GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

GRAND MASTER'S REPORT

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

1941]

Due to the high honour which you conferred upon me at our last communication, it is my privilege and pleasure to welcome you to this, the Seventy-fourth Annual Communication of Grand Lodge.

The war, which began shortly after our Annual Communication of 1939, is still raging; in fact, has spread until practically the entire Eastern hemisphere is a raging battlefield. Although the immediate terrors of the strife have not reached our shores, there are few among us who have not relatives and friends in the midst of the struggle. As loval citizens, it is our duty to do our utmost to destroy the forces of evil, and see that the principles of freedom and justice are triumphant. As Masons we should practice the high ideals and teachings of our Order, so that brotherly love will prevail among men and Masons forever.

If ever fraternalism was important, its need is today. Conceived in brotherly love, fostered by the principles of a belief in Deity, broadened by a freedom and tolerance of thought, Masonic fraternalism is indeed the antithesis of greed for power of ruthless might against an all enduring right.

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The degree work which I witnessed at many of these Lodges was of a high order and very creditably put on. This demonstrated to me that on the whole the officers of the various Lodges in this jurisdiction are taking a keen interest in Masonry.

On December 27th last, I installed the officers of Campbellton Lodge No. 32.

On January 13, an Emergent Communication of Grand Lodge was held in Moncton for the purpose of rededicating the Masonic Temple, which had been rebuilt to replace the one destroyed by fire some time previously. A large number were present, but a severe storm prevented many from attending. On that occasion it was our privilege to listen to a most inspiring address by R:W: G. Percy Burchill, P.G.M. The Lodges in Moncton have a temple of which they may be justly proud, and which is an evidence of their sincerity in Masonry.

It was my pleasure to request the R:W: Deputy Grand Master, James S. Hoyt, to install the officers of Keith No. 23, Saint John's No. 2, The New Brunswick No. 22, The Corinthian No. 13, and Union Lodge of Portland No. 10. I wish to thank R:W: Brother Hoyt for the efforts he has put forth to assist me in these duties, as well as for his attendance at many of my visits to other Lodges.

My thanks are also due to R:W: Brother B. E.

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official visits. From my visits and from information received from the Deputy Grand Master and the District Deputy Grand Masters of the several districts, I feel I can truly say that harmony and goodwill prevail within the jurisdiction. I am pleased to note from the Notices of Lodge meetings, which I have received during the year that a number of Lodges have paid fraternal visits to other nearby Lodges and in some instances have done degree work. I trust this practice will continue, and spread throughout the entire jurisdiction.

I would like to impress upon all Lodges, the necessity of making their annual returns promptly. These furnish information which the Grand Master should have early each year, as it is of great assistance to him to know the standing of each Lodge when making his official visits. The information contained in these returns is also required by the Grand Secretary before he can present a complete statement to Grand Lodge.

In addition to the usual returns required to be sent in by the Lodges within the jurisdiction further information was asked for this year. By this means I have ascertained that, with few exceptions, our Lodges are on a sound financial basis. According to our constitution the individual Lodges have the right to manage their own affairs within certain limits. Grand Lodge, however, is made up of these individual Lodges and for this reason I feel it is our duty to give them all the assistance and advice they may require in order to maintain a healthy financial, as well as ritualistic, condition. By doing so the position of Grand Lodge both financially and numerically will not be impaired.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

The attention of all members of the Craft is called to the decrease in membership for last year as stated by the report of the Grand Secretary. By reference to previous Grand Lodge reports it will be seen that our membership has been decreasing for the past twelve years. This loss in numbers has now reached a figure which is rather alarming. The revenue of Grand Lodge, as well as that of the individual Lodge. is being affected by this. Some means will have to be taken to prevent or curtail this loss, otherwise an increase in Grand Lodge dues will be necessary. Loss by death is inevitable but loss by suspension is the main cause of this decrease in membership. While suspension cannot be entirely eliminated it can be reduced to a minimum if greater effort is put forth to interview each delinquent member personally. This should not be left entirely to the Secretary, but close friends of the brothers in arrears, either as a committee or as individuals should be appointed to make the contact.

