PROCEEDINGS OF THE 89th Annual Communication OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Saint John, N. B., May 24th, 1956.

THE EIGHTY-NINTH ANNUAL COMMUNICA-TION of "The Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick" was held at the Masonic Temple, Germain Street, in the City of Saint John, on Thursday, the twenty-fourth day of May, A.D. 1956, A.L. 5956.

Most Worshipful Rev. Dr. Arthur E. Coleman assumed the Throne and Grand Lodge was opened in Ample Form at 10:00 o'clock a.m., followed by solemn prayer by the V:W: Grand Chaplain, Rev. George M. Young, as follows:

"Most merciful God, supreme Architect of heaven and earth, unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid, cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration and guidance of Thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love Thee and worthily magnify Thy Holy Name. Grant such love and devotion to Thee our Creator, such adherence to the principles of Freemasonry, such unity of mind and high purpose, such harmony and fellowship, such loyalty to duty and noble tenets of our Order, that all things thought, spoken and done here in this Grand Lodge may be for the advancement of Freemasonry and for the good of all people, and finally for our own salvation in that blessed Kingdom where the righteous shall find rest.

"Hear us, O Merciful God, as we sum up all our hopes, our prayers, our thanksgiving and pray as Thy blessed Son has taught us all to say:---

"Our Father, Who art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy Name, Thy Kingdom come, Thy Will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For Thine is the Kingdom and the power and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

"So mote it be."

The Proclamation calling the Eighty-ninth Annual Communication of Grand Lodge was read by the V:W: Grand Secretary.

The Most Worshipful Grand Master welcomed the brethren to Grand Lodge as follows:---

II Cor. 4: 18.

There was a moment in your life, and mine, when we stood on a certain spot and a voice said "you there stand as an upright man and a Mason; and I give it to you strictly in charge ever to walk and act as such."

For most of us that was quite a while ago, yes I venture to say, that if any one of us were singled out, and the voice said, "after all these long years you still stand as an upright

man and a Mason," we would be pardoned if we felt a little glow of pride.

What is it that keeps us steady, true and loyal to the Craft through all the years? I dare say that some of us, when we came to the door of Masonry had an idea that there would be some substantial material benefit if we were members of a world-wide and highly respectable institution, perhaps some business profit, or social advantage - but before we left the Lodge room a voice said "Masonry esteems no man because of his outward appearance or worldly honors."

The appeal of the Craft was to the inward, the spiritual, the eternal.

Now I have lived a somewhat lengthy life, and have been a Mason for more than fifty years, and I find in the ancient and honourable fraternity a spiritual appeal in at least five leading tenets of our Order:---

First, Antiquity

Anything that survives the years is of interest to uswe perpetuate venerableness. If we can link ourselves with something ancient, we feel that we are adding to the stability of our foundations.

We have pride in our family history - our ancestry our broad commonwealth - the land we call our own -in our patriotism we claim dignity because of the age or security of our native land - we have a fellow feeling with Brutus, who when tempted to betray his country, exclaimed "I'd rather be a dog and bay the moon, than such a Roman." Or we feel like the caretaker of the grounds of Oxford University. A Texan being shown about the campus compared the ancient building unfavourably with modern and greater ones in his home State, and poked a bit of fun at the limited campus, "But", said he "there is one thing I must praise, and that is your beautiful lawns. How ever do you manage such smooth, velvety greens?"

"Oh!" said the old caretaker, "that's easy, you just clip it and rowl it, and clip it, and rowl it, and clip it, and rowl it, for a thousand years."

Long ago I read this, "Free Masonry is an inexhaustible mine of wealth to the heart and mind. No single vision can scan the whole of its glories; no one cunning craftsman can explore the full extent of its quarries: no single mind can grasp its mysteries in their entirety. One sees a prismatic fragment of its beauty; another appreciates a separate portion of its strength; another fathoms, here and there, detached portions of its ineffable wisdom, but not until this mortal shall have put on immortality, not until we have entered the celestial Lodge above shall one soul be able to grasp its wisdom, strength, and beauty."

