GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

Right Worshipful, Very Worshipful and Worshipful Brothers of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick:

MY DEAR BRETHREN:-

It is again my privilege and pleasure to have the distinguished honor of welcoming you to this, the Seventy-seventh Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. The large number of Brethren who have registered and are in attendance is very gratifying to me, and I am sure will help to make this Assembly one that will long be remembered.

I am sure we are all filled with the enthusiasm and ambition to improve and better this Grand Fraternity, which, with its doctrines and teachings greatly help and assist us in all our doings.

We bow our heads again in praise and thanksgiving before the Supreme Architect of the Universe, for His careful guidance and assistance in the past, GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

The years of war through which we have passed and which we pray will soon be brought to a final glorious Allied Victory, have made many changes in our lives and in our Country, and we must look for still more changes to come. Vacancies in our homes and Lodges, created by those who have given their lives as a Supreme Sacrifice, to gain for this world, a place where free people could again hold up their heads, and profess their belief publicly, without fears of being imprisoned or murdered, will leave a lasting impression of the valiant and brave deeds which they have performed, and we must see and care for those they have left behind them, that they may not suffer for lack of our help and assistance.

We must create in this great Fraternity of ours a unity to better the world in which we live and to establish therein a perfect keystone cementing Peace, Harmony and Love, into that brotherhood which creates and builds all nations of this world. The task of fraternizing the human race is of Divine Ordination and is a part of the program of this Great Brotherhood, and is the first and greatest need of the world today. Our task lies in a ceaseless endeavor to create universally right relationship between men and nations, founded upon and springing from the Brotherhood of Man.

From this Grand Jurisdiction, a large number of

our Brethren have enlisted in the Armed Services of our Country, for service both Overseas and at home, and I hope that we will have a splendid report in the very near future, of the number of these Brethren who have volunteered their services for their King and Country. The Masters and Secretaries of the various Lodges must keep a careful report on these names, and keep our Grand Secretary advised of any changes, so that we, like other Grand Lodges, can have our record up-to-date at all times.

The Membership in our Order, as at December 30, 1943, shows 5,311 active Masons in New Brunswick Jurisdiction, an increase of 151 Members for the year. This is most creditable and encouraging, and from the number that have been raised to date this present year, I know that we will have a larger number at our next Annual Report.

I have mentioned in many of my visits to the Lodges that we must create a stronger appeal to those who have been admitted to our ranks and exemplify in our daily duties, the true Masonic teachings, thus binding our newly created Brethren in a much closer bond of Fraternal Friendship, and by this we will build Masonry stronger, but we ourselves, will reap the benefits from the efforts that we have made in this manner. Let the great Light of Masonry shine before all the world through our lives, so that the Masonic teachings, through emblems, signs and symbols may be changed to realities in this manner, thus will we set examples for others to follow and encourage those in darkness to see this Light.

Hamer. Grand Organist: Worshipful Brother Lee S. Saunders. Grand Steward, and Worshipful Brother Murray E. Tower, Grand Steward, all Presiding Officers of Grand Lodge, besides a large delegation of the Brethren from Moncton, Port Elgin, Sackville, Hillsboro, Point du Chene and other surrounding towns. Grand Lodge was formed not only to instal the Worshipful Masterelect and his Officers, but also to dedicate the new quarters of Sussex Lodge. The Brethren met together in the Church Hall of the Baptist Church in Dorchester, at 7.00 p.m., when the ladies served a very lovely dinner, after which, I had the honor of dedicating the new quarters of Sussex Lodge, and I am sure we all wish for the Brethren of Sussex Lodge, a very prosperous and enjoyable Home here, and we congratulate them on the wonderful manner in which they have furnished and decorated their new Lodge quarters.

