The M.W. Grand Master delivered the following address:

#### GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

#### Brethren of Grand Lodge:

We have assembled today to enter upon the duties and responsibilities of the Fifty-Third Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

This is the third consecutive year that I have had the distinguished honor of presiding over Grand Lodge as its chief executive; an honor which I much appreciate. I now stand before you to render an account of my stewardship.

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I desire to extend heartiest greetings to the Officers and Members of Grand Lodge, and to the representatives of subordinate Lodges here assembled. It is my sincere desire that our associations may be most pleasant.

In reviewing the past year, I wish to congratulate the Members of Grand Lodge upon the splendid success that has been attained, and for the continued friendly relations existing between our Grand Lodge and all other Grand Lodges with which we are associated.

The outstanding event of the year in the history of Freemasonry centred around the stupendous Peace Jubilee Communication held in Albert Hall, in London, England, June 23rd to 29th inclusive, by the United Grand Lodge of England; the Mother Grand Lodge of Freemasonry. I purpose to give a somewhat detailed statement of this outstanding and historic event.

Having accepted the invitation of His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England, to join in the Peace Celebration and upon your authority, I, in company with R.W. Past Grand Masters Dr. Thos. Walker and Dr. H. S. Bridges, left St. John for London, England, on the evening of June 9th. We were wished a "bon voyage" by a large number of the brethren who were at the depot to bid us farewell.

We arrived in the old historic City of Quebec the following afternoon. Our short stay in that city was made very pleasant by Colonel Ray, a friend of Dr. Bridges, who called upon us and invited us to lunch with him at the Quebec Garrison Club. After lunch he escorted us to the "Empress of Britain" and remained with us until we sailed at five o'clock, p.m.

The passage across was uneventful. Captain Webster and the chief engineer, Brother William Sykes, were most courteous and did everything possible to make our voyage pleasant.

We arrived in Liverpool Friday morning, June 20th and were in London that afternoon by two o'clock.

The following day we called on Sir George McLaren Brown, the London agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and booked our return passage. He was most courteous and did all in his power to make our stay in London pleasant. We visited Canada Lodge, F. & A. M., and attended their dinner as his guests. He also invited us to the Dominion Day banquet, which was a very enjoyable affair, and in many ways he showed his interest in us.

We then called on the V.W. Grand Secretary, Brother P. Colville Smith, at the Masonic Temple, Great Queen Street. We found him engaged and, while waiting, we were shown through the Library and Museum by Brother Dr. William Hammond, the Librarian and Curator. We were much interested in the valuable collections displayed. Among other things we saw a case containing five hundred and ten Past Masters' Jewels which had been presented to the late Grand Secretary, Sir Edward Letchford; also the large sword carried in procession before the M.W. Grand Master. This sword is 350 years old. We saw, as well, the swords carried before the Principal Z and the Pro Grand Master, and the Grand Lodge regalia worn by H. M. the late King Edward VII.

When we were ushered into the presence of the V.W. Grand Secretary, Brother P. Colville Smith, we were very graciously received and given a very cordial reception by him, as well as by the Grand Director of Ceremonies, Brother J. S. Granville Grenfell, and Brother Sydney A. White, the chief clerk in the Grand Secretary's office.

Brother Smith informed us that we were to be guests at the Savoy Hotel.

On Monday, June 23rd, we went to the Savoy Hotel, as directed, and there found invitations awaiting us to the different luncheons and dinners to be held throughout the week. We also learned that Brother A. Burnett Brown,

Grand Superintendent of Works, had been appointed to be our guide and companion during the week. At one o'clock Brother Brown called for us and took us to lunch, together with M.W. Grand Master Wardrope, of Ontario, and Past Grand Masters Chambers and Williamson, of Quebec, who were also stopping at the Savoy. The object of this luncheon was that we might have an opportunity to become acquainted. After lunch we were taken to and conducted through Westminster Abbey by Mr. Westlake, a prominent official of the Abbey, who had been appointed by the Grand Lodge of England to act as our guide.

As we passed through the twilight of this historic pile of buildings, which has been the scene of the Coronation of so many of Britain's Sovereigns, as well as the resting place of so many of her honored dead, we felt we were standing on sacred ground.

At 7 p. m. we were the guests of the Pro Grand Master Right Hon. Lord Ampthill, at Piccadilly Hotel.

On Tuesday, the 24th, the late Brother F. W. Sumner, Agent General for New Brunswick, called at the hotel and cordially invited us to use him or his office in any way we wished. Brother Sumner was very attentive to us during our stay in London.