The man who wrote that did not believe that Masonry was born yesterday. He had a perspective: a distant vista. He was thinking of the enquiring spirit of man which is ceaselessly engaged in deciphering from graven stone, and written scroll, and painted tomb, the meaning of human existence and the evolution of civilized social life. In our ancient symbols, words, signs, penalties and customs we are led back to every age, every country, every nation, every race. The endless and majestic search for truth has a spiritual impact.

We can trace the history of Masonry through the mists of prehistoric times, in the search we can catch glimpses of dynasties magnificent beyond our ken of cities, and achievements so wonderful in design and execution, as to rival the best knowledge and skill of the twentieth century.

By the banks of the Nile and from the astronomers, architects and wise men of ancient Egypt, from Phoenicians who ventured upon the vast unknown oceans; from the noble race that reared the temple of Solomon; from the intellectual treasure and noble thought that was Greece: from the bravery, loyalty, and strength that was ancient Rome, we have learned something of that unending quest. Founded

upon principles solid as the rock of Gibraltar, Masonry comes to us out of the dark ages of antiquity, and has for us the glamor of ancient things. Yet she is as fresh, enchanting, and vigorous as when in olden time craftsmen hewed the timbers in the forests of Lebanon, or squared the blocks which fitted so perfectly in the temple of Solomon. Time, which is said to conquer all things has left no trace of its ravages upon her fair and unwrinkled brow.

II-Mystery:

Anything mysterious appeals to us-in proportion as anything rises above the common place it becomes mysterious.

We read in the first line of the Great Lights which lies upon the altar. "In the beginning God!" and at once we are surrounded with mystery. Who is God? What is his relation to us, or our relation to Him? What has He done? What would He have us do? What kind of men would He have us to be? What kind of a world ought we to build? What is our destiny?

We enter at birth into a mysterious world, a going concern which we had no hand in building, and at once, wonder is excited, and investigation challenged, and continues every step of the way from the cradle to the tomb.

Every leaf is a mystery. The elements of the air we breathe, the process of the nourishment of our bodies are mysteries - the diversities in the animal world, the genesis of a thought, the growth of a habit, the formation of a character, the ceaseless play of life within and around us, are mysteries that still keeps the long succession of philosophers at work, and still confounds and confuses us.

Amid the mysteries the Mason seeks "Light, more light." Lured on from one symbol to another we seek to know all that would enlarge our vision, and make us wiser and more useful men. The more we seek, the more we are convinced that the things that are seen are transient, and the unseen things the Eternal.

III—Brotherhood:—

True fraternity is not a material contact, but a spiritual essence. We have a dream of "One World," in which there shall be a universal brotherhood, "where the common sense of most shall hold a fretful realm in awe, and the kindly earth shall slumber lap't in universal law." That's why Tennyson's phrase about "The Parliament of man and the Federation of the world" gives us a thrill. Toward that end Masonry is continually struggling. We crave companionship. Lord Bacon once said, "He that loves solitude is either a wild beast, or a God." Humanity is gregarious we live in families, clans, races, nations, cities, brotherhoods. The master builders of our institution fashioned in its very framework the law of fraternity. Civilization is not possible without brotherhood.

As individuals we perish. United we can stand — united man can unlock the treasures of heart and mind - united he can let loose the wings of his fancy — united he can develop his powers of reasoning and clarity of expression. United he can devise new skills and accomplish greater results. The Mason who keeps his brother's secrets as his own; remembers his brother's welfare as his own; who vindicates a brother's character behind his back as well as to his face; who warns of approaching danger, or who whispers healthful and helpful words is creating a spiritual influence far beyond his dreams. Masonry brings all to the level of brotherhood. Titles, place, power are forgotten in the broad and perfect fraternity.

Such a system interpreted in the spirit, and not the letter, if universally adopted would break down every iron curtain, and in our restless, turbulent world, set up the solid foundation for a "parliament of man, the federation of the world."

