ANNUAL MEETING.

St. John, N. B., Tuesday, April 24th, 1917.

THE Annual Meeting of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation was held at Freemasons Hall, this afternoon, at 2.30 o'clock, the M.W. Grand Master, Hedley V. B. Bridges, President ex-officio, in the chair.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting, as printed in the Proceedings of Grand Lodge, were, on motion, confirmed.

The annual report of the Managing Committee of the Masonic Hall was submitted by R. W. F. J. G. Knowlton, Chairman, and on his motion, seconded by R. W. A. R. Campbell, it was Resolved,

"That the report be received and approved and that it be presented to Grand Lodge."

V. W. H. Russell Sturdee, Grand Treasurer, submitted the annual statement of accounts both of the General Fund and of the Fund of Benevolence.

The report of the Audit Committee was likewise presented.

Resolved,

"That the Accounts and the report of the Auditors thereon be adopted and that they be presented to Grand Lodge for confirmation."

The notice summoning the annual meeting stated that the Board of Directors had made the following by-law: "A meeting of the Directors of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation may be called at any time by the President, the Vice-President or any three members of the Board of Directors."

On motion of R. W. F. J. G. Knowlton, the by-law was approved to be inserted as by-law No. 9, the four subsequent by-laws to be re-numbered 10, 11, 12 and 13 respectively.

On motion, the annual meeting of "The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation" adjourned.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

1917]

Our gathering here this afternoon brings us to the close of another Masonic year, and I wish, first of all, to extend a cordial welcome to you at this Annual Communication of Grand Lodge. Assembled here from different parts of the jurisdiction, as officers of Grand Lodge, as members, representative of subordinate lodges, as visitors, you have come together by reason of your interest in our noble order to discharge your duties and responsibilities, with the desire, also, to meet and associate with the brethren of the Craft. Surely an assembly such as this, to those of us who have the privilege of attending, cannot help but prove pleasant and profitable.

It is worthy of note, too, that this is the fiftieth Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, and we meet here today in the spirit of gratitude and pride, as we consider the history of our Grand Lodge during the past half century.

Under the circumstances it does not seem out of place to note briefly the condition of Freemasonry in New Brunswick before this period, and some of the facts in connection with the formation of Grand Lodge. Before the year 1867 there existed twenty-six lodges which had but little in common and which owed their existence to warrants issued by different grand lodges in the old country. Twenty were working under warrants from the Grand Lodge of England, three under the Grand Lodge of Scotland, and three also under the Grand Lodge of Ireland. The lack of anything like uniformity of ritual, and the difficulties and jealousies engendered by the fact that subordinate lodges owed allegiance to different grand bodies, must have prevented, in many ways, the growth of that harmony and coherence which should have existed among Masons.

No doubt the successful establishment of the Confederation of the Provinces into our Dominion impelled prominent Masons in New Brunswick to take active measures towards the establishment of a Grand Lodge. Then, too, it was the one hundred and fiftieth Anniversary of the establishment of the Grand Lodge of England, and the successful formation of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia had been consummated but a few years before.

The movement, of course, began with the members of the subordinate lodges in the City of St. John. On August 16th a meeting of Masters and Past Masters of Lodges of Free and Accepted Masons was held, at which representatives from the different lodges in the city were present. At this meeting a resolution was passed that a circular be issued to all lodges in New Brunswick stating the desirability of holding a convention, to consider the present position of Masonic affairs in this Province, and to take such action thereon as may be deemed necessary.

The convention was called for the second Wednesday in October, and on that date representatives from twenty different lodges in New Brunswick declared themselves, by unanimous resolution, The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick. R. W. Brother R.T. Clinch was unanimously elected Grand Master. He declined the honour, however, as not having resigned the position of District Grand Master under the Grand Lodge of England, he did not feel that he could accept the position.

The more prominent officers who served in the first year were: M. W. B. Lester Peters, Grand Master; R. W. Wm. Wedderburn, Deputy Grand Master; V. W. Wm. F. Bunting, Grand Secretary; W. John V. Ellis, Grand Director of Ceremonies.

To these who gave freely of their time and experience, perhaps more than to any others, are we indebted for the harmonious and successful consummation of the wishes and desires of the Masons in the Province.

Upon the Grand Secretary more than any other individual, of course, fell the burden of the correspondence and details, and the admirable records we have of these early achievements demonstrate in what an efficient manner he performed his duties.

The ceremonial of the installation of the Grand Master, with the dedication and consecration of Grand Lodge, was not observed until the following January.

By the end of the next year twenty-four lodges, having surrendered their charters, were enrolled on the register, and warrants bearing date in the year 1868 were issued to them.

Of those who were present at these early Communications of Grand Lodge all have passed away with the exception of Past Grand Master Wedderburn and Past Grand Master Forbes, who are still with us full of years and honor. One other, W. Brother Christopher Murray, a well known and highly respected Past Master of Albion Lodge in those days, died last August, on the Isle of Wight, where he made his home for many years past.

In the first report of Grand Lodge the membership stood at 1,312, which is about one-third of our present membership. The Craft has grown in numbers and wealth, more than commensurate with the growth of our population, and to us a survey of the past and the growth of our order are encouraging. We take pride in the antiquity of our order, and of our past history in New Brunswick. Proud are we of those Grand Masons who have left us a foundation, a heritage, for greater progress and achievement.

It is for us in beginning the second half century of our existence to re-dedicate our lives to all that is great and good and true, and to realize more fully our responsibilities

as Masons so that we may be found ready and anxious to contribute our part in these strenuous times to our country's welfare and in the amelioration of the community in which we live.

Once more let me emphasize, that more than upon any precept or regulation of Grand Lodge, the future welfare of Freemasonry in our jurisdiction rests with each individual brother in the careful observance of the principles of our order, in the cultivation of true fraternal spirit, in the practice of Masonic charity, and in the constant endeavour by our lives to convince those whom we daily meet, and with whom we associate, that we are the better for being Masons.

Another year of supreme importance and anxiety has passed by. Not for a day or an hour can we be forgetting the sense of the awfulness of the tragedy of this war, which for nearly three years has filled full the pages of the world's history.

By day and in nightly vigils our thoughts are of the tramp of men marching, the breath from breasts heaving, the din and terror of modern warfare but partially realized by us, the wounded, the unnumbered dead, the dreary hospitals of pain, the relentless fury and vandalism of the enemy incomparable with that of any other warfare, and above all of our brave soldiers, and of the call for men and more men. "This war is breaking my heart," said Lord Falkland, of the great Civil War in England, and throughout this vast Empire the sorrow and anguish and overpowering sense of loss in hundreds of thousands of homes is breaking hearts and crushing mature life. But above all and over all there is a calmness, full measure of faith as to the final result. And we as Masons are not losing sight of fundamentals. For truth, for liberty, for justice; against falsehood, against slavery, against injustice, is this war being waged by the Allies, and more than ever are the neutral nations of the earth realizing this.

"There is not a man among us," says England's former premier, "who does not breathe more freely now that the whole English-speaking race is to fight as comrades, side by side, in the most momentous struggle in history." Through the clouds of warfare, by faith, we can perceive what the future has in store. More and more we realize that this war is a struggle of democracy against the power of absolutism, of militarism — that while in the upheaval of events monarch thrones, claimed by divine right, may become as footstools, the ultimate peace will be settled "in the parliament of man, the federation of the world." And at last, through much tribulation, we shall fully realize that "God's in His heaven and all's right with the world."

