And a large representation of the craft, including many past grand officers.

Grand Lodge was opened in ample form at half-past two o'clock.

The M.W. the Grand Master stated that he had convened this Special Communication of Grand Lodge in order to pay the last tribute of respect to the remains of our late Grand Secretary, V.W. Brother T. Nisbet Robertson. He deemed it right, in view of the Masonic activity, zeal and capacity of the late Grand Secretary, and a proper tribute to his memory, that Grand Lodge itself should take the functions which ordinarily would belong to the Subordinate Lodge (Albion) of which our late brother was a member, and to inter his remains with all the respect the craft can pay an eminent and faithful brother, whose discharge of his official duties in many capacities had won him the highest esteem.

The M.W. Grand Master then feelingly referred to his own personal relations with Brother Robertson, which began when he was admitted into the craft. He (the Grand Master) was one of the first candidates upon whom Brother Robertson, as Worshipful Master of Albion Lodge, had conferred a degree, and in all the intervening years their relations—business, Masonic and social, had been unbroken; they had not been strained by any strong difference of opinion or sentiment; upon this fact he reflected now with a strong sense of gratification.

Letter of regret was read from R.W. Brother William Wedderburn, P.G.M., as follows:

HAMPTON, April 26, 1894.

M.W. and Dear Sir and Brother:

I most sincerely regret that judicial appointments, made some time ago, and due at the Court House here to-morrow, and which I am unable to postpone, will render it impossible for me to attend the funeral of our late Brother Robertson—a worthy and estimable and patriotic citizen and most exemplary Freemason. I should, if able, have joined my brethren with my humble but true tribute to his character and standing in the craft and the community.

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Grand Master's Address.

THE M.W. Grand Master delivered his Annual Address, as follows:

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

Once more I take pleasure in bidding you a hearty welcome to our Annual Communication, - praying that the Grand Architect of the Universe may bless our consultations and labours, and that our meeting may be harmonious and pleasant.

Another year has passed with its joys and sorrows, its encouragements and disappointments, and it now becomes my duty to render to you an account of my official acts during that period.

It is a source of great satisfaction to me to be able to report that, during the year just passed, peace and harmony have prevailed within our borders, and that a fair measure of prosperity has been vouchsafed to the craft.

Again the melancholy duty devolves upon me of recording the death of an eminent fellow-labourer. Again have we heard the near beating of the death angel's pinions, and again have we looked upon the fresh tokens of our common loss.

On the 25th day of April last, died at his home in St. John, V. W. Brother T. Nisbet Robertson, in the term of his office as Grand Secretary. His worth as a Mason, as a citizen, as a man - the sincere mourning of personal friends and of the general public-of fellow-craftsman and of fellow-citizen alike - have attested better than could any praise of mine to our loss.

Zealous and energetic all labours of public and common interest, he brought to bear on them the same methodical business-like habits and calmness of judgment that marked his private affairs. In him the fraternity has lost a good and faithful craftsman. His thirty-one years of work in Masoury are now all over, but his example still lives to the lasting good of the craft.

In view of the fact that he died in his term of office, and as a tribute to his zeal, activity and capacity as a Mason, and a proper tribute to his memory. I deemed it right that Grand Lodge itself should assume direction of those last sad rites we pay to the dead.

I have appointed W. Brother F. W. Wisdom Grand Secretary.

Worshipful Brother James Humphrey, Past Master and Treasurer of Corinthian Lodge, died in Montreal, April 16th, and was buried at Hampton with Masonic Ceremonial on the 18th inst. A warm hearted and generous Mason, and an active citizen, his early demise is deservedly mourned, not only by his Masonic Brethren, but by the entire community in which he lived.

Death has also taken his quota of illustrious Masons from among the craftsmen of other jurisdictions. Let us record our sympathy with

In August last, Right Worshipful Brother Zelotes H. Mason, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Florida died.

In March, the Grand Lodge of Georgia was called upon to mourn the loss of its official head, and Most Worshipful Brother John S. Davidson, who had occupied the Grand East for eleven years, passed to his reward

Right Worshipful Brother Frederick R. Fox, for eleven years Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Maine, died June 5th.

