The M:W: Grand Master delivered the following address:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

We are assembled here today at the Seventy-first Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge. I am pleased to see so many of you who have been faithful attendants and also those of you who are here for the first time. I welcome you all and my earnest wish is that you make yourselves acquainted with each other; form friendships; become interested in our Grand Lodge; there is work to be done and we need your assistance, not only to build up our Grand Lodge, but also to accomplish that great aim we have in view, the thorough exercise of the noble tenets of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

If all the nations of the world today would embrace these tenets as their motto what a blessing it would be to humanity, and what a peace would reign upon this sorely troubled and upset world where like strives against like for temporal power and self-aggrandizement; that purely ephemeral thing of no value to any of us in the final scheme of our Maker.

If our Institution is to go ahead we must cast aside all petty feelings of jealousy; eliminate the habit of back-biting that we are allowing to creep into our Order and learn more fully the lessons we are taught, and which were carried to such heights by the founders of our beloved Craft; to practise in fact rather than in thought, those truly Masonic Ornaments, Silence and Circumspection. Always bear in mind the Motto of our Grand Lodge, "Audi," "Vide," "Tace." Hear, See and be Silent.

During this past year nothing of strife has arisen to mar the placid rule of our beloved Sovereigns, King George VI and his gracious Lady. True, troublous times abound. Europe is uneasy and worried. China and Japan are at each others throats. Russia and Japan threaten each other by force of arms. Spain still wallows through another

year of violent bloodshed. Germany seeks further to upset the universe; but the great Commonwealth of British peoples, to which we are proud to belong, still labours on, quietly and serenely; watching and preparing; ready at a moment to rise and stay the hand that would bring chaos upon us. May this coming year bring us all that for which we wish most, a lasting and unbreakable Peace and understanding among all peoples.

We are all Brothers—unto One God must we all return. To their relatives and to their Lodges we all extend our sincere sympathy.

During this year was celebrated the greatest event in Canadian Masonic history; the Bicentennial of the founding of the first Masonic Lodge in our Dominion at Annapolis, Nova Scotia.

We in New Brunswick were particularly interested owing to the fact that our early Masonic history is closely linked with that of our Sister Province.

The founder of Freemasonry in that Province, of which New Brunswick was then a part, was Erasmus James Phillips, a Major in a regiment of British Infantry stationed in Nova Scotia. While in Boston in 1737, he became a Mason. On his return to Nova Scotia he carried with him a Warrant from Henry Price, then Grand Master

of Massachusetts, appointing him Provincial Grand Master for Nova Scotia. He formed a Lodge in the garrison at Annapolis in July, 1738. Thus, from this small beginning, Masonry in Canada has grown to a membership of 171,600.

During the past month Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia celebrated this two hundredth birthday. The celebration was attended by delegates from the Grand Lodges of England, Ireland, Scotland, Newfoundland, most of the United States and from each of our Canadian Provinces.

Your Grand Master, R.W. Past Grand Master LeBaron Wilson, and R.W. Past Deputy Grand Master John Thornton were privileged to represent the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. Also, by special invitation, R.W. Past Deputy Grand Master Horace A. Porter. At these celebrations your Grand Master and R.W. Brother Wilson were presented with the Erasmus James Phillips Medal, of which we are exceedingly proud and also of the honor conferred upon us.

On July 13th, a great many of these delegates arrived in Saint John and on the 14th they were tendered a banquet. As a matter of record I wish to list here those distinguished brethren from Great Britain and Ireland who attended in this city.

His Worship, Mayor D. Laurence MacLaren welcomed the guests on behalf of the City of Saint John and your Grand Master welcomed them on behalf of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. An enjoyable evening was spent by all present. I wish to quote in part from a letter received from Lord Farnham: "I hope it will do us a lot of good and broaden our outlook on life generally. We shall remember our time at Saint John and I have a very vivid picture in my mind of all the brethren at the banquet that evening. Wishing you and the brethren every good wish for the future."

