A procession of the Members and Brethren was then formed and conducted to the residence of the late R. W. Brother, Queen Street.


The remains were thence conveyed to Fernhill Cemetery and there interred with the ceremonies appropriate to Free and Accepted Masons.

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"That the Minutes of the last Annual Communication, having already been printed in the proceedings of the year, be now taken as read and confirmed."

The Minutes of the Special Communications of August 30th, 1912, of October 30th, 1912, and of June 22nd, 1913, were read and on due motion, in each case, were respectively confirmed.

The M. W. Grand Master after expressing his gratification at the presence of so many Craftsmen from outside the City of Saint John, delivered the following address:

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GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Brethren of Grand Lodge:

I welcome you cordially to this Forty-Sixth Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, and trust that your deliberations will prove of profit to all and make for the strong, firm upbuilding of the Craft in this jurisdiction.

Since we met last August, the sickle of the grim Reaper has gathered a plenteous harvest. Many have passed from our midst and entered the Celestial Lodge above.

My immediate predecessor announced to you verbally last year the death of R. W. David Dearness, Past Deputy Grand Master, and issued a summons for a special communication for the purpose of attending the funeral. Two days after my installation, Grand Lodge met accordingly, and laid our brother at rest with Masonic Brother Dearness was a member of New honors. Brunswick Lodge, in which he was raised on 11th March, 1869, elected Master in 1875, elected Senior Grand Warden in 1907 and Deputy Grand Master in 1910. He represented the Grand Lodge of Queensland near this Grand Lodge. Brother Dearness was widely known amongst St. John Masons. His exact knowledge of the Ritual was available to all, and many of those who have gained prominence in the Craft owed it to his instruction which was ever freely given. He showed clearly that he daily lived to exemplify the tenets of a Mason's profession. He has therefore left an example which should be copied, and a memory which will be cherished.

W. Brother Geo. E. Fairweather died on the first day of July, 1913. He was a member of Albion Lodge, No. 1, where he was raised on the 8th of May, 1868, installed Master 27th December, 1871, and held the office of Treasurer during the years 1873, 1874, 1875 and 1876. In 1879 and 1880, he was Senior Deacon of this Grand Lodge of which for many years he was an active member, taking a prominent part in the Lodge of Sorrow held for the late Past Grand Master Peters. A man of high integrity, he was universally respected. His equable temperament and well balanced mind attracted to him scores of friends by whom he will be most sincerely mourned.

W. Brother George U. Hay, Past Master of The Corinthian Lodge, No. 13, died very suddenly at his home in St. John, on the 23rd of April last. He was a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, and was well known among teachers for his interest in educational work. He will be best remembered for his love of the woods and fields, and his ardent support of the nature study movement in our public schools. He was the senior member of The Corinthian Lodge, and his brethren had shown their regard for him by placing him on the list of honorary members.

W. Brother Frederic W. Emmerson, District Deputy Grand Master for Westmorland County, died at Moncton, on January 6th last, in the fifty-eighth year of his age. Brother Emmerson joined Victoria Lodge at Milltown, N. B., about thirty-eight years ago, and, after his removal to Moncton, connected himself with Keith Lodge there, and afterwards assisted in the formation of Tweedie Lodge, of Moncton, of which he was a member at the time of his death. He was appointed District Deputy Grand Master at the last meeting of the Grand Lodge. He was a good Mason, a Christian gentleman, and an excellent citizen.

W. Brother Ferdinand L. Pedolin died on June 7th, 1913. He was raised in St. Andrews Lodge, No. 364, on the Scotch Register, subsequently became a member of Hiram, No. 6, affiliated with Northumberland, No. 17, on 10th February, 1896, and was elected Master in 1901. He was a regular attendant at his Lodge, in which he took a deep interest.

R.W. Brother T. Amos Godsoe died July 23rd, 1913; a member of Albion Lodge, No. 1, in which he was entered September 7th,1855. He was elected Master in 1881 and 1882, and held the position of Treasurer from 27th December,1889, up to the 27th December, 1907. He was elected Deputy Grand Master in 1883 and Grand Treasurer in 1893 and 1894. Few have had such a long, prominent and useful Masonic career as he. An exact ritualist, a faithful and generous friend, and a consistent Mason, his death leaves the Craft distinctly poorer.

We are also called upon to deplore the loss of R. W. Brother the Honorable John V. Ellis, to whom perhaps more than to any other man is due the standing of this jurisdiction to-day. He passed peacefully to rest on Thursday, July 10th. Brother Ellis was raised in The Lodge of Social and Military Virtues, Montreal. This Lodge has since become Antiquity, No. 1, on the Register of Quebec. Upon his removal to St. John, he affiliated on the 9th June, 1857, with Hibernia Lodge, then under the Irish Register. From this Lodge he subsequently demitted and on April 5th, 1858, became a member of Carleton Union on the Register of England, now No.8 on the Register of New Brunswick. Of this Lodge he was Master during 1864, 1865, 1876, 1891 and 1892. In Grand Lodge he was Grand Director of Ceremonies in 1867 and 1868; Deputy Grand Master in 1870 and 1871; Grand Master in 1872, 1873, 1874, 1884, 1885 and 1886. He represented the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario and the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin near this Grand Lodge. In 1882 he was elected an honorary member of Hibernia Lodge, No. 3. As a member of Carleton Union, he was a regular attendant at all its meetings, and for many years installed its Master and officers. His interest in the Lodge never decreased, but, as the years rolled on, seemed to grow stronger, and, notwithstanding his many public 1913]

