GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

The M. W. Grand Master then arose in the East and delivered the following Address.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

Brethren of Grand Lodge:

Through the mercies of the Great Architect of the Universe, we are permitted to assemble in this Forty-Second Communication of the Ancient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick, and our first duty as well as privilege, is to offer up heartfelt acknowledgment for the many blessings bestowed upon us since we met in Grand Lodge one year ago.

To all the Brethren assembled, I extend fraternal greetings and a warm welcome at this time.

It is with feelings of deep regret, that owing to circumstances over which I had no control, the plans I had mapped out when you again elected me for a second term to the distinguished position of Grand Master, of paving an official visit to the Lodges I had not visited during my first year in office, have been so rudely upset, and I desire to take this means of explaining to the Craft, what might appear as negligence on my part to the duties of this important office.

After my election on August 25th, 1908, I had made all my arrangements to devote the month of October to paying official visits, but owing to the Dominion Elections being called on, I felt that the time was not opportune. Immediately after the elections, I was called away from the Province, and it became necessary to further postpone my visits until the New Year.

Alas, how little we know what is before us! Since the 29th day of December last, I have been away from home at different times, 133 days, so you will understand how impossible it has been for me to make any definite dates for paying official visits.

Having promised many of the Lodges that I would pay them an official visit during the year, and having been prevented from carrying out these promises through absence from the jurisdiction, I felt that an explanation was due the Craft, and while it has not been possible to perform the pledges given, or finish up work I had commenced during my first year, to say nothing of the pleasure it gave me to

personally meet the members of the different Lodges throughout the Province, I trust under the circumstances which I have explained, you will extend to me the principle of our fraternity that "Suffereth long and is kind."

It is a pleasure to be able to again report to you, that Peace, Harmony and Brotherly Love prevail in all the Lodges in the jurisdiction, and that the increasing interest and prosperity referred to in my last communication have more than met our expectations.

It will also be a source of very great satisfaction to every Mason in this jurisdiction to learn from the report of the V. W. the Grand Treasurer, that the financial condition of the fraternity is better than ever before reported.

The condition of affairs shows us that we have returned to an era of prosperity and should be the means of spreading the benefits of this fraternity to many others in the years to come, so that the golden tenet, Relief, can be distributed more generally to worthy distressed brothers, their widows and orphans.

While it is a matter of rejoicing to us to learn that the bonds which unite us together have been extended to quite a number during the year, we also realize with feelings of sadness that some ties have been broken since last we met, and the familiar faces we have seen so regularly at the communications of Grand Lodge in past years are no longer here to welcome us.

OBITUARY.

Worshipful Brother Frank L. Tufts, who died September 19th, 1908, was initiated in Albion Lodge June 2nd, 1882. received the Master's Degree in August of that year, and was Master of the Lodge in 1887-1888. He discharged the duties of that office with care and assiduity. In 1904 and three succeeding years he held the office of Grand Director of Ceremonies, having previously been assistant in that office. In both capacities he was well known throughout the Province, and he cheerfully responded to visitation calls, showing himself ever ready to help, serve and instruct his brethren. In many of the branches of the Society he was an active worker, and his gentle manner and cheerful spirit won for him general good will. His death was sincerely mourned.

In the death of Worshipful Brother George Thompson, which occurred in St. John, N. B., December 7th, 1908, the Masonic fraternity suffered a loss, particularly New Brunswick Lodge, No. 22, of which

Lodge he was a Past Master, and for upwards of fifteen years, or until his death, he filled the office of Secretary efficiently.

Brother Thompson received his Entered Apprentice Degree in New Brunswick Lodge in April of 1874, and the Fellow Craft and Master Mason Degrees in May and June of the same year. Unassuming, courteous in deportment and conscientious in the discharge of all duties, truly his was "a well spent life."

Zion Lodge mourns one of its oldest members, Worshipful Brother Henry Teakles. Raised August 26th, 1868, our Worshipful Brother was elected to the chair of his mother Lodge in 1878. From 1892 until the time of his death he filled the office of Treasurer. Worshipful Brother Teakles always took deep interest in the welfare of Zion Lodge, and in the affairs of Freemasonry in general. Of a quiet and retiring disposition he yet proved himself to be a man and a mason of sterling worth and integrity, and of him it might be truly said that they who knew him best loved him most. Our late Worshipful Brother was called to appear before the Supreme Architect of the Universe December 20th, 1908, and was followed to the grave by many sorrowing friends, and laid to rest with Masonic honors.