It is our solemn duty, for a brief space, to meditate upon the uncertainty of human life, to pay our tribute of appreciation and regard for those brethren who have passed away since we last met. For them the brittle thread of life has been severed, their earthly labours are ended and they have left us to join the Celestial Lodge above. May we so employ our time and improve the hours that when the dread summons comes for us, we, too, may be found worthy.

Brother Wm. S. Marven, of Albion Lodge, died on August 8th, in the ninety-fourth year of his age. Brother Marven was made a Master Mason on April 19th, 1849, and was therefore an active Mason for over sixty-eight years, undoubtedly the oldest member of any lodge in New Brunswick. He served as Secretary of Albion Lodge for over twenty-five years and discharged the duties of his office faithfully and conscientiously. He was, also, a regular attendant at the Communications of his lodge for over fifty years, until the infirmities of great age prevented him. On the fiftieth anniversary of his being made a Mason, he was made an honorary member of Albion Lodge

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and was presented with a suitably inscribed gold watch with chain and seal, and at the regular Communication in 1911, Grand Lodge showed its appreciation of his sterling worth and character as a Mason, by conferring upon him the rank of Senior Grand Deacon. A most respected citizen of St. John, he lived to a great age, and died in the hope of a glorious immortality.

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R. W. Brother Andrew McNichol, Past Deputy Grand Master, passed away on February 9th, 1917, aged seventytwo years, after a Masonic career of forty-eight years. Brother McNichol was raised in New Brunswick Lodge in January, 1869, and was elected W. M. of that Lodge in the year 1884. W. Brother McNichol belonged to a well known family of Freemasons in the City of St. John, and no man was a more regular attendant at his own and sister lodges than he, until confined to his home through illness, and none more devoted to the best interests of the Craft. Always present at our Communications he served as Junior Grand Warden in 1895, and was elected Deputy Grand Master in 1908, and for many years he served on the Board of General Purposes. He was buried with Masonic honors by his brethren of New Brunswick Lodge, on February 11th, the services being conducted by the Deputy Grand Master.

Hiram Lodge, No. 6, has suffered indeed much loss in the death of three Past Masters. By the brethren it is felt as a calamity not at present to be estimated, a loss which seems irreparable. To me there is the deep feeling of personal loss of friendship and I know that the same feeling obtains with all the brethren of Hiram Lodge.

W. Brother Matthew Tennant passed away May 6th, 1916, and was buried with Masonic honors. Initiated E. A., November, 1888, passed to the degree of F. C. in December, he was raised a M. M. in January, 1889. He filled various offices until he was elected to preside in the

east in the years 1896-1897, and for the past ten years he filled most satisfactorily the office of Treasurer. During all the period of his Masonic life he was a constant attendant, even when health was failing him. With declining health, however, his interest in the Craft seemed rather to increase as well as his affection for Hiram Lodge. His kindly disposition, his full knowledge of affairs in general, and his unfailing courtesy with the younger members of the Craft, established a tie of friendship between him and the brethren, the severing of which caused deep regret and sorrow.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

W. Brother Fred St. J. Bliss was buried with Masonic honors on the last Sunday of the old year. He was initiated an E. A. May, 1891, passed a F. C. in June and raised a M. M. in July of the same year.

W. Brother Bliss was a man of keen intellectual power. A pupil of the old Collegiate School he graduated with honors from the University of New Brunswick in 1883. He at once began the study of law, and at the time of death was an acknowledged authority in municipal law and taxation, and was the author of several papers in this connection.

Brother Bliss was pre-eminently a man of literary taste and culture. He was a member of the most distinguished literary family that New Brunswick has produced and his knowledge of literary and historical works enabled him to discuss such subjects in a most delightful manner.

From his first years in Lodge he exhibited a keen interest in the ritual and he at once began to make himself master of it. He was elected to preside over the Lodge in the years 1899-1900. During his occupancy of the chair he exhibited a most thorough knowledge of the ritual, a knowledge which came from a genuine appreciation of its beauty, and his recital of the lectures was always made with intelligent appreciation of the subject matter. He filled the office of Junior Grand Deacon in 1900.

Of late years his active interest in the Lodge, through stress of business, was not so great, but his lively interest and appreciation of Masonic ritual remained with him through life.

W. Brother S. H. McKee passed away on February 23rd, after a lingering illness which he bore with true Masonic fortitude. No more enthusiastic Mason lived in New Brunswick than our late brother, and in his death Hiram Lodge has indeed lost a pillar of strength. "How shall we ever get along without him" was the sad comment at his death and since by his brethren.

Brother McKee was made a Mason in old St. Andrew's Lodge, being raised a M. M. November 11th, 1869. He was Master of St. Andrew's Lodge in the year 1877-1878, and during the many years since he was devoted to the interests of the Craft and untiring in his efforts to so keep up the uniform standard of the work in Hiram Lodge. For forty-two successive years he attended the installation ceremony on St. John's Day. Though in his seventy-third year there was nothing in his appearance, speech or action, to denote old age. Truly "Age did not wither nor custom" stale his infinite variety." Not a brother in Hiram Lodge but owes something to Brother McKee, not only for his interest in the Lodge but in each individual brother, and all gratefully acknowledge the debt. His interests, outside of his business and family life, seemed all centered in Freemasonry. Nor did these interests diminish with increasing years, but rather grew stronger, if that could be, and more bright. In his native home, the City of Fredericton, no man was better known or more appreciated as an honorable, upright citizen than our late brother, and the sense of personal loss is a heavy one with my brethren of Hiram Lodge.

Sussex Lodge, No. 7, has lost from its roll of Past Masters W. Brother the Hon. Geo. J. Clarke, LL.D., K.C.,

late Premier of New Brunswick, Past District Deputy Grand Master.

W. Brother Clarke was initiated, crafted and raised in Sussex Lodge in the year 1883, and presided over Sussex Lodge in 1892. Thereafter he continued his active interest in the Lodge and in Masonry, until the press of public business and duties left him little time for such activities.

Born in St. Andrews, he began early in life teaching school in St. Stephen. Studying law in the latter town, he practised his profession there and remained a citizen of St. Stephen for the rest of his life. He served as Mayor as well as in the position of a member of the Board of School Trustees. For a number of years he represented his native county in the Legislative Assembly. He became speaker of the House soon after the election of 1908, and was elevated to the honorable position of Premier of the Province in 1914. W. Brother Clarke was a man of broad human sympathies and kind heart. Instinctively a gentleman, a staunch friend, a pleasing conversationalist and a good speaker, he was a leading spirit not only in his home town but in his native province, and won many friends who mourn sincerely for him. Truly it may be said of him Tristem neminem fecit.

W. Brother Saunders of Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, died nearly a year ago in Calgary. At one time he occupied a very prominent place in the business life of Woodstock. He served a term as Mayor, and for years was an active member of the Board of School Trustees. Soon after occupying the chair of Woodstock Lodge he left Woodstock to engage in business in the west, and for several years was a citizen of Calgary.