We were taken through Richmond Park in autos, and at one o'clock we met at the Imperial Restaurant, Regent Street, as the guests of the Grand Stewards' Lodge. This is a very unique Lodge, and the luncheon was also unique and very enjoyable.

At 4.45 p. m. we visited Canada Lodge, No. 3527. After being very cordially received and welcomed by Pro Grand Master Lord Ampthill, we witnessed the installation of Brother Wm. Kerr as Worshipful Master. The ceremony of installation was conducted in a most efficient manner by the Pro Grand Master, Lord Ampthill, after which the visiting Grand Masters and other distinguished

representatives from the United States of America, New Zealand, Scotland, Newfoundland, Ontario, Quebec, and New Brunswick, tendered hearty good wishes from their respective jurisdictions to Canada Lodge.

We then repaired to the Connaught Rooms where a sumptuous dinner was served.

The usual after dinner toasts were given, beginning with one to "The King and the Craft" proposed by W. M. Kerr. Col. L. C. M. S. Amery, M.P., Junior Warden of the Lodge, proposed the toast "Our Brethren in and from the Dominion." Among other things he said "I do not intend to dwell upon the achievements of the Imperial Forces or of the Canadian Forces, but the achievements of the Canadian Forces from the first days of Ypres till the last hundred days of victory will be held in veneration for all time." This toast was replied to by Brother W. H. Wardrope, K. C., Grand Master of Canada in the Province of Ontario, and Brother E. T. D. Chambers, P. G. M., and Brother W. A. Williamson, G. Secretary, both of Quebec.

Wednesday, the 25th, we visited the Guild Hall and the rooms of the Goldsmith Co., where we saw a wonderful display of gold and silver plate of immense value.

At one o'clock we lunched at the Royal Automobile Club, Pall Mall, as guests of Motherland Lodge, No. 3861, W. Brother Wm. Perkins Bull, Worshipful Master. At three o'clock we left by automobile to visit the Royal Masonic School for girls at Clapham Junction and Weybridge. This school was founded in 1788. Girls are admitted at the age of seven and usually continue until the age of seventeen. Among the subjects taught are shorthand, typewriting, pianoforte, singing, etc. In the one hundred and thirty-one years it has been operating three thousand two hundred and eighty-five daughters of deceased or distressed Masons have been benefited. There

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were seven hundred and thirty girls in the Institution when we visited it.

My visit to this Institution was not only interesting and enjoyable, but it also made a lasting impression on my mind. I had seen one of the benefits and advantages of Masonry in the Motherland. It is a great satisfaction for a Mason to know that if he is incapacitated in any way, or if he dies, that his children will be cared for, educated and fitted for any station in life, by the brethren of the Masonic Fraternity.

At 6 p. m. we visited Antiquity Lodge, No. 2, which existed before there was a Grand Lodge of England, and today operates without a charter, because there was no Grand Lodge to grant a charter when the Lodge was organized. We received a cordial reception. We saw the E. P. degree worked in full. This Lodge has a number of interesting old relics, among them is the maul with which Sir Christopher Wren laid the Corner Stone of St. Paul's Cathedral, June 21, 1675. After this interesting meeting we were again dined in the Connaught Rooms.

Thursday, 26th, we visited the Parliament Buildings with Lord Ampthill, Pro Grand Master, as our guide. We were shown through the House of Lords and the House of Commons.

We were also driven to Bushev and visited the Royal Masonic Institute for Boys. We had luncheon there as the guests of the Institution. This school was established in 1798. There were seven hundred and seventy-six boys enrolled at the time of our visit. Some four thousand and ninety-four boys have received the benefits of the Institution since it was founded.

We returned from Bushey direct to London where, on invitation of the Lord Mayor, we dined at the Mansion House and attended a reception where we were presented to H. R. H. Prince Arthur of Connaught.

On Friday, June 27th, we visited St. Paul's Cathedral and at 1.45 p.m. assembled at Albert Hall, where the great Peace Celebration was to be held. We were here met by brethren and conducted to a spacious room where we donned our regalia. We were then conducted into the main hall where we were individually presented to the Pro Grand Master, and given a most gracious and cordial reception. Prayers of profound thanksgiving were then offered to Almighty God who had given Peace with Victory.

