PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

86th Annual Communication

OF THE

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Saint John, N. B., August 27th, 1953.

THE EIGHTY-SIXTH ANNUAL COMMUNICATION of "The Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick" was held at the Masonic Temple, Germain Street, in the City of Saint John, on Thursday, the twenty-seventh day of August, A.D. 1953, A.L. 5953.

Most Worshipful James William Duncan assumed the Throne and Grand Lodge was opened in Ample Form at 10.00 o'clock a.m., followed by solemn prayer by the V:W: Grand Chaplain, Rev. Canon W. P. Haigh, as follows:—

"Most merciful God, supreme Architect of heaven and earth, unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid, cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration and guidance of Thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love Thee and worthily magnify Thy Holy Name.

"Grant such love and devotion to Thee our Creator, such adherence to the principles of Freemasonry, such unity of mind and high purpose, such harmony and fellowship, such loyalty to duty and noble tenets of our Order, that all things thought, spoken and

done here in this Grand Lodge may be for the advancement of Freemasonry and for the good of all people, and finally for our own salvation in that blessed Kingdom where the righteous shall find rest.

"Hear us, O Merciful God, as we sum up all our hopes, our prayers, our thanksgiving and pray as Thy blessed Son has taught us all to say:

"Our Father, Who art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy Name, Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For Thine is the Kingdom and the power and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

"So mote it be."

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The Proclamation calling the Eighty-sixth Annual Communication of Grand Lodge was read by the V:W: Grand Secretary.

The Most Worshipful Grand Master welcomed the Brethren to Grand Lodge as follows:—

It is a very pleasant duty to again welcome the members of Grand Lodge and our Distinguished Guests both as your Representative Head, and personally.

This is your Assembly, and I trust that you will not only learn what has transpired during the past year, but may also carry away from our considerations, thoughts that you may turn into actions—for the benefit of your Lodge or Lodges, which in turn may rebound to the credit and greater honor of our Beloved Order.

To our Distinguished Visitors, the same welcome

applies — we welcome you in every sense that our great Fraternity stands for. We know that you will leave with us something for the good of the Craft—also that you may receive some inspiration whilst sojourning in our midst. We fully realize that you have made sacrifices and put yourselves out in order to be present with us. We sincerely appreciate the efforts you have made to attend upon our Eighty-sixth Annual Communication. Your aid and presence will greatly add to our assembly.

One can, perhaps, understand the thoughts, or rather the ignorance of certain peoples towards our standard of liberty but to me it is incomprehensible how persons living in our free countries — enjoying all the blessings of freedom — can even think of, let alone work for the destruction of our way of living and would wish to plunge us into chaos, such as appears to be enjoyed, or rather endured, in some countries.

It is the personal duty of every Mason to ferret out and expose all such people in our country, so that our land may be cleansed of such pestilential beings.

Our Order can only flourish in a peaceful atmosphere—although it has withstood the ravages of time and warfare. Let us seek Peace, but not at the loss of Honor.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

The dedication of new Lodges is always an occasion for thankfulness and I feel sure those in this jurisdiction, who have had this pleasure, feel keenly their duty and the responsibility they have assumed in carrying on proper Masonic work within the jurisdiction of their Lodge.

CHURCH SERVICES

It has been gratifying to note the many church services which have been held by so many Lodges and it is always a pleasure to grant dispensations for the proper use of regalia at these gatherings.

I would again at this time thank all those who made the social side of these meetings such a pleasure and also to thank all those who accompanied me for their interest and support, and for the hospitality enjoyed at the hands of other Masonic Bodies my heartfelt thanks and appreciation.

I regret exceedingly that I was unable to visit a number of Lodges and I realize I have been the loser and I hope the next year will see these Lodges which have not been visited given preference by the Grand Master and Grand Lodge.

In addressing the Craft during my visits I have tried to stress a more direct application of the under-

lying fundamentals of our great institution to our daily lives; to apply these fundamentals to our own acts and thoughts, so that they will reflect the Grace of He who permits us to be called by the name of Christian; I do feel that we, unthinkingly, are allowing too many opportunities to slip by us whereby these great factors can be more fully expressed — by deed and word — and call upon all the craft to so amend the errors of omission that none can say of us in the future "He had not the greatness of character to carry out the principles, he was taught."

It has been a very great privilege and pleasure to be present at other Grand Lodges and observe the methods used in the carrying on of their meetings.

As to the Conferences attended, although the Grand Secretary and myself were not in the best physical condition much good was received. The All Canada Conference in particular appears to have more in common with ourselves in New Brunswick than does the Conference held yearly in Washington.

We do receive minutes of these meetings which record in detail the subjects presented, but I am of the opinion we require some more improved method of getting the thoughts expressed or discussed brought to better light among our brethren and perhaps more of the ideas made use of.

For example, at the Washington Conference of Grand Masters we were privileged to listen to very excellently prepared papers on such topics as:—

Connectives — in Masonry by M:W: Benjamin W. Ela, Grand Master of Maine.

