Grand Lodge was opened in *ample* form at the hour of three of the clock with solemn prayer and the reading of the 24th psalm.

The M. W. Grand Master directed the Grand Pursuivant to admit Master Masons as Visitors if in good standing and properly clothed.

On motion of R. W. Brother His Honour Judge Forbes, P. G. M., it was ordered, "That the Minutes of the last Annual Communication be taken as read and confirmed, inasmuch as they had been printed in the Annual Proceedings of which copies had been distributed through the jurisdiction."

The minutes of the Emergent Communication of June 25th were read and confirmed.

The M. W. Grand Master directed that the Report of the Credential Committee be presented at the evening session.

The M. W. Grand Master then delivered the following address:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

Brethren of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick:

At the end of another year it is our privilege to meet once more within these walls in that spirit of charity, of brotherly love, and gratitude to God which should always characterize these annual gatherings. Another year in the history of Freemasonry in New Brunswick has passed away and again I stand before you to give an account of my stewardship, and to extend to each one of you a sincere and hearty welcome to this the Forty-fourth Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

As Freemasons we should be profoundly grateful to God for the continued prosperity of this great British Empire of which we form a part, for the constant growth and healthy condition of the Craft within this jurisdiction, and for the harmonious and friendly relations that have existed between this and other Grand Lodges.

It is also my privilege and pleasure to report that peace and harmony have prevailed throughout every part of this jurisdiction, and also that there has been unusual activity in the Subordinate Lodges throughout the Province during the past year. The reports of these Lodges will show a substantial increase in our membership. But, my brethren, it is well to remember that it is not the number of those who wear the lamb skin that has given to our fraternity the proud position that it has always held in the world's estimation, but rather the internal qualifications and exemplary conduct of each individual Mason. No anxiety therefore to increase the membership of our Lodge should ever lead us to permit those to join our ranks who do not maintain that high moral standing which should always characterize good Masons. If we wish to preserve the high standing of our noble fraternity, we must never lose sight of that well known maxim, "Guard well the outer döor."

We have looked forward to this annual communication with feelings of the deepest pleasure, for it is and ever should be a time of enjoyment, yet while we are met here as friends and brothers and have exchanged cordial hand clasps with each other, a feeling of sadness pervades our minds as we recall the fact that many places are to-day vacant in our ranks which were ably filled a year ago — Death, the great reaper, has taken from among us several brothers whose absence we sincerely mourn, and whose companionship is greatly missed. To their surviving friends and relatives we to-day tender our sincere and heart-felt sympathy in their sad bereavement.

The roll of Hiram Lodge is reduced by the death of three of its members, who were also members of Grand Lodge, W. Brother A. G. Beckwith, who had been living for some years in New York died in that city October 23. 1910. He first received light in Solomon's Lodge in the City of Fredericton, February 26, 1861. After his initiation he took an active interest in Masonic work and was elected Worshipful Master of Solomon's, which office he held in 1865 and again 1866. Brother Beckwith often attended the communications of Grand Lodge, and was made Senior Grand Deacon in 1870. During his long residence in Fredericton he was a public spirited citizen and was always active in promoting whatever was conducive to the development and progress of the city. His nature was generous and sympathetic, and those whose privilege it was to know him intimately found him a sincere and warm-hearted friend.

R. W. Brother Alfred F. Street died in the City of Fredericton December 11, 1910. He was initiated in Solomon's Lodge in 1869, and was its Worshipful Master in 1874 and 1875, and afterwards in 1877 and 1878. When St. Andrew's and Solomon's Lodges were united, Brother Street was elected as the first Master of the new Lodge now known as Hiram, No. 6, and discharged the duties of that important office in a highly satisfactory manner. Keenly interested in Masonic work he often attended the communications of Grand Lodge and was elected Junior Grand Warden in 1874. He was thoroughly versed in the ritual and took great pleasure in instructing the younger men, some of whom still feel the benefit of his careful teaching. He was prompt and correct in the discharge of his important duties as Collector of Customs at the port of Fredericton, faithful and devoted to the interests of

Hiram Lodge, and will be much missed by the members of the Craft throughout the Province. At the time of his death Brother Street was the representative of the Grand Lodge of Arkansas near this Grand Lodge.