Worshipful Brother Ora Patton King was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason September 4th, 1889, and was elected to the chair in 1901. Our Worshipful Brother was a man of much public spirit and took a prominent position in his native town of Sussex as well as in public life in New Brunswick, being a barrister of no mean standing and a member for several terms of the local legislature. Brother King was a zealous and enthusiastic mason, and was deeply interested in the affairs of Zion Lodge. In 1901, Worshipful Brother King was called to fill the office of Grand Director of Ceremonies of the Grand Lodge. On March 8th, 1909, our Worshipful Brother was summoned to appear before the Supreme Architect of the Universe, thus bringing to an early close a life of much promise and ability. He was buried in the Cemetery at Sussex Corner with full Masonic honours, a large concourse of Masons and other friends from near and far testifying by their presence their esteem and respect for our departed Brother.

Hibernia Lodge, No. 3, lost two from the roll of its Past Masters. Worshipful Brother Frederick D. Miles died April 13th, 1909, at a comparatively early age. Only so recently as 1907 he filled the chair of Master, and was a genial and good officer, a man of sterling character and most kindly disposed towards his Brethren.

August

A well known member of the craft in St. John passed away in the person of Worshipful Brother Wentworth E. Wilson, Past Master of Hibernia and Past Senior Grand Deacon. Until within the past few years he was a most regular attendant at his lodge and a constant visitor at the other city lodges, well willing to bear a share of the labour. He passed through the minor offices to the chair in 1890, and for a long time prior to his death, on July 7th, 1909, had been the Chaplain of his Lodge.

Benjamin Lodge, No. 31, Andover, has also been doubly bereaved and mourns two very valuable members. Past Masters J. Allan Perley and M. Stanley Sutton. The former died November 26th, 1908. A lifetime spent in that section of the Province had made him widely known and highly esteemed as a man and as a mason. His interest in the affairs of the Lodge was unceasing, and the prosperity of Benjamin Lodge, in later years, was in no small degree due to the active part he took in all its work.

Worshipful Brother Sutton was another whose membership had meant a great deal to Benjamin Lodge. He served three consecutive years as Master, and for the past ten years had been its Treasurer. In the business life of the community he had reached a very prominent position the result of his industry and capacity. No one could be more missed by his Brethren than Brother Sutton.

There died at Shediac early in the year Worshipful Brother John McFadzen, formerly a member of Albion Lodge, No. 1, but since 1884 a member of Zetland Lodge, No. 24, to the chair of which he was elected in 1887 and 1888. In the recent reviving of Zetland Lodge, Worshipful Brother McFadzen took an eager interest and continued to display it up to the time of his death.

VISITATIONS.

Unfortunately, I cannot as already explained, refer to the many official visits I expected and hoped to make, but the few visits, both official and unofficial, I had the privilege of making, have been bright spots in the second year of my administration.

One of the most pleasant gatherings I have ever attended was on the occasion of the official visit of the D. D. G. M., M. L. Young, to Sussex Lodge, No. 7. It was indeed a memorable occasion, being Thanksgiving Day in Canada, as well as the birthday of His Most Gracious Majesty, King Edward VII.

D. D. G. M. Young will give you full particulars in his report. I attended as a Past Master of Sussex Lodge, No. 7.

On Sunday, December 27th, I accompanied V. W. Brother Geo. M. Young, P. G. C., W. M., and the officers and members of Sussex Lodge to the Methodist Church, to hear a sermon by the Worshipful Master. Quite a large representation was present and listened most attentively to a very helpful discourse abounding with Masonic information and impressive advice to all.

December 28th I paid an official visit to Sussex Lodge, No. 7, accompanied by nine Past Masters of the Lodge, representing Grand Lodge. At that communication I had the pleasure of installing the Worshipful Master, Brother Richardson, and other officers of the Lodge.

