

SERVICE OF WORSHIP AND THANKSGIVING

May 11, 1984 Very Wor. Rev. John Jarvie, Grand Chaplain **Devotional Address** "A MORE EXCELLENT WAY"

Most Worshipful, the Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, and Distinguished Visitors, as I attempt to bring to you a message this evening, I find that I am touched by a bit of emotion. The references that have been made to a memorial service have brought to mind a person whose life powerfully influenced my own, and through whose example and counsel I have become a member of the Craft of Freemasonry. I am referring to my father who was, for me, a very fine example of a Mason, and a person who sought in all that he did to follow 'a more excellent way' in life. So his memory is with me as I seek to bring you this evening a few words of meditation - a few thoughts that seem to me to be central to the whole fellowship of this craft which we are pleased to call Freemasonry.

It has always intrigued me as I've moved about from one iurisdiction to another - I happen to have belonged to all three Maritime Grand Lodge jurisdictions - to note some of the differences within them. Some of them are very infinitesmal - most of them are, I suppose. They may be just in the words of the ritual, but they can pose a bit of a difficulty when you forget where you are and what the exact words are. Or they may be in the things that are done. For example, after the obligation has been taken and the Master approaches the Candidate from the East "under the duequard and sign" of whatever degree it is, other jurisdictions say, "on the step, under the due guard and sign." Sometimes I think it is important that we remember that there is a step which we take in this Order, and that we proceed step by step, not only from degree to degree, but along the journey of life. Or, at the closing of the lodge, in some places, as each officer, West, South or East, declares that we "meet upon the Level, act upon the Plumb and part upon the Square", he takes a step down until all the lodge is assembled together on one level signifying that oneness and unity which declares that there is among us no preference as to persons or station, but that we are all brethren in the very truth and reality of the word. A little thing, perhaps, but I happen to like the symbolism.

Then there is the difference in the Scripture used in the Fellowcraft degree. We use that portion of Scripture which was read by the Deputy Grand Master, the 13th Chapter of First Corinthians - at least a part of it. Other jurisdictions with which I am familiar use the vision of Amos 7. You probably recall it, "The Lord stood upon a wall made by a plumbline, with a plumbline in his hand. And the Lord said unto me, 'Amos, what seest thou? And I said, 'A plumbline'. Then said the Lord, 'Behold, I will set a plumbline in the midst of my people Israel: I will not again pass by them any more." I prefer the Corinthian reading for the very good reason that Amos seems to be rather judgmental and suggests that this God in whom we believe is exacting from us all that is his due, exacting from us a great discipline, a great deal of goodness, a strict obedience, and all else which of right belongs to him, on pain of death. But Paul, after suggesting to the Corinthians the important things in life - the duties owed to God and to their fellowmen and ending with that seeming zenith of what would be required, namely worship - went on to say, "And, behold, I will show you a more excellent way." Strange words, indeed. For what could be more excellent than worship of God and determining what we are to do as his children? But that more excellent way is presented to us in some of the finest writing we will find in all of literature. "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels and have

not love" (the word that is translated 'Charity' in the version of scripture which we read is really that word 'Love') though I possess all silver-toned oratory, though I can move people to the depths of their emotions, though I can tell stories and paint pictures in words - pictures that will linger long in the memory - though I can cause people to be persuaded to change their whole way of life but don't have love behind it, I am nothing. I am like "sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal". Then he goes on to say, "though I have the gift of prophecy" - and all of the things that go with it so that I am able to tell what is going to happen tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow; even if I am able to take all of the knowledge that has come and assimilate it, put it in a computer and to bring forth on the other side the answers I want to get or predict what is to come, or however skilled I may be as I work in the places of learning - unless I have love is doesn't mean anything. Or I can be moved to all kinds of generosity - give all my goods to feed the poor - or anything else - but unless I do it in love it is nothing. It doesn't profit me anything. So Paul suggests that love is more important than anything else.

