The Most Worshipful Grand Master delivered the following address:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

Brethren of Grand Lodge:

Once again the fourth Thursday in August brings to the members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick at one and the same time the privilege and responsibility of assembling in their Annual Communication for the purpose of deliberating upon how best to maintain and advance the well-being of this institution, which. I am convinced, lies very near the heart of every one of us here present.

Many of you have again this year, as oftentimes in the past, come hither at considerable personal sacrifice, bringing with you the matured experience of many years' association with your brethren in Grand Lodge. To such

of you I extend again my most cordial greetings upon the occasion of this, the Sixty-fifth Annual Communication of the governing body of this Grand Jurisdiction.

Others of you, in turn, meet with us for the first time as members of Grand Lodge. To you likewise I extend a hearty and fraternal welcome, and trust that your fellowship with us may become a lengthy and inspiring one. As the years roll round we trust that you will take an increasingly prominent part in our deliberations, so that when eventually it falls to us older members to lay aside our earthly Trowel for an heavenly one, it shall become your pleasing task to spread the cement of brotherly love and affection,—that cement which unites us into one sacred band, or society of friends and brothers.

And assuredly brethren all, the world needs today, as perhaps never before, the flowering of that fine spirit of Brotherly Love, the first of the three great Tenets of our Institution. The world-wide economic depression, to which I referred in my address of a year ago, unfortunately still continues, but happily an increased spirit of friendliness and co-operation appears in sight among the nations of the Old World, and even more so among the constituent members of the British Commonwealth of Nations, as is evidenced by the public utterances of the delegates to the Imperial Economic Conference recently held at Ottawa. Assuredly Masonry has a vital message for the world today, a message not, it is true, to be proclaimed in formal tone from the housetops, yet nevertheless, first learned by our initiates within the sacred portals of our Lodge rooms, may it not prove indeed "the little leaven that leaveneth the whole lump?"

A year ago today you honored me with re-election to the office of Grand Master of this jurisdiction. I regarded it then, and still regard it, as the highest honor that can ever be conferred upon me as an individual. During the twelve months which have elapsed since then I have endeavored, to the best of my ability, to discharge the varied duties which devolve upon one holding this exalted office. In so far as I have succeeded, I am deeply grateful for the opportunity of having been of service to

you; in so far as I have failed, I crave your kind indulgence.

Pursuant to custom, it now becomes my duty to render to you an account of my stewardship. Yet, ere I do so, it is fitting that we pause—as even we must do at our Grand Communications—to honor the memory of our well-loved brethren who, since our last annual gathering, have passed into "that undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveller returns." It is not appropriate that we should wish them back.

Yet, nevertheless, our sense of loss is strong, even as it must long be with those still more closely linked to them by ties of home and blood. To all such we extend our fraternal sympathy, like them, though, sorrowing not as those that have no hope.

OFFICIAL VISITS.

One of the most pleasing duties which devolves upon a Grand Master is that of paying official visits to the various private Lodges throughout his jurisdiction, whereby he is affored at one and the same time the opportunity of becoming personally acquainted with a large number of individual brethren and of assisting them in their degree work. Twenty-four such visits have been made by me during the past twelve months, a short summary of which is here presented for your information.

WESTMORLAND LODGE, NO. 44.

On October 6, I visited Westmorland Lodge, No. 44, at Port Elgin, and was much pleased with the good work of the officers who conferred the Fellow Craft Degree. The brethren of Westmorland Lodge have every reason to be

proud of their admirably appointed quarters. During the evening I also installed W. Bro. C. George Prescott as Grand Steward.

LEBANON LODGE, NO. 28.

The following evening was spent at Sackville with Lebanon Lodge, No. 28. Upon this occasion the officers exemplified the Entered Apprentice Degree, after which some time was spent in giving instruction regarding the work of the evening. There was a large attendance, a number coming from Moncton, Shediac, Dorchester, and Port Elgin. R.W. Bro Herbert M. Wood, who had been elected Junior Grand Warden, was also invested at this time. I am very grateful to R.W. Bro. Wood for many courtesies extended during my stay in Sackville.

