

M:W: I. Dale Steeves, in responding for the representatives, thanked the M:W: The Grand Master for their recognition, expressed their pleasure at serving this Grand Lodge and stated that they would be pleased to convey the fraternal greetings of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick to their respective Jurisdictions.

Under the direction of R:W: Bro. Simon MacDonald and the Grand and Assistant Grand Directors of Ceremonies, the brethren of Grand Lodge paraded to Trinity Anglican Church for the Annual Service of Worship and Thanksgiving conducted by V:W: Bro. Rev. Canon David Genge, Grand Chaplain. He was assisted by Bro. Eric Leighton, Grand Organist.

DEVOTIONAL ADDRESS MASONIC SERVICE

There is a saying amongst church people, "I can meet God as well on the golf course as I can in the worship of the church," and this is said sincerely. Masons say, "I can discern the light of Masonry in the way I meet my fellow man as well as I-can in the Lodge." Are these statements true, or are we deceiving ourselves?

Within the Christian Church, we are celebrating at this time the Feast of the Ascension. In the Book of Acts, we read, "When He had spoken these things, while they beheld, He was taken up; and a cloud received Him out of their sight."

The meaning of this experience was not that Jesus went up into the air, and if we were to ascend high enough into the atmosphere we would find Him – we do not have to do that at all. The Ascension means that Jesus has taken on a different form of existence. He exists in a different dimension. Modern science teaches us something about living in a different dimension. We have been shown that if we escape from the earth's gravitational field we experience weightlessness, and so the idea of "up" and "down" disappears. When we say that Jesus ascended, we mean that He is no longer bound by the dimensions of space and time. We don't look for Jesus "here" and not "there"; we don't think that if we pray at the right time Jesus will hear us. Space and time have nothing to do with the presence of Jesus. The Ascension means that Jesus is available to everyone, everywhere, at all times.

If this is true, what is wrong with thinking that we can meet God and worship Him on the golf course, out fishing in the boat, or when we are watching the stars at night as well as when we meet for worship in His church? Why do we say that we must go to the Lodge to experience the true light of Masonry?

The first lesson was the lesson which told about King Solomon (1 Kings 8:22-30), probably one of the wisest men the world has ever known, and he had built this beautiful temple. His father, David, had saved and gathered the beautiful things of the earth, the gold and the brass and the timers, all of the things that were necessary to create the

most beautiful temple that could ever be built, and Solomon had constructed that temple. Then he came before God in prayer, and he prayed that this temple would be the focal point of God's presence within the midst of His people. He said, "Watch over this temple day and night, this place where you have chosen to be worshipped. Hear me when I face this temple and pray." Then he went on to talk about the people, "When your people are defeated by their enemies because they have sinned against you, and then when they turn to you and come to this temple, humbly praying to you for forgiveness, listen to them." He saw God as focussing His attention and meeting His people in this temple which he had built; this was where they were to worship Him and this was where they were to meet Him and come in contact with Him. In the midst of his prayer, however, there is a verse which seems to contradict everything else. He said, "But can you, O God, really live upon earth? Not even all of heaven is large enough to hold you, so how can this temple that I have built be large enough." It is as though Solomon is saying, "God is so great that He is everywhere. He's on the mountains, He's revealed in the floods, in the beauty of the day and the glory of nature. He is everywhere, and here I have built a temple. Why in the world should people come and meet Him in this temple when He is everywhere?" And yet that thought quickly passed from his mind, and he went on praying about the temple being the place where His people were to meet Him.

This same contradiction is indicated in the thinking of people when they say, "I can certainly worship God on the golf course; I can worship Him in my summer cabin; as I sit and feel the warmth of the sun I can worship God; I don't really need to go to church," and people will say that sincerely. Why is it that I would say that they are deceiving themselves? Why did Solomon build this temple and want people to meet in it if this were truly possible? Now it is possible for you to meet God in these places, everyone knows that, but what is the difference between worshipping God out on the golf course and worshipping Him in church? Why is it essential that you come and worship here in this church? Why is it that you are deceiving yourself if you think that you can be as close to God out on the hillside as you can here? People sincerely believe that.

