The Right Worshipful, Very Worshipful and Worshipful Officers and Past Officers of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick; And the Worshipful Masters, Past Masters and Present Wardens of all Lodges within the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge;

Are hereby summoned to attend an Emergent Communication to be holden at Freemasons Hall, in the City of Saint John, on Tuesday, the Twenty-Second day of January instant, at 7.30 o'clock in the Evening.

This Communication will be in Celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the formation of Grand Lodge, which took place on Tuesday, January 22nd, 1868. Grand Lodge and the Brethen, at 7.45, will go in procession to Trinity Church for Special Divine Service, to be conducted by the V:W: Grand Chaplain. On conclusion of the Service, the Craft will return to Freemasons Hall, when Grand Lodge will be opened and the arranged for proceedings carried out.

In response to the aforegoing Proclamation, a large gathering of the officers and members of Grand Lodge, and of the Brethren generally, assembled at Freemasons' Hall in the City of Saint John, on the evening of Tuesday, January 22nd, 1918, and having been marshalled by the W. Grand Director of Ceremonies, went in procession to Trinity Church, at the hour of eight o'clock. The Grand Master, supported by the Grand Deacons, was accompanied by M. W. Brother Donald F. Fraser, Grand Master of Nova Scotia and his Deputy R.W. Brother Wm. H. Smith, by M. W. Brother Benjamin Rogers, Grand Master of Prince Edward Island, and by the R.W. Deputy Grand Master.

The special service arranged for the occasion, and of which copies in full had been beautifully printed, was then proceeded with. The clergy who took part were the V.W. and Ven. Archdeacon Crowfoot, Grand Chaplain, and the following Past Grand Chaplains, V. W. Rev. Canon R. A. Armstrong, Rector of Trinity Church, V. W. Rev. Canon Allan W. Smithers, V. W. Rev. W. H. Sampson and V. W. Rev. G. Fred Scovil. The musical portions of the service were most effectively rendered by a choir, generous in its numbers, under the conduct of Mr. James S. Ford, Organist of Trinity Church.

The preacher was the V. W. the Grand Chaplain.

V. W. BRO. THE REV. G. FREDERICK SCOVIL, PAST GRAND CHAPLAIN, then invoked the Blessing of Heaven as follows:

LMIGHTY and Eternal God, Architect and Ruler of A the Universe, at Whose creative flat all things first were made, we, the frail creatures of Thy providence, humbly implore Thee to pour down upon this convocation, assembled in Thy Holy Name, the continual dew of Thy blessing. We beseech Thee to hear us, good Lord.

For those who fight; that Thou wouldst give them protection and true courage in danger, and crown their warfare with victory;

We beseech Thee to hear us, good Lord.

For those who suffer — the wounded, the sick, and the dying; the prisoners, the anxious, and the mourners; that Thou wouldst be with them to support and comfort them;

We beseech Thee to hear us, good Lord.

For those who are gone forth to minister to the suffering, to their souls and bodies; that Thou wouldst grant them endurance and patient watching, with skill and gentleness, to the healing of pain and sorrow;

We beseech Thee to hear us, good Lord.

For those also, O Lord, the humble beasts, who with us bear the burden and heat of the day, and offer their guileless lives for the well-being of their countries, we ask Thy pity; for Thou hast promised to save both man and beast, and great is Thy loving-kindness, O God, Creator of the world;

We beseech Thee to hear us, good Lord.

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For all who die, in battle or through sickness, in this war: that Thou wouldst receive their souls into Thy Holy keeping, and grant unto them a merciful judgment at the last day:

We beseech Thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please Thee to give and preserve to our use the fruits of the earth in due season, and to save our land from famine, pestilence, and sword;

We beseech Thee to hear us, good Lord.

That Thou wouldst be mindful of all those in battle or in strife, and of all that beseech Thy great tenderness of heart those who love us, those whom we love, and all who have enjoined us, unworthy as we are, to pray for them:

We beseech Thee to hear us, good Lord.

OUR FATHER Which art in heaven, hallowed be Thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. LMIGHTY AND EVERLASTING GOD, we are taught A by Thy Holy Word that the hearts of men are in Thy Rule and Governance and that Thou dost dispose and turn them as it seemeth best to Thy godly wisdom: we beseech Thee so to dispose and govern the hearts of ourselves and all our brethren that we may learn to appreciate the value of Freemasonry. Plant deep within us a genuine desire to be more extensively serviceable to our fellow-creatures. Especially we implore Thee to youchsafe Thy continual help and guidance to us in this time of stress and trial, and grant that, by discharging our duties towards Thee with fervency and zeal, we may so keep bright and undimmed the principles of our Order that, when it shall please Thee to bring us through victory to a just and lasting peace, we may be found worthy to offer Thee as an acceptable service the aid of Freemasonry, to unite the nations of the world in a firmer fellowship and brotherhood for the promotion of Thy glory and the good of all mankind.

So mote it be.

ETERNAL LORD GOD, Who alone spreadest out the heavens and rulest the raging of the sea: Who hast compassed the waters with bounds until day and night come to an end: be pleased to receive into Thy Almighty and most gracious protection the persons of our sailors and soldiers and the fleets and armies in which they serve. Preserve them from the dangers of the sea and of the air, and from the violence of the enemy: that they may be a safeguard unto our Most Gracious Sovereign Lord. King George, and his Dominions, and a security for such as pass on the seas and land upon their lawful occasions: that the inhabitants of our Empire may in peace and quietness serve Thee, our God: and that they may return in safety to enjoy the blessings of the land, with the fruits of their labours, and with a thankful remembrance of Thy mercies to praise and glorify Thy Holy Name.