August

and other Masonic engagements, he rarely failed to attend a meeting. The history of his Grand Lodge career is the history of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. He was one of its active founders and continued to be a most influential and respected member from its formation in 1867 to the present time. As Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations for many years, he laid down the principles upon which he thought this jurisdiction should proceed, particularly in its relation with other Grand Bodies. These opinions, Grand Lodge was always glad to follow. He was a prominent member of the New Brunswick Masonic Hall Company, in which this Grand Lodge is so largely interested, and did much to promote its incorporation. Very largely by his efforts the Masonic Temple in St. John was built after the Great Fire in 1877. As a result of the depression which followed that disaster the debt on this building became a serious question to the Masonic fraternity and few to-day know what a great load of anxiety for many years rested upon the shoulders of its promoters. Brother Ellis never lost faith in the project, and in the prosperity which has come of recent years to this City he lived to see the Masonic Hall Company share and to have his judgment, as also of his associates, absolutely endorsed Of this building by reason of present conditions. he once said --- "That he hoped it would become the point within the centre of the Great Circle of Free Masonry within the Province of New Brunswick." I earnestly trust and believe that this is shortly to come true and also that the surplus revenue will be devoted to the Fund of Benevolence and used as assistance to those who require it. This is not the time nor the place to deal with his interest in other Masonic Bodies, in all of which he was interested, and in nearly all of which he attained the highest nosition.

He was a man of strong independence of thought and

genial personality, while his sympathy was extended to all in time of trouble. Of him it may be truly said,

"I have wrestled stoutly with the wrong, And borne the right, From beneath the footfall of the throng, To life and light."

VISITS.

During the year I have visited officially the following Lodges: Salisbury, No. 20, Howard, No. 15, Zetland, No. 24, Keith, No. 23, The Corinthian, No. 13, Zion, No. 21, The Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10, New Brunswick, No. 22, Hibernia, No. 3, St. John's, No. 2, Carleton Union, No. 8, Steven, No. 37, Hiram, No. 6, Woodstock, No. 11, Carleton, No. 35, Benjamin, No. 31, Colebrooke, No. 39, St.George, No. 12, St. Mark's, No. 5, Alley, No. 14, Victoria, No. 26, and Sussex, No. 7.

On the occasion of these visits instruction was given or work exemplified, and, in quite a number of instances, the officers were installed.

I have paid many private visits especially to the St. John Lodges, and was disappointed that the dates which I had named to visit Alexandria, Albert, Lebanon, Sussex, No. 4, and Ashlar Lodges, were not convenient for those lodges where they respectively meet. This, however, was neither my fault nor that of the Lodges, as dates proposed for visits of this kind will of necessity occasionally conflict with other conditions. I am deeply indebted to the various Grand Lodge officers past and present, who accompanied me, all of whom cheerfully gave up a portion of their time to this important work.

So far as I have travelled over this jurisdiction, I have found the Craft in good hands, and flourishing at nearly all points. While the Ritual is well expressed, there is a lack of uniformity which may however be readily corrected, and, in this connection, I repeat the advice of several Past Grand Masters, particularly that of Past Grand Master Forbes who recommended strongly the appointment of a paid lecturer whose duty it would be to visit Lodges, wherever and whenever required, to spend some days if advisable and give that positive interpretation of the Ritual which can only come from one in authority. Several Lodges are anxious to have such instruction, and I recommend that definite action be now taken on this suggestion.

The Board of General Purposes are of the opinion that the salary of the Grand Secretary is insufficient, and this opinion I most emphatically endorse.

The membership of the jurisdiction has nearly doubled in the last ten years and the additional work thereby entailed should carry with it a substantial increase in salary. I therefore suggest that the salary of this official be enlarged to such an extent as to provide payment for the increase in ordinary work, and, also, to include the payment for time spent as Grand Lecturer, because I do not think there is any one in this jurisdiction better qualified to give the instruction. I hope Grand Lodge will take action in this matter.

There is just one other point upon which I should like to dwell, as a result of my visits, and that is the ownership and occupation of Masonic Halls, or rooms. I find wherever a Lodge owns and occupies solely for its own use a Masonic Hall, or room, that there Masonic life is strongest, and, in some cases, where the Lodge has joint occupation with other bodies, there Masonic life is at low ebb. In some cases it is not possible to collect the money needed in the Masonic district to provide a hall or room. I believe it would be a wise provision to give the Grand Master the power to appropriate, say, \$150.00 for this purpose when to him it seems wise.

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In concluding my remarks regarding visits, let me thank most cordially every lodge I visited for the courtesies extended to the Grand Lodge officers. In all cases, determined, courteous and successful efforts were made to contribute to the enjoyment of our visits.