It was a never-to-be-forgotten scene. "Massed about the Grand Master on the throne were the purple and gold of the Provincial Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England, and the present and past Grand Officers of that body." In striking contrast was the brilliant green and gold of the Irish Craftsmen. Throughout the great building, from floor to the topmost gallery, bright blue was the color of apron and collar.

Across the great arena, East and West and North and South, a deep line of cardinal red, marked the position of the Grand Stewards, and formed a very cross of St. George on a Masonic field. Truly a spectacle worthy of the historic occasion.

This wonderful meeting marked an epoch in the history of Freemasonry. There were nearly ten thousand Masons present. They had come from the North and the South, the East and the West, to sit at the feet of the Mother Lodge of all Freemasonry. There were representatives present from New York, New Jersey, Georgia, Kentucky, District of Columbia, Louisiana, Florida, Iowa, Michigan, California, Nebraska, Colorado, West Virginia, Montana, Arizona, Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Victoria, Gibraltar, South America. Hong Kong and South China, Newfoundland, Eastern Archipelago, Madras, British Guiana, Canterbury, New Zealand, Ceylon and Queensland. There is no doubt but this gathering of the

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Masonic Clan will bind with bonds of brotherly love the whole Masonic world.

After this historic meeting we were invited to dine at Piccadilly Hotel as guests of the Grand Officers' mess.

On Saturday, June 28th, Dr. Walker left us to go to Edinburgh.

At 10.30 a. m. the same day Dr. Bridges and myself with other guests were taken to Hampton Court where we had luncheon. We were then conducted through Hampton Palace. At 4 p. m. we were invited to visit Electric Lodge which had assembled in the dining room where we had previously lunched. The brethren of Electric Lodge seemed much pleased at our visit.

The evening of the same day we visited Jubilee Lodge and saw the M.M. degree conferred on Commander Adams, who was the first man who stepped on the Mole at Zeebrugge. After the degree work, which was done in an impressive and efficient manner, we were dined in the Connaught Rooms. It was a splendid affair.

Sunday, June 29th, was for us a day of rest and worship. During the day we attended Divine Service.

On Monday, the 30th, we lunched at Piccadilly Hotel, the guests of V.W. Brother P. Colville Smith, the Grand Secretary. In the evening we visited Empire Lodge and saw the W. Master and other officers installed into their respective offices. We later dined in the Connaught Rooms.

On Tuesday, July 1st, at 7 p. m., we were the guests of Sir George McLaren Brown at a Dominion Day banquet in the Connaught Rooms.

Friday, July 4th, we were privileged to be present at the consecration of "Peace and Concord Lodge," No. 3947. This impressive ceremony was carried through by the Grand Secretary, P. Colville Smith. He also installed the Worshipful Master and the other officers. The con-

secration of this Lodge had one unique feature, in that it was consecrated as a strictly temperance Lodge.

Wednesday, July 16, Dr. Bridges and I, having crossed over to Ireland, called on Brother H. E. Flavelle, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Ireland. His office is in Freemasons Hall, Molesworth Street, Dublin. We were very graciously received and spent a pleasant hour with him.

I wish to speak an appreciative word of Brother A. Burnett Brown, the Grand Superintendent of Works, who was appointed our guide. He was most indefatigable in his attentions to us, and was always most courteous, the typical English gentleman. His lucid explanations of everything, especially those of historic interest contributed in a very large degree to our pleasure.

Brethren of Grand Lodge, I have given you a necessarily brief, but somewhat detailed account of our visit to the Motherland. The brethren over there certainly know how to entertain. Nothing was left undone for our profit and pleasure.

As a result of the Masonic Peace Celebration, I believe the bonds of fellowship all over the Masonic world will be stronger than ever.

In the Quarterly Communication of the United Grand Lodge of England under date of September 3rd, there is a record of a fitting resolution passed to the Grand Director of Ceremonies and the Especial Grand Lodge. It is as follows, "That the cordial thanks of Grand Lodge be given to V.W. Brother J. S. Granville Grenfell, Grand Director of Ceremonies, for the patience, zeal and skilled ability displayed as chairman of the Peace Celebration Committee, in assisting to organize and successfully superintend during the arrangements for the Especial Grand Lodge, at the Royal Albert Hall, on June 27th. Grand Lodge sincerely desires to congratulate him, with the Committee, the Special Stewards and the members of the Grand Secretary's

Staff assisting in the work, on the thorough success of the whole undertaking, and trusts that Brother Grenfell may long be spared to render similar great service to the Craft."

