ANNUAL MEETING

May 12, 1967, Saint John, N.B.

The meeting was called to order at the hour appointed by the President, R:W: Brother Alexander Buchanan, Deputy Grand Master.

R:W: Brother M. W. Dalton, Grand Treasurer, presented and read a statement of the Corporation's accounts for the past year, copies of which had been previously distributed to the Brethren present. This statement set forth the receipts and expenditures of General Account, Fund of Benevolence, Regalia Account and Liability Insurance Account. The Grand Treasurer's Statement had previously been considered and adopted by the Board of Directors of the Grand Lodge Corporation.

The Benediction

OUR HERITAGE

There are moments in every man's life when he is called upon to contribute something to his fellowmen. Some are more fortunate than others, in that they are called upon to make their contribution at a very great and important occasion. This is the position I find myself today. To have been chosen at this particular time to be your Grand Chaplain, and have the honour of conducting this Service and giving you this message, is one that fills me with awe and humility.

It is inevitable that when one celebrates an anniversary, the tendency is to look back to the, "The rock whence ye are hewn, and to the pit whence ye are digged." as the prophet Isaiah says in the 51 st. chapter of his prophecy. Let us then, on this 100th anniversary of the founding of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, do this very thing, look back on our heritage, not collectively but as individuals.

There is a common tendency today to write off the past, to say that it does not matter, that it is the future that is all important. True, it does not matter so much where we have been or what we have been, as it matters where we are now, what we are now, and where we are going. What we will become is the most important of all. Let us never lose sight however of the importance of our past, let us never lose sight of the lessons to be learned from our history.

James Michener in his book "The Source", makes this observation, that it is the fact that the Jew is so conscious of his history that has enabled him to survive as a people, without the benefit of a country, against persecution greater than any other race has ever endured. This is something for us to remember. When we think of some of the mighty peoples of the past, who lived only for the day and the selfish future, and have gone back into the dust from whence they sprang with no trace or remembrance of them left among men, yet the Jews still remain a mighty people, exerting a tremendous influence on the world around us.

When we talk of our Masonic Heritage, how far do we go? Do we go back fondly in our minds to the great brethren of the past whom we revere? Those who have for a time taken the trowel and the other working tools in their hands, and have laid stone upon stone to build our Masonic edifice. Let us remember that we always remain an E.A., a F.C., and a M.M., no matter how far we go in Masonry. In the construction of our own moral edifice, we need many times to take in hand the tools of even an E.A., to break off the rough and superfluous parts of the Rough Ashler that is ourselves, before it can be fitted with nicety into the perfection of the Masonic Edifice. We need to take in hand again and again, the plumb, square and level to see that it is not an eyesore or out of place in the structure. We need to take in hand again and again the trowel to spread the cement of brotherly love, that unites us into one common mass. Yes, we can look upon many such Masons, this is part of our Heritage.

Then we look back on many brethren, who for a time have laid aside the working tools, and have been for a time exalted above his fellows, for the purpose of drawing designs upon the trestle-board for the guidance and the future of the Craft. These designs must be in accordance with, and within the capabilities of the working tools of Masonry or else they are but dreams that have no practicality. It is vital to look continually to the days and the obligations when we were E.A., and F.C., to the practical application of the working tools so that the plans are well and truly laid.

I am sure that all of you here have in your mind some Mason who has been all these things, and has contributed greatly to our Order. No doubt this brother has looked back many times to other worthy brothers who have gone before. The glorious tale can never be fully told. It is vividly expressed in Gray's "Elegy", "Full many a flower is born to blush unseen and waste its sweetness in the desert air."

Now let us go back to 100 years ago today. Masonry did not start in New Brunswick with the formation of a Grand Lodge. No there were many devout and energetic Masons carrying on the building of our edifice under the authority of the parent Grand Lodge, to whom they gave allegiance and fidelity, until the time was ripe for a new age, ripe for independence, and so upon the trestle-board of Masonry the designs for a new structure, the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick were drawn.

The historical record of this great event must be left to the historians to do it full justice, but I would like to draw your attention to one great fact that is almost unique with Masonry. Independence was gained wih much joy, help and encouragement from the parent body. This is seldom found in any other of man's associations with his brethren. Man too often struggles and uses coercion upon his less fortunate brethren, to enforce subservience and servility that brings final disaster to both. This points to a grand Masonic ideal, that independence is not divorced from inter-dependence upon each other.

Shall we go back still farther, to the Grand Lodge of England, celebrating their 250th. anniversary this year? Let us think of all those brethren, high and low, rich and poor, who have added their skills to the Masonry of today. Let us go back still farther, to those free and independent bands of craftsmen, who by using the hands and intelligence God gave them, wrought in both operative and speculative Masonry. Those men who left their mark upon the earth in the form of great cathedrals, churches and guild-halls that are the glory of Europe and indeed the heritage of all man-kind.