But what is he talking about? What does he mean by 'love'? I want to share a few thoughts with you. In "The Road Less Traveled", M. Scott Peck seems to interpret love as Paul does here when he says, "Love is the will to extend oneself for the purpose of nurturing one's own or another's spiritual growth." In other words, love has a goal or a purpose to serve and that goal is one that is not only for the satisfaction of one's passions - indeed it is questionable if that is love because it is so often selfish. - but is directed instead to the well-being of people around us. It is an act of self-evolution, something that causes us to grow and increase, that makes us bigger persons than we were and brings us into relationship. Love is that which makes us realize who we are and helps us understand that we are made in the image of God in whom we say we believe. You recall that as we enter into the Lodge, we come first of all to the altar where the question is asked, "in whom do you put your trust?" We replied, "In God." God as we understand him. God as we have come to feel him being part of our life. God who has given to us this gift of life. God who has created this myriad universe of which we are a part. God who has put power into the depths of the earth and made it fertile and full of minerals and resources of energy, power and strength. It is this God in whom we live and move and have our being, and who reminds us that he loves us with a great love, a love that is longsuffering, a love that is patient and kind, that never grows cold even though it is rejected.

This is what Paul is talking about here, and it comes not from the study of intellectual things, not from being able to talk and come with words freely and easily, to give in rote that which has been given to us. It comes from something within us, that reaches out in fellowship to others. It has a goal to serve and is full of effort. "Love is," says Peck, "as love does." And Paul says this is the more excellent way. I suggest to you, brethren, that as we are offering our worship to that God from whom we have received the gift of life we are offering our worship to the God who has demonstrated his love for us in many different ways, and finally in the giving of his Son, as we Christians believe, for our redemption. As we offer our worship to him, we are remembering that he has not only shown himself to us in his Son, Jesus Christ, but, I rather think, also in our brethren with whom we have been, with whom we have walked and shared this journey if Masonic enterprise and who have since gone from us to that "House not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." Their memory we cherish because they, too, have shown us a more excellent way, not necessarily because they have known all the intricacies of our ritual and our craft, but rather because they have been people who lived for Masonry and for their families in order that there might come into this world of ours fulfillment of that hope and that blessing whereby we remember our Creator, not only "in the days of our youth", but also in the days of our age as we walk with him.

I want to suggest to you that there is a more excellent way than the ways that are being shown to us in the tensions, the hatreds, and strifes in this world of ours, and that the more excellent way is the way of sharing, of giving ourselves.

Just a little story. A number of years ago I experienced life as many unfortunates do - life on the streets. It was a learning process; deliberately undertaken. Just a weekend, spent on the streets of Toronto without money; without shelter unless I was able to find it somewhere; no place to eat unless I could find it through the generosity of others. On that first night out I thought I would find food at one of the churches, but I got there too late. They were closed. There were a number of us on the course — the Urban Training Project it was called - but we were not together on the streets. I went to a park and sat on a bench, wondering what I would do. I don't have the biggest appetite in the world, but you always seem to get hungrier when there's no food. As I was sitting there, feeling sorry for myself, a Roman Catholic priest who was on the course, came by. He said, "John, have you had anything to eat?" I replied, "No. I went to try to get some but the place was closed." He reached into his pocket, took out a sandwich, and

said, "Here. I got there in time. I took an extra sandwich. Take it." I took it very gratefully, but just as I was about to eat it, another member of our group, a Japanese, came along. I asked him, "Have you had any supper?" and he said "No." Without hesitation I took half of that sandwich and gave it to him. You know, I felt awfully good - awfully good that someone had met my need for something to eat and I was able to share it with someone else with less.

Unless I am greatly mistaken, that is a very small capsule of the kind of thing that it's going to take to bring about the realization of the intent of the Great Architect of the Universe as he drew the design for a world inhabited by people made after his own image. People of different creeds, different colors, different races, living together and sharing together the things that he has provided for their welfare. This is the more excellent way. Yes, there is faith faith that we are made by a God who has a great design for us. Faith that we travel not alone, but are always in his care. And there is hope. Hope as is depicted for us in the third degree as we are figuratively raised from the dead. Hope that there will come the day when, having completed the sojourn of this life, we enter into that "house not made with hands". Hope that we will hear those words, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant." And then there is love. Love, symbolized by the trowel, spreading brotherly love and affection among us. And not among us only, but also among all of mankind. Faith, hope, and love, but the greatest of these is love.

May we, remembering those who have journeyed before us, and looking forward to the fulfillment of life, go on with the blessing of God to the fulfillment of this hope and of our dreams.

And now, unto him who is able to do for us exceeding abundantly, above all that we can ask or think, to the only wise God, be glory within the fellowship of man and peace within all hearts. Amen.