The reason is that the mind of man is so finite, and God is so infinite, that all that you see of Him on the golf course is so minute in comparison to what the essence of God really is. It is like the sun shining above us. Someone will say, "My, isn't that sun warm!" But you have no idea of how warm the sun really is. All that you feel from the sun are a few tiny rays of a vast infinite number of rays that fill the whole universe. All that you experience is a tiny, tiny fraction of the rays of the sun when it falls upon you compared with what is available from that vast sun flooding out into God's universe. And the same

thing is true of us when we look at God by the river, on the mountain, on the lake, on the golf course. All that we see is a tiny, insignificant part of the essence of the real God. How do we know? Well, by the way God has dealt with us. Moses, wandering the hills of Palestine and Egypt, saw the splendour of God, and yet God had to come to him in a flaming bush. One insignificant, finite bush, burning in the midst of the vastness of God's universe. God came, and Moses saw God in a completely different way than anything he could see in the vastness of the realms of God. He came so much to see the essence of God at that moment, that the very ground around the tree felt as though it was holy. God recognized that the mind of Moses was so small that the only way He could reveal Himself to Moses was in a special way by coming in a burning bush. When Elijah fled, he could see the power of God in the earthquakes, in the great wind, but he didn't really recognize the essence of what God was until God came and spoke to him in a finite, still, small voice and when God came and spoke to him in that way, in that finite way, then the finite mind of Elijah could fathom the infinite essence of God. Why did Jesus come as one of us? God had been revealed in all history, but man couldn't see it. His mind was too small, and so God had to come as a finite individual in order for man to really meet God and know Him as He really is. You can see Him in the vastness of the world, but you never really know Him until you meet Him as God reveals Himself in these special events. And the same thing is true of worship. When you come to worship God at the Eucharist, for example, He meets you in a different way altogether than by the brook, or out on the sand, or out on your boat. It's peaceful there, but you do not meet God as God determined that you were to meet Him in the finite experience. The glory of that experience was laid down by Jesus Himself, as He said, "Take, eat; this is my body, this is my blood." As you come to that Eucharist, you come to meet God in all the essence of what God is like, in a way in which God has determined that you can receive Him far more abundantly and far more wonderfully than you can in nature itself.

Of course, it is possible to come to church and not receive. When I was in Florida a while ago, Mrs. Genge had a little different colour than I had, and you would say, "The sun didn't do you much good." Well, the sun didn't do me any good because I covered myself with all kinds of things so that the sun couldn't get through to me. You can come to church, and do exactly the same thing. You can come with a closed mind, and you can cut yourself off and never meet God, just as I didn't open myself to the sun. If you come to worship God in His church, and you know in you heart that the message of the Ascension is true, that God is alive, and that in this worship you are confronting the living God in the way in which He determined you would meet Him, in a finite act, you will have and experience which is not possible out of the hillside. But having met God in this experience of worship, you will see Him in a more wonderful way out in the boat or on the golf course. Meet Him here, and you will see the real God much more beautifully

everywhere.

The same thing is true for Masonry. If you experience the real light of the Architect of the universe in the ritual expression of an open Lodge you will see reflections of that light in all your walks through life.

Following the Service the brethren returned in procession and resumed labour.

The Grand master thanked the V:W: Grand Chaplain for the inspiring service and message.

It was moved by R:W: C. N. Hollett, seconded by R:W: J.D. McKenna and carried that the Devotional address, given by the Grand Chaplain, be printed in full in the Proceedings.

The Grand Master reminded all present that the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge Corporation would be held at 8:30 a.m. May 14 and that all members of Grand Lodge should be in attendance. he also called attention to the location of the ballot box which would be available to receive ballots from 9:00 a.m. May 14 until the time set for closing.

It was moved by M:W: Bro. Steeves that Grand Lodge take recess until 9:00 a.m. May 14 1988 and that the first order of business be the reading of nominations for the elected Grand Lodge Officers. Carried.

MORNING SESSION, SATURDAY MAY 14 1988

The Grand Lodge resumed labour at 9:00 a.m. with the Most Worshipful The Grand Master presiding. He announced that nominations for elective offices were duly closed.

The Grand Secretary R:W: B. A. Prescott presented the nominations for the elective offices for the ensuing year.

It was moved by M:W: Bro. Oulton and seconded that the ballot close at 2:00 p.m. and that the election of officers be at approximately 2:30 p.m. following the report of the Credentials Committee.