Sir Francis Davies expressed his appreciation to those brethren who made it possible for him to call upon and spend a few minutes with R.W. Past Grand Master George D. Ellis, Grand Representative of the United Grand Lodge of England near this Grand Lodge, who, through illness, was unable to be present at the banquet.

I also had the privilege of attending when greetings were extended the visiting delegates by the Grand Lodges of Prince Edward Island, Quebec and Ontario. After meeting with so many of those prominent and distinguished in Masonic work in other fields, I have a deeper conception of the scope of activity carried on in outside jurisdictions, and which I trust I shall be able to impart to the Craft in this Province as time wills it.

VISITATIONS.

It was my expectation to visit all the Lodges in this Jurisdiction during my two terms in this office, but owing to circumstances over which I had no control, I was prevented from carrying out my plans. Nevertheless I was able to visit twenty-four Lodges this year, at each of which I, and my Grand Lodge Officers, had a fine reception. It is noticeable that our District Deputy Grand Masters have been attending to their duties by the class of work exemplified by the officers of the several Lodges visited. I

realise that many of the District Deputies have a large territory to cover and that it is well nigh impossible for them to make two or more instructional visits each year to each of their respective Lodges, but it is obvious that they make good use of their time in this respect when they do pay their official visits, and the class of work being done is of a high order.

Most of you brethren have shown by your work that you are deeply interested in Masonry as a whole and particularly in the interests of your own Lodge. This is as it should be. You have splendid Lodge rooms, well furnished, of which you are particularly proud and, too, there is that friendliness one feels instinctively on visiting with you.

There are, however, I regret to state, many things being done that will have to be drawn to your attention for correction by those who err.

Many Lodges do not present a copy of the Grand Lodge Constitutions to newly raised candidates as is called for by our Laws. Nor do many have printed copies of their Lodge By-Laws to present at the same time, which also is one of our Laws. I feel that it would be well to present, also, the newly raised candidate with a copy of the Masonic Manual. It is our duty to see that every candidate is given his first start in Masonic education and these books contain all that he will require to know at the moment. He can enlarge upon his Masonic education as he sees fit and opportunity presents itself. But it must be borne in mind that the rules of our Institution must be strictly adhered to and those several Lodges concerned must procure a supply of Constitutions and present them to those entitled to them.

I have also noticed that, in some cases, you are rather careless of your Lodge records. It would be well to keep these where they will be safe at all times from fire, theft or vandalism. We should be proud of our Lodge records and keep them secure; today's records will be tomorrow's

history, not alone to your Lodge but to this Grand Lodge as well, of which you all form a vital part.

Great care must also be taken in regard to the acceptance of candidates. Today many men are moving from place to place and are not very well known in their new domicile; but still they are accepted and taken into our Order without much thought as to their desirability or our Lodges' welfare. They become delinquent and have to be suspended; or, without work, have to be supported. This does not make for good business in any way. True, we have the use of their money for the time, but men who are purely "drifters" become, later, charges upon us and cost us much in the long run.

Again it is necessary to draw your attention to Section 33 of our Constitution dealing with Fees and Dues and Returns to Grand Lodge. Some Lodges are very slack in this regard and withhold their remittances until very late in the year. This makes it hard for the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary to complete their work and have their books ready for auditing on time. I trust this will, in future, be better attended to.

In regard to Divine Service. It would be well in future that no plans for Saint John's Day be made to include holding a Public Service at any Exhibition or Fair Grounds. Public parades and services of this character are not in keeping with the high ideals of our Order. Such services should only be held in churches or Lodge rooms.

It is certainly not good business for Lodges to permit of privileged members after a membership of twenty-one to twenty-five years, which is a very short time in the life of any Lodge. It takes neither wisdom nor learning to see just where a Lodge will land that exempts all such members from the payment of any dues. It simply means that after these few short years your Lodge will have practically no income, unless it has had a great influx of Masonic population, which is rarely seen except in case of some boom. To those Lodges in this Jurisdiction who suffer and are so

afflicted, I urge that you amend your By-Laws immediately and thus set aside this canker that will eventually devour you.

