

### FREEMASONS' HALL.

WEST SAINT JOHN, Thursday, March 21st, 1929.

An Emergent Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick was held this afternoon, pursuant to the following Proclamation:

. Wardens of all Lodges within the jurisdiction of the
Grand Lodge:

Are Hereby Summoned to attend an Emergent Communication to be holden at Freemasons' Hall, West Saint John, on Thursday, the twenty-first day of March, next, at 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon.

The particular reasons for convening the Communication are to decide:

- Whether or no the Masonic Hall at Saint John, recently destroyed shall be rebuilt and restored, or the property and insurance monies on the building otherwise disposed of.
- If so, shall it be constructed as Grand Lodge Headquarters with a Lodge Room for Grand Lodge and to accommodate the local Lodges, and with Apartments for the Scottish Rite and for Luxor Temple.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Grand Lodge was opened in ample form at 3.15 o'clock. The Proclamation having first been read by direction of the M.W. Grand Master, he referred at some length to the cause and to the importance of this Emergent Communication. He was gratified at the very large attendance as it indicated that the situation created by the destruction of Freemasons' Hall had aroused much concern and was receiving close consideration. He hoped that unanimity would result from the deliberations.

A motion was made by R.W. Bro. E. H. Cairns, seconded by W. Bro. Clive Dickason, to the effect that the restoration of the Hall Building be undertaken by Grand Lodge.

In amendment it was moved by R.W. Bro. R. P. Dickson, seconded by R.W. Bro. A. R. Fraser, to the effect that the land and premises as they now stand be disposed of.

A large number of brethren took part in the prolonged discussion. R.W. Bro. H. A. Porter read numerous extracts from the Annual Proceedings as to the erection of the Hall by the New Brunswick Masonic Hall Company and the financial arrangements which were made at the time and as to the subsequent acquisition of the property by the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation.

It was finally agreed that a Special Committee of seven be appointed to frame a resolution harmonizing as far as possible the motion and the amendment and the views expressed during the discussion.

R.W. Bro. Cairns, W. Bro. Dickason, R.W. Bro. Dickson and R.W. Bro. Fraser, the mover and seconder of the motion and of the amendment, and R.W. Bros. H. A. Porter, G. Percy Burchill and George D. Ellis were constituted the Committee.

Grand Lodge was called off for half an hour and on resuming, the amendment and the motion were, with its consent withdrawn.

March

The Special Committee then submitted the following resolution as the result of its deliberations:

Resolved.

"That this Grand Lodge instruct the Directors of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation to undertake to transfer to any Masonic Body or Masonic Corporation in Saint John the premises on Germain Street provided that Body or Corporation undertake to erect a proper Masonic Temple in the said City of Saint John. And further the said Directors be authorized and instructed to advance to the said Body or Corporation any sum or sums to the total amount of \$35,000.00 towards the construction of the said building. And further, that the said Directors donate and cancel all said advances when the building is satisfactorily finished. The Grand Lodge further go on record as desiring to rent quarters in the said building and pay reasonable rental therefor."

This resolution was then formally moved by R.W. Bro. H. A. Porter, seconded by R.W. Bro. G. Percy Burchill, and was declared *Carried*.

Also Resolved.

"That, in the event of this proposal being accepted, the balance of insurance monies remaining after the payment of the \$35,000.00, be transferred to the Fund of Benevolence."

The M.W. Grand Master announced that Carleton Union Lodge, No. 8, had arranged for a supper in the downstairs rooms at six o'clock and that the members of Grand Lodge were cordially and fraternally invited.

Moved by R.W. Bro. George D. Ellis, P.G.M., seconded by the R.W. Deputy Grand Master,

"That to mark the appreciation of Grand Lodge of the action of the Master, Wardens and Brethren of Carleton Union Lodge in placing their Lodge premises at the service of Grand Lodge and in providing supper for the members, the sum of one hundred dollars be granted from the funds of Grand Lodge."—Carried.

Grand Lodge was then closed in ample form.

The President on calling the meeting to order read that part of the Proclamation which summoned this meeting.

## ANNUAL MEETING.

Moncton, August 22, 1929.

The Annual Meeting of "The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation" was held this afternoon in the Masonic Temple, in the City of Moncton, at 2.30 o'clock, pursuant to notice contained in the proclamation summoning the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge.

