The Grand Master's Convention

OF

DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS, MASTERS,
WARDENS AND OTHER OFFICERS AND
MEMBERS OF SUBORDINATE LODGES

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 25th, 1948

The meeting was called to order at 2.30 p.m. by the M:W: the Grand Master who called upon V:W: Rev. N. Franchetti, P. G. Chaplain, to offer prayer, after which M:W: D. C. Malcolm greeted the brethren.

The Grand Master announced that an Emergent Communication of The Union Lodge of Portland No. 10, F. & A. The Grand Master thanked Worshipful Brother Sheppard for the education afforded the brethren and visitors on the conferring of this degree and commended them for the excellence of their performance.

The Most Worshipful the Grand Master then called upon R:W: Brother Frank L. Smith, Jr., the Executive Secretary of the Masonic Relief Association of the United States and Canada, to speak to the brethren present on the work of this Association. W: Brother Smith gave a very excellent and interesting talk on the various phases of his work.

Most Worshipful D. G. Percy Sanderson, P.G.M. Quebec, addressed the brethren and brought greetings from the Province of Quebec.

M:W: M. R. Chappell, P.G.M. of Nova Scotia, addressed the brethren and extended his thanks for the invitation to be present and the enjoyment derived in his attendance at this Convocation.

A recess was taken until 8.30 p.m., when a play M:W: Carl H. Claudy, Executive Secretary of the Masonic Service Association of the United States,

entitled "He That Believeth," was presented by a company of players from the Moncton district under the direction of Brother Everett A. Ryder.

This performance was received with great acclaim by the brethren.

The Most Worshipful the Grand Master then called upon M:W: David A. O'Neill, Grand Master of Nova Scotia, who expressed his appreciation for the invitation extended him and brought greetings from the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.

M:W: R. V. Harris, P.G.M., Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, addressed the brethren and recounted in his inimitable manner anecdotes pertaining to Masonry, which were of an edifying and instructive character.

R:W: Harold F. Sipprell, P.D.G.M. of Nova Scotia and Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick near the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, extended his sincere best wishes to the Grand Master and complimented the Moncton players on their effort of the evening.

THE EIGHTY-FIRST ANNUAL COMMUNICATION of "The Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick" was held at the Masonic Temple, Germain Street, in the City of Saint John, on Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of August, A.D. 1948, A.L. 5948.

Most Worshipful Donald Campbell Malcolm assumed the Throne and Grand Lodge was opened in Ample Form at 10.00 o'clock a.m., followed by solemn prayer by the V:W: Grand Chaplain, Rev. J. A. Berridge.

The Proclamation calling the Eighty-first Annual Communication of Grand Lodge was read by the V:W: Grand Secretary.

The Most Worshipful Grand Master welcomed the brethren to Grand Lodge as follows:—

It is a very pleasant duty to welcome the members of Grand Lodge and our Distinguished Guests both as your Representative Head, and personally.

This is your Assembly, and I trust that you will not only learn what has transpired during the past

year, but may also carry away from our considerations, thoughts that you may turn into actions—for the benefit of your Lodge or Lodges, which in turn may rebound to the credit and greater honour of our Beloved Order.

To our Distinguished Visitors, the same welcome applies—we welcome you in every sense that our great Fraternity stands for. We hope that you may leave with us something for the good of the Craft—also that you may receive some inspiration, whilst sojourning in our midst. We fully realize that you have made sacrifices and put yourselves out in order to be present with us. We sincerely appreciate the efforts you have made to attend upon our Eighty-first Annual Communication. Your aid and presence will greatly add to our assembly.

I would ask each of you to convey to the good ladies of your party, our heartiest greetings. You may rest assured that we trust they will enjoy, and be amply repaid by, their visit to Saint John.

All present are conversant with history now in the making—and probably realize how close disaster may be upon our civilization.

One can perhaps understand the thoughts, or rather the ignorance of certain peoples towards our standard of liberty, but to me it is incomprehensible how persons living in our free countries—enjoying all the blessings of freedom—can even think of, let alone work for the destruction of our way of living and would wish to plunge us into chaos, such as appears to be enjoyed, or rather endured in the before-mentioned countries.