While in Sackville it was my very great privilege to meet the distinguished delegation from the United Grand Lodge of England, consisting of Lord Cornwallis, Deputy Grand Master, Sir P. Colville Smith, Grand Secretary, and Sir George M. Boughey, Past Dep. G. D. of C., who were then en route to Halifax. A few days later a number of the members of the Board of General Purposes, after attending the regular quarterly meeting in Saint John, also spent a pleasant half hour with these eminent English brethren, who were that day passing through the city on their way to Philadelphia to attend the Bi-Centenary of Freemasonry in Pennsylvania.

ALLEY LODGE, NO. 14.

On October 27, I visited Alley Lodge, No. 14, at Upper Mills, of which W. Bro. Kenneth M. Woodcock is Worshipful Master. On this occasion W. Bro. Clifford G. Chase, as Worshipful Master, and other members of the Lodge, exemplified the Entered Apprentice Degree. This Lodge has suffered greatly through the removal of many of its members, as well as on account of the present industrial inactivity, so that the attendance on this evening was noticeably small.

VICTORIA LODGE, NO. 26.

On the following evening, October 28, Victoria Lodge, No. 26, at Milltown was visited, when the Entered Ap-

prentice Degree was again exemplified, after which I reviewed the work and gave instruction upon various details. The Worshipful Master, Edwin J. Black, was unavoidably absent. All things considered, I feel that the lodges in this section of the jurisdiction would benefit by a little more united effort on the part of the members. R.W. Bro. James Vroom in the course of the evening described briefly a very pleasant visit recently paid by him to Ashlar Lodge at Lewiston, Me., and spoke particularly of the courtesies extended to him by the officers of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

KEITH LODGE, NO. 23.

Hiram Lodge, No. 6, at Fredericton was visited on May 5. Here the Worshipful Master, H. Ralph Gunter, and his officers conferred the Entered Apprentice Degree in a manner reflecting great credit upon themselves and those responsible for their instruction. On this occasion, too, I had the pleasure of investing R.W. Bro. A. Stirling McFarlane as Deputy Grand Master, he having been elected to this office at the last communication of Grand Lodge. W. Bro. Harry W. Wilson was also installed Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies.

SAINT MARK'S LODGE, NO. 5.

On May 31, a pleasant evening was spent with the brethren of Saint Mark's Lodge, No. 5, at St. Andrews. The Entered Apprentice Degree was exemplified, and some instruction given to the officers in regard to the same. During the evening W. Bro. Frank L. Mallory was invested as District Deputy Grand Master of District No. 5.

BENJAMIN LODGE, NO. 31.

On June 7, I visited Benjamin Lodge, No. 31, at Andover. After I was received by Worshipful Master Chantler, the I. P. M., W. Bro. Carpenter, took the chair, and with the Worshipful Master acting as Senior Deacon, the Fellow Craft Degree was exemplified, after which necessary instruction was given by me in the work of this degree. A number of visitors were present from Edmundston, Grand Falls, Hartland and Woodstock.

BETHEL LODGE, NO. 40.

The following evening, June 8, was spent with Bethel Lodge, No. 40, Edmundston. Good work was evidenced

by the Master, W. Bro. Franchetti, and his officers in the conferring of the Entered Apprentice Degree. A noticeably good spirit, too, was in evidence among the brethren of this Lodge. During the evening I duly installed W. Bro. Malcolm E. Amos as District Deputy Grand Master of District No. 4.

COLEBROOKE LODGE, NO. 39.

Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39, at Grand Falls, was next visited on the evening of June 9. This Lodge has not had any work so far this year, but from the manner in which the Worshipful Master and officers exemplified the Entered Apprentice Degree, one cannot refrain from saying that better work would rarely be seen. There was a large attendance, and, indeed, the acting Grand Director of Ceremonies reported that there was not sufficient regalia for all the officers of Grand Lodge, whose able support upon this occasion was greatly appreciated by myself.

WOODSTOCK LODGE, NO. 11.