We are now back far enough to see one of the great land-marks of our profession. One that I am sure is of the greatest importance to our Craft, indeed to all man-kind, and so I am going to dwell on it briefly, the importance of freedom in the eyes of those early craftsmen.

When an E.A., knocks at the door, he is asked among other things, "By what right or benefit does he expect to obtain this important privilge?" You all know the answer, "By being a free man of good report well recommended". The first important thing then is that he must be free. If he is not, the door is closed. This may seem harsh treatment, especially if his freedom or lack of it, is beyond his control, but our ancient brethren knew that mans highest achievements could only be obtained by man being free. He could not devote his energy and his skill to the full measure if he was another man's slave. He could not put his own being into his work if that being belonged to another. No man can accomplish his true destiny unless he is free to do so.

Secondly, no man could be made a mason with divided loyalties. What man can serve two masters? He could not serve the master of his lodge if some other had a claim upon him. No man must be accepted who could by pressure being placed upon him, undermine the Order or lower the standard of the work. Our fore-fathers saw this and insisted upon it, that their skill and their art could have free expression. What they accomplished in architecture and construction has never been equalled.

Could the pattern of our moral edifice have been built upon a more glorious foundation than this of our Masonic ancestors? It is an Heritage of great value. What our ancestors saw in the possibilities of man being free in the building of material things, is the echo of what God saw when He breathed into man's nostrils the breath of life and he became a living soul, that he might achieve his glorious destiny to become even the sons of God, even though in so doing. He had to give man the freedom to chose the evil.

Now we have reached the bed-rock of our Heritage, the freedom of man. The rest of creation, whether of animal or vegetable, can but blindly obey and fulfil its blind destiny. Man alone can climb to unknown heights, man alone can find true expression and dignity because God made him free, free even to say "No" to God. With what anguish the Divine Creator must witness from time to time, what the ruthless hand of ignorance and the devastations of war has laid waste, not only in material things, but in the lives of millions of our brethren, made like us in the image of God.

True, God saw the danger, it is implied in the story of the Garden of Eden, but God considered the freedom of man to be worth such a price as to limit His own Divine Authority, by creating his capable of defying Him. What tremendous value God has placed on the freedom of man.

Now as we stand on the threshold of another century, both in our Masonic and National life, one can almost imagine God brooding over us even as He did at the time of Creation. At that time God roused Himself, "The Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters and God said 'Let there be light' and there was light." Pray God that this light be never extinguished by the folly of man.

In the years ahead, as we draw designs upon our several trestleboards, let us continually keep before us our true Heritage, that we are made in the image of God, freemen with a destiny to fulfil, our bodies the tabernacle of the soul. Let us never be afraid to use upon ourselves. in the shaping of our lives, all the instruments of Free-masonry indiscrimin ately. Then we shall know the real joy of being true partners with God, freely giving our talents to build the designs upon His trestle-board as a labour of love.

As our ancient brethren saw, when they demanded that a man must be free before he could give the labour of love so necessary for the high standard of the Craft and the work they had in mind, so it is the same labour of love from man made free, that builds the high moral quality so essentially necessary to his gaining admission to the presence of God within that undiscovered country from whose bourne no travellers returns.

The M:W: The Grand Master expressed the appreciation of the Brethren to V:W: Grand Chaplain for his Service of Dedication and his inspiring address.

In March of this year I was again invited to attend a combined banquet of Shriners and Knights of Columbus at St. Thomas College in Fredericton. Over 400 were at this gathering. My remarks to them were on Masonry, its purpose and what it was not.

I regret I was unable to attend the Grand Masters Conference of Canadian Grand Masters in Toronto in February and also the Grand Masters Conference in Washington due to changes in Annual Meeting dates of the Company with whom I am employed.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation of the DD GM'S who held district meetings during their term of office. These meetings are most important to all our subordinate Lodges as this is the only way in which we can improve our ritual to a greater degree of perfection. Your Grand Lodge ritual committee has spent many hours to eliminate errors in our ritual and a new revised edition of the ritual has been printed and is available from the Grand Secretary. I was very pleased that your ritual committee was able to attend these district meetings. Their assistance and teachings were appreciated by all in attendance. Each DD GM should organize and hold these meetings at least twice every year in their respective districts. I would recommend to the Board of General Purposes having proper instructional kits provided with attache cases for each DD GM — these to be returned to Grand Lodge at the expiration of his term of office.

