Saint John, N. B., August 26th, 1948.

HE EIGHTY-FIRST ANNUAL COMMUNICAtion of "The Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick" was held at the Masonic Temple, Germain Street, in the City of Saint John, on Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of August, A.D. 1948, A.L. 5948.

Most Worshipful Donald Campbell Malcolm assumed the Throne and Grand Lodge was opened in Ample Form at 10.00 o'clock a.m., followed by solemn prayer by the V:W: Grand Chaplain, Rev. J. A. Berridge.

The Proclamation calling the Eighty-first Annual Communication of Grand Lodge was read by the V:W: Grand Secretary.

We fully realize that you have made sacrifices and put yourselves out in order to be present with us. We sincerely appreciate the efforts you have made to attend upon our Eighty-first Annual Communication. Your aid and presence will greatly add to our assembly.

I would ask each of you to convey to the good ladies of your party, our heartiest greetings. You may rest assured that we trust they will enjoy, and be amply repaid by, their visit to Saint John.

#### GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

To the M: W: Grand Lodge of F. & A. M. of New Brunswick:

MY BRETHREN:---

Grand Lodge again assembles to review a year of progress with a deep sense of sincere gratitude to Almighty God for a year of peace. We gather to take counsel with one another, to agree upon means best calculated to promote the welfare of Freemasonry and to decide upon such policies as will insure the greatest value to our labours, both within and without the lodge room.

There are those here who never before attended a Communication of Grand Lodge; there are those who have attended when possible; and there are those who have attended on many occasions. We enjoy meeting those who are here for the first time and are delighted to be again with those whom we have grown to love through intimate association.

It is a little disappointing to learn that to system of Masonic Education is not being un with the zeal expected by the subordinate learn this Jurisdiction. I feel that too much a is being paid to making members and not Mathe opportunity of broadening the vision of new members coming to us is not being to advantage of. I trust that the near future all of the Lodges in New Brunswick embrac very worthy effort to enlighten the Craft throadium of this system of Education and the efforts of those who have compiled it.

There has been no case brought before m Board of General Purposes dealing with un conduct and the thought has occurred that there are communities where Masonry as a v receiving criticism over the fact that some Masons guilty of offences are left undisciplined and kept in good standing. Wrongful actions of a Mason that are ignored by the Lodge may bring the whole Fraternity into disrepute. It has come to my attention that at times in some of our Lodges when there is much work in hand that the lectures have been dispensed with and I have reason to believe that they are not given at a future meeting. The ritual of our Grand Lodge must be strictly adhered to and all portions completed on each candidate.

There may be Masons who have the idea that their Lodge is self-sufficient and can be independent of the Grand Lodge and its laws. I would like to remind such men, if any there be, that their Lodge, self-sufficient though it may seem to be, has its existence only by virtue of a charter from this Grand Lodge; that the members of their Lodge are accepted as regular only because their Lodge is working under the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge; that this Grand Lodge can grant privileges to or impose burdens upon their Lodge and them. For these reasons, if for no others, this communication and the participation of every member of the Grand Lodge who is present should be taken full advantage of. If it seems to you that the meeting is "cut and dried," it will be only because you are willing to have it so. All of us should ever remember that the strength of Masonry comes, not from a few or many Lodges with a large membership and ample finances, but rather from the unity of the whole.

The Masonic Fraternity is a society composed of free men, free in thought and action, who are bound together by a belief in Deity, by a tie of obligations taken freely and solemnly and by a belief in the dignity and brotherhood of man.

The purpose of the Fraternity is to build me good morals, men of strong character, men of g will, who are seekers after truth and who are erous in the relief of those in distress. "To set Craft to work" means, therefore, to work on built character, and the instructions given are the te ings contained in the Ritual and in the Practice Freemasonry. The unique method of symbolism ployed by the Fraternity allows each member to in pret these teachings according to his capacity understand and to apply the knowledge obtain according to his needs.

There are other features of the Fraternity are of much importance to Craft life. Fellowship one. This is the natural result of an intimate as iation enjoyed by Masons during the hours of la and while at refreshment. Out of this may came t friendships which as you have probably discover are as precious as they are rare. Another feat is Masonic relief, lest in our concern for self-impro ment we become self-centered and forget our less : tunate brother or others in distress. Masonic re may find its way through various channels: Ass ance may be given to a distressed worthy brother, widow or orphans; members of the Fraternity n make a voluntary contribution to the support schools for orphans, hospitals for crippled childr homes for the aged Mason, or a collection may taken for the relief of the victims of some gr calamity.

There are two projects which have a deep inter in my mind. One—The New Brunswick Protests Orphanage. Every member of the Fraternity should all he can to further the great work of this institution. They need a lot of help financially. I do a know if it would be wise to ask Grand Lodge for

### AUDITORS' REPORT

August 6th, 1948.

To the Board of Directors, Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation:

We, your committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the V:W: Grand Secretary and V:W: Grand Treasurer report as follows:—

Our examination consisted of checking the cash book and ledger of the Grand Secretary, which were found to be clearly kept and in good order. From Sussex No. 4, Dorchester, have come additional valuable notes dealing with the life of that Lodge up to 1935. I have personally written accounts of the dedication of the hall in Sackville and the new building in Havelock. Also the Moncton Masonic Library; the Church Service sponsored by Districts Nos. 2 and 7; the Eastern Conferences and the All-Canada Get-Together.

The cost of publishing eight thousand copies, I the cost of mailing to Lodge Secretaries for distri tion, is approximately \$75, or a little less than cent per copy. The annual outlay is about \$300. T modest expense is made possible by the Secretar of the Lodges who are requested to enclose a co of the "Masonic Digest" with the notice of Loc meeting. We are indebted to them for this serv and the committee deeply appreciates their co-op ation.

It is impossible at this time to report on the si cess of the "Masonic Digest." It would seem to serving a useful purpose and be worth the small  $\epsilon$ penditure required.

### REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

Saint John, N. B., July 14th, 1948.

The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, F. & A. M .-

The Jurisprudence Committee having received from your Grand Secretary a letter in reference to the title of Past Grand Chaplains, beg to report as follows:—

It is the opinion of the Jurisprurence Committee that a brother who has served as Grand Chaplain, although not a Worshipful Master or Past Master, is not entitled to past rank unless such rank has been conferred by a vote of Grand Lodge under Section 12 of the Constitutions dealing with Officers and members.

On page 23 of the Constitutions under the heading "How Constituted" it clearly states that no brother shall rank as a Past Grand Officer unless he qualifies as a Master or Past Master of some Lodge.

If Grand Lodge wants to confer the title of Very Worshipful on a brother who has served as Grand Chaplain it can easily do so by vote under Section 12, or if it wants to make it a regular practice it can change the Constitution to so provide. This not having been done it is the opinion of the Jurisprudence Committee that no past rank goes to anyone who is not qualified as a Master or Past Master.

We are enclosing a cheque to the amount of \$92.50, which is balance purported to be owing the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick as our assessment for the year 1947.

This additional amount represents the difference between the 75 cents per capita, and the amount of \$1.00 per capita, which it is alleged that is due. It is the studied opinion of the members of Grand Lodge who belong to Carleton Union Lodge, that the increase in the per capita assessment is not constitutional, and this Lodge takes this opportunity of registering a strong protest to the increase.

We would also request that this matter appear on the agenda during the Grand Lodge convention next held, so that the dissatisfaction that now exists in our own and other nearby Lodges may be dispelled, and peace and harmony be restored among us.