IV-Moral Teaching:-

It was not by chance or accident, that our first Masonic

Craftsmen were men who builded a Temple --- they wrought not upon a palace to house arrogant tyranny, or an industrial plant that might enrich a people; not even on an amusement hall or a tomb, but upon a Temple. We derive inspiration from those consecrated builders whose skill and toil were consecrated to the task of building an earthly house for the worship of the Almighty Creator.

Our Degrees are set in an ascending scale --- we believe in the improvability of human nature. We say sometimes that Masonry is not a religion, yet like a religion, it believes in a decision and a process of being better as the days go by.

There are certain elements accepted universally by all religions --- a belief in a Supreme Being; an eternal distinction between right and wrong; an obligation to recognize and practice the virtues. On these principles all must, and do agree. Masonry plants itself upon these self-evident and universally recognized principles of all religions. Reverence for God the Supreme God, kindness to one's neighbor and respect for himself as a child of God.

V-Immortality:---

The supreme spiritual appeal of Masonry is its teaching on immortality. The evergreen which marked the resting place of our illustrious dead is the visible and material symbol of a great spiritual truth. The evergreen will wither into dust. It is the fate of all things material.

"Time, like an everflowing stream Bears all its sons away; They fly forgotten as a dream Dies at the opening day."

But the spiritual truth of the sprig of acacia tells its own story. There is a spirit in man that can never, never die.

You and I shall live long after these bodies moulder into dust. You and I shall live long after the hills have passed away. You and I shall live long after the stars have gone out, and the spiritual truth of our familiar dram-

over the hearts of men. To achieve that immortality is life's supreme triumph. To miss it, irretrievable tragedy.

There is a legend of the creation which tells us that at the beginning all the little seeds of life, infinitesimal beginnings of life, came before God the Creator, and He let them choose what they would be. One little seed of life said, "I want fins. The greater parts of the surface of the globe is water and I want fins to swim and live in it." So God made the fishes. A second little seed of life said, "I want wings. There is more air than water, and I want to fly in it." So God made the birds. Another said, "I want strong jaws and fleet feet, so I may catch my prey and never lack for food." So God made the animal world, the wolf, the tiger and the lion. But there was one tiny seed of life that was in danger of being overlooked, but God said, "My little fellow, what do you want to be?" and the little seed of life said, "I don't want anything, I do not want fins. I do not want wings. I do not want to destroy or crush by strength or fleetness of foot. I only want to be like you, and then I will be in right relationship with you, and everything on earth, or air, or sea." And God made man in His own image and gave him power and grace to become a child of God. So from hoary Antiquity, from our Mysteries, our Brothernood and pure Mortality, and above all our teaching of Immortality we gain a spiritual momentum that keeps us true and steady and loyal.

Thus, we may know that we came from God, and at the end of the road — there is a temple not made with hands, eternal in the heavens, and into that temple we may enter as upright men and Masons.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

All Annual Reports have been received and certificates are being presently issued and forwarded to Lodge Secretaries. I thank the Secretaries of the Lodges for their promptness in making their Annual Returns to enable me to give a complete picture of our membership to date.

In a number of instances itemized Treasurer's reports are not submitted, simply a statement of the lump sum expended. It is necessary that a full statement of the Treasurer's accounts be submitted to this office, this being provided for in the Constitution, although the Constitution does not say "itemized", that is the intention.

I note that a number of Lodges are still not purchasing Constitutions for presentation to their members. This is something that must be done as the Constitution provides that a copy of this Book together with a copy of the By-Laws of the Lodge be presented to each candidate upon completion of his Master Mason Degree. A close check will be kept on all Lodges and report must be made to the Board of General Purposes of such Lodges as are delinquent in the presentation of the Constitution and By-Laws.

To the Secretaries of Lodges, I would ask that you be a little more prompt in sending in the names and addresses of all newly raised members so that the booklet "More Light on Freemasonry" can be sent them as soon after their raising as possible, so that such information and knowledge as it contains would be available to them when they need it the most. R:W: Arthur S. Robinson, P.G.M., Grand Historian, presented the following report:---

(May 24, 1956)

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of Grand Lodge:

I beg to submit the following report for the year just closing.