The M:W: The Grand Master requested the Deputy Grand Master to assume the Grand East and delivered Grand Masters Address 1988.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS, MAY 14th, 1988

Brethren:

It gives me great pleasure to extend greetings, and a warm welcome to this the 121st. Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

Each communication brings with it many members of long standing, faces that are remembered and looked for year after year. This lends strength and permanence to our institution. Equally important are the new faces, those attending for the first time. You in time will become the backbone and the senior members of this body. I therefore especially welcome those who are with us for the first time and hope they will taken an active part in the proceedings, and what is very important, that you may return to your own Lodges with a greater understanding and appreciation of the work that goes on here and the problems we face. You will be a source of information and education for your Lodges if you share with them the workings of Grand Lodge. the strength of Masonry lies in the individual Lodges, and it is our concern that each Lodge is a tower of strength in their respective communities.

This is the time and the place for any brother to have his say on matters pertaining to masonry. This is your legislative assembly, where every brother is equal and has his right to speak. They could learn a great deal from us I think in the realm of getting along with other people, and in the practice of Faith, Hope and Charity and the greatest of these is Charity.

These yearly Communications also brings with it a note of sadness. Year by year age takes its toll, and our ranks are reduced by many old familiar friends through age, sickness and death. The names

of our departed brethren will be printed in the year book but, first, I will mention the passing of one of our most beloved Past Grand Masters, Most Worshipful Brother Donald A. Somerville. He will be greatly missed by all of us. Also the untimely death of our Grand Chaplain, Very Worshipful Brother Roy Baker Evans after a mere seven weeks in office.

Brethren, join me in a short silent tribute to those departed members we have just recognized. Following the silence the Grand Chaplain will offer a prayer on their behalf.

This, my first year in office has been a very enjoyable one. It is no job for an elderly man however. The year has gone by with incredible speed. One of the great joys of Masonry is the opportunity of visiting the Lodges of this Jurisdiction. I was impressed by the Lodge buildings. They show that there is a great pride, care and concern for the Lodge itself, and the furnishings show that they are significant to the Craft. The support and brotherly affection was very evident. I was likewise very happy with the support and co-operation of the Grand Lodge Officers, both past and present, who supported me on my official visitation. it made my task much easier, and enjoyable. To all those who assisted me on these occasions I extend my heartfelt appreciation. While on this subject I would like to mention the support I have received, and through me to the Grand Lodges as a whole, from our Grand Secretary Right Worshipful Brother Prescott, and his able staff. This past year also saw the resignation of our Grand Treasurer M:W: Brother Haycox. We were all sorry that he felt it was time for him to retire. I personally, and I know that the Grand Lodge collectively, appreciates the years of great service he has given to the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick in this important office.

It is unfortunate that the Scottish Rite Bodies felt is necessary for financial reasons, to terminate their sharing of the office expenses. This loss of revenue made it incumbent upon us to make revisions of the working hours of the Grand Lodge Office, and no doubt will cause some confusion and adjustment. No doubt all things will work out in time, but it will cause some increase in the expenses of the Grand Office as we will lose the revenue paid by these bodies.

In March of this year accompanied by Rt. Wor. Bro Charles Hollett, the Deputy Grand Master, and Rt. Wor. Bro. Basil Prescott, I attended the Annual Grand Masters conference in Winnipeg. It was my task to present a paper on the involvement and influence of the family on Masonry. Many other papers were given and much discussion took place which was of great value. The problems of various jurisdictions were discussed, and this greatly broadened our vision of Masonry throughout Canada.

DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS

I must pay tribute to the fine performance of the various D.D.G.M's over the past year. Through the implementation of the Mentor Program the work of the D.D.G.M's was greatly increased. I thank them and all the brethren who drove so many miles and put in so many hours upon this educational work. This should have a beneficial effect in making Masonry more understandable and an awareness of the meaning and value of the craft. This is a vital need if Masonry is going to survive as a vital force in every community.

STATE OF THE CRAFT

We are all concerned by the gradual decline in membership. It is not as rapid as it has been, but still we are not showing any increase, and while we can take some comfort that the pace of the decrease is slowing down, it is still a decrease. Let us all try our best to halt this trend.

The only thing that is causing me concern in the Order is the slow progress of the Masonic Housing. The new foundation set up under the title: The New Brunswick Charities and Housing Co. Ltd. has been working hard and putting a great deal of effort into this worthwhile scheme, but I am disappointed that no more progress has been made. When one considers the numerous housing complexes built by different organizations in this province by bodies much less numerous that our own, I must say again that I am a little disappointed by the lack of anything tangible on our part.