The Masons of Tennessee mourn the loss of that distinguished Masonic scholar, Past Grand Master George C. Connor, who died March 9th.

That venerable English Mason, E. Brackstone Baker, for many years representative of this Grand Lodge near the Grand Lodge of England, has passed away. Brother Baker ever took a lively interest in the affairs of this Grand Lodge, and only a short time before his death he wrote the Grand Secretary commending to our fraternal regard Brother the Reverend A. G. Hamilton Dicker.

I have nominated Worshipful Brother W. D. Forster for appointment as representative of the Grand Lodge of Michigan near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, in place of Right Worshipful Brother George F. Stickney.

A circular has been received from the recently formed Grand Lodge of Oklahoma Territory, containing a notification that the Grand Lodge had by a unanimous vote abolished the Grand Representative system in their jurisdiction.

The official visits that I have been able to make during the year have been a source of much pleasure to me, and everywhere I have gone I have been received with cordial greeting, and treated with the most courteous hospitality.

November 7th, 1893, I visited Sussex Lodge, No. 7. The attendance was good-visiting Brethren being present from St. Andrews, Milltown, and Upper Mills, as well as from Calais in the neighbouring jurisdiction of Maine.

The M. M. Degree was conferred by the Worshipful Master and Officers of the Lodge in a manner that elicited my warm commendation. I found Sussex Lodge meeting in a new hall, commodious and admirably furnished, and in every way a credit to our Brethren at St. Stephen.

On St. John the Evangelist's Day I visited Albion Lodge, and installed Worshipful Brother T. W. Peters.

January 4th, I visited officially Carleton Union Lodge, and presented to R.W. Brother Edwin J. Wetmore the Jewel which the Board of General Purposes had procured in pursuance of a resolution of Grand Lodge.

The occasion was one of great interest; the large attendance and enthusiasm of the craftsmen assembled testified to the esteem and regard entertained for this distinguished Brother. It was a source of great satisfaction to myself to be able to express in his mother Lodge, surrounded by those who know him best, my appreciation of his excellent work as Grand Secretary, and my obligations to him during the four years we had been associated in office.

January 9th, I paid an official visit to Hibernia Lodge, and installed Worshipful Brother J. A. Magilton, who for a second term occupies the chair.

January 18th, I visited The Union Lodge of Portland, and placed in the chair Brother J. T. Hartt.

Corinthian Lodge, which had been in a dormant condition, has, I am glad to inform you, resumed active work, and is already in a prosperous state.

In February, I visited this Lodge officially, and installed Brother George U. Hay, who had been elected at the January meeting, a dispensation having been issued for that purpose.

April 17th, accompanied by Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master Fleming, and Worshipful Brothers James Masters, George Coggin, and B. S. Black, I visited Albert Lodge.

We received at the hands of the Brethren there a most hearty welcome, and our visit was a most enjoyable one. At the request of the Worshipful Master, Brother J. Alex. Fullerton, I conferred the M. M. Degree upon three candidates. I found the condition of this Lodge very satisfactory.

July 5th I paid an official visit to St. Mark's Lodge, No. 5. I received a most cordial welcome from the Brethren in St. Andrews, and I am glad to be able to report St. Mark's Lodge in excellent condition, both financially and Masonically.

Such instruction as I was able to give in the ritual I gave; and there was every evidence that the Worshipful Master and Officers were deeply interested.

There were several visitors present from the neighboring town of St. Stephen; they having driven down for the express purpose of attending this meeting.

The reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, which I append, will show fully the condition of the craft over the Province.

You will rejoice to know that the matter of complaint, St. Croix against Alley Lodge, to which I referred in my report of last year, and which was then under correspondence, has been settled in a manner satisfactory to St. Croix Lodge and to the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Maine.

I feel that this is a matter for congratulation to the Brethren of both jurisdictions, and I heartily re-echo the wish of the Grand Master of Maine, that "future harmony and abundant prosperity may attend the Brethren of both jurisdictions."

Lebanon Lodge, which for some time had been struggling to maintain an existence, has at last decided to surrender its warrant, and has now ceased to exist. Many of its members, I am given to understand, will affiliate with Sussex Lodge, No. 4, and so will not be lost to the craft.