On the 30th October, a Communication of Grand Lodge was summoned to mark the reopening of the Masonic Hall at St. John. The chief Lodge Room had been completely furnished and decorated by the St. John Lodges, and is now a suitable room in every respect for all Masonic gatherings, and quite up to the standard hoped for by those who originally planned the building.

The St. John Lodges deserve all praise for their generosity in this respect, and their action will long continue to reflect credit upon those who so actively carried out the arrangements. The Communication was much the largest I have seen. Degree work was exemplified by Grand Lodge officers under the banner of Albion Lodge, No. 1. The occasion was one which will long be remembered.

On June 22nd of this year, being the Sunday nearest to the Festival of St. John the Baptist, Grand Lodge assembled at the Masonic Hall, in the City of Moncton, New Brunswick, and proceeded to St. John's Presbyterian Church, where Divine Service was held. This was in accordance with our custom. The service was conducted and sermon preached by the Very Worshipful the Grand Chaplain, the Rev. A. D. Archibald.

MASONIC HALL COMPANY.

As you all know, Grand Lodge is the largest holder of stock in this Company which owns the Masonic Hall at St. John. There are $2305\frac{1}{2}$ shares of stock outstanding of a par value of \$20.00 each. These shares are held as follows:

432¹/₂ — By other Masonic bodies.
454 — By persons and estates.

There is outstanding a bonded debt of the Company amounting to \$22,000. No dividends are paid on the stock. It was, I think, originally intended that the revenue from the building, as it increased year by year, should be used for benevolent purposes in this jurisdiction, and that this property when freed from debt would provide a revenue always available to that end. Unfortunately, for many years, income and expenditure only approximated.

For some time, I have been strongly of the opinion that the entire ownership of this building should be vested in Grand Lodge, and its affairs administered by the Board of General Purposes. To attain this result, I recommend that the Board of General Purposes be asked to approach the different Masonic bodies and suggest that they transfer their stock to Grand Lodge, and that the same request be preferred of the individual owners. In some cases the latter are not accessible, the stock having passed into the hands of executors or other representatives of the original owners. To meet cases of this kind or cases of those who may refuse for any reason to part with stock without consideration, I recommend that the Board of General Purposes be authorized to divert from Grand Lodge funds a sum sufficient to acquire the stock, and thereby secure the sole ownership. This policy will, I believe, prove of distinct advantage to the Craft, and give effect to the original intention regarding the administration and revenue of the building, while it will also give each Mason in the jurisdiction a definite interest in the home of his Grand Lodge.

INCORPORATION.

In order more easily and effectively to administer Grand Lodge funds, and, in order (particularly if the proposals regarding the Masonic Hall Company are approved) to have a legal entity ready to receive the ownership, I further recommend that the Board of General Purposes be authorized to petition the Legislature for an Act of Incorporation for the purpose of holding property and administering the benevolent and other funds of Grand Lodge, and also for such other financial purposes, as they deem advisable.

INCORPORATION OF SUBORDINATE LODGES.

I find that no fewer than eleven Lodges have obtained incorporation, no doubt finding this a more simple and desirable plan than holding property by way of Trustees. Of course, legislation of this kind should only be obtained for the purpose of holding property and there should be a reversion to the Grand Lodge to hold for Masonic purposes in each Masonic district affected, if the subordinate lodge should cease to exist. I recommend that the Board of General Purposes be authorized to apply to the Assembly for simple legislation, which would apply to all Lodges along these lines.

May I also suggest that in order to make the practice of the jurisdiction uniform, it would be most advisable, if such legislation is applied for and is obtained, that the Lodges at present incorporated should cease to use their present corporative powers and fall in with the general act.

RECORDS.

I am glad to inform you that the Board of General Purposes has completed a vault in the Masonic Hall which is now available for the reception of all old records of the jurisdiction. Records sent in by any subordinate lodge, if carefully enclosed in a metal case, will be cared for without charge. The vault is in charge of the Grand Secretary and Library Committee.

The Committee on Foreign Relations will present a report dealing with several matters which have come to their notice, or which have been referred to them. Our relations with other Grand Bodies continue to be of a most friendly nature.

During the present year many enquiries have been submitted on questions of Masonic Law and Usage to which prompt attention was given and replies made. As Past Grand Master Bridges pointed out last year, a little closer reading of our Constitution by the Masters of Lodges would supply the necessary information and reduce the correspondence of Grand Lodge officers.

Changes in the By-Laws of several Lodges have been submitted for approval, upon which, in each case, action has been taken.

The Report of the Grand Secretary will show the number of dispensations issued and the reasons therefor. I should like to emphasize the view that dispensations should not issue to confer degrees upon any candidate at a less period than four weeks from the date of a previous degree, unless broadly speaking, the candidate is about to leave the jurisdiction permanently.

During the early months of the year, Right Worshipful Thomas Walker, P.G.M., conducted, under my dispensation, a Lodge of Instruction for the benefit of the St.John Lodges.

I attended several of the meetings, and wish now to thank Brother Walker not only for the admirable manner in which the instruction was given, but also for the keen interest thereby awakened in the work.