Upon my arrival home from England, I received a letter from Brother A. E. Carlysle, Secretary of Canada Lodge, No. 3527, stating that I had been made an Honorary Member of that Lodge.

I accepted this distinction feeling that inasmuch as I represented this Grand Lodge at the Peace Celebration, that it was in reality an honor conferred on Grand Lodge through me.

VISITATION TO THE GRAND LODGE OF OURBEC.

On October 3rd, in response to an invitation from the Grand Lodge of Quebec, W. Brother Geo. D. Ellis, G. D. of C., and your Grand Master, went up to Montreal to attend the Fiftieth Anniversary of that Grand Lodge. We were met at the hotel by Grand Secretary Williamson and a number of the brethren, and very graciously received. In the afternoon we attended the session of Grand Lodge in the Rose Room of Windsor Hotel. We heard the history of the formation of Grand Lodge read by P.G.M. Chambers. A number of instructive and interesting addresses were given by prominent members of the Order.

Saturday we were driven to Forest and Stream Club as guests of Grand Lodge. This is a most charming spot. We were served here with a dainty luncheon.

Saturday evening a grand banquet was tendered us in the Windsor Hotel. It was a splendid affair. Over two hundred brethren were present.

#### OUR DEPARTED BROTHERS.

As we have come to the close of another Masonic year, we are saddened by the knowledge that a number of our beloved fraternity have been forced by the hand of death to fall out along the way. While they were with us we loved them. Now that they have gone before we hold their memory sacred.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

We remember that they "bore the burden in the heat of the day," and now that they have laid that burden down it becomes our duty to "carry on" with increased loyalty. We must "fight the good fight of faith" and "lay hold on eternal life," that some day we too may be translated and take our place with them in the Grand Lodge on high, where the Great Architect of the Universe presides in love.

I will now call the roll of our beloved dead:

Campbellton Lodge, No. 32. J. HENRY WILSON, P.M., died June 18, 1919.

As we have paused to drop a tear in memory of our departed Brothers we are reminded of the words of the poem:

"Into the long procession,
That passes away in the night,
Gone, yea, forever and ever
Gone to life's region of light,
Out from the shadow of suffering,
Drifting across the dark main,
Into the brighter future,
Out from gloom of pain."

#### OFFICIAL VISITS.

Tuesday, October 7, accompanied by G. D. of C. Brother Geo. D. Ellis, I left St. John for Salisbury, where we were joined by D.G.M. J. Fred Edgett and a number of the brethren from Moncton. At 7 p.m. we visited Salisbury Lodge, No. 20. We were cordially received by W.M. G. A. Taylor and a large number of the brethren. I installed Brother Taylor into the office of G. Standard Bearer. After the ceremony of installation the F. C. degree was worked in a very creditable manner.

The same evening, accompanied by the same brethren, I visited Steven Lodge, No. 37, in Petitcodiac. We were heartily received by W.M. R. M. Owen, and a large number of the brethren, with Grand Honors. The F. C. degree was conferred on a candidate in a creditable manner. The Craft was then called to refreshments and a pleasant hour was spent. We were then driven to Moncton by Brother Edgett, arriving there at 2 a.m.

October 8, D.G.M. Edgett took us to Shediac in his car. We visited Zetland Lodge, No. 24. W.M. Charters and brethren received us. Brother Charters called upon P.M. Dr. Murray to confer the E. P. degree on one candidate. The work was fairly well done.

I was much disappointed that the Master was not sufficiently acquainted with the work to have conferred

the degree himself. As kindly as possible I pointed out that the Worshipful Master of a Lodge should master the duties of his office. The explanation was made "that owing to so many of the brethren being absent from the place, they could not get enough present to open the Lodge." I believe that a Master who has been in office from January till October should be sufficiently acquainted with the work to enable him to at least try to put on a degree. I am pleased to learn that during the past winter there has been much improvement in the work of this Lodge, thus revealing the true Masonic spirit. This reflects credit on the spirit of the Worshipful Master and brethren of the Lodge.

After the degree work, Lodge was called to refreshments. We returned to Moncton the same night.

October 9. Early in the afternoon Brother Edgett took us in his car to Richibucto, where in the evening we visited St. Andrews Lodge, No. 16. A large number of brethren also came from Moncton, Chatham, and Newcastle, to assist us in our visit.

We were received with Grand Honors by W.M. Gardner who informed us that they were disappointed in not having a candidate, and requested Grand Lodge to exemplify a degree for the purpose of instruction.