Another change that comes to my mind that is timely is that of nights of meeting. Still some of the Lodges use a date for their regular night of meeting based on some phase of the moon. It would be much better if a specific night were set aside for your regular night and thus assure yourselves of a definite date that could be planned for by the members.

I wish to draw your attention to the splendid work being done by the Very Worshipful Grand Secretary. We are fortunate indeed in having one who is interested in his secretarial duties and who is willing to devote the time to them that he does. His records are a credit to any Grand Lodge and will assist Grand Masters in the future very materially in their work. He has been of great assistance to me on those official visits on which he has accompanied me, and has helped to lighten the burden of my office during the time he has been in office.

Today you are to elect a new Grand Master. He will have to devote a great deal of time, energy and thought to his high office. He will need your support at all times, give it to him unstintingly and willingly. You elect him, work with him. Nothing discourages a Grand Master so much as half hearted help; nothing encourages him so much as a hearty hand clasp and a heartfelt good wish. Extend to your new Grand Master, who ever he may be, all that he may require of you. It is an office of high dignity and one cannot be "one of the boys" at all times; but he is "one of the boys" and requires much assistance to carry out his duties with success.

To you Past Masters I would urge that you take a more active interest in your Lodge. If you do not and are content to let matters drift and "let George do it," you will find yourselves "on the shelf" indeed and not part of your individual Lodges and the business of which will drift away

from you and it will devolve upon one or two stalwarts to carry on the work and become "Masonic hermits" and be forced to control duties which is not part of their individual work, but which must be done because you will not take your share of the load. Be interested and you will derive much pleasure.

I wish to thank you all for the hearty support you have given me during my term of office. I have enjoyed the fellowship and have made many lasting friendships which will stand me in good stead, I hope, as years mellow and ripen them. I hope long to enjoy the happy memories your faces will bring to my mind as I meet you from year to year here at Grand Lodge or wherever we may meet. I wish you all the best there is to wish you and that you may all live long to enjoy your Masonic intercourse with your brethren.

The motion was seconded by W: Bro. J. O. Spinney, and upon being put before the meeting was unanimously adopted.

A telegram was received and communicated to Grand Lodge from Bro. C. Edward Dewar, expressing his regrets on his inability to attend this session of Grand Lodge.

Read a letter from R:W: Bro. J. Fred Edgett, stating that owing to the death of his brother in Prince Edward Island and his departure for that place he was unable to attend Grand Lodge.

A letter received from R:W: General Sir Francis Davies, Deputy Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of Eng-

land, and signed by himself and his several colleagues who accompanied him on a recent tour of Canada, and in which Sir Francis expressed the deep appreciation of the hospitality extended to himself and staff during their stay in Saint John, was read before Grand Lodge.

A letter from M:W: Robert R. Lewis, Grand Master of Masons of the State of Pennsylvania and Chairman of the 1938 Conference of Grand Masters of Masons of the United States, was read. M:W: Bro. Lewis extended, on behalf of the Conference, a sincere invitation to the M:W: Grand Master of New Brunswick to be present at the next Annual Conference to be held in Washington, D. C., on February 21st and 22nd. The letter was ordered referred to the Board of General Purposes for their information and action thereon.

The Grand Historian presented the following letter dealing with the work pertaining to his office and expressing his regrets at his inability to proceed further with the work owing to stress of business.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick:

As Grand Historian, I wish to report that I have about completed gathering what may be gathered from the past in Masonic History in this Province; of course all has not been written, but it is hard to get the full data without a fully paid writer being sent to each Lodge.

There is still much to be got, perhaps not about each individual Lodge, as about Masonry, especially in and about Saint John and up the St. John River as far as St. Anne's Point. I would suggest to the incoming Most Worshipful Grand Master that the succeeding Grand Historian be a Mason with time to spare and inclination to ferret out facts from the past, who lives in Saint John near the centre of present day Masonry and where much of the Masonic past lies buried.