Now that economic conditions are better, efforts should be made to have former members of the Craft re-instated who were suspended for non-payment of dues. There are within our jurisdiction many who have demitted from our own and outside Lodges. These should be approached with a view of having them again become active Masons.

It was my hope that the District Deputy Grand Masters could have met with the Ritual Committee for instructions. Certain conditions prevented this from being accomplished, hence I would recommend

that such a meeting be held as soon as possible in the new Masonic year.

Section 2, "Of Proposing Members," of the constitution requires certain information regarding applicants for membership in our Order, to be put on Lodge Notices. I have received Notices on which complete information was not given, and would call the attention of Secretaries to this important matter.

I would recommend that each Lodge be required to send Notices of all Regular and Emergent Communications to the Grand Master, the Grand Secretary, and to the District Deputy Grand Master of the District in which it is located.

In order that the members of the craft throughout this jurisdiction may be better acquainted with the activities of Grand Lodge I would recommend the Master of each Lodge cause to be read, in open Lodge, the Grand Master's annual address together with the annual report of the District Deputy Grand Master for that district. I make this recommendation not because I feel that my own address is any literary or oratorical gem, but merely for the sake of commencing a custom, which I feel that in the years to come will be of some benefit to our Order.

This evening, the member of Grand Lodge will witness a second degree to be conferred by Grand Lake Lodge No. 47. I am most anxious that as many of the brethren as possible should remain to see this degree, bearing in mind that this Lodge is the youngest Lodge in our jurisdiction.

In closing I would remind you that whenever a Lodge or Grand Lodge meets, it is assembled in the name of the Great Architect of the Universe. In stirring times such as these this should be borne in mind, and I trust that He will guide and assist us in our deliberations.

We note with pleasure that Grand Lodge has been able to make a contribution to the War Effort of the Nation by investing from the funds of the Benevolent Account \$5,500.00. of which \$2,500.00 was in Victory Loan Bonds.

We note with concern, that over the period of the last ten years, there has been a large decrease in membership and consequent less of revenue in General Account, and we would recommend that the Grand Secretary prepare a comparative statement of membership over the last ten years,

It was moved by V:W: Bro. R. D. Magee, seconded by R:W: Bro. F. W. Fowler, that a sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) be set aside for use by the War Fund Committee. Carried.

R:W: Bro. R. B. Irving, Chairman of the Special Committee appointed by Grand Lodge to collect and administer "The Masonic War Fund" read a report from the Committee as follows:-

THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

The Special Committee appointed by the Most Worshipful the Grand Master in accordance with the Resolution passed last year with respect to voluntary contributions for work for war purposes, begs leave to report as follows:—

The Committee appointed by the Grand Master consisted of Brothers Robert B. Irving, Stanley M. Wetmore, Horace A. Porter, Ernest H. Cameron and Herman E. Sullivan. This Committee met on September 10th, 1940, and elected Brother Irving as Chairman and Brother Porter as Secretary-Treasurer.

A circular letter was sent to the Worshipful Masters throughout the jurisdiction under date of the 25th day of September, 1940, and the various District Deputy Grand Masters were advised of this action. The matter was followed up by subsequent letters, both individual and general.

Attached to this Report as Schedule I is a list of the respective amounts received from the various lodges, totalling in all \$5,159.41.

This money has been expended in three directions. \$3,600.00 in all was forwarded to the Minister of Finance at Ottawa for the purpose of securing eight Bren guns for the active prosecution of the war. These Bren guns will be suitably inscribed as having been presented from this fund.

Having expended this amount for offensive purposes, the Committee thought well to use the balance of the fund for relief. By unanimous vote a grant of \$1,000.00 was made to the Queen's Canadian Fund for air raid victims. At the time this grant was made, contributions to that fund were rather hanging fire and apparently the public did not appreciate either the necessity for or the scope of the fund. Whether the size of your Committee's donation had any effect on public opinion or not, we cannot say positively, but the fact remains that shortly after, contributions started to flow in more rapidly and have since continued in rather gratifying amounts.

