In the 34th chapter of the Book of Numbers we find recorded the borders of the little land of Palestine. As we read about these borders of the Holy Land, the Promised Land, perhaps we may find the borders of our own lives. The thing that impresses one most about the borders of the land of Palestine is the small amount of land that is enclosed. Yet this was the promised land. This was the land to which God lead His chosen people by the hand of Moses. This was the land where Solomon built his magnificent temple.

The great nations around Palestine—the Egyptian, the Assyrian, the Babylonian and the Roman—must have looked with scorn and contempt upon this land whose territory they so often overran.

The borders of the land of Palestine were set by God and God instructed Moses to tell those who were to come to the promised land what the borders would be. Let us examine then, the borders of the land of Palestine as they were set by the Divine Creator and see if they are not the borders that God set for your life and mine.

The border of Palestine on the south was the desert coun-

try beyond which stretched Arabia and Egypt. Let us take this desert country as the southern border of our lives. It is a picture and symbol of our past.

When Moses was preparing the people for the crossing of the Jordan river and for the conquest of Canaan, he said of what lay behind, far to the south, "You shall return this way no more."

Every life has passed through some desert country where we do not wish to travel again. That desert country of our lives is the place of mistakes, failures, disappointments and transgressions., In the Bible we find men who had travelled through desert country. Jacob was one man who had travelled through desert country and yet who had reached a better land. Jacob in his early days was not a man to be admired and yet God still bothered with him. There are times when we almost give up in despair and disgust when we think of the desert country through which we have travelled. When you feel like that, that is the time to go to the Holy Book and read those words that are found so often, "The Lord of Hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our refuge."

Have then a southern border in your life beyond which into the desert country of past sins, failures and blunders your soul shall not be permitted to go. And as you claim that border for yourself, in love and charity allow your fellow man to do the same.

The western border of the promised land was the Great Sea—the Mediterranean Sea. The fact that Israel's western border was the sea suggests to us that our lives should not be aloof and apart from our fellow men. As we look at the sea rolling in, it seems to speak to us of the hopes and ambitions of our lives. The sea is vast and extensive. It is not a stagnant pool that receives and gives nothing in return.

So the western border of our lives should be like the sea,

big and without end, reaching out to our fellow men full of expectation and hope of what the future holds for us and them.

The northern border of the land of Palestine runs through the mountains. Those mountains speak to us of adoration and worship. They suggested adoration and worship to the writers of the Psalms, "I will lift up my eyes to the hills from whence cometh my help."

Thus it is that the mountains speak of adoration, veneration and worship. Every life should have a mountain boundary of adoration and worship of the Deity. Sometimes when we are climbing a height, those who are guiding us will warn us not to look down but to look up. Those men who are forever looking down into their own little world are in great danger of falling. As the poet says:

Let us lift our eyes to the mountains And our hearts will be filled with peace; Faith, hope and love will unite our hearts And hatred and strife shall cease.

Every life should have a mountain border of adoration. Sad is the life that has no mountain boundary, no skyline, no stars of faith and adoration.

The eastern border of the land of Palestine is the Sea of Galilee, the Jordan river and a little bit of land given to the tribe of Manasseh. The Bible is not a dull flat book, but one full of beautiful pictures. When the writer comes to describe the eastern border, he speaks of it as a land towards the sunrising. Life should have an eastern border which looks towards the sun rising, the land of hope, the land of another opportunity, the land of beginning again, the land of tomorrow. Sad is the lot of those who have no eastern border for their lives, no land of future hope and opportunity.

Such are the borders of the land of Palestine and we too should have such borders for our fives. We should have

a southern border which closes out the past. We should have a western border which takes in our fellow men. We should have a northern border which lifts our hearts to God. We should have an eastern border which looks towards the sun rising, the land of tomorrow.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Grand Lodge was called to order in respectful silence for a period in memory of the late Right Worshipful Brother James William Duncan and Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain offered prayer.

### STATE OF THE ORDER

We are about holding our own in numbers which is not too bad in these days when many jurisdictions are showing losses every year. We are having many new members but are losing too many in demits and suspensions. Those taking demits and being suspended mostly never did have too much interest in Masonry but I believe those who are remaining are taking a greater interest than ever before. The Degree work is being well done but I feel that a social evening once in a while would be a good thing in some Lodges that have a goodly number of candidates. I feel that four or five candidates for the Third Degree on a regular Lodge night should be discouraged as I am sure it is not too good for the attendance.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

As our Ritual has an examination for the Third Degree I would recommend that all candidates be instructed and examined on the Master Mason Degree. Also that the instruction and examination in all Degrees include the obligations.

The Washington Conference of Grand Masters and the All Canada Conference have proved to be of great value to those attending, but as not too many are able to attend from the Maritime Provinces, I would recommend that the new Grand Master appoint a committee to approach the other Maritime Grand Lodges to see if a Maritime Conference could be formed. Such a Conference would allow a great number of Brethern to attend and I feel would be of great benefit to all and stimulate more interest in Masonry in the Maritimes.

For some years there has existed a Chapter of DeMolay in Moncton and the Right Worshipful Brother who sponsored it has spoken several times to Grand Lodge on behalf of DeMolay but without much response but I am sure he will be pleased to know that lately two Brothers, one from Saint John and one from Fredericton have spoken to me about starting Chapters. National statistics indicate that 65% of the DeMolay members become Masons. That in itself should make us want to help them along. Or the fact that we are helping them to become better boys and better men should be incentive enough. So I recommend that a Committee on Youth Activities be appointed by the Grand Master to act in any way that will help DeMolay or other youth organizations.

We will be celebrating our One Hundredth Anniversary in a few years and may expect many distinguished visitors to be present at that time and I feel that we should have a medal to be presented to distinguished Masons who may

be present at any Communication of Grand Lodge. So I recommend that the Grand Master appoint a committee to obtain such a medal and report back to Grand Lodge at our next Annual Communication.

### CONCLUSION

I would like in conclusion to express my appreciation to all who have been of so much assistance to me during my term of office. The Grand Secretary has at all times been most helpful as have many others too numerous to name. I thank all of you from the bottom of my heart for the privilege and great honor of serving as your Grand Master.

There is much unrest in the world today and it must continue as many have never heard of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth or if they have they have never practiced it towards others or perhaps have never had it practiced towards themselves. Let us then always keep foremost in our minds and hearts the practice of the principles of our Beloved Order and hope and pray that they may come to be practiced throughout the whole world so that Brotherly Love, Tolerance, Truth and Justice may everywhere prevail which is what the Supreme Grand Master of the Universe intended.

## AUDITORS' REPORT

TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, MASONIC GRAND LODGE CORPORATION:

We, your committee appointed to audit the books and accounts of the R:W: Grand Secretary and the V:W: Grand Treasurer, report as follows:—

The Grand Secretary's cash book showed receipts for fees and dues, etc. of secretary and this was deposited in the Bank of Nova Scotia to the credit of the General Account.

The Grand Treasurer's books for the General Account and Benevolent Account were also examined. Receipts and Expenditures were checked and vouchers were produced covering payments. The Bank Balances were verified. Bonds are held in trust by the Canada Permanent Trust Company, and they certify that they have, April 30, 1961 at par value

The Regalia Account was checked and listed below.

Insurance policies are held covering Grand Lodge Regalia \$2,500.00 and 61 Paintings \$4,800.00; Office Furniture and Equipment \$9,000.00. A new spolicy to cover public liability was taken out on a three-year basis and Grand Lodge paid the premium of \$1,168.40. Through the period the different Lodges paid \$449.50 and this was deposited in the Canadian Bank of Commerce; \$390.40 of this was paid back to Grand Lodge, leaving a balance of \$59.10.

Petty Gash \$50.00 is held by the Grand Secretary.

### REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

Moncton, N. B. May 25th, 1961.

MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER. OFFICERS AND BRETHREN OF THE GRAND LODGE:

This Masonic year, now rapidly drawing to a close, has been marked by a considerable number of events of historic interest. Those I mention at this time have been brought to my attention or in which I have participated personally, I am afraid there are others of considerable note but of which I have not been informed. Again I urge the Secretaries to send me their monthly notices in which such things are mentioned. I thank the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary for their help and great kindness in this regard.

Our sympathy is extended to those who have been called upon to mourn the death of loved ones who occupied places

in our ranks. The Most Worshipful Grand Master has recorded in his admirable address a list of those whose places will be hard to fill: Charles F. Sanford, Bayard Stilwell, P.G.M. Guy Humphrey whose early efforts to introduce a ritual cipher eventually bore fruit under Grand Master Hoyt, Rev. Dr. J. Arthur Forbes, Past Grand Chaplain, the news of whose death came with shocking suddenness, Avard White a faithful member of Zetland Lodge, Mortimer Fullerton the last of three aged Brothers who for many years were pillars of great strength in Albert Lodge, and as our Grand Master has said there are doubtless many others.

Our Ritual Committee deserve our continued praise. We should mention the tireless work on that committee of Past Grand Masters Hoyt and Pearson.

Your Grand Historian was honored by being given the privilege of acting as Installing Officer for Keith and Tweedie Lodges.

This year seems to have been one of anniversaries. Zetland Lodge celebrated its centennial on Saturday, May 20th; Lodge St. John, our hosts at this time, marks its hundred years of existence. Our Deputy Grand Master was one of the very first to respond when, on taking office as Grand Historian, I appealed for Lodge histories. The material he sent in has proved very useful for this occasion. Ashlar Lodge celebrated its sixtieth anniversary September 15th; and Tweedie its fiftieth May 12th. Fortunately, I was able to attend on the 15th and it was certainly one of the best planned and carried out of all functions of the kind I have attended. This Lodge was constituted May 12th, 1911, under the Grand Mastership of M:W: Henry Bridges, whose nephew, Judge Gregory Bridges, was present at this Golden Jubilee and gave a sketch of the life of his distinguished uncle. I wish to call attention to a noteworthy thing this Lodge has done. On the occasion of the celebration of its 500th Regular Communication, reported last year, a bound book of the history of Tweedie Lodge with a section of blank pages inserted for future use was dedicated by P.G.M. Hoyt and at the function this year your Grand Historian gave an outline history of the entire fifty years.

At the celebration in Shediac this year Bro. Alex Saunders of Albion Lodge No. 1, presented Zetland Lodge with a beautiful copy of the Great Light of Freemasonry which was dedicated to God by the Grand Historian. Also I may add that I have been asked to lay the cornerstone of the fine new temple at Dorchester on June 10th. At Shediac our Grand Master dedicated a complete set of new regalia and invested the Officers with it. The Lodge gave Honorary Membership to seven.

Great efforts are being made by the Worshipful Masters of the three Lodges in Moncton to have a fine turnout at our annual church parade this year. The service will be held in St. George's Anglican Church with the Reverend Brethren Dr. Alexander, Canon McCordick and G. C. Brooks taking part, June 4th. This is a commendable effort.

I wish to thank the Grand Secretary for forwarding to me a copy of V:W: Bro. W. E. Thurrott's history of the temple at Minto and to Bro. Thurrott I offer my word of praise for preparing such a good report. On the occasion when the history was given our Grand Master paid the Lodge an official visit and the mortgage was burned.

June 27, 1960, at the request of V:W: George C. Robinson and the Master of Albert Lodge I dedicated the Bible markers presented by Bro. Robinson to the Lodge.

Six District Meetings were held during the year. The increase and value of these meetings is becoming apparent.

As already suggested the items I have mentioned in this report by no means form a complete record for the year, but I trust they do intimate to you the value of the efforts of our History Department and the reasons for a greater

interest on the part of all and especially as the Hundredth Anniversary of our Grand Lodge will soon come around. Tempus fugit.

Your committee recommends the use of burning tapers (candles) placed in a triangular form in front of the altar—East, West and South, in the Entered Apprentice Degree.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RELATIONS WITH FOREIGN LODGES

MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND BRETHREN OF THE GRAND LODGE:

For over two hundred years Freemasonry has existed in Belgium. In 1883 the present Grand Orient of Belgium was constituted and it has had an uninterrupted existence since then. Many of its members, however, disavow the existence of a Supreme Being and are opposed to the presence of the Volume of the Sacred Law in the Lodge room. It is stated that the last few years, some believe, have seen a hopeful movement toward regularity by the Grand Orient but no official action has been taken.

Apparently the Grand Orient was not moving fast enough in this direction for some of its members for on November 4, 1959, representatives of five Lodges met in Brussels and organized the Grand Lodge of Belgium. Their statement is that they did this because of their desire to respect the Ancient Landmarks and to work regularly to the glory of the Grand Architect of the Universe. The membership of those five Lodges was about 1,000 and, since then, three more Lodges have been formed under dispensation.

The basic principles of the New Grand Lodge are as follows:—

- 1. Exclusive sovereign authority over constituent Lodges.
- 2. All work is done to the glory of The Great Architect of the Universe and in the presence of the Great Lights. The Volume of the Sacred Law is always open in the Lodge room, and on it all obligations are taken.
- 3. Initiation is conferred on male adults, free men of good reputation.
- 4. Freedom of conscience of all Masons is respected, which forbids the discussion of religious and political questions in the lodge room.

- 5. Loyalty to country.
- 6. Adherence to the Ancient Landmarks, usages and customs of Freemasonry.
- 7. These principles are unbreakable and cannot be modified.

Most Worshipful Brother Thomas Roy, D.D., Secretary of the Commission on Information for Recognition of Foreign Lodges of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons informs me that on strict enquiry as to whether any of the members of the Lodges under the jurisdiction of The Grand Lodge of Belgium hold membership in an infidel Lodge or have communication with any of them the answer is a definite "No."

In view of these facts and because the new Grand Lodge of Belgium is anxious for recognition and because their move is so commendable we, your Committee on Relations with Foreign Lodges, recommend that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick recognize the Grand Lodge of Belgium and take the necessary steps thereto.

edition, relative to District Deputy Grand Masters, thereby 'confirming the rank Very Worshipful at the time of appointment by the Most Worshipful Grand Master'."

This motion was seconded by R:W: Percy C. Austin and following discussion and explanation was formally adopted by Grand Lodge.

The M:W: Grand Master instructed V:W: Grand Director of Ceremonies to present the following Most Worshipful Brethren to the Grand East and after presentation of certificates, were duly proclaimed Past Grand Masters (Honorary) of the Grand Lodge F. & A. M. of New Brunswick:

M:W: C. MacL. Pitts, Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Canada, in Province of Ontario;

M:W: Benjamin W. Ela, Past Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Maine;

M:W: John M. Littlefield, Past Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Maine;

M:W: Cyril H. Colwell, Past Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.

The above named M:W: Brethren addressed Grand Lodge expressing their appreciation of the honor conferred upon them.

With unabated zeal the Grand Master has displayed a most admirable devotion to the fulfillment of the duties and privileges of his position.

The Grand Lodge is most happy to see the fine group of distinguished visitors from other Jurisdictions who have accepted our invitation to be present with us at this our annual communication of Grand Lodge. Their presence is effective in strengthening those ties which must unite the community of true Masons everywhere.

We concer with the Grand Master in the hearty welcome he has extended to the representatives of the other Masonic Bodies within our Jurisdiction.

We join with the Grand Master in expressing the sorrow which the passing of so many of our distinguished and very active members has brought our Brotherhood. Also for the death of members of other Jurisdictions during the year we offer our profound sympathy not only to the organizations with which they were connected but to the bereaved there and to those in our own communities.

We wish to second the thanks the Grand Master has voiced to the Grand Chaplain for his inspiring message this morning. This feature of our communications is one not always characteristic of Grand Lodge assemblies elsewhere

We note with pleasure the welcome our Grand Master has expressed to those attending Grand Lodge for the first time.

We are pleased to hear the names of the group of newly appointed Grand Representatives. All are men who well deserve this great honor.

The list of his visitations clearly point out the constant contact with the Lodges kept by him and the helpful attitude he has maintained throughout. Also five visits to Sister Grand Lodges are recorded, thus further strengthening the ties already referred to. He mentions also his visit to

the All Canada Conference in Toronto, February 16 and 17 which he found both interesting and helpful. We are favorably impressed with his comments on the giving of long service pins and certificates and agree with his suggestions.

We observe that he is much pleased with the work of the District Deputy Grand Masters and agree with his commendation of the value of the District meetings. No less than six were held during the year.

We are in accord with the Grand Master in his summary of the state of the Order and find with him at least a measure of satisfaction in knowing that though there has not been much change numerically the interest is definitely on the increase.

We certainly are in hearty agreement with him in regard to instruction and examination in the work of Third Degree.

A Maritime Conference really would be a revival of the Eastern Conference of which four meetings were held and took in Ouebec as well as the Maritimes. This Conference was never terminated really but on the full organization of the All Canada Conference was left dormant to avoid duplication of work and expense but it was not dissolved as it was felt that at some future time its scope and activities might again be needed.

We heartily commend the words of praise the Grand Master has accorded the work of the Order of DeMolay. The beneficial effect of the work of this society on the development and character building of the boys who belong to it is undoubted in the face of rising delinquency among the youth of this generation. As yet there is only one Chapter in New Brunswick, that of Coronation Lodge in Moncton, while other provinces have two or three.

We concur with the Grand Master in his recommendation of the appointment of a committee to look into the matter of securing a Grand Lodge medal for distinguished visi-

tors especially as our Hundredth Anniversary is fast approaching.