I would also recommend that each DD GM endeavour to have all subordinate Lodges form a ritual committee of young interested Masons in each of these Lodges.

I have noticed that in quite a few of the Lodges I have visited this past year that the directive sent to all Lodges in July 1962 by the Grand Secretary that the burning tapers in some cases are not used at all. In others incorrectly placed. The lowering of regular lights during the ritual is not being carried out. This is important to the impression which the candidate receives and I would suggest the DD GM's see that this is carried out in all the subordinate Lodges of their respective districts.

It is my sincere hope that your Grand Lodge Ritual Committee will continue to show the interest that has been shown over the past two years and that they will carry on and attend all Distict meetings and point out the proper manner in which our ritual should be practiced.

The Board of General Purposes again gave approval to the committee on Masonic Scholarships. Wor. Bro. John B. McNair, P. G. M. Arthur S. Robinson and P. G. M. Henry D. Hopkins. Many applications again were received. After much difficulty, your Committee selected and awarded 6 scholarships.

The order of DeMolay still has the support of the Board of General Purposes. I have no report on any new Chapters being formed. I have urged the Lodges where additional Chapters might be formed to take an active part in this important work.

This 100 Anniversary Grand Lodge meeting finds a change in dates for our Annual Communication. It is my sincere hope that the brethren will find it more convenient and that we will have the largest attendance in Grand Lodge History. In my visits, I have pointed out that every Lodge in our jurisdiction should have representation at all our Grand Lodge meetings.

To my D.G.M. R. W. Brother Alexander Buchanan I wish to express my sincere appreciation for his assistance, both in Grand Lodge and the Board of General Purposes, also on the many occasions wherein he acted as my representative in many lodge installations, also on the occasion of the Grand Masters Conference at Toronto. His personal work in providing a hand wrought engrossed receptacle for the Grand Master's sword for Grand Lodge, is most appreciated.

While grateful to the many Grand Lodge officers and Past Masters who turned out in large numbers, for their presence and assistance on my visits to subordinate Lodges, I deeply appreciate their loyality. I am especially indebted to the M.W. P.G.M. C. D. Dickison for his advice, cooperation and personal assistance during my term as your Grand Master. While expenses in connection with our Centennial Communication will be heavy, our finances again in 1967 are in a healthy state, due mainly to the care exercised over the years by our Grand Treasurers.

STATE OF ORDER

I do not believe that Masonic progress can be measured in terms of membership alone. Numbers alone do not indicate the strength of our Order in this Province, but any organization must add good members to replace its natural losses, or its usefulness may suffer. I am pleased to report that in many of our Lodges applications to join our Order are being received in large numbers. We should be seriously concerned in making real masons of those we receive into our Lodges. Is Masonry to have a part in helping to build a better world in this second century of our Grand Lodge in New Brunswick and in the world? Masonry must somehow find its place and take an active part by assisting in some way to bring our Order into the forefront. Speculative Masonry can become operative by being co-operative in its spirit, labour and efforts and thus make effective the spirit of unity and purpose as an influence for making good will among men throughout the Universe.

It is still my opinion that Freemasonry has had a wonderful past in the century just closed but it also has a challenging future. Our fraternity is one of good deeds, charitable activities and develops sincere friendships and because of these wholesome facets, Masonry will continue to progress.

During the past number of years, we have heard the many supposed ills of our Craft and have proposed changes that should be made if we expect better attendance at all our Lodge meetings. We have been told that we must catch up with the twentieth cen-

tury methods; even though these methods may be contrary to the ancient usages and established customs of the Fraternity. In short they have been trying to tell us what is wrong with Freemasonry. Brethren there is nothing wrong with Freemasonry, though there are many things wrong with some Masons, yes all too many freemasons. As Freemasons "It is time we were making up our minds what it is we came here to do" If we are here for the noble purpose we once proclaimed so readily then we must face the sobering fact that our assignment is the improvement of ourselves, not freemasonry.

We must never forget that the Lodge is never a place. It is always a group of men. It is never just a sacred building. It is always a believing assembly. Every Lodge is a group of dedicated men, meeting together as men of like minds in a common purpose to select men of good character and strive to make them better. Looking to the future of the Craft, we all have some concern because of apathy and indifference that exist in many cases of our jurisdictions. We are rapidly approaching new problems. We seem to be satisfied to carry on as we have for years in the past, following the same pattern, offering nothing new and giving little in the way of suggestions and directions.

Masonry has survived over a hundred years in this jurisdiction by standing firm on its rules and principles. It may be that where we have been remiss is in our own failings to promulgate these principles vigorously. It is up to our Lodge Masters to see that our beloved fraternity has new luster and strength.