On April 25th and 26th, I accepted the invitation of District Deputy Grand Master Metzler, and with the Very Worshipful Grand Secretary, we joined with him in a general meeting of District No. 3. This is the first District Meeting held during my term of office, and from the large attendance of the Brethren from the Lodges of this District and the enthusiasm and character of the work carried on, I can assure the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick that a District which does not have a District Meeting at least once a year is definitely losing a connection which Masonry affords, and that only a District Meeting can accomplish. I congratulate District No. 3 on their turnout, on this occasion, and I hope that all the Brethren who attended went away from the meeting with as much

enthusiasm and renewed energy as both the Grand Secretary and myself did.

I was very pleased to accept an invitation from our Very Worshipful Brother and Grand Chaplain, Jos. McAlden, to attend Divine Service in All Saints' Anglican Church, St. Andrews, on Sunday, June 25th. Although the day did not lend itself to an outdoor demonstration, Saint Mark's Lodge room was opened for our get-together, and fall-in. A number of the Brethren from the surrounding Lodges, along with those who accompanied me from Saint John, formed Grand Lodge and accompanied by Saint Mark's Lodge and Sussex Lodge No. 7 joined in procession, and marched to All Saints' Church. The Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain excelled himself in the Masonic Service which he delivered on that occasion, and I publicly acknowledge, and thank him for his kind invitation to be present.

It was a great disappointment to me that I could not follow out our plans and visit Bethel Lodge as arranged on May 9th, during my tour of the Lodges in the River Valley. Certain business duties interfered and I was forced to deputize the R:W: Junior Grand Warden to pay this visit in my stead. I was, however, successful in arranging a later visit as recorded in my list of visitations, and so personally paid my visit to Bethel Lodge.

I have refrained from singling out any particular Lodge or Lodges for special mention in this report, as they all had something of outstanding significance and I could dwell on my visit to each at some length. I must, however, mention my visit to Mananook Lodge at Grand Manan. Through the kindness of the Brethren of Black's Harbour, arrangements were made with Connors Brothers, Ltd., to place at my disposal,

which this Masonic visit created, and we are all look-

ing forward to another visit in the very near future.

I received many invitations to attend Communications of Grand Lodges both in Canada and United States, which I had to decline owing to either other arrangements having been made before these invitations were received, or business conditions interfering. I was able to accept, however, the invitation of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts to be present with them at the quarterly Communication of their Grand Lodge on June 14th. I arrived in Boston on the morning of the 14th and was received by the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Arthur Coolidge, at his Conference of District Deputies, and after being his guest at a most enjoyable luncheon in the Touraine Hotel,

I was officially received in the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, in the afternoon. On my reception and introduction, having received Grand Honors, I was invited to the East, and was given the opportunity of speaking to their Grand Lodge. The Grand Director of Ceremonies was then directed to present me again to the East, then Grand Master Coolidge presented me with the Henry Price Jewel of Free Masonry, the highest honor the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts can bestow, and I thanked Grand Master Coolidge for this distinguished honor which he had conferred on me. Earlier in 1944, I was commissioned, by the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, as their Grand Representative, near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, an honor greatly esteemed, and my visit to the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts at this time, was two-fold. first as Grand Master of New Brunswick exchanging a Fraternal visit, and then as their Grand Representative in our Grand Lodge.

During this present term of office I have had the privilege of visiting many Lodges throughout Canada, and I can assure you that I have received most cordial receptions and I am sure the exchange of Fraternal good wishes, will do much to build a united Fraternity. The only Subordinate Lodge, outside of Canada, that I was able to visit, was Dalhousie Lodge in Newton-ville, Mass., at which time the Worshipful Master expressed his wish that I assume the East of this Lodge when I addressed the Brethren. My visitation here was most enjoyable, and my thanks and appreciation goes to Worshipful Brother Larry Jackson, the Director of Administration of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, for the opportunity thus afforded.

A great disappointment occurred, after I had made all plans to attend the Grand Master of Masons'

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Conference in Washington, early this year, when I found it impossible, owing to business conditions, to be present. I believe that a great deal could be gained by attending a Conference of this nature, and sincerely trust that my successor in office, will be directed to-if at all possible-attend this Conference. The Very Worshipful Grand Secretary, who had planned to go along with me and attend the Grand Secretaries' Conference, at my direction, attended both, and from the many points which he has mentioned and the subjects that we have discussed, will definitely be a benefit to our Grand Lodge. You will hear his report, which I know will only briefly touch on the valuable points which he has received, and the knowledge that he has gained.

