

The M.W. Grand Master delivered the following address:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

After an interval of sixteen months, we again meet in regular session of Grand Lodge, and I bid you welcome to this the Fifty-Fifth Communication and offer my congratulations to you on the continued progress of the craft in this jurisdiction. The past year has been one of considerable Masonic activity, and although the net gain in membership has not been as great as the year previous, which was one of unusual increase, still the gain has been reasonable and gratifying. I feel that the progress has been healthy and that all care has been exercised in the selection of material. I note while making official visits, that the very best men in the community are members of the craft. This is as it should be, only the very best material should enter into the

I can only conclude that the craft is in a very flourishing condition and there is no disturbing element to check the onward march of Freemasonry in New Brunswick.

The financial position of Grand Lodge is very satisfactory as will be shown by the reports of the Grand Treasurer and the Grand Lodge Corporation.

The Committee administrating the latter body is to be congratulated upon having been successful in considerably increasing the revenue.

The unrest alluded to in my address to Grand Lodge last year is still very much in evidence, although the greatest statesmen are using every possible means to settle the affairs of the world.

The present moment finds labor conditions on this continent very unsettled. The coal and railway strikes in the republic to the south of us, as well as the threatened railway strike in Canada threaten to bring misery to many. Let us hope this unrest will soon be settled, and that the

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principles we are taught in Masonry will be the ruling factor.

Masons should ever ask for more light and go in search of justice, and be prepared to take our part as individual citizens to bring about all that our craft stands for.

The year past has brought sorrow by the loss we have sustained in the death of some of our most devoted Craftsmen who have passed beyond the Veil which no mortal has ever lifted. Of these, the following had served in office in Grand Lodge:

On June 10th, 1921, I went to Port Elgin to meet several brethren who were desirous of forming a lodge in that section of the country.

The Grand Secretary and W. Bro. L. P. Stratton, D. D. G. M. of that district, accompanied me. After consultation and finding the sixteen brethren present, mostly young men full of enthusiasm for Masonry, I consented to grant a Dispensation under the name of Westmorland Lodge. I visited this lodge officially on July 17th last, accompanied by the same officers of Grand Lodge as well as W. Bro, R. A. Snowball, G. Steward, and several brethren from Keith and Tweedie Lodges, Moncton.

I was most agreeably surprised to find the W.M. and his officers so proficient in the Ritual. The Third degree was most admirably conferred entirely by the acting officers of the lodge. The membership has now increased to thirty, and Bro. Fraser, the acting Master, is to be congratulated on the success of the lodge. The proceedings up to July



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have been forwarded and placed before the Committee on Warrants, and I would recommend without any hesitation

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I would also recommend that a Charter be granted to Blackville Lodge, at present working under dispensation. I visited this lodge on several occasions unofficially, and consider that it is qualified to carry on as a Chartered lodge. The membership is steadily increasing. Copies of the

records have been submitted to the Committee on Warrants. Shortly before the last Annual Communication, an invitation was received from the Grand Secretary of Nova Scotia asking your Grand Master to visit the Nova Scotia Lodge of Research which would convene at Digby on June 8th, 1921, and also pay an official visit to the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia which would be in session at the same place the next day. I was very glad to be able to accept the invitation, and on the 7th June I left by boat for Digby, the following brethren from this jurisdiction supporting: Right Worshipful James Vroom, Right Worshipful F. F. Burpee, Very Worshipful C. Gordon Lawrence, Grand Chaplain, Very Worshipful George D. Ellis, Grand Treasurer, Worshipful R. A. Snowball, Grand Steward, and Wor. Glendon H. Allan, Worshipful Master of Carleton Union Lodge. The evening of arrival we attended informally the meeting of the Lodge of Research and had the pleasure of listening to a very interesting paper read by our Right Worshipful Brother Vroom on the "Early History of Freemasonry in New Brunswick." Some instructive papers were also read by members of the Lodge on "Early Masonic History in Nova Scotia."

The next morning we paid an official visit to the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, and attended Divine Service with the brethren. We were most cordially welcomed by Most Worshipful Grand Master MacDougall, of Nova Scotia, and received an enthusiastic reception from the members.

At the evening session, which we attended informally, a resolution was passed to present the Most Worshipful Grand Master of New Brunswick with a Bronze Medallion as a token of the appreciation of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia toward the brethren of New Brunswick. A very graceful compliment to you, brethren, and an honour highly appreciated by your Grand Master.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

In due course I received a request from the Grand Secretary of Nova Scotia to visit St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 1. at Halifax, on the 7th day of February of this year, when the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Nova Scotia would present the Medallion granted at the Annual Convention at Digby. I went to Halifax on the date specified and found the Most Worshipful Grand Master with his Grand Officers in charge of St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 1.