It is the personal duty of every Mason to ferret out and expose all such people in our country, so that our land may be cleansed of such pestilential

beings. "Fifth Columns" they have recently been known as—Traitors, their proper name.

What better subjects for teaching, than the several picked from our Ritual and Lectures?

Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence, Justice.

Faith, Hope, Charity.

Brotherly Love, Relief, Truth.

Silence and Circumspection.

These and many more afford subjects for solemn and serious reflection.

Our Order can only flourish in a peaceful atmosphere—although it has withstood the ravages of time and warfare. Let us seek Peace, but not at the loss of Honour.

It is my personal belief that until such time as the Grace of God shall have entered into, and dwelt in, the heart of every man—then and then only shall we have real peace—a peace that shall pass all understanding.

With a heart for every fate,
Still achieving, still pursuing,
Learn to labour and to wait."*

If this welcome is too much like a sermon, I still give it to you as it is. And repeat, I welcome all of you, and thank you for your attendance.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

To the M: W: Grand Lodge of
 F. & A. M. of New Brunswick:

MY BRETHREN:—

Grand Lodge again assembles to review a year of progress with a deep sense of sincere gratitude to Almighty God for a year of peace. We gather to take counsel with one another, to agree upon means best calculated to promote the welfare of Freemasonry and to decide upon such policies as will insure the greatest value to our labours, both within and without the lodge room.

There are those here who never before attended a Communication of Grand Lodge; there are those who have attended when possible; and there are those who have attended on many occasions. We enjoy meeting those who are here for the first time and are delighted to be again with those whom we have grown to love through intimate association.

I extend to you fraternal greetings and bid you welcome to the Eighty-first Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge and would have you remember that this is your Grand Lodge Communication, not mine. The Grand Lodge Officers are here today only to report to you on their activities for the past year, and to provide for the orderly and efficient conduct of your business here. The meeting is yours, not theirs.

On April 29th in company with a goodly number of Grand Lodge Officers and members of the Craft of this Jurisdiction, we attended the dual installation ceremonies of Acacia Lodge No. 8 and Alexandra Lodge No. 87 at Amherst, by the Grand Lodge Officers of Nova Scotia. The Most Worshipful Grand Master, A. Herman McMillan, was present and addressed the combined Lodges.

On April 30th our party attended the Second Regional Conference of the Eastern Provinces, held in Amherst, N. S. The following program was carried out after the Chairman of the Conference, R:W: Bro. Arthur S. Robinson, P.G.M., had greeted the assembly:—

At the luncheon hour Bro. Frank S. Land, of Kansas City, Mo., addressed the assembly on the subject, "Does the Craft Owe a Duty To the Youth of Today?" which was highly instructive and enlightening.

This Grand Lodge being a member of the Masters' Association of North America, it has the privilege to attend the sessions of this body on the 24th and 25th in Washington, D. C., the subjects discussed at this meeting included:—History of the Conference of Grand Masters; Freemasonry in America; Freemasonry in Italy; The Adaptation of Ancient Craft Masonry to Modern Requirements; The Obligation of Freemasonry to Our Youth; and the Value of Masonic Publications. These subjects were highly interesting and well handled by the speakers and were of great value. I feel that the benefits of these conferences will reflect in the administration of the affairs of this Grand Lodge from time to time and the opportunity of associating with the Grand Masters and other Officers of the Grand Lodges attending will undoubtedly broaden the scope of our fraternal relations to our benefit.

It is a little disappointing to learn that the present system of Masonic Education is not being undertaken with the zeal expected by the subordinate bodies of this Jurisdiction. I feel that too much emphasis is being paid to making members and not making the opportunity of broadening the vision of new members coming to us is not being taken to our advantage of. I trust that the near future will see all of the Lodges in New Brunswick embracing a very worthy effort to enlighten the Craft through the medium of this system of Education and through the efforts of those who have compiled it.

There has been no case brought before the Board of General Purposes dealing with unethical conduct and the thought has occurred that there are communities where Masonry as a

receiving criticism over the fact that some Masons guilty of offences are left undisciplined and kept in good standing. Wrongful actions of a Mason that are ignored by the Lodge may bring the whole Fraternity into disrepute. It has come to my attention that at times in some of our Lodges when there is much work in hand that the lectures have been dispensed with and I have reason to believe that they are not given at a future meeting. The ritual of our Grand Lodge must be strictly adhered to and all portions completed on each candidate.