Greetings, Brethren all:

On this occasion of the 117th Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, I extend to all a warm cordial welcome. It has seemed to me always that there is a spirit of reverence at each and every Grand Lodge assembly, a spirit of Brotherly Love and Brotherhood which characterizes our fraternity and symbolizes the strength of Masonry within the jurisdiction. We gather here because of our sincere attachment to the principles of our fraternity, our concern for its welfare and progress in the future. As we make our way through the proposed agenda, I trust that the decisions made will meet with your approval and will create renewed interest, enthusiasm and dedication for the success of our individual Lodges.

Visitations

Of all the responsibilities that fall to the lot of the Grand Master the most pleasing is the opportunity to visit with Lodges in the jurisdiction and, perhsps next, comes the visitation with sister jurisdictions. During the year it has been my privilege to make official Grand Lodge visits to 28 lodges in the jurisdiction as well as a number of visits on social occasions. Following the practice of my predecessor, I did not deem it wise to attempt to visit all lodges in

one year. With Grand Lodge Officers I presided at the installation of the Officers of Corinthian Lodge in Hampton and Lebanon Lodge in Sackville. I presided at the installation of Officers in Sussex Lodge St. Stephen and was present at the installations of Ashlar Lodge, McAdam and Carleton Union, Saint John. I carried greetings from Grand Lodge to the Provincial Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons in Saint John on June 18th of last year and to the Provincial Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star in mid July. I had the pleasure of meeting and extending greetings to a touring party of Past Masters and their Ladies of the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia at an over night stay in St. Andrews on July 25th. I attended with other Grand Lodge members a Loyalist Day service in Trinity Church, Saint John, conducted by R.W. Bro. Legassick and was present at an annual special comunication held by Carleton Union Lodge June 24th. I attended the church service held in the Temple, Saint John, conducted by the Masters and Chaplains of Saint John Lodges. Masonic families and friends were in attendance. It was my pleasure, also, to carry greetings of this Grand Lodge to St. Croix Lodge #46, in Calais and Leweys Island Lodge in Princeton, Maine, on the occasion of the installation of their Officers.

I was invited to address the Installed Masters of Saint John at their social evening on January 28th and the meeting of the Scottish Rite on March 12th. I also had the pleasure of visiting and speaking at a Charter Night at Hartland Lodge # 46 November 16th as well as attending a largely attended Ladies Night in Sussex Lodge, St. Stephen, on March 27th. On November 26th I had the pleasure of presiding with Grand Lodge Officers at a Rededication service at Coverdale Lodge # 52 in Riverview. The service of Rededication was conducted by the Deputy Grand Master R. W. Bro. Baldwin assisted by officers of Grand Lodge with members of the Order of the Eastern Star and a large number of guests in attendance. It was an inspiring occasion which made evident the advantage of two such fraternal organizations operating in friendship and harmony.

Visitations

Outside this jurisdiction I travelled to the Grand Lodge of Maine in May of this year, to the Grand Lodge of Vermont in June, last year. Also in June of last year I visited the Grand Lodge of Manitoba followed by the Grand Lodge of British Columbia. In July last I attended the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario. In all my visitations and attendance at meetings I have been received as your Grand Master warmly and most cordially on all oc-

May I take the time here to express the appreciation of Grand Lodge to R.W. Bro. Frank Langley for the time and attention he has devoted to Abnaki Lodge and to Bro. Larlee at Granite Lodge, in their formative year. The capability and knowledge of these two Brothers in these assignments is reflected in the progress and success of the Officers of each Lodge.

All Canada Conference

Accompanied by the Grand Secretary, R.W.Bro. Irvine and R.W.Bro. Murray, it was my pleasure and privilege to attend the All Canada Conference of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries held on March 30th and 31st in Winnipeg. It was some comfort to learn in conference with the Grand Masters of other jurisdictions that we all suffer from the same problems and shortcomings amd we seek like solutions. A decline in membership is common to all jurisdictions due mainly to demits and suspensions. We gained some comfort in learning that New Brunswick has the lowest rate of decline in that respect.

District Deputy Grand Masters

It has been said that no man walks alone and this has certainly been true of a Grand Master in any jurisdiction. It is true in New Brunswick. This Grand Lodge has been fortunate in having seven District Deputies who are deovted to the cause of Masonry in their district and, if this Grand Lodge has any reason to claim success during the past year, much of that success must be attributed to those District Deputies who go about regularly in fellowship among the members of the craft in their district. I must add to the District Deputies the members of Grand Lodge who have assisted me in any way during the year. The cooperation and assistance is most appreciated in all cases. I am most grateful to you all.