Carleton Union, No. 8, has lost two members from its roll of Past Masters — W. Brother E. C. Woodworth and W. Brother Fletcher, Past Grand Chaplain.

Brother Woodworth was one of the oldest members of the Lodge and had not been able to attend its Communi-

cation for several years, although he continued to maintain an active interest in its welfare. W. Brother Fletcher affiliated from St. George's Lodge, and was elected Grand Chaplain in 1908.

Miramichi Lodge, No. 18, mourns the loss of W. Brother John Johnston and W. Brother W. R. Gould.

W. Brother Johnston was Senior Past Master on the roll, and had filled the position of Treasurer of the Lodge for several years. W. Brother Gould was raised a M. M. in 1895, and was an active member of his Lodge until his death. For the last three years he had filled the position of Secretary most acceptably, and was ever anxious to exert his best efforts in behalf of the Craft.

W. Brother Robt. Miller died at the ripe age of seventy-eight years, and was buried in his home town, Bathurst, by his brethren of Lodge St. John with Masonic honors. He received his M. M. degree in Lodge St. John in May, 1870, and from that time until his death he displayed a keen and active interest in the affairs of his mother Lodge, being elected W. M. in the years 1898-1899. Of late the infirmities of age prevented him from attending regular Communications, but though unable to be present he was always anxious to keep in touch with the active interests of the Lodge.

W. Brother Otto B. Moore was made a Master Mason in Lodge St. John, June, 1904, and was elected W. M. of the Lodge in 1907. The following year he assumed the duties, by appointment, of Secretary, which office he filled until his death.

He was a zealous and enthusiastic member of the order, and was ever willing to aid and assist those in distress; possessed, too, of many social qualities. His unswerving fidelity to his mother Lodge and the uniform service he rendered in the discharge of his duties, won for him the regard and esteem of his brethren. As a citizen, also, he

was highly respected by all with whom he came in contact, and the Town of Bathurst, as well as Lodge St. John, deplores the loss of one whom the Supreme Architect saw fit to call from his earthly labours in the midst of his usefulness. He was buried on October 11th, 1916, at Sussex, with Masonic honors, by his brethren of Lodge St. John and those of Zion, No. 21.

The Board of General Purposes, realizing the importance and desirability of preserving in some way a list of the names of all Masons in New Brunswick, who have enlisted for foreign service, passed a resolution directing the Secretary to prepare such a list as an Honour Roll and that this list should eventually be placed in a prominent place in this hall. I feel quite sure that Grand Lodge will heartily approve of this action, that the names of those who have given life, health and enduring service for their country should be permanently preserved.

One of the pleasantest official visits I made during the year was to Bethel Lodge, No. 40, at Edmundston, for the purpose of dedicating and consecrating their new Masonic hall. On June 19th, with R. W. Past Grand Master Whitlock, the Grand Secretary and the Grand Director of Ceremonies, I arrived at Edmundston and was kindly greeted by the brethren, and on that evening the ceremony was performed according to ancient usage. The members of Bethel Lodge deserve much credit for their courage and perseverance. They now have a lodge room suited in every way to their needs. Because of the locality the membership will never be large, but one could not but admire the excellent feeling that prevailed, the pride of the members in their new hall and the keen interest displayed in matters appertaining to the Craft. After the ceremony we witnessed an exemplification of the E. A. degree with W. Brother Stevens in the chair, with which we were much pleased.

The officers of Bethel Lodge are much indebted to R. W. Past Deputy Grand Master Flemming, whose residence is now in Edmundston, for aid in preparation for their work, and they have made the most of his assistance.

The next day we proceeded to Grand Falls and visited Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39. We were welcomed by the W. M. Brother Merritt and the brethren. There was a fair attendance of the members, and I witnessed an exemplification of the E. A. degree, in which the Grand Secretary assisted. Several members of Bethel Lodge, with District Deputy Grand Master Stevens, accompanied us. Colebrooke Lodge suffers from the fact that they have not yet been able to procure a lodge room in which the members can take pride. One cannot but look upon the great natural water power here without thinking of the probability of its becoming the centre of important industrial establishments, and that in the near future. We were much indebted to W. Brother Puddington for his kindness in giving us opportunity in his car to see the beautiful natural scenery from every view point.

Arriving at East Florenceville the following afternoon, we were met by the W. M. of Carleton Lodge, No. 35, Brother Atkinson, who could not do enough for us during our short stay. In the evening we were received by a large body of the Craft, some of whom had come from across the border. It was a pleasure to meet W. Brother Jarvis, the W. M. of Woodstock Lodge, who had come at considerable personal inconvenience. The work of the evening was the conferring of the E. A. degree and the W. M. and officers acquitted themselves most creditably, giving evidence of careful preparation. Carleton Lodge comprises in its membership a large number of prosperous farmers. I counted fifteen motor cars leaving at the close of the evening's entertainment. They possess a well-finished building, free of debt. New furniture, however, and a

carpet are necessary to complete the appearance of the room, but I have no doubt these will soon be forthcoming.

On Sunday, June 25th, Grand Lodge convened in Special Communication for the purpose of attending divine service in St. David's Church, of which our Grand Chaplain, V.W. Brother MacKeigan, is the beloved minister. The day proved all that could be desired, and though St. John on a Sunday in June is a somewhat deserted city, there was a large attendance of the brethren present who listened with great pleasure and attention to an admirable sermon by the Grand Chaplain and to the beautiful singing of the choir. It is pleasing to note here that the custom, a custom of which I entirely approve, of attending service on the Sunday nearest St. John's Day is growing, and a large number of dispensations were issued last June for this reason.

With the Grand Secretary and the Grand Director of Ceremonies I arrived at Petitodiac on July 17th, and visited Steven Lodge, No. 37. The W.M. Brother Bleakney and a fair attendance of members warmly welcomed us. There was no candidate in waiting, and the exemplification of the E. A. degree was the principal work of the evening, the Grand Secretary assisting. The officers have had but little work to do during the year, but this has not deferred them from paying due attention to their duties. W. Brother Goodwin, Past District Deputy Grand Master, who has since moved to Moncton, has been of great assistance in Steven Lodge, and will be much missed.

On the eighteenth to Salisbury, for the purpose of visiting Salisbury, No. 20, where we found W. Brother Taylor in the east. The evening proved very warm, and as the lodge room is upstairs with low ceiling, the heat proved somewhat intense. No work was attempted. After an informal discussion upon matters of interest to members we repaired to the hotel where the brethren had prepared

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a banquet and which it is needless to say was quite in keeping with the traditional hospitality of Salisbury Lodge.

On the next morning we arrived at Hillsborough where the cool breezes from the bay brought a delightful change in the weather. I visited Howard Lodge, No. 15, that evening and found W. Brother J. Steeves presiding in the east with a large attendance of the Craft. Recent improvements in the lodge room have made it not only comfortable but attractive, and one could not but admire the use made of the natural gas, both in lighting and in arrangements for heating as well. An exemplification of the E. A. degree was given by the W. M. and officers who showed that they were exerting their utmost endeavours to master the ritual. Howard Lodge possesses a history. The brethren have recently celebrated their sixty-fifth anniversary, and the brethren are certainly maintaining the best traditions of the order.