The reports of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary show a healthy condition of Grand Lodge's finances and a gratifying increase in the number of the Craft.

The reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, will, I am sure, be read with much interest.

I recommend that the sum of \$300.00 be placed at the disposal of the Grand Master to be applied towards the payment of travelling expenses.

The Report of the Board of General Purposes will to some extent deal with several matters considered in the address, but, I have thought it well to set forth as clearly as possible my own sympathy with its recommendations.

I cannot close without thanking all the officers and past officers of Grand Lodge, especially the Grand Secretary, for the courtesy extended to me at all times, and for that whole-hearted support which has been so freely given to me.

In returning to you the gavel of office, which I have held during a year of unusual activity, may I point out that the tie is not a slender one which binds Masons together and impels them willingly to devote time and close attention to the upbuilding of the Craft.

What is that tie? What is Masonry? In the words of a writer of the eighteenth century,—"Does it tend to "instruct the mind, and tame each unruly passion? Does "it expel rancour, hatred and envy? Does it reconcile "men of all religions and of all nations? Is it an universal "cement binding its followers to charity, good will and "secret friendship? Is it calculated to promote the truest "freedom? Does it teach men to live quiet lives? In short "are all its precepts a complete system of moral virtue? "Then hail thou Glorious craft, bright transcript of all that is "amiable. Hail thou blest moral science which so beauti-"fully exemplifies virtue. Welcome ye delightful mansions "where all enjoy the pleasures of, a serene and tranquil GRAND

ARTHUR W. SHARP, Grand Treasurer. The Report of the Board of General Purposes was next submitted by the President, R. W. Brother Robert A. Irving, D. G. M., and after being read was laid on the table.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

To the M.W. Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

The Board of General Purposes submits its report for the year now ending.

Shortly after the closing of Grand Lodge, at a well attended meeting presided over by the Deputy Grand Master, the Board organized by electing V.W. Brother ArthurW.Sharp, Vice-President. Four subsequent meetings were held during the year.

The Deputy Grand Master and R. W. Brother A. R. Campbell were chosen to form, with the M. W. Grand Master, the Committee to administer the Fund of Benevolence. In the course of the year this Committee has made grants, in five deserving cases, to the amount of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars, application in each instance having been regularly made. The sum of \$1,500, which Grand Lodge transferred to the Fund, has been invested in a \$1,000 $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Bond of the Town of Truro, N. S., and a \$500 5 per cent. Bond of the St. John Railway Co. These investments raise the assets of the Fund to \$14,727.12, truly a matter for deep gratification. Since the accounts were closed, the Grand Treasurer has received the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, bequeathed to the Fund by the late R.W. The Hon. John V. Ellis.

The Steel Cabinet referred to in the Board's Report of last year was early received and placed in the Library Room. It conveniently holds both the new and old regalia.

In the last report, reference was also made to the fitting up of a Vault in the lower hallway. This work has been satisfactorily completed, and the Vault, well equipped with doors and shelving, is now available as a safe repository for the Books and Records of Grand Lodge, as also for those of Subordinate Lodges, if and when so desired.

Stored in the Library are some bound copies of the reprint of the Proceedings of Grand Lodge for the years 1867 to 1876, inclusive, and the Board has placed 150 copies of these with the Library Committee to be disposed at the nominal price of fifty cents each. Of this reprint, the report of 1879 says:

"The Board feel that this work is one of very consider-"able importance to the Craft, and commend it to their "careful perusal, so that the contents, finding a place in "faithful memories, may inspire them with zeal to work "out in New Brunswick the grand purposes of those whose "watchful eyes, clear intellect and noble hearts in Masonry "saw the dangers, conceived the remedies, and animated "the generous impulses which have carried Masonry to the "high and honored place it occupies in this jurisdiction."

Grand Lodge, in a general way, referred to the Board the matter of a so called "travelling certificate." It is realized that the present certificate cannot be reduced in size, and the Board is wholly averse to the adoption of an alternative one. A small leather case has been procured which will carry the Grand Lodge Certificate when neatly folded, and this, it is hoped, will practically meet whatever need exists. Cases can be had on application through Lodge Secretaries.

By direction of the Board a new edition of the Constitution has been printed and is ready for distribution. It should not be forgotten that the regulations require that a copy of the Constitution be presented to a Candidate when he receives the Master Mason degree. At the last Communication, Grand Lodge sanctioned an amendment to the Constitution permitting a petition, under certain circumstances, to be withdrawn before ballot. The Board regards that amendment with regret and concern, as the rule that "a petition once received by a Lodge cannot be withdrawn," is well nigh a landmark of the Fraternity. The Board ventures to hope that Grand Lodge will reconsider its decision of last year and, to that end, has caused due notice to be given of an amendment which, if adopted, will restore the section to its original reading.

Acting on the report of a Special Committee, the Board recommends to Grand Lodge that an increase be made in the salary of the Grand Secretary. It is recognized that the duties of the office have grown of late years and require more constant attention, and that the existing salary has become inadequate. In dealing with this recommendation it might be remembered that with new officers coming along, Lodges are often in need of instruction, and it would be well if the Grand Secretary were placed at the call of the Grand Master when requests for visits of an instructor are received.

