

## 83rd Annual Communication

OF THE

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Saint John, N. B., August 24th, 1950.

THE EIGHTY-THIRD ANNUAL COMMUNICAtion of "The Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick" was held at the Masonic Temple, Germain Street, in the City of Saint John, on Thursday, the twenty-fourth day of August, A.D. 1950, A.L. 5950.

Most Worshipful Dougald Joseph McMaster McLean assumed the Throne and Grand Lodge was opened in Ample Form at 10.00 o'clock a.m., followed by solemn prayer by the V:W: Past Grand Chaplain, Rev. Harold H. Hoyt, as follows:—

"Most merciful God, Supreme Architect of heaven and earth, unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid, cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration and guidance of Thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love Thee and worthily magnify Thy Holy Name.

"Grant such love and devotion to Thee our Creator, such adherence to the principles of Freemasonry, such unity of mind and high purpose, such harmony and fellowship, such loyalty to duty and noble tenets

of our Order, that all things thought, spoken and done here in this Grand Lodge may be for the advancement of Freemasonry and for the good of all people, and finally for our own salvation in that blessed Kingdom where the righteous shall find rest.

"Hear us, O Merciful God as we sum up all our hopes, our prayers, our thanksgiving and pray as Thy blessed Son has taught us all to say:

"Our Father, Who art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy Name, Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For Thine is the Kingdom and the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

"So mote it be."

The Proclamation calling the Eighty-third Annual Communication of Grand Lodge was read by the V:W: Grand Secretary.

The Most Worshipful Grand Master welcomed the Brethren to Grand Lodge as follows:—

It is a very pleasant duty to again welcome the members of Grand Lodge and our Distinguished Guests both as your Representative Head, and personally.

This is your Assembly, and I trust that you will not only learn what has transpired during the past year, but may also carry away from our considerations, thoughts that you may turn into actions—for the benefit of your Lodge or Lodges, which in turn may rebound to the credit and greater honor of our Beloved Order.

To our Distinguished Visitors, the same welcome

applies—we welcome you in every sense that our great Fraternity stands for. We hope that you may leave with us something for the good of the Craft—also that you may receive some inspiration whilst sojourning in our midst. We fully realize that you have made sacrifices and put yourselves out in order to be present with us. We sincerely appreciate the efforts you have made to attend upon our Eighty-third Annual Communication. Your aid and presence will greatly add to our assembly.

All present are conversant with history now in the making—and probably realize how close disaster may be upon our civilization.

One can, perhaps, understand the thoughts, or rather the ignorance of certain peoples towards our standard of liberty, but to me it is incomprehensible how persons living in our free countries—enjoying all the blessings of freedom—can even think of, let alone work for the destruction of our way of living and would wish to plunge us into chaos, such as appears to be enjoyed, or rather endured, in the beforementioned countries.

It is the personal duty of every Mason to ferret out and expose all such people in our country, so that our land may be cleansed of such pestilential beings.

Our Order can only flourish in a peaceful atmosphere—although it has withstood the ravages of time and warfare. Let us seek Peace, but not at the loss of Honor.

We attended the conference of the Eastern Provinces which was held in the Masonic Temple in the City of Quebec on May 16th and 17th. We were greeted and welcomed by M:W: Bro. Canon Crothers, who was chairman of the conference. The following very instructive papers were presented:—

Masonic Service and Welfare—by Philip C. Mc-Murdie, Director Service Dept., Grand Lodge of Massachusetts.

Masonic Education of District Deputy Grand Masters—Dr. W. J. Dunlop, P.G.M. Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario.

Life Memberships—L. A. McDougall, Grand Secretary, Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island.

Our Relations with other branches of Freemason-ry—Joseph Buckland, Deputy Grand Master, Quebec.

Should Demits be for a fixed period?—R. V. Harris, P.G.M., Grand Secretary, Grand Lodge, Nova Scotia.

Freemasonry and Communism—Canon L. F. Crothers, Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Quebec.

Masonic Secretaries Associations, Bradley A. Mc-Ausland, Grand Lodge of New Hampshire.

Your Grand Master spoke on promotion of Lodge attendance.

The luncheon address on May 16th—"Freemasonry at the Siege of Quebec" was delivered by A. J. B. Melbourne of Montreal, Grand Historian of the Grand Lodge of Quebec, in the suitable surroundings of the banquet hall of the Garrison Club.

At the conclusion of the meetings it was decided to discontinue this conference and devote full attention to the All Canada Conference which also covers the matters attended to by the Eastern Conference.