Yesterday, August 23rd, I held what I termed to be-a Grand Master's Conference, which was in reality, a Lodge of Emulation, under the direction of the Ritual Committee of this Grand Lodge. In my visiting the many Lodges, throughout the Jurisdiction, and you can see from my reports of the two years that I have been in office, I have visited every Lodge in our Jurisdiction, at least once-I have concluded that a number of the Lodges need assistance, which I believe can be rendered to them either through the Grand Lodge or through the District Deputy Grand Masters. I have found the Worshipful Masters, Wardens and Officers, to be conscientious, capable and energetic Masons, desiring to exemplify the Masonic Ritual Work in their Lodges, in the most capable manner, yet in many cases, they are handicapped by not having something to follow, for their wording, and the method and manner of how the work should be carried on. In the Conference, we endeavored to explain why certain things were done in certain manners, and the reason that these duties should be carried out in this way. We have also given you the opportunity to ask certain questions, when some one would endeavor to explain them, and I hope that the District Deputies appointed by the incoming Grand Master, will see to it, that they hold a District Meeting and that all the Officers of the Lodges in their District be present at that meeting. Our Masonry stands at the door of a new era, and it is through the capable guidance of the Grand Lodge and the energetic working of the individual Lodges, will determine whether Masonry can forge ahead and take its proper place in the minds and lives of the freethinking and determined men who form the Great Brotherhood of Mankind.

You honored me last August, by re-electing me as your Grand Master, an honor deeply appreciated, and I have faithfully endeavored to perform the duties of that Grand Office, as I saw them. I trust you will receive this Report of my stewardship favorably. You are fully aware of the difficulties of travel, and with the duties of my everyday life, it was sometimes quite troublesome to make all my arrangements coincide. but with the assistance of the Officers and Brethren, I have been able to do so, and have completed a splendid tour of our Jurisdiction. I have endeavored to leave a helpful message wherever I went, and have also done what I could to spread more knowledge and create a greater interest in Masonry.

The privilege and joy of serving you as your Grand Master, is one I shall always remember, as you all have made my duties so pleasant and agreeable. The association, both old and new, which were made, will. I hope, assist somewhat the expanding and broadening of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. All I can add for your kindness to me is said so simply—"Thank you." I pledge you my support at all times, and to the new Grand Master, whoever he may be,—all the assistance he would require of me. With every good wish for your future and that of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, I respectfully submit this Report.

I cannot impress too strongly upon the minds of those Lodge Secretaries the fact that they are laying themselves open to more or less severe censureship in overlooking this fact, whether it be intentional or otherwise, and would suggest to them that they keep this fact in mind and order their supplies promptly and in advance so that they will have a sufficient supply on hand to meet their requirements.

An item of interest to us all is the request of our Grand Master for returns of those of our Brethren serving with the Armed Forces. A small number have reached this office during the past year but there are many not yet received and, strange to say, only one of our Saint John City Lodges has complied with the Grand Master's request. It is hoped that all Lodges will make these returns as soon as they conveniently can. Forms have been supplied each Lodge and it will not take much time to complete them and send them in.

Secretaries, in completing these forms, are asked to fill in the names of those of their membership who have paid the Supreme Sacrifice so that their names might be suitably enscroled upon our records for future generations to observe that Masonry in New Brunswick did supply numbers who were sufficiently endued with the wish for Freedom as to lay down their lives that we at home might meet in comfort and peace. To secure our frontiers from the footsteps of an alien race bent upon murder and lust.

"That an amount of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) be appropriated to publish a short history of Free-masonry as written by the Grand Historian for presentation to the Craft within the jurisdiction." Carried.

"That Grand Lodge proceed with the publication of 1,000 copies of a cipher ritual of Grand Lodge to be made available to the Craft." Carried.