During the evening a letter to the Worshipful Master from the Grand Secretary of the United Grand Lodge of England was read, conveying a message from His Majesty, King Edward VII, in acknowledgment of his receipt of a copy of the programme of the meeting of November 9th. At the close of the installation ceremonies, all present were invited by the Worshipful Master to the banquet hall of the Lodge where refreshments were served and a very pleasant time was spent listening to many brilliant speeches by members of the Lodge and visiting Brethren.

February 12th, accompanied by the largest delegation of Masons I had at any of the official visits made during my terms of office, I visited The Corinthian Lodge, No. 13, of Hampton, N. B., for the purpose of consecrating and dedicating their beautiful new Masonic Hall. With the assistance of the officers of Grand Lodge, the ceremony of spreading the Corn, Wine and Oil, was carried out in a most impressive manner in the presence of the officers and members of The Corinthian Lodge, and a very large gathering of visiting Brethren.

After the services were concluded, we were guests of the Lodge at a banquet in the Lodge room, and spent a most enjoyable two hours, interspersed with speeches, songs and recitations by R. W. Brother Ralph A. March, and Brothers A. E. Massie and S. C. Matthews. Thus ended the pleasantest official visit I had the privilege of making in the second year in office, and the recollection of it will long remain green in my memory. The Brethren of Hampton deserve great praise for the deep and active interest they take in Masonry, and for the very prosperous condition in which the Craft is established there

I was sadly disappointed not being able to be present at the gathering held in Sussex Lodge, No. 7. June 24th. At that time I was out of the Province and could not avail myself of the pleasure it would have given me. From what I have heard from those who were present, it was certainly a most interesting and successful gathering of the Craft. and will be reported fully by District Deputy Grand Master Young.

Another source of regret is the fact that I was not able to be present at the laving of the corner stone of the new Masonic building in Campbellton. From the time I was first elected to the important office of Grand Master, I looked forward to paying an official visit to the Lodges on the North Shore, and am extremely sorry that the pleasure of doing so has been denied me.

Commissions under the Seal of Grand Lodge have, by my direction, been issued to the following Grand Representatives:

R. W. Brother Frederick Kearslev near the Grand Lodge of New Zealand, in the place of Malcolm Niccol, resigned.

R.W. Brother Edward Everett, near the Grand Lodge of Louisiana, in the place of Edwin Marks, deceased.

I wish to recommend Grand Lodge to place the sum of Two Hundred Dollars at the disposal of the Grand Master to provide instruction to private Lodges.

In laying down the gavel I am reminded how poorly my expectations of a year ago have been realized, and before leaving the chair I beg to offer my apologies to the Craft for the non-fulfillment of the duties of this important position.

I hope that an active campaign on the part of my successor may, in a measure, make up for my deficiencies, and that the coming years will demonstrate that the more the sublime teachings of Masonry are understood, the more they will be revered and appreciated.

Let me once more say that no words of mine can adequately convey to the members of the Craft my appreciation of the distinguished honor they have conferred upon me, and in closing I wish to thank the members and representatives of Grand Lodge and the Craft generally, for the courteous treatment I have received from them. May the Blessings of Heaven rest upon the Craft.

Annual Returns for 1908 have been received from thirty-three out of the thirty-seven active Lodges on the Register, and from Lodge No. 27 returns for 1906 and 1907. A synopsis of these returns reveals the following figures:

Although the above figures fall, in some respects, below those of 1907, yet they indicate a very satisfactory Masonic activity, shared in by practically all the Lodges. In point of membership Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, leads the roll with 182, Hibernia Lodge, No. 3, following with 157.

Dispensations of the M. W. Grand Master were issued to the number of twenty-five, all being either to confer degrees at short intervals or to attend Divine Service in regalia.

The edition of the Book of Constitutions having run out, the Board of General Purposes granted authority to have a new edition printed, and this, consisting of 600 copies, has just been received at the office. The needs of the Lodges can therefore be immediately met. As no amendments to the Constitution have been made since 1906, when the last edition was issued, the new copies do not differ in wording from those now in the hands of the Brethren, and are similar in style and paging.

Also, by authority of the Board of General Purposes, three hundred parchment Certificates of Grand Lodge were procured last autumn, the work being again done by the British American Bank Note Company, of Ottawa. All but thirty-five of these have since been issued, and, I am happy to state, that no Certificates called for by the returns are, as far as I am aware, now in arrear.