W. Brother Herbert C. Creed, who had been the efficient Secretary of Hiram Lodge many years, died August 31, 1910. He was initiated in Solomon's Lodge, Fredericton, February 11, 1873, and raised April 3 of the same year. Three years later he was elected Worshipful Master and took a prominent part in the union of Solomon's and St. Andrew's Lodges. It was at his suggestion that the name Hiram was given to the united Lodge. In the Lodge room to-day are the rough ashlar and the perfect ashlar which were presented to Hiram Lodge by W. Brother Creed at the time of the union. From 1880 to 1901 Dr. Creed was not connected with the Lodge, but rejoining in April, 1901, he occupied the office of Chaplain for four years, and that of Secretary until his death. His knowledge of the ritual, his strict attention to detail, and his regular attendance even in failing health exerted an influence for good over his brethren that is not easily overestimated. The sweet remembrance of his many virtues will long be cherished by his many friends in the Lodge for which he loved to work, and which he served so faithfully.

Carleton Union Lodge sincerely mourns' the death of Brother Jarvis Wilson, who died February 27, 1911, at the great age of ninety-four. Brother Wilson was born in the County Tyrone, Ireland, in 1817, came to New Brunswick in 1834, and took up his abode for a time in Queens County, but moved to Carleton in 1845, where he resided until the time of his death. Becoming a member of Carleton Union Lodge in 1862, he maintained a deep interest in its affairs for nearly half a century and faithfully attended the meetings of the Lodge until two months before his death. In 1899 he was made an honorary member of Grand Lodge with the rank of Junior Grand Deacon. In his early days Brother Wilson was a very active business man, was for several years a member of the Common Council, and always identified himself with every movement that concerned the public good. He was always active in the religious life of the community in which he lived, and for nearly fifty years was an elder in the Carleton Presbyterian Church. A good citizen, an upright man and Mason he died sincerely regretted by the whole community in which he had lived for more than sixty years.

Hibernia Lodge lost on the 4th June, 1911, its oldest Past Master, W. Brother John Johnston. Brother Johnston received his M. M. Degree in Hibernia Lodge. September 22, 1863, when the Lodge was working under a charter from the Grand Lodge of Ireland. He was installed Worshipful Master of his Lodge in 1868, and again in 1886. At the time of his death he had been a member of Hibernia for 48 years, and its treasurer for many years. Brother Johnston was a skilful workman in his business, an excellent citizen and a good Mason. Faithful in all things entrusted to his care he died greatly regretted by his many friends and highly respected by all who knew him.

Sussex Lodge, No. 7, lost on the 8th of April, 1911, one of its oldest Past Masters, R. W. Brother Henry Graham, who died very suddenly in St. Stephen at the age of seventyone. Brother Graham was born in England, but came to this province in early life and resided for a time in the City of Fredericton. Later he went to New York to live and received his M. M. Degree in 1866 in Kings County Lodge, No. 511, Flatbush, Long Island. On his return to New Brunswick he took up his residence in St. Stephen, where he affiliated with Sussex Lodge, No. 7, in 1872, and was elected its Worshipful Master in 1880. For a time he took an active interest in the affairs of Grand Lodge GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

and was elected Senior Grand Warden in 1883. In civic and municipal matters he took a very prominent place, having served as Mayor of St. Stephen and also Warden of Charlotte County. At the time of his death he was the Representative of the Grand Lodge of New York near this Grand Lodge.

W. Brother Andrew Skillen, the oldest Past Master of St. Martins Lodge, No. 30, entered into rest at the age of ninety years, on the 10th of August, 1911. He was initiated in True Blue Lodge at Killyleagh, County Down, Ireland, in 1842, and was probably the oldest active Mason in Canada, having been a member of the Craft for more than sixty-nine years. Brother Skillen came to New Brunswick in 1848 and carried on business in the City of St. John until 1855, when he moved to St. Martins where he resided until his death. He was enrolled as a member of St. Martins Lodge at its first meeting February 5, 1872, and was installed Treasurer, a position which he held continuously until 1882, when he was elected Worshipful Master. In 1884 he was again elected Treasurer and held this position until his decease. He was made an honorary member of St. Martins Lodge in 1901, and in 1904 the rank of Past Senior Grand Warden was conferred upon him by this Grand Lodge in recognition of his long and devoted interest in Freemasonry. In his younger days he took an active part in municipal matters and represented St. Martins in the Municipal Council on several occasions. Quiet and unassuming in his manner he possessed the confidence and esteem of his fellow citizens and exemplified in his daily walk and intercourse the highest principles of our order.