State of the Order

In keeping with the recommendations of a previous Board of General Purposes, a task force was appointed by the Board to investigate and program a five year program of operation to establish the strengths and weaknesses of Masonry in New Brunswick. The appointed chairman of this committee is R.W. Legassick. Under the direction of R.W.Bro. Murray a Grand Lodge bulletin has been printed on a quarterly basis during the year. It has been received with keen interest and enthusiasm throughout the jurisdiction. District Meetings have been held thorughout the jurisdiction with a view in most cases to placing the emphasis on Masonic education rather than the ritual of the three degrees as has been the case in past years. In several districts the program has been organized and conducted by the Education Committee. The change of direction meets with my approval and has been well received on all occasions.

During my visits to the various Lodges in the Jurisdiction it must have been obvious that I stressed to the Brethren the importance of Masonic Education and Fellowship. To my thinking these subjects reflect the very essence of Masonry and I would encourage all Brethren to put them into practice both within your own Lodge and your community in all your fraternal travels.

While Lodges have been active in degree work during the

year, we still note a decline in membership due to deaths, demits and suspensions. Deaths we can not escape, but I urge all Lodges to make a special effort to reduce the number of demits and suspensions. It is my feeling that no demit or suspension should occur without the Lodge first contacting the concerned brother to determine the reason in each case and offer encouragement to continue their membership.

Now, in conclusion, I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to all Lodges in the Jurisdiction for the attendance and support I have received during my visitations. Your warm receptions have been most encouraging and I am most grateful for the support you have given me as your Grand Master.

MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER AND BRETHREN:

In submitting my report as Chairman of the Ritual Committee and on their behalf wish to report that your Committee met three times during the past year previous to the Board of General Purposes Meetings and presented some recommendations to that Board which were approved by the Board of General Purposes.

Several items were discussed and were presented to the Board for their approval and as mentioned before were approved. One, which was discussed and approved was passed on to the Education Committee was that the Sign of Fidelity be given when changing the "Lights". Another item discussed was that singing be done when opening and during degree work. These directives will be sent to lodges, I hope in the near future.

As most of you will remember that at our last Grand Lodge meeting in Fredericton (May 13-14, 1983), it was recommended that part of the business in regards to the presentation of the Grand Lodge Certificate be left in the hands of the Ritual Committee. It was also recommended to and approved by the Board that as there were several versions of the proper procedure for presenting the Grand Lodge Certificate, that each lodge in the jurisdiction adopt their own and that it be given from memory. This I think will be pursued further and a proper interpretation of this will be forwarded to all lodges in our jurisdiction, so all will be uniform.

During the past year your Ritual Committee has had a very quiet year so far as District Ritual meetings were concerned. There were several Educational Committee meetings held and I think these meetings served the purpose very well. I would like to commend the Chairman and members of the Education Committee for their job well done last year.

It appears to me, as I mentioned before, that lodges in our jurisdiction, some of them seem to think that the Ritual work does not need to be corrected or kept up to standards that our previous Masters and Past Grand Masters have started and tried so hard to do in the past. We your Ritual Committee realize that District Deputy Grand Masters have tried to the best of their ability to have District Meetings and to explain the Ritual and education of our Order to the members. But I feel it is up to the Masters of every

Lodge to impress upon the officers of their lodge the importance of the ritualistic work of the Order and to keep it in respect and in conformity with the "Jewel" and that no deviation from our "Jewel" should be made.

I would also like to commend the District Deputy Grand Masters who tried to have a District Ritual meeting and with some success, but I think it was very disappointing to them when the lodges in their Districts did not give them the support. I would recommend that the lodges in our jurisdiction give their support to the District Deputy Grand Masters in their endeavours to keep our ritual in perspective with the "Jewel" and only by so doing is Freemasonry to survive.

REPORT OF MASONIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, GRAND LODGE OFFICERS AND BRETHREN:

This report from the Grand Lodge Committee on Masonic Education reflects a measure of optimism. The suggestions advanced in the reports of the past three years, appears to have produced some results. The number of Lodges with Education Committee's has increased. This move is most important, and I would again ask you to consider the formation of such a committee within your Craft Lodge, if possible. Creating this base will assure a continuation of the work already started, and we hope to follow up with more information from time to time.