I have received a petition in constitutional form from G. F. Burtt and twelve other Master Masons, praying that a Lodge may be established at Hartland, in Carleton County. As there was no evidence that the petition was recommended by the nearest Lodge (Woodstock), I have directed the Grand Secretary to draw Brother Burtt's attention to that requirement of our Constitution, and there at present the matter rests.

I have been pleased to approve an alteration in the By-Laws of Alexandria Lodge, changing their place of meeting from St. Mary's to Marysville, in the County of York.

I have also approved a change in the By-Laws of Corinthian Lodge, altering their place of meeting from the Masonic Hall to Smith's Hall, in Hampton, such a change being necessary, owing to the Masonic Hall being uninhabitable.

In August of last year a Masonic Congress assembled in the City of Chicago, and continued in session four days. Most of the jurisdictions on this continent were represented on that occasion, and many important Masonic topics were discussed. For your consideration I reproduce here the conclusions reached upon the following questions:

Grand Lodge Sovereignty.—The conclusion of the Congress is, that a Grand Lodge duly organized in a State or other autonomous territory is rightfully possessed of absolute Masonic sovereignty therein.

A Plea for Improved Proceedings.—The conclusion of the Congress is, that the formation of Masonic libraries should be encouraged and fostered; and inasmuch as the published proceedings of our Grand Lodges and other Masonic bodies do and ever will constitute the larger part of such libraries, greater care and more pains should be bestowed upon the preparation and publication of such proceedings, to the end that they may have greater value in every Masonic collection, and that there should be a freer and more generous distribution of proceedings among the brethren to the end that Masonic light may be more generally diffused.

Grand Representatives. —It is the conclusion of the Congress that under the changed condition of selecting Grand Representatives, too little time has elapsed to give opportunity for definite judgment as to the usefulness of the system, and it should therefore be continued.

The Prerogatives of Grand Master. — It is the conclusion of the Congress that the dispensing power recognized by the Old Regulation as residing in the person and office of Grand Master, has been so generally exercised by that officer from the organization of Masonry and the Lodge system down to the present time that its existence cannot be successfully denied, but that there are no dispensing powers so residing that may not be limited or wholly denied by the Grand Lodge, save such as inhere in that office under the sanctions of the Ancient Landmarks.

The Ancient Landmarks.—The conclusion of the Congress is, that the Ancient Landmarks are those fundamental principles which characterize Masonry as defined by the Charges of a Freemason, and without which the institution cannot be identified as Masonry.

The Creed of a Mason.—An unequivocal belief and trust in God is the fundamental principle upon which the institution of Freemasonry was founded and must forever rest.

Appeals for Aid. — The conclusion of the Congress is, that worthy Masons are entitled to relief from brethren and Lodges wheresoever they may be found in need of relief, and that the brethren or Lodges granting such aid are not entitled to demand reimbursement from the Lodges in which they hold their membership, but that when a member of one Lodge is relieved by another, and the financial situation of his Lodge is such as to permit, common courtesy and duty alike demand that it should reimburse a poorer Lodge relieving its members. Written or printed appeals for aid which do not secure the indorsement of the Grand Master of the jurisdiction from which they emanate should be discountenanced.

Non-Affiliates. — The conclusion of the Congress is, that every Mason ought to be a member of some regular Lodge, attend its meetings and share its burdens.

Physical Qualification.—It is the conclusion of the Congress that absolute competency to conform literally to all the requirements of the ceremonies of the several degrees of Ancient Craft Masonry fulfils the requirement of physical perfection in a candidate.

Inspection of Lodge Charters. — It is the conclusion of the Congress that a visitor to a Lodge has no right to demand an inspection of the Lodge charter.

I very much regretted that I was unable to accept a very courteous invitation to be present at the celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, on the 5th of June last.