The Reverend Richard Mathers, Albion Lodge, No. 1, died December 7, 1910. Grand Chaplain 1882, 1883.

The Reverend C. H. Manaton, Past Master of Sussex Lodge, No. 4, Dorchester, died April 25th, 1910. Robert Hutchinson, Past Master of Lodge Saint Andrew, Richibucto, died August 10th, 1910.

VISITATIONS.

During the past year I have visited quite a number of the Lodges throughout the jurisdiction, not only because it is the duty of a Grand Master to do so, but because I am fully persuaded that such visits, on the part of the officers of Grand Lodge, are productive of much good to the Craft

generally, and aid greatly in securing that accuracy of detail in our ritual which should characterize the working of the several degrees in our Subordinate Lodges. It is a great pleasure to report that, in those Lodges which I was able to visit, the work of conferring the degrees was for the most part admirably done, and that our ritual is being faithfully observed throughout the jurisdiction. The cordial reception extended to myself and the officers of Grand Lodge, who have accompanied me on these occasions, has been a source of very great pleasure to us all, and will remain among the most cherished memories of my life. It is my earnest wish that the present friendly feelings towards Grand Lodge may animate and pervade the minds of the brethren in the several Lodges throughout our jurisdiction during all the years to come.

My first official visit in 1910 was made early in October to the Lodges in the valley of the St. Croix. On October 4th, accompanied by R.W. Brother Thos. Walker, P. G. M., W. Brother Chas. D. Jones, Grand Director of Ceremonies, and Brother D. Arnold Fox, Grand Organist, I left St. John for St. Stephen. On reaching that city we were met at the Windsor Hotel by P. G. M. Julius T. Whitlock, W. Brother M. L. Young, R. W. Brother Walter W. Inches, W. Brother Clifford G. Chase, D. D. G. M., with whom we exchanged most pleasant and cordial fraternal greetings. In the evening, accompanied by all the brethren mentioned above, I visited Sussex Lodge. No. 7, where I was warmly welcomed by R. W. Brother Ias. Vroom, whom I found occupying the chair in the absence of the W.M., Brother Frank H. Beek, whose health had been for some time in a delicate and uncertain state. While we greatly regretted the absence of the Worshipful Master, we were pleased to see so accurate a ritualist as R. W. Brother Vroom in his place, and found him quite equal to the occasion, as he abundantly proved this by the GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

manner in which he worked the First Degree. Brother Vroom also exemplified the work of the Second Degree with the same accuracy that characterized his work in the First. The books and accounts of the Lodge were examined by R. W. Brother Thos. Walker, P. G. M., who acted as Grand Secretary in the absence of R. W. Brother Hartt, and found to be thoroughly and accurately kept. Before closing the Lodge Brother Vroom gave the visiting officers an opportunity for speech making and some interesting remarks were made. The reminiscences of R. W. Brother J. T. Whitlock, P. G. M., who had just returned from a trip across the Atlantic, and who had, during his visit away, attended a session of the Grand Lodge of England, were most instructive and thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Making St. Stephen my headquarters for the next two days I visited in succession Victoria Lodge. No. 26, at Milltown on the night of October 5, and Alley Lodge, No.14, at Upper Mills on the night of October 6. On my visit to Victoria Lodge I was accompanied by R. W. Brother I. T. Whitlock, P. G. M., R. W. Brother Jas. Vroom, P. D. G. M., W. Brother Melvin L. Young, as S. G.W., W. Brother Walter W. Inches, as J. G. W., R. W. Brother I. Twining Hartt, Grand Secretary, W. Brother Clifford G. Chase, D.D.G.M., W. Brother Wm. H. Smith, as G. D. C., W. Brother A. Mungall, as S. G. Deacon, and Brother D. Arnold Fox, Grand Organist. The attendance of members and visitors was large and the W.M., Brother A. P. Dewar, with an efficient corps of officers, worked the Third Degree in a correct and impressive manner. Light refreshments were served in the lodge room at the conclusion of the labors of the evening, and a most enjoyable time was spent in renewing and strengthening old friendships and forming new ones. Victoria Lodge is evidently in a very prosperous condition.