I have arranged all historical data on a standard file and placed the general matters together, and the histories of each Lodge are kept separately and filed numerically as to the number of each Lodge, so as to be readily followed.

In laying down office I wish to thank the many interested Brethren who have rendered me very valuable assistance.

The several other Grand Lodge officers present were likewise invested and installed, being conducted to their respective places by the W: Grand Director of Ceremonies.

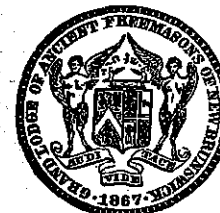

REPORTS

OF DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS

DISTRICT No. 1.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., August 23rd, 1937

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master:

I submit herewith my report as District Deputy Grand Master for District No. 1.

I have visited the Lodges under my jurisdiction and find the work of the various Lodges to be very satisfactory.

On Friday, November 12th, I visited the Corinthian Lodge No. 13, with the Grand Master, and the Master and Officers were complimented on the manner in which the Master Mason Degree was conferred, also accompanied the Grand Master to the Union Lodge of Portland No. 10 on Tuesday, November 16th, and witnessed the Master Mason degree.

MacCharles and officers for the year 1938, after which we sat down to a sumptuous turkey banquet and listened to some excellent speeches.

On January 11th, 1938, I accompanied Deputy Grand Master Leaman to Tweedie Lodge No. 41, Moncton, N. B., and assisted him in installing W:M: Peter McLean and officers for the year 1938, after which refreshments were served in the banquet hall.

On May 12, 1938, I visited Zetland Lodge No. 24, Shediac, N. B.; when the M. M. Degree was conferred upon one candidate in a very creditable manner by W:M: Kenneth Brydges and his staff of officers. I was accompanied by about thirty-five members of Keith and Tweedie Lodges.

On May 19th, I visited Sussex Lodge No. 4, Dorchester, N. B., when the F. C. Degree was exemplified by W:M: Frank Dobson and his staff of officers in an excellent manner.

On May 20th I accompanied the Most Worshipful Grand Master on an official visit to Keith Lodge No. 23, Moncton, N. B., where we witnessed the F. C. Degree. The work on this occasion was practically perfect, being put on by W:M: Russell MacCharles and his officers.

On June 3rd, I visited Salisbury Lodge No. 20 at Salisbury, N. B., and saw the M. M. Degree conferred. It was necessary to use a substitute candidate as the candidate could not be present on account of illness. The work was done by W:M: Hon. A. C. Taylor and his officers in a most excellent manner.

On June 7th, 1938, I visited Howard Lodge No. 15, Hillsboro, Albert County, N. B. Witnessed the E. A. Degree exemplified by W:M: Russell Dobson and officers in very fine form.

On June 14th, 1938, I visited Albert Lodge No. 34 at Albert, N. B. The E. A. Degree was conferred on a substitute candidate by W:M: G. W. James and his officers. Considerable progress has been made in Albert Lodge in the work of the ritual. On this occasion I was accompanied by Deputy Grand Master L. T. Leaman and others.

On July 7th, 1938, I visited Westmorland Lodge No. 44, Port Elgin, N. B., accompanied by brethren from Keith, Zetland and Lebanon Lodges. The E. A. Degree was conferred on a substitute candidate by W:M: Herman Peacock and his officers.

On July 12th, 1938, I visited Steven Lodge No. 37 at Petitcodiac, N. B. There being no candidate and three of the principal officers being ill, I did not ask them to exemplify any work. Having witnessed work by this Lodge before I feel confident the work would have been done in a very creditable manner by their regular officers.

W:M: Ernest S. Wilson presided. After the meeting we enjoyed refreshments.

On July 14th, 1938, I attended a banquet for distinguished guests at the Admiral Beatty Hotel, Saint John, N. B., including high dignitaries of Masonry from England, Ireland, Scotland, United States, Newfoundland, and Western Canada. Had the pleasure of meeting and securing autographs from many of them.