I have received the following circular from the Grand Lodge of Mississippi, containing proposed Rules as to Uniform Jurisdiction over Candidates. As this circular fully explains itself, I shall do no more than commend it to your attentive consideration:

The following proposed "Uniform Rules as to Jurisdiction over Candidates," prepared by Past Grand Master Frederic Speed, and carefully considered by the Law Committee, were adopted by the M. W. Grand Lodge of Mississippi, at its Seventy-Sixth Annual Communication, February, 1894, and the same are fraternally submitted for the consideration and action of the several Grand Lodges:

WHEREAS, it is desirable that there should be uniform rules adopted by all Grand Lodges, relating to the jurisdiction of Lodges over candidates rejected for initiation, and Entered Apprentices and Fellow Crafts applying for advancement, whose place of residence, after petition ing or initiation, is permanently removed outside of the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge having jurisdiction over the Lodges to which they have petitioned, or by which they were initiated, therefore be it

Resolved, That the two rules following be proposed to each Grand Lodge with which this Grand Lodge is in correspondence, for adoption, to become the Uniform Rules relating to jurisdiction over rejected candidates for initiation, and candidates applying for advancement, who have permanently removed beyond the jurisdiction of any Grand Lodge into that of another Grand Lodge; and be it further

Resolved, That said proposed Rules be and the same are hereby adopted by this Grand Lodge, to take effect from and after their adoption by any other Grand Lodge, as between this Grand Lodge and the Grand Lodge, or Grand Lodges, adopting the same; provided, that the laws, rules and regulations of this Grand Lodge, as they now stand, shall remain in full force and effect as between this Grand Lodge and all other Grand Lodges which shall not become parties to the same, by adopting said Rules, to-wit:

Jurisdiction Over Persons Rejected for Initiation.

RULE I. — Whenever any person who shall have been rejected for initiation in any Lodge, shall have removed his place of abode into the jurisdiction of another Lodge, within the jurisdiction of another Grand Lodge, with the intention of making it his permanent place of residence, and shall have resided there not less than one year, and shall again

desire to petition for initiation, he may present his petition to the Lodge under whose jurisdiction he resides, or to any Lodge which has concurrent jurisdiction over that place, which shall thereupon certify the facts to the Lodge which rejected him, and if said Lodge shall not, within six months thereafter, furnish to the Lodge to which said petition is made, the grounds upon which such rejection was made, it may proceed with such petition as in other cases, and that Lodge may initiate him if elected. Whenever the grounds upon which the petitioner was rejected are furnished to the Lodge to which he makes his new petition, it shall judge of the sufficiency thereof, and proceed in its discretion.

Jurisdiction Over Entered Apprentices and Fellow Crafts Petitioning for Advancement.

RULE II. - Whenever an Entered Apprentice, or Fellow Craft, of a Lodge in this jurisdiction shall permanently change his place of abode into the jurisdiction of a Lodge in another Grand Jurisdiction, and shall have resided there not less than one year, and shall desire to be passed, or raised, he may apply to the Lodge under whose jurisdiction he lives, or to any Lodge having concurrent jurisdiction thereover, and if it shall signify its willingness to receive him, and so certify the fact to the Lodge which initiated, or passed him, it shall thereupon strike his name from its roll of Apprentices, or Fellow Crafts, as the case may be, and all jurisdiction over him shall cease; provided, that if the Lodge to which he applies shall reject his petition for advancement, that the jurisdiction of the Lodge which initiated or passed him shall ipso facto be resumed, and his name shall again be entered upon its roll, with a note of the fact; and provided, further, that nothing in this or the preceding Rule, shall prevent a Lodge from initiating, passing, or raising a person as the proxy of another Lodge; in which event the person so initiated, passed, or raised, shall become a member of the Lodge for which it acts, if that would be the effect of being raised in the Lodge for which the degree is conferred, under the laws of its Grand Lodge.

If you will kindly advise me of the action that may be taken, I will notify all the Grand Lodges when all shall have considered the subject.

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Report of Board of General Purposes.

THE R.W. Deputy Grand Master, as President of the Board of General Purposes, submitted the Annual Report of the Board, as follows:

To the M. W. GRAND LODGE of F. and A. M. of New Brunswick:

The Board of General Purposes herewith presents its report for the past year to Grand Lodge.

The Board duly organized at a meeting on the 12th of September, 1893, electing Worshipful Brother A. R. Campbell, Vice-President, and on resolution decided to hold regular meetings on the second Wednesday of November, 1893, February, May, and August, 1894.