On my visit to Alley Lodge I was accompanied by W. Brother C. G. Chase, as D.G.M., W. Brother Melvin L. Young, as S. G. W., R.W. Brother Walter W. Inches, as J. G. W., R. W. Brother J. Twining Hartt, Grand Secretary, W. Brother A. H. Hiltz, as G. D. of C., and W. Brothers A. A. Laffin and Dr. Lawson, as Grand Deacons. The W.M., Brother Neil D. Smith, was in the East and gave us a hearty welcome. There was no candidate in waiting for a degree, but at my request the Worshipful Master and his officers exemplified the First Degree in a highly creditable manner. A notable feature of the evening was the presentation to the Lodge by the D. D. G. M., W. Brother Clifford G. Chase, of a portrait of his father, the late Granville Chase. The W. M., in accepting the portrait of our late Brother Chase, whose death, at a comparatively early age, had been deeply regretted by the whole community in which he had lived, referred in fitting terms to his sterling qualities as a man and Mason, and mentioned particularly the high esteem which was felt for his memory by the members of Alley Lodge. There can be no doubt that the future of Alley Lodge looks bright and prosperous. The lodge room has been thoroughly renovated within the past few years and now presents a bright and most attractive appearance, many new members have been initiated and all are evidently animated by an earnest and zealous feeling of attachment to our noble Order. During our stay in St. Stephen the many kind attentions extended to both the Grand Secretary and myself by Brothers Walter Inches, Dr. Melvin Young, Jas. Vroom, and P. G. M. Whitlock made this visit a particularly agreeable one and added greatly to our enjoyment.

On the night of October 26, accompanied by P. G. M. Thos. Walker and a large number of Grand Lodge officers, past as well as present, I paid a visit to the Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10, and found W. Brother J. Morris 1911] GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Robinson presiding in the East. After a cordial reception by the W. M., and the interchange of fraternal greetings, the officers of Grand Lodge witnessed the conferring of the Third Degree, in the working of which the Worshipful Master was ably assisted by his efficient staff of officers. The work was correct and impressive throughout, as was to be expected in a Lodge which possesses such accurate ritualists as the Grand Treasurer and the Grand Secretary. The chanting of that sublime passage of Scripture -----"Remember now thy Creator, etc.," by a picked choir of voices, under the direction of Brother D. Arnold Fox. Grand Organist, was thoroughly enjoyed by all lovers of good music present, and added greatly to the impressiveness of the ceremonial. After labour was concluded, the Worshipful Master invited the officers of Grand Lodge and the visiting brethren to partake of the good cheer provided in the banquet hall. Here we spent a couple of hours most pleasantly and profitably, all experiencing feelings of regret when the time came for us to part. The Union Lodge of Portland is evidently in good hands and there can be no doubt of its continued prosperity.

On the evening of November 3, accompanied by a full corps of Grand Lodge officers, I had the pleasure of paying my first official visit to Carleton Union Lodge. The attendance of members and visiting brethren was very large, and the Worshipful Master, Brother John Emerson, gave us a cordial welcome in appropriate and graceful language. The work for the evening was that of conferring the First Degree, which was carried out in a manner that I have seldom seen equalled and never surpassed in any of the Lodges which I have yet visited. The Lodges on the east side of the harbour will have to look well to their laurels or they may be surpassed by Carleton Union Lodge in accuracy and effectiveness of work. One of the pleasant memories connected with this visit was that of

meeting three generations of one family as members of this Lodge -- viz., Brother Jarvis Wilson, his son and grandson. Brother Wilson had reached the great age of ninety-four, but was still hale and cheerful and in the complete possession of all his faculties. As he conversed with us so brightly and pleasantly, none could realize that this was to be the last occasion on which we were to meet him in Carleton Union Lodge. After the close of the Lodge we accepted an invitation to refreshment and spent a most enjoyable hour in social intercourse with our brethren of Carleton Union, being obliged to leave all too soon in order to be in time for the last trip of the ferry boat to the East side. Carleton Union possesses one of the most attractive lodge rooms in the jurisdiction, the members both old and voung being thoroughly devoted to its interests, and will be in the future, as it has ever been in the past, a prosperous and progressive Lodge.

January 3rd, 1911, accompanied by a large number of Grand and Past Grand officers I paid an official visit to St. John's Lodge, No. 2, for the purpose of installing the Worshipful Master elect, Brother C. A. Rutherford, and other officers. There was a very large gathering of the Craft present, and we found W. Brother W. S. Clawson, the retiring Master, presiding in the East, under whose guiding hand this, my Mother Lodge, had had a prosperous year. The members of St. John's feel proud of its past history and are untiring in their efforts to promote its interests, and to keep it in that prominent place which it has always occupied among the Lodges of the Province. The banquet at the close of the labours of the evening was greatly enjoyed by all, enlivened as it was by pleasant speeches and good music.