The minutes of the Annual Meeting of 1928 were read and confirmed.

The Grand Treasurer, V.W. Ernest H. Cameron, presented the accounts of the Corporation for the past year and printed copies of the same were distributed. The various statements relating to the General Account, Fund of Benevolence, Sinking Fund and Insurance Fund, were read by the Grand Treasurer, and on motion, these were received and laid on the table.

The Chairman of the Board of Directors R.W. the Rev. C. G. Lawrence, D.G.M., next submitted the report of the Board, and in it was included a full report of the Auditors. R.W. Bros. John Thornton and S. M. Wetmore, covering the year's accounts and certifying as to the correctness of bank balances and of the bond holdings.

Moved by R.W. J. Gordon Forbes, seconded by R.W. H. V. B. Bridges,

"That the gratifying statement of accounts furnished by the Grand Treasurer be taken from the table and adopted; and together with the Directors' Report, referred to Grand Lodge for its information and with the view of being printed in the Annual Proceedings."—Carried.

There was some discussion on the recommendation with which the report of the Directors concluded. This was to the effect that the surplus monies of the Insurance Fund be transferred to the Fund of Benevolence. The view was expressed that the insurance losses paid on regalia and portrait should remain to the credit of the General Account and this view seemed to meet with approval.

It was finally Resolved, on motion of R.W. Bros. George D. Ellis and E. H. Cairns,

"That the recommendation as to the balance of the insurance monies be referred to the incoming Board of Directors to make such distribution of the balance as it may deem best."

The Annual Meeting of "The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation" on motion then adjourned.

### GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

#### BRETHREN:

1929]

At this time it now becomes my duty, and a most pleasant one, to welcome you at your Sixty-second Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons, of New Brunswick, to hear the reports of the past year submitted, and to lay out our work for the future and welfare of the Craft.

I take this opportunity to acknowledge the honor that you conferred upon me at the last Annual Communication, in electing me to the high office of Grand Master, and desire to express my sincere thanks to the Brethren throughout the jurisdiction who placed their confidence in me and sincerely trust that I have to some extent at least measured up to their expectations.

As in years past we are again called upon to mourn the loss of a number of the members of our Fraternity, who have been called to the Great Beyond, by the Supreme Architect, and therefore at this time recall the names of those who appeared on the Roll at our last Annual Communication, who have been removed by the hand of death.

We cherish in our memories the names of our departed Brethren, and to their families and relatives extend fra-

ternal sympathy. As a mark of respect, the Brethren

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assembled will stand in silent prayer, until the sound of the gavel in the east.

As a Fraternity, we should humbly render thanks to the Supreme Architect, for the manifold blessings we have received, Providence having bountifully supplied our needs; our country as a whole having been blessed with bounteous crops and prosperity during the year. No dissensions have arisen to cause the leaders in governmental affairs undue anxiety, and some progress is being made along the lines of continued peace.

For a time, we, in common with all loyal British subjects throughout the world were considerably disturbed over the serious illness of our beloved Sovereign, George the Fifth, but are deeply thankful to know that all indications now point to His Gracious Majesty being again fully restored to health.

The year has been one free from anything of a serious or contentious nature among the Masons of the Province, no appeals having reached the Chair, which indicates that harmony prevails among the Brethren. The year, however, has not been one without anxiety and loss to us, as a Fraternity, and it is still fresh in our memories the disastrous fire of January 26, 1929, when our beautiful Temple (the Headquarters of Grand Lodge), was utterly destroyed by fire. The structure was erected in 1879, and for many years has been the home of the Masonic Fraternity of the Province of New Brunswick, and while steps are now being taken to replace the building, the many pleasing memories and associations linked with the old structure, are now a thing of the past. The collection of the gallery of portraits of Past Grand Masters, some of them very valuable, and the work of eminent artists, were all destroyed, and in this our Fraternity suffered an irreparable loss.

Invitations were received during the year from the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island, and the Grand Lodge of Ontario, inviting me to be their guest at their Annual Communications, but on account of business matters was compelled to decline same.

## EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS OF GRAND LODGE.

On account of the loss by fire of the Masonic Temple, an Emergency Communication of Grand Lodge was summoned at the Freemasons' Hall, West Saint John, on Thursday, the twenty-first day of March, at 2.30 in the afternoon, the purpose of the Meeting being to take action in connection with the property destroyed. The Meeting was very largely attended, nearly all the private Lodges in the jurisdiction being represented. The deliberations of the Meeting resulted in the following resolution being adopted:

"Resolved, that this Grand Lodge instruct the Directors of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation to undertake to transfer to any Masonic Body or Masonic Corporation in Saint John the premises on Germain Street provided that Body or Corporation undertake to erect a proper Masonic Temple in the said City of Saint John And, further, the said Directors be authorized and instructed to advance to the said Body or Corporation any sum or sums to the total amount of \$35,000 towards the construction of the said Building. And, further, that the said Directors donate and cancel all said advances when the Building is satisfactorily finished. The Grand Lodge further goes on record as desiring to rent quarters in the said building and pay reasonable rental therefor."

Official notification of the acceptance of the above proposition by the Saint John Masonic Temple Limited was laid before your Beard of General Purposes at their Meeting on August eighth. Plans have been prepared and tenders for the erection of the building called for, to close August ninth, so the Fraternity are now assured that an up to date Masonic Temple will again grace the premises where the Grand Lodge Masonic Temple formerly stood. The Plans provide for a Grand Lodge Board Room, Grand Secretary's Office, Library Quarters and Vault.

A second Special Communication of Grand Lodge was summoned to meet in the Masonic Temple, Moncton, on

Sunday, June 23rd, for the purpose of attending Divine Service in St. John's United Church. The Right Worshipful Senior Grand Wanden the Reverend Hugh Miller, delivered the address, which was greatly enjoyed by the large number of Brethren present, his subject being, "What Manner of Man Are You?" Brother, the Reverend J. A. Ramsay, assisted in the Service, and thus was St. John's Day fittingly celebrated.

#### OFFICIAL VISITS.

On October 11, 1928, visited Zetland Lodge, No. 24, Shediae. The Third Degree was conferred in a very creditable manner, a number of their Past Masters assisting in the work. A large number of Brethren were present from Lodge Saint Andrew, Westmorland, and Salisbury Lodges. During the evening it was my pleasure to instal Worshipful C. Avard White as Grand Sword Bearer.

On October 12, 1928, visited Fownes Lodge, No. 45, Havelock. No degree work took place during the evening, but an excellent opportunity was afforded of discussing Masonic matters with the Brethren. The Lodge convened at seven o'clock, in order to permit a further visit to Steven Lodge during the same evening.

On October 12, 1928, visited Steven Lodge, No. 37, Petiteodiae. A large number of the Brethren from Fownes Lodge accompanied us on our visit to Steven. There being no degree work, matters pertaining to the Lodge, as regards their financial position, etc., were fully discussed.

On October 15, 1928, visited Lodge Saint Andrew, No. 16, Richibueto. The Second Degree was conferred in a very creditable manner. The Officers were laboring under considerable disadvantage on this evening, as on the morning of our visit the hand of death had removed their faithful Tyler.

On October 18, 1928, visited Howard Lodge, No. 15, Hillsborough, where the Lodge having no candidate, the Second Degree was exemplified on one of their Brethren in a very creditable and pleasing manner. On October 23, 1928, visited Albert Lodge, No. 34, Albert, where the Second Degree was exemplified in a very pleasing manner, this being the Mother Lodge of Wor. D. D. G. Master Jones.

On October 25, 1928, visited Westmorland Lodge, No. 44, Port Elgin, where we witnessed the exemplification of the Third Degree.

On October 30, 1928, visited Restigouche Lodge, No. 25, Dalhousie, the occasion being the celebration of their Diamond Jubilee. There was a record attendance of the Lodge, and a very interesting history of Restigouche No. 25, was read by Brother J. R. Disbrow, a son of one of the charter members of that Lodge. The Third Degree was also conferred upon two candidates, followed by a banquet.

On October 31, 1928, visited St. John's Lodge, No. 27, Bathurst, and witnessed the exemplification of the Second Degree.

On November 2, 1928, visited Salisbury Lodge, No. 20, Salisbury, there being an exceedingly large attendance, over one hundred being present in this small village, a number of Brethren having come considerable distance to make the Meeting a success. The Second Degree was conferred.

On November 8, 1928, visited Sussex Lodge, No. 4, Dorchester, the Second Degree being conferred, and a large number of Brethren being present from Port Elgin, Sackville, Salisbury, and Petiteodiae.