On June 21, I visited Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, at Woodstock, when W. Bro. Hubert F. Seely, Worshipful Master, conferred the Fellow Craft Degree very creditably. During the evening, I also had the pleasure of investing W. Bro. Alfred Page as Junior Grand Deacon.

CARLETON LODGE, NO. 35.

The following evening, June 22, I visited Carleton Lodge, No. 35, at Florenceville. Here W. Bro. V. V. Trafford and officers conferred the Entered Apprentice Degree, after which I gave considerable instruction to the officers in their work and movements, and suggested that they endeavour to get further instruction as opportunity permits. I was gratified to observe that the disagreeable weather did not prevent a number of brethren from other Lodges from attending this communication.

HARTLAND LODGE, NO. 46.

On my visit to Hartland Lodge, No. 46, at Hartland on June 23, I was welcomed by the Worshipful Master, W. Bro. J. Keswick, who stated that, while no candidate

was available, he and his officers were prepared to exemplify the Entered Apprentice Degree. This they did in a very creditable manner.

On my three visits to the Lodges in this section of the jurisdiction, I was pleased to have accompany me R.W. Bro. LeBaron Wilson, P.G.M., and R.W. Bro. A. Stirling McFarlane, Deputy Grand Master, as well as many other representative brethren. I should like also to refer especially to W. Bro. Alfred Page, Mayor of Woodstock, who extended various courtesies to me during my three days' visit to that vicinity.

ALEXANDRIA LODGE, NO. 33.

On July 4, I visited Alexandria Lodge, No. 33, at Devon, where W. Bro. Maxwell and his officers exemplified the Entered Apprentice Degree. The work was well done. It was a pleasure also to observe a number of brethren from Fredericton in attendance.

ST. MARTINS LODGE, NO. 30.

St. Martins Lodge, No. 30, at St. Martins, is one of our smaller Lodges, which has for some time past labored under serious economic difficulties. Situated in what was in years gone by a thriving seaside community, it has experienced the vicissitudes which have in many cases followed the passing of the days of "Wooden Ships and Iron Men." For some time no candidates for Freemasonry have presented themselves but under the present Worshipful Master, W. Bro. Errol Miller, the Lodge appears to be taking on a new lease of life. Upon the occasion of my visit to this Lodge, on July 11, a candidate was in waiting for the Fellow Craft Degree. Upon the request of the Worshipful Master, the degree was conferred by the brethren who accompanied me. The officers and members of the Lodge who were present seemed much encouraged and interested. The Lodge room, moreover, has been recently renovated, and I look for a much better report from this Lodge in the near future.

SUNBURY LODGE, NO. 42.

The last of my official visits during the year was paid to Sunbury Lodge, No. 42, at Fredericton Junction, on the evening of July 28. The Entered Apprentice Degree was exemplified, after which I gave some instruction in certain details of the work.

On all these occasions the Officers of Grand Lodge were the guests of the private Lodge visited, at either a formal banquet or for an informal social hour, as the season of the year or local conditions suggested. I herewith desire to record my grateful thanks for the social courtesies thus extended and to express my gratification at the opportunities thus afforded of "breaking bread" with a very large number of the members of the Craft within our own jurisdiction, as well as with many visiting brethren from adjacent and even farther afield jurisdictions, which has yet once again demonstrated to me the universality of our well-loved institution.

OFFICIAL INVITATIONS.

As during the previous year, certain official invitations were extended to me to represent this Grand Jurisdiction at various important Masonic gatherings outside the borders of our own province.

Foremost among such invitations was that extended by the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association to attend the dedication of the Memorial to Washington, the Man and the Mason, at Alexandria, Virginia, on May 12 of this year. I regret that circumstances made it impossible for me to accept this invitation to what must have proved a deeply significant Masonic gathering for our brethren in the great republic to the south of us.

I should like also to express my appreciation of the cordial invitation extended by M.W. Bro. Allan M. Wilson, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire, to be his guest at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire at Concord on May 18. M.W. Bro. Wilson, it will be recalled, was present with us at

our last Annual Communication, and it would have been personally pleasing thus to renew our Masonic intercourse of a year ago, but once again circumstances intervened.