On August 9th, 1938, I accompanied the Most Worshipful Grand Master on an official visit to Albert Lodge No. 34, at Albert, N. B., where we witnessed the E. A. Degree conferred in a very creditable manner by W:M: G. W. James and his officers. Delicious refreshments were served at the close of the meeting.

In closing I would like to express the opinion that all of the Lodges in District No. 2 are in good financial condition and I would also like to thank you, Most Worshipful Grand Master, for the honor conferred on Keith Lodge, and myself personally, in appointing me as your Deputy for District No. 2. I would also extend my thanks to the various Lodges for their cordial welcome and kind hospitality to me as well as to the brethren who accompanied me from my own and other Lodges for their loyal support. In this respect I would particularly mention Wor. Bros. R. L. Algie, A. S. Robinson, H. T. Hart, T. A. Robinson and Russell MacCharles, they having accompanied me on practically every occasion.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master:

As District Deputy Grand Master of the Third Masonic District, it is again my privilege and pleasure to give an account of my stewardship and also to take this opportunity of expressing my thanks and appreciation for re-appointing me to this high office.

With the exception of Blackville Lodge No. 43, which has been inactive for several years, I have this year visited officially all the Lodges in my District and on every occasion have had a cordial and hospitable welcome.

Early in the year I visited the Lodges on the Miramichi River, Miramichi Lodge on January 17th, and Northumberland Lodge on April 12th. On both occasions I took an early morning train and spent the afternoon reviewing the work of the several degrees with members of the Craft interested in correct ritual. In Miramichi Lodge at Chatham I witnessed the working of the E. A. Degree on two candidates; while at Newcastle, Northumberland Lodge conferred the F. C. Degree on a like number. In both Lodges the work was very creditably done, considering that the officers had only been installed a short time previously, and as each of them now have instructors well posted in the ritual I trust that on the occasion of your recent visit to the Miramichi valley you found their efforts worthy of commendation.

On May 2nd I visited Campbellton Lodge No. 32 at Campbellton. The Brethren there have one of the finest Lodge rooms in the province, and with a number of Past Masters well versed in Masonic ritual and always willing to be of service the officers have every opportunity to put on good work. At that Communication Wor. Master

Gray and his officers conferred the M. M. Degree in a very pleasing manner, although several of the regular staff, including the Senior Warden, were absent.

On June 6th, accompanied by Wor. Bro. W. B. Jones of Miramichi Lodge, I motored to Richibucto for an official visit to Lodge Saint Andrew, a round trip of nearly 300 miles. The E. A. Degree was conferred on one candidate in a manner that compared favorably with that of any Lodge in the District, notwithstanding the fact that the Lodge depends largely on the outlying district for its membership and some of the officers, particularly in the winter months, have difficulty in regularly attending either Communications or rehearsals. A pleasing feature of the evening was a short address by Wor. Bro. Hugh M. Ferguson who, at the age of eighty-four years and with sixty years of Masonic life to his credit, is still vigorous and active in the affairs of his Lodge.

On July 12th, I presided at a Past Masters night in Restigouche Lodge No. 25, at Dalhousie, when the M. M. Degree was conferred on three candidates. A large number of visitors were present and as the Past Masters had devoted considerable time to rehearsals the work went through very smoothly. Among the visitors registered was Wor. Bro. W. Forrest Allan, Wor. Master of the Union Lodge of Portland, who kindly consented to raise one of the candidates. Restigouche Lodge is my Mother Lodge and I am pleased to report that Wor. Bro. Kingsley Miller and his officers are doing very efficient work.

On Monday, August 8th, accompanied by several members of Restigouche Lodge, I visited Lodge Saint John at Bathurst where I witnessed the conferring of the F. C. Degree on two candidates. Little criticism could be made regarding the work of any of the officers, and this applies particularly to Wor. Bro. Hodgins and also to his Senior Deacon, Bro. C. R. Branch, whose rendition of the lecture was of a high order. Lodge Saint John will form in Public

Procession on September 18th, to attend Divine Service, an annual custom, conscientiously observed by our Bathurst brethren.