I complied with the request, and with W. Brother R. A. Logie, of Chatham, in the chair, the work was well done and the brethren of St. Andrews Lodge expressed themselves as well pleased with the instruction given. Grand Lodge was then invited to refreshments and a very pleasant hour was spent.

December 9. Accompanied by G. D. of C. Geo. D. Ellis, I visited Hiram Lodge, No. 6, and installed Brother Harold Caldwell as D.D.G.M. for District No. 4 and Brother Alexander Murray as G. Sword Bearer.

A Roll of Honor of the brethren of Hiram Lodge who had been overseas in the great war of 1914-1918, and a

picture of Brother Chas. Edgecombe who made the supreme sacrifice, was unveiled by W.M. McVey, after R.W.P.G. Master Dr. H. V. Bridges had made a very eloquent address.

December 18. In company with G. D. of C. Geo. D. Ellis, I went to McAdam Junction and visited Ashlar Lodge, No. 36.

We were met at the station by D.D.G.M. Hawthorne, P.G.M. Whitlock, Brother Wm. Smith, and a number of brethren who had come from St. Stephen to assist in the visitation.

There were a very large number of brethren present at Ashlar Lodge and we were enthusiastically received by the Worshipful Master. The M.M. degree was conferred on two candidates in a most creditable manner. Light refreshments were served.

December 19. Accompanied by the same brethren, I visited Victoria Lodge, No. 26, at Milltown. We were cordially received by W.M. Back and by a large number of brethren of Victoria, Sussex and Alley Lodges, as well as brethren from Calais. The E. P. degree was exemplified in a manner that showed the officers of Victoria were skilled workmen. After the work of the evening I had the pleasure of giving an illustrated talk on my trip to London. The brethren were kind in expressing their appreciation.

December 27th, St. John's Day, I installed J. Percy Cruikshank as Worshipful Master, along with the Wardens and other officers, of Carleton Union Lodge, No. 8.

January 6th. Attended by a large number of Grand Lodge officers I visited St. John's Lodge, No. 2, and installed Brother Roy L. Sipprell as Worshipful Master, together with the other officers.

On January 7th, I again visited Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10, and installed Brother Horace A. Porter as Worshipful Master together with the other officers.

January 8th. With the Grand Lodge officers, I visited New Brunswick Lodge, No. 22, and installed Brother S. P. McCavour Worshipful Master, and the Wardens and other officers.

January 9th. Accompanied by the G. D. of C. and a number of brethren, I visited The Corinthian Lodge, No. 13, of Hampton, and installed Brother Archie Brittain, P.M. as Worshipful Master along with the other officers.

January 13th. Accompanied by Grand Lodge officers I visited Hibernia Lodge, No. 2, and installed the Worshipful Master, Wardens and other officers.

At all of the above meetings, after the installation ceremonies, refreshments were served, and very pleasant entertainments given.

January 28th. Accompanied by R.W. the Grand Secretary, J. T. Hartt, G. D. of C. Geo. D. Ellis, G. S. Warden W. S. Clawson, acting J.G.W. John Thornton, acting G. Chaplain H. H. Bissett, G. Organist D. A. Fox, P.G.M. Dr. H. V. Bridges, and P.M. H. Mowatt, I visited Sunbury Lodge, No. 42, and consecrated and dedicated their new Lodge room for Masonic purposes. I also installed W. Brother Geo. W. Smith, P.M., as Worshipful Master, together with the Wardens and other officers. We later spent a pleasant hour over light refreshments.

The Worshipful Master and brethren of this Lodge are to be congratulated on having purchased and furnished their new Lodge room. They certainly are very enthusiastic Masons and deserve great credit for having provided so comfortable a Masonic home.

On April 17th, I was invited by the Worshipful Master of Campbellton Lodge, No. 32, to attend the unveiling of Honor Rolls which had been placed in the Baptist and Presbyterian Churches and Lodge room. Accordingly, in company with the R.W. Grand Secretary, the Grand Director of Ceremonies and a number of acting Grand Officers, I proceeded to Campbellton, and on Sunday

morning, accompanied by Campbellton Lodge, I attended Divine Service in the Baptist Church. After an able sermon by Rev. Wellington Camp, I unveiled a tablet to the memory of Capt. Harry W. Ferguson, who was killed in the Great War of 1914-1918.

Again in the evening, we attended Divine Service in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, and after an eloquent sermon by Rev. Hugh Miller, Worshipful Master of Campbellton Lodge, I unveiled a tablet to the memory of Lt. Col. A. E. G. McKenzie, who fell while leading his troops into action in the late war.

