#### OFFICIAL VISITS.

At the last Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, reference was made to an invitation from the Grand Lodge of Maine inviting the Grand Master of New Brunswick to participate in the celebration of the One Hundredth Anniversary of their Grand Lodge. As I had a business engagement in Ontario entered into before receiving the above invitation, I was compelled to forego the pleasure of fraternising with the brethren of Maine.

R. W. D. C. Clark, Past Grand Master, very kindly volunteered to represent this Grand Lodge on that occasion, and I commissioned him to do so.

Brother Clark, therefore, carried our fraternal greetings to the brethren in Maine and reports having been cordially received and lavishly entertained. Brother Clark very generously carried out his duties without any expense to this Grand Lodge.

On the first day of November I proceeded to Sussex and visited Zion Lodge, No. 21. W. M. A. E. Pearson met me at the depot, and a short time after we were joined by R. W. LeBaron Wilson, Deputy Grand Master, and the Grand Secretary who came up from St. John on the evening train. Later in the evening we were joined by R. W. Roy E. Crawford, Junior Grand Warden, V. W. The Reverend C. Gordon Lawrence, Grand Chaplain, W. Dr. J. S. Bentley, Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies, R. W. S. H. Flewwelling, Past Senior Grand Warden, and R. W. Francis F. Burpee, Past Junior Grand Warden. We were very cordially received by the brethren of Zion Lodge and witnessed the Master Mason's degree conferred on two candidates in an excellent manner, adding much to its impressiveness. After Lodge closed refreshments were served and a musical programme provided which was very much enjoyed.

Next morning we proceeded to St. John, and in the evening I visited St. John's Lodge, No. 2— a large number of Grand Lodge officers being in attendance— and witnessed the First degree conferred in a creditable manner. After Lodge closed refreshments were served in the banquet hall and a pleasant hour spent.

On Thursday evening, November 4th, I visited Carleton Union Lodge, No. 8, with the Grand Lodge officers in support. We were most kindly received by W. M. J. P. Cruikshank and the brethren, a large number of whom were present. The Third degree was excellently worked, after which adjournment was made to the banquet hall where a banquet was served in the style and manner for which the brethren of Carleton Union are famous. Speeches were made by Past Grand Master H. S. Bridges, the Deputy Grand Master, and several others. A pleasing incident occurred when three generations of Brother Wilson's family were seated at the table. A very pleasant evening was spent.

Next evening, November 5th, I went to Hampton in W. Brother Bentley's car which was thoughtfully placed at the disposal of the Grand Lodge officers, several of whom attended, and visited Corinthian Lodge, No. 13. A very cordial welcome was accorded, the Third degree being conferred in a manner that allowed of no criticism. It was a pleasure to meet the brethren of Corinthian Lodge in their beautiful home-like rooms. A banquet and musical programme were provided and thoroughly enjoyed.

On November 15th, accompanied by R. W. D. C. Clark, Past Grand Master, R. W. J. H. Hawthorne, Senior Grand Warden, V. W. Geo. D. Ellis, Grand Treasurer, R. W. J. T. Hartt, Grand Secretary, R. W. R. S. Barker, Past Deputy Grand Master, and W. Brother Percy Burchill, Grand Director of Ceremonies, I visited Alexandria Lodge, No. 33, at Devon. The Entered Apprentice degree was

conferred on two candidates, after which refreshments were served. There was a good attendance of the brethren, several from Hiram Lodge coming over for the occasion.

Next evening, November 16th, Hiram Lodge, No. 6, Fredericton, was visited. The same Grand Lodge officers were in attendance, and in addition the V. W. Grand Chaplain and Senior Grand Deacon joined us. The Worshipful Master and brethren of Hiram Lodge, noted for its hospitality, extended a very cordial welcome. The Third degree was conferred in an excellent manner, a sumptuous banquet prepared by the ladies of the Eastern Star being afterward partaken of. Speeches were made by Past Grand Master Clark, the Grand Secretary, the Grand Chaplain, Senior Grand Deacon, Grand Director of Ceremonies, and others. An orchestra was in attendance and a musical programme was enjoyed. A delightful evening was spent.