There may be Masons who have the idea that their Lodge is self-sufficient and can be independent of the Grand Lodge and its laws. I would like to remind such men, if any there be, that their Lodge, self-sufficient though it may seem to be, has its existence only by virtue of a charter from this Grand Lodge; that the members of their Lodge are accepted as regular only because their Lodge is working under the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge; that this Grand Lodge can grant privileges to or impose burdens upon their Lodge and them. For these reasons, if for no others, this communication and the participation of every member of the Grand Lodge who is present should be taken full advantage of. If it seems to you that the meeting is "cut and dried," it will be only because you are willing to have it so. All of us should ever remember that the strength of Masonry comes, not from a few or many Lodges with a large membership and ample finances, but rather from the unity of the whole.

The Masonic Fraternity is a society composed of free men, free in thought and action, who are bound together by a belief in Deity, by a tie of obligations taken freely and solemnly and by a belief in the dignity and brotherhood of man.

The purpose of the Fraternity is to build men of good morals, men of strong character, men of good will, who are seekers after truth and who are generous in the relief of those in distress. "To set Craft to work" means, therefore, to work on built character, and the instructions given are the teachings contained in the Ritual and in the Practice of Freemasonry. The unique method of symbolism employed by the Fraternity allows each member to interpret these teachings according to his capacity to understand and to apply the knowledge obtained according to his needs.

There are other features of the Fraternity that are of much importance to Craft life. Fellowship is one. This is the natural result of an intimate association enjoyed by Masons during the hours of labor and while at refreshment. Out of this may come true friendships which as you have probably discovered are as precious as they are rare. Another feature is Masonic relief, lest in our concern for self-improvement we become self-centered and forget our less fortunate brother or others in distress. Masonic relief may find its way through various channels: Assistance may be given to a distressed worthy brother, widow or orphans; members of the Fraternity may make a voluntary contribution to the support of schools for orphans, hospitals for crippled children, homes for the aged Mason, or a collection may be taken for the relief of the victims of some great calamity.

There are two projects which have a deep interest in my mind. One—The New Brunswick Protestant Orphanage. Every member of the Fraternity should do all he can to further the great work of this institution. They need a lot of help financially. I do not know if it would be wise to ask Grand Lodge for

donation for this most worthy association but would like the committee on the Grand Master's Address to consider it and so report. The other project is Masonic Bursaries or assistance to Masons' sons. From time to time inquiries are made concerning the rendering of some assistance to boys of Masonic families, deserving sons who might receive some assistance at college. Our benevolent fund is piling up bonds and not one-half of the interest is being used for its present purposes. I would like this considered with a view to something being worked out in respect to this project within the next few years.

One could not close this message without publicly acknowledging my deep sense of gratitude to those Past Grand Masters and Grand Lodge Officers who have so ably supported my official visits. It is indeed heartening to have so many attend these communications, and I am sure the Lodges we have attended feel as I do. To the District Deputy Grand Masters for their great help to this Grand Lodge and to the Lodges of their Districts. To the Grand Secretary goes my warmest thanks for loyalty and devotion to duty. To the whole Fraternity my thanks and to assure you of my loyalty to all the brethren in the jurisdiction.

Finally, let me remind you that the world is in need of Master Masons; men who know the meaning of Apprenticeship; men who possess the skill, moral courage and stamina of the Fellowcraft; men who have acquired the knowledge, wisdom and the power of self-control of the Master Mason. Yes, the world needs us as Master Masons; we need Freemasonry; and the Fraternity to which we belong needs our unqualified support in its great work.

Three Lodges have failed to make their payments to Grand Lodge and three have made underpayment of their amounts due. These three:—Carleton Union, The Corinthian and The New Brunswick Lodges—claim that Grand Lodge had no authority to make the change of per capita as was passed by Grand Lodge last year on the recommendation of the Board of General Purposes and have refused to pay on the basis of \$1.00 and have made their return on the old basis of 75 cents. I would like to have direction from Grand Lodge how you would have me act in this respect. All the other Lodges accepted the change adopted by Grand Lodge and have paid in full on the one dollar basis without argument.