I do not leave the office of Grand Master reluctantly as I am now in a better position to aid and assist you than heretofore. Your friendship always is the reward of my labor. The Lodge program always will be for our refreshment. As we depart upon the square and have acted by the plumb. It is on the level I salute you. I am proud to state that generally our Order in this Province is sound, attractive and highly respected. We may not be progressing the way we would wish, but there is no reason for alarm as the zeal and enthusiasm is of high level in the face of the challenge to maintain quality, rather than give way to panic and throw discreet selection to the winds. Let me say to you in conclusion that I count myself favoured to have been granted the rewarding privilege of serving this truly beloved Fraternity as your Grand Master.



REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, 1967

Most Worshipful The Grand Master, Officers and Members of The Grand Masonic Lodge of New Brunswick:

This must necessarily be my last report as The Grand Historian of the Grand Masonic Lodge of New Brunswick. I was first appointed to this office by my successor in office as The Grand Master of New Brunswick, most Worshipful Brother Donald C. Malcolm, M. D., and since his time appointed by each succeeding Grand Master, down to and including our present Grand Master Most Worshipful Brother Perley Everitt Roy, who has been the soul of courtesy and kindness for which I thank him. To The Grand Secretary also, R. W. A. C. Lemmon who has faithfully included my annual reports in the Proceedings of The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, I offer my sincere and hearty thanks. I am grateful also to the many who have been of great assistance to me by sending notes of items, which were deemed of sufficient interest and importance to be included in the annual reports.

I consider the work of the Grand Historian to be important because by perusing reports of current events, we may avoid future errors and see opportunities for service in days to come.

It has indeed been an honor and a privilege to have served the Grand Lodge in this capacity and I am deeply thankful to all concerned. But the passing of the years has also meant the approach at last of old age with its accompanying weaknesses. Therefore, I submit my resignation and ask the Grand Master to accept it and to relieve me of further duties in connection with this work. To my successor in office, whoever he may be, I offer him my hearty congratulations, with the hope that he may enjoy the work as I have.

My system has been simply this: I installed in my home a set of metal files in which I arranged compartments, one for each Lodge in the jurisdiction, suitably numbered and, as items pertaining to the Lodges reached me, they were filed, each in it's little home for reference when the time come to write the annual report. The material in those files should be of assistance to the historian who will now assume office, and is available to him. There is a wealth of material in those files and I hope it will not be allowed to go to waste.

This is Centennial Year and our Dominion of Canada and our Grand Lodge of N. B. both came into being in that year, — 1867. The various lodges in our province have been asked to choose some appropriate project to mark this historic time. Our Grand Lodge has already begun work by an able committee on it's own special project — the writing and publishing of a book entitled "Freemasonry in New Brunswick". I highly commend their choice. Success to them!

To all who have been called upon to mourn the loss of loved ones during the Masonic Year and to the fraternity, I extend my heartfelt sympathy and condolences.

I congratulate our Most Worshipful Grand Master, Perley Everitt Roy, on his very successful term of office in the Grand East.

I was privileged to assist R. Wor. Bent Skidmore in the installation of the Wor. Master and Officers of Keith Lodge, No. 23, for the ensuing year. I also attended the first meeting presided over by the new Master, after his installation. A presentation was made to Bro. Charles Neil Smith, retiring Treasurer of the Lodge. He is succeeded in office by Wor. Bro. Vaughn Scott. The presentation was made by Wor. Bro. G. D. Allan. This was followed by an unusual and happy event. There were present at this communication five Masons, each over four score years of age: Wor. Bro. Dr. Harry S. Thomson, Wor. Bro. W. R. Rodd, Bro. Peter Davidson, Bro. Sidney J. Horton, Tyler of the Lodge, and P. G. M. Dr. A. S. Robinson. Each was called upon to stand and to offer a few remarks. After the meeting the brethren retired to the banquet room for refreshments, where each of the five was presented with a beautiful Centennial plate by Wor. Bro. Vaughn Scott.

Zetland Lodge is to be congratulated for acquiring their fine new carpet dedicated by the Grand Master, November 10, 1966; and Albion had their new gold regalia dedicated on Installation Night, December 27, 1966.

The year 1966 has been one crowded with incidents of Masonic note. Some of sad impact as well as those of more cheer-ful character.

Saturday, July 9, 1966 Lebanon Lodge, Sackville, lost one of its Past Masters of life-long membership in the person of Wor. Brother H. M. Wood, who passed Saturday July 9, at the age of 89. He had celebrated his birthday on May 10th.

On the evening of Wednesday, June 10th, The Corinthian Lodge honored Worshipful Bro. Carl Patterson, who in that month was looking forward to celebrating his 90th birthday, the oldest member of The Lodge. The secretary, Wor. Bro. James Humphrey wrote me an excellent report of the evening's proceedings and commented, "not often can a lodge gather to enjoy such an occasion." Very true, indeed!