The report of the Board of General Purposes was next presented and read by the Deputy Grand Master, R. W. Brother Andrew McNichol.

Moved by W. Brother Alexander M. Rowan, seconded by R. W. Brother His Honour Judge Forbes, P. G. M.,

"That the report be received and taken up section by section"— Carried.

The first four sections of the report were, on motion, severally adopted.

Section No. 5, relating to Travelling or Lodge Certificates having been again read, it was moved in amendment by W. Brother A. M. Rowan and seconded by R. W. Brother George W. Rothwell, P. G. W.,

"That Travelling Certificates, bearing the seal of Grand Lodge and signed by the Grand Secretary be issued, on application, to the subordinate Lodges, and be filled in and delivered by the Lodge Secretary to members desiring them."

After a protracted discussion it was moved in amendment to the amendment by R. W. Brother Daniel C. Clark, S. G. W., and seconded by W. Brother William J. Brown,

"That the decision of this matter be deferred until this evening's Session."

The amendment to the amendment, and then the amendment, were put to Grand Lodge and severally declared — Lost.

The section was thereupon formally adopted.

The remaining sections of the report, having been approved of, it was resolved,

"That the report of the Board of General Purposes be adopted and entered upon the Minutes."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge F. & A. M. of New Brunswick:

The Board of General Purposes presents the following report respecting matters which have engaged its attention during the past year.

Four meetings of the Board were held. At the first one, in October last, the Senior Grand Warden, R. W. Daniel C. Clark, was elected Vice-President.

At this meeting the Board took early occasion to entrust to R. W. Brother Edwin J. Everett and the Grand Treasurer the duty of investing for the Fund of Benevolence the sum of \$1,500.00, transferred by Grand Lodge at the Annual Communication, together with the sum of \$500.00, part of the Fund's balance then on hand.

These Brethren subsequently reported that they had purchased Twenty Bonds of the Saint John Railway Company of the par value of \$100.00 each, bearing interest at 5 per cent. These Bonds are now part of the assets of the Fund.

The only matter referred to the Board by Grand Lodge was a proposal to authorize the use by Brethren desiring them of Travelling or Lodge Certificates, such Certificates to be issued by the Lodge after having been signed and sealed by the Grand Secretary, and to be not a substitute so much as an alternative for the present Grand Lodge Certificate.

The matter was fully discussed at three meetings of the Board, and the resolution finally arrived at, though not unanimously, was that in the opinion of the Board it is not desirable for Grand Lodge to issue or to authorize any other than the Grand Lodge Certificate at present in use. The Board therefore respectfully recommends that no departure in the matter of Certificates be made from what has hitherto obtained in this jurisdiction.

The accounts of the past year have been audited by a Committee of the Board, and their report is presented herewith.

It is gratifying to be able to direct the attention of Grand Lodge to its enhanced financial position, and, in view of the good balance on hand, the Board strongly recommends that, as last year, the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars be transferred to the Fund of Benevolence, to be invested under the direction of the incoming Board.

To the Board of General Purposes,

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GRAND LODGE, F. & A.M., New Brunswick:

Your Committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary of Grand Lodge, report as follows:

That we find the books in order and properly kept, and that proper vouchers have been submitted to us for all expenditures. We have pleasure in calling your attention to the gradual increase in the funds of Grand Lodge, and note that while \$1,500 have been transferred to the Fund of Benevolence, our balance in the Bank exceeds that of last year by about \$500.

"That the committee's report be adopted and that its recommendations be carried out."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN RELATIONS.

The Committee on Relations with sister Grand Lodges respectfully report:

That they have considered certain papers referred to them in connection with the Grand Lodge of the State of Oklahoma.

There was a Grand Lodge for the Indian Territory and also a Grand Lodge for the Territory of Oklahoma, both of them legally established and regular. The Congress of the United States by a political act united these two territories and united them into a state, and the two Grand Lodges following the organic law merged into one, and as such they ask our recognition of the proceeding and fellowship with the Grand Lodge of Antient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Oklahoma. Most Worshipful Henry L. Muldrow is Grand Master, and Joseph S. Murrow, of Atoka, and Wm. H. Anderson, of Waurika, are jointly Grand Secretaries. This fusion of the two Grand Lodges was brought about on February 10, 1909, in a manner at once practical and

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harmonious, and this Grand Lodge may properly send congratulations to the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma on the event. In view of the interesting manner in which the union is described in the letter referred to the committee, we recommend that the Grand Secretary be authorized to publish the letter in our proceedings, and the following resolution is offered.