In a brief summary of my observations during my visits in this district I can truthfully state that correct wording of the ritual is becoming more evident with each succeeding year. There is still much to be desired, however, as to floor work and attention to those minor details so essentially necessary for the smooth and impressive working of a degree. To accomplish this, each and every officer of a Lodge should be brought to realize that his presence and co-operation are necessary at all rehearsals and communications. Officers who are irregular in attendance, careless as to dress and deportment, and who lack interest in the work of the minor roles should never be advanced to the higher stations. Promotion must be by merit if the high character and dignity of the Lodge is to be maintained.

In conclusion, may I assure you that it has been a pleasure to have served as your District Deputy during your term of office, not only for the opportunities afforded to be of service to the Craft but also on account of the knowledge acquired by my visits to Saint John. The hours spent in Emulation Lodge were most enjoyable and instructive while the friendships formed among my brethren in Freemasonry will ever bring to me pleasant memories.

In submitting annual report may I take the opportunity of thanking you for the honor conferred in appointing me as your Deputy in District No. 4 for the year.

BETHEL LODGE No. 40, EDMUNDSTON.

On February 4th I went to Edmundston and was met at the station by Ronald D. Baird, Worshipful Master of Bethel Lodge. In the evening the Lodge worked a candidate through the second degree. I was very much impressed with the calibre of the official staff of this Lodge. They seem to be alert and keen. During the evening a business report was brought in, and it showed the Lodge had \$1500 invested in Dominion of Canada bonds and almost sufficient cash on hand to buy another \$500 bond. They own their own building, which contains lodge, preparatory and ante rooms on the first floor, with suitable dining room and kitchen in the basement. The report showed they had forwarded \$67.81 church collection to the New Brunswick Protestant Orphans' Home and \$10.00 to Saskatchewan Relief Fund. Following the meeting we repaired to the dining room and partook of a tasty repast. A happy feature of the occasion was the presence of a goodly number of the fraternity from nearby Maine Lodges under the leadership of District Deputy Grand Master Waldo Burgess of Limestone, Maine. The Worshipful Master had sent him an invitation to attend, and I appreciated very much the courtesy of his presence and fine remarks.

We missed our late departed brother, W: Malcolm E. Amos, who at the time of his death was District Deputy

Grand Master. Evidences of his labors were manifest in the Lodge room. The nobility of his character and his devotion to the Craft have made a deep impress. He lived up to the ideals of his profession, and the sweet remembrance of his many virtues will truly last for many, many years.

On Sunday, June 26th, I again had the privilege of being with the brethren of Bethel Lodge, this time at their observance of St. John's Day. They had expected that you, Most Worshipful Sir, would have been in attendance, as you had so signified your intention, but illness disarranged your schedule and prevented. I am happy to inform you that as your representative they made me most welcome. Following the opening of the Lodge the Craft was formed in procession, and paraded, preceded by the Edmundston Band, to the Anglican Church, where Past Master Rev. Jos. McAlden of Andover delivered the address. Past Master Rev. N. Franchetti of Bethel Lodge, Rector of the Church, conducted the service, and the offering was donated to the New Brunswick Protestant Orphans' Home. Members of Edmundston Royal Arch Chapter No. 10 were guests.

COLEBROOKE LODGE No. 39, GRAND FALLS.

On January 19th, visited Colebrooke Lodge and installed the officers. This Lodge is very active and under the splendid leadership of the retiring Worshipful Master, Harley L. Wright, had a successful year, during which nine candidates were received. They have a beautiful brick building erected in 1927 at a cost of approximately \$18,000. On the first floor is a banquet hall, with cloak room, kitchen and lavatory, and the lodge room is on the second floor. There is a splendid basement. The building is attractively furnished and appointed throughout, and the debt is reduced to about \$5,000. If any of our Lodges in the jurisdiction ever contemplate constructing a temple