At this time I wish to quote from one of the foregoing subjects, namely the paper on Masonic service and welfare. "Masonic Service is that individual privilege, as well as Masonic duty, which has always been an important teaching of Freemasonry. It is broadly defined as the result of taking the same interest and exercising the same effort in doing for a brother Mason or his dependents that you would wish to have him do for you or yours should opportunity offer and within the Lodge it is intended to promote the coordination of the Masonic strength, to enlist the largest number of members of that lodge in some phase of Masonic activity, on the theory that the strongest

lodge is that one which has the largest number of participating members".

It will be noted that strength of a Lodge is suggested by the largest number of participating members, and not by the largest membership. This I believe is one way of helping solve a problem that confronts most lodges to-day—attendance. I would recommend it to all lodges.

I recommend that the District Deputy Grand Masters hold annual District meetings. I believe this matter has been suggested before, but as it is only done occasionally, I refer to it again. At these meetings, Secretaries of the lodges of the District could hold a get-to-gether and smooth out any obstacles that deter the conducting, with uniformity, of the business of the lodges. I believe that such District meetings would promote, cultivate and enhance Masonic education as well as bring the brethren of the Districts into closer communion with one another.

#### VISITATIONS TO SISTER GRAND LODGES

I was able to attend the 131st communication of the Grand Lodge of the State of Maine, held in Portland, Maine, on May 2nd to 4th inclusive.

I also attended the 85th communication of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia. At this Communication, I was presented with the Erasmus James Phillip Medallion by Grand Master Thompson. This is the highest honor conferred by this Grand Lodge. I am very proud of this medal and also of the honor conferred. At both of these communications the warm feeling of brotherly love existing between our Grand Lodges was evidenced and we enjoyed very much seeing and meeting with the brethren of these sister Grand Jurisdictions.

On Sept. 11, 1949 we were pleased to have the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite meet in this Jurisdiction. It was my privilege and pleasure to greet and welcome these illustrious brethren on behalf of the Masons of New Brunswick.

#### FUND OF BENEVOLENCE

From the Report submitted by the Committee administering The Fund of Benevolence to the Board of General Purposes it was noted that applications for assistance from this fund were increasing in number and that the income from investments was decreasing. This latter is due to the fact that many of the higher rated bonds held by the Fund have matured and it is now necessary to purchase bonds carrying a much lower rate of interest thus decreasing our income. While we have been able to take care of all worthy applications up to the present it can be readily observed that -as our higher rated bonds continue to mature and our re-investments must be for a lower rated amount we will find it a little more difficult to take care of all applications coming to the Committee unless or until the capital account be largely augmented. It was also noted that many of the lodges making application to the Committee for assistance contributed little or nothing to the assistance of their brother. I feel that it is very important for each lodge to contribute as much as it possibly can for relief before applying to the Fund. Good faith must be shown to our immediate lodge family before applying elsewhere for relief.

#### GENERAL ACCOUNT

In like manner I must draw your attention to the condition of the General Account. Although the statement of the Grand Treasurer shows a surplus as of this date it must be understood that this sum must carry Grand Lodge until January next—when the fees

for next year begin to come in. You all know that the cost of living has increased, very materially, during the past years and is the reason for this advance. This also applies to the operating costs of Grand Lodge. All commodities employed in the operation of this business have increased so much that it becomes harder year by year to make both ends meet without borrowing on the next year's income. This matter will have to be seriously considered very shortly and I would suggest an increase in the per capita tax of fifty cents per member to take care of the increasing costs of operation.

#### HUMAN RIGHTS AND FREEDOM

Before closing I would like to speak for a few moments on Human Rights and Freedoms. The history of the Human Race is one of conflict between and among nations, communities, families and individuals and even after two world wars fought within a quarter of a century, the world stands to-day at the cross-roads and unless men can sit down at a conference table without hatred and suspicion in their hearts, humanity still must look for deliverance by the sword rather than from the sword.

It has been written by an eminent writer "The twentieth century would see the cessation of wars and the end of feuds; that territorial boundaries would be eliminated; that much of the old order would perish and even dogmas would die, but that man would live. To him would be given a greater territory, confined alone, by world limits and a greater hope limited by heaven". Whether the writer was displaying a special prescience or was over-optimistic in his estimate, his shining message nevertheless presents a challenge. Man must live beyond mere man-made boundaries, his mind must broaden until it embraces the whole of

mankind in bonds of understanding and tolerance, then shall be established that Freedom which makes for Brotherhood and the Peace of all men.