On November 20, 197, visited Lebanon Lodge, No. 28, Sackville, the Third Deree being exemplified in a most pleasing manner. The Meeting was largely attended. About sixty visitors were present from Port Elgin, Dorchester, Salisbury, Albert and Moneton.

On November 26, 1928, visited Miramichi Lodge, No. 18, Chatham, the First Degree being conferred. This afforded an opportunity of inspecting the building recently purchased by the Brethren of Miramichi Lodge, the appointments being excellent, and when the Lodge convenes in the large room in the building, will be one

of the most spacious and best appointed Lodge quarters in the Province.

On November 29, 1928, again visited Sussex Lodge, No. 4, being pleased to accept an invitation to be present at the celebration of their Diamond Jubilee. The Lodge convened in the early evening, and later adjourned to the Windsor Hotel, where a largely attended Banquet was held, the evening being pleasantly spent.

On December 27, 1928, on invitation, visited Keith Lodge, No. 23, Moncton, for the purpose of installing the Officers for the new year.

On January 11, 1929, on invitation, visited Tweedie Lodge, No. 45, Moneton, and duly installed the new Officers.

On January 15, 1929, was pleased to accept an invitation to install the Officers of The Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10, Saint John, a large number of Grand Officers being present, and a very pleasant and enjoyable evening was spent, the Officers' Banquet after installation being a feature of the evening.

On May 6, 1929, visited Zion Lodge, No. 21, Sussex, the Third Degree being conferred, a very large gathering present.

On May 14, 1929, visited Northumberland Lodge, No. 17, Newcastle, the Third Degree being conferred.

On May 15, 1929, visited Campbellton Lodge, No. 32, the First Degree being conferred. Following the degree a most excellent Banquet was tendered the visitors in the Presbyterian Church Banquet Hall.

On June 3, 1929, visited Bethel Lodge, No. 40, Edmundston, the First Degree being conferred.

On June 4, 1929, visited Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39, Grand Falls, and witnessed the conferring of First Degree.

On June 5, 1929, visited Benjamin Lodge, No. 31, Andover, the First Degree being conferred.

On June 6, 1929, visited Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, the First Degree being conferred.

On June 7, 1929, visited Carleton Lodge, No. 35, East Florenceville, the Third Degree being conferred.

On June 7, 1929, visited Hartland Lodge, No. 46, the Second Degree being conferred.

The week's experience in visiting these six Lodges on the Saint John River was singularly pleasant and satisfactory. It was my first visit to this beauteous portion of the Province and the striking scenery—the long extended views—were a daily delight. I was necessarily much gratified by the attention and courtesy of the Brethren whom I met, and impressed by the comfort and attractiveness of the well-furnished Lodge Rooms. We were everywhere met with hospitality and good-will, and the whole week was for us full of interest and gratification.

On June 14, 1929, visited The Corinthian Lodge, No. 13, Hampton, the Third Degree being conferred.

On June 24, 1929, visited Carleton Union, No. 8, West Saint John, it being their Annual Celebration of St. John's Day, the R.W. Deputy Grand Master, Rev. C. Gordon Lawrence being the speaker of the evening, the address being most eloquent and instructive. At the close of the Lodge, a Banquet was served in their spacious quarters, and was a most enjoyable affair.

Taking the Jurisdiction as a whole (judging from the Lodges visited to date), I consider that the private Lodges in nearly every case are in very comfortable quarters, showing that during the last few years a great deal of attention has been given to improving the Lodge rooms. This is very gratifying, and evidence that the members are endeavoring to make their meeting places more homelike and attractive.

On our official visits to the Lodges, Chatham to Campbellton and Woodstock to Edmundston, we were favored with the presence of the Very Worshipful Grand Secretary, and these Lodges were thus afforded the opportunity of having any slight differences in their work corrected in his kindly manner, as well as receiving instruction in

any part of the work on which they were not fully posted. His presence seemed to be greatly enjoyed.

I have commented only briefly on the Official Visits made during the year, as on account of the goodly number, if extended remarks were made in each case, the lengthy report might prove somewhat tiresome to my hearers. I found the work in the majority of the Lodges of a very creditable character, and consider that the Ritual is being very well adhered to, when we take into account the difficulty that a great many of the Lodges are laboring under as regards proper instruction in the correct Ritual. I find, however, that in some districts, Past Masters are assisting very materially the younger officers with good results, one noticeable district being No. 4, where R.W. Brother Gabel is making frequent visits, greatly to the benefit of the Officers of the different Lodges.