We have added to the family of Grand Lodges this past year in that the M:W: The Grand Master was pleased to direct that a Dispensation be issued to a number of Brethren residing at or near Harbourside Station, N. B., and known as Cherry Mountain Lodge, U. D. This Lodge was set to work May 13th, 1948, by V:W: John T. Bottomley in whose District this Lodge has its being. The first Master of this new Lodge is Wor: Bro: James A. Murray. The recommendation for this new Lodge was forwarded by Ashlar Lodge No. 36, of McAdam, N. B. We now have 46 active Lodges in the jurisdiction.

In company with the Grand Master I once again had the pleasure of being present at the Annual Convention of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries of the Grand Lodges of British North America at Washington, D. C., in February last. The Grand Master has given you an account of this visit and it is not necessary for me to amplify it in any manner. Subjects discussed were vital to Freemasonry and will produce much of benefit to the Craft at large. With the Grand Master I also attended the second Regional Conference of Eastern Grand Lodges of British North America held this year in Amherst, N. S. Papers were presented at this meeting by several from this Grand Jurisdiction and were of special interest and value. The Minutes of neither of the two conferences held have, as yet, come to hand but I am to believe that they will be mailed to the Grand Lodges interested before too long an elapse of time.

We, your committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the V:W: Grand Secretary and V:W: Grand Treasurer report as follows:—

Our examination consisted of checking the cash book and ledger of the Grand Secretary, which were found to be clearly kept and in good order. REPORT OF GRAND HISTORIAN

*To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers
and Members of the Grand Lodge of Free and
Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:*

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren:

I beg to submit a report of my year as Grand Historian.

First, I wish to thank you, Most Worshipful Sir, for the appointment to this office in succession to so able and distinguished an officer as V:W: Herbert I. Knowles. I consider your favor both an honor and a privilege.

After I had had an opportunity to study the work already accomplished by my predecessors, I sent to the Secretary of each Lodge in the jurisdiction a copy of the following letter:—

December 10, 1947.

MY DEAR BROTHER SECRETARY:

At our Grand Lodge installation ceremony, August 28th, our Grand Master, M:W: Brother Dr. Donald C. Malcolm did me the great honor of appointing me Grand Historian to succeed V:W: Herbert I. Knowles, Chairman of the Educational Committee, who wished to be relieved of other duties that he might devote himself more fully to the very important task of developing our Educational Programme—a task for which he is eminently fitted.

I am anxious to carry on as well as I can the work he has been doing so efficiently. I would beg of you, therefore, to send me at least a sketch of your Lodge's history if such has not already been submitted to V:W: Brother Knowles and also, while I am in office,

notes of important happenings in your Lodge as occur. Current events are history in the main. Please drop me a line when an anniversary is observed, or a brother honored, or a faithful one to rest,—any of those things that affect the life of your Lodge or Masonic community.

I realize keenly that you, dear brother Secretary, are a busy man, but, in the future, such things as I have mentioned increase in value as time passes and in helping to preserve them you will render an invaluable service to your Lodge and to the Grand Lodge.

Our Lodges have sustained great losses of valuable material through fires, but even more through indifference and a lack of understanding the value of the preservation of historical data. Character sketches of those who have rendered outstanding service will be greatly appreciated; newsclippings, pictures, or anything you deem of value are not to be neglected. Your Master could appoint a committee to assist.

In response to this appeal, the following Lodges have furnished material to bring up to date their individual histories already begun by my predecessors in office:—The Corinthian No. 13, Hampton; Leinster No. 28, Sackville; Bethel No. 40, Edmundston; Tweedie No. 41, Moncton; Fownes No. 45, Havelock.

In addition to these the Officers of Acacia No. 1, Moncton, have supplied interesting data having to do with the origin, dedication, and brief history of 1

Lodge. From Sussex No. 4, Dorchester, have come additional valuable notes dealing with the life of that Lodge up to 1935. I have personally written accounts of the dedication of the hall in Sackville and the new building in Havelock. Also the Moncton Masonic Library; the Church Service sponsored by Districts Nos. 2 and 7; the Eastern Conferences and the All-Canada Get-Together.

