# GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The M. W. Grand Master delivered the following address:

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

I wish to extend to you a hearty and fraternal welcome to this our Forty-Eighth Annual Communication.

It is now nearly half a century since our founders, who were good and true masons, who were men who filled a large place in the public affairs of New Brunswick, laid broad and deep the foundations of Grand Lodge, and the growth of our Order has been in a measure, we trust, commensurate with their hopes and desires.

In accordance with the change in our Constitution we are assembled in April instead of in August, and while the autumn season, which is the season of fulfilment and realization, may seem more appropriate for the annual assembling of Grand Lodge, yet the season of spring, which is the season of youth and of promise and of hope, may be regarded as almost equally appropriate. The fact, also, that we are nearer the closing of our masonic year emphasizes the present as a fitting occasion for our Annual Communication.

Not eight months have elapsed since Grand Lodge met in the City of Fredericton. These months, however, have been of supreme historic interest and anxiety. "The catastrophe incalculable," the greatest war in the world's history to which our Grand Master, last year, alluded in most fitting terms, still is being waged with unabated fury.

Freemasonry has ever flourished in times of peace. Masonry has always deplored the miseries and suffering which are the inevitable consequence of war, but we must feel, to-day, that wishes for peace are inopportune and useless, and not until the principles of truth and justice and liberty have finally triumphed and prevailed, can we hope for peace that will be permanent and lasting.

In these months, we have been called upon to mourn the loss of a number of brethren, members of Grand Lodge, who have been called from their earthly labours, and in whose lives and work we felt a deep and fraternal interest.

Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, mourns sincerely for their oldest Past Master, W. Brother James E. Drysdale, who, for almost half a century, was a regular attendant of the Lodge, and a most consistent and prominent mason.

In his home in Buctouche, on the 18th November, R. W. Brother Robert A. Irving, P. D. G. M., after a short illness, passed away at the age of forty-two, cut off in the midst of his usefulness, and the brethren of Lodge Saint Andrew deeply mourn their loss. R. W. Brother Irving was made a Master Mason in Lodge Saint Andrew, No. 16. in May. 1897. He was twice elected to preside over the Lodge, and in August, 1912, he was elected Deputy Grand Master of Grand Lodge. We well remember his strong and vigorous personality in this hall less than two years ago. Who of us would have judged otherwise than that the future had in store for him years of success and honour in the active affairs of life? But the Supreme Architect had decreed it otherwise, and no more will he meet with us in the lodge room below. A warm hearted friend, an active and enthusiastic mason, he filled a large place in the

affections and regard of his brethren who keenly feel his

Miramichi Lodge, No. 18, mourns the loss of one of her oldest masons, R. W. Brother F. E. Danville, P. G. W., who died on the 23rd November, at the ripe age of eightysix. Brother Danville received his Master Mason's Degree in Northumberland Lodge, in August, 1878. Upon his removal to Chatham, a few years later, he took his demit and became a member of Miramichi Lodge, No. 18, and up to the time of his death, a period of thirty-two years, he was an active member, and a constant attendant at regular communications, until the infirmities of age prevented. Time did not weaken his interest in masonry, nor did age lessen his enthusiasm. Honest, straightforward and upright, he was held in the highest esteem by the citizens of the town in which he resided, and was loved and respected by the craft. Brother Danville was a frequent attendant at our Annual Communications, and Grand Lodge honoured him by electing him Junior Grand Warden, in the year 1898.

Hiram Lodge has lost from the roll of her Past Masters W. Brother J. D. Phinney. W. Brother Phinney became a mason young in life, and received his degrees in Lodge Saint Andrew, No. 16. He removed to Fredericton over twenty years ago, and at once took his place as one of the foremost citizens of the capital, and until death enjoyed the respect and esteem of all classes of society. He became a member of Hiram Lodge some years after leaving Richibucto, having taken his demit from his mother lodge. For a number of years he represented his native County in our Legislature. Of modest and retiring disposition, nevertheless when occasion required, ever a graceful speaker, he was bold and independent in the expression of his opinions as to what was right. He not only exhibited true masonic virtues, but exemplified in

his life and conduct the words of the poet, "an honest man's the noblest work of God." Failing health did not prevent him from attending the meeting of Grand Lodge in Fredericton, and almost his last public utterance was made at the banquet given in the evening by Hiram Lodge. He was buried with masonic honours on the 2nd of March by his brethren of Hiram Lodge.