In accordance with a resolution passed at the last Communication of Grand Lodge, a committee was appointed to procure a proper Jewel for presentation to V. W. Brother Edwin J. Wetmore, the late Secretary of Grand Lodge. At a subsequent meeting the committee reported that they had procured a suitable Jewel and the Secretary was authorized to draw an order on the Treasurer for the cost.

In order that the several alterations and amendments to the Constitution made since its publication in 1878, may be more conveniently referred to, it was ordered that the Secretary be ordered to have (250) two hundred and fifty copies of the same (with standing resolutions, decisions, etc., having the force of law) printed and placed in the copies of the Constitution now on hand.

The sum of (\$100.00) one hundred dollars was received for interest on bond of the Masonic Hall Company for the Fund of Benevolence and ordered to be placed on special deposit to the credit of that fund.

At the meeting of the Board held on the 9th of May last, a circular letter issued by direction of the M. W. Grand Master in reference to the death of our late V. W. Grand Secretary, T. Nisbet Robertson, and appointment of Brother Wisdom to the office, was ordered to be placed on the minutes, and a resolution was adopted that a committee draft a letter of condolence and forward it to the widow of our late brother.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

The following Resolution was accordingly sent Mrs. Robertson:

"Resolved, That the Board of General Purposes of the Grand Lodge of A. F. and A. M. of New Brunswick, in making a record of the death of Brother T. Nisbet Robertson, recently its Secretary, expresses at the same time its sense of the loss the craft has sustained by the death of a member who for over twenty years devoted himself earnestly and faithfully to the administration of all the affairs brought before the Board, who was constant in attendance, careful in all his methods, and thorough and exact in the performance of his duty, giving to the administration of the business of the fraternity the advantage of experience, a wise judgment and a thorough knowledge of affairs;

"Therefore Resolved, That the Board, whilst thus expressing its sorrow at the death of so excellent a member, is sensible also of the great loss the family of Brother Robertson has sustained in the removal of its head, and expresses to them its deepest sympathy in a dispensation which has taken from them a kind husband and father, and a tender and faithful protector."

Mrs. Robertson, in acknowledging the communication, expressed her deepest gratitude for this expression of sympathy for herself and family in their affliction.

The question of the indebtedness of Grand Lodge on account of the Masonic Hall Company was referred to a Sub-Committee, who submitted the following report:

To the Board of General Purposes of GRAND LODGE:

The Sub-Committee appointed under resolution of the Board under date of May 9th, 1894, to take into consideration the indebtedness of Grand Lodge on account of the Masonic Hall Company with a view, if possible, to reduce some of the burdens of the craft, beg leave to report that they have carefully considered the whole subject.

The only indebtedness of Grand Lodge is on account of Freemasons Hall, in aid of which debentures have been issued, or debentures of the Masonic Hall Company have been endorsed, to the value of (\$22,500.00) twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars since the year 1891; so far (\$12,500.00) twelve thousand five hundred dollars of this indebtedness has been redeemed, leaving (\$10,000.00) ten thousand dollars in debentures out at the present time. These fall due at different periods, but in some years as many as five are payable at or about the same time, the whole being redeemable under existing schemes by the year 1902.

The Sub-Committee having in view the excellent credit of Grand Lodge and the ability it has shown to redeem its indebtedness, and also the cheerfulness and spirit with which its daughter Lodges have born the taxation necessary to enable it to do so much, recommend to the Board to ask Grand Lodge for authority to alter the present scheme of redemption of the bonds, so that hereafter it will be at the option of the Board or of Grand Lodge to redeem but one debenture of (\$500.00) five hundred dollars each year, so that the present indebtedness may extend over a period of twenty years before it is finally extinguished.

To enable this to be done, the Board should take power from Grand Lodge to extend some of the existing debentures as they fall due, or to replace them by the issue of new bonds, under the seal of Grand Lodge, signed by the Grand Master, and countersigned by the Grand Secretary, so that the existing debt need not be redeemed at a greater rate than of (\$500.00) five hundred dollars each year.

This change will involve an annual charge of (\$500.00) five hundred dollars for principal, and (\$600.00) six hundred dollars for interest, which last item will decrease at the rate of (\$30.00) thirty dollars per year, as the debentures are paid off.