The New Brunswick Lodge No. 22 celebrated the 100th anniversary of it's founding February 8, 1966.

Annual Church Services have been observed by the lodges. It has been so arranged that all in the jurisdiction have been able to join in this act of worship.

The Grand Master dedicated the new quarters of Howard Lodge, June 11, 1966.

J. H. Norton, Honorary Member of Keith Lodge and prominent C. N. R. official, died June 20, 1966.

The Lodges extend sincere and deep sympathy to P. G. M. C. D. Dickison and family on the death of his son and partner in business.

The passing of Rt. Wor. Roy E. Crawford ended an outstanding career in Free Masonry, 60 years of intense active service to the fraternity. His son Prof. W. J. H. Crawford, of Mt. Allison is following in the footsteps of his illustrious father and is proving a pillar of strength to Lebanon Lodge.

Several Lodges in the St. John area include in their monthly notices, paragraphs urging their members to render support to the fine youth movement on the part of the Order of Demolay.

District Meetings were held and proved both helpful and instructive.

Our Scholarships are again being offered for the encouragement of our young people seeking university training.

Sussex No. 4 met with a great loss in the death of R. Wor. S. David Robinson, Oct. 21, 1966. He was a loyal supporter and a great help in every worthwhile activity of his lodge.

A FURTHER HISTORY NOTE

At noon, Sunday March 5, 1967, our country from coast to coast was shocked and saddened by the news of the passing of our Governor-General, Georges Philias Vanier. A great funeral service was held in the Basilica March 8 after which the coffin containing his body was taken to the union station whence, by rail, it was conveyed to Quebec City for further religious ceremonies Thursday March 9th to be buried in the spring. This ended the earthly career of a great and loyal Canadian. The members of our fraternity, I am sure, mourn with his family, and our citizens everywhere in this sad hour.

All this brings up-to-date with these history notes.

May The Great Architect of the Universe bless and keep you all both as individuals and as a fraternity.

Powers, Grand Master of Alberta, addressed the Grand Lodge and on behalf of the brethren of Alberta on this Centennial occasion presented to the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick a set of 3 Gavels, hand wrought, enclosed in a suitable case and properly inscribed. This gift was gratefully acknowledged by Most Worshipful The Grand Master.

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master, on behalf of Grand Lodge, expressed the appreciation to the special Centennial Committee in providing the Centennial Medallions which have been distributed to all who have registered at Grand Lodge. Also, for the Souvenir Plates commemorating our 100th Anniversary which have been made available to members of the Fraternity. Another Centennial Project has been the installation of a Voice Fortification System which has improved the reception in the Masonic Temple quarters.

CENTENNIAL LODGE

The Right Worshipful Grand Secretary presented the following petition:

"To the M:W: Grand Master of the Ancient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:"

"We, the undersigned, being regular registered masons of the lodges mentioned against our respective names, having the prosperity of the craft at heart, are anxious to exert our best endeavors to promote and diffuse the genuine principles of the art; and for the conveniency of our respective dwellings and other good reasons, we are desirous of forming a new lodge to be named "CENTENNIAL" in consequence of this desire, we pray for a warrant of constitution empowering us to meet as a regular lodge at OROMOCTO, in the county of SUNBURY, on the second Monday of every month, and there to discharge the duties of masonry, in a constitutional manner, according to the forms of the order and the laws of the Grand Lodge; and we have nominated and do recommend Worshipful Brother STANLEY WINS-LOW BROWN to be the first master, brother HARVEY EDWIN FINLEY to be the first senior warden, and brother GREGORY EDMOND COLLINS to be the first junior warden of the said lodge. The prayer of this petition being granted we promise strict obedience to the commands of the Grand Master and the laws and regulations of the Grand Lodge." (Signatures of 35 petitioners attached).

The Very Worshipful District Deputy Grand Master, E. G. Perkins, addressed the Grand Lodge, recommending that the petition be granted, and on motion duly adopted, the request was referred to the incoming Grand Master and his advisory board for favorable consideration and action thereon.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Grand Secretary announced that invitations for this Centennial Convocation had been extended to a number of Grand Lodge jurisdictions and was pleased to note that all jurisdictions in Canada (excepting Manitoba) were represented at this meeting; that the United Grand Lodge of England was represented by the District Grand Master of Newfoundland. The Grand Lodge of Scotland was represented by the District Grand Master of Newfoundland. Present also were delegates of a number of New England jurisdictions of the U. S. A. All are listed elsewhere in these Proceedings.