W. Brother J. T. Allen Dibblee, P. G. D., of Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, died January 31st, and was buried with masonic honours in the cemetery of the Parish Church of his native town. W. Brother Dibblee was raised a Master Mason July 25th, 1878, and presided over Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, during the years 1892 and 1893. For the period of thirty-six years he ever displayed an active interest in masonry and was a loyal and true member of the Craft. Keen interest, also, was shown by him in all matters connected with his native town. On the School Board, for many years a member of the Town Council, and for two years Mayor, and as his County's Representative in our Legislature, his period of service in the public interest was a large one, his influence was exerted along the line of progress and good government in a most energetic manner, and the work he did is still exerting its power and will be transmitted to those who come after him. Woodstock Lodge feels keenly his removal from their midst.

Zion Lodge, No. 21, mourns the loss of W. Brother Murray Huestis, one of her Past Masters. He died on October 25th. W. Brother Huestis was raised a Master Mason February 5th, 1879, and was elevated to the chair in 1904. For over fifteen years he served his Lodge faithfully as Secretary. He was an enthusiastic mason, affectionate and loving in his own family and a faithful friend. By his death, Zion Lodge loses a pillar of strength and the fraternity a zealous and ardent worker.

Steven Lodge, No. 37, has lost W. Brother W. S. King from her roll of Past Masters and sincerely mourns for him.

The whole Empire mourns the loss of Lord Roberts, who passed away in France in November last. As masons, however, we possess even a stronger tie in this connection.

The report of the Grand Lodge of Ireland contains the

"Last, but not least, has to be deplored the death of Field Marshal Earl Roberts, that distinguished soldier who, after an eventful life devoted to the service of his country, ended a noble career in the field of war. He was a member of the Military Lodge, No. 728, Dublin, in which he took a deep interest, and was a most regular attendant at its meetings whenever his military duties brought him to Ireland."

We are thus forcibly reminded that each year brings us nearer the inevitable journey to that undiscovered country from which no traveller returns. We should, therefore, be the more careful of our thoughts, our words and our actions, so that when we, too, are called, we may be found worthy to enter the Celestial Lodge above.

We have to congratulate ourselves upon the present excellent condition of the different subordinate Lodges in the jurisdiction. I have been impressed with the importance attached by our Lodges to the official visits of Grand Lodge officers, and one cannot but feel that the present encouraging condition of the Craft is due in a large measure to the activity displayed by my predecessors in office in visiting, officially, our Lodges.

In the short time at my disposal I have not been able to make as many official visits as I would like, for this is certainly the most interesting as well as a very pleasant part of the duties of the Grand Master.

Accompanied by the S. G. D., W. Brother S. H. McKee, the Grand Director of Ceremonies, R. W. Brother T. S. Wilkinson, P. G. W., and W. Brother Alex. Boyd, P. G. D., I made an official visit to Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, on the night of their Regular Communication in November. I found W. Brother J. A. Lindsay presiding in the East and a full attendance of members present. W. Brother Lindsay, though of mature years, possesses the enthusiasm of youth, and he was surrounded by officers who performed their duties with precision. The finances of the Lodge are in excellent condition, and its position as one of the very strong Lodges is worthily upheld. R. W. Brother Munro is still the efficient Secretary and much of the credit of the Lodge's present strong position, financially, is undoubtedly due to his efforts. At the conclusion of the ceremonies the officers of Grand Lodge were suitably entertained.

On the 25th November, accompanied by R. W. Brother Thomas Walker, P.G.M., the Grand Secretary, and the Grand Director of Ceremonies, I visited Ashlar Lodge, No. 36, at an Emergency Communication. W. Brother Geo. H. Gallagher was in the chair and the Master Mason's Degree was conferred upon a candidate, the lectures being given by R. W. Brother Walker and the Grand Secretary. Ashlar Lodge fully maintains its place as one of the brightest Lodges established in recent years.