I must say as a interjection that ritual and education must go hand in hand, each must compliment the other. It is certainly not the intention of the Education Committee to take over any of the spotlight, because the ritual is the fundamental portion of any lodge and the educational part, purely is a supplement.

The new Bulletin, Mostly Masonry, made available for the first time at this year's Grand Lodge Communication, provides a

number of suggestions for education nights. We hope you take a copy from this meeting. Your reaction to the report will be appreciated, in accessing its value, and its future status.

In checking through proceedings of past Grand Lodge communications, we found many interesting reports from past committees. Information, I feel that should be made available. I found references to several books, produced by the New Brunswick Grand Lodge, but few copies are still in existence today. Most had to do with Masonic Education. This source should be explored, and the writings of our Distinguished past compiled and made available for use by the Craft Lodge committees.

Summarizing the activities of your Grand Lodge Education Committee, for the past twelve months, we must report continued progress.

Mini-Workshops were conducted in Albert, Sackville, and Hillsborough and special education nights are scheduled for Rexton and Saint John in May. Most of these were conducted by your Chairman, with valued assistance from interested Brothers. The format of the Mini-Workshops is informal, and content can be changed to fit the requirements of the meeting.

Three District Workshops were also conducted, and all were well attended. One in Fredericton, March 6th; Riverview, March 24th; and Bathurst, April 9th. I would like to extend a special thank you to District Deputy Grand Masters Tom Winters, District 6; Lewis Clark, District 2; Delbert Alward, District 7 and Murray Clousten, District 3 for an excellent job in the organization of these Workshops. As a result of their work, we averaged 70 brethren at each one.

A request from District Deputy Art Dingee is pending, and we hope a Workshop can be organized this fall. At each of these Workshops, Right Worshipful Brother Ted Clouston, Chairman of the Ritual Committee, attended, and participated actively.

In March I was given an opportunity, at the request of the Grand Master to attend the 2nd Annual All Canada Conference of Grand Masters held in Winnipeg, Manitoba and moderated a paper on the media, given by Most Worshipful Brother Ronald Groshaw, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario.

in conclusion, I would again like to offer the suggestion, that this jurisdiction consider organizing a Week-end Workshop, involv-

ing all lodges in the Province, instead of trying to stage seven district workshops each year. Such a seminar could prove very valuable for all Craft Lodges.

I must pay special tribute to the loyal members of this committee who have assisted so graciously in Education activities this past year, and thanks also goes to those Brothers who were not members of the committee, but gave freely of their time and talent. To our Grand Master, M.W. Bro. Gordon Coffey, our committee pledges continued support and look for your guidance as we move into another Grand Lodge year.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE (INCLUDING QUINN TRUST)

THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F & A.M.

After careful consideration, it is the unanimous recommendation of all members of your Committee that the Grant to each Lodge for the year 1984-85, from interest derived from the Quinn Trust Funds, be increased another \$50.00 to a total of \$500.00. We trust that this Grant is very helpful to the Lodges, especially the smaller Lodges, but it should be noted that your Committee makes an annual review and it doesn't necessarily follow that it will be always possible to keep the grant as high as this year. None of the Principal of the Quinn Trust has ever been touched.

In December of 1983 it was our recommendation to the Board of General Purposes that a Maximum of \$1500.00 in interest from funds of the Quinn Trust be allocated to the Library Funding annually, and that up to a maximum of \$200.00 be permitted to each Lodge applying, until the \$1500.00 is exhausted. Lodges benefiting would not have preference over other Lodges applying for the first time. It was also our recommendation that a suitable gummed label be provided those Lodges benefiting from the programme, to be placed within each publication so obtained, noting as having been provided by the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, in grateful memory of Brother William G. Quinn. Board of General Purposes agree with the recommendation.

During the year the Board of General Purposes agreed to donate up to \$1,000.00 towards the building of a permanent Trailer for the Masonic Float. Your Committee concurred in this decision.

It is recommended that the amount of \$10,000.00 be again allocated for 1984 for Masonic Scholarships.