Notes on current events have been sent in by Alley No. 14, Upper Mills; Zion No. 21, Sussex; and Colebrooke No. 39, Grand Falls. I have had a reply from Zetland No. 24, Shediac, material re the defunct Lodge at Blackville, and valuable items and literature from M:W: Bro. R. V. Harris, Grand Secretary of Nova Scotia; R:W: Bro. E. G. Dixon, Grand Secretary of Canada in Ontario, and from P. G. M. Frank Brown of Florida.

These documents I have arranged in a series of note-books from which I purpose to write continuations of the histories in proper form.

I also hope to continue the history of our Grand Lodge begun by Very Worshipful Brother Knowles.

All the books and documents belonging to this department, except the note-books written by myself, are at present in safe keeping with the Moncton branch of the Bank of Montreal.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MASONIC EDUCATION

To the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

During the past year the Committee on Masonic Education have been engaged in publishing the "Masonic Digest." This has been issued quarterly beginning with the November, 1947, issue.

The cost of publishing eight thousand copies, plus the cost of mailing to Lodge Secretaries for distribution, is approximately \$75, or a little less than one cent per copy. The annual outlay is about \$300. This modest expense is made possible by the Secretary of the Lodges who are requested to enclose a copy of the "Masonic Digest" with the notice of Local meeting. We are indebted to them for this service and the committee deeply appreciates their co-operation.

It is impossible at this time to report on the success of the "Masonic Digest." It would seem to be serving a useful purpose and be worth the small expenditure required.

Interest in the production of Masonic plays has increased owing to the encouragement given by R:V: Brother Lemmon. The capable performance of the Moncton brethren last night is an example of what is being accomplished.

It is recommended that the sum of \$500 be made available for the work of the Committee for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

Saint John, N. B.,
July 14th, 1948.

The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, F. & A. M.—

The Jurisprudence Committee having received from your Grand Secretary a letter in reference to the title of Past Grand Chaplains, beg to report as follows:—

It is the opinion of the Jurisprudence Committee that a brother who has served as Grand Chaplain, although not a Worshipful Master or Past Master, is not entitled to past rank unless such rank has been conferred by a vote of Grand Lodge under Section 12 of the Constitutions dealing with Officers and members.

On page 23 of the Constitutions under the heading "How Constituted" it clearly states that no brother shall rank as a Past Grand Officer unless he qualifies as a Master or Past Master of some Lodge.

If Grand Lodge wants to confer the title of Very Worshipful on a brother who has served as Grand Chaplain it can easily do so by vote under Section 12, or if it wants to make it a regular practice it can change the Constitution to so provide. This not having been done it is the opinion of the Jurisprudence Committee that no past rank goes to anyone who is not qualified as a Master or Past Master.

Sanford, seconded by the V:W: Grand Secretary, that the rank of "Very Worshipful" be conferred upon the present Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain and on all other Past Grand Chaplains not previously confirmed in this rank. Carried.

It was moved by the Grand Secretary and seconded by the Grand Treasurer and carried:

"That an appropriation of five hundred (\$500.00) be made to the Grand Master to pay the expenses of visiting and instruction the year."

"That a sum not to exceed twenty-five (\$25.00) be allowed the District Deputy Grand Masters to defray travelling expenses on their visits, if they find it necessary and that reports be submitted to the office of the Grand Secretary with their annual reports to the Grand Master."

"That the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) be set aside for use by the Grand Historian."

"That an appropriation of five hundred (\$500.00) be made to the Committee on Moral and Religious Education."

The V:W: Grand Secretary read the following letter from Carleton Union Lodge No. 8:—

Dear Sir and Very Worshipful Brother:

We are enclosing a cheque to the amount of \$92.50, which is balance purported to be owing the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick as our assessment for the year 1947.

This additional amount represents the difference between the 75 cents per capita, and the amount of \$1.00 per capita, which it is alleged that is due. It is the studied opinion of the members of Grand Lodge who belong to Carleton Union Lodge, that the increase in the per capita assessment is not constitutional, and this Lodge takes this opportunity of registering a strong protest to the increase.

We would also request that this matter appear on the agenda during the Grand Lodge convention next held, so that the dissatisfaction that now exists in our own and other nearby Lodges may be dispelled, and peace and harmony be restored among us.

The Grand Secretary read a Memorial from Secretary Treasurer of the Service Association Saint John Masonic Bodies, regarding the setting of scholarships within the jurisdiction by Lodge.