R. W. Brother Walker, P. G. M., has been a member of Ashlar Lodge for a number of years and has often attended its Communications. It is needless to say that he has been of the greatest assistance to the officers in past years in keeping the working tools bright. The banquet provided by the members of the Lodge, in the beautiful dining room of the C. P. R. Station, and the music furnished by the orchestra were worthy of any occasion.

On arriving in St. Stephen, the next day, we were met by W. M. L. B. Mitchell and several of the brethren of Sussex Lodge, No. 7, and in the evening with the Grand Secretary and the Grand Director of Ceremonies, I visited the Lodge. The hour of our visit was late. A most enthusiastic patriotic meeting was held that evening in St. Stephen, which as good and loyal masons we were impelled to attend. No degree work was performed, therefore, and after the close of the Lodge we were very appropriately entertained in the banquet hall of the Lodge room, and I have seldom listened to more appropriate speeches than were made by the members of this Lodge. Sussex Lodge, one of the oldest on the roll, has always been strongly represented in Grand Lodge and holds the distinguished honour of having on its list of members two Past Grand Masters. Freemasonry has always flourished on the border, and in District No. 5, which is largely comprised in Charlotte County, there are more members of the Order in proportion to the population than in any other part of the Province. Sussex Lodge has been the centre of this District.

On the following morning, we were most agreeably entertained by Brother W. Graham, of Victoria Lodge, who took us on an automobile drive around Oak Bay, and in the afternoon W. Brother Mungall of the same Lodge very kindly showed us through the Cotton Mill for which Milltown is justly noted.

In the evening, with R. W. Brother Whitlock, P. G. M., R. W. Brother J. Vroom, P. D. G. M., R. W. Brother Inches, P. G. W., and W. Brother R. W. Grimmer from Sussex Lodge, and W. Brother Chase, P. G. D., of Alley Lodge, we visited Victoria Lodge, No. 26. W. Brother Hiltz, a very efficient Ritualist, presided in the East. A number of the officers were unable to be present as the Cotton Mill was running over time and they were unable

to get away. There was no candidate in waiting, and the Worshipful Master selected his officers from those present. and exemplified the First Degree, the Grand Secretary acting as Senior Deacon. It is needless to say that the work was well done.

I was very glad to meet, at this Communication, a number of the Craft from Alley Lodge, as I was prevented from visiting that Lodge at that time.

The fraternal greeting and kindly hospitality which we met with at the hands of our brethren on the border are

For the purpose of installing officers for the ensuing not easily forgotten. year, I visited Hiram Lodge, No. 6, on the evening of the 27th December and I had the pleasure of installing W. Brother H.S. Campbell a second time as Worshipful Master. This Lodge closed a record year in the matter of work performed, and the work has been well done. The attendance at different Communications is uniformly good, and the officers vie with one another in the faithful discharge of the duties of their offices.

. The Regular Communication of Alexandria Lodge, No. 33, was held on the 4th January and I visited this Lodge officially upon that date to install the officers. I was accompanied by the S.G.D. W. Bro. S. H. McKee, the Grand Director of Ceremonies, P. G. D. Boyd and W. T. McLeod. W. Brother Peter L. McFarlane was installed Worshipful Master, and he is surrounded by a number of young officers who, I have no doubt, will do their best to master the Ritual, and perform the duties of office. The members of Alexandria Lodge, for a part of the year, were compelled to give up their Lodge room, and for several meetings met in Hiram Lodge room, by permission of the Grand Master. They are now back in their old quarters, however, and with young and enthusiastic masons in office I have no doubt that a successful year will ensue.

Upon invitation, I visited The Corinthian Lodge, No. 13, at Hampton on the night of the January Communication. I was accompanied by the Junior Grand Warden, the Grand Secretary, the Grand Director of Ceremonies and the Grand Organist, and had pleasure in installing W. Brother Flewwelling as Worshipful Master as well as the other officers. One could not but be impressed with the fact that W. Brother Flewwelling was surrounded with an efficient staff of officers and the ease and precision with which all discharged their initial duties showed very clearly that they were early becoming familiar with their work. The attendance was large and it was most enjoyable to exchange fraternal greetings with so many good brethren. The bountiful entertainment provided in the beautiful Lodge room was not by any means the least happy part of the occasion, and I have a better idea now why The Corinthian Lodge has always been so popular with Grand Masters in the past.