The balance of the money was voted to the Canadian Committee of The Save the Children Fund. This is a British charity which has been established for years as a relief agency, non-partisan and non-sectarian. During the last twenty-two years the British Government has entrusted to it more than two million and a half Sterling. Rescue homes are maintained for children from two to five years of age and outside work is also done in seeing that children are provided with temporary quarters after a bombing and also that in the air raid shelters special equipment is provided for younger children. As much of the suffering arising from air attacks is caused by cold and lack of hot food and drinks at a critical time when vitality is low and nervous strain great, the work of this charity has its particular appeal. While your Committee is not in the slightest degree influenced by the fact, it may be of interest to Grand Lodge that the Honorary Chairman for Canada of this Fund is the President of the University of New Brunswick, Dr. Norman A. N. Mackenzie.

Porter presented and read the report of the Special Committee on the address of the Grand Master and, on motion, duly seconded, the report was received and approved and ordered to be printed in full in the Annual Proceedings of Grand Lodge, and that the recommendations contained therein be adopted.

BRETHERN OF GRAND LODGE:

The Committee to whom was referred the Grand Master's Address beg leave to submit their report thereon.

We wish to commend the Address because it is short, succinct and business-like and deals with the affairs of Grand Lodge rather than being an address on world history or an acknowledgment of private courtesies received.

The Grand Master is entitled to the thanks of Grand Lodge for the leadership he has bestowed and the thought given to our affairs.

We join with the Grand Master in his expression of regret at the loss of so many members who have served the Order well in the days gone by. The percentage of really active and outstanding workmen seems to be exceptionally high.

Losses by death are to be expected and cannot be prevented. The Grand Master has drawn our attention to the fact that these losses are not the only losses we are sustaining, and in fact numerically are the smaller item. During the present year out of two hundred and seventy struck off our roll only eightyfour were from death, one hundred and eighty-six were from other causes. This is a condition which has been going on for some years, and while the Grand Master draws particular attention to the effect on the revenue of Grand Lodge, your Committee feels that the question is one of even wider range and worthy of serious consideration both by the Board of Gen-

eral Purposes and the Leaders of the Craft in the various Districts. Evidently many Lodges are failing to inculcate into the minds and hearts of the new members the principles and duties and mutual responsibilities which devolve upon us as Masons. Particularly at this time when we are striving to preserve the principles of individual freedom, of the common brotherhood of mankind, surely now is the opportune time to teach clearly and methodically the principles of this great Order. We would suggest to the Board of General Purposes that they consider having prepared special addresses on phases of our teaching, or of our symbolisms, and that these addresses be available for use in the various Lodges at their winter meetings. Such a program might reawaken interest and be a further stimulant to induce some former members to become re-instated.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

The Grand Master also draws attention to the fact that notices are going out in which complete information is not being given of the people who are to be ballotted upon. Your Committee would suggest that instructions be given to the Grand Secretary to notify the Worshipful Master of any Lodge sending out such a communication that no ballot shall be taken in such an instance and that the name will have to be included on the next notice.

The Committee wish to join with the Grand Master in the rejoicing that our brethren in the City of Moncton are again re-established in their own home, and that this has been rededicated. May the Masons of Moncton prosper and always be an important factor in the Masonic life of the Province.

Your Committee feel sure that those Lodges which had the privilege of a visit from the Grand Master benefitted therefrom. They also join in appreciation of the good work done by the Deputy Grand Master, and they endorse most heartily the recommendation that each Lodge be required to send notices of all regular and emergent communications to the Grand Master, the Grand Secretary, and to the District Deputy Grand Master of the District in which it is located. Your Committee would be apt to include the Deputy Grand Master in this list.

Receipt of the notices together with an early receipt of returns will enable the Leaders of the Craft to do still better work. On the other hand, in concurring in the Grand Master's recommendation that his address be read at a regular meeting of each Lodge your Committee feel that this will engender more interest among the private members. Knowledge and enthusiasm should go hand in hand.

Your Committee close this report as they began it, with an appreciation of the leadership given by the Grand Master and with a sincere hope that he will be spared for many years to actively participate in the affairs of Grand Lodge.

I take pride in saying that the nine Lodges comprising this District are in excellent condition, and although many prospective candidates have answered the call of their King and Country and have removed elsewhere, Freemasonry continues to grow and flourish.