He can attain this broadness of mind by the practice of those Masonic, Christian and Democratic principles which teach and recognize the liberty and freedom of all men, the practice of charity, tolerance and a sincere respect for the opinions of others.

In closing I wish once again to express in all sincerity my appreciation of the high honor you have conferred upon me and to thank all the brethren for their assistance and support in making the privilege of serving you such a pleasure.

#### BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES

TO THE GRAND LODGE OF FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

The usual meetings of the Board of General Purposes were held during the year. At the meeting held September 16th, 1949, R:W: Wm. H. McKay was elected Vice-President.

The Grand Master appointed the following committee to administer the Fund of Benevolence:—R:W: Bros. LeBaron Wilson, S. M. Wetmore, J. S. Hoyt, W. P. Barnhill, J. W. Duncan, A. C. Lemmon, H. D. Hopkins, C. F. Sanford and R. F. Wright.

The Committee received and approved several applications and disbursed \$3,200.00. No applications deemed worthy were refused. This Committee must again point out that it is expected that Lodges will contribute to the extent of their ability to distressed brethren before making application to the fund. In a number of instances Lodges that can well afford to contribute to the relief of their distressed Brothers failed to do so and expect the Fund to carry these applicants indefinitely.

It is found that a great many of the Lodges have

not applied to the Grand Secretary for the examination for the M. M. Degree. These have been in his hands for over a year and await distribution.

A Special Committee appointed to review the matter of elected officers made a survey of all Grand Lodges in North America and find that this is the only Jurisdiction not electing their Wardens. Changes in the Constitution to make this possible to Lodges desiring this option are embodied in the Proclamation for this meeting. There is also a change in the method of electing Lodge Treasurers.

The Ritual Committee have had several proposed amendments to the Ritual presented to them. The only change recommended would be in the matter of the moveable and immoveable Jewels. They recommend that these two words in the Ritual be transposed. They further recommend that a further printing of the cypher Ritual be undertaken.

The Committee administering the Fund of Benevolence is revising the applications for the Fund of Benevolence, which will be ready for issue at an early date.

Miss A. J. Wilkes found it necessary to resign her position as Secretary to the Grand Secretary and Mrs. Eleanor S. Henderson has been appointed in her stead.

Permission of the Board has been granted Acacia Lodge No. 49, of Moncton, N. B., to establish a Chapter of DeMolay for boys in that city, the expense to be borne by the Lodge.

The pleasant memory of those who have been called to the Higher Lodge will remain with many of us and their good works will live to stimulate others to greater achievements by emulating their efforts.

Your committee wish to congratulate the M:W: Grand Master on the visitation to subordinate Lodges and his interest in their welfare. His attendance and participation in the Maritime Conference and at the Grand Lodges of Maine and Nova Scotia are proof

of the good results and assistance our Grand Masters and representatives can obtain from this fraternal communion and exchange of information.

The following Notices of Motion having been duly given in the Proclamation calling Grand Lodge were adopted.

The Board of General Purpose have accepted the report of the Special Committee appointed to review amendments to the Constitution in respect to Election of Officers by Subordinate Lodges and recommend the following changes in Sections 1 and 4, page 49 "Of Private Lodges"

1A Only Wardens, Past Wardens, Masters and Past Masters in good standing in their Lodge are eligible for election to the office of Worshipful Master.

1B A Lodge, by its By-Laws, may elect its Wardens by written ballot but without nomination. A Lodge so disposed shall amend its By-Laws accordingly and shall abide thereby. If this option be not adopted by any Lodge the Wardens shall be appointed by the Master as in Section 2.

Section 4-Insert after "without nomination" and add "except the Treasurer who shall be nominated."

The Notices re Bursaries and Grant to the Protestant Orphans' Home were defeated.

R:W: A. S. Robinson presented the report of the Grand Historian:-

Owing to my severe and protracted illness during the months of winter and spring, I was not able to send out my customary letters on behalf of our Department of History to the Secretaries of the various Lodges. However, I am happy to be able to report considerable progress, thanks to certain interested and helpful Brethren.

R:W: Bro. A. C. Lemmon was added by the Most Worshipful the Grand Master to the committee whose interest it is to prevent the loss of Masonic relics in the Jurisdiction of New Brunswick.

Your committee are indebted to the Officers and members of The Corinthian Lodge, of Hampton, for preserving considerable material of this kind from Midian Lodge which, in an earlier day, flourished in the village of Kingston.

Worshipful Brother A. Williamson has added to our files an excellent history of that Lodge which he obtained from a Mr. Wetmore, of Clifton. Our thanks are due this gentleman also.