On the evening of the twentieth we visited Albert Lodge, No. 34, a goodly number of the brethren from Howard Lodge accompanying us. Here we were received most warmly by W. M. Jones and a good attendance of members. The E. A. degree was again the work of the evening and it was given with care and accuracy. The entertainment, provided by the brethren in their refreshment room, proved most enjoyable, and I left the County of Albert feeling that the order was in good hands and that the future outlook is bright.

On August 30th, accompanied by the Grand Secretary and the Grand Director of Ceremonies, I visited officially Lebanon Lodge, No. 28. We were most cordially welcomed by W. M. Pethick and the brethren. A large number of the Craft from Amherst, N. S., were in attendance, among whom were Past Grand Master Smith and the District Deputy Grand Master for that part of Nova Scotia, and the lodge room was filled to its capacity. The conferring of the third degree was the work of the evening. W. Brother Pethick is a most enthusiastic Mason and his officers ably supported him in the work. After the conferring of the degree the brethren listened with pleasure to Past Grand Master Smith who has always done his best to maintain the true fraternal spirit between the two jurisdictions. I have seldom attended a more enthusiastic gathering of the Craft.

The next evening I visited Tweedie Lodge, No. 41, in Moncton. There was a fair attendance and I was glad to meet once more our good brother Sangster, whose age does not lessen his enthusiasm for Freemasonry. I witnessed the M. M. degree conferred upon a brother by W. Brother Bennett and the officers of the Lodge and was most kindly entertained by them. W. Brother Edgett, the W. M. of Keith Lodge was in attendance, to whom I was much indebted for his kind attention the next day. I regret much that it was not convenient for Sussex Lodge, No. 4, and Lodge St. Andrew, No. 16, to receive an official visit at this time.

On November 23rd, with R. W. Past Grand Master Bridges, the Grand Chaplain, the Grand Secretary and the Grand Director of Ceremonies, I visited officially Sussex Lodge, No. 7, in St. Stephen. The night proved anything but propitious, a heavy rain prevailing. We found, however, a good attendance and were received by W. M. Fraser. The first degree was conferred upon a candidate. and the W. M. and officers of the Lodge carefully and accurately performed their duties. Excellent speeches were made by the Grand Lodge officers and visiting brethren and the entertainment provided by the members in their fine banquet hall was all that could be desired.

The following evening we were joined by R. W. Past Grand Master Whitlock and R. W. Deputy Grand Master Vroom, the W. M. and others from Sussex Lodge, and were

warmly received by W. M. Gray and members of Victoria Lodge, Milltown. There was no candidate in waiting, but the excellent work of W. M. Gray and his officers in the exemplification of the E. A. degree was a pleasure to listen to, and I was particularly interested in the remarks of R. W. Brother Vroom, with reference to the early history of Freemasonry on the St. Croix. From the kind hospitality provided by the brethren of Victoria Lodge we had to hasten away with regret to catch the last car for St. Stephen and I left for home on the morrow, fully confident that the young brethren of the Craft, on the border, are determined to maintain the high traditions of the past, and that there is no danger of any retrogression.

It was my privelige to visit, on December 18th, with the Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies, Brother George D. Ellis, Miramichi Lodge, in Chatham. The weather proved unfavorable, but a large number of brethren were present. The occasion was an unique one in Masonic history in New Brunswick. The work of the evening was the conferring of the Master Mason degree upon the former Lieutenant-Governor, the Hon. L. J. Tweedie, his son, W. Brother Fred M. Tweedie, presiding in the east. The work was worthy of the occasion. The banquet at the Touraine was a fitting ending to an excellent Masonic gathering and the remarks of our new brother were witty and appropriate.

The brethren of Miramichi Lodge expected before this to have a new building erected upon a site which they had procured, but owing to some difficulty arising, action has been deferred until after the war.

I visited officially for the purpose of installing officers for the ensuing year, Hiram Lodge, No. 6, Alexandria, No. 33, and Sunbury, No. 42. I have already alluded to the severe loss that Hiram Lodge has sustained. W. Brother Colwell, the newly elected master, is surrounded

by intelligent officers, and I feel sure they will acquit themselves creditably.

W. Brother Rickard, who now occupies the chair in Alexandria Lodge, has been a member for a number of years and will discharge his duties eanestly and conscientiously, and there is a good deal of work to be done during the year from present prospects.

W. Brother Hailstone is the new master of Sunbury Lodge. He has held office in that Lodge for the past three years, and I have no doubt that he will do his best to discharge his own duties faithfully as well as to encourage the officers to perfect themselves in their several parts of the ritual. I feel that Sunbury Lodge has fully proven the wisdom of Grand Lodge in issuing its charter. There are many discouragements to be met with in the first years of a Lodge's existence, but the brethren are trying well to do their part.

I enjoyed much an unofficial visit to Hibernia Lodge, No. 3, on February 13th last. There was no degree conferred, but the Communication was a most interesting one. Three brethren, W. Bro. T. A. Peters, Brothers Chamberlain and McHarg, having completed fifty years of Masonic life, W. M. Kelley and the brethren of the Lodge presented each with an illuminated address and a Masonic jewel. W. Brother Peters, who was Master of Hibernia many years ago. replied in a happy manner, and his description of those early days of Masonic meetings proved most interesting. The banquet provided by the brethren in honor of the occasion was most enjoyable and was attended by representatives of different lodges in St. John.

With R. W. Past Grand Master Walker, the Grand Director of Ceremonies, the Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies, and W. Brother Alex. Boyd, I visited Ashlar Lodge at McAdam on the evening of February 15th. We were received by W. Brother Piercy, who was occupying

the chair for a second term. The M. M. degree was conferred upon a brother with uniform impressiveness, reflecting much credit upon the W. M. and officers. There was a good attendance of the brethren, but we missed much our esteemed W. Brother J. W. Hoyt, who has been, since its formation, one of the pillars of Ashlar Lodge. All who know our brother must indeed regret that, owing to ill health, he is no longer able to attend the regular Communications of his Lodge.

With a full attendance of Grand Lodge officers I was privileged to visit St. John's Lodge, No. 2, on the evening of April 3rd, and was welcomed by W. M. Mowatt and the brethren. St. John's Lodge possesses a history extending back to 1802, and maintains its pristine vigor, standing second as far as numbers of members is concerned. The F. C. degree was conferred upon three candidates, with an ease and impressiveness not often equalled, and it is to be regretted that owing to the very stormy night there was not a large attendance to lend encouragement to the officers by their presence.

In reporting somewhat fully upon my official visits to subordinate lodges in the jurisdiction, I would like to say that I have this year more than ever been impressed with the large number of young men in office who are earnestly striving to master the ritual and who are neglecting no opportunity to gain assistance. I know, too, that all must agree that the hope and the future of freemasonry with us, as far as accuracy and uniformity of ritual is concerned, depend largely on the exertions of these young officers in this direction, and their intelligent interpretation of the ritual by impressive delivery in the lodge room.

On November 11th, as I had accepted the unanimous invitation of the Chairman and Board of School Trustees to lay the corner stone of the new school building on Bentley Street, St. John, Grand Lodge officers and members of the

Craft were convened in the Temple of Honour Hall, Main Street, and a procession having been formed by the Grand Director of Ceremonies, proceeded to Bentley Street, headed by the band of the 165th Battalion, where the Board of School Trustees joined the procession to the site of the new building. I have here appended my address to the Chairman and Board upon that occasion.