Let us hope that some progress of a visible nature will take place in the not too distant future.

Finally my brethren let me say that it was a great honour to be elected Grand Master of New Brunswick. I realize now, after this year in office, how great an honour it has been. I have enjoyed every minute of it. I may not have accomplished much, but if you have enjoyed me as much as I have enjoyed you, it has a been very worthwhile year. If we haven't accomplished much, we have had a good time doing it, and if we can continue spreading Faith, Hope and Charity and brotherly love among ourselves, then no task will be too great or impossible to undertake and the Craft will go on from strength to strength in the future.

Moved by W: Bro. J. R. Andrews and seconded by R:W: S. Scribner that the address by The Most Worshipful The Grand Master be received, printed in full in the Proceedings and referred to a Committee of Past Grand Masters for review and report. Motion carried.

The Deputy Grand Master, Rt. Wor. Bro. Hollett, then appointed a committee of all Past Grand Masters present under the Chairmanship of Past Grand Master J. S. Brooks to review the Grand master's address and present their report to Grand Lodge.





We recommend that the Manual for Semi-Public Installation of Lodge Officers be adopted and approved for use as Official Manual for all Lodges in the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. The Manual was adopted and approved by the Board of General Purposes at its March Meeting.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

In this committee's report presented on May 9, 1987, you were informed that applications for recognition from certain State Grand Lodges of Brazil and Mexico were under review and our recommendations deferred.

In 1978 the State of Mato Grosso, Brazil was divided into two distinct states – the State of South Mato Grosso and the State of Mato Grosso. A new Grand Lodge was then formed; i.e. The Grand Lodge of the State of Mato Grosso. This new Grand Lodge in correspondence commencing in 1985 and with subsequent follow-ups, has requested recognition from The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick and as its Declaration of Principles sent with the request for recognition would indicated that this Grand Lodge is regular in every way, you Committee on Fraternal Relations recommends that our Grand Lodge extend recognition to the Grand Lodge of the State of Mato Grosso, Brazil and exchange Grand Representatives.

In February 1986 we received a request for recognition from the Grand Lodge of the State of Minas Gerais, Brazil, and since this Grand Lodge is entirely regular in its Declaration of Principles, you Committee also recommends that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick extend recognition to the State Grand Lodge of Minas Gerais, Brazil and exchange Grand Representatives.

Similiarly, the Grand Lodge of Santa Catarina, founded on April 21, 1956 has made application for reciprocal recognition with the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, and being regular in every respect through its Declaration of Principles, it is recommended that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick extend recognition to the Grand Lodge of Santa Catarina and exchange Grand Representatives.

jurisdiction of those lodges comprising the Conferderation of Mexican Grand Lodges, which we have recognized for many years, as do almost all other North American Grand Lodges and those of England, Scotland and Ireland, the York Grand Lodge of Mexico. Therefore, you committee cannot recommend recognition of the lodges of the Confederation of Mexican Grand Lodges which to our knowledge are not in amnity with the Grand Lodge we already recognize.

The Grand Lodge of Cuba. This Grand Lodge had been recognized by the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick for many years with exchanges of Grand Representatives. Our last listing of this Grand Lodge appeared in our 1969 Proceedings and a review of our files does not reveal any recommendation to Grand Lodge through this Committee to remove recognition. The Commission on Information for Recognition reports that the "Gran Logia de Cuba" inaugurated January 1984, is, in the Commissions opinion, clandestine and irregular, encroaching on the exclusive territorial jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Florida. The Grand Lodge of Cuba, at Havana, continues to be recognized by eight of our Canadian Grand Lodges as well as the Grand Lodges of England, Scotland and Ireland. Correspondence relating to the updating of Grand Representatives initiated this review and as a result this committee recommends that the Grand Lodge of Cuba be again listed as being recognized by the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick and exchange Grand Representatives.

Your Committee on Fraternal Relations notes that with the passage of time several vacancies again exist in our list of Grand Representatives and respectfully suggests these deficiencies be reviewed and worthy nominees selected for recommendation to the applicable Grand Jurisdictions.