Mainly at the instance of the M.W. Grand Master, the Board has quite fully discussed the general question of incorporation, and the relations of Grand Lodge, in a business way, to the Masonic Building in St. John. The Board has reached the conviction that matters should not any longer drift along, but that well directed efforts should at once be made to acquire all outstanding stock in the Hall Company, and so vest in Grand Lodge the exclusive ownership of the property. The following is the resolution unanimously adopted by the Board:

"That Grand Lodge be requested to authorize the "Board of General Purposes to seek incorporation to enable "it to hold the shares of The New Brunswick Masonic "Hall Company already owned by Grand Lodge, and to, as far as possible, acquire the other shares of the Com-"pany; and, for this latter purpose, that such monies as "may be necessary be placed at the Board's disposal."

We knew him as one greatly endowed with the qualities which the three pillars symbolize, and these qualities were ever at the Craft's service. To our grateful memory of what he was is now added our gratitude for the generous bequest to the Fund of Benevolence.

The M. W. Grand Master stated to Grand Lodge that as through the death of Past Grand Master Ellis the Committee on Foreign Relations has lost its Chairman, he had requested R. W. Brother James Vroom to act in the vacancy. A report from the Committee would be received at a later stage.

"That when Grand Lodge takes recess, it take recess until 8 o'clock his evening."—*Carried*.

Also on like motion resolved,

"That the election of the elective officers be the order of the day at 8.30 o'clock."

Ordered on motion,

"That the Reports of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary be taken from the table and printed in the Annual Proceedings."

At the Grand Master's request, Past Grand Master Walker stated that he had, when recently in England and in compliance with the wishes of the Grand Master, made enquiries of Messrs. Spencer & Co. as to the cost of a set of jewels to be worn with the old regalia of Grand Lodge. It had been his intention to secure jewels without emblems, but on finding that the additional expense would be very slight he had given an order for jewels with emblems, the cost to be fifteen shillings each. A jewel for the Grand Master was not included in the order.

R. W. Brother Thomas Walker, M.D., P. G. M., as the Grand Representative of The United Grand Lodge of England near this Grand Lodge, read the following correspondence, copies of which had been sent him by V. W. Sir E. Letchworth, Grand Secretary. Copy extract from pages 119 and 120 of the Report on Correspondence of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, A. F. and A. M., for the year 1912, and from page 61 of the Report on Foreign Correspondence of the Grand Lodge of Quebec, dated 13th February, 1913.

GRAND LODGE OF ENGLAND.

"We much regret that we have not received fuller proceedings from this Grand Lodge, as we learn by a personal letter received from Brother W. B. Melish, P. G. M., of Ohio, and present Grand Master of Templars, that Prince Arthur, son of the Duke of Connaught, Grand Master, was made a Mason at sight by the Pro Grand Master. The letter of Bro. Melish is most interesting, and we should like to quote it in full but we did not feel like taking the liberty of doing so without asking his permission. In this letter he mentions that he was present at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of England in April, 1911, and speaks of a pleasant interview with the Grand Master, H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, and the Pro Grand Master, by whom he was cordially invited to be present at the Ceremony to take place the following Thursday, but that previous Masonic engagements for that day compelled him to decline the invitation. He described the procedure observed at the making of President Taft a Mason at sight by the Grand Master of Ohio, to which H. R. H. said that that was about all he received when he was made a Mason.

In reply to an enquiry as to the proceedings that would be observed at the making of Prince Arthur a Mason, the Pro Grand Master replied: 'The Prince will be initiated by special dispensation from the Grand Master, and will receive the three degrees of the blue Lodge in about a

hour-and-a-half. I shall obligate him, giving him the S. D. G. S. and G., etc., and a short lecture, and proclaim him an Apprentice, a Fellow Craft and a Master Mason, and a Member of Royal Alpha Lodge.'

What will those Brethren who insist that the Grand Masters of England do not now, nor have they ever claimed the right of making a Mason at sight, now say to this?"

COPY LETTER addressed to the Grand Secretaries of the Grand Lodges of Maryland, U. S. A., and Quebec.

FREEMASONS' HALL, GREAT QUEEN STREET, LONDON, W. C. 25th July, 1913.

DEAR SIR AND R. W. BRO.:

I am directed to address you on the subject of the statement of which I append a copy and which appeared in the Report on Correspondence of your Grand Lodge for the year 1912, and to inform you that it is entirely incorrect and without foundation.

The M. W. Pro Grand Master is unable to believe that any such information can have been furnished by M. W. Bro. W. B. Melish to whom he is writing himself on the subject, for Bro. Melish cannot possibly have carried away so false an impression of his conversation with H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught and Lord Ampthill.

It will be sufficient to inform you of the actual facts which can, of course, be verified by reference to numerous records both public and Masonic.

They are as follows:

H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught was initiated in the Prince of Wales Lodge on the 24th March, 1874, passed on the 23rd June, 1874, and raised on the 27th April, 1875. On each occasion the full ceremony was performed without the slightest abbreviation or variation from the established custom.