Monday evening, accompanied by a large number of acting Grand Lodge officers, I visited Campbellton Lodge, No. 32. We were very cordially received by the Worshipful Master and brethren, after which we witnessed the F. C. degree put on in an excellent manner. The Master and officers of Campbellton Lodge are certainly skilled workmen and very enthusiastic Masons. After the degree work and at the request of the Worshipful Master, I unveiled a tablet in the Lodge room in honor of twenty-one members of Campbellton Lodge who had been engaged in the late war.

J. M. Troy, P.M. of Northumberland Lodge, then on behalf of his daughter, Mrs. A. E. G. McKenzie, unveiled and presented to Campbellton Lodge a bronze tablet in honor of her late husband, who was an active and enthusiastic member and Past Master of Campbellton Lodge.

Grand Lodge was then invited to refreshments prepared in an excellent manner by the ladies of the Presbyterian Church, after which an hour was pleasantly spent in entertainment.

#### SPECIAL DECISIONS.

In September last I was appealed to for a ruling on the question "If a person who has applied for Membership and has been balloted for and accepted, and afterwards it

has been found that he is an undesirable person to become a Mason, can he be stopped from getting the degrees."

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

My ruling is "If a person has been elected to Membership and afterwards it has been found that he is an undesirable person to become a Mason, that a brother in the Lodge in which he was elected may give notice of a motion for reconsideration of the ballot, that notice of motion to be placed on the regular notice of meeting. And on that motion being declared carried a new ballot can then be taken."

During December last, I was appealed to by Alexandria Lodge, No. 33, to establish for them a new jurisdiction, making the St. John River the boundary line between Alexandria Lodge and Hiram Lodge, or making an open jurisdiction. Alexandria Lodge sent maps and plans fully explaining their position.

This matter I referred to the Board of General Purposes, who very carefully considered the application and decided that as our Constitution is very plain on this matter, and as it had been decided by R.W. Brother Walker when he was Grand Master that the jurisdiction should be a straight line between Lodges, and as this decision was confirmed by a committee of the Board of General Purposes at that time, also by vote of Grand Lodge, that it would not be wise now to change the jurisdiction. I heartily concurred in this decision, and have so ordered.

A number of the Lodges have desired a change in their By-Laws thereby increasing the amount of joining fees, all of which I have approved.

## APPOINTMENT OF REPRESENTATIVES.

I have recommended for appointment as Grand Representatives to sister Grand Lodges the following brethren: R.W. George Ackman to the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island and W. Geo. D. Ellis to the Grand Lodge of Colorado.

Commissions have been issued to the following brethren representing this Grand Lodge: William B. Alexander, New York; Lewis G. Klench, Montana; S. C. D. Rea, Illinois; J. Bruce Cloyd, Tennessee.

#### EMULATION LODGE OF INSTRUCTION.

In January I granted a dispensation to R.W. Brothers J. T. Hartt and Francis F. Burpee, to hold a Lodge of Instruction in the City of St. John. I am pleased to report that there has been a large attendance and much valuable instruction given.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

In recognition of the great kindness shown your representatives while in England during the Peace Celebration, I would recommend that the following brethren be constituted members of this Grand Lodge, and that Past Grand Rank be conferred upon them respectively.

I further recommend that an increase in salary be given to the R.W. Grand Secretary.

I also recommend that the usual grant be made next year for instruction to subordinate Lodges.

#### SPECIAL INVITATIONS.

On March the eleventh, your Grand Master received an invitation to visit the Grand Lodge of Maine, which will celebrate its 100th Anniversary in the City of Portland, on Wednesday, May the fifth.

#### GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS.

In closing this my third Annual report, as I am about to lay down the gavel you placed in my hands three years ago, I wish to thank Almighty God for the many blessings that have come to us as a Grand Lodge.

Many of our brethren who were overseas engaged in the Great War, have returned home and we have the great pleasure of meeting them again in our Lodge rooms. Many will never return. We mourn for them but look forward to the time when we will meet again where there will be no more parting.

During my three terms of office, it has been my great privilege to visit all but two Lodges in the jurisdiction. I have been accompanied by the R.W. Grand Secretary and G. D. of C., and I cannot speak too highly of the courtesy and help rendered by these two brethren.

I have also received great assistance from many other brethren during these visits, and as far as I am able to judge, the very best of brotherly feeling exists in all the Lodges.