In view of the fact that the Grand Master, address to Grand Lodge, had recommendations in the same vein it was moved and seconded that the memorial be received and referred to a special committee to be appointed to consider this subject. Carried.

The Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address made report as follows:—

The Special Committee to whom was referred the Most Worshipful Grand Master's Address, submit their report as follows:—

Your Committee congratulates the Most Worshipful Grand Master on the completion of another successful year of this Grand Lodge, under his able and energetic guidance, and the appreciation and thanks of Grand Lodge are due him for his conscientious leadership and devotion to the interests of our Fraternity.

We join with the Grand Master in his warm welcome to our Distinguished Visitors, and express with pleasure in the profitable exchange of Fraternal Visits and Greetings with other Grand Bodies.

We concur with the thoughts of our Grand Master and his feelings on the troublesome periods that the world as a whole is going through at the present time, and his judgment of the true answer being found

We congratulate our Most Worshipful Grand Master that he has been able to visit and attend meetings outside of our jurisdiction, particularly the meetings of the Regional Conference of Grand Masters of the Eastern Provinces, and also his attendance at the Grand Masters' Association of North America, and we trust that the men occupying the office of Grand Master in future, will realize the importance and good that can mature from visits of this nature.

We are glad to note that the Grand Master refers in his Address to the System of Masonic Education, and also to the Constitution of the Grand Lodge, besides calling attention to Lectures and Work within the Lodge. These are vital points and must be followed by the Craft in their entirety, otherwise, certain of the beauties of Masonry will not be altogether revealed.

We are glad to note the interest of our Master with regard to the New Brunswick Protestant Orphanage and Masonic Bursaries, and recommend that a committee be appointed to thoroughly consider these important matters and report to this Grand Lodge their findings and recommendations.

We are all conscious of the untiring effort of our Grand Master since he has accepted this position and congratulate him on the good that he has accomplished, as we are well aware of the tireless energy that he gives to this work, sacrificing, we know, considerable time which he should be spending in his medical profession and in his family life. It was moved by R:W: C. F. Sanford, seconded by R:W: James S. Hoyt, that the committee app

to report on that part of the Grand Master's Address regarding the New Brunswick Protestant Orphanage and bursaries be authorized to communicate with the various Lodges in this jurisdiction asking them to allow the twenty-five cents per capita overpayment for 1947 to become the property of Grand Lodge. Carried.

The Grand Secretary read a letter from R:W: Charles E. Cooke, Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick near the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, expressing his regret at his inability to be present owing to a severe illness and thanking the Grand Lodge for the interest taken during his illness.

Also read letters from R:W: J. A. V. Preston, Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick near the Grand Lodge of Ontario, and R:W: Albert Elmgreen, Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick near the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin, extending fraternal greetings from their respective Grand Lodges and giving a short resumé of the proceedings of their Grand Lodges.

It was moved by V:W: R. L. Algie, seconded by R:W: R. D. Baird, that the salary of the Grand Secretary be increased by the amount of three hundred dollars (\$300.00). Carried.

Grand Lodge then took recess until 8.00 p.m.

During the recess period the delegates and visitors were entertained at dinner by the Masters, Wardens and Past Masters of the six Saint John Lodges, in the Masonic Temple, at which time M:W: Bro. Granville C. Gray, Grand Master of the State of Maine, delivered an inspiring address.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at 8.00 p.m. and the

first order of business was the election of Office

The M:W: Grand Master directed the Grand Secretary to read that portion of the Constitution relating with the "Election of Grand Lodge Officers" which was accordingly done. The Grand Master then appointed as scrutineers:—V:W: Bros. McGowan, H. A. Nichol, W. C. Maltby, D. A. S. ville, W. E. Thurrott and L. C. Dimock, who pledged and the election proceeded.

On written nomination and ballot cast, M:W: old Campbell Malcolm was re-elected Grand Master and was accordingly so declared amid great applause.

accordingly proclaimed so installed from the South, West and East, and accorded Grand Honours.

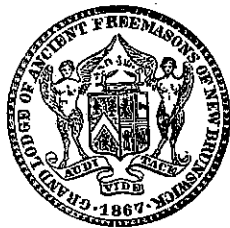