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OOK, we beseech Thee, O Lord, upon the people of , this land and grant that in this time of anxiety and distress they may walk worthy of their profession. Grant unto us all that we may remain united in one heart and mind to bear the burdens which this war is laying upon us. Help us to respond to the call of our Empire according to our several powers: put far from us selfish indifference to the needs of others, give us grace to fulfil our daily duties with a sober diligence, and enable us by patient continuance in well-doing to glorify Thy Name.

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The following sermon was then delivered by V. W. BRO. THE VER. ARCHDEACON CROWFOOT, GRAND CHAPLAIN:

2 Cor. 3:17.

"Where the Spirit of the Lord is there is Liberty."

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Members of Grand Lodge, and Brethren:

XX7E are here this evening to thank God for the blessings which He has so richly poured upon the Craft, and particularly upon the Grand Lodge of this jurisdiction during the past fifty years of its existence.

It will be in accord with the spirit of our gathering, as well as giving point to the thanksgivings which we have assembled to offer to the Deity, if I take as my subject

The Mission of Masonry,

and ask you to consider the principles for which masonry stands.

Seeing that it is only in the light of the past that the ideals and aims of the present can be understood aright. I would ask you to glance back over the records of time and consider those hoary mists of antiquity out of which our most excellent institution is seen emerging. Without discussing at length the sublime origins of our Craft, a subject of which it would not be seemly to treat in the presence of a mixed assemblage. I may say that in free masonry we have the direct lineal descendant of the Guilds which played so prominent a part in the history of the Middle Ages. And in making this assertion I feel that I am giving expression to a statement which the most cynical "cowan" will hardly venture to dispute. It is a fact established beyond possibility of denial, and attested not only by records in possession of lodges in the Old Country, but

vouched for in any history of our nation. And there is traceable an unbroken continuity of life linking the speculative masons of today with their operative brethren of antiquity.

If then we are to arrive at a true estimate of the mission of masonry it will be by a study of the part played by the Medieval Guilds in the drama of the human race.

As we study the records of those old days the Guilds appeal to us on account of the extent and variety of their philanthropic work. At King's Lynn, for instance they maintained the sea wall, a very important part of public work in that low-lying country. At Coventry they sustained the aged, at Ludlow they educated the children. while at Cambridge they were instrumental in founding the College of Corpus Christi, which stands to this day a monument of their social service.

We read of them too in the picturesque rôle, as the organizers of famous pageants and stately processions. We are told for instance that at York on the Friday after Corpus Christi, the Guild which was called after the holy day "kept a solemn procession'' and it is narrated that in this festive show in the year 1413 "ninety-six separate crafts took part, and no less than fifty-four pageants were prepared and presented in the procession by these crafts, while ten more made the show the more glorious by bearing a vast number of blazing torches."

But while these facts convey a vivid and appealing picture of two aspects of the work of the guilds; they do not exhaust the reasons for their existence or in any way summarize their importance in history. No organization of men would have had the continuous and uninterrupted existence such as these guilds enjoyed had they been societies formed only for philanthropy and merry-making. They existed to promote a deeper purpose than this, a purpose of which pageantry and public service formed but the by-products as it were. What this service was will best be understood in the light of a sentence written by the late Bishop Stubbs of Truro, who describes them as "The purest fount of true democracy."

A hasty glance at the history of democracy must suffice to substantiate this statement. As early as the sixth century B. C. the political philosophy of Solon had

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stipulated that citizens should have a voice in the selection of their governors, that government should proceed not by compulsion, but by consent, and that all who held authority should hold it subject to the control of those for whom they acted. But, as Lord Acton has said: "Although the maxims of the great classic teachers, of Sophocles, and Plato and Seneca, and the glorious examples of public virtue were in the mouths of all men there was no power in them to avert the doom of that civilization for which the blood of so many patriots and the genius of so many incomparable writers had been wasted in vain. The liberties of the ancient nations were crushed beneath a hopeless and inevitable despotism."

How then did liberty come to us? There are those who tell us that modern liberty was born in the throes of the French Revolution. Without intending to minimize the historical importance of that terrible event, I maintain that it is not true to attribute our modern heritage of freedom entirely to this source. The candle of liberty first lighted by the sages of classical antiquity was not extinguished, and only relit at the holocaust of the effete French aristocracy. It was burning all the time.

"Liberty," writes a disciple of Gladstone, "in the old days had been the offspring of thought and meditation, its cradle had been rocked by sages, and it had been suckled on the logic of philosophers" But "there were no philosophers in the medieval age, for intellect had not yet reawakened, and the cause of liberty was attended to by blacksmiths and carpenters and fishmongers and clothiers and other such practical craftsman and artisans." And how was it that these rude and unlettered men could keep the precious taper of liberty alight? I will tell you. It was not that they were philosophers, they were not. It was not that they were deep thinkers, they were not. It was not that they were steeped in classic lore, they were not. But it was that they were men whose religion was their life, whose trade, as their guild rules to this day attest was regulated by the spirit of Christianity, it was for this reason that they kept the precious taper burning, for where the spirit of the Lord is there is liberty.

At this point two questions force themselves upon our attention. We have claimed Divine inspiration for our

ancient brethren, on what grounds, it will be asked, do we make this claim? And secondly it may be asked what is the witness of masonry to liberty, are we sure that she has really preserved this precious taper, and kept it burning?

Let me take these two questions in the order in which I have propounded them.