Our expenses for 1983 were several hundred dollars higher than our receipts and were it not for interest on our regular Account Funds we would have operated at a loss. It is therefore the recommendation of your Finance Committee that a Planning Committee on Finances be authorized to make a thorough study of Income and Expenditures and to draw up a Five Year Plan on Finances, and to make their report to the Board of General Pur-

poses during the year 1984. It is our suggestion that the present Finance Committee be appointed for this purpose.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

MOST WORSHIPFUL, THE GRAND MASTER:

This years activities have been directed to assignments. We are in the process of forming a committee which will be concerned with writing a history of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick with a target of completion for 1989, a five year plan is my best estimate.

Working completely independent of this is R: W: Bro Arthur B. Dingee, D. D. G. M. District No 4, whose "Bi-centennial Project" was to have completed and published all the "Blue" Lodge histories for District No 4. Although publication has not been accomplished, the histories have been written and I am pleased to say that copies are being made available to me. These histories will be of great help to us in our future task. I commend R: W: Bro Dingee for his effort and for his success in this project.

There are other pockets of activity in this direction throughout the jurisdiction and I might name Sussex Lodge No 7 in St. Stephen, and I am getting parts of that history, Chapter by Chapter and also there is activity in Salisbury Lodge No 20, Salisbury where work is on-going on a history of that Lodge. I would encourage all District Deputy Grand Masters to urge the Lodges within their districts to do the same. One Grand Historian is unable to accomplish this task alone, but with this kind of grass roots support, we should be able to produce a volume of which we can all be extremely proud.

I can add only my own simple request, please try to include biographies of Past Masters, both living and dead, in your histories, particularly those who have gone on to take an active part in our Grand Lodge. It is interesting to note in this regard that at a recent Past Master's Night in the New Brunswick Lodge No 22, a short

biography of every living Past Master was read as part of the evening's programme. These biographies were prepared and read by R: W: Bro. Boutilier.

A second assignment has been the preparation of a Biography of the late Bro. William G. Quinn, whose great benevolence is known to all of you. Bro. Quinn would be 94 years of age this year had he survived. I mention this because I am experiencing some difficulty in developing a character study of a man who never married, has no immediate surviving relatives and whose surviving contemporaries are few in number and at best can be said to be extremely forgetful even though they knew him well. Alas the ravages of time upon the human mind! If there are any among you here who may read this report, and who knew Bro. Quinn and can fill in some factual information, it will be very much appreciated. He was known to have enjoyed lengthy conversation. I have interviewed some distant cousins with whom he attended school, clergy, freinds and masons. In addition I have examined records in the Provincial Archives, schools and the Anglican Synod office and hope to have this task finished before summer.

In the past year Granite Lodge No 54 and Abnaki Lodge No 55, which had been working under Dispensation received their Charters. At the ceremony for the latter held this spring on Deer Island, more than three hundred persons assembled in the Junior High School on the Island to witness the semi-public presentation of their Charter and the installation of their officers and to share in the fellowship of dining together, albeit in shifts, following the presentation.

Two International Past Master's Nights have been held, straddling the St Croix River, which have also been extremely successful in attracting large turnouts from many Lodges in the Calais and St Stephen area.

A second Charter Flight of Masons has left for Scotland, the group numbers about one hundred and fifty, to tour parts of Scotland and Europe. This trip, like the first, developed from the enthusiasm of the Keltic Degree Team and an invitation to attend the anniversary celebration of Lodge Caledonian in Scotland.

It is interesting to note that the original copies of the Bunting Diaries have re-appeared and I am happy to report are permanently lodged in the Archives of the New Brunswick Museum. Their rich content of eye-witness accounts of events occuring in the latter half of the nineteenth century is of interest both to all the craft and

to the community at large. Their storage in the Museum will assure their professional care and preservation. The late R: W: Grand Master Bunting's portrait is hanging on the north wall of this Lodge room. He also served as our first Grand Secreatry and to my mind was our first Grand Historian.

"The elected officers shall be chosen by written ballot without nominations, except the Treasurer, who shall be nominated, and the Tyler, who is to be chosen by nomination and open vote, and no brother shall be declared elected to any elective office unless he shall have received a majority of all the votes cast."

> Wor, Bro. Owen F. Walton Keith Lodge No. 23

Wor. Bro. Walton explained the intent of the Motion is to eliminate conflict between two paragraphs. He therefore moved the above motion, which was duly seconded and carried.