I think some progress has been made in our History Department this year and I am sure there is an increased interest.

I offer my congratulations to St. George Lodge No. 12 on appointing a Lodge Historian in the person of Bro. H. D. Boyd, who has been in communication with me and I am glad to say I have been able to furnish him some of the information he required on beginning his work.

On the evening of February 10th, 1956, fully 100 members of the Fraternity assembled in the Blue Room of the Masonic Temple in Saint John to hear Most Worshipful Dr. R. V. Harris, Grand Secretary and Grand Historian of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia deliver a lecture on the Life and Work of Rev. John Beardsley accredited as the most active Mason in introducing the Craft into what is now the Province of New Brunswick and to hear a paper on early Masonry in the same area up to the erection of this Province in 1784, by the Grand Historian of this Jurisdiction.

The unusual success of this meeting justly belongs to Dr. A. E. Coleman, our Most Worshipful Grand Master, who had mention of the event given in the various notices sent out by the Lodge Secretaries and who graciously presided during the evening.

Dr. Harris is the Secretary of the Masonic Research Association of Canada and gave the Annual Report of the organization before delivering his lecture.

I am very grateful for the help and assistance in all my efforts given me by the Grand Master.

The paper given by your own Historian on the occasion just mentioned was also read in Moncton on April 23rd, under the auspices of Acacia Lodge No. 49.

A very pleasant feature of our meeting in Saint John was the addition of several names to the list of members of our Association.

It was my privilege, on behalf of the Grand Master, to install the Master and Officers of Keith Lodge No. 23 for the current year and to assist at the installation ceremonies of several other Lodges.

Requests have come to me concerning various Masonic matters which, fortunately, I have been able to supply. My one dread is that, due to the limited amount of material as yet in our files, some seeker will request knowledge that I shall not be able to supply.

An interesting feature recently introduced is the awarding of Fifty-year Lapel Buttons and attractive certificates suitable for framing. It was my pleasure to present two at the April meeting of Zetland Lodge. The venerable brethren thus distinguished are affectionately known as "Worshipful Brethren Al Mugridge and Sandy Bateman." They are still hale and hearty and regular attendants at the communications of their Lodge. On that occasion Wor. Bro. Mugridge gave the lecture in the Third Degree. Zetland Lodge No. 24 has another Brother entitled to receive the fifty-year award but, as he lives in another Jurisdiction, arrangements have not as yet been made to make his presentation.

On June 7th, 1955, Howard Lodge No. 15 celebrated its one hundredth anniversary. Wor. Bro. Charles Allison Peck was presented with the fifty-year button and Certificate. Due to previous commitments both the Grand Master and myself were unable to attend and the presentation was made by Rt. Wor. Philip Drader, S.G.W. Four decades had passed since Wor. Bro. Peck first presided in the East in Howard Lodge. I sent a letter on behalf of the Grand Master and myself to Bro. Peck and the Lodge.

Another highlight of the evening was the reading of selections from the Minutes of the Lodge from 1855 to 1936 by Wor. Bro. R. E. Lockhart. A copy of this was loaned me from which to make a transcription for the Hillsborough file. These selections were so well chosen-many of a decidedly humorous nature—that they make fascinating reading.

The fifty-year button and certificate for James Evellett Fullerton of Albert Lodge No. 34 is still in my office as Brother Fullerton is ill and his sickness along with his advanced age has till now made it impossible to make the presentation. I have been in communication with his Lodge about the matter but have received no direction from them as yet.

It was necessary during the year to add two more sections to the steel files, which were paid for out of the grant and I wish to express my thanks for the increase in the grant during the last two years.

The publications which have come in this year have been fewer in number than usual but are valuable nevertheless.

I wish to urge the installation of a case for Masonic relics in some nook or corner of these rooms. I have seen many such cases. They are not deep; have glass fronts and occupy only waste spaces on walls and their contents provide definite and valuable interest to visitors as well as to our own membership.

