It would seem right to make a more special reference to the death of R. W. Bro. Knowlton, for in the records of Grand Lodge he has an enduring place. For eight years he filled the honourable office of Grand Treasurer and then he was the chosen of the Craft for two arduous years as Grand Master. To him, to his initiative and enthusiasm, we owe it that Grand Lodge now possesses this valuable Hall property. Through personal interviews and direct correspondence he secured as free gifts to Grand Lodge, fully five hundred shares of the former Hall Company stock and the other outstanding shares at a very low valuation. Although the first few years of ownership were disappointing, because of low rents and heavy repairs, we now know that Grand Lodge has, in this property, a valuable asset, greatly enhancing our financial position; and for this result, we hold gratefully the memory of Past Grand Master Knowlton.

The Second degree was exemplified in a most creditable manner. St. George Lodge is to be congratulated on its magnificent Lodge Room and Masonic Temple.

I wish to thank all the Lodges visited by the Grand Master and officers of Grand Lodge for the very fraternal reception and entertainment. In every Lodge visited the Craft seemed to take special pains to make the visits pleasant, which I trust have been of some profit to the Lodges in the Jurisdiction. The ritual work can be improved, and I trust that the time is not too far distant when Grand Lodge will choose some way to instruct the several Lodges in the ritualistic work.

CONSECRATION OF NEW LODGES.

On Thursday, the 16th of November, 1922, A. L. 5922, assisted by the R. W. Deputy Grand Master Stewart L. Morrison, the R. W. S. Grand Warden A. R. Snowball, R. W. J. T. Hartt, Grand Secretary, R. W. R. A. Logie, G. D. of C. Stanley M. Wetmore and V. W. Geo. D. Ellis, I Constituted, Consecrated and Dedicated to the service of God and for the advancement of the great and good prin-

On Thursday, the 30th of November, 1922, A. L. 5922, assisted by P. D. G. Master J. Fred Edgett, R.W. J. T. Hartt, Grand Secretary, D.D.G.M. A. A. Andrew, P.D.D.G.M. Lew P. Stratton, G. D. of C. Stanley M. Wetmore and a large gathering of the Craft from Moncton and Sackville, I Constituted, Consecrated and Dedicated to the service of God and the advancement of the great and good principles of Freemasonry, Westmorland Lodge, No. 44, in ample form according to Masonic laws and the ancient usages of the Craft. I installed Bro. Allyn R. Fraser as the first Worshipful Master of Westmorland Lodge, No. 44, under its warrant dated November 30, 1922. At the request of the Worshipful Master. I installed the Wardens and other officers.

With the personnel of these two Lodges and the number of Brethren within their respective localities, I am confident that they will be successful and will give Masonic strength to the Jurisdiction.

The By-Laws of Blackville Lodge, No. 43, and West-morland Lodge, No. 44, have been presented to me and have been approved with some slight changes.

I received a petition from a number of Master Masons residing in Havelock, N. B., dated September 29, 1922, requesting me to grant a Dispensation for the working of a new Lodge to be named "Fownes," and they nominated and recommended D. R. Keith, Past Master, to be the first Master, Bro. John R. Price as first Senior Warden and Bro. Arthur R. Coles as first Junior Warden of the said Lodge. After due consideration I granted the Dispensation on

December 19, 1922, and requested District Deputy Grand Master Albert E. Pearson to deliver the Dispensation and to set Fownes Lodge to work. He having performed that duty in a most able manner, I recommend that a Warrant be granted to Fownes Lodge, as I consider that it is qualified to carry on as a Warranted Lodge. Copies of the records have been submitted to the Committee on Warrants, and a detailed report will be submitted by the District Deputy.

The District Deputies have been active, with one exception, visiting the Lodges and giving instructions in the several districts; their reports will be placed before

On assuming office as Grand Master, I was informed that the five Lodges in the northern part of the Jurisdiction were to hold a joint communication of instruction under the warrant of Northumberland Lodge, No. 17, of Newcastle, and realizing that it would be necessary to send a member of the Ritual Committee, I deputized W. Bro. F, F. Burpee to act in that capacity to give instructions if necessary. I also was present, unofficially, and am convinced that gatherings of this kind, of the several Lodges, will give good results in the ritual work.

During my visits to the various Lodges within the Jurisdiction, I have frequently discussed with the Craft the desirability of freeing the funds of Grand Lodge from the heavy charge of meeting the interest on our bonded indebtedness. These funds should and were intended to be used for the Fund of Benevolence and other purposes of Grand Lodge.

I, therefore, earnestly recommend that the Grand Lodge place a per capita tax of one dollar on each member of the Jurisdiction for five years, which will in that time free Grand Lodge of its bonded indebtedness and enable Grand Lodge to carry on the grand benevolent purposes for which we, as a Craft, stand.