Chas. D. Jones, G. D. C., and Brother D. Arnold Fox, Grand Organist, I went to Hampton for the purpose of installing the Worshipful Master elect of the Corinthian Lodge, Brother E. Allan Schofield, and the other officers. There was a good attendance of members, some of whom had travelled a long distance in order to be present, and we were given a cordial welcome by the retiring Master, W. Brother Cecil March, under whose care the Lodge had greatly prospered during the past year. It is always a very pleasing duty to visit this Lodge and to note the evidences of prosperity which have fallen to its lot in recent years. Everything possible was done by Brother Schofield to make our visit an agreeable one, and the pleasant social intercourse enjoyed with our brethren in Hampton while partaking of the abundant good cheer provided for us after the ceremony of installation was concluded still remains fresh in our memory.

On May 9th, accompanied by R. W. Brother Thos. Walker, P. G. M., R. W. Brother David Dearness, D. G. M., W. Brother Chas. D. Jones, G. D. C., and Brother D. Arnold Fox, Grand Organist, I went to Newcastle to pay an official visit to Northumberland Lodge, No. 17. On arriving at Newcastle we were met at the station by Dr. Nicholson, the Worshipful Master, who conveyed our party to the hotel, after first giving us a very pleasant drive around the town. In the evening of the same day we proceeded to the Lodge, where we were joined by R. W. Brother Robert Murray, P. D. G. M., R. W. Brother W. R. Gould, S. G. W., and a large number of the Craft from Miramichi Lodge which is situated in the adjoining Town of Chatham. At the request of the Worshipful Master the officers of Grand Lodge, who were with me, assisted by R.W. Brothers Murray and Maltby, worked the Third Degree, for which no less than six candidates presented themselves There was a very large attendance of members and visitors

present, and I was very much pleased to find such Past Masters as Brothers Richard L. Maltby, Dr. Pedolin, and Hon. John P. Burchill still taking an active interest in the affairs of their Lodge. Many new members have been added to the roll of Northumberland Lodge since Brother Nicholson has been in the chair, and its present condition is most gratifying. R. W. Brother Murray, who acted as Grand Secretary in the absence of Brother Twining Hartt, examined the books of the Secretary and Treasurer and found them in a satisfactory state. Light refreshments were served in the lodge room when the labours of the evening were over, and a most enjoyable hour was spent in social intercourse with the hospitable brethren of Northumberland Lodge.

During April I received a petition from a number of brethren asking for a dispensation to open another Lodge at Moncton to be called Tweedie Lodge. As this petition was accompanied by the recommendation of Keith Lodge, No. 23, I thought proper to grant the request of the petitioners and directed that a dispensation be issued to them, and on May 12th, accompanied by the Grand Secretary and Grand Organist, I went to Moncton for the purpose of instituting Tweedie Lodge, U. D. With the assistance of R. W. Brother H. B. Fleming, as D.G. M., R. W. Brother Geo. Ackman, as S. G. W., R. W. Brother Jas. E. Masters, as J. G.W., R.W. Brother Geo. R. Sangster, as Grand Treasurer, R. W. Brother J. Twining Hartt. Grand Secretary, W. Brother R. P. Dickson, as S. G. Deacon, W. Brother F. P. Forbes, as J. G. Deacon, and W. Brother Geo. H. Pick, as G. D. of C., I placed Brother Fred W. Emerson in the East as W. M., Brother Samuel C. Alward in the West as S. W., Brother Geo. Percy Kirk in the South as J. W., and Brother M. J. Steeves as Secretary. The First Degree was then conferred on three

candidates. I would recommend that the prayer of these petitioners for a charter be granted, as I am satisfied that good results will follow the opening of this new Lodge in the thriving City of Moncton.