I was received with all the honours due the office and received the Medallion, which is known as the "Erasmus James Phillips Medallion" in honour of the first provincial Grand Master of Nova Scotia, 1738-1760. There was a large gathering present of the brethren of St. Andrew's Lodge, which is "The oldest lodge in the British Empire overseas." having been organized in 1750 by the Hon. Edward Cornwallis, the founder of Halifax. A banquet brought a very interesting visit to a close.

My first official visit was made on June 10th to Tweedie Lodge, No. 41, Moncton, accompanied by the Grand Secretary. After installing L. P. Stratton as District Deputy Grand Master for District No 2, I witnessed the E. A. degree exemplified very satisfactorily. There are many energetic brethren in this lodge who take pride in keeping up the standard of their lodge. A banquet was partaken of at "The Green Lantern" with eighty brethren present. Short addresses were made and songs were sung by several brethren. A very pleasant evening was spent.

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On the 19th June I attended Divine Service with the brethren of Northumberland Lodge, No. 17, Newcastle, a large number coming from Miramichi Lodge as well as from Campbellton and Blackville. The Very Worshipful Rev. C. Gordon Lawrence, Grand Chaplain, preached a most inspiring sermon.

I spent a week in the southern part of the province beginning on Monday, July 11th. On that date I visited St. Mark's Lodge, at St. Andrews. I was accompanied by the Grand Chaplain and Grand Director of Ceremonies. Unfortunately I did not witness any work, but spent a pleasant hour in conversation with the brethren, after which refreshments were served.

The next morning we left for Grand Manan. At St. Stephen we were joined by R. W. Past Grand Master D. C. Clark, V. W. Grand Treasurer G. D. Ellis, R. W. F. F. Burpee, and W. R. A. Snowball, Grand Steward. The same evening we visited Mananook Lodge, No. 38, and received a very cordial welcome from a large number of enthusiastic brethren. The Worshipful Master was unable to be present. A candidate for the Entered Apprentice degree having been announced the brethren made an urgent request that the officers of Grand Lodge exemplify the work, which request was acceded to with Past Grand Master Clark in the East, Grand Director of Ceremonies Burchill in the West, Grand Steward R. A. Snowball in the South, R.W. F. F. Burpee, Senior Deacon, and V. W. Ellis, Grand Treasurer, Junior Deacon. The brethren present asked many questions after the degree was finished.

This lodge is composed of brethren who seldom have an opportunity to visit other lodges in this jurisdiction and apparently appreciated our visit. Refreshments and an address by the Grand Chaplain ended a very satisfactory evening. 1922] GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK. 95

Returning to the mainland the next day, a visit was made to Alley Lodge, No. 14, at Upper Mills. There was a small attendance. The evening was spent instructing the officers in the Ritual. The building in which the lodge is situated is owned by the Lodge, and there is a satisfactory amount of funds on hand. The community is small, but the brethren present were apparently quite enthusiastic.

The following evening, July 14th, we visited Victoria Lodge, No. 26, Milltown. The Worshipful Master Lieut.-Colonel W. H. Laughlin, and the brethren, received us very cordially. This is one of the best conducted lodges in the jurisdiction. The officers put on the Entered Apprentice degree in a manner leaving nothing to be desired.

The tour ended the next evening by a visit to Sussex Lodge, No. 7, St. Stephen. There was a large attendance of the brethren who appeared to appreciate the visit of the officers of Grand Lodge. The F. C. degree was conferred on five candidates and was well done. We were afterwards entertained with refreshments. Making St. Stephen our headquarters for the week, the daytime was very pleasantly spent in the company of R. W. J. T. Whitlock, P. G. M., R. W. James Vroom, and W. W. B. Hawthorne, P. D. D. G. M., to whom I wish to express sincere thanks for the courtesies shown us.

On Monday, April 25th, I visited Steven Lodge, No. 37, Petitcodiac, at the request of the Worshipful Master of Campbellton Lodge, No. 32, and on the invitation of the Worshipful Master of Steven Lodge, for the purpose of attending Divine Service and unveiling a Memorial Tablet to our late Brother Frank Lockhart, who was killed in action overseas. This tablet was presented to Steven Lodge and erected in the Baptist Church by the brethren of Campbellton Lodge, of which the late Brother Lockhart was a member. This brotherly act on the part of Camp

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bellton Lodge in erecting the tablet in the church in which our late Brother worshipped in his home town is to be commended, and in doing so they put into practice one of the principles of Masoury, brotherly love. I was accompanied on the occasion by Brothers Chas. A. Alexander, Past Grand Warden, A. A. Andrew, P. D. D. G. M., and J. W. Patterson, P. D. D. G. M., of Campbellton Lodge, as well as the Grand Director of Ceremonies, G. P. Burchill, and R. A. Snowball, Grand Steward.