H. R. H. Prince Arthur of Connaught was initiated by the Pro Grand Master (*i. e.*, by Bro. Lord Ampthill himself) in the Royal Alpha Lodge, on the 25th May, 1911, passed in the same Lodge by the W. Master, R. W. Bro. Lord Kensington, on the 2nd July, 1911, and raised in the Household Brigade Lodge by the W. Master on the 29th April, 1912. In each case the ceremony was exactly the same as for every other candidate for Freemasonry.

In view of what I have already written it is hardly necessary for me to add that the remarks attributed to His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught and to Bro. Lord Ampthill are purely imaginary.

I am to beg you to give the same amount of publicity to this correction as was given to your report, for I need hardly explain to you what serious mischief would be caused if the false statement which was unaccountably furnished to you should not receive the fullest correction. It may be useful to you to know that the Constitutions

of the Grand Lodge of England expressly provide in Rule 195 that "No Lodge shall confer more than one degree on any Brother on the same day, nor shall a higher degree be conferred on any Brother at a less interval than four weeks from his receiving a previous degree."

Except in the case of Lodges abroad the Grand Master has no power to grant a dispensation to permit degrees to be conferred at shorter intervals, and then only by substituting intervals of one week for four.

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An informal but interesting discussion ensued being evoked by a suggestion thrown out by the Grand Master that future Communications of Grand Lodge be summoned for ten o'clock in the morning so that time and opportunity would be afforded for the exemplification of degree work or the consideration of matters of general Masonic interest.

Among those who spoke were R. W. Brothers Walker, Maltby, Munro and H. V. B. Bridges, and they favoured the change if it would lead to the conferring of a degree each vear.

W. Brother Lewis H. Bliss gave notice under Section 1 "of Meetings" of a proposition to change the place of next year's meeting to the City of Fredericton. He then moved.

"That Grand Lodge do now proceed to the consideration of the proposed change."

The motion was seconded by R. W. Brother Richard L. Maltby, P. D. G. M.

Moved in amendment by W. Brother John B. M. Baxter, P. G. D. of C., seconded by W. Brother George E. Day, P. G. Pur.,

"That the consideration of the proposed change be taken up this evening immediately after the election of officers."

The amendment having been put and lost the motion was duly Carried.

Moved by W. Brother Lewis H. Bliss, seconded by R. W. Brother Richard L. Maltby, P. D. G. M.,

"That the next annual session of Grand Lodge be held in the City of Fredericton."-Carried.

Grand Lodge then took recess.

TUESDAY EVENING.

August 26th, 1913.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at eight, the M. W. Grand Master in the East.

R. W. Brother Ralph A. March, P. G. Warden, moved the following amendment to the Constitution of which due notice had been inserted in the summonses issued to the members.

"That the following clause be added to Section 6 'of Certificates:' 'A Lodge may, however, issue a card receipt for dues signed by its Secretary bearing on the reverse side a Certificate, under the Seal of Grand Lodge and hand of the Grand Secretary, that the Lodge is duly warranted and registered.'"

The motion was seconded by W. Brother J. Verner McLellan, G. Pur., and after a long discussion was Carried.

The Grand Pursuivant announced Most Worshipful Brother, His Honour Judge D. F. MacWatt, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada, in the Province of Ontario. The Most Worshipful Brother was admitted accompanied by Past Grand Master Walker and W. Brother John B. M. Baxter, by whom he was introduced and conducted to the East. He was then saluted with the Grand Honours.

The M. W. Brother spoke very pleasantly in reply to the Grand Master's words of welcome and especially referred to his Masonic friendship of over twenty years with the late Past Grand Master Ellis, whose loss, though greatest to the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, was as well a loss to Masonry throughout Canada.

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The elections of the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Senior Grand Warden, Grand Chaplain and Grand Treasurer were unanimous.

W. Brother Robert Clerke was, on nomination and open vote, duly re-elected Grand Tyler.

W. Brother Alexander M. Rowan, P. G. Std. B., presented his Commission as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Louisiana. The Commission was dated at New Orleans, June 23rd, 1913, and signed by E. Sundbery, Grand Master, and Richard Lambert, Grand Secretary.

W. Brother John B. M. Baxter, P. G. D. of C., presented his Commission as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario. The Commission was dated at Hamilton, July 26th, 1913, and signed by Wm. David McPherson, Grand Master, and R. L. Gunn, Grand Secretary.

W. Brother Frank A. Godsoe, P. G. D., presented his Commission as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia. The Commission was dated at Halifax, July 26th, 1913, and signed by W. Medford Christie, Grand Master, and Thomas Mowbray, Grand Secretary.

W. Brother Herbert E. Goold, P. G. D. of C., presented his Commission as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Maine. The Commission was dated at Portland, July 26th, 1913, and signed by Elmer P. Spofford, Grand Master, and Stephen Berry, Grand Secretary.