A QUIET YEAR.

The past year has been, upon the whole, a quiet one masonically in our grand jurisdiction. I am pleased to inform you that no questions of a contentious nature have come before me, and that the brethren of the various private Lodges are zealous in promoting that "harmony which is the strength and support of all institutions, particularly this of ours."

During the year several Lodges submitted minor changes in their by-laws, which were approved after due consideration.

A number of Lodges also applied for dispensation to attend divine service, and these I was very pleased to grant, and I desire to commend those Lodges which make a practice of regularly calling out their members for this laudable purpose.

A FORWARD STEP

My recommendation of a year ago in regard to further ritualistic instruction for the District Deputy Grand Masters after their appointment was subsequently approved by the Board of General Purposes, to which it had been referred. Accordingly the various deputies, with one exception, came to Saint John in due course and spent two days with the Ritual Committee, assisted by a number of the Saint John brethren. The work of the three degrees was thoroughly gone over, and their administrative duties were likewise carefully explained to them. At the conclusion of the two-day conference they expressed themselves as extremely satisfied with the instruction received, which, they felt, would place them in a much better position to assist the Lodges in their various districts.

I feel that, in making such instruction possible for our District Deputies, we have taken a very definite forward step; and I am convinced also, from reports received, that the officers of the various private Lodges appreciate this

additional opportunity afforded them through Grand Lodge of acquainting themselves with the correct interpretation of our New Brunswick ritual. I trust this past year's conference will prove but a preliminary step to further gatherings of this kind, and that the incoming Grand Master, appreciating the interest thus created among the brethren throughout the province, will further the work by reappointing the present incumbents and arranging for their further instruction.

Occasionally, as I have travelled over the province during the past two years, I have found the ritual of other jurisdictions creeping into the work of some of our Lodges, but undoubtedly more competent District Deputy Grand Masters could do much to bring about a greater uniformity of ritual. In this Grand Jurisdiction of New Brunswick we have, I feel assured, a ritual which is at once beautiful and complete. Let us make use therefore of every means at our disposal which will facilitate its accurate use.

Before leaving this topic I desire to express my grateful thanks to the members of the Ritual Committee and the brethren who assisted them for their kindness in devoting time and effort in the instruction of the District Deputies during their two-day conference in this city.

THE EASTERN STAR

Another matter which has caused me serious concern during my tenure of office is the attitude which we, as members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, should take in regard to an organization known as the Order of the Eastern Star, which admits Masons to its membership. It is not, however, and never can be a truly Masonic body because of the admission of women to its membership.

In this Loyalist province we have always prided ourselves upon following in the footsteps of the United Grand Lodge of England in regard to Masonic procedure. I should like therefore at this time to direct your attention to a recommendation passed by the Board of General Purposes of the Grand Lodge of Western Australia on February 28, 1929, which reads as follows:

'The Board recommends that no Freemason of this Jurisdiction be permitted to attend any meeting of, or be a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, and that no meeting of the Order of the Eastern Star be permitted in any Lodge room.'

This recommendation, it may be stated, is in strict accordance with the attitude previously adopted, after careful consideration, by the Grand Lodges of both England and Ireland.

Coming yet near home, we find M.W. Bro. Walter S. Harrington, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada, in the Province of Ontario, addressing his Grand Lodge brethren at their recent annual communication at Kingston, Ontario, in these words:

"One would have thought that there was no room for doubt as to the attitude of our Grand Lodge towards the Order of the Eastern Star after the pronouncement by M.W. Bro. Ponton in 1923, and the clear and concise statement of our position by M.W. Bro. Rowland in 1927. If after these repeated warnings Freemasons persist in openly or tacitly recognizing this Order as being directly or indirectly connected with our organization, or having any claims upon their time or attention prejudicial to the duty they owe their Lodge, there will, in my opinion, be no course open to our Grand Lodge but to adopt some more drastic means of disciplining the offenders."