I again visited Steven Lodge on Sunday, August 28th, to perform a like duty in the church at Canaan, the brethren of Steven Lodge having erected a Memorial Tablet to the memory of Brother James William Corey, who was also killed in action. A large number of brethren from nearby lodges attended.

On September 20th I dedicated the Lodge Room of Blackville Lodge, U. D., being accompanied by R. W. Robert Murray, P.D.G.M., the Grand Treasurer, Grand Secretary, Grand Director of Ceremonies and W. R. A. Snowball. Many brethren from Northumberland and Miramichi Lodges attended. The brethren of Blackville entertained us at a banquet which lasted until a very late hour.

October 20th, on invitation of the Worshipful Master of Lodge St. John, No. 27, I went to Bathurst accompanied by R. W. George Ackman, P.D.G.M., R. A. Logie, P.G.W., and W. R. A. Snowball. The Fellow Craft degree was exemplified in as perfect a manner as could be desired. The manner in which the Senior Deacon, V. W. the Rev. A. D. Archibald, did his work and delivered the lecture was a treat worth listening to. After a banquet in the hall downstairs, an adjournment was made again to the lodge room where a pleasant hour was spent in a social talk. 1922] GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.


January 17th, 1922, I visited Lebanon Lodge, Sackville, and installed the officers. Several brethren from Chatham and Moncton were present. Light refreshments were served.

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May 11th, I visited The New Brunswick Lodge, No. 22. I was supported on this occasion by a full staff of officers of Grand Lodge. The Master Mason degree was conferred on two candidates. It goes without saying that New Brunswick Lodge is excelled by no lodge in this jurisdiction for good work. The brethren are alive to the interests of Masonry, and take pride in their lodge as was manifest by the large number present. We were entertained in the Temple Club Room after the lodge was closed.

On the second evening after, the 16th, I visited The Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10. A full staff, as on the previous occasion, was present. Worshipful Master Sawaya received us very cordially and stated that the lodge was in a very flourishing condition. The Third degree was conferred, and the Worshipful Master had the work well in hand, with a good staff of officers, as was to be expected. Refreshments were served afterwards in the Temple Room, and we were pleasantly entertained for a couple of hours with a musical programme.

Ashlar Lodge, No. 36, McAdam, was visited on May 18th. The Deputy Grand Master, R. W. F. F. Burpee, W. S. P. McCavour, W. Chas D. Strong, Grand Steward; W. P. S. M. Wetmore, of Hibernia Lodge were up from St. John in support. W. H. Priestman, District Deputy Grand Master, was also present. We witnessed conferring of the Third degree on three candidates, and the work was well done. Worshipful Master Fraser is very energetic and has some excellent officers. A banquet in their comfortable room downstairs was served, and speeches made by Deputy Grand Master Wilson, and others. It was well



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into morning before the brethren of Ashlar Lodge would allow us to depart.

I received an invitation from the Worshipful Master of Benjamin Lodge, No. 31, Andover, to visit them, which I did on the 6th June accompanied by the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary. This is a very prosperous lodge. The officers conferred the Third degree on four candidates in a very satisfactory manner. The lodge room is one of the best in the jurisdiction, with a club room below where the brethren meet nightly in social intercourse. A banquet served at midnight was enlivened by short speeches, songs, etc., a very pleasant night terminated in

I took advantage while in that part of the province to visit Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39, at Grand Falls, and also Bethel Lodge, No. 40, at Edmundston.

The Worshipful Master of the former was unfortunately not present, and as there was not any candidate the Grand Secretary gave the officers instruction for an hour and answered many questions. Although this lodge raised eighteen candidates last year, there was not a large attendance. Those who were present, some coming twelve miles, were very anxious to perfect themselves in the Ritual. Light refreshments were served. Worshipful Brother A. D. McCain, D. D. G. M., who met us at Florenceville and took us in his car this far on our journey, left us here, and Brother H. Chapman very kindly drove us in his car to Edmundston on June 8th, on evening of which we visited Bethel Lodge. The brethren received us very kindly and were apparently glad to have the Grand Lodge officers with them. They have a splendid lodge, and there are some bright young officers who conferred the F. C. degree on three candidates, the work being done very well. We did ample justice to the usual banquet provided.

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
On June 26th and 27th Howard Lodge, No. 15, Hillsboro, and Sussex Lodge, No. 4, Dorchester, were visited, accompanied by a large number of brethren from Keith and Tweedie Lodges, of Moncton, to whom I am under many obligations.

Howard Lodge is doing good work, the officers are well up in the Ritual and the attendance was large. We were entertained with light refreshments.

Sussex Lodge, Dorchester, is one of the smaller lodges, but the brethren are loyal members of the craft and much interested in the welfare of the lodge. The Worshipful Master, R. W. A. W. Chapman, is energetic, and work in the E. A. degree was well done. Refreshments were served, and a social hour was spent conversing with the brethren.