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It was with pleasure I accepted the invitation of the Worshipful Master of New Brunswick Lodge, No. 22, to install his successor in office. Accordingly, on the evening of the 14th January I visited that Lodge, accompanied by a full complement of Grand Lodge officers, for the purpose of installation. I have known W. Brother Geo. D. Ellis for some years as a friend and a mason, but to be able to install the son of his father, our late loved and revered brother, R. W. P. G. Master Ellis, into the chair of this vigorous Lodge, I esteem not only as a pleasure, but a privilege and an honour.

The grand attendance, this spacious and beautiful Lodge room filled to its capacity, the careful attention to the Ritual of the ceremony, and the kindly and hearty fraternal greetings extended to one of the few who have been privileged to occupy the Grand East outside of this city, by the many brethren and officers of Grand Lodge

rank, and the magnificent entertainment at the close of the Communication, I cannot easily forget and for it all I wish to express my grateful appreciation.

Pursuant to a resolution of Grand Lodge, at our last Regular Communication, a Warrant of Constitution was issued to Sunbury Lodge, No. 42, which had been working under a Dispensation since December, 1913.

On the 25th January, with R.W. Brother C. D. Jones, D. G. M., the Grand Secretary, the Grand Director of Ceremonies, the Senior Grand Deacon, and W. Brother Alex. Boyd, P. G. D., I visited Fredericton Junction and dedicated this Lodge according to ancient usage. At the conclusion of this ceremony W. Brother D. W. Mersereau was duly installed Master, as well as the other officers.

The Worshipful Master and brethren, during the past year, have displayed commendable zeal in their work, and have fully justified the judgment of my predecessor in office in issuing them a Dispensation under which to work. While Sunbury Lodge will never become a large Lodge, I have no doubt that it will, for years to come, afford a home for the members of the Craft in that vicinity who feel most grateful for its establishment, and who will do their best to maintain the honour and dignity of our Order.

Through the Grand Secretary, I received an invitation to visit Lodge St. John, No. 27, at Bathurst, for the purpose of consecrating their new Lodge room. Accordingly, on the 26th February, I visited officially this Lodge, and assisted by the Deputy Grand Master, the Senior Grand Warden, R. W. Brother Maltby, P. D. G. M., the Grand Secretary, the Grand Director of Ceremonies and the Grand Pursuivant, I duly consecrated according to ancient usage the new Lodge room of Lodge St. John. There was a large attendance of members to witness the ceremony and a strong delegation came from Campbellton Lodge with W. Brother Andrew.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, the E. A. Degree was conferred upon a candidate. W. Brother McIntosh, who is Master of the Lodge, and his officers, performed their work in a very satisfactory manner. The officers of Grand Lodge were very agreeably entertained at the close of the Communication. The brethren of Lodge St. John are to be congratulated on their new surroundings. They have a new building of two stories and a Lodge room of ample accommodation.

With the advent of the new Pulp Mill in this historic town, and new industries, they may well feel confident and enthusiastic about the future of the Craft in their midst.

On the evening of Sunday, the 6th December last, upon invitation of St. John's Lodge, No. 2. I met the officers of Grand Lodge, brethren of St. John's Lodge, and many other masons of St. John, in the vestry of St. Andrew's Church for the purpose of attending divine service and witnessing the unveiling of a tablet in memory of R. W. Brother Wm. Campbell, one of the original members of St. John's Lodge and for a number of years District Deputy Grand Master for the Province, under the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.

The tablet, which was presented by St. John's Lodge to St. Andrew's Church, was unveiled with appropriate language by R. W. Brother H. S. Bridges, P. G. M., and a vigorous address was delivered by R. W. Brother J. G. Forbes, P.G.M., both of whom are members of St. John's Lodge as well as of St. Andrew's congregation.

After the conclusion of this pleasing ceremony the brethren of the Craft listened with keen interest to an admirable sermon delivered by the Grand Chaplain.