Speaking personally, therefore, I feel strongly that this Grand Lodge of New Brunswick should place itself on record as disapproving of members of this Grand Jurisdiction devoting to the Order of the Eastern Star any of that time and energy which might more properly be given to furthering the work of their own Lodges, to which certainly they owe their undivided allegiance.

A WORD OF CAUTION.

There is still one other matter upon which I should like to speak a word of caution. During these days of financial stringency many good and true Masons are finding it increasingly difficult to keep their accounts balanced

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with the secretaries of their Lodges, and while we all realize that the financial status of any organization must be carefully maintained, nevertheless I would suggest that Charity must ever remain uppermost in our minds, and that therefore our Lodges should be as lenient as possible with those brethren who are in arrears in their dues through no fault of their own. Indeed, is it not our bounden duty thus to "aid and assist a distressed worthy brother," either by remitting his dues or by allowing him any reasonable extension of time, as his circumstances shall suggest?

EXEMPLIFICATION OF THE E. A. DEGREE.

During my official visits of the last year the Entered Apprentice Degree has been either conferred or exemplified with varying degrees of accuracy. For this reason I have made arrangements with the Ritual Committee to have this degree conferred this evening at 8 o'clock. previous to the assembling of Grand Lodge, by the Worshipful Master and officers of the Union Lodge of Portland. No. 10. I trust the members of Grand Lodge will avail themselves of the opportunity thus provided of checking up upon the working of this degree in their own Lodges.

CONCLUSION.

And now, in handing over my gavel to my successor, I do so feeling that he will be accorded the same generous support as has been so graciously given to myself. I look back with gratitude upon the many pleasant hours spent with the brethren of the various Lodges, and I shall never forget the many courtesies extended to me by those with whom my official duties have brought me in contact. In this connection I should like to refer especially to R.W. Bro. J. Twining Hartt, our indefatigable Grand Secretary: and to V.W. Bro. Ernest H. Cameron, Grand Treasurer, who has been most attentive to his duties. The reports of both of these officers will be presented to you in due course for your consideration. To R.W. Bro. R.B. Irving. who has been with me upon a very large number of my official visits; to W. Bro. W. Grant Smith, G. D. of C., for his many kindnesses, and to W. Bro. S. C. Wright and W. Perley Barnhill, who have accompanied me upon several occasions. I also tender my personal thanks.

Finally, brethren, let me once more thank you for the honor you have twice conferred upon me in electing me as your Grand Master. I have striven to the best of my ability to serve you in this high office; nor will I cease my endeavors to promote the interests of our great fraternity now that the time has arrived for me to lay aside the gavel of authority and assume once more the less conspicuous badge of quiet service.

Total membership at 27th December 1931, 5998, a decrease of 37.

The M.W. Grand Master's Dispensations issued by his direction and under the seal of Grand Lodge were 31 in number. Two of these were to enable Lodges to change their place of meeting. The Special Committee on the matter has recently made a report to the Board respecting Portraits of Past Grand Masters and such report is herewith presented.

Your committee appointed to arrange for the renewal of portraits of former Grand Masters beg to submit the following report:

Past Grand Master Wilson being unable to serve on the committee retired and his place as chairman was taken by the Most Worshipful Grand Master.

After considerable correspondence with various Artists and a careful and thorough investigation into their qualifications, your committee entered into a contract with Mr. E. Wyly Grier, P.R.C.A., of Toronto, to paint four portraits at \$500.00 each, F.O.B. Toronto, the frames to cost \$37.00 in addition. The subjects selected were Past Grand Masters B. Lester Peters, Thomas Walker, Judge Wedderburn and John V. Ellis. After these had been finished, Mr. A. P. Paterson stated to a member of your committee that if Past Grand Master William F. Bunting was included in this group he would contribute to the cost of the painting. This very generous offer was submitted to the Board of General Purposes who directed the committee to arrange with Mr. Grier for the fifth portrait.

The cost of these five paintings to Grand Lodge is \$2,748.51. All bills have been presented to the Board of General Purposes and paid, and your committee submit for your consideration the portraits that are now hung on the walls of the Lodge room, and feel satisfied that you will approve of the selection of the Artist, Mr. E. Wyly Grier.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

"TO THE MASONIC GRAND LODGE CORPORATION."