NEW BUSINESS

Wor, Bro. Layton R. Wasson expressed concern that the various Committee Reports, in particular those that are printed and passed around at this Grand Lodge meeting are difficult to digest in a few moments, to provide time to ask some intelligent questions, consequently he moved "That all those printed reports be mailed at the same time the Proclamation is mailed". Seconded - on the question - it was pointed out that the Proclamation is mailed shortly after the 60 day limit before Grand Lodge for receipt of Notices of Motion but that the financial activities do not close until March 31st, followed by audit and printing, therefore it is not possible to comply with this request. Motion defeated.

Grand Lodge was then recessed for lunch, to resume labour at 2:00 p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

On resuming labour, The Most Worshipful, The Grand Master directed that Rt. Wor, Bro. Donald Henry Wright of Howard Lodge No 15 be conducted to the Grand East and invested him with the Beardsley Medallion.

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master then drew to the attention of Grand Lodge that the various Honorary appointments made in 1982 and 1983 had received the approval of the Board of General Purposes but required Grand Lodge confirmation, and called for the following motions:

"Moved and seconded that the appointments of the late M: W: Bro. R. V. Limerick and of M: W: Bro. F. S. P. Haycox as Honorary Past Grand Masters of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick be confirmed effective as of May 15, 1982." Motion carried

"Moved and seconded that the appointment of M: W: Bro. Alexander Buchanan as an Honorary Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick be confirmed effective as of May 14, 1983" Motion carried.

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master noted he had recommended to the Board of General Purposes and received their concurrence that Wor. Bro. Isaac Henry Kennedy of Sussex Lodge No 7 receive honorary appointment as Past Junior Grand Warden, and would therefore request confirmation by this Grand Lodge.

"Moved and seconded that the appointment of Rt. Wor. Bro. Isaac Henry Kennedy as Honorary Past Junior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick be confirmed effective as of May 12, 1984." Motion carried.

PRESENTATION DICTIONARY OF CANADIAN BIOGRAPHY, VOL. V 1801 - 1820

M:W: THE GRAND MASTER, DISTINGUISHED VISITORS, OF-FICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW **BRUNSWICK:**

In 1974 I was asked by the editorial staff of the "Dictionary of Canadian Biography" to submit names from New Brunswick who had died during the period 1801 - 1820 in various categories and of course there were others as well. And when the list was completed I was looking it over and I was asked if there were any revisions, and one of the names I had submitted was of course the Rev. John Beardsley, it had been deleted. After about a year of argument we had the name included, and of course I was asked to prepare that biography.

It was submitted late in 1975 with a copy to our late and respected Grand Secretary, then Right Worshipful and later Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Bert Lemmon, in 1976 it was revised and in 1981, as M:W: Bro. I. Dale Steeves recalls, it was completely revised because of additional information which had been discovered. We find that our late and distinguished brother has left

an almost enormous progeny in the United States, throughout Canada and in England. The biography although it appears under my name actually was the work of some of his descendants and some very well known geneaologists, particularly in New York and Massachusetts in the United States of America. I felt that because it is not only a very complete biography, covering pages 58 to 60 in this rather large volume, but there are also other names of prominent New Brunswickers of that period, in fact we call it the "Loyalist Volume" and I felt it was only proper after I had received my copy around Christmas time that I purchase an additional copy and with your permission present it to the Grand Lodge at this time, yet to mark not only the Bi-Centennial of our Province but also the Bi- Centennial of Freemasonry in New Brunswick, because as you are all aware sir, on September 1st, 1984 will mark the Two-Hundredth Anniversary of the installation of Wor. Bro. John Beardsley as Worshipful Master of Hiram Lodge No. 17 under the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia as it then was, and I believe according to our late and most distinguished Masonic Scholar, M:W: Bro. Dr. Reg V. Harris, there were two lodges only but they constituted themselves a Grand Lodge.

It is therefore my pleasure and indeed a privilege to present to you and through you to the Library and Archives of our Most Worshipful Grand Lodge in this our Bi-Centennial year, a complete biography of our "Founder" one might say in the Province of New Brunswick, a most distinguished Mason, a son of the Church and very prominent figure in the early life of our Province. It is my pleasure Sir at this time to present Volume V, Dictionary of Canadian Biography, the period 1801 - 1820, to the Grand Lodge.

R:W: Bro. C. A. Pincombe Past Grand Historian