In looking up the early history of Freemasonry in New Brunswick, I find in R. W. Brother Bunting's work that the first member of the Craft to preside over a Lodge in New Brunswick was the Rev. J. Beardsley, and the date of that occasion was September 1,1784. Brother Beardsley before coming to New Brunswick had been Junior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of New York. He was evidently enthusiastic in the interest of the Craft in those days, and was undoubtedly instrumental in establishing two other Lodges, at Maugerville and at Kingston.

There is record of his having preached a sermon to the brethren, here, in Trinity Church on St. John the Baptist Day, 1802, in which he states that "the noble art hath been propagated in different parts of the Province so that we now have five regular Lodges established." He died poor, and lies buried beneath the chancel of the old church at

There is no memorial of any kind to commemorate his Kingston. work. It does not seem out of place, therefore, under the circumstances, to recommend that Grand Lodge provide a suitable memorial — for one who may not unfittingly be styled the father of Freemasonry in New Brunswick - to be placed in the church beneath which he lies buried.

In visiting Lodges in the jurisdiction I have been much impressed with the many pleasant and attractive Lodge rooms, homes of Freemasonry, of which the brethren may well be proud. It is a significant fact, too, that much improvement has been made of late years, and these improvements have not been made in any spirit of ostentation, but they are the results of a genuine desire that masonry may be appropriately and adequately housed.

Sometimes one hears of an indebtedness, but it is better to have a live and energetic body of masons meeting in a building with a debt not out of proportion to its financial ability, than a Lodge asleep and resting too securely in its finished Temple.

At our last Communication, in Fredericton, the Master Mason Degree was conferred in Hiram Lodge, No. 6,

by officers who were members of a Lodge of Instruction which was held in this Lodge room. I regard this as a most important feature of our last meeting and know that it has already been productive of much good, and has resulted in greater exactness of work in several subordinate Lodges.

Much credit is due R. W. Brother Walker, P. G. M., for the active interest he took in this matter.

We sometimes hear the opinion expressed among masons that there should be uniformity of Ritual at least throughout the Dominion. It has never seemed to me so very desirable and it certainly appears impracticable. It is enough that the grand principles are the same throughout.

I feel we are all ready to confess an actual affection for our Ritual. Its simplicity, in which lies much of its strength, its directness and impressiveness are endeared to proclaim "ne varietur" as our motto in this regard.

This is the first Communication of Grand Lodge in which our reports show that this Masonic Temple is the actual property of Grand Lodge, and what was for years "a consummation devoutly to be wished" has become an actual reality. In the report of the Board of General Purposes of last year, it was clearly brought to the notice of Grand Lodge that this successful issue was largely brought about by the zeal and energy of one person. And after looking more closely into the matter, as I have had occasion to do, I am even more impressed with what R. W. Brother Knowlton was able to accomplish while in the Grand East.

Grand Lodge now possesses a valuable property which will no doubt in future years become a source of greater financial strength, and the surplus revenues from this source will be secured to the Fund of Benevolence, and this was the original intention of the founders of the building.

The reports of the Grand Treasurer and the Grand Secretary will be laid before you in due course. These will be found gratifying and encouraging.

The finances of Grand Lodge are in excellent condition and an increased membership is reported.

During the past fourteen years our membership has doubled. In the year 1900 there were but 1885 active masons in the jurisdiction, and we now have nearly 3700 enrolled in our Lodges.

There has been little if any increase in population in those parts of New Brunswick from which our membership is drawn, so that this increase exhibits in a marked manner the growing strength and vigor of the Craft, and demonstrates clearly that the principles of Freemasonry which have endured through the ages, and which are among the most potent agencies for good in our civilization, are commending themselves more and more to the younger and rising generation.

I have issued fully twenty dispensations, the most of which were for the purpose of conferring degrees upon candidates at short intervals, and twenty of those who have received degrees at short intervals had enlisted for active service in the war.

Through the kindness of the Grand Secretary, I have ascertained fairly well the number of masons who have enlisted, and I know that considerably over a hundred are on the list, and of these fully fifty are from St. John.