"That the Grand Lodge of the State of Oklahoma, which naturally succeeds to the authority formerly held by the Grand Lodge of the Indian Territory and the Grand Lodge of the Territory of Oklahoma, be recognized as a regular Grand Lodge, with which the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick enters into fraternal relationship, and to which it sends hearty congratulations.

"That the M. W. the Grand Master be respectfully advised to respond to the call of that Grand Lodge for an exchange of representatives."

May 13, 1909.

Right Worshipful Brother:

The Grand Lodges of Indian Territory and Oklahoma were united into one Grand body under the name and style of "The Grand Lodge A. F. and A. M. of the State of Oklahoma," in a convention held at Guthrie on the 10th day of February, 1909.

On February 9th, the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma held its regular Annual Communication and wound up its affairs. The Grand Lodge of Indian Territory met in Grand Communication on the same day, at the Temple, at McAlester, in a meeting called especially for the purpose of closing up all of its affairs, which was done in peace and harmony.

That night, after finishing up its business, the members of the Grand Lodge of Indian Territory were taken in a special train of two long sections to Guthrie to attend the convention, arriving there early in the morning of the 10th. The Grand Lodge of Oklahoma met this special train at the depot, in Guthrie, and the two Grand bodies marched in double file, in a column more than three blocks long, to the big Temple, and all the brethren registered in the new Grand Tyler's record, made especially for that purpose.

At 2 o'clock p. m., Grand Master Hoag, of Oklahoma, opened the convention with an excellent address, in which he introduced Most Worshipful Leo E. Bennett, (who was Grand Master of Indian Territory at the time the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma was organized) as the presiding officer of the convention.

Brother Bennett then introduced Most Worshipful Joseph S. Murrow. that veteran Grand Secretary, as the secretary of the convention, and Wm. M. Anderson the Grand Secretary of Oklahoma, as assistant secretary of the convention.

A constitution had been prepared by a committee of brethren from each Grand body, which was presented to the convention and adopted unanimously.

Under this constitution, the following officers were unanimously elected as the first officers of the consolidated Grand Lodge:

Henry L. Muldrow, of Indian Territory jurisdiction, Grand Master, Tishoninge.

George Ruddell, of Oklahoma jurisdiction, Deputy Grand Master, Weatherford.

Alexis Eddleman, of Indian Territory jurisdiction, Grand Senior Warden, Marietta.

Charles R. Cook, of Oklahoma jurisdiction, Grand Junior Warden, Snyder.

Leo E. Bennett, of Indian Territory jurisdiction, Grand Treasurer, Muskogee.

Joseph S. Murrow, of Atoka, Indian Territory jurisdiction, and Wm. M. Anderson, of Waurika, Oklahoma jurisdiction, (jointly) Grand Secretaries.

Wm. R. Brown, of Oklahoma jurisdiction, Grand Lecturer, El Reno.
W. H. Talmadge, of Indian Territory jurisdiction, Grand Orator,
McAlester.

The convention was then dissolved and the Grand Lodge of the State of Oklahoma was opened in AMPLE FORM.

On Thursday, February 11th, much necessary business was transacted the appointive officers named, the various committees appointed, and McAlester was selected as the place for holding the next Annual Communication, which will be on the second Tuesday in February, 1910.

There was not a jar to mar the harmony of all these proceedings; everything passed off with the very best of feeling and most fraternal kindness, and each side vied with the other in seeing which best could work and best agree. There was not a single dissenting vote in all the proceedings, and there were many incidents showing that these two Grand bodies were united in Brotherly love and affection, as well as in law, in the most cordial and satisfactory manner.

This union doubles the strength of Masonry in the New State, there being now nearly four hundred lodges and quite twenty thousand members in "The Grand Lodge of the State of Oklahoma," and it will stand well up among the strong Grand Lodges of the world.