In some instances I have felt it my duty to adminster a reprimand for lack of interest, or carelessness. The discipline in every case has been given and taken in the spirit of brotherly kindness, and has resulted in stimulating the brethren to better work.

I sincerely trust that my successor in office may have the same loyal support that has been accorded me, both from the officers and members of Grand Lodge as well as from the Craft at large.

I humbly pray that the very choicest blessing of the Great Architect of the Universe may always rest upon the Craft throughout this jurisdiction.

The books of Grand Lodge, both the Grand Treasurer's and my own, had to be closed for auditing on April 1st and certain payments since received are therefore not included in the above statement.

For this Grand Jurisdiction the above figures are altogether unprecedented, and they reveal, as perhaps no words can, how great have been the activities of the Private Lodges.

The dispensations were forty-four in number and fourteen of these were issued by the authority of the R.W. Deputy Grand Master during the Grand Master's visit to England. I doubt whether any previous Deputy Grand Master has had occasion to exercise this prerogative in New Brunswick.

Two Commissions have been received during the year; one from Rhode Island in favour of R.W. Brother George Ackman, P.D.G.M., and the other from Colorado for W. Brother George D. Ellis, G. D. of C.

The M.W. Grand Master's Commissions have issued in four instances, viz., to W. Brother William B. Alexander, near the Grand Lodge of New York; W. Brother Louis G. Klench, near the Grand Lodge of Montana, W. Brother S. C. D. Rea, near the Grand Lodge of Illinois, and W. Brother J. Bruce Cloyd, near the Grand Lodge of Tennessee.

Much delay has been experienced in procuring a supply of certificates to meet the demands of the year's returns. By direction of the Board of General Purposes an order was placed with the British American Bank Note Company, Ottawa, last autumn, but it was not until late in March that the Company was able to secure the needed parchment skins. The order has however at last been received, and the certificates are being sealed and inscribed with the Grand Master's name and so will soon be available for issue.

The motion was supported by R.W. Brother J. Gordon Forbes, P.G.M., who warmly commended the interest and energy of W. Brother George D. Ellis as Chairman of the Hall Committee.

The motion was declared Carried.

#### REPORT OF HALL COMMITTEE.

St. John, N. B., April 7th, 1920.

To the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation:

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The Managing Committee of the Masonic Hall beg to submit the following report:

Acting under your instructions, your Committee have extended the heating plant to the apartments occupied by the Municipality of the City and County of Saint John, thus connecting the entire building with the heating system. This work has cost more than your Committee estimated, but the saving in fuel justified the expenditure.

Your Committee has secured a competent engineer as caretaker of the building, and are paying him a salary of \$75.00 per month. The results have been most satisfactory and the consumption of coal considerably reduced. The building has been more uniformly heated, to the greater satisfaction of the tenants.

Notice has been given to the several tenants that rents will be advanced from May 1st. The increased revenue from this source will be \$820.00.

Owing to the ever increasing cost of maintenance, an appeal has been made to the different Masonic bodies occupying the Hall on long term leases, for an annual grant in addition to their present rents. This appeal has been met in a truly Masonic spirit by a majority of the bodies approached, and an increased revenue of about \$1,500.00 is expected as the result.

Luxor Temple has been granted the privilege of subletting a portion of their premises to the Knights of Pythias for one year. This body is making extensive improvements to their apartments. Some repairs have been found necessary to the main roof, and to the metal work on the east wall, as well as the replacing of some slates on the mansard roof. This work is now under way.

Your Committee would recommend a thorough inspection of the exterior of the building, as they feel the time has arrived to make extensive repairs to the east and south walls.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

## GRAND TREASURER'S REPORT.

IN ACCOUNT WITH THE MASONIC GRAND LODGE CORPORATION.

The M.W. Grand Master deserves the thanks of Grand Lodge for what was accomplished in these visits, and also in connection with the many visits to Lodges in his own jurisdiction.

It is also very gratifying to know that the Grand Master has received an invitation to visit the Grand Lodge of Maine at its One Hundredth Anniversary, in May next—as we understand that that M.W. Grand Lodge was the first Grand Body to recognize the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

Your Committee believes that Grand Lodge will heartily approve of the recommendation made in the Grand Master's address in respect to conferring Past Grand Rank upon the distinguished brethren in England, who manifested so much interest in the welfare of the representatives of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

R.W. Brother Thomas Walker expressed the strong hope that the invitation from the Grand Lodge of Maine, referred to by the Grand Master and by the Committee on his Address, would be accepted. The One Hundredth Anniversary was a notable circumstance in the history of any Grand Lodge; and as our relations with the Grand Lodge of Maine had ever been close and cordial this Grand Lodge should be worthily represented on the occasion.