"Mr. Chairman and Members of the Board of School Trustees of the City of St. John:

From time immemorial it has been the custom of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of F. and A. M., when requested to do so, to lay the corner stone of buildings erected for the worship of God, for charitable objects, for the purposes of the administration of justice and free government and for important public industries. These objects, comprising the best interests of mankind in the arts, sciences, education and the industries which tend to make men better citizens, are of the noble purposes of Freemasonry and may well demand the assistance of our ceremonials upon such occasions.

And first then, because your Board has unanimously requested me to lay this corner stone, I, as Grand Master, accompanied by the officers and members of Grand Lodge of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of F. and A. M. of New Brunswick, have much pleasure in attending here this afternoon for the purpose of taking charge of these proceedings. And I wish to assure you, sir, of the cordial and hearty sympathy of the members of the Craft manifested in this large number of Masons here assembled, as well as of the sincere and earnest desire that your undertaking begun here may prove eminently satisfactory and successful.

As one who is not a resident of St. John, I may be permitted to say a word more. The record of the Board

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of School Trustees of the City of St. John has been indeed an honorable one. The activity, sound judgment and discretion shown by its members upon the inception of our school system, as well as after the deplorable fire which devastated this city, is a matter of civic history. The past is secure. The zeal and energy of your Board, displayed in the last fifteen years or more, have resulted in the erection of numerous buildings so that with the completion of this, the educational interests of your city will be served with a complement of building accommodation, of equipment and apparatus, and more important than all, of teaching power and skill, all of which, I feel confident in saying, are not surpassed by those of any city of like population in the Dominion of Canada. Confident therefore. in this present, you may look forward hopefully to the future.

And now we may, therefore, lay this corner stone according to ancient custom, and I have, at your hands, Mr. Chairman, much pleasure and special satisfaction in accepting this trowel to be used on this occasion. To us as members of the Fraternity it is the emblem of brotherly love and affection which unites us into one band or society of brothers and fellows among whom no contention should ever exist, save that noble contention, or rather emulation. of who can best work and best agree. And I sincerely and devoutly trust that these noble sentiments by this trowel symbolized may be largely exemplified in the erection of this building; exemplified, too, in the conduct and actions of that young life which in the days to come will upon this foundation receive its elementary education; that time in the future as in the past, will work out for you much success and much good."

With the assistance of the Deputy Grand Master, the Senior Grand Warden, R. W. Brother D. C. Clark as Junior Grand Warden, and the Grand Chaplain, I laid the corner stone according to the rites of the Ancient Craft, R. W. Past Grand Master Walker delivering the Ancient Proclamation.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

The reports of the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer and that of the Board of General Purposes, which will be placed before you in due course, will prove interesting reading. While the increase in membership is not as large as last year, it is gratifying to note that there is an actual increase and that our finances are in a sound condition. The number of dispensations issued by me will be noted in the report of the Grand Secretary, and these have been issued for similar reasons to those of last year.

The report of the Chairman of the Hall Committee is also one in which Grand Lodge is much interested. The assuming, by Grand Lodge, of full control and ownership of the Masonic Hall has thrown, of course, a burden of work and responsibility which has been cheerfully assumed by your Committee, and the Chairman from his personal knowledge and experience in this connection is admirably fitted for the position. Last year repairs essentially necessarv were made upon the building, and further improvements are demanded before we can expect to receive much increase in income from rentals. These improvements will be completed just as soon as your Committee deem the means at their disposal adequate.

One cannot but be struck with the large number of Masons that are lost to us as far as active support is concerned, from year to year, by withdrawals and suspensions. While I have no suggestion to make it is certainly a matter deserving the attention of Grand Lodge as well as of the different subordinate lodges. Perhaps too much responsibility is placed upon the Secretary of the Lodge, and he may lack the assistance of the officers and members in helping to keep up the roll of membership.

These brethren are still nominally Masons, but it is more than a financial loss that is actually sustained by so many names being dropped from the roll, there is loss of hearty support and cordial sympathy and fellowship as well.

My attention has been called to the fact that many brethren are not always careful to answer, in person, the summons to attend Masonic funerals. Our brethren upon whom may rest the infirmities of years may well be excused, particularly when weather conditions are unfavourable, but it certainly is not becoming in Masons to attend funerals in the ordinary procession, when the funeral ceremony is in charge of their Lodge at the request of the deceased brother.

It is surely a subject for mutual congratulation that our Fund of Benevolence has increased uniformly year by year, so that with recent additions it amounts to almost \$17,000. When the improvements suggested in our Masonic Hall are completed the increase from rentals will also help to augment this Fund annually. Our late Past Grand Master Ellis, in a report of many years ago, points out very clearly the duty of Grand Lodge in this respect. "The establishment of the Fund itself is a duty, the performance of which we ought no longer to postpone." It is pleasing to note that the suggestion made many years ago has been in a measure carried out.

Since January a Lodge of Instruction, under a dispensation, has been conducted by R.W. Past Grand Master Walker for the benefit of lodges in St. John. I have not been able to attend personally, but the attendance is reported good, and I have no doubt that many are receiving benefits from it. Through these many years Past Grand Master Walker's efforts have been untiring in aiding and assisting others to master the ritual, and few indeed are there of us who have not received benefit, either directly or indirectly, from his exertions.

In laying down the gavel, the emblem of authority, which you confided in me nearly three years ago, I wish once more to express my appreciation and gratitude for the honor you have done me in three times unanimously electing me your Grand Master. This honor I shall not cease to appreciate while life lasts. I trust I have in some measure realized my duties and responsibilities and my own shortcomings in the discharge of these duties. I have tried to do so to the best of my ability and have striven to impress upon the brethren that a spirit of kindness and forbearance should influence all their dealings with one another. Whatever errors I have committed (and to err is human) I have to ask you to cover with "the broad mantle of Masonic charity."

These years have been years of special pleasure as well as responsibility, however. I cannot forget in the years to come the courtesy, the hospitality, which are traditional with the Order, and the kindly greetings that have been extended to me as I have gone over the Province. While the opportunities of meeting so many of the brethren and the unfailing kindness shown me will remain with me as pleasant memories, it is pleasant to know, also, that they will be extended to my successor in office as well.

Of the future of Freemasonry with us there can be no doubt. It is ours to be men of hope and trust. When the day dawned for us which found the whole English-speaking people united in sentiment and action in carrying on this war to a successful conclusion, to the hope and trust and courage that was ours, we added greater courage and thanked God. For among these two great nations are nearly three millions of men who are Masons, whose principles are vitally contained in the successful issues of this titanic struggle for truth and freedom.

The world cannot, will not be, the same after this war is over, nor will the British Empire be as it was before the fateful August, 1914. Over eighty years ago the poet

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Wordsworth said to Emerson that what the United States needed was a great war to cement it into a united people. And the war came. It may have been that our beloved Empire needed this war. Had we formerly any misgivings concerning the solidarity of the British Empire? They have surely left us. The mystic chords, the bonds of affection, strong as iron, stretching from hundreds of thousands of homes from every part of this vast Empire to the graves of the beloved dead in Flanders, in France, and in the battlefields of the east, will surely unite the different parts of this nation, "which like a brave ship with torn sheets and battered sides has ridden out the storm," into one great united people, so that in the future more than in the past our prayer will be, "Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet; lest we forget, lest we forget."