ANNUAL REPORT OF NEW BRUNSWICK MASONIC CHARITIES AND HOUSING COMPANY LTD. TO THE 121st COMMUNICATION OF THE GRAND LODGE OF

NEW BRUNSWICK

The first meeting of this Company following Grand Lodge on May 8 & 9, 1987 was held on June 10, 1987, at Sussex, N.B. At this time several matters were dealt with including he procurement of the Company Seal; preparation of a Budget; requirements to become a Charter Member in the Company and the passing of a motion approving a request to the Board of General Purposes for Capital Funding.

A second meeting was held on September 15, 1987 at which time special guests in attendance were Bro. Earl Wilson, President of the New Brunswick Senior Citizens Foundation and Bro. Kenneth Darrah, Secretary who spoke on the need for housing for seniors in New Brunswick. The President of this Company reported on a meeting he and the Secretary had with Mr. Walter Waite of New Brunswick Housing Corporation. As a result of this meeting, studies for senior housing were requested for Saint John, Moncton and Woodstock.

Our third Company meeting was held on December 8, 1987 at which time Charter Membership in the Company was extended from December 31, 1987 to March 31, 1988. Action was also taken in the form of a Newsletter to have the Grand Secretary and the D.D.G.M.'S kept informed of the workings of the Company. Studies were received from the Moncton and Woodstock areas and the Board directed that the President and secretary be authorized to submit applications to the N.B.H.C. and were approved by same on May 4, 1988. A most generous donation in the amount of \$1,000.00 was received from Woodstock Lodge No. 11 in memory of deceased brethren, other substantial donations have been received during the year including a \$300.00 donation from members of Tweedie Lodge No. 41. Several sub-committee meetings were held during the year resulting in a comprehensive outline of the "whole purpose of this company" being prepared; a copy of which has been forwarded to the Department in Ottawa. Bro. David Young of Granite Lodge No. 54 was appointed by the Grand Master to fill a vacancy on the Board representing the Upper Saint John River Valley.

A fourth meeting was held in Fredericton on April 9, 1988 at which time the requirement by Revenue Canada for supplementary Letters Patent was discussed. Amendments to our Letters Patent were voted on and approved by the Board and later ratified by voting members at the Annual General Meeting. These have since received

James McKenna, who made verbal contact with Ottawa and a very special thank you to Wor. Bro. Freeman Dunnett, who through his untiring efforts, brought it to fruition. Also thanks goes to Bro. Peter Crocco for taking care of last minute documents in order to complete our "Supplementary Letters Patent".

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK F. & A.M.

The Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Distinguished East Peers and Brethren All:

Although the Financial Statements you have received earlier today cover the period April 1, 1987-Dec. 31, 1987, this report of the Finance Committee covers the Masonic year i.e. from Grand Lodge Communication;87 to the present time.

It was with regret to this committee that our Grand Treasurer, Most Worshipful Bro. Fred S. P. Haycox found it necessary, due to health reasons, to submit his resignation to the Most Worshipful The Grand Master effective Dec. 31, 1987. Most Worshipful Brother Haycox has served this Grand Lodge as its Grand Treasurer for seventeen consecutive years. this is the longest period of time that any Grand Treasurer has served this Grand Jurisdiction since its beginning some one hundred and twenty-one years ago. We express to M:W: Bro. Haycox our sincere thanks for those many years of devoted service to the finances of our Grand Lodge and wish him well with improved health during his years of retirement.

The vacancy which occured due to the resignation of M:W: Bro. Haycox was filled by R:W: Brother Andrew Allan, through the appointment by our M:W: The Grand Master under Constitution Section 19 Page 39 – 1982 edition.

We certainly welcome Rt.Wor. Bro. Allan to our committee and hope that he may occupy the office of Grand Treasurer for a period even exceeding that of the previous incumbent. As well as having a new Grand Treasurer during the year, the finance committee also received a new chairman. It was with regret that the previous Chairman, Right Worshipful Brother John Flewelling, after 12 years of service to the committee requested not to be re-appointed again due

to health reasons. R:W: Bro. Flewelling also served this Grand Lodge well for all those years and we express our appreciation to him in like manner as for M:W: Bro. Haycox. Hence, my brethren, you observe two new faces at the helm of the finances of your Grand Lodge at this time.