R. W. Brother Edwin J. Everett, P. G. M., brought up the matter of the regalia of Grand Lodge officers. The regalia, through long use, had become worn and shabby and was now hardly worthy of Grand Lodge.

R. W. Brother Everett concluded by moving,

"That it is the opinion of Grand Lodge that a new complete set of regalia should be obtained, and that the obtaining of it be referred to the Board of General Purposes with power to act."

The motion was seconded by R. W. Brother His Honour Judge Forbes, P. G. M., and — Carried unanimously.

Grand Lodge then took recess.

TUESDAY EVENING.

August 24th, 1909.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at eight o'clock, the M. W. Grand Master in the East.

The Credential Committee made a final report as to members present at the Communication.

R. W. Brother Robert Murray, P. G. W., made a verbal statement as to the financial position of Lodge Saint John, No. 27, at Bathurst, the facts having come to his knowledge, during the past year, when visiting the Lodge as District Deputy Grand Master. The Lodge had passed through a

period of depression and lack of work, and as a consequence its obligations to Grand Lodge could with difficulty be met. It would be a great boon to the Lodge if these obligations were cancelled. R. W. Brother Murray also read a written statement prepared by the Lodge Secretary and moved, seconded by W. Brother James McIntosh, P. G. D.,

"That the fees and dues payable to Grand Lodge by Lodge Saint John, No. 27, in respect of the years 1906 to 1909 inclusive, be remitted"—The motion was Carried.

The M. W. Grand Master stated that he had received a message from R. W. Brother Julius T. Whitlock, P. G. M., regretting his unavoidable absence.

It being now the hour of 8.45, Grand Lodge proceeded to the order of the day, the election of officers.

The M. W. Grand Master appointed as Scrutineers R. W. Brother Allan W. Chapman and W. Brothers Arthur W. Sharp, Stewart L. Morrison and John W. Hoyt. These Brethren were presented to the East and made the usual declaration. The Constitutional regulations governing elections were then read.

The M. W. Grand Master declared the above named Brethren to be duly elected to their respective offices and thanked the Scrutineers for the satisfactory performance of their duties.

Resolved on motion of R. W. Brother The Hon. John V. Ellis, P. G. M.,

"That when Grand Lodge takes recess, it take recess until 3 o'clock to-morrow afternoon."

Grand Lodge then took recess.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

August 25th, 1909.

The M. W. Grand Master took the chair at 3 o'clock and Grand Lodge resumed labour.

The Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address, through R. W. Brother The Hon. John V. Ellis, P. G. M., presented the ensuing report:

The special committee, to which was referred for consideration the Address delivered at the opening of this session of Grand Lodge by the M. W. the Grand Master respectfully report:

That the cordial manner in which the Grand Master greets the Brethren is responded to by them with all the heartiness and brotherly feeling which they have for one whose kindness, courtesy and good will towards all his Brethren have been constantly displayed in the different positions which he has so worthily and satisfactorily occupied in the Craft.

Grand Lodge will readily accept the statement of the Grand Master, that conditions which he could not control prevented him from carrying out intentions formed early in the year to make a round of

visitations. And, there will be sympathy with him in his regrets that he was unable to be present at the laying of a corner stone of the new Hall at Campbellton, or to visit the Lodges at the North Shore. For Grand Lodge is fully cognizant of the fraternal and spirited hospitality of the Brethren in that part of the Province, and a Grand Master misses much of the joy of life, who goes through the Chair without visiting them. However, during his two years of office, the Grand Master has been able to pay a number of visits to different Lodges outside of the city, by which the Craft has been greatly benefited.

Grand Lodge will note with pleasure the interesting observations made by the Grand Master respecting the meeting, for the dedication of the new Hall of Corinthian Lodge, Hampton, reported by all who have seen it, to be one of the best appointed Lodge rooms in the jurisdiction, and also what is said respecting meetings of Sussex Lodge which he attended. There is useful suggestions in his observation of methods by which the ordinary meetings of the Craft may be increased in interest.

The simple words in which the Grand Master refers to the Brethren whose labors are ended and who have entered upon their rest, needs no comment from the committee. They are reminders to us all that the day will come when our records will be tersely summed up, and let us hope, kindly. May we all so live that we leave behind us neither obligations unfilled nor worthless memories.