Over the plains and valleys of Syria and Mesopotamia have roamed for centuries the Bedouin of the desert, most untruthful of mankind. But when even he wished to impress upon his hearers that there was a grain of truth in his statements, his oath was, "By the English word, by the British faith, what I say unto you, I swear is truth."

Over these valleys today are the brave British soldiers sweeping unto victory, carrying truth and liberty and justice, principles dear to every Mason's heart, there where over 2,400 years ago, by the willow fringed rivers of Babylon wrote Esdras, "As for truth, it endureth and is ever strong, it liveth and conquereth for evermore."

And now, in our deliberations and labours of this Annual Communication of Grand Lodge may the Supreme Architect of the Universe continue to have us in His holy keeping.

"That the report of the Grand Secretary be taken from the table and printed in the Proceedings of the year."

A New Edition of the Constitutions of Grand Lodge has just been received from the printers, and copies are therefore, again available to meet the needs of the Subordinate Lodges.

The Funeral Service has also been reprinted in a more convenient form.

R. W. Brother F. J. G. Knowlton, P. G. M., submitted the reports of the Managing Committee of the Masonic Hall, of the Grand Treasurer, and of the Audit Committee. These reports had already been presented at the annual meeting of "The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation" and had severally been adopted.

Moved by R. W. Brother Henry S. Bridges, Ph. D., P. G. M., seconded by R. W. Brother A. R. Campbell, D. G. M.,

"That these reports as adopted by "The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation" be now confirmed by Grand Lodge and the recommendations approved of.—Carried.

REPORT OF HALL COMMITTEE.

To the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation:

The Managing Committee of the Masonic Hall beg to submit the following report:

No construction work of any importance has been completed during the year, as, although your Committee is most desirous of carrying out your instructions relative to the improvements in the stores owned by your Corporation, the difficulty in obtaining labor and material has caused the matter up to the present to be held in abeyance.

It is to be hoped, however, that during the coming summer the congestion will have so far relaxed as to allow the work to be proceeded with.

All minor repairs of a very inexpensive nature in the way of carpenter work, painting, etc., necessary to keep the Corporation's property in proper condition have been carried out.

Agreeably to the intention intimated in our last report certain advances have been made in the rentals of the Corporation's stores which will result in an increased revenue for the year ending April 30th, 1918, of \$235.

As a result of the installation of the proposed heating apparatus in these stores it will of course be necessary to again increase these rentals, so as to provide a fair return for the investment.

Your Committee has also entered into an arrangement with the Scottish Rite bodies, now occupying apartments in the building, to complete certain improvements in these in the way of installing heating and lighting systems as well as doing some necessary carpenter work and painting, your Committee also agreeing to maintain the rooms.

This work will occasion an increase in the rental of \$350, which amount we feel should afford an adequate return.

For similar reasons to those mentioned above this work has only been partially completed. Your Committee recognizes the supreme importance of securing the largest possible amount of revenue from the Corporation's property and to that end find it necessary to apply the strictest business principles to its management.

Negotiations with the Mystic Shrine, in regard to the taking over, improving and maintaining the rooms now under lease to them, have thus far failed to come to a head.

At the last Annual Communication of Grand Lodge the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation was requested to erect in the Masonic Temple, a Mural Tablet, to contain the names of all the members of the craft in this jurisdiction who have enlisted and proceeded overseas in defence of the Empire.

This duty has been pushed forward as rapidly as possible by your Committee, but as the returns required from the various lodges interested are as yet incomplete the work can hardly be said as yet to be shaping to a finish.

As soon, however, as the necessary information is forthcoming to secure accuracy in the inscription, further efforts will be made to carry out your instructions.

In further accordance with your directions a permanent janitor has been employed at a yearly salary of \$365, which arrangement would seem to possess some advantages.

The Hall Committee would further suggest that the incoming Committee be empowered to carry to completion the several matters outlined above.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

TUESDAY EVENING.

April 24th, 1917.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at 8.30 o'clock, the M. W. Grand Master in the East.

Grand Lodge proceeded to the order of the day, the election of Grand Officers.

The Sections of the Constitutions governing elections were read.

The M. W. Grand Master appointed as scrutineers, R. W. Brother George B. Hegan and Worshipful Brothers Henry S. Campbell, Frank T. Atkinson and John F. Edgett, and they were solemnly pledged to the faithful performance of their duty.

After written nomination and ballot taken in each case, the scrutineers reported that the following Brethren had, in each instance, received a majority of the votes cast. They were accordingly declared elected to their respective offices.

W. Brother Robert Clerke, on open vote, was re-elected Grand Tyler.

The Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address presented the following report.

REPORT ON THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The Committee to whom was referred the address of the M. W. Grand Master note with interest the remarks of the eloquent speaker in reference to the fiftieth annual communication, and to the history of the Grand Lodge for the last fifty years. He has given us valuable information, which will be acceptable to the Craft throughout the province. His praise of the good work of the Brethren of that day will find an echo in every Lodge. This may bring to our minds the words:

"God be praised that the dead have left still Good undone for the living to do."

Grand Lodge will join with the M. W. Grand Master in the hope that the younger members of the Fraternity will carry on the work with zeal. Your Committee would recommend that the Board of General Purposes be authorized to take some steps for the fitting observance of the fiftieth anniversary of the formation of this Grand Lodge.

The long list of distinguished Brethren who have passed from their earthly labors during the past year remind us of the uncertainty of life, and we join with him in deploring their loss.

The Grand Master's report of his visitations proves his fidelity to this important duty, and assures us of the prosperity of the Craft throughout the jurisdiction. The unanimous invitation of the Board of School Trustees of the City of St. John for the Grand Master to lay the corner stone of King George's School, on Bentley Street, is worthy of note; as is also the courtesy of the band of the 165th Battalion on that occasion.

The Committee hope that the Lodge of instruction to which reference is made by the M. W. Grand Master will be continued, and that Brethren who have occasion to visit the city will attend its meetings as often as possible. The Craft is much indebted to R. W. Brother Walker for the untiring interest he has taken in the matter.

True it is, as the M. W. Grand Master reminds us, that the world will not be the same after this great war is over; and we may well believe that our Empire will find strength and unity in the stern discipline of this time of testing. Our beloved Fraternity also is being sorely tried, and we earnestly pray may come through the trial purified as by fire.

W. Brother James H. Hawthorne, Grand Director of Ceremonies, presented his Commission as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of California, near this Grand Lodge. The Commission bore the signatures of Francis V. Keesling, Grand Master, and John Whicher, Grand Secretary.

The Worshipful Brother was conducted to the East and welcomed by the Grand Master amid applause and was saluted with the Grand Honours.

The following report was presented and having been read, a motion, duly seconded,

"That the report be adopted" was, after discussion, declared carried.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

The Board of General Purposes has, it may be premised, but little to bring to the attention of Grand Lodge, inasmuch as the general affairs of Grand Lodge are now so largely dealt with in the reports presented to the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation and by it referred to Grand Lodge.