Tuesday, July 4th, I went to St. George accompanied by R. W. LeB. Wilson, Deputy Grand Master, the Grand Secretary and W. Stanley M. Wetmore, of Hibernia Lodge. and met the brethren of St. George Lodge, No. 12. This is a very flourishing and successful lodge owning a good building and a nice lodge room and well equipped club room for the use of the members. We were very cordially received, and were informed that it was five years since a Grand Master had visited there. Although they have had no special instruction in the Ritual during that time the Entered Apprentice degree was exemplified to the satisfaction of the members of the Ritual Committee who were present.

St. Martins Lodge, No. 30, was visited on July 10th, twenty-five of the brethren from St. John, and the Senior Grand Warden and Grand Chaplain, from Hampton, supporting me. There being no candidate in waiting, the Worshipful Master requested the brethren of Grand Lodge to exemplify the Entered Apprentice degree, which request



was acceded to, Past Masters from lodges in St. John assuming the offices. Refreshments were served. This was an exceedingly pleasant visit.

The week of Monday, the 17th, to Friday, the 21st July, was taken up visiting the lodges in Westmorland and Kent counties. Salisbury Lodge was first visited. We found a fair attendance of brethren. W. Bro. Gesner A. Taylor, Past Master of this lodge and Past District Deputy Grand Master, was one of the first to greet us. We spent a very pleasant evening, refreshments being served and a pressing invitation to come again. This lodge is flourishing,

Albert Lodge, No. 34, was visited the next evening. many of the brethren from Keith and Tweedie Lodges were present. A most cordial welcome was extended to us from the large number of brethren present. There is a lot of good material in this lodge, everyone being enthused with the spirit of Masonry, earnest and attentive to instruction, Speeches and anecdotes along with refreshments made a pleasant evening pass quickly.

Wednesday evening Zetland Lodge, No. 24, Shediac, was visited. This lodge is unfortunately situated inasmuch as there is not much desirable material to draw from.

Friday evening, the 21st, found us at Richibucto to meet the brethren of Lodge St. Andrew, No. 16. I was somewhat disappointed at the small attendance. Although this is a lodge with a membership of sixty there is only about twenty per cent. of that number residing in the immediate vicinity, which may account for the small number present. The Secretary not being at his post, I could not ascertain if all the brethren had been notified. There are, however, some bright young members who I hope will take hold and lift the lodge out of the rut into which it has apparently drifted. They are very anxious for instruction and on 1922

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request the Entered Apprentice degree was conferred upon a candidate, who was in waiting, by some of the brethren from Northumberland and Miramichi Lodges, about twenty of whom came over to join us that evening. After refreshments and more requests to send some one to give them instruction, we left for home having completed a very satisfactory week's work.

I reached my objective on August 7th, by visiting Sunbury Lodge, No. 42, accompanied by W. Bros. R. A.

Snowball, G. Steward, and G. H. Harrison, P. M. Miramichi Lodge.

On arriving at Fredericton Junction we found the following brethren from St. John: The Deputy Grand Master, Grand Treasurer, F. F. Burpee, P. G. W., and J. Thornton, P. G. W.

We were very cordially received and witnessed the Third degree conferred on a candidate quite satisfactorily. This lodge is very prosperous with a comfortable lodge room in a building owned by the lodge. After refreshments were served, a very pleasant two hours were spent in speeches and conversation among the brethren.

This concluded my official visits for the year, having, during my two terms in office, visited every lodge in the

jurisdiction. The District Deputy Grand Masters have been very attentive to their duties visiting all the lodges in their districts at least once and some of them twice. Their reports will be placed before you.

There is a persistent request or demand from the lodges for more instruction. They are beginning to realize more and more that a correct rendering of the Ritual is essential to the success of the lodge. Comparison is often made by a brother who has visited another lodge and found

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that the officers there interpreted the work in a manner different from that which he sees in his own.

The result is, that in lodges within easy visiting distance of each other, more or less of a rivalry has developed calling for closer attention to details. It is then he feels the lack of instruction which he thinks Grand Lodge should furnish. The importance of this feeling which I find is almost universal cannot be overestimated.

I would strongly recommend with a fervent desire to see it carried through, that Grand Lodge appoint an officer — you may give him the title of Grand Instructor or Grand Lecturer or some other name as may be decided upon,— who will devote at least three or six months each year to instruction.

The expense of this can easily be met by raising the per capita tax ten or fifteen cents among the lodges outside the City of Saint John. This extra assessment will be endorsed without a demur, I am quite sure, as wherever I mentioned the proposition it was gladly agreed to. I cannot impress the importance of this recommendation too forcibly, and I sincerely trust the Board of General Purposes will take the matter up promptly.