The Grand Secretary read a report on the Conference of Grand Secretaries held in Washington, D. C., February, 1944.

It was moved by R:W: Dr. F. A. Godsoe and seconded by W: Frederick Green:—

"That the Report be received and printed in full in the Annual Proceedings of Grand Lodge and that Grand Lodge continue its membership in this Association and also that of the Conference of Grand Masters of the United States and Canada." Carried.

GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT ON CONFERENCE IN WASHINGTON

In February, each year, in Washington, D. C., is held a conference of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries. These two Associations have been meeting so for the past seventeen years.

It was the intention of our Grand Master to be present at the Grand Masters' Conference this year, but business interposed at the last minute and he was unable to attend,—but by his direction your Grand Secretary was enabled to attend at both meetings.

At these conferences are presented previously selected subjects by appointed speakers which have a direct bearing on our Masonic edifice. After each presentation a round-table talk ensues bringing out the views of such as care to speak on the subject. These papers and the ensuing talks are of a highly

educational nature and are worth the expense of time and money to hear them.

The Grand Secretaries' Conference deals principally with subjects having a direct bearing upon the business of their office, and such matters as may tend toward a closer unity of the Craft, wheresoever dispersed.

This year the principal theme tended toward postwar possibilities, — what form our post-war work should take. A Freemason's duty, opportunity, service in the post-war world.

The question is an unanswerable one because none of us has the ability to answer the question as to when the war will cease or what the post-war world will be like.

One definition of a Mason is this: I am thankful to God Almighty that I do not have to sit in judgment on my fellow man. I am my brother's keeper, that I know. But I am mostly responsible for my own acts and so long as I act so that my life will perhaps be of benefit rather than a detriment to my brother's way of life, I am accomplishing something.

It would be foolish for us who are of the Trinitarian faith to say that every man that has his name on our Church rolls was a Christian. It would be equally foolish for us to say that every man that had his name on our Lodge rolls was a Mason. What I mean by a Mason is not necessarily a fluent ritualist or a brilliant jurist. The most humble member of a lodge may be a better Mason than any of us. It is the man who realizes when he professed belief in Almighty God and became a member that it was not lipservice and that he had the faith and courage to adopt

it as his way of life. That is the man that I am talking about when I use the word "Mason."

Again, we must have the very best men we can find to put this job over. Ask yoursleves the question, Where can we get the best men? The answer is simply, and I want you to get this, —the best men at their best.

The whole theme and scheme of this compilation is expressed in a beautiful little story of the chaplain who was ministering to a dying soldier. The boy looked up at him and said, "Padre, I don't belong to your Church." The chaplain said, "No, my son, but you do belong to my God." Think about that.

Happy people sing. A Mason is happy because in times of trial and great danger he puts his trust in God. While we consider this momentous question, let us sing in our hearts: "Rise up, oh men of God, have done with lesser things, give heart, and soul, and mind, and strength to serve the King of kings."

Passing this subject through the Masonic crucible it comes out in this challenging question, "What is the greatest contribution I can make to the post-war world?" The answer is clear and simple, "Be a Mason."

The present world chaos is probably the outgrowth of Nietzsche's philosophy of the superman. Crippled in body and soul, his brilliant mind caught the people of Germany off guard and enabled him to establish temporarily a philosophy which attempts to replace God, in the scheme of life, with a superman. This poisonous virus injected into the bloodstream of a once great people has infected them with the loath-some disease of hate and greed so that they have

pulled down their temples of righteousness and left misery in its wake.

The antidote is the practical application of the principles of Masonry reflected in the lives of the members of our Fraternity who have the faith and courage to live the life of a Mason. Against this insidious doctrine of superman, Masonry has, through the centuries, taught the doctrine of Brotherly Love; Relief; Truth; Temperance; Fortitude; Prudence; Justice and Toleration. It is not only our responsibility, but our bounden duty to live such a life.