It is but right, though, that Grand Lodge should be reminded that the administration of the Fund of Benevolence is each year, placed with a Committee of the Board consisting of the M. W. Grand Master and two other members. It will be noted that the grants made from the Fund this past year amounted to \$488.00, that the Income of the Fund was \$764.46, and that its assets at this date are \$16,976.65.

The Board has had before it an application for assistance from Lodge Saint John, No. 27, Bathurst, setting forth in detail the expenditure which the Lodge has met in the erection of a new Lodge room to replace the former one destroyed by fire. The brethren of the Lodge deserve the utmost credit for the energy they have displayed, and the Board recommends that Grand Lodge do now authorize a grant of Two Hundred Dollars to assist them in the procuring of new paraphernalia.

A special meeting of the Board was held to-day at which the M. W. Grand Master submitted copies of correspondence between Campbellton Lodge No. 32, and Saint John's Lodge, No. 2, and of a resolution passed by Campbellton Lodge and transmitted to the Grand Secretary, complaining of what had taken place. The case was that a young man, up to that time a resident of Campbellton, had gone to St. John and enrolled in a military unit then stationed there. While on duty with this unit, awaiting overseas orders, he made application to St. John's Lodge, was accepted and received the three degrees.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Learning of this action, Campbellton Lodge demanded an explanation and the letter, with one from the Secretary of St. John's Lodge, was submitted to the Grand Master, who in his reply expressed the view, "That men who have enlisted for Foreign Service should be afforded every opportunity to become Masons before leaving Canada," and that their position might well be regarded as analogous to that of "sea-faring men" under Section 2 of "proposing members," and be governed by the same principle. It was unanimously resolved, "That the M. W. Grand Master's view of the spirit of the Constitution applicable to this case is one which the Board deems it improper for it to revise." Furthermore, the members of the Board were all of the opinion that, under the circumstances of the case, residence at Campbellton had ceased, and that consequently, the Lodge there no longer had jurisdiction.

W. Brother A. C. Grant of Saint George Lodge, No. 12, stated that it was the intention of the Lodge, to erect a new Lodge Building at an early date, and he asked, on behalf of the Lodge, that some financial assistance be granted, by Grand Lodge, towards the cost of construction.

On motion of R. W. Brother J. T. Whitlock, P. G. M., seconded by the V. W. Grand Treasurer it was ordered,

"That the application be referred to the Board of General Purposes with power to act."

On the motion of R. W. Alexander R. Campbell, D. G. M., the sum of Four Hundred Dollars was voted to the M. W. Grand Master to meet expenses of visits of instruction to the Subordinate Lodges during the coming year.

The usual grant of Thirty Dollars was also made to the Library Committee.

The M. W. Grand Master announced that as the Grand Master elect was at present away from the Province and was not to return for some days an emergent Communication would have to be summoned for the installation of officers. Grand Lodge would not, therefore, re-assemble to-morrow afternoon.

Grand Lodge was then closed in ample form at the hour of 10.30 of the clock.

The R. W. Deputy Grand Master, after referring to the special business for which the Communication had been called, stated that the M. W. Grand Master much regretted that his professional duties precluded him from attending. At the Deputy Grand Master's request R. W. Brother Thomas Walker, M. D., P. G. M., took the East.

The Grand Master elect, Right Worshipful Brother Daniel Clifford Clark, was duly obligated, invested and installed by Past Grand Master Walker and proclaimed "Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick," and was thereupon saluted as such by the Brethren present.

The Grand Master then delivered the following Address:

R.W. Senior Grand Warden and Brethren:

I wish at this time to thank you for the confidence you have had in me, by placing me at the head of the Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick. And I trust that you may never have cause to regret your action.

Freemasonry has always been dear to my heart and I have received much benefit from its teachings and I have tried, in my humble way, to further its best interests, but I never dared to hope that I would hold the exalted position of Grand Master.

The honor you have conferred upon me seems greater inasmuch as I was absent from the province when I was elected, and I think never before in the history of this Grand Lodge has a Brother been elected to the Grand East in his absence from Grand Lodge. Therefore, I appreciate the honour more than I can tell you.

I am especially pleased to hold the office of Grand Master this year, as it is the fiftieth anniversary of the

organization of Grand Lodge, and I would be glad to receive suggestions from any of the Past Grand Officers or any of the brethren, as to how we might fittingly observe our semi-centennial.

I know that a feeling of sadness must pervade each of us at this time as we think of those whom we have met in our different lodges, those with whom we have fraternized and with whom we have exchanged those friendly and brotherly tokens, but whom we will never meet again on earth, they having made the supreme sacrifice in defence of our beloved Empire, of our mothers, wives, daughters, and ourselves, who have been unable to go overseas to engage in the greatest war the world has ever known. And while we mourn the loss of their immediate presence, counsel and friendship, we are consoled by feeling that they. are in heaven with their everlasting Father, the Great Architect, the Ruler of the Universe, and we extend our sympathy and consolation to their families, relatives and friends. I trust that those who remain at home will continue to support those who are overseas fighting for us, both with our money and our prayers, that the Great Architect of the Universe may spare the lives of our Brethren and return them in safety to their homes and loved ones, and that He may speak those magic words "Peace, Be Still," and bring this cruel war to a speedy and honourable close.

Our actions as Masons are critically watched by the public in general, and we must ever be guarded in our thoughts, words and deeds, so that by our conduct the tenets, precepts and teaching of Freemasonry may be publicly exemplified.

Freemasonry has a sure foundation only as we look for guidance to our Almighty and Eternal God. Let us therefore look to Him for wisdom and strength to enable us to carry out His will with freedom, fervency and zeal.

Good floor work and close attention to the ritual when working the degrees add much to the attractiveness of our Lodge meetings. And, as official visits by the members of Grand Lodge tend to stimulate the officers and members of private lodges to better endeavours in getting up the work, it is my intention to make such visits as frequent as possible, and I shall look to you for the co-operation which I know will be as cheerfully given as it has in the past.

And now Brethren in closing, let me again thank you for the honour conferred on me and let me assure you that my best efforts will be put forward to follow the high example set by my predecessors, and that with your cooperation, I will strive to improve such standards of excellence as may be found possible.

I am very grateful to Past Grand Master Walker for so effectively presiding over my installation and to you, Brethren, for your attendance here this afternoon.

SERMON

Delivered by V.W. the Ven. Archdeacon Crowfoot, Grand Chaplain, on the afternoon of Saint John's Day, Sunday, June 24th, 1917, at Saint Paul's (Valley) Church.

Prov. 3:6. "In all thy ways acknowledge Him and He shall direct thy paths."

There are only two great realities in life — God and man. Every error in history, every life that has come to grief, every dynasty that has fallen from its high degree, every kingdom that has had to forfeit the reigns of power, can trace its fall to a failure to harmonize aright these two great realities.

And since so much depends upon the right relation of God and man, it has been the aim of all philosophy, and the goal of all intellectual endeavour to discover the happy mean wherein this right relationship consists.