Pearson and adopted that the customary grant of \$500.00 be allotted to the M:W: Grand Master; that the number and amount of Scholarship Awards for 1967 be referred to the Board of General Purposes for their consideration, and further, that in accord with Constitution and General Regulations page 52, section 3, an amount not to exceed twenty five percentum of the unexpended balance of income of the Fund of Benevolence be transferred to the credit of the Grand Lodge account of general purposes. This latter amount to assist in defraying exceptional expenses of this Centennial session.

Following announcement that the customary Banquet would be held in the Banquet Hall at 6:00 p.m., a motion to recess was adopted whereby Grand Lodge would resume at 10.00 a.m. on Saturday, May 13th, when the first order of business would be the presentation of nominations for the elective offices.

An overflow audience repaired to the Banquet Hall at 6.00 p.m. and under the auspices of the Entertainment Committee of Grand Lodge a program was enjoyed. M:W: Thomas S. Roy Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts; a native of the Province of New Brunswick; as well as an Uncle of our presiding Grand Master, M:W: Perley E. Roy, was introduced as the special speaker for this occasion. His address on the Principles of Freemasonry as applied to our every day living, was most inspiring and constructive. The reception and applause of the gathering is a small token of gratitude to this eminent brother of the Fraternity, who has so graciously accorded us the benefits of his association and knowledge on many occasions.

Excuses were presented on behalf of M:W:P:G:M: Arthur S. Robinson and the R:W:D:G:M: J. Stewart Brooks.

The Grand Secretary read the foregoing Proclamation calling together this Especial Communication.

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master welcomed the brethren and explained that this Especial Communication had been called for the purpose of commemorating the events leading up to the formation and institution of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick which took place on October 9th and 10th, 1867. It was at that Communication when the several lodges then existing in the Province of New Brunswick under the jurisdiction of several Grand Lodges did by resolution, declare themselves to be "The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick", and further, that upon proceeding with the election of officers, M:W: Benjamin Lester Peters was duly elected by acclamation to be the Most Worshipful The Grand Master together with other Grand Lodge Officers. Also, at that meeting arrangements were made for consecrating the Grand Lodge and installing the Grand Masterelect, which subsequently were completed on January 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 1868.

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master called Grand Lodge to order and requested Most Worshipful Past Grand Master F. C. Thomas to proceed to the altar and all present repeated responsively the Entered Apprentice obligation in expression of re-dedication.

Special Centennial Certificates had been provided for candidates initiated during 1967 and fifty of these brethren being present, were escorted to the Grand East and personally made the recipients of this memorial.

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master announced that he desired an open forum to discuss selected topics relative to our Masonic improvement and several papers had been prepared by Grand Lodge officers to further this suggestion. Also, that while free discussion was encouraged, there would not be any resolutions entertained, and the overall results would be under advisement for future action.

V:W: District Deputy Grand Master, I. Dale Steeves, introduced the first topic "The Desirability of so-called 'Public Installation of Officers of Subordinate Lodges'". This subject was debated by R:W: Bro. W. J. Bambury (No. 2), M:W: Bro. F. C. Thomas (No. 3), M:W: Bro. C. D. Dickison (No. 17), R:W: Bro. C. R. Bateman (No. 24), V:W: Bro. Rev. K. Legassick (No. 13) and Wor. Bro. B. A. Mitton (No. 52). M:W:P:G:M: H. D. Hopkins introduced the second topic "Concurrent Jurisdiction" which was freely discussed in the remarks of Wor. Bro. J. S. Humphrey (No. 13), Wor. Bro. L. G. Donald (No. 23) and R:W: Bro. W. J. Bambury (No. 2). Topic number three "Lodge Attendance" was introduced by V:W: District Deputy Grand Master J. B. Flewelling, and suggestions were submitted and summarized very eloquently by our V:W: Grand Chaplain, Rev. K. Legassick.

V:W: Bro. T. L. Banks, District Deputy Grand Master, presented topic number four "Suggestions for improvement of Officers of Subordinate Lodges" which was received with enthusiastic support. M:W:P:G: M. J. S. Hoyt under topic number five outlined changes recommended in the conducting of Masonic Funeral Services to meet present day situations, which were discussed and enlarged upon.

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master expressed appreciation to the brethren who had prepared the various topics and to the brethren for their fair and frank acceptance of the agenda. While it was to be noted that Grand Lodge would recess to meet in Moncton Masonic Temple on Sunday, October 15, 1967, the brethren were requested to attend a buffet luncheon and entertainment which had been provided under the auspices of the Senior Grand Deacon, Wor. Bro. R. B. Dick and his committee, and to which the ladies of the brethren were invited.