I quite understand that this will require an amendment to the constitution but it is a necessary improvement.

On the eve of relinquishing the position as Head of the Craft in this jurisdiction I wish to state that I am deeply sensible of the honor you conferred upon me in electing me for a second term.

This is not a formal phrase, Brethren, but a sincere expression of my feelings. I can easily understand now the words my immediate predecessor used, when he said, "the years he sat in the Grand East were the happiest of his life."

The acquaintances one meets with and the friendships made while visiting the brethren throughout the jurisdiction is something in one's life that will never be forgotten. To the officers of Grand Lodge, who have so loyally given me their support, I am very grateful.

The Deputy Grand Master, Grand Treasurer, Grand Secretary, Grand Director of Ceremonies and W. Bro. R. A. Snowball have been of great assistance to me. Wor. L. P. Stratton and Wor. A. D. McCain, District Deputies, were good enough to place themselves and their cars at my disposal for a week at a time.

A short explanation of these figures should be made. The above total receipts of 7,628.90 far exceed any previous year's revenue, but they include remittances, for 1920, from eight Lodges which were sent in after April 1, 1921, when the accounts of Grand Lodge were closed. These remittances amounted to 994.00 which with the balance then in the Grand Secretary's hands, make a total of 1,024.00. Deducting this amount the Lodge payments of Fees and Dues properly belonging to 1921 are shown to

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have been \$6,604.90. This sum is greatly in excess of any former year. It is, however, to be borne in mind that the per capita tax, for Lodges outside St. John City (East side) was raised to seventy-five cents, an increase per member of fifteen cents and, roughly speaking, this increase has produced the sum of six hundred dollars.

The accounts of Grand Lodge were closed on 15th July last, and at that date, with but one exception, all the Lodges, including the two under dispensation, had made returns and remittances. The one Lodge has since repaired the omission.

The final synopsis of the Returns has been completed and this is the abstract:

While on the subject of Returns I would like to make a few comments rather in the hope that they will receive the attention of Lodge Secretaries.

The Annual Return is intended to be a record, in a condensed form, of all the work of the Lodge during the year and of all changes in the membership. It is improper, therefore, to withhold the name of a Brother because he has not received the Third degree. Indeed, it is in respect of the First degree that the initiation fee of \$4.00 (which includes registration) is payable to Grand Lodge and so, though he has only received the one degree, yet his names, age, additions and date should be entered in the Return

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and the fee included in the remittance. On the other hand, as a Brother is not, by our Constitutions, a member of the Lodge until he is raised, his name, until then, should not appear in the List of Members nor should dues be paid for him.

All our lists are seniority not alphabetical lists. For this reason it is better that surnames should not be placed first but that every Brother's names should be written in their natural order, Christian names first and the surname last. Further, when a Brother's additions and date or dates are once reported they should not be repeated in a subsequent Return, but only the names.

Remittances are often made by the Lodge Secretary and it is to be feared that perhaps it is his practice to pay Lodge bills and then account to the Treasurer; but this is not as it should be and such a practice is quite sure to create unpleasantness. It is the duty of the one officer "to receive and pay over," and of the other "to receive and pay out," and these duties are best kept distinct.

It must not be inferred from these remarks that mistakes are general or that the Secretaries are all alike for many of them are careful and exact and their Returns are clear and attractive; but one or other of the above slight errors does, from time to time, creep in.

The Dispensations issued during the year, by the Grand Master's authority, have been forty-nine in number. They include the Dispensation to Brethren residing at Port Elgin to meet as Westmorland Lodge, No. 44, and to confer degrees, a Dispensation for a general Lodge of Instruction at St. John during the past winter, one to install officers, twenty-nine to attend divine service in regalia, and the others to confer degrees at short intervals upon Brethren in most instances about to leave the jurisdiction.

REPORT OF DIRECTORS.

August 24, 1922.

To the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation:

The notice of the two By-Law Amendments was given by your Directors because, on consideration, they agreed that the present By-Laws were deficient and anomalous in that they made no provision for an annual report from the Directors and yet required the Hall Committee, a subcommittee of the Board, to report annually to the Corporation. That the Board itself should present a report at each annual meeting is the more necessary and desirable because by By-Law 6, the Board is given control and management not only of the Masonic Hall but of all other property vested in the Corporation.

Anticipating that these amendments would receive the sanction of the Corporation, the Board has prepared and now begs to present the following report:

During the interval of sixteen months since the last meeting, the affairs of the Masonic Building have received the close attention of the Hall Committee. Reports have been made by the Committee at each meeting of the Directors and the Board cannot do better than make the following extracts.

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"During the year, the Library and Halls have been painted and the ceilings whitened. This, with some minor repairs to the windows in the Court Room, some slight alterations in Mr. Potts' office, and a little work on the roof, is all that it was thought necessary to do on the building."

