


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# PROCEEDINGS SPECIAL COMMUNICATION

# The M.W. Grand Master :

"It is a great pleasure to open this session of Grand Lodge in St. Andrews, which was an important centre of Masonie activity in days gone by. With the exception of military Lodges which had travelling warrants, the first Lodge under Irish charter within the limits of the present Province of New Brunswick was held here, and attached to it was the first conclave or encampment of Knights Templar. They were called the Hibernian Lodge and Encampment, and it is their purple banner which you see on the wall of this Lodge room.

But more interesting and more important than this is the fact that the Hibernian Lodge kept its lights burning when Masonry was nearly extinct in the neighboring State of Maine, and the Brethren of Calais and Eastport came here for their Degrees and for the fraternal meetings.

A tablet or some other memorial should be placed to mark the site of the first meeting of old Hibernian, if it is definitely known."

The Grand Director of Ceremonies announced that the members of Grand Lodge and the Brethren would assemble in Androelia Hall at 2 o'clock. A procession would be formed and attend Divine Service and afterwards the Members of Grand Lodge would return to this Lodge Room.

Grand Lodge re-assembled in the Lodge Room of Saint Mark's Lodge at 4.30 o'clock, after having attended special service in All Saints Church, conducted by the Rector, Brother the Rev. A. B. Humphreys, who also preached the sermon.

On resuming the East the M.W. Grand Master expressed himself as very much pleased by the large attendance of the Craft, and the orderly conduct of the procession to and from the Church.

Resolutions expressing the thanks and appreciation of Grand Lodge were passed to Brother the Rev. A. B. Humphreys for his sermon; to the Rector, Church Wardens and Vestry of All Saints Church for the privilege of holding the service in the Church, and to the Organist and Choir for their splendid support.

The singing of the Choir from time to time added greatly to the beauty of the Ceremonial.

We cherish the memory of these our brothers whose passing has broken our ranks. To the brethren of other jurisdictions who mourn the loss of leaders we extend fraternal sympathy. In common with obscure and humble members of the Craft, many all unconscious of good work they have done, they are come to the place where all are equal. Through the golden gates of the West they have passed, to the land that is fairer than day. Whether their tasks were great or small, if they found their happiness here in the fulfilment of their obligations and the daily doing of useful things, we may be sure of their happiness there.

Again I have the pleasure of saying that no appeals to the Grand Master have called for official rulings during the year.

As the reports to be laid before you will show, the funds at the disposal of Grand Lodge are increasing; and, with one or two exceptions, the private lodges are in good condition financially and are quietly doing their work.

I regret that my intention of calling the District Deputy Grand Masters together early in the year was not carried out because of illness. I should like to see greater dignity and responsibility conferred upon these officers, as a means of bringing more closely together the lodges in their respective districts. The success which has attended an exchange of fraternal visits between neighbouring lodges, and the established custom of holding district meetings under the presidency of District Deputy Grand Masters elsewhere, encourage me to think that such an extension of their work would be beneficial.

In this connection, I wish to call attention to a comparatively new form of Masonic Charity which deals with unemployment. Through representative associations, in

some jurisdictions, an organized system of finding employment for Masons who are out of work is carried on. Here is perhaps a good work within our reach which could be made to pay its own expenses by small contributions from the beneficiaries.

I fear there is one evil custom increasing among us, that of admitting applicants who are not in a position to meet the cost of membership and to become regular contributors to Masonic charities. I have known of at least one case in which the applicant borrowed money to pay his initiation fee. It would be better if an applicant were required to show that he is not only self-supporting, but that he has made some provision for the support of his family in case of his death, before his application could be considered.

Because of distance, and for other personal reasons, I felt it necessary to decline a courteous invitation to visit the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario at its last annual communication. I am sure you will appreciate the honour thus extended to your representative.

In June I had the pleasure of visiting the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia in session at Halifax; and, accompanied by R.W. Bro. F. S. Sawaya, P. G. W., I remained until the close of its sessions. I realized more fully than ever before how closely we are bound by historical and other ties to our brethren in the older province. While I would not for a moment suggest that we surrender any part of our independence because of the historical fact that we were once under the jurisdiction of Nova Scotia, yet I think there are some phases of Masonic work in which joint action with that Grand Lodge might be of mutual advantage.