In view of this, the Sub-Committee are satisfied that the Annual Dues payable by the Lodges upon their members can be reduced so that Lodges outside of the City of Saint John shall pay only (60c.) sixty cents for each member, and Lodges within the City of Saint John (\$1.00) one dollar for each member, and they recommend the Board to give notice of such amendments to the Constitution as will make legal the payment of such reduced dues upon the members for the year 1895. and thereafter; the scale of dues existing at the present time to be operative for the present masonic year.

Your Sub-Committee believe that the change here recommended will be of much financial benefit to the Lodges, and that it can be effected without in any way impairing the credit of Grand Lodge.

We find Grand Lodge debenture indebtedness to aggregate the sum of ten thousand dollars, in bonds of five hundred dollars each.

Grand Lodge holds 1,390 shares, of the par value of twenty dollars each, of fully paid up and non-assessable stock of The New Brunswick Masonic Hall Company, aggregating the sum of twenty-seven thousand eight hundred dollars.

"For every member, each Lodge within the City of Saint John (East Side) shall pay towards the fund for Grand Lodge purposes one dollar per annum."

On motion of R.W. Brother John V. Ellis, Past Grand Master, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of General Purposes be empowered to arrange for the retirement, as occasion arises, of any existing bonds or certificates of indebtedness of Grand Lodge attached to bonds of the New Brunswick Masonic Hall Company, according to the terms of the report of the Board submitted at this session of the Grand Lodge. So that hereafter Grand Lodge may not have to pay more than five hundred dollars in any one year of its bonded indebtedness; and that the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary be authorized to sign and to affix the Seal of Grand Lodge to any new bonds or certificates of

indebtedness which it may be necessary to issue in order to carry into effect the scheme of redemption of existing indebtedness, recommended by the Sub-Committee of the Board.

COMMITTEE ROOM, FREEMASONS HALL, Saint John, N. B., August 28th, 1894.

To the M.W. GRAND LODGE of New Brunswick:

The Committee to whom was referred the address of the M.W. Grand Master report as follows:

- 1. Your Committee feel that in the death of V.W. Brother T. Nisbet Robertson, Grand Secretary of this Grand Lodge, Freemasonry has lost a valuable expositor and a good and faithful craftsman; one who was ever at his post, and who discharged, to the utmost of his ability, the duties of the several high and honorable positions which he occupied.

- 3. To the sorrowing friends and relatives of our own and other jurisdictions, who mourn the loss of eminent and faithful brethren, we extend our sincere fraternal sympathy.

The Committee is pleased to note that the Grand Master has officially visited many of the Lodges during the year, and feel that his services in this respect cannot be too heartly commended.

The thanks of the craft are also due to the brethren who have accompanied him. These visitations bring together many of the brethren; they help to strengthen the chain of fraternity; they unite craftsmen of different opinions, and they increase the interest which we all feel in each other as members of one common family.

The Committee rejoice to learn that the difference which existed between the St. Croix Lodge, of Maine, and the Alley Lodge has been satisfactorily settled. The craft in New Brunswick desires sincerely to respect the jurisdictional rights of Sister Grand Lodges, and all of our Lodges should be most careful not to infringe upon these rights in any way. A close observance of our own constitutional regulations in this respect is urged upon all members of Lodges.

The Committee regrets to learn that Lebanon Lodge, Sackville, has been compelled to surrender its warrant, but hopes that by this proceeding much benefit will accrue to the Lodge at Dorchester, one of the oldest and most faithful in this jurisdiction.

The revival of Corinthian Lodge is satisfactory, as that Lodge had, at one time, a splendid reputation for its zeal and energy. The Committee also notes with pleasure the probability of the establishment of a Lodge in the flourishing district of Hartland.

Neither the Committee nor Grand Lodge has time at this Annual Communication to fully consider the important matters submitted for consideration by the Grand Master in respect to the conclusions of a Masonic Congress at Chicago, and of certain legal propositions offered by the Grand Lodge of Mississippi for general acceptance. It is therefore recommended that these matters be referred to the Committee on Regulations with Foreign Grand Lodges to consider them during recess and to report thereon at the next Annual Communication as to what action, if any, be necessary; the members of Grand Lodge being invited in the meantime to inform themselves as far as they can upon these matters.