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A matter of some interest was brought before the Board of General Purposes at its recent meeting and was much discussed. The facts are, that in December last a communication was received from a Scottish Lodge, through the Grand Secretary of Scotland, requesting Hiram Lodge, Fredericton, to confer the Third degree on a brother who had been initiated and passed in the Scottish Lodge in the summer of 1919. The Brother was then serving with the Canadian Forestry Corps and after the war returned to Fredericton, his former residence. Among the Brother's papers was a small Lodge Certificate and letters from the Lodge Secretary; one of them acknowledging a payment to a New Hall Fund. When, however, the officers of Hiram Lodge questioned him as to his experiences it was found that he retained no recollection of what he had heard, seen or done, while receiving the two degrees, could answer no questions or make any explanations. Hiram Lodge had, therefore, taken no action.

The decision of the Board was that if the W. Master of Hiram was fully satisfied as to the Brother's identity, and the Board thought that he might be, his course was to cause the Brother to be duly instructed in our First and Second degrees: and, after satisfactory examination, to confer on him the Master Mason degree, as requested by the Scottish Lodge. This decision has been made known to the Master of Hiram Lodge.

At my installation as Grand Master, I requested the assistance of the Craft in carrying on the duties of the office and I am happy to state that this request has been complied with by every member in the Jurisdiction.

To the Past Grand Masters, Present and Past Grand Lodge Officers and Brethren, who have assisted me in the past year by counsel and advice, I tender my most sincere thanks.

"That the Address of the M.W. Grand Master, with the above exception, be referred to a committee of three members who shall report thereon during this Annual Communication."

R.W. Bros. H. V. B. Bridges, P.G.M., J. D. B. F. MacKenzie, P.G.M., and Robert A. Logie, P.G.W., were constituted the committee.

The following report having been read, it was, on motion, received to be printed in the year's proceedings.

GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT.

To'the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The report of the Grand Secretary will, as usual, first refer to the receipts of his office during the past year; that is, in respect of the year 1922.

These receipts have amounted to five thousand nine hundred and sixty-six dollars and forty-five cents and may be thus itemized:

These figures cannot readily be compared with those of last year inasmuch as the income then reported included payments from eight Lodges which had omitted to make their remittances for the preceding year; but, roughly speaking, it may be stated that the above receipts are six hundred dollars less than those properly belonging to 1921, which year, it should be borne in mind, was in this respect our most prosperous year. But the past year is a close second and it is indicative of the general well being in the Jurisdiction that every Lodge conferred each of the three degrees during the twelve months; and, if the number of the degrees conferred is a proper criterion then Keith, Woodstock, Sussex, No. 7, and Alexandria Lodges deserve special mention.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

There has been but little for the Board to deal with during the past year.

Three meetings have been held, at the first of which W. Bro. John R. Haycock was elected Vice-President, but his duties as such were very light, as the Deputy Grand Master was present from Fredericton on each occasion.

By the Board's request, Past Grand Masters Walker and Clark continued to act with the M. W. Grand Master as the Committee of the Fund of Benevolence. The applications for grants were eight in number and the amount voted by the Committee was \$475.00. As the income of the Fund was \$940.00, the cash balance was increased to \$1,606.21. Of this balance the sum of \$1,000.00 has since been invested in Bonds of the Town of Saint Andrews.

It is the experience of the Committee and of the Grand Treasurer that the applications for aid should preferably be made by the Master of the Lodge and certified to by the Secretary.

In his address to Grand Lodge last year, M. W. Bro. MacKenzie strongly urged the appointment of a Grand Lecturer charged with the duty of instructing the Lodges in degree work, devoting some months each year to the purpose. He supported the recommendation with a suggestion that the Lodges, other than those in St. John, be assessed a small membership tax to meet the expense which such work would involve. The matter was referred by Grand Lodge to this Board, and the Board at its first meeting appointed a sub-committee to consider and report;

1923

The sub-committee refer approvingly to District Lodges of Instruction such as have been held at Bathurst and last year at Newcastle; but much personal expense attaches to such gatherings though doubtless a strong fraternal spirit of emulation is happily aroused.

By the Board's direction, notice has been given in the proclamation of an amendment to the provisions of the Constitutions as to Districts, providing in effect that the up river district shall extend from Florenceville to Edmundston. At present, it also includes Woodstock, York, and Sunbury counties; and experience has shown that the distances are too great for any adequate supervision. The Lodges affected, will, it is hoped, lay their views before Grand Lodge.

The first three sections were read and severally adopted.

The fourth section, as to instruction in the ritual of the degrees, evoked an interesting and useful discussion.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

The holding of District Lodges of Instruction was advocated by W. Bro. H. Priestman, D.D.G.M., R.W. Bro. A. E. Pearson, D.D.G.M., R.W. Bro. F. F. Burpee, P.G.W., W. Bro. Gesner A. Taylor, P.D.D.G.M., and R.W. Bro. E. H. Cairns, P.G.W. The M.W. Grand Master also expressed his approval of district gatherings. The value of fraternal visits by Lodges to one another was emphasized by R.W. Bro. H. V. B. Bridges, P.G.M., as inducing a very proper emulation among Lodge officers.