The report of an Emergent Communication at Grand Falls for the purpose of laying the corner stone of a new Masonic Hall for Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39, was printed with our last annual report. Another Emergent Communication was called to meet at Grand Falls on the twenty-fourth of last month, to dedicate to Masonic uses the very beautiful hall, since completed. The occasion was one of much gratification to me because of the large attendance of Grand Officers and others, including many visitors from lodges in Maine. The brethren of Colebrooke Lodge have made generous contributions to their building fund, and are to be congratulated upon the success of their efforts. About three hundred and fifty members and visitors were present at the banquet which followed the ceremonies.

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Saint John's Day in June falling on Sunday, I invited the members of Grand Lodge to assemble at Saint Andrews and join with Saint Mark's Lodge, No. 5, in attending divine service at All Saints Church. There was a large gathering of the Fraternity, including members of Saint Croix Lodge, Calais, Sussex Lodge, Saint Stephen, and Victoria Lodge, Milltown, who omitted their usual joint service on that day for the purpose of going to Saint Andrews.

I also had the pleasure of attending divine service with Sunbury Lodge, No. 42, on the last Sunday in July, and marked with satisfaction the dignity and solemnity of their proceedings.

The past year has been memorable with us for the advanced position Canada has taken among the nations of the world as a member of the Council of the League of Nations, and for its more general recognition as a land of promise. It has been a year of wonderful discoveries and marvellous achievements throughout the world; and has seen a series of efforts among Masons to unite their forces for the promotion of international harmony, that has not been without success. Changed and changing views among English-speaking Masons with respect to our relations with the Masons of South America and Central Europe have widened the field of Masonic recognition. Perhaps the greatest event in Masonic current history has

been the visit of R.W. Bro. Lord Cornwallis, Deputy Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of England, to India, Burmah and Ceylon, where the checkered floor of the Masonic Lodge furnishes the only common ground of intercourse for men of the various races and creeds in that mighty empire, and where the strengthening of Masonic influence which has followed his visit is expected to have lasting results.

An occasion of greater importance in the political world, however, is the present visit of the great Indian princes to England to plead for closer relations with the British Government.

The tenth anniversary of the close of the Great War sees preparations for the conclusion of a pact of peace to be signed in Paris on Monday of next week by the representatives of fifteen nations. Events move swiftly in the realms of thought and feeling. Much less than a year ago, such an agreement would have seemed impossible. It is deemed so great an occasion in the contemporary history of the world that the Anglican clergy in the Mother Land are calling upon their flocks to observe the day as one of prayer and thanksgiving. Masons, too, may well hail it with joy, as an earnest of the coming of that Brotherhood of Man which shall put an end to war in all the world. We cannot believe that as soon as war is formally outlawed all wrong will suddenly cease. We can and must believe that in the end right will prevail, when Man shall have fulfilled all the purposes of his existence here, when the lost word shall be found, and the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea. That end may even now be nearer than we think.

Brethren, I bespeak for my successor in office the same kind sympathy and assistance which you have given me, and I wish you increased prosperity and happiness under his rule.

Annual Returns for the year 1927 are lacking from three Lodges. From the Returns which have been received are derived the following figures as to degrees conferred and as to Membership:

The number of Members, in 1926, of the Lodges in default is included in the above total.

Since August last, 235 Certificates have been issued, being all that the Returns to date called for.

The blank forms on hand are nearly 100, but a further supply will be needed to provide for our Master Masons of 1928. For reasons of cost, the present imitation parchment will, doubtless, have to be retained.

The Dispensations of the Most Worshipful Grand Master, under the Seal of Grand Lodge, were 32 in number and of these 15 were for the purpose of attending Divine Service in regalia. One Dispensation authorized Miramichi Lodge to change its place of meeting to the former St. John's Presbyterian Church, Chatham. Another to Sussex Lodge, No. 7, to meet temporarily in another place while the Lodge Room damaged by fire, was being restored. A third, addressed to the Ritual Committee provided for the holding of a General Lodge of Instruction in Saint John.

Three Commissions were issued and two received.

The M.W. Grand Master appointed as Grand Representatives at the Grand Lodge of North Dakota R.W. Bro. John A. Graham of Bismark, and in a like position at the Grand Lodge of Maryland, W. Bro. George S. Yost of

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Baltimore; also to represent this Grand Lodge near the Grand Lodge of Norway M.W. Bro. Ferdinand G. Juell of Oslo.