The relationships of men will never again be the same, nor should they, for they have not been founded on the eternal truths of God. Whatever may be the political, economic or military form of world organization for the preservation of a just and durable peace, the rights and duties of peoples to maintain their cultural freedom must be preserved. Masonry cannot adequately meet man's perennial demands for peace and freedom with a simple call to commit ourselves to its cause, but must instill into us that exalted way of life to which each of us has so solemnly consecrated himself. Peace will depend upon the cooperation of the men in all lands. We, therefore, must have faith and conviction enough in our way of life to be tolerant with others.

We can play a conspicuous role in this phase by developing a real sense of toleration. Race, color and creed must be dealt with in the realization that all men are brothers and creatures of a common Father.

The challenge to exhibit in our fellowship a higher group life is presently before us. The Churches, by whatever name they may be called, are divided into so many sects as to make this impractical. Masons are members of one of these several creeds, so our

responsibility is two-fold. One of our greatest and immediate concerns should be to develop this higher group life and show the world how mankind can live together.

Let us believe in our way of life; visualize our individual responsibility; exercise self-discipline and obedience to law so that with one accord we may pray to the Great Architect of the Universe in the words of Reinhold Niebuhr:

"Give me the serenity to accept what cannot be changed. "Give me the courage to change what can be changed. "The wisdom to know one from the other."

Here I would like to thank my good friend, M:W: Brother O. Frank Hart, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of South Carolina for much of the thought and ideas and the material used in this short paper. He is an inspiration to all who get to know him and think with him in these matters.

I have tried, my Brethren, to give you an example of those things I have heard and learned in my visit to Washington. It may be that I have not gotten across to you in the way, possibly, some other and better composer might have done the position we stand in to accomplish anything of magnitude in our Masonic post-war effort. Further subjects on this vital phase of our future life will be considered and discussed in the future gatherings of both the Grand Masters' and Grand Secretaries' Conferences and it is to be hoped that this Grand Lodge meeting today in Freedom and Peace in this city will make it possible that, in future, your Grand Master and Grand Secretary,-no matter who they may be in the future, -will have these meetings on their MUST list if it be at all possible for them to so attend. The neglect on our part of the past seventeen years should not be

allowed to continue. I trust that Grand Lodge will take action today on this vital problem so that we, in New Brunswick can take our rightful place in the great Masonic scheme of things to come and be part of the power needed to consummate a lasting and durable peace.

It was moved by R:W: LeB. Wilson and seconded by W: T. A. Robinson:-

"That Grand Lodge support the Conferences of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries and that Grand Lodge pay the expenses of these two Officers to these conferences in future." Carried.

Read the Report of the Committee on Fraternal Correspondence.

It was directed that the Report be received and printed in full in the Annual Proceedings and that the recommendation of the Committee be considered by the Board of General Purposes."

Your Committee on Fraternal Correspondence is pleased to again present a report on this phase of Masonic work.

Of note in particular is the vast amount of work being done by other Grand Jurisdictions in the matter of making plans and setting up funds for the rehabilitation of soldier members of the Craft after their discharge from the Services.

It is to be regretted that this Grand Lodge has not seen fit to likewise start machinery that will help our own returned Brethren if and when occasion may require. It is not too late even yet to begin the collection of a fund that can be used for such purposes and show our soldier members that we have their position in mind and stand ready to help, aid and assist them according to our Obligations.

Your Committee is aware that this Grand Lodge is not yet in a financial condition to permit the publishing of reviews in our Annual Proceedings, but we feel that advantage should be taken of such reviews as have been made and that the Craft will avail themselves of the fact that these volumes are on fyle with the Grand Secretary in our Library and make a valuable edition to Masonic education. It will broaden the mind considerably and tell all who seek just what is taking place beyond the borders of our own somewhat restricted Jurisdiction.

Although no factual items can be enumerated in this report beyond the small item spoken of—we feel that a larger Committee should be named for such work and should contain one member having the time and capability of tabulating those items of special significance and educational value to us that could be added to our Proceedings for the edification of our members to whom the Library is not readily available.



REPORTS Of District Deputy Grand Masters