Next day, November 17th, accompanied by the Grand Treasurer, Grand Chaplain, and Grand Director of Ceremonies, I went to Woodstock and visited Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, where a hearty welcome was accorded us. This Lodge is in a most prosperous condition, the brethren being enthusiastic and diligent, taking great interest in their work and pride in their Lodge. I installed R. W. Brother Edgar W. Mair as District Deputy Grand Master for District No. 4, after which the Entered Apprentice degree was conferred in a manner leaving nothing to be desired. Refreshments were served, and songs by several of the brethren enlivened the proceeding.

Leaving next morning for Florenceville, accompanied by the Grand Treasurer and Grand Director of Ceremonies, I visited Carleton Lodge, No. 35, in the evening. This Lodge has been laboring under difficulties, many of the brethren living in the surrounding country several miles from Lodge headquarters. There has been a large debt on their building, which, however, the Worshipful Master stated had been considerably reduced during the year. The kind words of advice offered by the Grand Master who visited them on a previous occasion, R. W. D. C. Clark, have evidently borne fruit as the brethren were greatly encouraged thereby, and at the present time I found them quite enthusiastic and working hard to perfect themselves in the work of the Ritual and bring the Lodge up to a high standard. There being no candidate present the Entered Apprentice degree was exemplified and, where necessary, errors were pointed out by the Grand Treasurer. who represented the Ritual Committee on that occasion. We were entertained with refreshments at a nearby restaurant. We were taken back to Woodstock the same night by Brothers Hayden and Strong, of Woodstock Lodge, who were good enough to come for us with their car.

On December 3rd, supported by a complete staff of Grand Lodge officers, I visited Albion Lodge, No. 1, in the City of St. John. Worshipful Master Dr. Malcolm and the brethren, of whom there was a large number present, gave us a most cordial welcome. It was a pleasure to witness the precision of the work in the Third degree which was conferred on a candidate. This Lodge has an excellent staff of officers. A banquet and musical and literary entertainment brought a pleasant evening to a close.

I was very glad to be able to accept the invitation of the Worshipful Master of Hibernia Lodge, No. 3, at the personal request of the Worshipful Master-elect, Brother Stanley M. Wetmore, to visit the Lodge and install the Worshipful Master. On January 11th I made the promised visit and installed Brother Wetmore as Worshipful Master, a complete staff of Grand Lodge officers supporting. The Worshipful Master recognizing a weakness in the chain of officers in line for promotion, had the courage of his convictions and placed two Past Masters in the Wardens'

chairs. This was accomplished without the least friction, and is to be commended. I understand the Lodge is much benefited thereby, efficiency of the officers being recognized as the great desideratum. I had the pleasure of presenting, at the request of the Worshipful Master, a Past Master's Jewel to W. Brother Robert Clerke, Secretary of the Lodge, and Grand Tyler of this Grand Lodge, as a token of their esteem for this Brother who has served the Craft continuously for fifty years, a distinction reached by only a few. An adjournment was made to the club rooms where a banquet was served which, together with a musical programme and speeches by Past Grand Master H. S. Bridges, Worshipful Master C. D. Strong, of St. John's Lodge, and others, was greatly enjoyed.

On January 18th I left for Sackville to visit Lebanon Lodge, No. 28, but was held up on the road by a wrecked freight train, and only got as far as Moncton the next morning at four o'clock. R. W. Brother Francis F. Burpee, who was to join me at Sackville, explained the situation to the brethren and assisted at the installation of the Worshipful Master and officers.

Next evening, January 19th, I visited Keith Lodge, No. 23, at Moncton. R. W. D. C. Clark, Past Grand Master, Geo. D. Ellis, Grand Treasurer, and S. H. Flewwelling, Past Senior Grand Warden, joined us, as well as Past Masters Rodd and Woodworth, of Lebanon Lodge, and Williston, of Northumberland Lodge. W.M. Robertson received us very cordially and conferred the Entered Apprentice degree very satisfactorily although this was the first time the newly installed officers had worked together. This Lodge is very prosperous and is ambitious for newer and larger quarters, although the Lodge room is very comfortable and attractive. Refreshments were served and a pleasant hour was spent talking with the brethren, a large number being present.