R.W. Bro. Stanley M. Wetmore, D. G. M., has been commissioned to represent the Grand Lodge of Quebec in this Grand Lodge and R.W. Bro. R. Percy Dickson, P. G. W., the Grand Lodge of Mississippi.

The cost of Aprons, Master Mason and Past Master has been reduced by two shillings — so the present prices are — Past Master's Apron \$8.00, Master Mason Apron \$4.75, leather case \$1.75.

Some Manuals, though comparatively few, have been disposed of.

Attention is called to a verbal omission in the Manual, on page 30, in the third line from the bottom, insert the word "ever" before the word "exist."

The beneficial practice of providing each Brother, at his raising, with an Apron and a Manual is gradually though too slowly spreading among the Lodges. From every point of view it is a desirable practice. It supplies each new member with his essential Masonic clothing and it places in his hands the means of becoming closely familiar with much of our admirable work.

# REPORT OF BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

# To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The Board at its first meeting after the Annual Communication elected W. Bro. John R. Haycock, P. G. D. as its Vice-President, and requested Past Grand Masters Wilson and Ellis to continue to act with the M.W. Grand Master as the Committee of the Fund of Benevolence. The Committee received twelve applications for assistance during the year and made the following grants:

The financial condition of the fund is one to cause very great satisfaction. Its investments have been augmented to the extent of \$3,000.00, bonds for that amount having been purchased by the Directors of the Corporation, out of the general balance, and transferred to the fund. The cash balance has increased by \$607.84 being the excess of income over the above grants. The investments — now \$33,000.00 — assure an annual income of well up to \$1,700.00.

As to the Sinking Fund, its holdings now exceed the bonds of the Masonic Hall Company and of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation which together amount to

\$32,000.00 and which have to be redeemed in September, 1929. The assets of the Sinking Fund, as shown by the accounts are \$33,144.31 and there are certain assessments yet to be received.

The full aim and object of the assessment imposed by Grand Lodge in 1923 has therefore been attained and the Board deems it but right to recommend that the assessment for the current year 1928 be remitted; and to that end, suggests that a formal resolution to this effect be passed by Grand Lodge.

In its report last year, the Board was at some pains to represent the need of new regalia because of the worn condition of that then in use, and it asked Grand Lodge to approve of the purchase of a new set. The proposal did not at the time, however, receive much encouragement and so the matter has rested.

During the year, the present outfit has seen a good deal of service and is further impaired. It will no doubt for some time to come answer for evening visits and stand the wear and tear of packing and re-packing; but — to quote the Constitutions — "In Grand Lodge and at great ceremonials and festivals," clothing more worthy should be supplied for the Grand Officers. At its last meeting, the Board adopted a motion, "that Grand Lodge be recommended to approve of the purchase of new regalia and to authorize the Board to take the necessary action."

The second section, respecting the Sinking Fund, was considered and likewise adopted.

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The third section, as to the regalia of Grand Lodge, on motion of R.W. Bro. H. V. B. Bridges, P.G.M., seconded by R.W. Bro. S. M. Wetmore, D.G.M., was adopted, and the recommendation as to procuring new regalia was approved of.

The report of the Board, as a whole, was then adopted.

"That the special assessment on the members of the private Lodges for the current year 1928 be withdrawn, inasmuch as the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the Hall Bonds is now sufficient to discharge the whole indebtedness."—*Carried*.

The annual accounts of the V.W. Grand Treasurer, the report of the Audit Committee thereon, and the report of the Managing Committee of the Hall were presented by the R.W. Deputy Grand Master and copies distributed. The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation at its annual meeting had already considered and adopted these reports.

Under this authority the Directors approved of the purchase of bonds of the Canadian Government Railways par value \$3,000.00  $4\frac{1}{2}\%$  due in 1954, and the same were delivered into the custody of the Grand Treasurer, to be added to the Fund's securities.

The report of the Auditors and also that of the Managing Committee of the Hall have been approved of by the Board and are herewith submitted.

To the Directors of the Grand Lodge Corporation:

Your Hall Committee beg to submit the following report:

Immediately after taking over the care of the Hall, your Committee arranged with Mr. Munro to lay a floor (tongue and grooved) over the Blue Room, thereby protecting the ceiling, and making the room above available for storage purposes. This work cost in the vicinity of \$400.00. The entrances to the five stores on Germain Street, have been re-laid in hardwood; a toilet has been installed for the Vaughan Electric Co.; the McLaren store has been repainted throughout. This is the first work that has been done in this store for at least twelve years. Some work has also been done for Mr. Keys, and in the Elks apartments. The entire Germain Street front has been painted, including the window sashes on this front, and on the lower entrances. A new fence has been erected, protecting the wall in the rear, and new steps to the back entrance.