In the month of February last it was my privilege to accept the cordial invitation which was extended to me as your Grand Master, by the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia to be present with them on the occasion of the celebration of their one hundredth anniversary at Washington. The proceedings connected with this great Masonic festival were of unusual interest, and extended over a period of three days. On the evening of Saturday, February 18, there was a reception to the Craft in the new Masonic Temple at Washington when the visiting Grand Masters had an opportunity of exchanging fraternal greetings with M. W. Brother Keiper, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia, and other distinguished members of the Craft in Washington. On Sunday, February 19, at 3 p. m., a most interesting and inspiring religious service was held in Belasco's Theatre, which was filled to overflowing. The addresses delivered on this occasion were full of the true spirit of Freemasonry and were listened to with the closest attention by the large gathering present. On the morning of Monday, February 20, the visiting Grand Masters attended a special communication of the Grand Lodge, and in the evening of the same day were entertained at a sumptuous banquet in the new Willard Hotel. Everything was done by Grand Master Keiper and the committee in charge of the celebration to look after the comfort of their visitors, and they are certainly to be congratulated on the great success which marked every feature of their one hundredth anniversary.

An Emergent Communication was held in the City of St. John on Sunday, June 25, at the Masonic Temple for the purpose of attending Divine service. There was a large attendance of members from the several Lodges in the City besides many brethren from other parts of the Province. After Grand Lodge had been opened in ample form, a procession was formed under the direction of W. Brother C. D. Jones, G. D. C., and W. Brother Francis F. Burpee, as Assistant G. D. C., and the brethren then marched to St. Stephen's Church where service was conducted by the Grand Chaplain, Rev. Gordon Dickie. The sermon preached by the Grand Chaplain on this occasion was a very instructive one and was listened to with marked attention by all. After the conclusion of the service, the brethren returned to the Temple, where, after appropriate resolutions had been passed thanking the Trustees of St. Stephen's Church for their kindness in allowing them the use of the building, and the Grand Chaplain for his able and instructive sermon, Grand Lodge was closed in ample form. E. Powers added materially to the appearance of the procession, and I take this opportunity to thank the Knights for the courtesy extended on this occasion.

Two events of peculiar interest to every citizen of the great Empire of which we form a part have occurred during the past year, and it is quite fitting that some reference should be made to them on the present occasion. The Coronation of King George V. at Westminster Abbey was perhaps the most magnificent spectacle that has ever been witnessed in that historic building. As Freemasons we rejoiced greatly in the spontaneous outburst of loyalty with which the crowning of the King was attended in every part of his vast dominions. We hope that he may long be spared to rule over us, and that he may follow in the footsteps of his father, King Edward the "Peacemaker," who was so long the patron of our Order.

In August, 1911, not many weeks after the Coronation of the King there was signed at Washington a general treaty of arbitration between Great Britain and the United States of America. As members of an Order that professes to be actuated by the noblest principles and animated by the spirit of brotherly love, we must surely welcome the ratification of such an important agreement between the great Mother Land and her earliest offspring, and earnestly pray that the other nations of the earth may be influenced by the noble example set before them to do likewise, thus ushering in the time of universal peace so vividly pictured by Tennyson:

"When the war-drum throbb'd no longer, and the battle-flags were furled, In the Parliament of man, the Federation of the world."

From the reports of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary, which will be laid before you at this meeting, it will be seen that the finances of Grand Lodge are in a sound condition and that there is again an increase in our membership. August

It would be well for Grand Lodge to place the sum of \$200 at the disposal of the Grand Master to provide instruction for private Lodges, and I recommend that this be done as heretofore.

I desire before closing, to sincerely thank my associate officers for their promptness and willingness to assist me on all occasions in the discharge of the numerous duties pertaining to this office — more especially do I extend my thanks to the Grand Secretary, for the uniform courtesy and kindness which have always characterized him in the discharge of his duties.

And now, brethren, it is my earnest wish, that all our deliberations on the present occasion may be carried on in the spirit of brotherly love, and that prudence and wisdom may guide us in all our doings.

The report of the Board of General Purposes was then submitted by the Acting Deputy Grand Master, R. W. Brother James Vroom, P. D. G. M.

It was as follows:

REPORT OF

THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, F. and A. M., of New Brunswick:

The Board of General Purposes begs to submit its report for the past year.

The Board has held three Regular and three Special Meetings, at the first of which the Senior Grand Warden, R. W. Wilfrid R. Gould was elected Vice-President.

As Grand Lodge had approved of the proposal to transfer Two Thousand Dollars to the Fund of Benevolence, the Board requested the Grand Treasurer and R. W. Brother Thomas Walker to select the investments, and they agreed on the purchase of four Town of Truro Bonds of \$500 each, bearing interest at 41/2 per cent.