The change in the position of the Corporation from being the owner of the Masonic Hall to that of a tenant in the Masonic Temple has greatly diminished the cares and duties of the Directors. During the past year there has been nothing requiring special attention.

The financial statements of the V.W. Grand Treasurer— "General Account" and "Fund of Benevolence" and the Auditors' report thereon have been submitted to the

Directors and adopted. As has been the practice hitherto, the Grand Treasurer and the Auditors will personally present the Account and the Report to this Annual Meeting of the Corporation.

It will be noticed that the investments recommended last year have been effected; \$4,000 of General Account and \$1,000 Fund of Benevolence—in the purchase of Province of New Brunswick Bonds 5% due 1960. It is now recommended that \$1,000 of the cash balance of the Fund of Benevolence be likewise invested.

R.W. Bro. James Vroom, P.G.M., submitted the report of the Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address, it being as follows:

REPORT ON GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

Your Committee appointed to draft a reply to the Most Worshipful Grand Master's Address beg leave to submit a report.

Inevitable changes in our lists of officers from year to year break ties of intimacy which we would willingly preserve; yet soon these are forgotten in our abiding interest in the great purpose of our institution, the promotion of Harmony and Brotherly Love. "Men come and go, but man remains." These are the words of that great Masonic poet and philosopher, Goethe, whose death occurred one hundred years ago. They were true as applied by him to the progress of civilization; and we shall find them equally true if we apply them to ourselves. Those with whom we have been most closely associated in Grand Lodge work in the past year may find other associates in the years to come; and press on with increasing fervour in their endeavour to seek peace and ensue it, which is the essential feature of all Masonic work. They will remember us and we remember them as fellow travellers for a little while. matters who the workers be, if still the work goes on?

But we cannot thus lightly dismiss the thought of those who have passed beyond the realms of time and space within the last twelve months, leaving us to take up as best we may the work that once was theirs. With the Grand Master, we must strongly feel the loss, though we cannot wish them back. Let us, therefore, set aside the usual space in our records in tribute to their memory; recall their virtues and forget their faults; and humbly trust that they are safe with Him who doeth all things well.

Grand Lodge will sympathize with the Most Worshipful Grand Master in his saying that the world needs to-day, perhaps more than ever before, the Masonic spirit of Brotherly Love; and will watch with eager anticipation every indication of its coming. Such indications are not wanting. Indeed, to those who look for them, they are surprisingly numerous, both within the British Commonwealth of Nations and beyond.

Your Committee feel quite sure that Grand Lodge will wish to congratulate the Most Worshipful Grand Master upon the success of his personal visits to the Lodges in his jurisdiction; and upon the fact that again no disputes or contentions have arisen to call for his official ruling. The good results which seem to have attended he new method of instructing District Deputy Grand Masters is also a matter for congratulation. It may be possible still further to extend their duties and responsibilities so as to relieve the Grand Master of trivial details of supervision.

The Committee feel that Grand Lodge is deeply indebted to the Most Worshipful the Grand Master for his urgent call for some attention to the serious situation caused by the presence in this Loyalist Province of an organization having its headquarters and its chief interests in the United States of America an organization composed of men and women who wish to be and claim to be connected with Masonry, and who are known by the name of the Order of the Eastern Star.

After such inquiry as Grand Lodge may think advisable, there should be a deliberate expression as to whether the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick will permit this invasion of its territory by a quasi-Masonic Body; or whether, following the example of the Grand Lodges of England and Ireland, and of several other Grand Lodges in the British Dominions, and others in the United States, it shall take stern measures of repression; not merely because the intruding Grand Body is foreign in its origin and management, though that alone in our case would be ample reason for opposing it, but mainly because even in the country of its origin it has been denounced as unmasonic and an injury to Masonry by those who have given it their most serious attention. To that end, the Committee recommend that the whole matter be referred by this Grand Lodge to the Board of General Purposes, with authority to appoint a special committee to report thereon directly to Grand Lodge at its next annual communication.