The above Commissions having been read, the four representatives were conducted to the East, welcomed by the Grand Master and accorded the Grand Honours. W Brother Baxter spoke in acknowledgment. Moved by R. W. Brother the Deputy Grand Master:

"That the Report of the Board of General Purposes be taken from the table, adopted and entered in full upon the Minutes."

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The Report of the Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address was presented and read by W. Brother John B. M. Baxter. On his motion it was resolved:

"That the report be received and taken up section by section."

The sections of the report numbered 1 to 6 were then separately read and on motion, duly seconded, were severally adopted.

To section 7, which endorsed the recommendation that the sum of \$300 be placed at the disposal of the Grand Master for expenses when visiting Lodges, an amendment moved by W. Brother A. M. Rowan, seconded by R. W. Brother R. A. March, was adopted, viz.:

"That the sum be increased to \$500."

Moved by W. Brother J. B. M. Baxter, and resolved,

"That the Report of the Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address, as amended, be adopted as a whole and referred to the Board of General Purposes."

REPORT ON THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

Your Committee upon whom devolves the duty of reporting upon the M. W. Grand Master's Address, desires to express the concurrence of Grand Lodge in his sympathetic references to those departed brothers who have relinquished their labors here with the working tools of the Craft and have been called upon to view in the Celestial Lodge beyond,

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the Great Trestle Board of the Universe. Among those who have been summoned during the year, P. G. M. the Honourable John V. Ellis has filled by far the largest space in Masonic history, yet Grand Lodge deplores his loss not alone because of his counsels from the Grand East but even more because of the void which he leaves among his fellowmen.

Of him the Grand Master may well say:

His presence haunts this room to-night A form of mingled mist and light From that far coast. Welcome! beneath this roof of mine Welcome! this vacant chair is thine Dear guest and ghost!

Your Committee also recommend that a page of the records be inscribed as a memorial to each of the departed brethren mentioned in the Address of the Grand Master.

The Grand Master is to be congratulated on the excellent condition in which he found the Order during his visitations, and Grand Lodge will assure him that as a result of his extensive intercourse with the Craft and energetic attention to the duties of his high office, even greater success may be expected in future. Grand Lodge will cheerfully accord to the Grand Master all praise for the very great efforts which he has made during his year of office for the promotion of the interests of the Order.

Your Committee strongly recommend to the favorable consideration of Grand Lodge the recommendation that the salary of the Grand Secretary be increased to a sum sufficient to enable him to devote the time necessary to give ritual instruction to those Lodges which require such assistance.

They also recommend that the Grand Master be empowered to apply a sum not exceeding \$150.00 for the purpose of assisting subordinate Lodges to acquire halls or rooms for their places of meeting.

Your Committee desires the careful attention of Grand Lodge to that portion of the Address which deals with the Masonic Hall Co. Should the several Lodges donate their stock to Grand Lodge, a gift which we think may confidently be anticipated, it would leave but 454 shares outstanding, of the par value of \$9,080.00. Of this stock it is practically certain that a large amount will be donated to the Craft, and it is possible that but a very small amount of money may be required for the purchase of such stock as shall not be donated. Your 1913]

Committee recommend that steps be taken to provide by legislation for the cancellation of all stock in the Masonic Hall Co. which shall not be claimed within a reasonable period, the length of which should be defined by the enactment. Until the expiration of that period it

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would probably be advisable that an adequate sum should be taken from the funds of Grand Lodge and deposited with the Receiver General of the Province as security for the due payment of any claims which holders of stock may have. Any balance remaining in the hands of the Receiver General after the expiration of the period of limitation would of course revert to Grand Lodge.

Your Committee recommend that the Board of General Purposes be authorized to promote legislation along the lines indicated in this report.

Your Committee heartily approve of the suggestion of the Grand Master that the Board of General Purposes be authorized to apply to the Legislature for an Act of Incorporation so as to enable that body to properly hold the property and administer the funds of Grand Lodge; in fact, such a step will be rendered absolutely necessary if the policy as to the acquisition of the Masonic Hall should be adopted by Grand Lodge.

Your Committee also recommend that the Board of General Purposes should prepare a simple mode of incorporation for subordinate Lodges which would be capable of being utilized not only by those Lodges which are not at present incorporated but also by those which have special charters. We think the legislation should leave the latter bodies absolutely free, but at the same time should be framed in such a spirit that the Lodges at present incorporated would feel entirely disposed to bring themselves under the general Act.

Your Committee endorse the recommendation that the sum of \$300.00 be placed at the disposal of the Grand Master to be applied towards the payment of travelling expenses when officially visiting Lodges. (Amended to read \$500.00.)

The first, second and third sections were duly adopted.

The fourth section was as follows:

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"Your Committee would not willingly let fall the recommendation of the Committee on Foreign Relations of 1911, of which the late Past Grand Master Ellis was chairman, respecting the recognition of the Grand Lodge of France. This, it will be remembered, is one of two Grand Bodies in that country which are working together in harmony; but is not the one accused of extinguishing one of the three Great Lights of Masonry. This Committee would, therefore, repeat the recommendation that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick seek an exchange of representatives with the Grand Lodge of France, pending a final settlement of any and all difficulties which still exist between the Grant Orient of France and the governing bodies of the Craft elsewhere."