Grand Lodge by resolution, recessed at 5:10 p.m. to resume in the Masonic Temple, Moncton, N.B., at 2:00 p.m. Sunday, October 15, 1967. An evening of refreshment and entertainment was enjoyed by the brethren and their ladies.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 15, 1967

Grand Lodge resumed labor at 2:00 p.m. in the Masonic Temple, Moncton, N.B., the Most Worshipful William John Summerville, The Grand Master, in the Grand East. The Most Worshipful The Grand Master announced that Grand Lodge assisted by the brethren of the fraternity would attend Divine Service at Saint John's United Church, Moncton, at 3:00 p.m. and the Worshipful Grand Director of Ceremonies was ordered to form procession to parade to the Church aforementioned. Approximately 650 of the brethren composed the procession, assisted by the local Pipe Band. All districts of the Grand Lodge jurisdiction were represented. On arrival at the Church, participation in the following service was observed.

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ANNIVERSARY SERMON

October 15, 1967 St. John's Church Moncton, N.B.

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First I would like to say how grateful and honoured I feel to have been asked by the Grand Master to speak to you on this historic occasion. Also to thank Dr. Archibald for his kindness and hospitality. This is an historic occasion in our lives, in our Masonic lives, to be assembled here in this house of God for the purpose of worshipping God. If any one is gathered here to be seen of men or for any other purpose than to give God thanks and praise for all His mercies, then he is unworthy of his high calling, unworthy of Masonry.

It is very significant that the dedication of the Grand Lodge of N.B. should have taken place at this time of the year, as this anniversary service shows, or is it another example of the great care that the founders of our Grand Lodge had for our beloved institution? In our Masonic lives we often allude to the Temple built by Solomon, and our Masonic life has been built upon the same principles that governed the architecture and erection of that splendid building, so first of all I would draw your attention to a few facts of that great building.

In the first Book of Kings, chap. 6 v 1, we read, "And it came to pass in the 480th year after the children of Israel came out of the land of Egypt, in the 4th year of Solomon's reign, in the month of Zif, which is the second month, that he began to build the House of the Lord." Now this month of Zif correspondes with our May, April being counted as the first month, so the Temple was begun in the month of May, 976 B.C. or 2934 years ago. It is interesting to note that our 100th anniversary celebrations began in May of this year in Saint John, the month that saw the beginning of the Temple. The Temple was completed according to the 38th verse of this same chapter, in the month of Bul, which is the 8th month, (November) in the 11th year of Solomon's reign, so was he 7 years in the building of it. Seven years and seven months to be exact.

If we turn to the 8th chapter of the first Book of Kings, we find that the Temple was dedicated in the month of Ethamin, our October, on the following year. Now I think we should look into why the Temple's dedication was delayed 11 months from the time of its completion, Israel's whole life depended on agriculture, and her whole system geared to agricultural conditions. Ethamin was known as the month of the Perpetual Waters, that is, it is the last month of the dry season. You know that at certain times of the year in the East, no rain falls at all, so this month of the perpetual waters, was the month when the only streams and water supplies still running were those not depending on surface water, but on the perpetual sources far beneath the surface of the earth. The following month Bul (November) when the Temple was finished, the rains came again. Now anyone who has farmed will tell you that it is impossible to plow after a prolonged drought, the ground becomes iron hard, so when the rains began to soften the earth, all the men of Israel would be scattered far and wide over all the length and breadth of the land to ready the ground for seed time. There would be no respite from the toils of farming until the last of the harvest would be gathered in, which took place early in the month of Ethanim (Oct.) when the grapes were finally brought to the wine-press. Then followed a period of ease, then the most important feast of the Hebrew year took place, the Feast of the Tabernacles, on the full moon in October, when all the men of Israel gathered together in Jerusalem for a great religious festival of thanksgiving to God for all His mercies. This has come down to us in the form of our annual Harvest Festivals, and national thanksgivings at this time of the year.

We can see by this, why the Temple's dedication had to wait 11 months, until the men of Israel could all be gathered together in this sacred spot, at this particular time of great rejoicing, this feast of thanksgiving, to join, become a part of this great dedication service.

I have wondered myself if this delay would have been necessary but for the confusion that arose over the death of our ancient Grand Master, Hiram Abill, I feel sure that the efficiency which is displayed in the erection of the Temple, the organization of the time and manpower, did not allow for a lapse of almost a year for its dedication, but was scheduled for the previous year. This crime, forbidden alike by the laws of God and man, so disrupted things in the construction of the Temple, that a whole year was lost in its service to God and man. As it was, the Temple was dedicated on the day of the full moon of October 2926 years ago.