Time would fail us were we to attempt to describe these various endeavours. But we may be permitted to allude to two attempts which we select, not because they have solved the problem, but because their failure to do so points the direction in which the solution lies. There is for instance the cult of the goddess of pleasure, a cult which is very ardently persued by many men today. It is a goddess which is but an incarnation of a man's own self, and it is an attempt to solve the problem we have alluded to by omitting the other great factor — God. There are other forms of this worship of self which are to be found among men, and masons today. There is the cult of power, which is ardently persued by not a few who are

prominent in the world of business and of politics. Here again, God is, if not ignored at least made subservient to the idol of self, and as a solution of the great problem of life the attempt breaks down.

There is on the other hand the ascetic ideal, which, if it does not ignore God, holds such a perverted idea of Him that it leads its devotees to ignore man entirely, and holds that the human body is a foe, to be lacerated on a bed of nails, or rendered useless by being paralysed into some horrible contortion. But these are heresies more or less confined to oriental countries, and are not dangers which are very likely to beset the average hard-headed westerner.

But as there is a fragment of truth in every heresy, so there is perhaps enough of the true light in these various false teachings to indicate the lines of the true solution, and I contend that in the principles of Christianity we find the one and only true solution of the problem of the right relationship which God and man ought to bear to one another. And that I may the firmer establish the truth of my contention I invite you to consider with me three great fundamentals which underlie the Christian faith, that you may see in what way Christianity claims to solve the problem of the ages.

But before I proceed to state these fundamentals permit me to say that you, as speculative masons, will not be slow to recognize in them the most excellent tenets of our institution. This is not the place to discuss the difference between masonry and Christianity. To the devout Christian who is also a regular and upright mason there is no difference to discuss, for he knows that nothing in masonry is antagonistic to all that is best and noblest in the Christian religion.

First then Christianity places the supremacy of God.

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She seems to say to her children in the words of our text "In all thy ways acknowledge Him." Echoing the words of the old Jewish law-giver she says "Thou shalt have none other gods beside Me." It is with faith in this God that she leads her children onward, step by step, knowing that with such a faith they need fear no danger. And I need not remind you brethren of the very prominent position which faith (in the Supreme Architect of the Universe) holds in masonry. There was never a more baseless charge fulminated against our ancient fraternity than that its members were atheists and libertines.

It is because Christianity lays this great emphasis on the existence of God, "Believing where she cannot prove" that she holds that man, made in God's image, and after His likeness is to be God's co-operator. Mindful of the words of her Founder "My Father worketh hitherto and I work," she has ever made it her aim to bring up her members in the belief that they are one and all to be workers. To what extent this is realized by the average Christian I leave it to you brethren to decide. But I cannot help feeling that too many professed Christians seem to confine their work to a maximum amount of criticism, and a minimum amount of cash. Yet this only serves to show how very imperfectly the average Christian realizes "his obligation."

As with Christianity, so with masonry, every brother is made to feel that he is a worker. The fact that we are speculative and not operative masons must not blind us to the fact that there is an abundance of work for every mason to do, and work which we alone can do. We recall the priceless monuments of antiquity which our operative forefathers reared, the beauty of the medieval cathedrals, the stability of the castles, the gracefulness of the campaniles, and the dignity of the guild halls, and we see in

them a symbol of the great work which lies before the heirs of those old masons, in the framing of brotherhood, laid upon the foundation of faith, and cemented with the clay of affection. Pardon me for venturing to recall these well known ideals, I do so to remind you brethren that masonry has work for every brother, and must tolerate no drones in her hive. Let it be the ideal of every mason to be a worker in his lodge and not allow the burden of the work to fall on the shoulders of but one or two, as is too often the case at present.

And yet sometimes it is not entirely the individual who is to blame. There are in some lodges, even as there are in some congregations of Christians, brethren who have so forgotten the principles of true brotherhood as to imagine that they must assert themselves, and push forward their own authority, to the detriment of unity, and to the extermination of all true fraternity. Christianity and masonry both teach that the road to salvation lies through the denial of self. He who would save his life must lose it, and he who would think only of himself will not find himself among the number of the elect at the last great reckoning. The sad history of Christian divisions bears eloquent witness to the disaster of overlooking this necessity for self suppression, and it must ever be reckoned one of the chief glories of the Craft that it has by upholding the ideal of brotherhood checked that growth of individualism which is at once the peril of society, and the cause of the downfall of states.

The supremacy of God, the brotherhood of man and the self-sacrifice of the individual, these are the fundamentals of Christianity, and the glories of free masonry. And as we look back over the wonderful way in which God has watched over our Craft through all the centuries of its history, we cannot but feel that here, if anywhere, is vindi-

cation of the truth, and of the necessity to the world of those principles which, as Masons, we hold dear.

Nor is it only in the past that we find a vindication of these great principles for which we stand. The crisis of the present corroborates in a wonderful way the verdict of the past. This terrible war which seems to have brought the whole history of the world to a standstill would never have happened had the world as a whole, and the separate nations in particular, remembered the counsel of our text and in all their ways acknowledged God. No patriotic citizen of the British Empire will wish for one moment to throw the whole blame in this respect on to the side of his opponent. He will be the first to acknowledge that there was fault on both sides. He will not attempt to deny that religion was very lightly regarded in the years before the war. Men were far too intent on the cult of self. whether it be in the forms of pleasure or of power, to have much room for thought of God. And in that love for the brethren which is inseparable from love for God, both England and Germany had lamentably fallen short. The policy of pan-Germanism regarded the other nations as inferior, and only meant to minister to the supermen of Culture. While England pursued her policy of splendid isolation equally forgetting the claims of the brotherhood of man.

And as a result there has come war, a terrible warning of the danger of forgetting God.

It sounds at first sight almost paradoxical to say that the war has emphasized the brotherhood of man. But it is undeniable that it is a touch which has "made the whole world kin." We feel that the whole world is smaller, England and France seem as near as the United States, and the United States itself, since she came into the war, never seemed quite so close to us. We feel sure now that

we are brothers, of the same blood, fighting for the same democratic ideals. What a vindication it is of the masonic tenet of brotherhood.

There is no need for me to say much of the way in which the war has popularized and made us familiar with the essence of self-sacrifice. Lives which we always thought useless and good for nothing have blossomed into the richest flowers of heroism and have been laid down at the foot of the Crucified who died that we might live. "Greater love hath no man than this that a man lay down his life for his friends." And with the opportunity has come a tasting of the joy of sacrifice. Letters from the trenches are full of radiant happiness. "I never felt so happy in my life," writes one, "I was never so taken out of myself." And for us at home it is:

To steel our souls against the lust of ease;
To find our welfare in the general good
To hold together, merging all degrees
In one wide brotherhood.

To teach that he who saves himself is lost;
To bear in silence though our hearts may bleed;
To spend ourselves and never count the cost
For others greater need.

To go our quiet ways, subdued and sane; To hush all vulgar clamour of the street; With level calm to face alike the shame Of triumph or defeat.

- Sir Owen Seaman.

Yes, and to the Mason, as to the Christian, there is nothing new, or even hard in this call to deny self. To the

a grander task for any brotherhood? Could God give the brethren any nobler employment.

But remember the honour of the Craft rests upon every single mason. And the extent to which this glorious opportunity is embraced depends upon the amount of effort which each brother will make. One brother's inconsistent life can bring discredit on the whole Craft, one brother's good deeds reflect glory on all his brethren. It is therefore in full consciousness of the great opportunity which the future holds for the Craft that I say to every single brother here present.