On every occasion of Official Visits, I was handsomely supported by Grand and Past Grand Officers, as well as a goodly number of Officers and members of private Lodges in the district visited. On all occasions the Grand Officers and visiting Brethren were cordially received, and at the close of the Lodge, were royally banquetted, adding greatly to the pleasure and enjoyment of the evening.

### AMENDMENTS TO BY LAWS.

Applications for amendments to By-Laws were very few, and in only two or three cases have I been called upon to approve of slight amendments after the same had been regularly adopted by the interested Lodge.

## APPOINTMENT OF GRAND REPRESENTATIVES.

During the year I was pleased to appoint the following Representatives:

Past Master Brother Lindsay Smith Giffon, of Winkelman, Arizona, as Grand Representative, residing near the Grand Lodge of Arizona. Past Master Lewis H. Johnston, residing near the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma, Brother Johnston to succeed the late Grand Representative, David D. Hoeg.

Past Master J. A. V. Preston, Grand Representative near the Grand Lodge of Canada, Province of Ontario.

During the year, on account of the removal of Right Worshipful R. T. Mosely, from Grand Falls, I was pleased to appoint Right Worshipful J. W. Niles as District Deputy Grand Master of District No. 4. R.W. Brother Niles has entered into the work with a truly Masonic spirit, and is very popular with the Lodges in District No. 4.

On account of the loss by fire of the Grand Lodge Dress Regalia, the Board of General Purposes authorized the purchase of two sets: one undress, and the other full dress, the authorization for the purchase of the full dress being left with a committee at the last regular Communication of the Grand Lodge. The Committee, I consider, acted wisely, deciding to purchase two sets. The undress to be used for Grand Lodge Official Visits, and thus save from deterioration the full dress, which is very liable to be damaged through travel.

In summing up the situation, after having visited in the vicinity of thirty private Lodges, I consider that the affairs of private Lodges are in very fair condition. A large number of enthusiastic young men are now coming to the front in the Lodges throughout the jurisdiction, and good progress in Masonry should be made in the future.

One matter that I think calls for special consideration, and would like to see dealt with at this Communication, is the question of the advisability of appointing for a year at least, some thoroughly competent person to the position of Ritual Instructor. It is almost impossible for the Lodges situated in the remote districts to prepare their work so that the Ritual will be fully carried out, and I do not see any way that this can be accomplished unless by the appointment of a competent person, whose business it will be to travel throughout the jurisdiction

at frequent intervals and spend considerable time with the different Lodges until the Officers are fully competent to give the proper instructions. This matter has been mentioned before and recommended by Grand Masters, and while there now is on the records authority for occasional visits of a Grand Lecturer, I do not think that the work can be successfully carried out until such time as some person is appointed whose full duty it is to visit the different places and hold Lodges of Instruction, where the Officers may receive the correct wording of our Ritual.

As you will learn from the report of the R. W. D. G. Master and the Worshipful D. D. G. Masters, the full jurisdiction has been pretty well covered, and the reports as submitted assure us that progress in Masonry is being made throughout the province.

#### FINANCIAL.

The financial position of Grand Lodge, as you will observe from the V.W. Grand Treasurer's report, is now on a sound basis. The outstanding Bonds, which have been running for a number of years, and for the retirement of which a special assessment was authorized in 1924, are to be paid in full on September 1st, 1929, thus relieving the Grand Lodge Corporation of any outstanding indebtedness. After contributing \$35,000 to the Saint John Temple Limited, as per resolution of Grand Lodge, dated March 21st, 1929, we will have a balance on hand from the Insurance on our Temple of about \$20,000.00. This, added to the amount of our Benevolent Fund, gives us a very substantial balance to our credit.

With the Fraternity in its present happy position financially, and every reason to believe, from the prosperity evidenced in our beloved Province that our position will continue to improve, it would seem to be an opportune time to lay out on our Masonic trestle board some object worthy of achievement by our noble Order, and thus place before our members some definite goal worthy of accomplishment.