Past Grand Master MacKenzie while agreeing that the time was not opportune for the action suggested by him in his address last year expressed the hope that his recommendation as to a Grand Lecturer would not be lost sight of.

Moved by V.W. Bro. George D. Ellis, G. Treas., and duly seconded,

"That the section be adopted and that it be referred for further consideration to the M. W. Grand Master and the District Deputy Grand Masters for the coming year."—Carried.

It was agreed that the last section of the Board's report be taken up this evening together with the proposal to change the number and bounds of the Districts.

The financial statements of the V.W. Grand Treasurer, the report of the Directors and the report of the Auditors, were formally submitted to Grand Lodge by the R.W. Deputy Grand Master.

These had been duly presented to the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation and had been adopted.

REPORT OF DIRECTORS.

August 23, 1923.

To the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation:

In compliance with the amended By-Law, the Board of Directors presents its annual report. From the accounts of the Grand Treasurer, the members have learned, doubtless with gratification, how satisfactory have been the financial transactions of the year. For the first time the income from Hall rents has exceeded the necessary expenditures on Building Account. In its last report to the Board the Hall Committee state:

"This has been a very quiet year for your Hall Committee. It has not been found necessary to make any important repairs to the building; less than \$300.00 has been spent since the last annual report.

Your Committee are at present replacing the plank walks in the rear, and have under consideration work on the cupola to prevent the pigeons from entering.

All the rooms in the building are at present occupied, and the tenants are paying their rents in a satisfactory manner.

Your Committee are very pleased to direct your attention to the fact that the receipts on Building Account for the year ending July 15, 1923, are about \$350.00 greater than the total cost of upkeep for the same period; for while the Grand Treasurer's returns show \$10,486.12 paid out on Building Account, \$2,404.73 of this is for coal now in the bins for use during the season 1923-24. The above balance with rents outstanding of \$440.00, collected since the books of the Corporation were closed, will show a credit balance for the year of \$788.53."

The Hall rentals for the current year may be summarized as follows:

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1923

The expenditure on Building Account, actually pertaining to last year, was \$8,081.39. Therefore, failing the necessity for heavy repairs — and none such are foreseen,—these figures seem to assure a yearly surplus of well up to \$1,000.00. Much brighter is the prospect for the coming years if the present annual charge for bond interest is wiped out by payment of the bonds at maturity.

As a nucleus of a Sinking Fund for this latter purpose, the Grand Treasurer, by the Board's direction, has arranged to invest \$5,000 of the cash balance on hand, in Bonds of the Canadian National Railways. This amount, it is earnestly hoped, will yearly be augmented, so that when the Bonds mature in 1929, there will be ample funds to retire them.

The report of the Auditors is herewith submitted:

AUDITORS' REPORT.

To the Board of Directors Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation:

Your Committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary, report as follows:

That all the books are properly kept and vouchers have been produced to us for all expenses and payments. It will be noted that the financial standing of the Corporation is in splendid condition. You will also note that there is a large balance of cash on hand and we concur in the suggestion of the Grand Treasurer to us that \$5,000.00 of this

amount be invested in Government or Municipal Bonds and set aside to retire Bonds of this Corporation falling due in 1929.

We would also direct your attention to the fact that a few of the Lodges have outstanding balances, some of them running back three or four years, and we would suggest that the Secretary of these Lodges be especially written to with reference to these amounts outstanding.

Moved by R.W. Bro. F. F. Burpee, P.G.W., seconded by R.W. Bro. A. E. Pearson, P.G.W.,

"That when Grand Lodge takes recess it take recess until eight o'clock this evening."—Carried.

Grand Lodge then took recess.

THURSDAY EVENING.

August 23rd, 1923.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at eight o'clock this evening, the M.W. Grand Master in the East.

R.W. Bro. Daniel C. Clark, P.G.M., presented the following report:

To the Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The committee to whom was referred that portion of the Grand Master's address in reference to the creating of a sinking fund to provide for the retirement of the \$32,000.00 bonded indebtedness on the Grand Lodge Building, when same falls due in 1929, begs to report that it heartily concurs with his proposal and recommends that such resolutions be adopted at the present Communication of Grand Lodge as shall provide for a special per capita assessment of one dollar per annum upon the membership of all private Lodges for the five years commencing with 1924, for this purpose.

"That the report of the Special Committee be received and approved of."—Carried.