Are we sure that our ancient brethren had the spirit of the Lord? This is a question which I will answer in the words of our Saviour, "By their fruits ye shall know them." Look at the works of our ancient brethren. Contemplate those dreams of stone in which they wrought their faith.

"Give all thou canst; high heaven rejects the lore Of nicely calculated less or more:

So deemed the man who fashioned for the sense These lofty pillars, spread that branching roof Self-poised, and scooped into ten thousand cells Where light and shade repose, where music dwells Lingering, and wandering on as loth to die; Like thoughts whose very sweetness yieldeth proof That they were born for immortality. They dreamt not of a perishable home

Who thus could build.

Surely none who gaze upon such stupendous works will deny to their artificers some share in the spirit of the Lord. If then they had the spirit of the Lord, had they also liberty? We claim that our ancient brethren kept the taper of liberty alight. What ground have we for making this statement?

I point you in reply to the whole genius of our institution. Our tenets, our organization, our ritual are all eloquent of liberty. Recall the stately and impressive ceremonial with which a Master is installed. Recollect the solemn charges which are given to every officer in a lodge when he is invested with the jewel of his office. All are reminded that though they be for a time elevated above their fellows, yet as masons all meet upon the level. Thus has the Craft preserved that true idea of liberty which sees in it not the license for each to do as he likes, but rather that ordered harmony in which each different note is required to complete the music of the whole.

Thus as we read the records of the past it would seem that the Mission of Masonry has been to keep the taper of liberty alight.

What then about the future?

I believe that there is a future for masonry, a future which shall far exceed the glories of the past, if you and I will but be faithful to our obligation, and hand on to posterity that which we ourselves have inherited from the past. And if we would fulfil our part in this glorious mission it would seem to me that there are three things we must do.

In the first place we must do all in our power to promote *liberty.* And that this is a part of our obligation of which we are not unmindful I am made conscious when I contemplate the numbers of brethren who have gone from every lodge and are now striking their blow for liberty on the battle-fields of Europe and elsewhere. Let us who are at home see to it that we support our brave brethren by every means at our disposal. We have praved for them tonight. Let us see to it that our prayers are followed by our labours. Let the Craft be forward in every good work to ameliorate the lot of the sick and wounded, and to minister to the needs of the widow and the fatherless.

Secondly, as masons, it is our duty to *practice liberty*. And by this I would have you understand that the Craft is not to be used as a means for self-advancement. Shame on the brother who has joined because of the good he could derive from it in his business, but rather I would have you see in it a priceless opportunity for the practice of that true liberty which consists in the service of our brother men. and seeks to link self in the service of others.

Lastly and above all let us see to it that we provide liberty with that true Divine atmosphere in which alone she can exist. The Holy Bible is the great light in free masonry, let us see to it that it is the rule and guide of our lives. Let every mason remember that his life is to be a life lived in the conscious realization of the spirit of the Lord. Shame on the mason whose masonry is but an empty ritual and nothing more, whose very conduct gives the lie to his obligation, and whose life is but darkening the light by which others have to live. Rather let us

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remember the glorious mission of the Craft, and live in closest touch with the Divine Spirit, for "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is Liberty."

This Memorial is made by Order of Grand Lodge, that their names be not forgotten.

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R.W. Brother Thomas Walker, Past Grand Master, then arose and said, "M.W. Grand Master, I have also a presentation to make. Many of us here know that some years ago Past Grand Master Ellis, by a vote of the Board of General Purposes, had authority to sit for his portrait to an eminent artist in Toronto. Senator Ellis in his lifetime refused this authority, holding that the Board of General Purposes had no authority to spend the funds of Grand Lodge for such a purpose, and so the matter stood."

At this point Wor. Brothers W. Leonard Ellis and George D. Ellis entered bearing a framed portrait in oils of their father, the late Hon. John V. Ellis, P.G.M. It was placed near the East and at once unveiled.

"Now, however, Mrs. Ellis has authorized me to present to Grand Lodge, through you, Most Worshipful Sir, this oil painting of our late revered brother, Past Grand Master Ellis. Will you allow me in the first place to say what a great debt of gratitude we owe to Mrs. Ellis for this beautiful portrait, which I trust will ever hang on our walls, and while being gazed upon by succeeding generations of Masons, may stimulate them to copy all those good things which were so well practiced and held by our departed brother.

Secondly: The Masonic history of Past Grand Master Ellis is a history of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, and from its formation he was always a leading light in its activities. He was six times elected Grand Master, and not only was he foremost in his own Province, but few of us have any doubt that he was better known than any Mason on this Continent. His Masonic work only ended with his life. In this he was an example to all who hear me today. Try to copy the example he so well set and do not, when your period of official service has drawn to a close, turn your back on the lodge room and conclude that your Masonic work is over."—Applause. The M.W. Grand Master replied that he accepted the gift with the utmost pleasure and gratitude on behalf of Grand Lodge. The portrait would indeed be a cherished adornment of the walls and an inspiring reminder to the members.

Grand Lodge was then closed in *ample* form and the first verse of the National Anthem was sung.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

OFFICERS AND BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

As Grand Master of the ancient and honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick. I extend a most hearty greeting to the members of the Craft here assembled from different sections of the jurisdiction.

It seems fitting at the opening of this, the fifty-first Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, to express our deep sense of gratitude to Him who is our Supreme Master for the manifold mercies and rich blessings with which He has crowned our lives during the past twelve months, and to humbly pray that His hand may direct our writing on the new page we have just turned.