The only matter referred to the Board by Grand Lodge was that of obtaining new Regalia for Grand Lodge Officers. A Special Committee was appointed to obtain information as to reliable makers and probable cost. Subsequently, however, on learning that Past Grand Master Walker intended to visit England during the present summer, the Board entrusted him with authority to interview London firms and to place the order. No communication has yet been received from R. W. Brother Walker since his arrival in England, but doubtless, ere long. Grand Lodge will be in possession of a set of Regalia such as is needed for special occasions.

At its first meeting the Board appointed a Special Committee of five to frame Rules and Regulations for administering the Fund of Benevolence, it being generally felt that the income of the Fund should henceforth be available for cases of need. The report of this Committee was fully considered by the Board, and the Rules as finally adopted are here inserted for the information of the Craft:

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Fund of Benevolence of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, Administered for the Benefit of Members of the Craft in New Brunswick.

In order to be entitled to aid from the Fund, a Brother must be a Regular Member of a Lodge under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick at the time of his application for aid, must have been a Subscribing Member for at least four years, and have paid his annual dues to his Lodge for that period. Widows and orphans of Brothers, who are so qualified, are entitled to the benefit of the Fund as though the husband or father were living.

The appeal for help from the Fund must be presented on a prescribed form of application to the Committee in charge of the Fund by the Lodge to which the Brother belongs, over its Seal, and must be signed by the Master and Secretary, and by the Brother who has reported the case to the Lodge.

The administration of the Fund shall be in the hands of a Committee of three Members of the Board, one of whom shall be the Grand Master for the time being, and the others shall be chosen annually by the Board of General Purposes, at the Meeting of the Board called for organization purposes, after the annual session of Grand Lodge, or at some meeting called thereafter.

No grant to any one, either a member, a member's widow, or children, shall exceed in one year the sum of fifty dollars, but if the Grand Master advises the Board to enlarge the amount, it shall be competent for the Board to do so. The Grand Master shall state the maximum amount which he advises, and that amount may be allowed in whole or in part.

The amount expended in any one year by the Committee shall not exceed the annual income of the invested fund in the year preceding.

The grants made shall be paid by cheque issued by the Grand Treasurer, and countersigned in the usual manner.

It shall be, as far as is possible, a guiding principle that the Fund shall not be expended by way of pensions or annuities, but to relieve immediate and pressing distress.

Copies of the above and also Forms of Application have been sent to each Subordinate Lodge. The Board takes pleasure in submitting the very satisfactory Report of the Audit Committee:

R. W. Brother The Hon. John V. Ellis, P. G. M., as Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations presented the following report, and moved that Grand Lodge concur in the same. The motion was seconded by R. W. Brother His Honour Judge Forbes, P. G. M., and was—*Carried*.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN RELATIONS.

The undersigned members of the Committee on Foreign Relations of Grand Lodge respectfully submit the following:

On page 345 and 346 of the printed transactions of Grand Lodge for the year 1909, is the following entry:

"A most interesting communication, addressed to the Grand Secretary, from R. W. Brother Albert J. Kruger, the representative of this Grand Lodge near the Grand Orient of Belgium, was next read. It was dated at Antwerp, July 20th, 1909. To the Communication was attached a list of Belgian Masonic precepts and a translation of a speech made by the Vice-President of the Council of the Grand Orient of France, on the occasion of a visit to a Lodge at Cologne.

"Brother Kruger's letter concluded as follows:

"'Kindly convey to the Grand Master and Brethren of Grand Lodge, when assembled at the coming Annual Communication, my personal respect and best wishes for their happiness and prosperity.'

"R. W. Brother The Hon. John V. Ellis, P. G. M., made brief reference to Masonry as existing in France and to the fact there were two Grand Bodies exercising jurisdiction.

"On his motion it was resolved,

"That the letter from Brother Albert J. Kruger with the accompanying papers and also the question of recognizing the Grand Orient of France, be referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations."