"Your Committee, in conjunction with the Trustees of Masonic Bodies, has purchased 150 folding chairs to be used as required by any of the Masonic Bodies. These have proved a great convenience and will save the wear and tear of having chairs carried in and out of the building. Your Committee has also purchased twelve quartered oak chairs for the Library."

"The premises occupied by Luxor Temple have been re-let to them for a term of ten years at one thousand dollars (\$1,000) a year."

"A new agreement has also been made with the Trustees of Masonic Bodies for a term of ten years whereby they will pay eighteen hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,875.00) per annum for the main Lodge room and anterooms. This is an increase of one thousand dollars and will do away with the necessity of asking the different Lodges for special grants from time to time."

"Your Committee feel that too much cannot be said of the very generous treatment received from the two Bodies during the negotiations. They met our requests in a truly Masonic spirit and accepted the increased financial burden, cheerfully realizing the necessity of putting the building on a sound financial basis."

Renewal leases have likewise been entered into with the Municipality of St. John, Mr. H. J. Keys and Mr. Jacob Rubin, of the National Clothing Company, each at an increased rental.

The present rentals may be thus summarized:

The Directors have under consideration a proposal to cut a doorway in the north side of the Lodge room into the adjoining main hall. This would serve as an exit in case of emergency and as an entrance were the room to be used for other than strictly Masonic purposes. The Centennial Celebrations of St. John's Lodge, No. 2, and Carleton Royal Arch Chapter will be recalled as instances of this kind.

It is also proposed to effect improvement in the ventilation of the Lodge room and to fit up the sample room, now occupied by Mr. H. E. Ellis, to command a higher rental.

The financial position of the Corporation indicated in the Grand Treasurer's accounts is cause for much congratulation and the prospect for the future is a greatly improved one.

The Auditors' report is here inserted but it will be presented and read by one of the Audit Committee.

AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Directors, Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation, St. John, N. B.:

Your Committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary, report as follows:

That all books are properly kept and vouchers have been produced to us for all expenses and payments.

We would draw your particular attention to the splendid financial standing of the Corporation, and never in the history of Grand Lodge have the finances been in such a

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healthy condition as they are at the present time. You will note that the Grand Secretary's receipts for fees and dues far exceeds the monies expended on Grand Lodge account. You will also note that the balance of cash on hand this date was \$7,293,90.





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In due time arrangements were made and the following course of lectures was announced:

- March 31, 1922 (Under the Banner of The Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10) — The Landmarks of Masonry, R. W. Bro. Henry S. Bridges, P. G. M.

April 28, 1922 (Under the Banner of The New Brunswick Lodge, No. 22)— Masonic Etiquette, R. W. Bro. Hedley V. B. Bridges, P. G. M.

The course was very much indeed of a success; the Lodges, in turn, took up their duty with enthusiasm and hospitality and the Brethren attended the meetings in good numbers.

When in March, 1921, the Board sought to place an order for Certificates, it was found that not only was parchment very difficult to obtain, but that the cost of the finished Certificate would be something over two dollars. It was therefore decided to adopt a heavy paper or imitation parchment, but the change, it is hoped, will be but temporary. The item of \$515.00 in the Grand Treasurer's accounts is for 1030 of these Certificates, the final cost of each being about sixty cents. They are separately printed from the original steel plate, and as engravings and in

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respect of clearness they are excellent. They have practically all been issued and a further order for 1000 is now being executed. This supply will meet the arrears of about 100 and also probably the needs of the present and the ensuing year.

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The reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters were referred to the M.W. Grand Master with the request that such portions be printed as he may think desirable.

Resolved, on motion of the V.W. Grand Treasurer,

"That the election of the elective officers of Grand Lodge be the order of the day at 9.30 o'clock this evening."

And also,

"That when Grand Lodge takes recess it take recess until 9.15 o'clock."

On behalf of the Committee on Warrants R.W. Bro. F. J. G. Knowlton, P.G.M., reported as to the two Lodges under Dispensation, the one at Blackville and the other at Port Elgin. The one had been set to work on August 1st, 1920, and the other on June 10th, 1921. The Committee had examined the copies of records sent in by the two Lodges and were satisfied as to their proceedings and as to their prospects.

In the Committee's opinion, however, the records of both Lodges were defective in that they did not set out the Dispensation of the Grand Master empowering them to work. The Dispensation should, in each case, have been copied into the minutes of the initial Communication and it was desirable that the omission should at once be remedied.

Further, both Lodges were referred to in the records as being Lodges A. F. and A. M. As the title of this Grand Body is "The Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick," all private Lodges on its register are Lodges F. and A. M.

The report concluded with the recommendation that a Warrant of Constitution be granted to each of the Lodges.