I sincerely hope that the officers of Grand Lodge, the members representing subordinate lodges, together with the visitors, having come together because of your deep interest in our splendid order, may enjoy beautiful fellowship and, as well, that your deliberations may promote the best interests of our Order.

For the fifth consecutive Annual Communication we meet under the shadow of a world tragedy. Four years ago our Empire was dedicated to a Holy Ideal. Our people then believed, and still believe, that a nation's promise is the badge of a nation's honor. With high resolve, and splendid devotion, her sons have given themselves "a living sacrifice" that justice might be established in international relations; that democracy might be preserved for future generations, and that, small nations might be free to work out their own destiny.

Our Dominion, as a not unimportant part of the Empire, has nobly done its duty. Her sons at Ypres and Vimy Ridge and many another hard fought field have brought much glory to our nation. But the glory has been tempered by sorrow that has come to many a Canadian home whose son has paid the supreme sacrifice.

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In the glory and the sorrow our Craft has nobly borne its part, for over ten thousand Masons, good and true, have fought the fight and kept the faith on the battlefields of Europe. God grant that before another Annual Communication the Supreme Ruler of the Universe may so direct the forces that stand for righteousness, for truth, for liberty, and for justice against oppression and wrong, that victory may perch upon our banners, and peace may come to our troubled world.

It is now one year since you conferred upon me the distinguished honor of electing me Grand Master, an honor the more appreciated because you elevated me to the Grand East during my absence from Grand Lodge. It was with misgiving that I took up the duties of this honorable office. I realized my limitations, but felt assured that I could depend on the sympathy and counsel of my distinguished predecessors and as well the officers of Grand Lodge. In this I have not been mistaken, and I desire to take advantage of this opportunity to express my appreciation for the assistance rendered, and for the courtesy and hospitality which have been accorded me everywhere by the members of the Craft. The duties of the office have proven a pleasure.

I have already made mention of the strife among the nations. In striking contrast to the world's discord, I am pleased to report to you that beautiful fellowship and splendid harmony have prevailed during the year, throughout the entire Iurisdiction.

There has also been a healthy growth during the last twelve months. The addition of new members has been most gratifying; but, my brothers in the Order, let us not lose sight of the fact that not by numbers shall the strength of Masonry be gauged, but by the quality of her manhood.

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Let us keep the standard high and not admit to membership those whose lives would bring reproach upon the Craft. Need I remind you that on the shoulders of each individual member rests the honor of the Order? We should cultivate those cardinal principles for which the Masonic Order stands.

The past year has been unique, in that the Grand Master has not been called upon to give his decision on any important matters related to Masonic procedure and practice. This seems to indicate that the brethren have been giving much consideration to the Constitution of Grand Lodge, and so were able themselves to settle all questions that arose. I have, however, sanctioned a number of changes to by-laws and have granted a number of dispensations which will be fully explained in the Grand Secretary's report.

OUR HONORED DEAD.

As we meet to-day we welcome new faces to our midst but we are also saddened by the knowledge that there are those whose fellowship we have enjoyed who will never again sit in Grand Lodge. They have been elevated to the Supreme Grand Lodge on high, where the Supreme Grand Master presides in Love. Brethren of the Order have paid their last tribute of respect. We to-day hold their memory sacred.

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All of the brethren whose names I have just read were both much honored by the members of the Craft in their respective Lodges and as well their memories are held in reverence. But there is one among the list of our honored dead that I desire to especially mention, both because of the honorable position that he occupied in our Order, and also because of the outstanding position that he filled in public life.

R. W. P. G. M. The Hon. William Wedderburn passed away at his home in St. John, April 5, 1918.

Brother Wedderburn was initiated E. A. in Saint John's Lodge June 16th, 1857; passed to degree of F. C. July 15th; and raised to M. M. August 17th, the same year.

He was Worshipful Master in 1862 and 1863; and was always a strong advocate of an independent Grand Lodge for New Brunswick.

At the formation of Grand Lodge he was unanimously elected Deputy Grand Master, and continued in that office until September, 1870, when he was chosen Grand Master, which honorable position he occupied two years.

Brother Wedderburn will be long remembered as a fluent speaker, orator, and lecturer, and on many public and private occasions commanded the close attention of his auditors by eloquent and ornate deliverances.

DIVINE WORSHIP.

On Sunday, June 24th, it was my very great pleasure to attend Divine Worship at St. Paul's Church, of which the Ven. Archdeacon Crowfoot, our Grand Chaplain, is the Rector. There were present a large number of Grand Lodge officers and brothers of the City Lodges.

Although the inclement weather interfered somewhat with the attendance, those who braved the storm were fully repaid in listening to the splendid sermon delivered by our Grand Chaplain, who selected as his text Prov. 3:6. "In all thy ways acknowledge Him and He shall direct thy paths."

LAVING CORNER STONE.

On June 9, 1917, I accepted the invitation of the Board of School Trustees of the Parish of Lancaster School District No. 1, to lay the Corner Stone of their new Beaconsfield school building.

Grand Lodge assembled in Carleton Union Lodge room at 2.30 p.m., and a procession having been formed by the Grand Director of Ceremonies, proceeded to the site of the building, headed by the Temple of Honor Band.

In the absence of the Premier of the Province, the Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, on behalf of the Board of School Trustees, formally requested me to lay the Stone and presented me with a suitably engraved Trowel.

I have here appended my address to the chairman and members of the Board upon that occasion.