I have lately seen a report of a wonderful gathering of masons at Empire Lodge in London at which every Grand Lodge jurisdiction in Canada was represented, and the statement was made that there were about five thousand masons in the First Contingent. It is probable that fully as large a percentage of the Second Contingent are also members of the Craft. And this leads one to ask why have so many masons in Canada volunteered for active service?

Masons have always been truly loval, but there is something more than loyalty in this action. If this war were being waged by Great Britain for the purpose of military conquest, or territorial aggrandizement, or commercial supremacy, I apprehend that the same response would not have resulted. It is because the great moral principles for which the Empire is fighting are truth, justice, liberty and honour, and for these principles masonry has stood for centuries. Let us not lose sight of fundamentals in this connection.

Great Britain drew the sword only after patient and painstaking diplomacy had failed. The appeal to arms was made only after an amicable settlement was seen to be impossible. She summoned her sons to the field of battle because there was no other way to maintain her honour and her pledged faith to a brave but small nation. Her Minister of Education has given direction that everywhere throughout the Empire shall be taught the causes and lessons of this war, and we are not forgetting. should we forget the appeal of England's Premier on the spiritual side which touches a responsive chord in the heart of every mason in the Empire -- "to the ancient and inbred qualities of our race which have not failed in times of stress — to self-mastery, self-sacrifice, patience, tenacity, willingness to bear one another's burdens, the unity which springs from a dominating sense of a common duty, neverfailing faith and an inflexible resolve."

The voice of Freemasonry has ever been the voice of peace. Masonry, like the arts and sciences, has flourished and thriven during years of peace.

But if the Supreme Architect of the Universe decrees that this awful war shall continue until the wrongs of suffering, down-trodden Belgium shall have been measurably righted, until the forces of the enemy shall have been driven from the fields of fair France and her dismembered Empire wholly restored, until the ancient rights and liberties and language have been given back to poor Poland, and until the clang of armor and sword of Prussian militarism be no more heard in Europe, naught shall we say, but as was said of old, "Just and righteous art Thou altogether in Thy works, O Lord."

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Since the accounts were closed for audit, remittances of Fees and Dues amounting to \$269.80 have been received from Hiram and Carleton Union Lodges.

For a period of eleven years after its formation in 1867, Grand Lodge met in Annual Session in the month of September. A change was then made to the latter part of April, and this change obtained until 1892. Then the Constitution was again amended and the Fourth Tuesday in August was fixed as the date for the annual assembling. Inasmuch as April has once more been selected, it was felt that it would be well to urge the Lodges to make

their returns as soon as possible after the installation of officers in order that the usual statements might be prepared for Grand Lodge. Circulars pointing out the need for prompt action were accordingly issued early in January. The Lodge Secretaries are to be commended for the very satisfactory response which has been made, as all returns, with but one exception, have been received.

The V. W. Grand Treasurer being unable, for business reasons, to be present, his annual statement of accounts was submitted by R. W. Brother F. J. G. Knowlton, P. G. M., who, in doing so commented upon some of its special features. Together with the Grand Treasurer's Accounts was presented the Auditor's report thereon.

Moved by Past Grand Master Knowlton, seconded by R. W. Brother J. T. Whitlock, P. G. M.,

"That the Statements and Auditor's report be accepted and adopted and that they be referred to Grand Lodge for consideration."—Carried.

R. W. Brother Knowlton, after reading By-Law No. 2, which provides that the Annual Meeting of the Corporation shall be held "at the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon or at such later hour as may be stated in the notice of the meeting," gave notice that he would move, at the next annual meeting, an amendment providing that the meeting shall be held "at an hour to be stated in the notice of the meeting."

On motion, "The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation" adjourned.

Grand Lodge resumes labour.

R. W. Charles D. Jones, Deputy Grand Master, presented the report of the Board of General Purposes, and on motion, it was ordered that the same be received and laid on the table.

The following is the report:

# REPORT OF BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The Report of the Board of General Purposes must necessarily be brief as but few matters have engaged attention during the seven months which have elapsed since the last Communication.

At its first meeting the Board elected the V. W. Grand Treasurer, Vice-President, and appointed R. W. Brother F. J. G. Knowlton, Past Grand Master, and the Deputy Grand Master to act with the M. W. Grand Master in administering the Fund of Benevolence.