The Philosophy of the First Degree — by M:W: Harry E. Howard, Grand Master of Alberta.

Report of Commission on information for recognition — Wm. E. Yeager, Past Grand Master of Pennsylvania.

Belief in God — by M:W: Thos. E. Roy, Grand Master of Massachusetts and likewise at Montreal, many interesting and important subjects were discussed.

GROWTH OF ORDER

I do feel obliged, however at this time to mention the fact that as will be noted in the report of our Grand Secretary that very many petitions for membership are constantly being received and we must be very careful to see that we are only accepting into our membership those who will make Masons — not members.

Other Jurisdictions are now in trouble on this account and now is the time to see to it that our investigation committees are properly instructed and carry out their duties accordingly.

Let me quote for your information the following statement as printed in the proceedings of the 1953 Grand Masters' Conference held in Washington, "In the State of New York we make Master Masons every year, so called, by the thousands and out of our thousands and hundred of thousands of Master Masons in the State of New York there are tens and tens of thousands of them who cannot even get into a Masonic Lodge unless they are vouched for, and yet they go around parading as Master Masons."

Large membership or large lodges should not be our ambition, but to do our part to improve man to the betterment of mankind and have more "Masonic Lodges rather than Lodges of Master Masons."

We do not wish this condition to ever exist in this jurisdiction and we should, therefore, be careful, as pointed out before, and see that no candidate is accepted or advanced too rapidly.

Dispensations have been refused seeking permission to work upon more candidates at the one time, than our Constitution allows and also seeking the right to advance candidates by shortening the stated interval between Degrees.

There are jurisdictions where at least one year must elapse between Degrees and it is now realized that this phase as well as our initiation fee must be carefully examined for possible improvement.

May it never be that we, nor our children or children's children, shall have to tear down our Masonry, to discover once again, treasures which some stupidity of carelessness, or inattention, or fancied improvement, may have lost.

I wish to extend to each District Deputy Grand Master my sincere appreciation of the work they have done and to those in particular who have forwarded such splendid reports.

I feel that in connection with the work of the D.D.G.M. that we must more fully realize the importance of their work and therefore we must put forth more effort to assist them in standardization and explanation of all phases of Lodge operation, not only ritual work alone, but it has become very evident that we need a much more correct carrying on of Lodge detail by Lodge Secretaries and any others concerned.

GRAND SECRETARY'S OFFICE

With the co-operation of the Saint John Masonic Temple Ltd., the Grand Secretary's Office suite has been redecorated and more suitable furniture has been provided all of which makes for improved appearance.

SPECIAL REGALIA

Since our last communication three Lodges have now availed themselves of the honor of using gold trim on their officers' regalia, signifying as set out in our Constitution the years of service of their respective Lodges.

I did call attention to one apron which I believe was trimmed in error, as it was a Grand Lodge apron with additional gold similar to that which had been placed on the regular lodge regalia. It was pointed out that no change could be made in any regalia other than that of the Lodge whose years in Masonry gave them that privilege.

GRAND LODGE REGALIA

In as much as it was agreed that the appearance of our Grand Lodge Regalia was below par, that steps to be taken to secure new. I am proud to wear this new apron which has been secured for comparison of price and value and a committee is now working to bring in a recommendation to the Board of General Purposes, concerning the possible purchase of required regalia and I would recommend that this Board be given authority to proceed and secure regalia as this Committee agrees is necessary.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMME

No doubt many of you have missed the Monthly Educational Bulletin which accompanied each issue of your Lodge notice.

We have had this year prepared a book by our V:W: Bro. H. I. Knowles, to whom we owe much and to whom we wish to express our most sincere thanks.

This publication has been sent direct, on behalf of the Grand Lodge, from the Grand Secretary's office to each candidate, as soon as the Grand Secretary is advised that the candidate has become a Master Mason.

Much favorable comment has been received and we would be glad to receive any constructive criticism.

EMBLEMS

I have noted on notices from Lodges that two distinct types of cut are being used, in the printing thereof. One a square and compass without the letter "G" and a second one with the letter "G" which is not constitutional and I would suggest that necessary changes be made to make all insignia or printing cuts correct within our jurisdiction. Care must be used to see that no error is made as emblems are displayed on new buildings.

LODGE JURISDICTION

The question of changing a Lodge Jurisdictional area was brought to my attention, but it was agreed that the seeking and proper co-operation in granting waiver of jurisdictional rights between the lodges concerned would best meet the needs of the Lodge seeking relief.

CONCLUSION

Brethren, you know by now my interest has truly been in the improvement of, not only our work in making Masons, but also in making our fraternity even a greater institution and if the thoughts I have endeavoured to express contain any value, they should be placed before the Board of General Purposes from where a suitable committee can go into and procure more detailed information, detail and recommend to the Board and the Grand Master certain directives

which might be issued the several Lodges so long as they in no way conflict with our Constitution.

My term of office as your Grand Master will long be remembered and cherished by me. The many thoughtful and generous courtesies extended to me have been deeply appreciated and will be highly treasured during my remaining days.