The negotiation, movement, action or whatever it may be termed, between the Freemasons of France as represented by the Grand Orient and those of Germany has not, your Committee find, made sufficient progress to justify the declaration that the breach which has for a long time existed between the members of the Craft in the two countries has been healed, although some progress has been made in some of the Grand Lodges of Germany towards removing the impediments which stand in the way of a more satisfactory relationship than now exists. The difficulties appear to have begun in 1871, out of the Franco-Prussian war, or rather out of events or circumstances connected with that war, and they were extended or perpetuated by the action of the Grand Orient of France in regard to what is known among the fraternity as a removal of one of the ancient landmarks, the extinction of one of the Great Lights, and which action of the Grand Orient of France has materially affected the attitude towards it of, practically, the whole

Craft in America as well as in some parts of Europe, notably those in which the English language is used.

The progress of time, the constantly improving relationship between the people of France and of Germany have disposed a great many of the German Masons to endeavor to put an end to the unsatisfactory relationship between the Craft in the two countries, and some of the German Grand Lodges have so declared themselves; but there is not the unanimity of feeling in the matter which Brother Kruger anticipated when he made his appeal to us. Indeed the whole matter has created a great deal of feeling among the Freemasons of Germany. So apparently, prudence and care will be most necessary in the endeavor to bring about a final settlement. Your Committee share in the hopes that this whole business will eventually be amicably settled, and that the Grand Orient of France will so far recognize the strong desire of the Craft in many countries for a restoration of harmony and a cessation of the troubles which have been created by the action referred to above.

Your Committee remind Grand Lodge that there are in France two supreme authorities over the Craft Lodges, and that these two bodies are in harmonious relations with each other. The doctrine of exclusive jurisdiction does not hold in that country to the extent to which it is held in America. One of these bodies is the Grand Orient; the other is the Grand Lodge of France which has under its control over one hundred and twenty Lodges, fifty of which are in Paris and its suburbs. Your Committee can see no very strong reason against friendly relationship and fellowship with this Grand Lodge. It often happens that a member of the Craft from this Province seeks, when in France, to visit the fraternity there. Our relations or want of them with the Grand Orient practically prevents this. The brother does not seek the Grand Lodge of France for he knows nothing of it. Yet it is a legitimate authority, admitted to be so, by the Grand Orient, and its certificates and balustres are issued in the name of the Grand Architect of the Universe; and its membership is a satisfactory one. The Committee is of the opinion that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick might open negotiations with it looking for an interchange of representatives, pending the final settlement of all the difficulties which now exist between the Grand Orient of France and the governing bodies of the Craft elsewhere; and they so recommend.

R. W. Brother Doherty spoke feelingly in reply. He recalled that he had been present at the formation of Grand Lodge forty-four years ago, and at many communications since, and it always "warmed his heart" to meet his Brethren of Grand Lodge.

Moved by R. W. Brother His Honour Judge Forbes, P. G. M., seconded by V. W. Brother Fred J. G. Knowlton, Grand Treasurer,

"That the rank and dignity of Past Grand Chaplain be conferred on W. Brother the Reverend Canon Neales, Grand Chaplain in 1901."—*Carried*.

At the suggestion of Past Grand Master Ellis it was unanimously resolved,

"That Brother William S. Marven, of Albion Lodge, No. 1, be constituted a permanent member of Grand Lodge with the rank of Past Senior Grand Deacon."

The following is the report of the Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address presented at this point by R. W. Brother James Vroom, P. D. G. M.

REPORT ON THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The Committee appointed to report upon the Most Worshipful Grand Master's Address wish to express their fullest sympathy with him in the feeling that we should watchfully guard the door of our Lodge, that no unworthy applicant may be allowed to enter, remembering that we will be judged by the worst of our members more often than by those whose blameless lives are our chiefest ornament.

This Grand Lodge, also, the Committee are well assured, shares with the M. W. Grand Master his sorrow in recalling the names of those who have passed from their labours, leaving vacant places that in many cases are hard to fill; and would join with him in his words of condolence to friends and relatives.

The Grand Lodge will have learned with pleasure that the M. W. Grand Master has been able to visit so many of the Lodges under his jurisdiction, and that the Lodges have shown their appreciation of the courtesy of his official visits.

The Brethren here assembled will heartily join in the fitting and loyal reference made in the address to the coronation of our Most Gracious King; and with the M. W. Grand Master will hail with satisfaction the conclusion of a treaty of unlimited arbitration between His Majesty's government and the government of the United States, hoping that the Senate of that country may not see fit to place its constitutional veto upon this effort to advance the cause of universal peace.

In conclusion the Committee recommend that the sum of Two Hundred Dollars be again placed at the Grand Master's disposal for instruction of private Lodges.