Thereupon, it was moved by R.W. Bro. Daniel C. Clark, P.G.M., seconded by W. Bro. Frank A. Godsoe, P.G.D.,

Whereas, Grand Lodge has approved of the recommendation of the M.W. Grand Master, that a special per capita assessment of \$1.00 be made on the membership of each private Lodge in the jurisdiction, for the purpose of creating a Sinking Fund wherewith to retire the Bonds outstanding on the building owned by Grand Lodge in the City of St. John, which fall due in 1929:

Be it Therefore Resolved, that each private Lodge in the jurisdiction, shall, in addition to the present per capita assessment, pay annually to Grand Lodge the sum of one dollar for each member on its register as at December 27th, for the years 1924 to 1928 inclusive,

And Further Resolved, that to enable the Lodges to comply with this resolution, each private Lodge is hereby expressly authorized, by a majority vote, to assess every member the sum of \$1.00 per annum for the above named period, in addition to his annual lodge dues,

And Further Resolved, that the Grand Treasurer be authorized to establish a special reserve for the purpose of administering this Fund, and that all monies so received shall be invested in Government or Municipal Securities as shall from time to time be determined upon by the Board of General Purposes.

In addition to the mover and seconder, the motion was spoken to at some length by W. Bro. Herbert Priestman, D.D.G.M., W. Bro. James T. Kirk, W. Bro. William J. Brown, W. Bro. J. William Smith and V.W. Bro. George D. Ellis, Grand Treasurer.

The M.W. Grand Master also addressed Grand Lodge. The motion was then put and declared *Carried*.

The letter from Keith Lodge, No. 23, proposing and requesting that the Annual Communication for 1924 be held in the City of Moncton was again read, and it was

moved by R.W. Bro. Daniel W. Kyle, P.G.W., and seconded by W. Bro. Howard J. Mowatt,

"That the next Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge be held in the City of Moncton as requested by Keith Lodge and for the special reasons set out in the letter received from the Lodge."

The motion was Carried.

The last section of the Report of the Board of General Purposes as to the Masonic Districts and also the notice of motion set out in the Proclamation to amend Section 1 "Of District Deputy Grand Masters" were then taken up and discussed.

W. Bro. H. Priestman was strongly averse to the proposal in so far as it affected Ashlar Lodge at McAdam. Grand Lodge finally concurred in the suggestions put forward by R.W. Bro. Stewart L. Morrison, D.G.M., and supported by W. Bro. John A. Lindsay, P.D.D.G.M.; and the section was amended to read as follows:

OF DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

- 1. The jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge shall be divided into six districts, for each of which a District Deputy Grand Master shall be appointed, as hereinafter provided. These districts shall be numbered as follows:
- No. 1.—To include the City and County of Saint John and County of Kings.
- No. 2.—To include the Counties of Westmorland and Albert.
- No. 3.—To include the Counties of Kent, Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche.

- No. 4.—To include the Counties of Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska.
- No. 5.—To include the County of Charlotte and Ashlar Lodge, McAdam.
- No. 6.—To include the County of York (excepting Ashlar Lodge, McAdam) and the Counties of Sunbury and Oueens.

It being now nine o'clock Grand Lodge proceeded to the order of the day, the election of Grand Officers. The sections of the constitutions bearing on elections were first read and the M.W. Grand Master appointed as Scrutineers R.W. Bros. Charles Robinson, P.G.W.; E. H. Cairns, P.G.W.; and W. Bros. Bernard J. Collier and Horace A. Porter. Moved by V.W. Bro. H. Russell Sturdee, P.G.T., seconded by R.W. Bro. A. Brittain, P.G.W.,

"That the sum of Fifty Dollars be granted to the Library Committee for the purposes of the library for the coming year."—Carried.

R.W. Bro. Thomas Walker, P.G.M., on behalf of the Committee on Warrants reported that the minutes and proceedings of Fownes Lodge working at Havelock under the Grand Master's Dispensation had been received and examined by the Committee. Rarely had a more satisfactory record and report been submitted by a Lodge under Dispensation. The Committee had pleasure in recommending that a Warrant of Constitution be granted. He moved.

"That a Warrant of Constitution be granted to Fownes Lodge, No. 45, as prayed for in the petition of the brethren at Havelock."

The motion was Carried unanimously.

R.W. Bro. H. V. B. Bridges, P.G.M., presented and read the following report of the Committee on the Grand Master's Address:

REPORT ON GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

BRETHREN:

Your Special Committee appointed for the purpose of considering the report of the M.W. the Grand Master respectfully submit the following report thereon:

Grand Lodge learns with pleasure and satisfaction of the continued growth of our Order throughout the jurisdiction, and of the enthusiasm which prevails, among the subordinate Lodges, for the Craft.

Grand Lodge wishes to congratulate the Grand Master upon the fact that he has been able to visit very many subordinate Lodges and that he has been able to gather around him in these visits so many of the officers of Grand Lodge, for it is just by means of such communications that enthusiasm is engendered, and peace and harmony made to prevail.

It is a matter for congratulation, also, that our Grand Master has had the opportunity to consecrate two young and thriving Lodges at Blackville and Port Elgin in the Jurisdiction, and that he has seen fit to grant a Dispensation to Fownes Lodge at Havelock.