On the twenty-first day of March I officially visited Miramichi Lodge, No. 18, at Chatham. The Grand Treasurer and Grand Director of Ceremonies, along with several Past Masters of Northumberland Lodge, No. 17, as Grand officers accompanied me. Needless to say the welcome by the brethren was enthusiastic and demonstrative. Worshipful Master R. A. Snowball and his regular officers conferred the Master Mason's degree in a satisfactory manner, all the more so as this was the first time the newly installed officers had worked it. Adjournment to the banquet hall followed and a sumptuous repast was enjoyed. Speeches were made by the Grand Treasurer, Grand Director of Ceremonies, Past Master E. W. Jarvis, R. W. R. A. Logie, Past Junior Grand Warden, and others. Worshipful Master Snowball and brethren of Miramichi Lodge proved to be genial hosts.

Leaving the next day, accompanied by the Grand Director of Ceremonies and Brother R. A. Snowball, I went to Campbellton, where we were joined by District Deputy Grand Master A. B. MacKinnon. The same evening I visited Campbellton Lodge, No. 32, where a large number of brethren had assembled to give us a hearty welcome. W. M. Matthews and his officers conferred the Entered Apprentice degree on a candidate in the same careful manner in which Campbellton Lodge always exemplifies the work. I installed Past Master the Reverend Hugh Millar as Grand Steward, after which a banquet was partaken of in the banquet room of the Lodge. The brethren then adjourned to the Lodge room again, where a pleasant hour was spent enjoying the speeches and anecdotes of several of the brethren. This Lodge is one of the most prosperous in the jurisdiction. The membership is large and the brethren support their officers well by a large attendance at all meetings.

The next day, the twenty-third of March, we left for Dalhousie. Several of the brethren from Campbellton going with us. In the evening we visited Restigouche Lodge, No. 25, the Past Masters present from Campbellton Lodge, W. M. Snowball of Miramichi Lodge, Brother P. G. McFarlane, Past Master of Sussex Lodge, No. 7, and the Grand Director of Ceremonies, supporting as Grand Lodge officers. W. M. MacKay and the brethren received us in a very cordial manner. Brother A. B. MacKinnon, Past Master, had been appointed District Deputy Grand Master for District No. 3, and I took the opportunity of installing him as such. The Entered Apprentice degree was conferred on a candidate, the work being exemplified quite satisfactorily. At the request of the Worshipful Master I unveiled a Memorial Tablet erected by the brethren of the Lodge in memory of Brother Robert Mackie who was killed in action. After Lodge closed a splendid banquet was served, provided by the Ladies' Aid of the Memorial Hospital at Campbellton. Speeches were made by Brothers Andrew, Alexander and Collier, of Campbellton Lodge; McFarlane, of Sussex Lodge; R. A. Snowball, the Grand Director of Ceremonies, and others. A pleasant and profitable evening was spent.

Northumberland Lodge, No. 17, at Newcastle, was visited the next evening. The Grand Director of Ceremonies and twenty of the brethren of Miramichi Lodge accompanied me. The welcome was demonstrative, Worshipful Master Coudsi making it plain that the brethren of this Lodge appreciated a visit from the Grand Master. The Fellow Craft degree was exemplified in a careful manner after which we proceeded to the refectory of the Methodist Church where a splendid banquet had been prepared by the Ladies' Aid of that church. Ample justice was done to the good things provided, and speeches were made by several of the brethren. Music was provided by an orchestra.

The tour of the North Shore Lodges was most pleasant and profitable, the brethren evidently appreciating the honor of selecting one of their members by Grand Lodge for the most honorable position of Grand Master. In fact, the brethren of all the Lodges visited throughout the province were most kind and cordial in their welcome.

I am convinced that the visits of the Grand Lodge officers are looked forward to by the brethren with delight and stimulate the interest in Lodge work. The utmost harmony and good feeling prevails, so far as I can judge, in every district I visited. I am under many obligations to the brethren for the kindness and uniform courtesy extended to me on every occasion.