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It is not improbable that this day of our Lord, October 15, 1967, could be the very day, for we are very near the full of this October moon and we are gathered here in this Temple of God, to rededicate our Masonic Edifice to the glory of God, even as our Hebrew brethren were gathered 2926 years ago today. Does it not give you a thrill to realize the significance of this? That is why I said at the beginning, that it could easily be the wisdom of our founders 100 years ago, to chose this very day for their dedication.

Can you not picture in your mind of how this past week, 2926 years ago the roads around Jerusalem were filled with 1,000s of men, wending their way toward this great festival, even as you have wended your way here today. You have travelled in ease and comfort, travelling in a couple of hours what it took our ancient brethren a week or more to travel on foot, let us trust that the ease and comfort of your present journey does not detract one whit from the dedication of your hearts on this great occasion. Sometimes I am afraid, the ease with which we obtain the blessings and priviliges of our modern life detract from our appreciation of them. I feel sure that the long journey that the more remote inhabitants of Israel made that day, enhanced rather than detracted from the devotion they felt to Almighty God for the great blessings they had received during the year past, and for the great privilige they were to take part in that day.

This 8th chapter of the first Book of Kings is one of the greatest in the O.T. and marks the high point of Solomon's reign. From this time on he went from strength to strength as far as material things were concerned, but he never exceeded, nor even attained again, the high spiritual magnificence of this sublime moment of his prayer for Israel. When we cantemplate the magnificence of the Temple, the perfection of every part, the organization of the manpower, the precision of its erection, the craftmanship of Hiram, let us always ask ourselves one thing, which was the greater, the external magnificence or the moral sublimity of the scene? Was it the Temple situated on its commanding hill, with all its courts, the dazzling splendor of its material, the innumerable multitudes, the priesthood in their gorgeous attire, the king with all his royal insignia, sitting on his throne of burnished brass, the music, the radiant cloud filling the Temple, the sudden fire flashing on the altar, the whole nation on its knees? All this is a grand picture and a great tribute to the industry of man. But was it not the sublimer scene of the religious grandeur of the hymns and the prayer, the exalted and rational view of the Divine Nature, the union of a whole people in the adoration of the One great incomprehensible, Almighty, Everlasting Creator of the Universe?

Yes my brothers, this was the sublime scene, a whole nation on its knees, giving to God the honour and praise due His name, for His goodness, that made all this possible; the seed time and the harvest, and all the other blessings they had received in the past year; to give God thanks for the skill and the strength and intelligence to make this Temple possible, and in their humble acknowledgement that even this splendid building, constructed by so many celebrated artists, paled into insignificance beside the works of the Great Architect of the Universe. This is something I want you all to remember as you gather here in this service of rededication, the Temple of Solomon escaped not the ravages of barbarous force. Nothing that man can build of the material things that God has given him can stand the force of time. There is one thing that God has given man that can withstand the ravages of barbarous force, the lapse of time, the ruthless hand of ignorance and the devatations of war, and that is the immortal soul that God gave to every man that is born in His own image, that humble mold of clay into whose nostrils He breathed the breath of life and he became a living soul, an everlasting soul. This is the edifice that God is most anxious for us to build. This is the temple in which He longs to dwell, this temple of ours in which dwells the Holy Spirit of God.

While man must strive on this earth to better himself, taking care that it be not at the expense of others, let him be more anxious to better his soul. Life and intelligence is not given to man for selfish purposes or pursuits, but for his spiritual growth toward a life with God who gave it. Let us strive, let us pray for the grace to do this with a fervour equal to that of our Grand Master Solomon on his day of dedication, and I can think of no grander words to emphasze this, than by using again the blessing with which Solomon dismissed his people 2926 years ago today.

"Blessed be the Lord, that hath given rest unto His people Israel, according to ALL that He promised; there hath not failed one word of AII His good promise, which he promised by the hand of Moses His servant. The Lord our God be with us, as He was with our fathers, let Him not leave us or forsake us; that He may incline our hearts unto Him, to walk in ALL His ways, and to keep His commandments, and His statutes, and His judgements, which He commanded our fathers, that ALL the people of the earth may know that the Lord is God . . . (brethren stand) And now to God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit, be ascribed as is most justly due, all might, majesty, dominion and glory now and forevermore, that all the earth may know that the Lord is God, and that there is none else. Let your hearts therefore be perfect with the Lord your God, to walk in His statutes, and to keep His commandments, as at this day of our dedication. AMEN (So mote it be)

On return to the Masonic Temple, The Most Worshipful The Grand Master expressed appreciation and grateful thanks to the Grand Chaplain Rev. K. Legassick and to all who had participated in this successful Commemorative meeting.

Grand Lodge was closed in ample form at 4:25 p.m.