Just what form this should take, is a matter for very careful consideration and thought. But with a member-

ship of over 6,000 we are capable of taking on some line of activity that will be a credit to Masonry, and to the permanent benefit of the Fraternity. As I stated above, I am not in a position to suggest just what this line of action should be, but we must not lose sight of the fact that a goodly number of our Brethren are now reaching advanced years, and some are in very indifferent health and circumstances, and one of our first considerations must be for their comfort and, if necessary, their relief. Whether this should be met by the establishment of a Masonic Home for the care of aged Masons and their wives, who through force of circumstances are no longer able to provide for themselves in comfort, or through some form of financial relief, are matters for our consideration.

I am convinced that now is the time to make a start, and feel sure that all members of the Fraternity will agree that it is a matter of such importance that provided any resolution is advanced at this Annual Communication, requiring report at a later date that an Emergency Communication of Grand Lodge should be held to hear and take action thereon.

I desire to mention the support accorded myself and Grand Lodge Officers on our official visits by the District Deputy Grand Master, Right Worshipful Walter S. Jones, F. Arthur MacKenzie, J. W. Niles, while in their districts. Also thank for their support the following Brethren who accompanied us on a goodly number of our visits:

all occasions, which has made my year as your Grand Master a very pleasant one indeed.

Particularly do I wish to mention the Very Worshipful Grand Secretary, Brother J. T. Hartt, who has been untiring in his efforts to assist me in all matters which have come before me; R.W. Deputy Grand Master the Reverend C. Gordon Lawrence; V.W. Grand Treasurer Cameron; Worshipful Grand Director of Ceremonies Gibson, who has proved himself a most efficient Grand Director, always courteous and attentive; Worshipful Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies Irving, Senior Grand Deacon Silas C. Wright, and Junior Grand Deacon Col. L. C. Carey.

I also desire to thank all members of the Fraternity for their co-operation throughout the year, and ask the same assistance and co-operation for my successor.

The Board has held four regular and three special meetings during the past twelve months. R.W. Bro. R. Percy Dickson, P.G.W., was chosen Vice-President of the Board and R.W. Bros. LeBaron Wilson and George D. Ellis were requested to again act with the M.W. Grand Master as the Committee of the Fund of Benevolence.

Apart from the Cash balance, the assets of the Fund remain unchanged from last year, viz., \$33,000.

Preparatory to ordering the Full Dress Regalia, as authorized by Grand Lodge, the Board had decided that the then regalia, after the January installations were over, should be sent to Spencer & Co., London, to be lined with garter blue leather, both Aprons and Collars; and the sett would thus have been rendered serviceable for official visits for many a year. This intention was, of course, frustrated by the total destruction of the regalia on January 26th.

In the extremity thus created, the Special Committee of the Board, the M.W. Grand Master, R.W. Bros. G. D. Ellis, John Thornton and Grand Secretary decided to at once order a sett of undress regalia for use on official visits to the Private Lodges. A very prompt delivery was made by Spencer & Co. and the regalia is very satisfactory and much admired.

The Full Dress regalia was at the same time be-spoken and the final shipment came to hand in July. It makes its first appearance at this Annual Communication. There remains only the ordering of silver gilt collar jewels as to which there has been some correspondence. The combined cost of the two sets duty included has been \$2,525.63, as is shown in the Grand Treasurer's Accounts.

It is the intention to prepare with the V.W. Grand Treasurer's assistance, an itemized statement of the total cost, indicating price and duty of each Grand Officer's regalia and to print the same in the Annual Proceedings as a record for the future.

In order to provide a suitable and safe receptacle for the regalia at all times when not in use, a steel fire-proof cabinet has been purchased, the drawers of which will readily hold the various parts

The large expenditure for printing and stationery was because, in addition to the 600 copies of the Proceedings for 1928, it was necessary to have printed 500 copies of Lodge Returns, 500 copies of Applications to the Fund of Benevolence, Proclamations and Circulars for the Special Communication on March 21st, and the Special Church Service on June 23rd, and sundries from time to time. It will be necessary for the incoming Board to authorize the printing of a new edition of the Constitutions as the one of 1,000 copies printed in 1924 is exhausted.

A supply of Past Master and Master Mason Aprons and cases has just been received, and these, as hitherto,

may be had at cost price.