The report was, on motion, received and adopted, and then Past Grand Master Knowlton made the following substantive motions which were duly seconded and unanimously adopted,

"That a Warrant of Constitution do issue constituting the brethren at Blackville, in the County of Northumberland, as Blackville Lodge, Number 43," also,

"That a Warrant of Constitution do issue constituting the brethren at Port Elgin, in the County of Westmorland, as Westmorland Lodge, Number 44."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN RELATIONS.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

Your Committee on Relations with Foreign Grand Bodies has lost one of its members in the lamented death of R.W. Bro. Alexander R. Campbell, P.D.G.M., whose mature and sober judgment on matters which came before the Committee was of great value to the Craft. The remaining members of the Committee beg leave to submit a report on certain matters which seem to be of sufficient importance to claim the attention of Grand Lodge at this session.

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Grand Lodge will learn with pleasure that the unhappy divisions in Queensland have been healed by the formation of the United Grand Lodge of Queensland, and that this United Grand Lodge is recognized by the Grand Lodge of England. The Grand Lodge of Queensland with which we have had fraternal relations is now merged in the United Grand Lodge. It is, perhaps, only necessary for us to congratulate our brethren in Australia upon the harmony which now prevails, and extend the same recognition to the new United Grand Lodge.

An International Masonic Federation was formed in Zurich, Switzerland, in 1920. Its main purpose is well shown in its name, a purpose in which we must all be deeply interested. This International Federation does not claim to be a supreme body, adherence to which would necessarily impair the sovereign powers of its constituent members; nevertheless, it appears to have certain laws to which its members must conform. What effect, if any, their submission to these laws should have upon our relations with any foreign grand bodies which join the Federation is a matter upon which your Committee is not prepared to offer an opinion until further information is available. An official circular from Copenhagen indicates that the Grand Lodge of Denmark, in consequence of adhering to this International Masonic Federation, has adopted a new constitution and changed its name to Grand Orient of Denmark and the North. This may not necessarily mean that the Grand Lodge of Denmark with which we were in correspondence has ceased to exist.

The new Grand Lodge of Vienna, and several new grand bodies in Spanish American countries, are asking for fraternal recognition. Your Committee is unable to make any recommendation in these cases at present. It may be well to add that such a lack of recognition is not condemnation. Later advices or altered circumstances may lead

us to welcome these new organizations, not only as true and genuine Masonic Bodies, but as much needed allies. Within the limits of the Antient Landmarks, we cannot have too many helpers.

THURSDAY EVENING.

August 24th, 1922.

At 9.15 o'clock this evening, Grand Lodge re-assembled, the M.W. Grand Master in the East.

The Masters and Wardens of the Private Lodges who were present formed across the Lodge Room and W. Bro. James MacMurray, Master of Albion Lodge, No. 1, read the following address:

To the Right Worshipful Brother, John Thomas Twining Hartt, Major in the Reserve Militia of Canada, Grand Secretary and Past Grand Warden of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

We beg you to accept the accompanying gift as a tangible expression of our affectionate regard.

The address engrossed on heavy card leaves was richly illuminated and beautifully bound in garter blue and gold.

The Grand Secretary was conducted to the East and the M.W. Grand Master presented him with a purse of gold, the gift of the Private Lodges.

A brief reply having been made by the Grand Secretary, Grand Lodge proceeded to the order of the day.

The sections of the Constitutions relating to the election of Grand Officers were read and the M.W. Grand Master appointed as Scrutineers:

The Deputy Grand Master, R.W. Bro. LeBaron Wilson, was alone nominated for the Grand East and on ballot cast was declared duly elected Most Worshipful Grand Master.

Nominations having been made and ballots taken in each case, the Scrutineers reported the following members of Grand Lodge to have severally received a majority of the votes cast:

On nomination, by Past Grand Masters J. G. Forbes and Henry S. Bridges, and by open vote, W. Bro. Robert Clerke, P.G.D., was re-elected Grand Tyler.

Grand Lodge then took up certain motions to amend the Constitutions of which formal notice had been given in the Proclamation summoning the Annual Communication.

Moved by W. Bro. George E. Day, P.G.Pur.,

"That Section 1 'of Certificates' be amended by adding thereto the words 'Every Master Mason must pass a satisfactory examination in the work of the Master Mason degree before a Grand Lodge Certificate will be issued to him, and the Secretary shall notify the Grand Secretary to that effect.""

Following some discussion the motion was put and declared lost.

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Moved by V.W. Bro. George D. Ellis, Grand Treasurer, "That the words 'Twenty-Five' and 'Twenty' in Section 17 of 'Private Lodges' be struck out, and the words 'Fifty' and 'Thirty' inserted in lieu of them respectively."