As I look back on my seemingly short space of time and think of the Friendships made, my heart is filled with gratitude for the opportunity you have given me to be of some small service to you — "The Craft."

If such there be, Masters are urged to communicate with the Grand Secretary who will give all assistance possible in preparing reports for the consideration by the Board.

Aprons and cuffs were purchased from different manufacturers for the Grand Master and Deputy Grand Master.

A Committee has been appointed to consider future replacement of our Regalia, which is badly needed.



AUDITORS' REPORT

We, your committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the V:W: Grand Secretary and the V:W: Grand Treasurer report as follows:—

The Grand Secretary's cash book showed receipts for fees and dues, etc., of \$10,458.83 and this was deposited in the Bank of Nova Scotia to the credit of the General Account.

The Grand Treasurer's books for the General Account and the Benevolent Account were also examined. Receipts and Expenditures were checked and vouchers were produced covering payments. The bank balances were verified. Bonds at par value \$103,000 held in a safety deposit box in the Bank of Nova Scotia, Prince William Street, Saint John, were checked and found correct.

Insurance Policies are on hand covering Grand Lodge Regalia \$2,500.00 and Oil Paintings \$4,800.00.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MASONIC EDUCATION

Reference was made in the last report of the Committee on Masonic Education, to the booklet System of Masonic Education for the new member. The proposals of the Committee on this enterprise were submitted to the Board of General Purposes.

After due consideration the Board favored the publication of a single booklet rather than a series of booklets, suitable for presentation after each degree. Moreover, it was decided to have the Grand Secretary send the booklet to the new member.

The Committee has carried out the recommendation of the Board and the distribution of the booklet by the Grand Secretary is in operation.

The booklet consists of 47 pages and bears the title, "More Light on Freemasonry." It corresponds in size and appearance with the published proceedings of Grand Lodge. Included are an excellent Foreward by the Grand Master, fifteen articles on various Masonic topics, a short bibliography and the address of three suppliers of Masonic books. The cost of publication of 2,000 copies was \$554.84.

The Committee suffered a significant loss by the death of R:W: Horace A. Porter. His interest in literary pursuits and a keen intellect made him a valuable member. Brother Porter's article on Masonic Jurisprudence, which appeared in the Masonic Digest,

will be found in the booklet "More Light on Freemasonry."

REPORTS Of District Deputy Grand Masters

DISTRICT No. 1

Saint John, N. B. August 14h, 1953.

To the Most Worshipful The Grand Master of Masons in New Brunswick:

It is again my privilege to submit to you my report of a year's activities.

My first official duty was to install the Worshipful Master and Officers of Saint Martin's Lodge No. 30. In this I was assisted by R:W: Bro. F. C. Thurston as Senior Grand Warden, W: Bro. M. Dalton as Grand Chaplain and W: Bro. W. J. Summerville as Grand Director of Ceremonies.

During the year I attended six of the Church Services held by the lodges in this District.

The spirit of Masonry flourishes in this District, not only in the exemplification of Degree work within the lodges, and their attendances at Divine Service, but also in their social activities, such as Ladies' Nights, picnics and the exchanges of fraternal visits.

During the past two years I have noticed that a great many of the errors in ritual have been due not so much to lack of interest and study as to the misinterpretation of the letters of the code ritual.

parade was held in which over 440 Masons took part, marching to the Central United Church to attend divine service conducted by Bro. J. A. McMillan, pastor of this church, the music being under the direction of Wor. Bro. E. W. Freeborn and the choir consisted of Brother Masons, assisted by members of the Eastern Star, and were trained by Bro. Leon. Barnes. To further assist in this service, it is pleasing to say there were five Ministers of other Protestant Churches on the platform. A collection was taken in aid of the Protestant Orphanage.

On July 17th, Keith Lodge No. 23, Stellarton, N. S., exemplified the Entered Apprentice Degree in Keith Lodge No. 23, Moncton, on a candidate, which work was very ably performed.

During the summer of 1952 the lodge room of Moncton Masonic Temple was enlarged by the addition of a balcony, which work is a credit to Keith Lodge who took upon themselves the financial responsibility and the heavy task of looking after the work. Much credit is due to Wor. Bro. Charles Stevens who acted as chairman. The other Moncton Lodges assisted in a financial capacity.

A meeting was held in November, 1952, of all the members of the Boards of General Purposes of the three City Lodges of Moncton, at which it was decided to purchase a Hammond organ. This was done and on March 31st, 1953, this instrument was fully paid for by all Masonic and Sister Lodges of Moncton together with personal contributions from members of the Masonic Fraternity.

A new Temple is being planned for Steven Lodge No. 34, at Petitcodiac, and I am in hopes a dedication will take place either this year or early in 1954.

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In April, 1953, after R:W: Bro. A. S. Robinson, Past Grand Master, and Deputy Grand Master R. B. Graham had made reference to the effect that the Lodges in Moncton were fast becoming heavy with membership, a meeting was held under the chairmanship of the District Deputy Grand Master, District No. 7, and a committee was formed to bring in a report. This has been laid over until later on in the fall.