The applications for aid have been few in number, the grants made by the Committee amounting to but one hundred and seventy-five dollars.

The Investments of the Fund have undergone no change since the last report in August and are, as then, of the par value of \$14,500, yielding an annual income of \$669.00. In addition there is, at this date, a Savings Bank balance of \$2,054.40, and it might be well if the incoming Board were to invest one thousand or fifteen hundred dollars of this balance in approved Municipal Securities.

The application made to Grand Lodge on behalf of Bethel Lodge, No. 40, for some financial aid in erecting a new Lodge Room, and which Grand Lodge referred to the Board, was considered at a Special Meeting. A statement was submitted by the Treasurer of the Lodge containing a description of the new building, an estimate of its cost including the land and of the means which the Lodge had of meeting the cost. The Board unanimously agreed that a contribution of one hundred and fifty dollars be made.

The sum of five hundred dollars, voted by Grand Lodge to the Canada Lodge Field Hospital, was early remitted to Sir F. Williams-Taylor and was acknowledged by him in the following telegram:

"I am directed by the Worshipful Master of Canada Lodge to express to you his very keen appreciation of your prompt and generous donation, to which as a member of the Canada Lodge I add my warm thanks."

A subscription of one hundred dollars was also made by the Board, in September last, to the Canadian Patriotic Fund. The Credential Committee for this Communication are: R. W. Brother A. McNichol and W. Brothers T. H. Belyea and W. B. Robertson.

I would recommend that the basement be looked after as soon as possible, as the water passing through it is gradually softening the bases of the brick piers and parts of the brick partition, and may, if unchecked, cause serious damage.

R. W. Brother James Vroom, P. D. G. M., as Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations, presented a report dealing with the request of The Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands for recognition. The report showed

briefly the existing Masonic conditions in the Islands, the number of Lodges, and the fact that the new Grand Lodge had been recognized by the Grand Lodge of California and other Grand Lodges in the United States. The report was signed by R. W. Brother Vroom and R. W. Brother A. R. Campbell, P. G. W., and it concluded with recommending that this Grand Lodge extend recognition. The third member of the Committee, R. W. Brother His Honour Judge Forbes, P. G. M., had not seen his way to joining in the recommendation mainly because the Grand Lodge of Scotland, under whose warrant a Lodge was still working in the Islands, had as yet withheld its recognition.

After some discussion it was Resolved on motion of R. W. Brother Henry S. Bridges, P. G. M.,

R. W. Brother F. J. G. Knowlton, P. G. M., of the Special Committee, presented the following report on the Grand Master's Address, and on his motion, seconded by R. W. Brother Donald Munro, P. D. G. M., it was Resolved.

"That the Committee's report be entered on the Minutes and its recommendations carried into effect."

To the Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

The Committee to which was referred the Address of the Grand Master are fully in accord with him that the change of the date of the Annual Communication will be of distinct advantage to the Craft.

It is indeed very fitting that the Grand Master should refer by name to those whose loss we mourn. The many prominent members of this Institution who have passed away during the present year recall to us friendships which must now live only in the past but the recollection of which will lead us all to emulate their examples. Requiescant in pace.

The many visits paid to private Lodges emphasize the unceasing zeal of the Grand Master in this important work.

They join with the Grand Master in wishing all prosperity to the youngest Lodge, Sunbury No. 42, and have learned with pleasure of the rebuilding of the Lodge Room at Bathurst.

It is the duty of Grand Lodge to see that a suitable memorial to Brother John Beardsley be erected in Trinity Church, Kingston, and therefore the Committee suggest that the Board of General Purposes be directed to carry out the recommendation of the Grand Master in this respect.

Grand Lodge has learned with pride of the large number of Masons at Empire Lodge, London, at which it was stated that five thousand members of this organization form part of the First Canadian Expeditionary Force. If Masonry stands for anything in this Empire, it stands unswervingly erect for the Crown and Throne of England. The principles taught in our Lodges have clearly tightened the ties which bind the individual to King and Country.

Grand Lodge then took recess.