I am deeply grateful for the encouragement and help given so generously by our Grand Master and for items sent by the brethren. Please continue the good work.

Moncton Lodge of Perfection received its charter and was duly constituted and consecrated on April 27th, the first in eighty years—in an evening ceremony long to be remembered by members of the Rite not only in Moncton but by members from the Mother Lodge in Saint John, from Nova Scotia and elsewhere.

I trust these items will give some notion of our activities and serve as a reminder to help all you can.

I close with a quotation from Winston Churchill's latest book "A History of the English-Speaking Peoples":

"No one can understand history without continually relating the long periods which are constantly mentioned to the experiences of our own short lives. Five years is a lot. Twenty years is the horizon to most people. Fifty years is antiquity. To understand how the impact of destiny fell upon any generation of men one must first imagine their position and then apply the time-scale of our own lives. Thus nearly all changes were far less perceptible to those who lived through them from day to day than appears when the salient features of an epoch are extracted by the chronicler."

That the sum of \$500.00 be set aside for the use of the Grand Master presiding;

That the sum of \$100.00 be set aside for the use of the Grand Historian;

That the sum of \$500.00 be set aside for the use of the Committee on Masonic Education;

That the out-of-pocket expenses of the District Deputy Grand Masters be paid on presentation of their accounts.

The Grand Director of Ceremonies was directed to present M:W: Dr. Jephtha S. Munro, Grand Master Mason of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, to the East. M:W: Grand Master Coleman asked M:W: Brother Munro to accept Honorary Membership in the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick and presented him with a Certificate as Honorary Past Grand Master. M:W: Brother Munro very graciously accepted the honor conferred and expressed his sincere thanks in a very fitting and pleasing manner.

Grand Lodge ratified the rank of Very Worshipful on Harry W. Carpenter on recommendation of M:W: The

Grand Master, he having served a number of years as District Deputy Grand Master for District No. 4 to the satisfaction of the Grand Master and Grand Lodge and this honor was conferred in consequence of his care, skill and ability.

The Grand Secretary stated that he had received a number of maps of the Province of New Brunswick showing the territorial limits of each of the several lodges. This work was done by R:W: J. G. Blaine Pugh who happens to be director of surveys for the Provincial Department of Lands and Mines of New Brunswick. He was assisted by Bro. A. F. Wightman, a member of Hiram Lodge No. 6 who was employed in the Photogrammetry Branch of the Government. This work is of a very high character and should prove very useful to the several Lodges in the jurisdiction. The Grand Secretary was directed to thank R:W: Bro. Pugh for his trouble and labor involved and to express the sincere thanks of Grand Lodge for his services and that such recognition should be given in the proceedings of Grand Lodge.

REPORTS Of District Deputy Grand Masters

DISTRICT No. 1

Lancaster, N. B. April 27th, 1956.

To the Most Worshipful The Grand Master of Masons in New Brunswick:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first report as District Deputy Grand Master of District No. 1 for the year 1955-1956.

I was duly installed at a regular meeting of my Mother Lodge on June 2nd, 1955 by R:W: Bro. James Stanley Hoyt.

In the past year I have been able to pay 13 visits (official and otherwise).

On two occasions an interesting feature was the raising of a Son by his Father who was Master of the Lodge:— June 6th at Zion Lodge No. 21, Sussex, N. B., and on November 9th at Corinthian Lodge No. 13, Hampton, N. B.

I was privileged to attend Divine Worship with the brethren on six occasions, namely: Grand Lodge, at Trinity Church, Saint John; Hibernia Lodge No. 3 at St. Mary's Church, Saint John; New Brunswick Lodge No. 22 at St. Andrew's Church, Saint John; St. John's Lodge No. 2 at Stone Church, Saint John; Carleton Union No. 8 at D.V.A. Chapel, Lancaster; Carleton Union Lodge No. 8 at Carleton United Church, West Saint John.

As a member of Grand Lodge, I accompanied you Sir, on eight of your official visits — six of them for the purpose of installation.