The recommendation that the sum of two hundred dollars be placed at the disposal of the Grand Master for the ensuing year for purposes of instruction ought to be approved, and the committee recommend an appropriation to that extent for the purpose.

The committee agrees with the Grand Master that all the conditions of the Craft have greatly improved in the past few years, for which we ought to be thankful to our Heavenly Master, whose care and prudence we gratefully acknowledge. With the increase of our revenue we can enlarge our benevolent fund and with a good income for current purposes we can proceed at an early date to carry out some of the benevolent teachings of the Craft in regard to those who are in distress, and thus demonstrate that the more the teachings of our institutions are known, the more they will be appreciated and revered.

In concluding these echoes of the Grand Master's Address, the committee unite in the Grand Master's prayer "May the Blessing of Heaven rest upon the Craft."

The Grand Master will lay down his official position, with the full appreciation of the craft of the many splendid qualities of heart and

A most interesting communication, addressed to the Grand Secretary, from R. W. Brother Albert J. Kruger, the representative of this Grand Lodge near the Grand Orient of Belgium, was next read. It was dated at Antwerp, July 20th, 1909. To the Communication was attached a list of Belgian Masonic precepts and a translation of a speech made by the Vice-President of the Council of the Grand Orient of France, on the occasion of a visit to a Lodge at Cologne.

Brother Kruger's letter concluded as follows:

"Kindly convey to the Grand Master and Brethren of Grand Lodge, when assembled at the coming Annual Communication, my personal respect and best wishes for their happiness and prosperity."

R. W. Brother The Hon. John V. Ellis, P. G. M., made brief reference to Masonry as existing in France and to the fact there were two Grand Bodies exercising jurisdiction. On his motion it was resolved,

"That the letter from Brother Albert J. Kruger with the accompanying papers and also the question of recognizing the Grand Orient of France, be referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations."

The M. W. Grand Master announced that in view of the recognition of the new Grand Lodge of the State of Oklahoma, he had appointed M. W. David D. Hoag, of Anadarko, as representative of this Grand Lodge, near that of the State of Oklahoma and would recommend the appointment of W. Brother Henry S. Bridges, Grand Master elect, (formerly representing Oklahoma) as the representative near this Grand Lodge.

The installation of officers was next proceeded with.

The Grand Master elect, Worshipful Brother Henry Seabury Bridges, was duly obligated, invested and installed by the retiring Grand Master, proclaimed "Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick" and saluted with the Grand Honours.

REPORTS OF DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

Moncton, N. B., August 5, 1909.

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER:

Dear Sir and Most Worshipful Brother:

Most Worshipful Sir:

I beg to submit my report as D. D. G. M. for District No. 5.

After assuming the duties of office, I learned that my predecessors considered uniformity of work as our greatest need, and my efforts have been directed toward that object.

November 9th, 1909, accompanied by R.W. Brothers Thomas Walker, M. D., P. G. M., Geo. W. Rothwell, P. S. G. W., Chas. K. Howard, P. J. G. W., and W. Brother J. W. Hoyt, P. D. D. G. M, I visited Sussex Lodge, No. 7.

Being the anniversary of The Royal Birthday, and an Old Home night for the members of Sussex, a large number were present, including Brethren from all the Lodges on the St. Croix valley.

The M. M. Degree was exemplified by W. M. Rev. G. M. Young and his staff of officers, Brother Walker acting as critic and instructor, and none present could fail to improve his knowledge of the ritual. The banquet following, with the toast responses, completed an evening which I think none of us will ever forget.

The following evening, accompanied by R. W. Brothers Dr. Walker and Geo. F. Pinder, P. D. G. M., V. W. Brother G. M. Young, P. G. C., W. Brothers A. H. Hiltz, P. D. D., and Dr. W. H. Laughlin, P. D. D., I visited Alley Lodge and spent the most profitable evening I have ever enjoyed at a masonic gathering.

The First and Second Degrees were exemplified, subject to as frequent interruptions for criticism and instruction as seemed necessary. The remainder of the evening was occupied by Dr. Walker, in replying to questions about the M. M.