Grand Lodge learns with deep sorrow and regret of the loss of so many of its distinguished members who have been removed from our midst to the Celestial Lodge above during the past year, and recommends that their names be suitably inscribed on the records of the Proceedings.

Knowlton, on account of which Grand Lodge now possesses this valuable property, the Masonic Hall, and hopes that in the near future it may be the property of the Masons of New Brunswick, freed from all debt and encumbrance.

On motion it was agreed that when Grand Lodge takes recess it take recess until three o'clock to-morrow, Friday.

The following visits were made:

October 5th, 1922. St. Mark's Lodge, No. 5, at St. Andrews, W.M. Bro. W. McLaren occupying the East, and conferred the Second degree on two candidates in a correct and dignified manner. After labor we were called to refreshments which were much enjoyed both mentally and bodily. The sincerity and heartiness of the welcome accorded will always be in the memories of myself and the brethren who accompanied me.

November 16th, 1922. Ashlar Lodge, No. 36, Mc-Adam, W.M. Lawrence M. White presiding in the East. Four First and one Third degrees were worked in the usual efficient manner for which Ashlar Lodge is noted. After adjournment a happy hour was spent over the banquet board, and with song and story. On December 27th, 1922, I acceded to the request of the W.M. and acted as Installing Officer at this Lodge, with Past Master Bro. G. H. Gallagher acting as Director of Ceremonies.

Some time in February, I cannot state the exact date, I visited Sussex Lodge, No. 7, St. Stephen. W.M. Davidson presided and kept up the excellent reputation of the Lodge by the splendid manner in which he exemplified the ritual. This Lodge always makes me feel very much at home and leave nothing to be desired when they offer entertainment to visitors.

The meetings at the above Lodges were all very well attended, the books kept in the approved method and

right up to date. All credit is due the Secretaries for the splendid manner in which they perform their duties.

June 5th, 1923, I visited Mananook Lodge at Grand Manan. I exceedingly regret to report a poor reception, refusal of the W.M. to even open the Lodge, let alone exemplify any degrees. I had to open and close the Lodge and conduct the business. I was given to understand they had two candidates ready for degrees but none were present. The Secretary was absent, although I was informed he had been seen at the Hall earlier in the evening, and only the minute book was available. This book is not kept in the least properly and if any criterion the remainder must look more like a schoolboy's scribbler than a Lodge record. I tried as nicely as I knew how, to point out the discrepancies in their method of business, talked on various subjects of Masonic interest to the few who were present, and tried to impress on them the necessity of putting their house in order, visiting other Lodges in the jurisdiction to brush up their knowledge, etc.

Being in a rather inaccessible spot may tend to neglect of this Lodge on the part of Grand Lodge Officers, with the result noted above, and I would strongly recommend that some Brother with the necessary time, knowledge and willingness be sent to this Lodge to stay at least several days and go into matters in detail with the Brothers there, and try and revive the spirit of true Masonry which must have been in evidence at no very distant past.

I have to mention my gratitude to the brethren who accompanied me on the visits, particularly Past Master Bro. W. C. Whipple who came on every trip and gave vital assistance on every occasion.

I regret that I was unable to visit every Lodge in the district during the last period but I did as much as possible, hoped to do more, but was prevented by various circumstances over which I had no control.

Although a second term as D.D.G.M. was thrust on me against my wish, knowing as I did that I probably would not be able to fulfil the duties as I should, yet I am sensible of the honor done me, and wish to thank you for the same.

I must apologize for not having accompanied you during your visit to the Lodges in this district, but I was in Vancouver at the time and only received your invitation several weeks after your trip had finished.





The procession moved by way of Main, Robinson, Queen, Church, St.George, and Alma Streets, to the site of the building. Grand Lodge passed through the opened ranks to the north east corner and the various bodies took up their assigned positions.

Grand Master.—Right Worshipful Senior Grand Warden: The Grand Lodge having assembled for the purpose of laying the corner stone of the Masonic Hall, here to be erected, you will direct the Junior Grand Warden to call upon all persons present to preserve order.

Senior Grand Warden.—Right Worshipful Junior Grand Warden: It is the will and pleasure of the Most Worshipful Grand Master that this corner stone be now laid with masonic honors; you will therefore direct all persons present to preserve due order and solemnity.

Junior Grand Warden.—Brethren and all who are here present: Take notice that the Most Worshipful Grand Master will now deposit this corner stone in masonic form, you will therefore observe due order and decorum during the ceremonies.

After which the Moncton Masonic Choir, under leadership of W. Bro. John G. McColl, sang the ode, as follows:

Hail, Masonry divine,
Glory of ages shine:
Long may'st thou reign;
Where'er thy Lodges stand,
May they have great command,
And always grace the land;
Thou Art divine.

Great fabrics still arise,
And grace the azure skies —
Great are thy schemes;
Thy noble orders are
Matchless beyond compare;
No art with Thee can share;
Thou art divine.