Your Finance Committee has met on several occasions during the year and has fully reviewed Grand Lodge Financing, Grand Lodge Investments, the Quinn Trust and Grand Lodge Expenditures. Although this report may be somewhat more lengthy than recent financial reports, I believe we owe a full report to our membership in an attempt to bring you up to date with our observations as new brooms. At the commencement of the year under review, Grand Lodge had an Investment Portfolio of some thirty-two different stocks and bonds for a total value of \$420,000. All Investment Certificates are held in trust by the Royal Trust Co. here in Saint John. There is a considerable fee for this service as indicated in our financial statements. The Maturity dates of our Certificates vary from current to the year 2009. Some 32% of our Certificates will mature within a five-year period., 5.7% will mature within a 5-10 year range and 61.9% mature in excess of 10 years. The Committee considers it more desirable to have a larger percentage of the portfolio to be maturing in the medium range period of 5-10 years and will be considering that position as certificates mature.

While your committee takes the greatest caution possible when purchasing investments, some concern has been expressed as to individual liabilities when acting on your behalf. We attempt to have approximately 2/3 of the portfolio in Government and Government guaranteed bonds with the balance in Corporate stocks and bonds. We would request your authorization to continue such purchases within these approximate ranges.

We also reviewed the Quinn Trust Account and recommended to the Board of General Purposes that it be amalgamated within the Current Account of Grand Lodge and was consequently authorized by the Board.

This Committee was requested by the M:W: The Grand Master, through the Board of General Purposes, to recommend an amount of money to be donated to the Masonic Charities and Housing Co. Ltd. from Capital Funds of Grand Lodge. Since this request is of such magnitude I believe it appropriate to reiterate to this Grand Lodge the full report as presented to the Board of General Purposes. The Finance Committee in conjunction with the Special Committee appointed by the M:W: The Grand Master investigated Grand Lodge expenses and presented the recommendations to the Board of General Purposes. As

of May 1, 1988 the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite bodies found it necessary to vacate the shared expenses of secretarial staff in the Grand Lodge Office, hence it has been necessary for Grand Lodge to assume responsibility for a portion of that financial contribution made by the A. & A. S. Rite. I am certain that you will receive, through other reports, details that our office secretarial position has been reduced to a part-time position with a mid summer lay-off. This is being attempted as an economy measure on a part-time basis and further assessments will be made at the end of the summer season. The Board of general Purposes also requested these combined committees to assess the honorarium of the position of Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master of this Grand Lodge. The honorarium for the Deputy Grand Master of \$300.00 a year was commenced ruling R:W: Bro. Gruchy's time in office and has continued at the same level since that time. It must be understood that the D:G:M: has minimal responsibilities while the G:M: is within the jurisdiction - i.e. he presides at Grand Lodge while the G:M: is presenting his address to this august body. His responsibilities become active only when the G:M: is outside the jurisdiction for and extended period of time or when the G:M: becomes incompacitated. Under these conditions the D:G:M: assumes the responsibilities, with few exceptions, as that of the G:M: If during the course of the year a D:G:M: chooses to visit lodges, he does so as an individual member of the Grand Lodge with no additional authority and at his own expense. Hence, the committee determined that no additional honorarium could be recommended. The situation relative to the position of G:M: is somewhat different. The current honorarium for a G:M: is \$2,500 per year and has remained at that amount for the past twelve years. That alone might suggest need for alteration. However, it should also be remembered that in 1976 a G:M: was expected to visit every lodge annually. In 1983 this requirement was reduced to once every two years, thus, reducing travel requirements by 50% or increasing income by 100%. Net results being similar. The return travel distance to every lodge in this jurisdiction from a southern location is approximately 10,00 miles averaging 200 miles and \$100.00 per visit. However, a problem arises when a G:M: is requested to make return personal visits. The Committees were of the opinion that visits of the G:M: subsequent: to his official visit should be at the expense of the individual lodge extending the invitation through the normal channels. It is, therefore, recommended that no change be made at this time to the honorarium for a G:M: However, it is further recommended that in the future when a G:M: is requested by a lodge for and additional visit within the two-year period that the grand Secretary invoice that lodge in an amount of \$100.00 and that same be given to the G:M:

For the past number of years it has been customary for the Finance Committee to recommend to Grand Lodge the amounts of funds for Scholarship awards and grants to Lodges. I will again, this

year recommend that \$10,000 be provided for Scholarship Funding on basis similar to recent years and further recommend that a grant of \$550.00 be made to each lodge within the Jurisdiction for the current Masonic year. It is considered desirable that in the future these expenditures be included in the regular budget as presented to the Board of General Purposes at the beginning of each year.