The effect of the amendment if adopted, would be that no Lodge in the City of Saint John should make a Mason for a less consideration than Fifty Dollars and no Lodge outside the City of Saint John for less than Thirty Dollars.

R.W. Bros. R. A. Logie, A. E. Pearson and J. G. Forbes, opposed the adoption of the motion, Past Grand Master Forbes especially being averse to unnecessary interference with the discretion of the private Lodges.

The motion was declared lost.

The following motion submitted on behalf of R.W. Bro. James Vroom, P.D.G.M., was also lost on being put to vote,

"That the following provision be added to Section 2 'of Proposing Members': 'In case of the Committee of Investigation failing to report at the next Regular Meeting, action shall be deferred until some subsequent Regular Meeting, in the summons of which a like notice for the balloting shall be sent to all the members.""

Grand Lodge then took recess until three o'clock, to-morrow, Friday afternoon.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

August 25th, 1922.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at three o'clock, the Grand Master, M.W. Lieut.-Col. J. D. B. F. MacKenzie, in the East.

R.W. Bro. A. E. Pearson, J.G.Warden, presented the report of the Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address, and on his motion, seconded by R.W. Bro. J. T. Whitlock, P.G.M., the same was adopted.

REPORT ON GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the M. W. Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

Brethren:

Your Special Committee to whom was referred the Grand Master's Address beg leave to report thereon as follows:

Grand Lodge rejoices in the flourishing condition of the Craft in this jurisdiction, to which the M.W. Grand Master calls attention, and has confidence that our doctrines and faith will continue to spread until our teachings will be acknowledged by all men in recognizing the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. The Grand Lodge is especially gratified in the knowledge that two new Lodges have been instituted in its jurisdiction.

With the Grand Master, Grand Lodge feels that the growth of Freemasonry throughout the world today may do much to check the great unrest in the labor conditions prevailing, and will assist in the solution of the diplomatic questions which are still threatening the world's peace.

Grand Lodge notes with pleasure the fraternal relations existing between this Grand Lodge and the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia as exemplified by the very cordial reception extended to our M.W. Grand Master on his recent visit to the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia and the Nova Scotia Lodge of Research.

The Grand Lodge believes that much of the prosperity and good will prevailing among us is due to the zeal shown by our M.W. Grand Master during his term of office in visiting all the Lodges in our jurisdiction.

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Grand Lodge mourns the loss of the distinguished brethren who will be with us no more, and your Committee would recommend that their names be suitably inscribed in the records of our Proceedings.

In conclusion your Committee approves of the Grand Master's suggestion that this Grand Lodge appoints an officer to give instruction to all Lodges, and further recommends that this Grand Lodge directs the Board of General Purposes to take the matter up promptly and give it their earnest consideration.

"Whereas, the several Protestant Institutions carrying on this work have reorganized under the foregoing corporate name; and, in order to successfully carry on this laudable work they contemplate the erection of new and suitable buildings, to house some two hundred and fifty or three hundred children; be it therefore

"*Resolved*, that Grand Lodge earnestly recommend this charitable undertaking to the liberality of private Lodges and the individual members of the Craft within this jurisdiction."

The motion was Carried.

Resolved, on motion of R.W. Bro. F. F. Burpee, P.G.W.,

"That the Ritual Committee be requested to arrange for the exemplification of a degree during the next Annual Communication of Grand Lodge."

R.W. Bro. J. T. Whitlock, P.G.M., in very admirable terms, proposed a vote of thanks, especially of the nonresident members of Grand Lodge, for the cordial reception and hospitable attention shown them last evening at the supper hour by the Masters and Past Masters of the local Lodges.

The motion was seconded by W. Bro. R. A. Snowball and adopted.

The brethren of Hiram Lodge, Fredericton, were very warmly praised by R.W. Bro. Forbes, P.G.M., for their excellent and artistic work when conferring the Master Mason degree. He thought it had been most beautifully exemplified and richly deserved the appreciation and the gratitude of Grand Lodge. His motion to this effect was unanimously concurred in.

The M.W. Grand Master then invested and installed his successor in office R.W. Bro. LeBaron Wilson who was thereupon saluted and proclaimed as "Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

This Lodge has not yet complied with the request to furnish me with a copy of their notice as per sample sent them.

I would suggest that a uniform notice be drawn up by Grand Lodge and sent to all Lodges in the jurisdiction so that they may have something as a guide in this matter.

I would also suggest that all Lodges be required to send a copy of Notice of Communications to the Grand Secretary so that he may be in a position to detect any departure from the Constitution.

My warmest thanks are due to the brethren of Ashlar Lodge, and others, who so loyally supported me during my term of office, and I hope that I have been able to spread the fraternal feeling of good will in some small measure.


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Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation.

The minutes of the Annual Meeting of 1921 were read and confirmed.