Hiram, the architect,
Did all the craft direct,
How they should build.
Sol'mon, great Israel's king,

R.W. Bro. R. Percy Dickson, President of the Company, addressed the M.W. the Grand Master and said:

Today is the beginning of a new era for Masonry in the City of Moncton. It has long been our ambition to own our own home. The Moncton Masonic Temple, Limited, is incorporated by Letters Patent in the Province of New Brunswick, and in October, 1921, this corner was purchased as a site for the Masonic Temple.

This spot is well adapted for our purpose — it is one of the oldest landmarks of our City. We will always remember the "MacKenzie" property — with its old-fashioned cottage, its old-fashioned garden, its wonderful flowers and beautiful trees — some of which we have been able to preserve to beautify our new home. This was the home of one of our oldest Past Masters — the late John MacKenzie — first Mayor of the Town of Moncton. It was from this corner we conveyed him to his last resting place in Elmwood Cemetery, and what could be more fitting than that we should build on this corner a new landmark to our fraternity?

We do not expect that this building will be as imposing in architecture, beauty or magnificent grandeur as those structures built in the long ago by our ancient brethren when Freemasonry was more operative than speculative, but we hope to show that the arts and sciences of the east are not lost, and that this building with its columns, its pilasters, its porch, its pillars, and its winding stair leading to the middle chamber, will bear some of the character of that ancient temple of King Solomon, and that when it is completed it will be an honour to our fraternity and a credit to our City — a building that will be a landmark for every stranger within our gates, and one our brethren from other lands will view with admiration. It is hoped our wisdom in this great undertaking will be strengthened by the support of every good Mason, so that in the days to come we may view with admiration the beauty of our handiwork.

I ask you, Most Worshipful Sir, on behalf of the Masons of Moncton, in the presence of your fellow craftsmen, before this large assembly representing the beauty and virtue of our City, that you do now in the name of the Great Architect of the Universe lay the Corner Stone; and I beg of you to accept at my hands, on behalf of Brother William G. Atkinson, Chairman of the Building Committee, this silver trowel for the performance of your work — this trowel to be retained by you as a memento of this occasion.

President Dickson then presented the Grand Master with a silver trowel bearing the following inscription:

A solemn prayer was then offered by the Grand Chaplain. Rev. Hugh Miller:

Great Architect of the Universe, who did'st look upon the works of Thy hands and beheld they were very good; vouchsafe to regard with Thy gracious favour this our undertaking which we commence in Thy name and dedicate to Thee. Be pleased to accept our offering, guard from accident all who are engaged in this building, that by Thy Providence it may be brought to a successful completion. And grant that Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth, the three tenets of our profession, eternal and unchanging as Thyself, may be so inculcated and followed in these our halls, that our work may ever redound to Thy glory, to whom we owe all we are and all we have. Amen.

Response: So mote it be.

Brethren let us pray for our King:

Vouchsafe, O Lord, to replenish him with Thy Holy Spirit, that he may always incline to Thy will and walk in Thy ways. Endue him plenteously with heavenly gifts; grant him in health and wealth long to live; strengthen him that he may vanquish and overcome all his enemies, and finally, after this life, may he attain everlasting joy and felicity. Brethren, let us pray for the Craft:

Shower Thy blessings, O Lord, upon our Order. May the sublime principles of Freemasonry so subdue every discordant passion within us, so harmonize and enrich our hearts with Thine own love and goodness, that each member in his life, every lodge in its work, and the whole institution in its widespread influence, may humbly reflect that Order and Beauty which reign forever before Thy throne, and may we all at last find a resting place in the Celestial Lodge above. Amen.

Response: So mote it be.

The cement was spread by the Grand Master, and the stone slowly lowered to its place, while the choir rendered appropriate musical numbers.

After the stone had been properly placed, the Deputy Grand Master applied to it the Square, the Senior Grand Warden the Level, and the Junior Grand Warden the Plumb.

Grand Master: Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master: What is the proper Jewel of your office?

Deputy Grand Master: The Square.

Grand Master: Have you applied the Square to such parts of the stone as should be square?

Deputy Grand Master: I have, Most Worshipful Grand Master, and the craftsmen have done their duty.

Grand Master: Right Worshipful Senior Grand Warden: What is the proper Jewel of your office?

Senior Grand Warden: The Level.

Grand Master: Have you applied the Level to the stone?

Senior Grand Warden: I have, Most Worshipful Grand Master, and the craftsmen have done their duty.

Grand Master: Right Worshipful Junior Grand Warden: What is the proper Jewel of your office?

Junior Grand Warden: The Plumb.

Grand Master: Have you applied the Plumb to the several parts of the stone?

Junior Grand Warden: I have, Most Worshipful Grand Master, and the craftsmen have done their duty.

Grand Master: Having full confidence in your skill in the Royal Art it remains with me now to finish the work.

The Grand Master then gave three blows upon the stone and said:

I find this foundation stone well formed, true and trusty, and correctly laid, according to the rules of our Ancient Craft. Let the elements of consecration be presented.