On the roof, it was found necessary to do considerable work, and your Committee attach herewith J. E. Wilson Co.'s report, with reference to same.

The two sample rooms are still unrented, the smaller having been let once or twice for short periods.

The Committee are pleased to report that all rents are full paid up for the year.

Your Committee have made some experiments with Pea Coal, and would suggest that the in-coming Committee look fully into the matter of forced draft, with a view to using this grade of coal, thereby saving at least \$5.00 per ton.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., August 2nd, 1928. In connection with Masonic Hall building, the slating work on the

mansard and towers was broken and loose and in bad shape generally. We repaired the slating and fitted flashings, also where it was impossible to repair the slates we fitted on copper. This copper work is permanent work and in case the rest of the slating work should give you trouble the copper work necessary could be continued from the present work. The cornices on the tower were rusted through, also the ridge rolls, flashings, sill coverings, also the louvres and galvanized work was completely rusted out, and you were fortunate in not having more serious damage to the interior of the building; the metal work in most cases was simply held in place by the paint. The slating work was repaired in general, and ornaments. Yours truly,

# THURSDAY EVENING.

### August 23, 1928.

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The nominations filed with the V.W. Grand Secretary were duly announced in their order and ballots taken for each elective office.

# REPORT ON GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick :

The Committee to which was referred the address of the M.W. the Grand Master wishes to congratulate him on the completion of his second year in office, upon the fact that health and strength have been continued to him and upon the full measure of success which has crowned his work, not only in visiting different Lodges in this jurisdiction, but also in attending the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.

It is, indeed, very fitting that the Grand Master should refer by name to those whose loss we all mourn for the names of the many prominent members of our Ancient Institution who have passed away during the year recall to us friendships which must longer live in memory only, but the recollection of which will doubtless lead us to emulate their examples. May they rest in peace.

Grand Lodge learns with pleasure that harmony has been maintained throughout the jurisdiction, that the funds available for Grand Lodge are more than ample to discharge all obligations and that private Lodges as well show a sound position financially.

It is a matter to be regretted by the members of Grand Lodge that the Grand Master was unable, through illness, to call together the District Deputy Grand Masters, and Grand Lodge expresses the hope that such a conference may be held in the near future, feeling that the holding of district meetings, under the leadership of the District Deputies, would be beneficial to the Order and add greater dignity and responsibility to these offices.

In the opinion of Grand Lodge the form of Masonic Charity, dealing with employment, as suggested in the address of the Grand Master, is worthy of thoughtful consideration; but it is the feeling of Grand Lodge also that any tendency among Masons to admit to the Order applicants who are positively not in a position financially to meet the costs of membership should be strongly deprecated.

Grand Lodge learns with pleasure of the completion and dedication of the new Masonic building at Grand Falls for the uses of Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39, and congratulates most heartily the brethren on the success of their efforts, and expresses the hope that this success may be the cause of still greater Masonic activity in that vicinity. Grand Lodge is in hearty agreement with the Grand Master that the past year has witnessed Canada taking an advanced position among the nations of the world as a member of the Council of the League of Nations, and that there has been a series of efforts among Masons throughout the world to unite their forces for the benefit of international harmony and peace.

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It is with a spirit of thankfulness that the concluding paragraph of the Grand Master's address is noted: that the tenth anniversary of the close of the Great War sees preparations for the conclusion of a peace pact to be signed by the representatives of fifteen nations. Freemasonry has always flourished in times of peace. Masonry has always deplored the miseries and sufferings which are inevitable consequences of war, and therefore it is our hope and trust that peace may be permanent and lasting, and that "the end," in the words of the Great Master, "May be nearer, now, than we think."

I have enjoyed each and all my visits, and must add that the best of harmony and goodfellowship prevailed, and it is with the greatest of pleasure that I present for your approval my official report.

My first visit was to Tweedie Lodge, No. 41, accompanied by several of the Brethren from Keith Lodge, when the Third Degree was exemplified in a creditable manner by the officers of that Lodge.