The Credential Committee for this Communication is composed of W. Bros. Robert L. Algie, Keith Lodge, No. 23, Aldran R. Bennett, Tweedie Lodge No. 41, and George E. Dawes. Howard Lodge No. 15.



## REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS.

To "The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation":

The Corporation meets in Annual Session under very changed auspices. The utter destruction of Freemasous' Hall in Saint John and all its contents has made the Corporation but little more than a name, and the Grand Lodge itself homeless. The time may come when it will be desirable to frame an adequate record of the occurrence and its many results, but at the moment it may be well to state briefly what has transpired and what steps have been taken since the disaster.

At the Special Communication of Grand Lodge, on March 21st, and at the Special Meeting of the Corporation held immediately afterwards, the following resolution agreed upon by a Select Committee of Seven, was adopted by both Bodies:

"That this Grand Lodge (Corporation) instruct the Directors of The Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation to undertake to transfer to any Masonic Body or Masonic Corporation in Saint John the premises on Germain Street provided that Body or Corporation undertake to erect a proper Masonic Temple in the said City of Saint John. And further, that said Directors be authorized and instructed to advance to the said Body or Corporation any sum or sums to the total amount of \$35,000 towards the construction of the said Building. And further, that the said Directors donate and cancel all said advances when the Building is satisfactorily finished. The Grand Lodge further go on record as desiring to rent quarters in the said Building and pay reasonable rental therefor."

The offer here made was in due time acted upon by a Committee of Brethren representing the five Lodges in Saint John, plans were prepared, tenders called for, and a new Corporation, "Saint John Masonic Temple Limited," legally formed. Its formation was notified to Grand Lodge by its Board of Directors and request was made for a transfer to the new Body of the Germain Street premises, and the payment of the monies in ac-

cordance with the above resolution. Subsequently, the following resolution was certified to the Grand Secretary as having been passed by the Board of Directors of Saint John Masonic Temple Limited at a meeting held on the 12th day of August instant.

"On motion, duly made and seconded, Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to write the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge advising him that this Board had undertaken to rebuild and repair the Masonic Temple on Germain Street and to provide quarters therein for the Grand Lodge."

Your Directors at a special meeting on the 8th instant, adopted the following resolution:

"That on completion of guarantee from the 'Saint John Masonic Temple Limited,' of intention to construct a new Masonic Temple in Saint John, the proper Officers of the Corporation transfer to the new Corporation the land and premises on Germain Street, and that the V.W. Grand Treasurer be authorized to pay over to the new Corporation the sum of \$35,000 from time to time as required, the whole amount to be paid within two months from the signing of contract."

It may be added that the Deed of Grant is ready for execution. Such is the situation at the moment.

The Board has pleasure in presenting herewith the report of the Auditors, R.W. Bros. Thornton and Wetmore, who again most obligingly undertook a duty which of late years has certainly not become, in any degree, less onerous or less responsible.

The V.W. Grand Treasurer was authorized to pay to the Moncton Masonic Temple Company the sum of one hundred dollars to mark the satisfaction of Grand Lodge with the arrangements made for this Annual Communication and the excellent accommodation provided.

"That the salary of the V.W. Grand Secretary be increased to \$1,500.00 per annum."—Carried.

The R.W. Deputy Grand Master presented the report of the Special Committee on the Grand Master's address.

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The Committee appointed to consider the address of the M.W. the Grand Master expresses its appreciation of the careful attention the Grand Master has given the interests of the Fraternity and share his satisfaction with the evidences of progress and continued harmony.

The passing from our midst of eleven members of Grand Lodge since our last Annual Communication attracts our attention to the most precious teaching of our profession. We heartily share the Grand Master's belief that they have been called by the Supreme Architect to service in the Great Beyond.

It is a matter of great satisfaction that the Grand Master has found it convenient to visit officially so many of the Private Lodges. The inspiration of his presence and the benefit of his advice and instruction are greatly to the interest of the Fraternity.

The Grand Master's desire to see upon the Trestle Board of Grand Lodge the design of an "object worthy of achievement by our Noble Order" is heartily shared by the committee and recommended to Grand Lodge for deliberate consideration at the next Annual Communication.

Permit me to express my appreciation of the honour conferred upon me last year by my elevation to my present office, and through the medium of this report to thank the brethren of my district for the courtesies extended to me and the brethren of my own Lodge for the assistance rendered me in the discharge of my duties.