I wish to express my personal thanks to Right Worshipful D. C. Clark, Past Grand Master, Right Worshipful J. Twining Hartt, Grand Secretary, Very Worshipful George D. Ellis, Grand Treasurer, Very Worshipful the Reverend C. Gordon Lawrence, Grand Chaplain, Worshipful J. Percy Burchill, Grand Director of Ceremonies and Worshipful John S. Bentley, M.D., Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies, for the loyal support they gave me throughout the year; some of them I am sure at great personal inconvenience and expense, joining me in visiting the more distant Lodges.

Sixteen brethren residing in Blackville and vicinity applied by petition for a warrant to hold a new Lodge. The petition was recommended by the Worshipful Master, Wardens, and brethren of Northumberland Lodge, No. 17.

As these sixteen members of the Craft living twenty-five miles from the nearestLodge were thus debarred from many of the benefits of Masonry, I issued a dispensation authorizing them to meet as a Lodge. Before doing so, I visited the locality and ascertained that the conditions were favorable for a successful Lodge, and on the ninth day of August I visited Blackville accompanied by R. W. Brother

Clark, Past Grand Master, and R. W. Brother Hartt, Grand Secretary, V. W. Brother Ellis, Grand Treasurer, and about twenty brethren of Northumberland and Miramichi Lodges and organized the Lodge under dispensation. Since that time, one of the members has erected a new building part of which has been set apart as a very comfortable lodge room. The brethren have provided the lodge with suitable furniture and regalia costing fourteen hundred dollars without any charge on the Lodge.

The report of the Board of General Purposes, as well as those of the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer, will be laid before you and will show a healthy increase both financially and numerically. The Grand Master or the Board of General Purposes has not been called upon to adjust or settle any important questions between lodges or individual members during the year. All is peace and harmony within the jurisdiction.

Several Lodges have submitted By-Laws for approval, changes mostly relating to increased fees and dues. In most cases the changes were approved as asked for; in others, slight amendments were made before giving final approval.

Our relations with Grand Lodges with which we hold fraternal intercourse continue to be harmonious. The Grand Secretary's Report will contain the names of the brethren recommended to represent other Grand Lodges near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick where vacancies occurred.

The pleasing intelligence comes to us from England, that the two eldest sons of His Majesty The King have been appointed and invested Senior Wardens. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, who first set foot on Canadian soil in this City of Saint John, and who during his tour of Canada endeared himself to all Canadians, has been invested Senior Warden of the Household Brigade Lodge,

No. 2614, and His Royal Highness the Duke of York has received the same distinction in the Navy Lodge, No. 2612. Thus in another twelve months, both these illustrious brethren will be constitutionally qualified to achieve what many Masons consider the highest honor the Craft can bestow on any of its members "The Mastership of their mother Lodge."

I would strongly endorse the recommendation as set forth by the Grand Master in his annual address to the brethren at a previous session of Grand Lodge, that the office of the Grand Secretary should be located in the Masonic Temple. Suitable rooms could be easily set aside in the building not only as an office where the Grand Secretary and assistant could be available during business hours, but also as a depot for Masonic supplies.

During my official visits, I noticed some brethren, especially in the outside districts, indifferently supplied with proper Masonic Regalia. The quality procured by individual members is often of very inferior material and workmanship. If Grand Lodge would authorize the Grand Secretary to procure standard material guaranteed as to quality from a responsible supply house and furnish it to Private Lodges on repayment, we would have all the brethren properly clothed at less cost to themselves than at present, and I believe it would be a source of revenue to Grand Lodge as well.

I would recommend that both these suggestions be carefully looked into by the Board of General Purposes.

I hope and trust that the deliberations of this communication will be for the material benefit of the Craft.

#### REPORT OF HALL COMMITTEE.

St. John, April 18, 1921.

To the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation:

The Managing Committee of the Masonic Hall beg to report as follows:

The repairs to the exterior of the building have been carried out as directed by you.

The gravel roof has been patched where necessary and the grating over the central water conductor renewed. The brick work on the top of the east wall has been repaired and covered with metal; all the galvanized work on the roof including the towers has been painted, and the loose slates on the west mansard roof have been replaced by copper. This your Committee feel will be more durable, and will prevent any danger from slates falling to the pavement. Nearly \$1,000.00 has been expended on this work.