"Mr. Chairman, and Members of The Board of School Trustees of the Parish of Lancaster School District No. 1:

"From time immemorial it has been the custom of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons, when requested to do so, to lay the Corner Stone of buildings erected for the worship of God; for charitable objects; for the purposes of administration of justice and free government, and for important public industries. These objects, comprising the best interests of mankind in the Arts, Sciences, and Education, and the industries which tend to make men better citizens, are of the noble purposes of Freemasonry, and may well demand the assistance of our ceremonies upon such occasions.

"First, then, because your Board has unanimously requested me to lay this Corner Stone, I, as Grand Master, accompanied by the officers and members of Grand Lodge,

and brethren of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick, have much pleasure in attending this afternoon for the purpose of conducting these proceedings; and I wish to assure you, Gentlemen of the Board, of the cordial sympathy of the members of the Craft manifested in this large number of Masons here assembled, as well as of the sincere and earnest desire that your undertaking begun here may prove eminently satisfactory and successful.

"It gives me great satisfaction that it should so happen that my first official public duty as Grand Master of New Brunswick should be discharged at the call of those with whom I have been long associated, and with whom I have had so many pleasant relations, and in my own parish where I have large financial interests.

"I am pleased to know of the activity of your Board, Sir, in providing for the beautiful school building that these plans call for, and I trust that God's blessing may rest upon you as a Board, that it may rest upon the architect, the contractors, and the workmen, in the performance of their respective duties, so that the entire building may be brought to a successful finish, and that then the real work of your Board may have its full fruition in the education of our children to fit them for any position which they may be called upon to fill later in life.

"We may now therefore lay this Corner Stone, in accordance with our Law and Ancient Custom. And I have, Mr. Chairman, much pleasure in accepting this trowel at your hand to be used on this occasion, as the instrument used by operative Masons to spread the cement which unites the building into one common mass, and which we, as speculative Masons, are taught to use for the more noble and glorious purpose of spreading the cement of brotherly love and affection, that cement which unites us into one sacred band or society of friends and brothers, 1918] GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

among whom no contention should ever exist, save that noble contention, or rather emulation, of who can best work and best agree; and I sincerely and devoutly trust that these noble sentiments by this trowel symbolized, may be largely exemplified in the erection of this building, exemplified too in the conduct and actions of that young life which in the days to come will receive its elementary education within the building to be erected upon this foundation; that time, in the future as in the past, will work out for you much success and good."

With the assistance of R. W. Bro. W. A. Dougherty as Senior Grand Warden, R. W. Brother H. S. Bridges as Junior Grand Warden, V. W. Brother Rev. G. Fred Scovil as Grand Chaplain, I laid the Corner Stone according to our Masonic Ritual.

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF GRAND LODGE.

On January 22nd a special meeting was held to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the formation of this Grand Lodge. A large number of the members of Grand Lodge, brethren of the city Lodges, and visiting brethren, met in Masonic Hall, and at eight o'clock in the evening formed in procession, and accompanied by the Grand Master of Nova Scotia and his deputy, and the Grand Master of Prince Edward Island, proceeded to Trinity Church, where the Grand Chaplain, Venerable Archdeacon Crowfoot, assisted by V. W. Past Grand Chaplains Rev. Canon R. A Armstrong, Rev. G. F. Scovil, Rev. W. H. Sampson, and Rev. Canon A. W. Smithers, conducted a very impressive service, after which we returned to Masonic Hall, and Grand Lodge was opened in ample form.

Most Worshipful Brother Benjamin Rogers, Grand Master of Prince Edward Island, Most Worshipful Brother Donald F. Fraser, Grand Master of Nova Scotia, and his deputy, R. W. Brother Wm. H. Smith, then being an-

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nounced, were received with grand honors and given a cordial welcome to Grand Lodge, after which each of the Grand Masters made some very happy remarks expressing their pleasure at being present with us on our fiftieth anniversary.

R. W. P. G. Master Hedley V. B. Bridges then delivered a most interesting and instructive oration, which was listened to with wrapt attention.

A scroll containing the names of the first officers of The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick was then unveiled and presented to Grand Lodge by R. W. P. G. Master H. S. Bridges. It now hangs upon our walls.

The surprise of the evening, however, came when R.W. P. G. Master Thomas Walker said that he had a very pleasant duty to perform, and requested Worshipful Brother Geo. D. Ellis, Grand Director of Ceremonies, and Past Master W. L. Ellis, sons of our beloved P. G. Master, John V. Ellis, to unveil a portrait of their father, and which, on behalf of Mrs. Ellis, he, in a few very feeling remarks, presented to Grand Lodge. The beautiful painting was accepted on behalf of Grand Lodge by your Grand Master, and now adorns the walls of Grand Lodge.

A most pleasant, interesting, and instructive evening, enjoyed by an exceedingly large number of brethren, now having come to a close, Grand Lodge was closed in ample form.

The above will be more fully set forth in the proceedings now being prepared by the Grand Secretary, which will be distributed to the respective Lodges in the Jurisdiction.

GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS.

Lodge of Instruction.

Under special dispensation from Grand Lodge, Emulation Lodge of Instruction has been conducted in St. John

City by R. W. P. G. M. Walker, assisted by R. W. Francis F. Burpee. Much valuable instruction has been given to the brethren who availed themselves of the privilege thus afforded.

APPOINTMENT OF REPRESENTATIVES.

I have recommended for appointment as Grand Representatives to Sister Grand Lodges the following brethren: Worshipful Brother Aaron Lawson, Edmundston, to the Grand Lodge of Alberta; Worshipful Brother W. S. Morrison, M.D., St. John, to the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands; Most Worshipful Brother D. C. Clark. St. John, to the Grand Lodge of Ireland.

VISITATIONS.

Having received at your hands such a signal honor. I determined to show my appreciation by making an official visit to as many Lodges as possible, and it is with pleasure that I now report having visited twenty-one Lodges in the jurisdiction. I will now render a detailed statement to you for your consideration.

Accompanied by a number of officers and members of Grand Lodge I made my first official visit to Carleton Union Lodge No. 8, on Thursday evening. August 2nd. The occasion was unique, inasmuch as Carleton Union Lodge is my mother Lodge, and the date was the thirtyninth anniversary of my being raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason.

Grand Lodge was received by Past Masters W. L. Ellis and Jarvis Wilson, and was given a most cordial welcome by Worshipful Master S. Irons and brethren.

The M. M. degree was exceedingly well done, and I had very great pleasure in complimenting the Worshipful Master and his officers upon their efficiency.

After labour, Grand Lodge was most hospitably entertained in the club room. After full justice had been done the good things provided, a pleasant time was spent in addresses and music.

It was also my great pleasure to install Brother Frank K. Stuart as W. M. and other officers of this Lodge on St. John's day, December 27th.

Tuesday, September 4th, with Grand Secretary and Dr. W. S. Morrison acting Grand Director of Ceremonies, I visited Sussex Lodge No. 7, St. Stephen, accompanied by R. W. James Vroom, acting D. G. Master, R. W. Brother M. L. Young, P.D.G.M. F. H. Wetmore, M.D., of Hampton, and others.

We were most cordially welcomed by Worshipful Master W. B. Hawthorne, after which I witnessed the M. M. degree worked. The Grand Secretary, at my request, pointed out any errors or omissions. The criticisms were kindly given; they were very thankfully received by the Master and officers.

After the work of the evening Grand Lodge was entertained to light refreshments.

The following night I visited Alley Lodge No. 14, at Upper Mills, and saw the E. A. degree exemplified by acting Worshipful Master Chase. Grand Secretary J. T. Hartt gave a friendly criticism, after which we spent a very pleasant hour together.

My next visit was to St. Mark's Lodge No. 5, St. Andrews, accompanied by R. W. P. G. M. J. T. Whitlock, the Grand Secretary, and acting Grand Director of Ceremonies. We received a splendid welcome by acting Worshipful Master D. C. Rollins, who conferred the M. M. degree in a very creditable manner. We brought away with us pleasant memories of an enjoyable and profitable evening. My next official visit was on September 14th, when, with a number of Grand Lodge officers, I visited The Corinthian Lodge No. 13, Hampton. I found Worshipful Master J. W. Smith presiding in the East, with a large number of the Craft in attendance. The M. M. degree was conferred in a most creditable manner, after which Grand Lodge was pleasantly entertained.

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On January 11th of the present year I again visited this Lodge and installed the new officers.

Monday, October 1st, in company with R. W. P. G. Master J. T. Whitlock, Grand Secretary J. T. Hartt, Grand Director of Ceremonies Geo. D. Ellis, I left St. John to visit the Lodges on the North Shore. Before we reached Campbellton we were joined by R. W. Deputy Grand Master J. D. B. F. McKenzie. We were given a most cordial welcome to Campbellton Lodge No. 32 by Worshipful Master J. Henry Wilson. The E. A. degree was worked in a very impressive manner, after which we spent a short time in addresses, music, and light refreshments.

The next evening, October 2nd, with the above named Grand Lodge officers and a number of the brethren from Campbellton Lodge, who very kindly drove us to Dalhousie, I visited Restigouche Lodge No. 25. I was very much disappointed in this Lodge, as the Worshipful Master, W. McK. McNeill, neither attended the meeting nor sent any excuse for his absence. The Secretary came, after being sent for; but as he brought no books, the Grand Secretary was unable to procure information regarding the condition of the Lodge.

I found the Lodge room dirty and not at all attractive. It gave the impression of a decided lack of interest in Masonry. With the assistance of Grand Lodge officers and other visiting members (only four members of the

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Lodge being present) I opened the Lodge and exemplified the E. A. degree.

I then told the Secretary of the Lodge that I desired a letter from the Worshipful Master explaining his conduct. As yet I have not received any satisfactory communication from him, and the matter has been placed in the hands of the Deputy Grand Master to investigate.

On Wednesday, October 3rd, I visited Lodge St. John No. 27, at Bathurst. We were received and given a royal welcome by Worshipful Master Cox. After the E. A. degree was conferred we were then invited to the home of the Worshipful Master and spent a very pleasant time.

The next night, October 4th, I visited Miramichi Lodge No. 18, at Chatham. It was with great pleasure I witnessed the M. M. degree conferred on the son of our R. W. Deputy Grand Master J. D. B. F. McKenzie. The accuracy of the work reflected great credit upon the local officers. Later, the Grand Officers were invited to a banquet at Hotel Touraine.

Again the following night I visited Northumberland Lodge No. 17, at Newcastle. We received the welcome that only a Masonic Lodge can give. We witnessed the F. C. degree conferred. We then spent a pleasant hour over refreshments, interspersed with music.

At all of these visitations I was accompanied by the officers indicated, also by other members of Grand Lodge. With the exception of one Lodge, Grand Secretary reported favorably on the condition of the Lodges and the manner in which the books were kept.

The Grand Secretary also in a friendly and brotherly manner criticised the work; gently pointing out any errors or omissions from our ritual. His criticisms were received in the spirit in which they were given, namely that of brotherly love. On Thursday, October 11th, it was my great pleasure, accompanied by a goodly number of Grand Lodge officers, to visit New Brunswick Lodge No. 22, St. John, and after being heartily welcomed by Worshipful Master Dalton and brethren of the Craft, of which there was a very large number present, I witnessed the conferring of the E. A. degree in a most excellent manner.

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It was my great pleasure in this meeting, at the request of Worshipful Master Dalton, to present to Brothers Robert Campbell and George Smith scrolls certifying that they had held continuous membership in New Brunswick Lodge for more than fifty years, a truly remarkable record.

My next official visit was on Monday, November 5th, when, with officers of Grand Lodge, I visited Zion Lodge No. 21, at Sussex, and witnessed the M.M. degree conferred in a solemn and impressive manner. Grand Lodge was entertained by Zion Lodge with open-hearted hospitality.

On Tuesday, November 27th, accompanied by a large number of Grand Lodge officers, I visited Hiram Lodge No. 6, in the Capital of our Province. The welcome extended to us by the W. M. and brethren was the kind we have learned to expect from Fredericton. I witnessed the M. M. degree conferred upon Brother Walter Kitchen, who has only recently enlisted for overseas duty in the Royal Aviation Corps. The work was performed with dignity and impressiveness. It was with pleasure I complimented the Master and other officers on their efficiency. After the work of the evening we were entertained by Hiram Lodge, assisted by the ladies of the order of the Eastern Star. The tables were beautifully decorated and loaded with good things. A very pleasant evening was spent, which will long be remembered by those present.

The following night I crossed the noble St. John River and with a number of Grand Lodge officers I visited Alexandria Lodge No. 33, at St. Mary's, York County. Our

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hearts were warmed by the cordial welcome given by Worshipful Master Rickard. The work of the M. M. degree was very impressive, the more so as the candidate, Brother A. C. Kelly, had recently returned from the great war severely wounded, but hopeful that he will soon be able to return and continue doing his bit.

The Senior Deacon of Alexandria Lodge told me that he has been continuously in office since 1873, which is a wonderful record.

Tuesday, January 1st, 1918, with the officers of Grand Lodge, I visited St. John's Lodge No. 2, and after the usual greetings by Worshipful Master Mowatt, at his request installed the new officers for the ensuing year.

My next official visit was on Friday, January 8th, on which date I visited Hibernia Lodge No. 3, St. John, along with officers of Grand Lodge, and at the request of Worshipful Master Kelly I had great pleasure in installing the officers in their respective stations.

The next night, January 9th, The Union Lodge of Portland was visited, and at the request of Worshipful Master H. N. M. Stanbury I installed the officers in their respective stations.

Friday, March 1st, in company with a large number of Grand Lodge officers, I visited Albion Lodge No. 1, St. John. I was most enthusiastically welcomed by Worshipful Master Bentley. It was a great pleasure to witness the work of the evening, the M. M. degree, which was performed in a splendid manner. Grand Lodge was afterwards entertained.

Friday, March 15th, with Grand Secretary and Grand Director of Ceremonies and Past Grand Director of Ceremonies James Hawthorne, Brother Frank K. Stuart, and a number of other members of Grand Lodge, I visited Woodstock Lodge No. 11. We were heartily welcomed by Worshipful Master Mair and brethren. The attendance of the Craft was large. The F. C. degree was most impressively conferred. We were later served with refreshments.

On the evening of March 20th I made my last official visit. With a number of Grand Lodge officers I visited Keith Lodge No. 23, Moncton. We were very cordially received by the Worshipful Master. The F. C. degree was very creditably conferred. The Grand Secretary reported the books of the Lodge in excellent condition. After labour, we partook of light refreshments, and a very pleasant evening was brought to a close.

It will be seen from the report which I have just rendered, that I witnessed the conferring of degrees in each subordinate Lodge which I visited. I found in nearly every Lodge that the ritual was well maintained and that there was an evident desire on the part of all officers to be as perfect as possible in the work.

I wish to express my hearty appreciation of the help rendered and the courtesies received from the officers of Grand Lodge who accompanied me on my various official visits, and desire to make special mention of the valuable assistance rendered me in my duties by the R. W. Grand Secretary, Brother J. Twining Hartt.

SPECIAL RECOMMENDATIONS.

Our noble order has grown to such proportions that it has, in the opinion of the Grand Master, become imperative to make the office of Grand Secretary permanent. I would therefore respectfully recommend that a suite of offices be provided in the Masonic Temple which will not only be the office of the Grand Secretary but, as well, will be the headquarters for our Masonic Jurisdiction.

I would further recommend that the salary of the Grand Secretary be so increased as to make it possible for him to devote his full time to the work of this most impor-

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tant office; and that this may receive the most careful consideration, I would further recommend that this proposition be placed before the members of the board of general purposes, with full authority to deal with the matter.

I am of the opinion that a change in the entrance to our Masonic Temple is also necessary: and I would recommend that steps be taken to ascertain the feasibility of changing the present entrance to one opening immediately from Germain Street.

Before I bring my address to a close. I wish to convey to the members of the Craft my sense of deep appreciation for assistance rendered, for courtesies received, and for hospitality so generously given throughout the jurisdiction: also for the fraternal welcome accorded me and those members of Grand Lodge who so kindly accompanied me. I humbly pray that the same harmony that has characterized the relations of the Craft during the past twelve months may continue, and that the blessing of the Supreme Architect of the Universe may rest upon our Grand Lodge and all members of our Craft.

"I will be true, for there are those who trust me: I will be pure, for there are those who care: I will be strong, for there is much to suffer; I will be brave, for there is much to dare; I will be friend to all the poor and friendless; I will be giving and forget the gift; I will be humble, for I know my weakness: I will look up, and laugh, and love, and lift."

By direction of the M. W. Grand Master, Commissions under the Seal of Grand Lodge were issued appointing the following brethren as Grand Representatives of New Brunswick, viz.:

W. Brother C. Sherburn Rice of Wilmington, near the M. W. Grand Lodge of Delaware;

W. Brother Edwin Emil Elser of Manila, near the M. W. Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands.

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The dispensations authorized by the Grand Master numbered thirty-five, and included one for a General Lodge of Instruction under Past Grand Master Walker, one to elect officers, one to install officers, one to hold a second ballot on candidates duly proposed.

Ten of the Lodges attended Divine Service in regalia and a number of degrees were conferred at intervals of less than four weeks, mainly on brethren enrolled in the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

J. TWINING HARTT, Grand Secretary,

R.W. Brother F. J. G. Knowlton, P.G.M., as Chairman of the Managing Committee of the Masonic Hall, presented the report of the Committee, and also on behalf of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation submitted the accounts of the V.W. Grand Treasurer and the report of the auditors thereon.

These reports and accounts had already been laid before the Annual Meeting of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation and had been formally adopted. After giving a verbal summary of the year's accounts R.W. Brother Knowlton moved, seconded by R.W. Brother Henry S. Bridges, P.G.M.,

"That the reports and the V.W. Grand Treasurer's accounts, as adopted by the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation, be received and confirmed, and that they be printed in the Annual Proceedings."

On the motion being put some little discussion ensued, and explanations were made by R.W. Brothers Knowlton and Walker, of the Managing Committee, as to certain items in the "Building Account."

The motion was then declared carried.

REPORT OF HALL COMMITTEE.

To the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation:

1918]

Your Managing Committee begs to report as follows:

Our activities since our last report have been centered on the completion of the heating apparatus, the refinishing of the Scottish Rite Room, and the painting of the windows in the Blue Lodge Room.

As stated in a former report, the work of the installation of the heating apparatus has been proceeding somewhat slowly owing to causes difficult to control, but we are now glad to say that everything will be in readiness for our autumn requirements. The necessary increase in the rentals consequent on this installation has been cheerfully agreed to by the respective tenants.

The rooms occupied by the A. & A. Rite Bodies have been fitted with steam heating apparatus, and repainted under their direction and to their satisfaction. The decoration of the windows in imitation of stained glass produces a very pleasing effect.

In the Blue Lodge Room your Committee with the view of adding to its attractiveness decided to embellish the four windows with appropriate Masonic designs. This work was accordingly completed in a very artistic manner by Mr. G. M. Cleveland, and it may be interesting to know that the figures and inscriptions are all hand painted. The first window is emblematical of Blue Lodge work, and the symbols and emblems appertaining to these degrees are readily recognizable.

In the second window an attempt was made to set forth some salient features of Chapter work, with the hope that our endeavours may meet with the appreciation of Chapter Masons, while the third window is peculiar to Knight Templarism, and is illustrative of Knights Templar and

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Knights of Malta with their respective banners. But perhaps the most interesting of the series and that which will appeal to all the Craft without distinction is the fourth or memorial window wherein a feeble attempt is made to portray a sense of the reverence that we Free Masons have for the memories of those of our brethren who have given the best that was in them, and laid down their lives that we and those that come after us may continue to enjoy the blessings incident to British institutions.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

To the Board of Directors, Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation, St. John, N. B.:

Your Committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary, report as follows:

That all books are properly kept and vouchers have been produced to us for all expenses and payments. The following statements of accounts and assets shows the financial standing of the Corporation.

You will note that the Grand Treasurer's account shows receipts from the Grand Secretary of \$3,513.05, while the Grand Secretary's books show \$3,800.20 as having been paid. This is accounted for by a payment of \$287.15 made by the latter, after the Grand Treasurer's books had been closed.

The General Account shows an overdraft in the Bank of Nova Scotia of \$2,588.02 caused by extraordinary expenses for new heating installation, renovations of A. and A. Rite Rooms and a large advance in the Insurance rates.

REPORT ON GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

GRAND LODGE ROOM, April 24th, 1918.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The Committee to whom has been referred the address of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master wish to place on record its entire approval of the message to Grand Lodge.

The appropriate and feeling remarks with reference to the part played by our brethren in the great war, and the hope therein expressed of an honourable peace in the near future must touch a deep and responsive chord in the hearts of all the brethren.

The harmony, peace and good will that has prevailed throughout the jurisdiction during the past year is a matter of profound thankfulness, and is in a large measure due to the wisdom and tact of the Grand Master and his associate officers.

Your Committee has to express deep sympathy with the fitting remarks expressed by the Grand Master relating to the great loss the fraternity has sustained in the death

of so many distinguished masons since our last Communication. The passing away of P.G.M. Wedderburn from our midst, no doubt the oldest P.G.M. in any jurisdiction in the world, removes the last of that distinguished body of Masons who laid broad and deep the foundations of this Grand Lodge.

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The special recommendations made by the Grand Master, your Committee feels, are worthy of the careful attention of Grand Lodge, and it recommends that these propositions be placed in the hands of the Board of General Purposes with full authority to act in the matter, as soon as in its judgment the finances of Grand Lodge will permit.