I would also inform you that the budget for the 1988 calendar year is a deficit budget in an amount exceeding \$16,000. The authorization for increased dues as passed by the Grand Lodge last year takes effect only this year at the craft lodge level and will not be received by Grand Lodge until the end of the year after Saint John's Day in December.

All of this is respectively submitted on behalf of your Finance Committee.

Wor. Bro. Robert Strokes of Woodstock Lodge No. 11 then outlined his research of the will and bequest of the late William G. Quinn and his views as to the wishes of the late Brother Quinn regarding housing for Senior Masons, etc. He then moved as follows:

"I move that the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick donate the income of \$75,000 for a Senior Citizen's Complex from the William Gibson Quinn Trust Account for the purpose of Capital Expenditure with the stipulation that the first complex built be named the Quinn House."

The motion was seconded by W:B: Ronald Caines of Coverdale Lodge No. 52.

On the question R:W: Bro. Owen Walton asked, should the motion be passed would funds be taken from Quinn Trust Capital or interest earned and also what effect such a donation would have on the annual grants to all lodges? He was assured that funds could only be taken from interest earned and M:W: I. Dale Steeves, Chairman of the Finance Committee, offered his opinion that if the motion passed and the grant of \$75,000 was approved, Grand Lodge would not be able to continue the annual grants to the Craft Lodges, and also other arrangements would be necessary to continue scholarship funding. R:W: J. D. McKenna then spoke in favour of the motion and felt that, by his calculations, plenty of funds should be available from Quinn Trust revenue (interest earned) without danger to Capital Funds.

Wor. Bro. William E. Cooper of Hiram #6 then spoke at some length stating that while he was not opposed to "the principle that we should become involved in Masonic Housing" he urged extreme caution and commented:

"I think it is inappropriate for us to be considering major contributions from the Trust when there is no project set out, there is the possibility of a project, but there is nothing tangible being presented in the form of housing and if we involved ourselves with a private corporation and considerable amount of money in a project that, so far, is non-existant."

He also noted that funds given "will be subject to whatever ruling Revenue Canada makes and this is not, in my estimation, the appropriate time to make any contribution from this body to that Corporation unless there is a project in place and unless those funds are going to be expended in the immediate and in the current year in which they were contributed."

Finally, he stated that "if this Grand Lodge comes back with a substantial proposal and one that is imminent then I think that we might re-consider the matter at that time".

M:W: Bro. Blake Oulton noted that we could be considering a donation of "a considerable amount of money to go to a private corporation over which we, as Grand Lodges have no control."

W: Bro. D. Mayes pointed out that, to date only 700 Masons out of a total New Brunswick membership of approximately 7,000, or 10%, had so far shown support for the housing concept, and while he too supported the corporation in principal he felt that, first of all, the uncommitted 90% or membership should be developed and that the Finance Committee's recommendation that funds be conserved for future needs should be supported at this time.

R:W: Bro. D. Gruchy again stated that The New Brunswick Charities and Housing co. is to construct, maintain and operate apartment complexes and that they "would be totally in control of 50% of them".

After further brief discussions and remarks, The Grand Master called for a vote on the motion and it was carried by a narrow margin. (91 to 83).

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

My report to you will be brief and hopefully to the point.

Work is continuing on a provincial history, but not as quickly as I had anticipated, and certainly not as quickly as I would like. Writing a book is not an everyday assignment, and seems to move by "fits and starts," particularly when the would-be writer is a volunteer who has not yet reached the golden years of retirement. The task at hand certainly leaves little time for the traditional chronicling of current events.

No matter what the task at hand, I have come to the conclusion that the Grand Historian needs volunteer assistance to keep abreast of current events. My forays into the north of the province are few and far between, and reflect a lack of budget (for which I am not making a request), and the limitations placed by the distances to which I may drive after a day's work. I request only that volunteers from the various districts please contribute information concerning unusual or interesting items to me.

The Grand Historian still needs help from many individual lodges to bring their histories up to date. Lodges in District No. 4, during R: Wor. Bro. Dingee's term of office as District Deputy Grand Master and as a result of his urging, have accomplished this task, and this effort by the authors and the right-worshipful brother is much appreciated. I am aware that there are other lodges trying to complete their histories and they receive my moral support and encouragement. I recommend that the two newest lodges, Granite and Adnaki, prepare a story about the events that led up to obtaining their warrants and, a review of their subsequent accomplishments.