R.W. Brother J. D. B. F. MacKenzie, Grand Masterelect concurred in the same hope though doubtful as to being able himself to attend.

A pleasant exchange of views followed and it was agreed that M.W. Brother D. C. Clark would represent Grand Lodge. With this happy understanding the matter rested.

At some little length the M.W. Grand Master referred to his term of service (now ending) as Grand Master. The three years had been the happiest in his life. 

# COPY OF CIRCULAR ISSUED BY THE UNITED GRAND LODGE OF ENGLAND.

AIMS AND RELATIONSHIPS OF THE CRAFT.

As a great deal of misapprehension appears to be entertained in some quarters concerning the aims and relationships of the United Grand Lodge of Antient, Free and Accepted Masons of England, I have been desired by the Grand Master to make the following statement regarding them.

The Grand Lodge of England — of which H.R.H. The Duke of Connaught has been for twenty years Grand Master, in succession to the late King Edward VII., himself Grand Master as Prince of Wales, from 1875 to 1901 has held strictly aloof throughout its history, which dates from 1717, from participation in public or political affairs. either national or international, considering itself precluded from taking any share in discussions on state policy. While thus standing aside from party divisions it has always inculcated patriotism in the citizen, and loyalty in the individual. It had not long been established when it publicly gave assurance of this to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. The assurance thus given in the reign of George I is emphasized in a special degree in that of George V. Everyone who comes into Freemasonry is strictly enjoined at the outset not to countenance any act which may have a tendency to subvert the peace and good order of society, to pay a due obedience to the law of any State in which he resides, and never to be remiss in the allegiance due to his Sovereign.

No secret is attaching to these duties, which are of the essence of Masonry as practised under the Jurisdiction of the United Grand Lodge of England, as well as by the Sister

Grand Lodges of Ireland, Scotland, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand, and, I have reason to believe, of the remainder of the English-speaking world.

Every English Lodge at its consecration is dedicated to God and to His Service; no one can become a Mason until he has declared his faith in the Supreme Being. As a consequence, men of every shade of political opinion and ministers of all religious denominations are members of and office-bearers in our organization, and Masonry thus provides a platform on which men of all conditions, classes, and creeds can work together for the common welfare. In Masonic Lodges all discussions on topics of a political or theological nature are strictly forbidden.

Because of its determination to preserve the position it has upheld for over two centuries, the Grand Lodge of England never takes part in any Masonic or quasi-Masonic gathering in which the fundamental Antient Landmarks of Freemasonry — which have been indicated above — are allowed to be regarded as open questions.

### DISTRICT No. 2.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons of the Province of New Brunswick:

MOST WORSHIFFUL SIR: I beg to submit my report as Deputy Grand Master, District No. 2.

On October 7th I had the pleasure of accompanying you and other Grand Lodge Officers on your official visitation of Salisbury Lodge, No. 20, Salisbury, where the F. C. degree was exemplified by W.M. Brother Gesner A. Taylor and his staff of officers; and on the same evening paid a visitation to Steven Lodge, No. 37, Petitcodiac, where the same degree was exemplified by W. Brother R. M. Owen, and officers of Steven Lodge.

On October 8th I again accompanied you on your official visitation of Zetland Lodge, No. 24, Shediac, on this occasion we witnessed the E. A. degree, P.M.W. Brother H. W. Murray occupying the chair.

Accompanied by a number of members of Keith and Tweedie Lodges, on November 4th paid an official visit to Howard Lodge, No. 15, Hillsboro, the chair being occupied by W. Brother Steeves. The F. ### DISTRICT No. 3.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

Most Worshipful Sir: I beg herewith to submit my report as District Deputy Grand Master for District No. 3.

I wish to thank you for the honor you have conferred upon me in appointing me to the position, and entrusting me with the duty of representing you in this district. I am sorry to state that owing to business, and unforeseen events, I was prevented from visiting all the Lodges in my jurisdiction. I did, however, the best I could under the circumstances.

On July 7th, last, I paid an official visit to Saint Andrew, No. 16, Richibucto, being accompanied by twenty-one officers and members of Northumberland, No. 17.