A motion to adopt the same was declared — Lost.

The following is the report as finally adopted:

REPORT ON FOREIGN RELATIONS.

ST. JOHN, N. B., August 26, 1913.

To the M. W. the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

Your Committee on Foreign Relations respectfully present the following report:

A Masonic Convention was held at Manila, in the Philippine Islands, in November last, at which there were represented three Lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge of California; and, after due deliberation, at a later meeting, held in December, the Brethren representing these three Lodges proceeded to organize a Grand Lodge of the Philippine

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Islands. All the proceedings of this Convention would seem to have been regular, according to the standards of the Grand Lodge of California; and there seems to be no reason, therefore, why the latter should not yield recognition to the new Grand Lodge, if it has not already done so, for its territorial claims are not greater than those generally put forward by like governing bodies in the United States. Nevertheless, it does not necessarily follow that we should hasten to acknowledge these claims. There are in the Philippines two Masonic Lodges under Scottish Constitution, which took no part in the organization of the new Grand Lodge. The new Grand Body, claiming exclusive territorial jurisdiction, demands that the Grand Lodge of Scotland shall withdraw from the territory thus occupied, and no longer maintain its authority over the two Scottish Lodges; and, since it is improbable that the Grand Lodge of Scotland will accede to this imperative demand, and thus force the Scottish Masons in the Philippines to change their allegiance, it seems to your Committee advisable to await the outcome before extending a formal recognition to the new Grand Lodge.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge of Porto Rico asks for recognition. It meets at San Juan and is an offshoot of the Grand Lodge of Cuba which this Grand Lodge fully recognizes.

It displays the three great lights on its altars and requires of its applicants a belief in Deity. One of its subordinate Lodges works in English, the others in Spanish, and except in language these differ little from Lodges in the United States and Canada.

The present Grand Master is an English-speaking native of Virginia, and the writer of the letter asking for recognition is a Canadian. Your Committee cordially recommend that the request be granted.

An official circular has been received from the Grand Lodge of Oregon, transmitting a copy of certain resolutions looking to the formation of some central representative Masonic Body with authority to enact laws and take measures binding upon such Grand Jurisdictions in the United States and British North, America as may choose to participate; with the object of promoting uniformity in law and ritual among English-speaking Masons on this continent. Your Committee are of opinion that all necessary uniformity can be attained in North America without in any way impairing the sovereign authority of the existing Grand Lodges.

"That the sum of fifteen hundred dollars be transferred from the general account of Grand Lodge to the Fund of Benevolence and be invested by the Board of General Purposes."

Moved in amendment by R. W. Brother William B. Wallace, P. D. G. M., seconded by R. W. Brother Julius T. Whitlock, P. G. M.,

"That the sum, if any, to be transferred to the Fund of Benevolence, be left in the discretion of the Board of General Purposes."

The amendment was Carried.

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The R. W. Deputy Grand Master moved the following amendment to the Constitution according to notice given on behalf of the Board of General Purposes:

"That Section 9 'of Proposing Members' be amended by striking out the words 'it becomes the property of the Lodge and cannot be withdrawn except by vote of the Lodge and upon the application for withdrawal by the recommenders of the petition, previous to the Report of the Investigating Committee being received,' and by inserting in lieu thereof the words 'cannot be withdrawn.'"

The motion was seconded by R. W. Brother Henry S. Bridges, P. G. M., and was discussed at some length by W. Brother Frank A. Godsoe, P. G. D., and W. Brother John B. M. Baxter, P. G. D. of C. The motion was duly *Carried*.

Moved by R. W. Brother Henry S. Bridges, P. G. M., seconded by V. W. Brother Arthur W. Sharp, G. Treas., "That the salary of the Grand Secretary be increased to the amount of eight hundred dollars."—*Carried*.

"That, in view of the unremitting and effective service given by him for years past to the affairs of The New Brunswick Masonic Hall Company as a Director and latterly as its President, Brother George Blake, of Albion Lodge, No. 1, be constituted a permanent member of Grand Lodge with the rank of Past Senior Grand Deacon."— *Carried*.

Ordered,

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"That when Grand Lodge takes recess, it take recess until three o'clock to-morrow, Wednesday afternoon."

Grand Lodge then took recess.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

August 27th, 1913.

Grand Lodge resumed labour this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

R. W. Thomas Walker, M.D., P. G. M., gave notice that at the next Annual Communication he would move to so amend Section 6 "of the Proceedings of Grand Lodge" as to provide that "no alteration or addition (to the laws, rules or regulations of the Grand Lodge) shall be made unless by consent of *two-thirds* of the members present."

Resolved, on motion of Past Grand Masters Walker and Bridges,

"That The Reverend A. D. Archibald be constituted a permanent member of Grand Lodge with the rank and dignity of Past Grand Chaplain."

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The greatly improved condition of the library was referred to and the sum of thirty-five dollars was voted the Committee for the ensuing year.

The following letter from the venerable Brother, William S. Marven, Past Senior Grand Deacon, was read:
