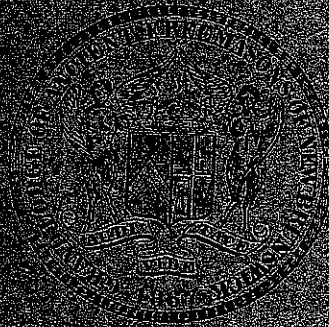

ANNUAL MEETING

May 28th, 1964, Saint John, N. B.

The Annual Communication of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation was held this morning in the Masonic Temple, in the City of Saint John at 9:30 o'clock, pursuant to notice given in the Proclamation summoning the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge.

R:W: Lloyd W. Vincent, Deputy Grand Master, President, was in the chair.

The meeting was called to order at the hour appointed by the President, R:W: Brother Lloyd W. Vincent, Deputy Grand Master.

R:W: Brother Albert G. Hoar, Grand Treasurer, presented and read a statement of the Corporation's accounts for the past year, copies of which had been previously distributed to the Brethren present. This statement set forth the receipts and expenditures of General Account, Fund of Benevolence, Regalia Account and Liability Insurance Account. The Grand Treasurer's Statement had previously been considered and adopted by the Board of Directors of the Grand Lodge Corporation.

On motion of R:W: Brother A. G. Hoar, seconded by Wor. Bro. M. W. Dalton, the statement of the Grand Treasurer was received and laid on the table.

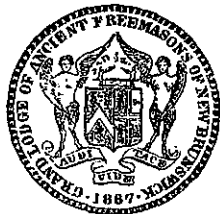

"The Blossom and the Rock"

A MASONIC DISCOURSE

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

May 28th, 1964

Two or three weeks ago it was my experience to drive along one of our little-used Kings County roads. It started off all right, well surfaced and drained; before long we were climbing great hills from the tops of which one could see for some miles. Farms looked like playthings, in the distance. Rugged hills showed row on row. The road tipped steeply and climbed again; the gravel gave out and we were travelling on bedrock. It made its way through grassy spots, yet ever the tracks led on and after a very steep drop we came out on level farmland. We learned we had been travelling the Old Cumberland Road — one of the earliest in Southern New Brunswick.

The thing was, however rough it may have been, the rock-bed of the road proved dependable, to the car in the early spring when any road is not at its best. Under the surface the rock was there, holding us up, making it possible to continue our journey and come safely through to the other end.

As we went along there were signs of old farms. Barns still in use on many, and a few houses where they lived part of the time. There were, too, a certain few where people lived all year 'round. The fields were well cleared, and it is obvious they were in the stock-raising business. In places bush roads showed lumbering activity — both long-lumber and pulp. The ground was providing for the needs of those who worked it — in fields or forests.

Breath-taking was the blossoms on every side. Wild cherry first out, and bilberry ready to bud. Pussy willows in full blossom by the roadside. Bluets in the grass, and higher still the maples were in first blossom, ruddy-red against a filmy green, and every hardwood its own shade of green on the distant hills. Here and there great pines faced the sky with an challenge to the elements; lesser spruces nodded agreeably and mingled with the hardwoods; little trees saucily challenged old pasturelands and venturing tamaracks pushed out their early needles. The chip of a sparrow added appropriate sound.

To the strength of the rock and the provision of needs was being added the overflow of beauty.

And one began to think of the rock, the field and the blossom. They are to be found together, so often.

They are found together *In Man*.

There is the rock of a man's basic character: worthy and well qualified, a free man, of lawful age, well recommended — recommended not so much by his friends in the craft, as by his own characteristics. There is the rock of a man's own basic integrity: he can be trusted; his honour is his guerdon and his word is his bond. This is what recommends a man to anything; and without this inner recommendation of the rock of his own character no man can be depended upon for anything.

Then there is what we might call the field of his work. His usefulness, to himself and society. Self-employed in a small business, a farmer, fisherman, lawyer or dentist, he may be; or part of a great organization, in the civil service or a link in the assembly-line of a great plant; a man who knows his work and does it well, his basic character showing itself in competent application to the task. Here is another facet of a man: we see the man in the quality of the work he does.

Yet we do not know this man until we have glimpsed yet another part of his nature, his interests. Two men may be alike in basic character and in the way they do their work; no two men are alike in the interests of mind and hobby. You know a man for years, or think you do, and then discover he is a collector of autographs, or of stamps; a lover of symphonic music and especially the French horn; a man who loves spruce trees; a man with a fund of curling stories! Then you begin to see him as he is — the complete person — and then, alone, do you really begin to know him; as it were, rock, and grass, and blossom.

Then I would suggest to you these things are true of *Buildings*.

We see a great building going up, many stories above the ground. Carefully they fit and bolt the steel-work. Mesh spreads out and floors materializes; walls enclose it and windows let in light. Nature brings on a storm, the wind beats upon it, there is some sway to the structure; it holds firm because, deep in the earth, in the bed-rock, are great foundations fastening the entire structure to the substance of the planet. With-

out this attachment to the rock the building would never stand; with it, it stands firmly through the years, perhaps for ages.

Finished, the building is suited to its purpose. Offices, perhaps, and corridors, meeting rooms like this, kitchens, apartments or whatever. Bright and cheery the appointments are, that work may be done happily and efficiency increased. It is a good building, serves its owners well.

And to the eye artistic, it is a pleasing building. The ancient Greeks were the lovers of art, and introduced to man the perfections of proportion. Ages have come and gone since their buildings were erected; and every age has acknowledged that here were the standards of perfection. Some ages have ignored proportions and presented monuments of ugliness by which mankind would remember them. Some ages have adapted the lovely and in so doing mangled it. Other ages have adapted the proportions of perfection to a different style of architecture, producing the Gothic glories of the middle ages and the Georgian gems of a century or two ago. Functionalism today may be a standard in building economy; but the Supreme Architect is not without witness in the hearts of men, for we want the finest in what we build, gracefulness expressed in simplicity; the eye must be satisfied first and the pocket-book second.

Strength, usefulness and loveliness remain tenets of building design. And every true man does his job soundly and well, be he carpenter, stone-mason or diagnostician. Building is symbolic of every worthy enterprise, there is the rock, and the grass, and the blossom.

Again, I would suggest to you, this is true of *Freemasonry's Philosophy of Life*.

On the strong foundation of character, Freemasonry lays the beams of truth and raises walls of brotherly love. Traditions, ceremonials, customs, bind us together in this fraternity; and friendships are advanced by experiencing together the adventures of the various degrees and rehearsing the ritual to put them on for others. Freemasonry is a rock of strength to its members — the remembering of ritualistic experiences is enough to recall the brotherly love of those who have gone this way before us and are faithfully carrying out their promises of fidelity and truth before God and man.

So the usefulness of Freemasonry becomes apparent, to the reflective mind. Our obligations lay upon us the most serious concern that our example as men and Masons be one to uplift and encourage the general good of the community and world. A Mason can never be unmindful of the larger society of which, as a citizen, he is a part.

The beauty of Freemasonry's insights is a crowning glory of the Craft. "Geometry, or Masonry, originally synonymous terms, being of a divine and moral nature is enriched with the most useful knowledge; while it proves the wonderful properties of nature, it demonstrates the more important truths of morality." So we learn toward the conclusion of the Fellowcraft Degree lectures.

Yet I would bring to you a personal concern at this very point. There is so much that is hidden in the words. I wonder how many of our brethren understand it? How many of our brethren hear words and phrases, and grasp no meaning? I wonder how much the Lodge means to the brother who takes his degrees, comes for six months, sees ritual reenacted and does not know what he is seeing? I wonder how many of our brethren know anything about the antiquities of the Craft? How many of them have ever stopped to find out the significance of the signs and symbols we use? How many of them find anything for the mind, behind all this appeal to the senses? I question whether an invitation to turn up at rehearsal will interest him? I seriously question whether we

can expect him to find out, on his own insights and meanings which make our ritual and ceremonial, yes our very language, so rich and beautiful? I submit to you that this initiative should be in the Lodge, to point out the meaning of symbols — yes, maybe to point out what the symbols are, for not every initiate has a mind that sees behind the signs what is implied. Interpreting the place of music in a Lodge ritual, and the kind of music played, would help impress the meaning of the occasion upon candidates and brothers alike.

I leave with you the question whether our benches would be so empty so often, had the brethren something brightly informative from time to time to open their eyes and behold the unchanging principle behind the beauty of rhythmical act, word and song.

So Freemasonry has its rock, in character, its grass in community usefulness, and its blossom, in insights.

Finally, I would suggest to you that the Rock, the Grass and the Blossom disclose *Him who is the Supreme Architect of the universe*.

It was a rocky road, that Cumberland Road, three weeks ago. But the rocks held the car up; there were soft places but the car went through, because the rock was there. And there are, in life, times when the going is so very uncertain and things threaten to mire us down. A friend proves careless of our friendship, or one in whom we trusted deceives us; a reorganization of the company leaves us with no friend at the top, the company ceases to be like a family and we are sort of cast on our own. Life tumbles in upon us, we are staggered by the tragedy, so unexplainable, so unnecessary had but a trace of caution been used; so suddenly the attack came, and no one dreamed of it happening! Life throws its tear gas in our eyes when we are innocent bystanders and when we are supporting the finest; things threaten to mire us down.

And then we need to remember there is One able to keep us from falling.

*"Though the cause of evil prosper,
Yet 'tis truth alone is strong;
Though her portion be the scaffold,
And upon the throne be wrong,
Yet that scaffold sways the future,
And, behind the dim unknown,
Standeth God within the shadow,
Keeping watch above His own."*

Beside the rocky road grew the grass, busily forming fodder aor another winter; and beyond the grass, the trees, lumber, pulp, plywood, beams and joists and finish-wood and blanks for carving. So usefulness is part of the Supreme Architect's plan — daily work to provide the necessities and make life's luxuries the more meaningful by the earning of them. We are to be faithful in our daily work, bearing living trust to comrade and principle alike.

And the bushes, crowned with beauty, the trees in every hue and shade, flitting feathers and the sweet cry of a bobolink: nature all-glorious, over and above the utilitarian, the riches of love and joy in the Creator's heart, awaiting our awareness that they be ours in fullness; the greatness of other philosophies, beholding other aspects of the Creator, than those we customarily take for granted; the supremely Christian revelations of the Creator's mercy and power, Rock, Grass and Blossom ... each show us, in strength, usefulness and beauty, something of MAN;

of BUILDINGS;

of FREEMASONRY'S PHILOSOPHY OF LIFE;

of the SUPREME ARCHITECT of the UNIVERSE.

Grand Master's Address

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

MY DEAR BRETHREN:

This Ninety-Seventh Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick opens with peace and concord prevailing among the Craft but with the World at large in a state of turmoil and unrest. In Africa and Asia racial problems and conflicting ideologies continually arise and increase to disturb the World. Nearer at home, in our great neighbor to the south and our own Canada, elements of disturbance and friction are not lacking. South America, too, is suffering from more than its usual share of trouble. Over all looms the dark and threatening cloud of Communism. Masonry must create a new public image of itself and let the world know that Masonry is a living force in the battle for the right to live as free men in a free world.

Centuries ago the proudest boast that a man of the civilized world could make was to say "I am a Roman Citizen." Let us imitate that proud boast; let us be proud to say "I am a Mason"; let us stand up and be counted.

A year ago, you honored me by electing me your Grand Master. I regarded it then, and still do, as the greatest honour that can be bestowed upon me. During the months which have elapsed since my election, I have tried to the best of my ability to discharge the duties of my high office. In so far as I have succeeded, I am deeply grateful for the opportunity of being of service to you; in so far as I have

failed, I crave your kind indulgence. The splendid support and warm reception I have received during my visitations are deeply appreciated and the large attendance of Brethren at Lodge meetings and particularly the presence of so many Grand Lodge Officers who attended with me has been most heart-warming.

To-day, I extend a hearty welcome and fraternal and friendly greeting to all present. Many of you are attending your first Grand Lodge meeting. Please feel at home; this is your Grand Lodge and its business is your business.

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Official Visits

One of the most pleasing duties of a Grand Master is the opportunity he has of visiting the Lodges in his jurisdiction and also of paying fraternal visits to other Grand Lodges. Twenty visits to New Brunswick Lodges and two visits to other Grand Lodges have been made by me during my year in office. I have also taken the opportunity to visit several other Masonic Bodies. I submit herewith a summary of these pleasant occasions.

On April 18th I visited Westmorland Lodge No. 44 at Port Elgin. This Lodge is quite a distance from Saint John and I was pleased to be accompanied by sixteen members of Grand Lodge, there being also a good attendance of the brethren. The E.A. Degree was conferred by a competent staff and at the closing a delicious clam chowder was served. This being the occasion of Past Grand Master Robinson's Birthday and Port Elgin his birth place, opportunity was taken of extending felicitations to our most respected Past Grand Master.

On Monday, April 13th I travelled to Bathurst and visited Lodge St. John No. 27 where I witnessed the E.A. Degree conferred by a very competent staff of officers. There was a large attendance of Grand Lodge and over one hundred brethren present. The Brethren enjoyed refreshment on close of Lodge.

The next day Tuesday, April 14th I drove to Petitcodiac and paid an official visit to Steven Lodge No. 37. I was accompanied by a large group of Grand Lodge Officers and nearly a hundred brethren were present and witnessed the M.M. Degree conferred on two candidates. The work was excellent and we were served refreshment after the meeting.

On April 21st I attended a meeting in Saint John held under the banner of The Union Lodge of Portland No. 10. The stations were occupied for the Master Mason Degree by the Worshipful Masters and Wardens of the nine Lodges in District No. 1. The Ritual was well rendered and the more than one hundred Brethren present witnessed a real Masonic evening. This meeting had been arranged by D.D.G.M. V.W. F. L. Nickson and the rewarding result was due in no small measure to his diligence and zeal. On conclusion of the meeting, a delightful luncheon was served by the host Lodge. This was an outstanding event and similar meetings might profitably be arranged in the other Masonic Districts.

The Board of General Purposes has met on four occasions and I wish to express my appreciation of the support and services rendered Grand Lodge by the Brethren serving on this Board.

Other Activities

On June 15th as presiding Officer I held a meeting of Eastern Canada Priory No. 19 of Knights of the York Cross of Honor at Halifax and installed a new slate of officers and the following morning I was received as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick by the Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons of Nova Scotia.

On June 27th I was received as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick by the Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons of New Brunswick in Saint John, N. B.

From July 7th to 12th I attended the Imperial Council Sessions of the Shrine at Chicago accompanying The Potentate of Luxor Temple, R.W. Bro. D. A. Sommerville on that occasion.

On August 27th accompanied by several brethren I attended the DeMolay Convocation in the Masonic Temple at Moncton. Seventy boys were present from two Chapters in New Brunswick and six in Nova Scotia. It was an inspiring sight to witness the excellent work carried out and the manner in which these young men conducted their business.

On September 20th and 21st I attended the North-eastern Shrine Association Field Day at Hartford, Conn. The Units of Luxor Temple sixty strong accompanied Potentate D. A. Somerville on this occasion.

On October 4th I was greeted as Grand Master at the Ladies' Night held by Luxor Temple and it was a pleasure to meet and greet old friends, Imperial Potentate Harold Close and Mrs. Close on this occasion.

On October 19th I was received at a meeting of Saint John Council No. 1 Royal and Select Masters. All the degrees of this body were conferred and I had the pleasure of again participating in one of the scenes. The meeting was followed by a dinner.

On October 29th I attended the Fall meeting of the Royal Order of Scotland. I was received by the Prov. Grand Master, Dr. V. D. Davidson and had the pleasure of seeing Senior Grand Warden, Carl Jarvis enter the Order. The usual sumptuous dinner at the Admiral Beatty Hotel followed this meeting.

On November 14th while in Montreal on other business I took the opportunity of attending the Board Meeting of the Shriners' Hospital for Crippled Children. As I am one of the governors of this Hospital it is always a pleasure to meet with the other members of this Board.

On November 27th accompanied by my wife I accepted an invitation of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite to attend a banquet honoring Ill. Sovereign Grand Commander R. C. Berkinshaw at the Admiral Beatty Hotel.

On November 29th I was received as Grand Master at a dinner in the Admiral Beatty Hotel, held by Luxor Temple in connection with its Fall Ceremonial.

On December 6th I journeyed to Halifax with other members of Luxor Temple and attended a Ceremonial of Philae Temple where I was also presented as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

On January 24th I attended the Annual Meeting of Luxor Temple and installed its officers for the ensuing year.

I believe that one of the highlights of my year as Grand Master was the occasion of my attendance at the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons of North America at Kansas City in February, 1964 when I was accompanied by Past Grand Master R. T. Pearson and R.W. Bro. A. C. Lemmon Grand Secretary. This Conference has been customarily held in Washington, D.C. The Mid-Western Brethren were most hospitable and concerned for the comfort and accommodation of their guests. Representatives from the Grand Lodges of The United States, Canada, Mexico, France, Germany, Belgium and other Countries were in attendance. The agenda and discussions were most interesting and informative. It is at this Conference that one can appreciate the magnitude and universality of Freemasonry. The spirit of Brotherhood and the opportunities which challenge the efforts of the Grand Lodges of our time are brought into focus and the problems discussed for improvement. I sincerely recommend continued association at these annual Conferences. Next year the Conference returns to Washington, D.C.

On Sunday afternoon May 24th the Lodges of Districts Nos. 2 and 7 headed by the Air Force Band paraded to Central United Church in Moncton and attended Divine Service.

A truly Masonic Sermon was preached by the Minister V.W. Brother J. A. Berridge and V.W. Bros. the Rev. F. E. Archibald and G. C. Brooks and Bro. The Rev. J. J. Alexander took part in the service and appropriate music was rendered by a Masonic Choir under the direction of V.W. Bro. E. W. Freeborn. Some 300 brethren were in line including a large number of Grand Lodge Officers, R.W. Bro. A. C. Lemmon, Grand Secretary accompanied me from Saint John.

Visitation to Irish, Scottish and English Jurisdictions

On arriving in Dublin on Tuesday, April 28th, I visited Freemasons' Hall and was cordially received by the Grand Secretary, R.W. Brother James O. Harte and was conducted on a tour of the building by his Assistant, W. Bro. Brown. This is a magnificent building and I was particularly impressed by the Grand Lodge Room, the Knights Templar and Royal Arch Rooms and the Scottish Rite Quarters. There are four Craft Lodge Rooms and two dining halls. There is also an extensive Library and a Museum containing many interesting items and relics relating to Masonry in Ireland.

That evening I attended a meeting of Sapphire Lodge No. 561 and witnessed the exemplification of the Master Mason Degree. The work although considerably different from our ritual was most interesting and well done. I was royally entertained both at Lodge and subsequently at supper when a most delightful two hours were spent in refreshment and good fellowship. This Lodge is known as a "Teetotal" Lodge and one of the few apparently so termed in Ireland — but this fact did not lessen the cordial reception I received.

On Thursday I had the pleasure of meeting the Deputy Grand Master, R.W. Dr. John Wallace and Mrs. Wallace and together with Grand Secretary Harte and my wife enjoyed a delightful luncheon in the Saddle Room of the Shelburne Hotel. My visit to Dublin was primarily a Masonic one, on account of my being the representative here of the Grand Lodge of Ireland, and the fact that my Mother Lodge, Hibernia, No. 3 received its first warrant from the Grand Lodge of Ireland. My happy expectations were fully realized. My only regret is that the Grand Master M.W. Raymond F. Brooke, who I know personally was ill in hospital and unable to greet me, and the representative of New Brunswick W. Bro. V. N. Gorman is now residing in England.

Grand Secretary Harte telephoned to V.W. Bro. Henry Lemon, Grand Secretary of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Antrim that I was arriving in Belfast on the afternoon of May 1st. and on reaching that city I proceeded to the Masonic Hall on Rosemary Street and was cordially greeted by Bro. Stewart the Asst. Secretary and Bro. Walker the Librarian. They were joined by R.W. Brother Robb P.D.G.M. who welcomed me officially to the Province of

Antrim. I was taken on a tour of the Hall which is a fine new building elaborately equipped for holding several Lodge meetings at once and with adequate banqueting facilities. That evening I was welcomed by Grand Secretary Lemon and introduced to W. Bro. R. J. Quirey who invited me to attend a meeting of his Lodge No. 700 of which he is the Wor. Master. Zion Lodge met at 6:30 p.m. and I was received with Grand Honours. There being no degree work, Lodge was closed at 7:30 p.m. and adjournment was made to the Banquet Hall where a sumptuous meal was served to upwards of 100 brethren. I responded to the Toast to the Grand Lodge of Ireland and also presented a Past Master's apron to Wor. Bro. James McQuoid, I.P.M. on behalf of Zion Lodge. After dinner a good two hours was spent in song, stories and speeches and this being another "Teetotal" Lodge nothing impaired the harmony of the gathering.

I owe a great debt of gratitude to all the brethren who made my stay in Ireland so enjoyable and I believe I have further cemented the brotherly love which has always existed between our respective Grand Lodges. I would be remiss indeed if I failed to acknowledge the great kindness and hospitality extended to my wife and me by P.M. Cyril Holt of Belfast. He is a brother-in-law of P.M. James Lutton of Carleton Union Lodge No. 8 and together with his lovely wife gave us two days of enjoyable motoring in Ulster, viewing the Giants' Causeway, the Hills of Mourne, the Silent Valley and the coastline of the Atlantic Ocean and the Irish Sea — All scenes of great beauty.

In Edinburgh, May 5th I called on the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Scotland, Dr. Alex F. Buchan and received a most hearty welcome. An opportunity was afforded me to tour the beautiful Masonic Hall including a visit to the museum which contained many exhibits of Masonic and historic interest, including the original painting of Robert Burns in Lodge.

Dr. Buchan took my wife and me to luncheon at the Royal Burgess Golf Club, said to be the oldest in the world and then for a motor drive to view the new bridge across the Firth of Forth.

On the afternoon of May 6th V.W. Bro. R. F. Wright and I repaired to the Royal Arch Hall on Queen St. and after partaking of tea and sandwiches went into the meeting of the Grand Lodge of the Royal Order of Scotland. We were cordially welcomed by the D.G.M. Lord MacDonald. The Royal Arch Lodge Room was of beautiful design and

eminently suited for the Degree work of the Royal Order. At 6 p.m. the Brethren invited Brother Wright and me to join them at dinner in the Conservative Club on Princess Street. Brother Wright did address the gathering and conveyed the Greetings of the Provincial Grand Lodge of the Royal Order in New Brunswick, and I availed myself of the opportunity to have a long conversation on various Masonic topics, with the Grand Master Mason of Scotland Lord Bruce.

At noon on May 7th I attended a luncheon given by the Grand Lodge of Scotland prior to the Quarterly Meeting and indeed felt that I was in most distinguished company, being seated at table between Lord Bruce and the Earl of Eglinton and Winton, P.G.M.

The Grand Lodge of Scotland was opened with great ceremony in a magnificent Lodge Room attended by some 300 brethren in regalia. I was happy to have with me at this meeting R.W. Bro. W. J. Bambury, P.D.G.M. and W. Bro. James Humphrey presently our Grand Pursuivant. I was received with Grand Honours and I conveyed the greetings of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick to the gathering and R.W. Bro. Bambury also spoke. Lodge closed at 4 p.m. and I regretfully bade farewell to my generous hosts who entertained me so lavishly and made my sojourn in Scotland so pleasant and informative.

In London on May 15th I visited the beautiful Freemasons' Hall, Great Queen Street where I was cordially welcomed by the Grand Secretary, W. Bro. J. W. Stubbs. After a tour of this magnificent building I was introduced into "The Jubilee Masters Lodge". Membership in this Lodge is confined to Past Masters of the London Masonic District and the presiding master V.W. Bro. Frere is the President of the Board of General Purposes and Grand Secretary Stubbs is a Past Master of this Lodge. I was received with Grand Honours and witnessed with great interest the opening and closing ceremonies which differ considerably from our own. After close of Lodge, a most sumptuous banquet was served to some 200 brethren and again I was the guest of honour and tendered the fraternal greetings of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick to our English Brethren. After a delightful two hours of feasting and good fellowship I departed from what is no doubt the most Magnificent Masonic building in the world and the home of the "Mother Lodge of Freemasonry".

One of the most delightful recollections that I have of my visit to London was my reunion with my dear friend

and fellow brother of Hibernia Lodge, Colonel Harry Ward. Harry gave my wife, Bro. Frank Hunter and me two most delightful days driving through the beautiful English Countryside and visiting many quaint and interesting places of interest not readily accessible to the average tourist.

State of the Order

The impression I gathered from my visits to the Lodges in New Brunswick was favorable. The Officers seem devoted and the brethren appeared to take a keen interest in their respective Lodges. Attendance is not what it should be and I endeavoured to light a spark of encouragement by not only giving praise to the Officers and Brethren present but by suggesting methods by which interest and attendance could be improved. I strongly believe that more events of a social nature, including at times the presence of the ladies should be held; and that more inter-lodge fraternal visits should be made. I was particularly impressed by the excellent spirit and good ritualistic work displayed in the more distant lodges — separated as they are from their sister lodges by many miles and having to go it on their own, so to speak. The diligence and zeal of the D.D.G.M.s and the Ritual Committee of Grand Lodge are of great assistance in this respect and these Brethren are to be commended for their efforts.

And now to the future; as your Grand Master I am endeavoring to promote the Order of DeMolay in New Brunswick. Two Chapters of the Order have been operating for some years in Fredericton and Moncton. It is my hope that one or two will be instituted in Saint John before long. Strong and devoted committees are working on the project and financial support is assured. This Order for boys is very strong in other jurisdictions and has tremendous possibilities. I will be glad to furnish details to any and all interested Brethren.

A notice of motion will be presented to this Grand Lodge to amend the Constitution to permit some of the income of the Fund of Benevolence to be devoted to provide scholarships to assist in furthering the education of the children of Masons. Full particulars will be available when the amendment is presented. I trust the Brethren of Grand Lodge will favour the project.

On Sunday, June 21st there will be a "Grand Master's Church Service". The Brethren will parade to Exmouth

St. United Church from the Temple for service at 3:00 p.m. The sermon will be preached by the present Grand Chaplain V.W. The Rev. George MacLean and a large turn-out is earnestly requested and hoped for by your Grand Master. This will be a good opportunity "to stand up and be counted".

In closing I wish to express my deep appreciation for the service and support given me by the Board of General Purposes, The District Deputy Grand Masters, the Past Grand Masters, the Deputy Grand Master L. W. Vincent, the Grand Secretary R.W. Bro. Lemmon, Mrs. Henderson in the Grand Secretary's Office for her tolerance of my idiosyncrasies and generous assistance and lastly but by no means least to my three faithful followers Wor. Bros. Allan, McCauley and Belyea, respectively the Senior and Junior Deacons and Director of Ceremonies of this Grand Lodge.

Report of the Grand Historian

May 28th, 1964

To The Most Worshipful The Grand Master, Officers and Members of The Grand Lodge Of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:
Brethren:

It is daily impressed upon our minds how the events in other lands affect our lives both as individuals and as members of our great fraternity. Speedy transportation both in the realms of travel and news coverage have changed vastly our way of life in recent years. Radios and television sets are now a common part of household equipment and what we see and hear by means of these affect our thinking and opinions whether we wish it or not. Also the constant blows of sound weary the brain and dull the judgment. The constant hearing of evil around us and the realization of the gradual lowering of high moral standards serve to harden our consciences to the dangers accompanying our familiarity with the changes taking place. A day beginning with sunshine and gladness is suddenly changed to one of sadness and gloom by the sharp crack of a rifle from a lofty window and one of the most promising world figures falls a bleeding victim of brutality against the knees of a brave and affectionate wife. In a moment what has happened is flashed through the imomorial regions of the clouds to a listening world. A few hours later and millions witness the murder of the murderer as distinctly by the magic of modern science as if present in the corridors of the jail.

The play bills of the movie houses display adds professing scenes of horror for the delection of the audiences the management hope to attract by these ghastly promises. An utter disregard for parental authority and an absolute lack of control on the part of the parents themselves in so large a number have brought into being a generation of delinquents from whom so much was expected to cure the ills of the past and create a better world in which to live. Brainless discordant squaling passing for music and distorted lines for pictures have had a blighting of the sense of the beautiful on the part of many particularly of the young. However there are bright indications that thoughtful people are beginning to awaken to a realization of the real state of affairs and what is needed to overcome the evils to some extent at least.

Truth is eternal though the application of it may seem to vary. This is an age of organization, overdone to some

extent, no doubt, yet at times capable of producing much good. The great youth movement known as the Order of DeMolay has been sponsored by our Board of General Purposes and has the hearty sympathy of our Most Worshipful Grand Master. This Order was conceived and organized by one of the great Masons of our age, Frank S. Land who a few months ago was called to a higher service in The Grand Lodge above. Our Board of General Purposes have now moved to sponsor The Order of DeMolay in the Jurisdiction of New Brunswick. The first Chapter in New Brunswick is in Moncton and named Coronation Chapter. The order of DeMolay has the hearty support of our present Grand Master and our Immediate Past Grand Master. The untiring efforts of Rt. Wor. Philip Drader, assisted by a small but able group of Masons and the priceless sympathy and help of the mothers of the boys, have overcome all difficulties. The boys are now allowed to hold their meetings in the Lodge Room of the Moncton Masonic Temple. Much of the opposition to the movement in Moncton seemed to come, at least at first, from those who feared we were trying to "Make young Masons". Nothing could be further from the minds of those who favored the work. It is simply an altruistic effort on the part of Masonry to give the boys at the "Gang Age" an organization that will direct their thoughts to the highest ideals of conduct. On their altar during the sessions repose The Bible and school books. At nine o'clock each meeting night work is halted; the boys kneel and lift their hearts to God on behalf of their parents. Your historian is not familiar with any other organization of youth which has as part of its regular program of meetings such a practice. Masons are welcomed at the sessions to see for themselves the fine type of boys we have on our lists and the character of the degrees. It should be remembered that for this work to prosper older men must stand behind and support and help these groups. It is not enough to assist them in getting their organization started and then leave them to themselves. In that case the movement disintegrates and disappears. Also there must be wisdom displayed; genuine help without too much interference. To get an adult group going and then leave them to carry on sometimes will work but never with boys who are growing and changing from minute to minute and nothing will kill a movement, however good, like indifference.

Our Grand Master is promoting educational ideas and other progressive plans within the Masonic scope for the general good. His scholarship committee has already been at work. Our Immediate Past Grand Master continues his

never failing interest in all our work evidenced by his frequent visits to the Lodges and generous support in every way.

We extend our heartfelt sympathy to those who have been called upon to mourn the loss of loved ones. Two well known members of them, were Archie Parlee and Jack Bottomley. Both well known to your Historian.

We have been pleased by the news of the arrival of some new members of The Royal Family safely come into the world of men, Hearty congratulations to all concerned.

The attendance upon divine worship by our lodges in a body is being carried out at this season. It is highly commended. Masons should let the world see that we reverence sacred things and should not be shy about it.

October 3rd, 1963, your Historian dedicated a beautiful altar carved from stone by the skilful hands of Bro. Henry Harrop of Sussex Lodge No. 4 and installed in the Lodge room of their new temple in Dorchester. It is a work of art as well as a sacred symbol. Our thanks and congratulations to our esteemed Brother Henry for his valuable and unique gift to the Lodge he loves so well.

Coverdale Lodge is contemplating the erection of a temple to accommodate its growing membership. Hillsborough also is seriously entertaining the same idea.

We were greatly pleased recently to see the fine writup of the Masonic career of our Rt. Wor. Bro. P:D:G:M: M. W. Dalton who has served our Grand Lodge and the Fraternity so efficiently in many ways through the years.

I was pleased to see on the notices of Frank Nickson, D:D:G:M: and others in the same office lists of the Lodges in their districts. I appreciated very much the card of invitation from Brother Nickson to accompany him on a visitation.

We note with approbation the Masons in our Jurisdiction who have been recent blood donors. A fine service to the sick.

In a recent communication in Sussex No. 4 in Dorchester where Wor. Bro. Herb Palmer received a 50-year certificate and button. Others have been given this award recently also but whose names appeared in the press have not been sent me, hearty congratulations to all.

The entire fraternity in New Brunswick join in felicitations to The Corinthian Lodge of Hampton on attaining their Hundredth Anniversary observed by them with suitable ceremony.

I am sure that there are other items well worthy of inclusion in this report which have not reached me. For this I am sorry. I thank those who have helped me during the year I would mention one who has been especially helpful in this regard, Bro. Charles N. Smith, Treasurer of Keith Lodge. At any rate both time and space for this occasion are about run out. Mention must be made, however, that the creation of The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick and The Dominion of Canada both came into being the same year, 1867, and due observance draws near. The study of history is ever important because from observing the errors of the past we may, if we heed the warning, avoid similar errors in the present. It is a stupid adolescent attitude to do otherwise.

Consider well the dictum of the old poet philosopher: "The Moving finger writes and having writ moves on nor all thy piety nor wit can cancel half a line nor all thy tears wash out one word of it."

Report of the Committee on Relations Foreign Lodges, May 28, 1964

It will be remembered, I trust, that a year ago, when your Committee were handed by our Grand Secretary an urgent appeal by The Grand Lodge of India, recently constituted, for recognition by The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, we had not, at that time, been able to investigate the situation with sufficient thoroughness to warrant our making the recommendation. Since that time we have.

India is a strange land with multitudinous religions and our committee were held up particularly with the understanding on the part of the membership there of the meaning of the words the "Great Artificer of The Universe" which they place, rightly enough, as The First of The Great Landmarks.

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren, we wish to report as follows:

1. That the Lodges composing the new Grand Lodge of India have all been constituted by one or other of the Grand Lodges of England, Scotland or Ireland. And that the landmarks recognized by them were, in each case, adopted by the Indian Lodges as they came along. For this reason, the Grand Secretary of England writes me, they had "no qualms" about the question raised by the New Brunswick Committee.

2. The three great lights when the Lodge is in session include as The Volume of The Sacred Law the Bible, The Koran of the Moslems, and two or three others. Part of the Ceremony of Opening includes "The Bringing In, "each by its proper Officer, the Volume held in reverence by each of the different faiths of the several members on their Roll. I am told that there have been cases when as many as five of these officers entered at this point in the opening ceremony each bearing his sacred volume but all believing in The Great Artificer of The Universe. We, your Committee, realize that we are building for the future and must try very hard to make no errors that will cause difficulties in time to come.

3. After most careful study we would summarize the basic principles acknowledged by all the members of the Lodges composing the New Grand Lodge:

I. A belief in The Great Artificer of The Universe will be the first and essential condition of Membership. "

II. The Three Great Lights are exhibited when the Lodge is in Session.

III. No women are admitted to membership.

IV. The Oath of membership to be made on the volume most binding to his conscience.

V. No Masonic intercourse with mixed bodies.

VI. Inculcate duties of loyalty and good citizenship.

VII. Will not countenance any act subversive to the State.

VIII. Will have no intercourse with bodies not obedient to these principles.

We feel, Most Worshipful Grand Master, that this is a time in the history of the race when we should endeavour especially to promote harmony and good will among good men and true which is one of the great objectives of the practice of Speculative Masonry.

Your Committee, therefore, in all good faith, commend the Recognition of The Grand Lodge of India.

Report of Jurisprudence Committee

R:W: Bro. Henry D. Hopkins reported on behalf of the Jurisprudence Committee that no contentious questions had been submitted to the committee.

These reports were regularly received and adopted to be entered in full in the Proceedings.

Money Grants: It was moved by R:W: Bro. L. W. Vincent, seconded by R:W: Bro. F. C. Thomas, and carried that the following grants of money be approved by Grand Lodge: For the Grand Master, \$500.00; for the Grand Historian, \$100.00 (if required); for Committee on Masonic Education \$500.00 (if required).

New Business Notices of Motion

R:W: Bro. Carl H. Jarvis gives notice that he will move or cause to be moved that Section 17 on Page 38 of the Constitution of Grand Lodge (1960 Edition) be amended by inserting the word "The" after the letters "M:W:" in the third line thereof and by substituting the letter "M" for the letter "R" in the fourth line thereof. The intent of this amendment is to entitle the Grand Master to be known as Most Worshipful The Grand Master and to entitle Past Grand Masters to be known as Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters.

V:W: Bro. Beecher D. Diamond gives notice of motion that he will move or cause to be moved that Section 1 on page 40 of the Constitution of Grand Lodge (1960) edition be amended by striking out the "Fourth Thursday in May" and substituting therefore the words "First Thursday in April". The said section will then read as follows:—

The place of holding the annual communication of Grand Lodge is the City of Saint John, and the time, the first Thursday in April.

R:W: L. W. Vincent gives notice of motion that he will move, or cause to be moved that the Constitution and General Regulations of the Grand Lodge F. & A. M. of New Brunswick relating to the Fund of Benevolence as noted on page (52) (1960) edition be amended as follows:—

(a) The following words to be added at the end of section 2:—"Subject to the award of educational scholarships."

(b) Section 3 to be deleted and the following inserted as section 3 — "This fund shall be appropriated for the relief of poor and distressed brethren and widows and orphans of deceased brethren as may be deemed worthy of assistance and also educational scholarships for children of brethren and deceased brethren; provided always that such brethren are, or such deceased brethren at the time of their decease were registered and in good standing on the roll of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, with the sole exception that Grand Lodge may order and direct that an amount not to exceed twenty-five per centum of the unexpended balance of income of the fund in any year be transferred to the credit of The Grand Lodge account of general purposes."

(c) A new section to be known as section (4) shall be enacted to read as follows:— The Grand Master shall appoint for each year a committee consisting of three brethren in good standing on the roll of the Grand Lodge of

New Brunswick to be known as the Scholarship Selection Committee which shall award for the year for which they are appointed such number of educational scholarships as the Board of General Purposes determine are to be available for that year. Any scholarship so awarded shall be paid by the Grand Lodge in such manner as may be deemed advisable.

R:W: Bro. Jarvis regularly moved the adoption of a resolution in accordance with the notice of motion in respect to awarding the title of the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Past Grand Masters which was seconded by Wor. Bro. E. B. Ross. The vote being called the Most Worshipful Grand Master declared the motion carried. Henceforth the title of the Grand Master shall be — Most Worshipful The Grand Master and the title of Past Grand Masters shall be Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters.

V:W: Bro. B. L. Diamond regularly moved the adoption of resolution in accordance with the notice of motion in respect to a proposed change of the date of holding the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge as outlined above. Wor. Bro. C. P. Nisseu seconded this motion, which upon being put to vote was declared by the Most Worshipful The Grand Master to be "lost".

R:W: L. W. Vincent regularly moved the adoption of resolution in accordance with the notice of motion in respect to an amendment of an addition to the Constitution to provide for educational scholarships from the Fund of Benevolence as outlined in detail on the agenda. Most Worshipful Past Grand Master, A. S. Robinson seconded the motion and explanations were submitted. The vote having been called the Most Worshipful The Grand Master declared the motion carried.

DEMOLAY FOR BOYS

The Most Worshipful, The Grand Master requested Bro. S. B. Cassidy to address Grand Lodge in respect to support of the movement for DeMolay chapters for boys in this jurisdiction. Bro. Cassidy outlined the success of this movement generally and the accomplishment at present in New Brunswick and at the conclusion presented 8 honorary certificates to members of the fraternity, of which the Most Worshipful The Grand Master was a recipient.

Motion by M:W: P:G:M: Pearson seconded by M:W: P:G:M: Hoyt and adopted that Grand Lodge recess until 8:00 p.m. when the first order of business will be the election of Grand Lodge Officers.

The customary banquet under the auspices of the Entertainment Committee of Grand Lodge was a capacity audience in the banquet hall of the Masonic Temple at 6:00 p.m.

The special speaker for the occasion was Most Worshipful Brother H. L. Martyn, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario. His address on "Masonry in the World of to-day" was received with enthusiasm and sincerely appreciated.

GRAND LODGE RESUMES (Evening Session)

Grand Lodge resumed labor at 8:00 p.m. The Credential Committee submitted their final report and the Most Worshipful The Grand Master expressed the appreciation of Grand Lodge to the members of the Committee for their labor.

The Grand Secretary was instructed to read the portion of the Constitution referring to the election of Grand Lodge Officers and the Most Worshipful the Grand Master appointed the D:D:G:M.'s as scrutineers, who were duly sworn.

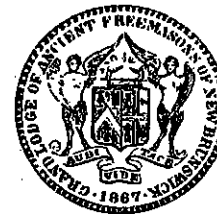

Of the District Deputy Grand Masters

McNair, Junior Warden; Rt. W. Bro. Warren Maxwell, Chaplain, V.W. Bro. Jas Murray, Treasurer; Rt. W. Bro. M. S. Speight, Senior Deacon; V.W. Bro. A. Wheaton, Junior Deacon; V.W. Bro. Francis Nickson, Senior Steward; V.W. Bro. Lloyd Dougherty, Junior Steward; V.W. Bro. W. J. Gaynor, Director of Ceremonies. We were pleased to have you, Sir, with us as well as Rt. W. Bro. Lemmon and other officers of Grand Lodge including Rt. W. Bro. R. Pearson and Rt. W. Bro. W. J. Summerville acting as members of the Ritual Committee, all of whom by their wise and constructive remarks added to the worth of the evening.

On February 20th, I was invited to preside over the installation of the Worshipful Master and Officers of Ashlar Lodge and it was a pleasure to accede to this request.

During my official visits and also on other occasions when I visited the various Lodges, I witnessed a great deal of degree work and find that it is uniform and quite satisfactory. There is a great interest and desire amongst the Worshipful Masters and officers to perfect the work. This is certainly most commendable and I believe that the officers

throughout the District are to be highly congratulated but I think that some of the credit must go to the Past Grand Lodge Officers who keep a sharp eye on this phase of our duties and particular credit should go to my predecessors, the past District Deputies of recent years, who instilled the desire for improvement in the minds of the officers and brethren.

Tweedie Lodge No. 41 of Moncton joined in the exchange of visits and visited Albert Lodge No. 34 at Albert in December, presenting a 60 year jewel to Mr. Archibald M. Downing, a member of Tweedie and former member of Albert.

I am indebted to the Lodges from outside District No. 7 who co-operated in an effort to make the program of visitations a success.

I have made an official visit to each Lodge in the district during the year, as well as other informal visits to each Lodge. It is with great regret that I report that on the whole enthusiasm for Masonry has not increased in the District during the year and during my term of office as District Deputy Grand Master. I am at a loss to make any concrete suggestion to improve this condition.

I can only say that the officers and particularly masters, do not fully realize the great influence they can bring to bear upon a Lodge, and fail to seek, and to recognize when they appear, opportunities to make their meetings of greater interest.

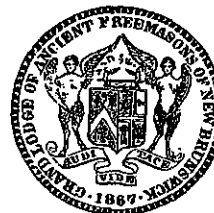