When the time shall come for our esteemed Grand Master to hand over to his successor the cares and responsibilities of

office, Grand Lodge will be in a position to thank him for his fatherly care; and to express the hope, which your Committee are sure will be general, that he may live for many years to perform those intermittent duties which so often fall upon a willing Past Grand Master.

REPORTS

OF DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

DISTRICT No. 1.

Saint John, N. B., August 16, 1932.

Most Worshipful Grand Master: Before making my report for the past year I wish to thank you for the honour you have conferred upon me by appointing me District Deputy Grand Master for District No. 1. It was a great pleasure to meet you and other Grand Lodge Officers at a meeting called by you for the purpose of studying the Ritual and the instruction received at that time has been of great benefit to each and all of us. I have endeavored to pass on some of your instructions to the several Lodges in my District.

On December 28th, accompanied by Right Worshipful John Thornton, I visited Zion Lodge, No. 21. This communication was held for the purpose of installing the Officers and the ceremony was well carried out by Right Worshipful John Thornton, assisted by Brother James A. Murray, Past Master. The attendance at this meeting was rather disappointing owing to other attractions held that evening.

On June 6th, accompanied by several members of The Corinthian Lodge, I paid my official visit to Zion Lodge, No. 21. I was much pleased by the cordial welcome tendered me by Worshipful Master A. C. Gorham and his Officers. It was a large gathering; included therein were a number of visitors from Sister Lodges. The Master Mason Degree was conferred on two candidates, and the work was well carried out by the Worshipful Master and his Officers. Zion Lodge has a fine staff of Officers, who with a little instruction are capable of doing fine work. The lectures delivered by the Past Masters were given in excellent style. During the refreshment hour Right

Worshipful A. E. Pearson gave an interesting address on the History of Zion Lodge. It is my intention to attend some rehearsals at Zion Lodge when they resume work in September.

Moncton, N. B., August 3, 1932.

Most Worshipful Grand Master: Please receive herewith the report of your District Deputy for District No. 2.

Let me first express my thanks and appreciation for the honour conferred in appointing me to the office, which I trust I have fulfilled to your satisfaction.

My first official invitation was from Lebanon Lodge, No. 28, requesting me to install their Officers at the regular communication, January 19th, which gave me great pleasure, as it was the only request to install the Officers I received from any of the ten Lodges in the District.

The following official visits were made:

On May 4th, Howard Lodge, No. 15, was visited, when the Officers of the Lodge put on the Third Degree on the first candidate this Lodge has had in over a year, and considering their lack of practice, the work was very well done.

Salisbury Lodge, No. 20, worked the Second Degree on May 6th, in a manner that might well be a model for any Lodge in the Province. This Lodge seems to be in a flourishing condition and is without doubt the banner Lodge of the District.

Lebanon Lodge, No. 28, was visited on May 17th, and though no degree work was exemplified, a very enjoyable time was spent in listening to a debate between teams from Acacia Lodge, Amherst, N. S., and Lebanon Lodge, which made a very pleasant change from the Lodge routine. I regret that I have been unable to make another visit to this Lodge to witness the work, but knowing the ability of the Officers, and the interest taken by the Past Masters, I feel that I would not have been of much assistance.

On May 23rd, Sussex Lodge, No. 4, was visited. There being no candidate the Worshipful Master and Officers exemplified parts of the Third Degree in excellent form. This Lodge is greatly indebted to the assistance given by Worshipful Brother Gesner Taylor in the ritualistic work, as are many of us in the District.

Zetland Lodge, No. 24, was visited on June 9th. There being no candidate the Worshipful Master and Officers exemplified the Third Degree, following which there was an interesting discussion of the work. After Lodge closed the brethren adjourned to the Hotel Shediac, where a splendid banquet was partaken of, following which was provided an excellent entertainment.

The work of the First Degree was put on by the Worshipful Master and Officers of Steven Lodge, No. 37, on June 14th, for the benefit of the District Deputy.