The Deputy Grand Master presented the vessel containing the Corn. The Grand Master scattered corn upon the stone, saving:

I scatter this corn as an emblem of plenty. May the Bounteous Giver of all good bless this undertaking, for the advancement of our ancient craft, and preserve the health of the workmen, and prosper their labours.

Response: So mote it be.

The choir sang:

When once of old in Israel
Our early brethren wrought with toil,
Jehovah's blessing on them fell
In showers of Corn and Wine and Oil.

The Senior Grand Warden presented the cup of wine, which, the Grand Master taking, poured wine upon the stone, saying:

I pour this wine as an emblem of joy and gladness. May the Great Dispenser of all human events enrich the people of this city with every blessing and keep them faithful, loyal and charitable.

Response: So mote it be.

The choir sang:

When there a shrine to Him alone
They built, with worship sin to foil,
On threshold and on corner stone,
They poured out Corn and Wine and Oil.

The Junior Grand Warden then presented the vessel containing oil. The Grand Master poured oil upon the stone and said:

I pour this oil as an emblem of peace. May the Supreme Ruler of nations continue to us the blessing of peace.

Response: So mote it be.

The choir sang:

And we have come, fraternal bands
With joy and pride and prosperous spoil,
To honour Him with votive hands,
With streams of Corn and Wine and Oil.

Grand Master: May the all bounteous Architect of the Universe bless the inhabitants of this city with an abundance of the necessaries, conveniences, and comforts of life;

assist in the erection and completion of this building; protect the workmen against every accident; long preserve the structure from decay, and grant us all a supply of the corn of nourishment, the wine of refreshment, and the oil of joy. Amen.

Response: So mote it be.

The Grand Master then struck the stone three times with his hiram, and the brethren gave the public grand honors by three times three.

The Grand Master delivered the working tools to the architect, saying:

Worthy Brother: Having thus, as Grand Master of the Freemasons in this jurisdiction, laid the foundation stone of this structure, I now deliver these implements of your profession into your hands, entrusting you with the superintendence and direction of the work, with full confidence in your skill and capacity to conduct the same.

The Grand Master then spoke, as follows:

Know all of you who hear me: We proclaim ourselves free and lawful masons, true to the laws of our country, professing to fear God and to confer benefits to mankind; we practice universal beneficence towards all; we have secrets concealed from the eyes of men which may not be revealed to any but masons; they are, however, lawful and honorable; unless our craft was good and our calling honorable these secrets would not have existed for so many generations, nor should we have had so many illustrious personages as brethren of our order, always ready to sanction our proceedings and contribute to our welfare. We are assembled in the broad face of open day, under the canopy of Heaven, to build a Temple of Masonry. May God prosper our handiwork, as it shall most please Him. May this temple become a place wherein just and upright

masons may practice Benevolence, promote Harmony and cultivate Brotherly Love until they shall all assemble in the Grand Lodge above, where the world's Great Architect lives and reigns forever.

The closing hymn was sung as follows:

Master Supreme, accept our praise; Still bless this consecrated band; Parent of Light, illume our ways, And guide us by Thy sovereign hand.

May Faith, Hope, Charity divine, Here hold their undivided reign: Friendship and harmony combine To soothe our cares and banish pain.

May wisdom here disciples find. Beauty unfold her thousand charms, Science invigorate the mind, Expand the soul that virtue warms.

May duty dwell within each breast, Relief attend the suffering poor; Thousands by this, our lodge, be blest Till worth, distress'd, shall want no more.

After the above hymn, R.W. Bro. H. V. B. Bridges, LL.D., P.G.M., Principal of the Provincial Normal School, Fredericton, N. B., was heard in an able and eloquent public oration in which he congratulated the members of the Masonic Fraternity of the city in the efforts they were putting forth in the erection of a new home, and also referred to the institution of Keith Lodge, No. 23, in Moneton.

In opening his remarks the speaker stated that he considered it a pleasure to be invited to participate at the ceremony of the laying of the corner stone of the Masonic Temple of the Masonic Fraternity of Moncton.

He spoke briefly on the institution of Keith Lodge, which he said when first organized was under the jurisdic-

tion of the English Grand Lodge and was at first known as No. 927 of the Grand Lodge of England. The charter for the lodge he said was issued at the request of the illustrious Past Grand Master Alexander Keith in whose honor the lodge was named. The inception of Freemasonry in the City of Moncton he stated, dates back seventy years. On July 3rd, 1868, the lodge came under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick as Keith Lodge, No. 23, and at that time Charles Holstead was the Master, John McKenzie, the Senior Warden, and J. L. Harris, the Junior Warden.