A biography of B. Lester Peters, our first Grand Master, has been added to the files now kept by the Grand Historian. In addition, most interesting data on the life of Judge William Wedderburn, who succeeded Brother Peters, was kindly sent me by the Judge's daughter, who is the wife of the Rev. Irving Lynds, of Lockport, New York. These notes too are in their proper file.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

A wall-piece of the Past Masters of Westmorland Lodge No. 44, and suitable for framing was lettered by your Grand Historian and presented to the Lodge.

Also this year two notable and very praiseworthy works in this Department have been accomplished. Worshipful Brother Austen, of Lodge Saint John, Bathurst, completed the history of his Lodge which he has been sending me in instalments. This entailed the reading of the Minutes of every meeting of Lodge Saint John since its inception.

Rt. Wor. Bro. Byron Duffy has also performed a similar task for Sussex Lodge No. 4, of Dorchester. He made three copies of this writing; one he presented to his Lodge; one he retained for himself, and a third, beautifully bound in blue leather, he presented to Grand Lodge and is now among the library books in this building.

The Officers of Zetland Lodge, Shediac, have loaned your Grand Historian the first Minute book of that body containing the records of every meeting from the first, dated January 29th, 1861, to September 11th, 1907. And very interesting reading it provides to any Mason familiar with the activities in that area. With this book came a small trunk filled with old letters and papers of a most interesting character.

I am grateful to our Grand Master for urging upon the Secretaries to forward to the Grand Historian all Lodge Notices containing items of interest or worthy of inclusion among the notes of the particular Lodge to which they refer. All such received have been placed in the files and may be used in later writings as our work progresses.

## REPORTS Of District Deputy Grand Masters

#### DISTRICT No. 1

Sussex, N. B. August 22, 1950.

To The Most Worshipful the Grand Master Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first report as District Deputy Grand Master of District No. 1 for year 1949-1950.

I regret very much that I cannot report a visitation to all Lodges in my district owing to time at my disposal was taken up with other business.

Made my first official visit to Hibernia No. 3 at their regular convocation Nov. 8th, 1949. The Master Mason degree was exemplified on three candidates by Wor. Bro. Bradley in a very efficient manner and I am sure the candidates received a very full and satisfactory Master Mason degree. The Officers had the work very well prepared and the lodge seems to be progressing very well. Minutes and books of the lodge were well kept and business conducted efficiently.

I visited New Brunswick Lodge No. 22 on their regular convocation April 13th. Fellow Craft was exemplified on four candidates and the work was found to be in good order. Wor. Bro. Dalton and the Officers seemed to have had a good deal of preparation and it reflected favorably in the degree work.

Made my official visit to Zion Lodge No. 21, my

home lodge, on May 1st. Wor. Bro. Langell conferred the Master Mason degree on one candidate. Work was done in the usual efficient manner and I believe Zion Lodge and its officers show the benefits of frequent and well attended rehearsals. The Lodge room has been completely redecorated, a new ceiling with recessed lighting, newly panelled walls and new carpet with Theatre seats installed gives the Lodge room a very pleasing and creditable appearance. While this work has cost the Lodge considerable money it has been completely financed within the Lodge. This Lodge has not been as busy this year as formerly, but the attendance is good and a very lively interest prevails.

It was my privilege and a pleasure to accompany the M:W: The Grand Master and Members of Grand Lodge on their visit to St. Martins Lodge No. 30 on June 12th. Wor. Bro. Black and his officers exemplified the Fellow Craft degree on three candidates in a very creditable manner.

On July 10th I made my official visit to St. Martins Lodge No. 30. Owing to the absence of Wor. Bro. Black, Wor. Bro. Thurston filled the duties of Wor. Master assisted by a number of P.M. of St. Martins Lodge and exemplified the 3rd degree on three candidates. With the membership scattered over a wide area this lodge has difficulty in getting the Officers together for rehearsals, in my remarks I tried to stress the importance of this phase of the work, however, the Wor. Master seems to be doing a good job and is having a busy year. When the application has been properly signed by all of the committee, may it be returned to the Secretary promptly as possible please.

I would like to see the examination of the candidates on the work in the Master Mason Degree adopted in the various Lodges as I think it would be beneficial not only to the candidates but also to those who have not had the opportunity of taking it.

In closing, I would like to express my appreciation of the courtesies extended to me by the various Lodges which I visited and my cordial reception. I found the work of the different Lodges to be of good order.

It has been a pleasure to act as your D.D.G.M. and I wish to thank you for your confidence in appointing me to this office.