it would prove of interest to them to see this structure. A Lodge from one of the Maine towns has since put up a building, which they patterned after that of Colebrooke Lodge. Following the installation and a luncheon with the usual speeches, the newly installed Worshipful Master, Harold J. Fraser, was so keen to be getting on with his work that he invited his officers to stay for a rehearsal of the first degree, and, although it was then midnight, they very willingly acquiesced, and a complete practise was carried out. Among the members of this Lodge are brethren from New Denmark, the Danish colony situated about ten miles from Grand Falls, and these brethren are among the most active members and officers of the Lodge. During the evening an enlarged photograph of Archibald R. Hallett, the first Worshipful Master, was unveiled. This Worshipful Brother had lived to preside in his Lodge on August 9, 1933, within four days of his ninetieth birthday.

BENJAMIN LODGE No. 31, ANDOVER.

On June 7th, visited Benjamin Lodge and witnessed the initiation of two candidates. The Lodge performed its duties creditably, and at the conclusion of the meeting we were bidden to the dining hall downstairs, where a nice luncheon, buffet style, was provided by the ladies. Following the luncheon we went again to the Lodge room, the Worshipful Master and officers taking their stations, and with many of the brethren sitting in the members' seats. including a delegation from Grand Falls, had an informal Lodge of Instruction.

This Lodge is having a remarkable run of candidates, and at the time of writing this report have dealt with fourteen applications so far this year. Worshipful Master C. Harry Lewis and his officers are very busy as a consequence, and from what I saw, know they are doing their work well.

CARLETON LODGE No. 35, EAST FLORENCEVILLE.

On May 12th visited Carleton Lodge and saw this Lodge under the direction of J. Winston Sipprell, the Worshipful Master, pass three Entered Apprentices to the degree of a Fellow Craft. It was a rather unique occasion in that these Entered Apprentices were all principals of nearby schools. This is one of our fine lodges, and the brethren deserve credit for their progressiveness in remodeling the lower floor of their hall, which is now well suited for plays and entertainments, and it has become a community centre. At the luncheon following the meeting we had some fine speeches, and one could not help being warmed at the cordial feeling which prevailed. Before departing for our homes the official staff and a considerable number of the brethren remained for conference and instruction in ritualistic work.

HARTLAND LODGE No. 46, HARTLAND.

This is my own Lodge, and while I did not visit it officially, have been present at every meeting but one. The Lodge is the newest in the District and is now fifteen years old. Its affairs are being capably administered by the Worshipful Master Gordon McBurney.

WOODSTOCK LODGE No. 11, WOODSTOCK.

Official visit to Woodstock Lodge was made on the 7th April, and there was an exemplification of the Entered Apprentice Degree. The Lodge room has been newly decorated and presents a very fine appearance. It is of interest to note that this is the second largest Lodge in the jurisdiction, being only exceeded in number of members by Keith Lodge No. 23, Moncton.

On May 5th I was again present in Woodstock Lodge to assist in doing honor to brethren belonging to the Lodge

who had been Masons for over fifty years. There were six of them, and the record of their membership is as follows: Donald Munro, sixty-two years; George A. Gabel, fifty-nine years; David W. Jackson, fifty-three years; J. Norman W. Winslow, fifty-three years; David N. Phillips, fifty-three years; and James W. Foster, fifty-one years. Each was presented a Masonic emblem charm by Worshipful Master Murray MacKenzie on behalf of the Lodge. Speeches were heard from these honor guests. R.W: Donald Munro, who was Deputy Grand Master in 1900, gave a most interesting history of the Lodge, and Bro. Jackson told of his experiences in the Klondike in 1898.

It was a great pleasure to have accompanied you on your official visits to Woodstock Lodge No. 11 on November 4th, Bethel Lodge, No. 40, on August 16th, and Colebrooke Lodge No. 39 on August 17th.

I regret that owing to previous engagements I was unable to be present at divine service with Woodstock Lodge No. 11 on June 26th, and the At Home in the form of a New Year's Ball given by Benjamin Lodge No. 31, Andover, on December 31st, although I appreciated very much the courtesy of special invitations to attend.
