shall be required to send a notice of such rejection to the other lodges within that jurisdiction.

-Grand Lodge, September 1874.

Resolved, That lodges of instruction shall be held only in the regular place of meeting of the lodges under whose authority they may be authorized to work.

-Grand Lodge, September 1875.

[April,

Resolved, That at each annual communication of grand lodge the most worshipful the grand master shall appoint a ritual committee and a library committee.

-Grand Lodge, September 1875.

Resolved, That when a new lodge opened under a dispensation or warrant, may require instruction in the work and ritual, the grand master shall be empowered, if he deem it necessary, to appoint a competent brother to visit the lodge for the purpose of giving the officers proper instruction, and such proportion of the expense incurred which to the grand master may appear just and right, shall be paid by the board of general purposes, upon the certificate or recommendation of the grand master.

-Grand Lodge, September 1876.

Resolved, That it is not advisable to touch the fund (Fund of Benevolence) except in case of some extraordinary emergency, until the principal shall have reached a figure when it will yield an annual income of at least one hundred and twenty dollars, say six per cent on two thousand dollars.

-Board General Purposes, September 1877.

Resolved, that no lodge or brother shall print or publish, or cause to be printed or published, the constitution of this grand lodge or any portion thereof.

-Grand Lodge, September 1878.

Resolved, That in order to facilitate the business of grand lodge at the annual communications and to place matters of interest before representatives to enable them to legislate in respect thereto, it shall be incumbent on the grand master, deputy grand master, grand treasurer and grand secretary to have their addresses, reports, etc., completed in time to have them printed previous to the opening of grand lodge.

-Grand Lodge, September 1878.

Resolved, That until further ordered, the hour of three in the afternoon, shall be the time for opening grand lodge at its annual communications.

-Grand Lodge, September 1878.

Resolved, That this grand lodge does hold as a matter of unquestionable masonic law, that when an independent grand lodge has been duly organized in any political territory, it has the undoubted right to exclusive masonic jurisdiction within that territory, and that the erection or continuance of lodges by any other grand body against the supremacy of the local grand lodge, is an invasion of masonic territory alike subversive of good government and disloyal to masonic constitutional authority.

-Grand Lodge, September 1878.

Resolved, That immediately after the close of the present session of grand lodge, it shall be the duty of the grand master to draw upon the grand treasurer a check, which check shall be countersigned by the grand secretary, for the sum of five hundred dollars, and on the second day of January next or first lawful day thereafter, and on the second day of January or next lawful day of every year succeeding, the grand master shall draw a similar check, which check shall be countersigned by the grand secretary, upon the grand treasurer, until the whole amount of the stock subscribed be paid up, and the grand treasurer as soon as he shall have funds wherewith to meet the checks aforesaid, shall annually pay the sum of five hundred dollars to the treasurer of the masonic hall company or other person legally entitled to receive and give the company's receipt for the same. This resolution shall be the warrant of the above-mentioned officers of grand lodge for the payment without any other order of the sums above specified.

-Grand Lodge, September, 1878.

Resolved, That the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick views with great surprise and profound regret the action taken by the Grand Orient of France in striking out from her affirmation of masonic principles the declaration of belief in the existence of God and in the immortality of the soul. That such action is in direct antagonism to the fundamental principles of freemasonry and distinctly opposed to the ancient charges, landmarks and traditions of the fraternity:

And further Resolved, That this grand lodge, in consequence of such action, does hereby suspend all fraternal communication with the Grand Orient of France, while she persists in a course so contrary to the spirit and genius of our ancient craft:

And further Resolved, That this grand lodge cannot recognize as "true and genuine" brethren, any who have been initiated in lodges that either deny or ignore a belief in the Great Architect of the Universe and the immortality of the soul. All lodges within this jurisdiction are therefore directed not to admit as a visitor any brother hailing from a lodge under the Grand Orient of France, unless,—first, he proves that he has been initiated according to the ancient rites and ceremonies in a lodge professing belief in the Great Architect of the Universe: and second, nor unless he himself shall acknowledge that this belief is an essential landmark of freemasonry.

-Grand Lodge, September, 1878.

Resolved, That at each annual communication of grand lodge there shall be appointed a committee of three, to whom shall be referred during the recess of grand lodge, communications and other documents from other grand bodies who ask to enter into fraternal intercourse, or seek recognition.

-Grand Lodge, September 1878.

Resolved, That at each annual communication of grand lodge, there shall be appointed a committee of three to whom the grand master may refer, during the recess of grand lodge, the petitions of lodges under dispensation who desire to receive warrants of constitution, and such committee shall report at the next annual communication.

-Grand Lodge, September 1878.


