The M. W. The Grand Master delivered the following address:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

Once again we assemble in our annual communication and I extend a hearty welcome to all. It is my earnest hope that our deliberations may be of such a character that all matters engaging our attention "May be so ordered, and settled on the best and surest foundations" and that the opportunity which it affords for the exchange of friendly greetings and intercourse will inspire each of us to carry back to our respective lodges a fresher and brighter vision of Masonry.

As the world in which we live is the great workshop wherein we are taught to apply the lessons of the Lodge room, so I feel it proper to make some reference at the outset to world conditions and events which have passed on the screen since last we met. On May 6th last as citizens we joined in the general rejoicing throughout the British Empire occasioned by the celebration of the Silver Jubilee of his Most Gracious Majesty, King George V. Amid confusion and restlessness abroad among the nations with Dictatorship and Autocracy replacing Democracy, and statesmen groping for light, the figure of our beloved king as the head of a constitutional Government stands unmoved, steadfast, firm in the affection of a devoted people. In these days of instability, and as an expression of our loyalty, it behooves this Grand Lodge of New Brunswick to place upon its record a profound sense of gratitude to Almighty God for the life and example of our most gracious sovereign.

We again meet under the shadow of depressed economic conditions with many of our fellow citizens still unable to find profitable employment and our industrial life far from

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normal. There are, however, unmistakable signs of improvement but the convalescent period, I am afraid, will be a tedious one and will require much patience and perseverance. Economics has played a great part in history in shaping and moulding the character of races and nations and these periods of stress and strain which call for the best that is in a man should strengthen and improve the race. On the other hand there is no doubt that long periods of unchecked prosperity produce an artificial set of values in men's lives which sooner or later break down. Our forefathers in these Maritime Provinces, by indomitable courage and perseverance overcame obstacles, endured privations and produced a race of the stuff that has made leaders in fields of industry, science and learning all over the world. When we become impatient and disheartened let us "Look unto the rock from which we were hewn" and recalling the traditions of the past, may we too leave our marks behind us on the trail that the way may be clearer and the Goal

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surer for those who shall come after us. Notwithstanding the tragedy of the Great War and its legacies of suffering and distress and in spite of the many movements looking towards International Peace, there are still threatening and rumblings of discord and unrest between Nations. We earnestly hope that the unceasing efforts of Great Britain and other Major Powers will be successful in arranging a peaceful solution of the present crisis and that the influence and Power of the League of Nations in promoting International Peace and Goodwill, will become greater and more firmly established as the years roll by.

While I had planned to visit several other Lodges during the latter part of July and early August, unfortunately for various reasons, it was found impracticable on each occasion, so that my number of visitations is somewhat smaller than I would have otherwise desired.

I had the privilege of accepting the very kind invitation of the Grand Master of Nova Scotia to be the guest of the Grand Lodge at their Annual Communication which was held in Lunenburg on June 11th. I was given a very warm welcome by the Brethren of our Sister Province and learned much to interest me during my short sojourn. As your representative I was honored by being presented with the Erasmus James Phillips Jewel and entertained at luncheon, and I come away with the strong conviction that there should be a much greater bond of attachment between the members of the Craft in these two Maritime Provinces.

I regretted that I was obliged to decline invitations to be present at the Grand Lodge of P. E. I., at Charlottetown on June 27th. At the Grand Lodge of Ontario at Hamilton on the 17th and 18th of July, and the Grand Lodge of Maine at Portland on May 6th.

I want to express my appreciation to the District Deputies in the various Districts for the very loyal and

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efficient service they have performed. The practice of meeting the ritual committee each year and confirming the work is a splendid one and shows good results, and I hope will be continued.

My thanks to all those who have assisted me in carrying out the duties of my office. To Rt. Worshipful J. Twining Hartt, Grand Secretary who by his unfailing courtesy and attention was ever ready to help and guide. I owe much to the Past Grand Masters, and R. W. Deputy Grand Master Irving and to those Brethren who supported me on my meanderings through the jurisdiction I am most grateful.

Iust one word more — We rejoice in the progress already made and the sound condition of the Craft throughout the jurisdiction, but I have been wondering if the time has not arrived when we might well consider the feasibility of going a step further. What I have in mind is some definite objective that Masonry in New Brunswick might work towards. I am thinking now especially of our younger Masons. There is a growing tendency at present to leave to the State, with its clumsiness and inefficiency, social services and obligations which were formerly discharged by volunteer effort. And in this connection let us remember that charity is the keystone of our Institution and that it is an active and not a passive virtue. My suggestion would be the appointment of a committee to survey our position, study our needs and report in due course what, if any, plans could be undertaken for the further extension and promotion of our beloved institution.

May the day come when all men shall rightly and adequately appreciate the mission of Masonry.

As to Masonic funerals — it is seldom that, on a Brother's death, application can be made for a Dispensation and the same received before the funeral. In many of the Lodges this course is usually taken.