I bring to your attention that many of the original documents upon which Bunting based his history would appear to have been lost in fires or have simply disappeared. At one time I would have recommended the donations of ex string historical documents and archive materials to the provincial museum for safekeeping, but recent developments leave me with reservations regarding that

suggestion. The housing of any historical collection requires a concern for safe storage – safe from deterioration, destruction and shrinkage – and the maintenance of a proper catalogue of the materials contained in the collection, and most importantly, a responsible custodian. Private homes do not usually meet these requirements, are not always accessible, and occassionally require gross, uncontrolled and unplanned transfer of the materials to another location. Such collections may be at risk because of a controlled storage environment – lack of proper air circulation, humidity control, and the risk of fire are some examples of the kinds of concerns encountered. In considering storage, we need volunteers to come forward and offer to help with the job.

There is a Canadian collection in storage in Newcastle and undoubtedly there is material in it that would be of interest to us. The custodian of that collection is Bro. Jack Ullock.

In the last two decades, there have been a number of local community histories written, some concerning family geneologies, others containing lists of settlers arriving by ship, and some dealing with the development by Loyalists of our communities. We have never attempted to add this material to any of our libraries, and the donation of any spare copies would be much appreciated. They provide useful information to cross-reference to lodge membership in order to learn more about our early brethren. They are expensive to buy new and we have not appreciated their value to reaching a better understanding of our roots.

In closing I ask consideration to be given to inviting the Grand Historian to attend the various meetings of the Board of General Purposes not necessarily as a member, but as an observer so that he may be kept better informed concerning issues.

I tender herewith my report on Fraternal activities within District No. 2.

Visitations and Presentations

It has been a very busy year and all lodges in the District have been visited at least twice, with several visits to lodges in our neighbouring District No. 7. I have always been welcomed on every occasion and recently on my Officials Visit I have had tremendous support from my predecessors and other officers and members of Grand Lodge. There were 47 brethren with me when I visited Lodge St. Andrew in Rexton on March 14th for a total attendance estimated at 93. During these visits I have been pleased to present, on your behalf, 25 and 50 year pins and Grand Lodge Certificates.

Presentation of 70 Year Bar

The first 70 Year Bar in this District was presented to Bro. Allison S. Geddes by M:W: Bro. William Murray, PGM on September 22nd 1987 in the Moncton Hospital. Bro. Geddes received his Master Mason's Degree in Tweedie Lodge, No. 41, on September 14, 1917. His immediate family were present as were the following Past Masters of Tweedie Lodge, Robert Livingstone, Secretary; Benson Stymiest, IPM, and C. A. Pincombe, D.D.G.M. Bro. Geddes, then 92, was most appreciative of the honour conferred upon him.

Church Service

The Annual Church Service for Districts 2 and 7 was held on September 27 in St. Andrews United Church in Rexton with Lodge St. Andrew No. 16 as host Lodge. The Minister, Rev. David C. Jackson, Past Grand Chaplain and Secretary of Lodge St. Andrew, conducted this Service and delivered an excellent message on the meaning of Friendship. District Meetings and Workshop

June 10 Westmorland Lodge, Port Elgin acted as hosts for a community banquet to honour R:W: Bro. Dr. H. G. Hetherington and Mrs. Hetherington.

June 16 Tweedie Lodge held a **Bill Murray Night** to honour our recent Grand Master with several presentations, including one to Mrs. Murray.

September 25 Fownes Lodge held a banquet prior to Lodge, since they held the Travelling Gavel. R:W: Bro. George Robinson made several presentations and spoke of his young days in Havelock.

November 21 Attended the Second Greater Moncton Masonic Dinner and Dance.

December 10 Zetland Lodge, Shediac Cape, honoured R:W: Bro. Chesley Bateman, PDGM, with several gifts in honour of more than 40 years service to the Craft.

January 23 Attended the Installation of the Officers of Westmorland Assembly, No. 23, Order of the Rainbow for Girls, and brought Greetings from you and your Grand Lodge. These young ladies are most deserving of our support.

Summer Communications

Zetland Lodge No. 24, Shediac Cape will be meeting in July and August on the second Thursday this summer on a trial basis. They did not meet in February or March.

Public Relations