Here in this place, said Dr. Bridges, Masonry was secure seventy years ago. Today he added, we are building the foundations of a grand temple that shall be the home of Masons in the future, and today we are being looked upon by all members of the Masonic Fraternity in New Bruns-

Referring to the signing of the armistice which concluded the Great War, the speaker stated that, with the anniversary of this memorable day but a short distance away it would not be fitting to pass without mention of this memorable occasion when Peace in a great world conflict was finally declared. He referred to the Patriotism and Peace which permeated the order, and briefly referred to a meeting of Masonic brethren of the continent of Europe held in England in 1913 at which time representatives from England and France represented themselves for peace while the German representatives, borne down by the German Kaiser, decried it.

Referring to the second battle of Ypres in the World War in which the Canadian Corps played such a heroic part, the speaker made fitting reference to the statement made by Lord Birkenhead who said that the Canadians there compared equally with men of Thermopylae. "Thou shalt not pass." The deeds of the Canadian forces in the

war, the speaker said, have been a glowing tribute to their memory.

Speaking on the uplift and protection of small countries by the Mother country, Dr. Bridges referred to matters wherein the British Government, not only in the late war but in years gone by, had stood by the weaker nations of the globe. He made reference to the defeat of Spain at the time of the Spanish Armada, when the British Government had held forth the helping hand to the Netherlands.

Out of the war there have come many things, stated the speaker, and from it among these things, Service, Duty and Discipline have come to the fore. Ralph Connor had said on one occasion while in Fredericton that Duty and Discipline had risen to a high sphere as one of the outcomes of the world struggle in so far as their influence on the people is concerned. Masonry, he added, is still to be called on, by discipline and the call to duty.

To the younger members of the order the speaker urged that they carry out the work of the order to its highest and greatest end. This building, he stated, will have a peculiarly important care to the young men of the order, for to them must fall the burden of indebtedness he said. Continuing, the speaker urged the younger members to carry out the ritual and to master the famous New Brunswick ritual of which, he stated, there is none better. Its terseness and comprehensiveness are to the advantage of the younger members of the order. The workman might die, but the work lives on, and as it glides from day to day and year to year in other strains, it must be carried on by those who follow in the footsteps of those who have gone before.

Addressing himself principally to the older members of the order, Dr. Bridges urged that they attend regularly at communications. Iron sharpeneth iron, he stated, and as the young learn from the experienced, in like manner may strength and vigor be acquired by coming in contact with the younger ones around us. The Doxology was sung followed by the National Anthem, and the proceedings ended with the benediction by the V.W. Grand Chaplain.

The procession re-formed and moved by way of Alma, St. George, Steadman and Main Streets to the Masonic Hall.

The M.W. the Grand Master resumed his station in the East. He congratulated Grand Lodge upon the very large number of Masons who had taken part in the interesting ceremonies just completed; upon the exceedingly creditable display made by the respective bodies; and upon the bright and genial day a kind Providence had vouchsafed to them. He thanked the various bodies for the hearty manner in which they had responded to his invitation, and expressed himself especially grateful to the brethren who had come long distances to fill up the ranks and take their share in the work of the day.

R.W. Bro. J. E. Masters addressed the M.W. the Grand Master as follows:

The laying of a corner stone by our Beloved Order is always a cause for rejoicing on the part of all good Masons, and this one of today is no exception. It is the third time I have been privileged to attend such functions in Moncton. The Young Men's Christian Association and Wesley Memorial Church under Past Grand Master Walker, and today our own good temple under Grand Master Wilson. While the first two were pleasing duties we were called upon to perform for sister organizations, this last is of the greatest importance to us. It is the Corner Stone of our Home, that is to be an evidence handed down to generations to come of our Faith and Hope, with a prayer that our Charity may never cease.

It is with extreme pleasure that I move a very hearty vote of thanks be extended to our Most Worshipful Grand

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Master and Officers for acceding to our request and performing the duties in such an admirable manner: also I desire to avail myself of this opportunity of moving a very hearty vote of thanks to P.G.M. Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, for the eloquent and admirable as well as instructive oration delivered by him on this occasion, and which I am sure will long be remembered by all who participated in this great ceremony.

Brother F. A. McCully, K. C., of Keith Lodge, seconded the above motion, which was Carried unanimously.

Brother William G. Atkinson, Chairman of the Building Committee, then addressed the M.W. the Grand Master as

Most Worshipful Grand Master: I wish to extend to you on behalf of the Building Committee our sincere thanks for the promptness with which you responded to our invitation to lay the Corner Stone of the Moncton Masonic Temple, and I also desire to avail myself of this opportunity to compliment you on the very admirable and effective display the Craft has made this day under your authority. As the Great Architect of the Universe has today blest us by bestowing upon this gathering a perfect day together with the sunshine undimmed by clouds from that celestial body in the canopy of the heavens, so may the perfect sunshine of the Craft radiate from our proposed home undimmed by any clouds of dissension, and may the sunshine from our new home always radiate for the good and welfare of all members of the Craft.

The above resolution and the remarks of Bro. Atkinson were cordially acknowledged by the M.W. Grand Master.

Grand Lodge was then closed in ample form.