The east wall has been repointed; extensive repairs have also been made to the towers over the main entrance. These were found to be in such a serious condition, that it was necessary to take down one section, and have it re-built, but your Committee felt the expenditure necessary to preserve the fabric. Three galvanized water conductors were replaced by conductors of copper. This work cost nearly \$1,200.00.

Both the boilers and all the steam pipes are being covered with asbestos.

The location of the drain pipe in the boiler room has been changed, so as to give more room in front of the furnaces; an opening has been made in the sidewalk for the removal of ashes, thus saving a hoist of two flights in the rear.

Your Committee are pleased to report that the several Masonic bodies, who promised financial assistance, have paid in \$1,298.00, in addition to their rents. Some of these bodies have very generously agreed to increase the grant, and an additional sum of \$375.00 is looked for from this source.

The large store over G. & E. Blake's shop has been fitted up and rented to the National Clothing Co., as a sample room, at a yearly rental of \$360.00. All the Germain Street stores have been leased to the present occupants at a combined increased rental of \$400.00. Your Committee therefore anticipate an increase in the rental receipts of about \$1,100.00 for the coming year.

This should make the total receipts from this source about \$7,940.00, while the estimated expenditures for the same period will be about \$8,500.00.



The Commission was dated at Washington, March 8th, 1921, and signed by Charles J. O'Neill, Grand Master, and A. W. Johnston, Grand Secretary.

The Commissions having been first read, the three Grand Representatives were formally conducted to the East, and welcomed by the Grand Master. They were then saluted with the Grand Honours.

Moved by R.W. Bro. William B. Wallace, P.D.G.M., seconded by W. Bro. Malcolm L. McPhail, P.A.G.D. of C.,

"That the sum of Five Hundred Dollars be placed at the disposal of the M.W. Grand Master to meet the expenses of visiting and instructing the Private Lodges."—Carried.

Also on like motion, Resolved,

"That the customary grant of Thirty Dollars be voted to the Library Committee."

It was agreed on motion of W. Bro. A. M. Rowan, P.G.Std.B., that when Grand Lodge takes recess, it take recess until three o'clock to-morrow, Wednesday afternoon.

Moved by W. Bro. G. Percy Burchill, G. D. of C., seconded by R.W. Bro. James Vroom, P.D.G.M.,

"That the thanks of Grand Lodge and more especially of the members from elsewhere in the Province be extended to the members from the City of St. John for their agreeable hospitality at the supper hour this evening." Both mover and seconder spoke of the fraternal goodwill which the social gathering had evoked and which had greatly induced a cordial spirit among all the members.

The motion was supported by W. Bro. James McQueen, G.Swd.B., and was *Carried* unanimously.

The vote of thanks was acknowledged by the R.W. Deputy Grand Master.

Moved by Past Grand Master Whitlock, seconded by Past Grand Master Clark,

"That the Ritual Committee be requested to arrange for the exemplification of degree work at the next Annual Communication."—Carried.

Grand Lodge then took recess.

### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON,

April 27th, 1921.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at 3 o'clock, the Grand Master, M.W. Lt.-Colonel J. D. B. F. MacKenzie, in the East.

R.W. Bro. James Vroom, P.D.G.M., presented the following report of the Committee on the Grand Master's Address, and on its being read it was *Resolved* on motion of Past Grand Master Forbes,

"That the report be received and adopted."

#### REPORT ON GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the M. W. Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

#### BRETHREN:

Your Special Committee to whom was referred the Grand Master's Address beg leave to report thereon as follows:

Grand Lodge rejoices in the unusual prosperity of the Craft in this jurisdiction, to which the M.W. Grand Master calls attention, and will heartily join with him in hoping that our most cherished faith and doctrines will spread as rapidly as our membership, and that our teachings will extend beyond the bounds of our Fraternity until all men acknowledge the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man.

noted with pleasure the advancement in Masonry of Their Royal Highnesses The Prince of Wales and The Duke of York.


