ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

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The first of four meetings of the Board was held on June 28, 1997. It was called to order by the Grand Master, M:W:B: Osborne L. Nason, who, after welcoming remarks, turned the meeting over to the constitutionally designated Chairman, R:W:B: Evan W. Thomas, Deputy Grand Master. R:W:B: John C. Dunham, Senior Grand Warden, was then elected Vice-Chairman.

In a report on the "One-Day Class", held on April 26, 1997, in Riverview, N.B., M:W:B: William H. Balser remarked on the success of the event and listed for the record the Primary Officers and Lecturers for the day. He also noted that the event came in somewhat under budget.

The Board increased the Grand Master's annual travel allowance from \$3,500 to \$3,750 effective May 10, 1997. It also established, effective the same date, a yearly travel allowance, each, for the Senior and Junior Grand Wardens.

The new Chairman of the Masonic Charities and Housing Corporation, W:B: Brian Francis, reported that \$18,000 was paid for a very successful Camp Goodtime 1997. \$4,500 was also given in support of the 1997 Deaf, Blind and Rubella Camp.

At the request of W:B: Francis, the Board approved the sale of Camp Goodtime lapel pins at \$3.00 each. Sales will be made by Masonic Charities & Housing through the various New Brunswick Lodges. The Board also approved the sale of Return Address Labels bearing the Masonic Square and Compasses, with proceeds to the Masonic Charities and Housing Corporation. A suggestion was made by a Board member that each package of labels contain a note advising against using the labels for business purposes.

Masonic Charities and Housing has also reported that Camp Goodtime 1998 will be held at the Rotary Camp on Grand lake during the first week in August, with Sponsor Day scheduled for August 2nd.

A suggestion was made that New Brunswick consider making available to its members a 50-Year Medallion, similar to that used by other jurisdictions. The Awards Committee was given the task of investigating availability, costs, etc. and reporting back to the meeting.

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In his remarks to the Board, the Grand Master suggested that whenever possible, photographers be used at special occasions so that a visual record may be had for future reference.

According to section 12, page 44 of the Constitutions (adopted at the 130th Annual Communication) all Directives of the Grand Master currently on the books will expire at the conclusion of the 131st Annual Communication. Accordingly, notices of motion on the following subjects were prepared by the Jurisprudence Committee: Allowing the wearing of Blue Aprons and Medals with a Tux and Fez by members of the Luxor Temple Past Masters Unit when on parade; Requiring that all degrees must be conferred in their entirety at a single meeting, excepting the lectures which must be given as soon thereafter as possible; Specifying that the examination and Obligation for each degree shall be completed by the candidate in "Open" Lodge except under special circumstances when, by permission of the District Deputy, the Obligation may be given in the preparation room; Directing that the Grand Master only shall close Lodge in "short form": Allowing Semi-Public Installations only upon permission of the Grand Master, with the request to be submitted through the District Deputy 30 days in advance and then done from memory except for the ancient charges. The full form of these motions were reviewed and approved by the Board and are contained in the Proclamation for Grand Lodge.

The content of the Directives regarding the explanation of the penalties of the Obligations, the placing of the burning tapers during the first degree and the use of the Sign of Fidelity, including at the opening and closing of the Great Lights has been placed in the Ritual.

Also reviewed, approved and placed in the Grand Lodge Proclamation were notices of motion to make the appointment of a Deputy Grand Secretary permissive rather than mandatory; One requiring the preparation and distribution by Grand Lodge of memorials each time a Grand Master or Past Grand Master dies; And one adding the term "Masonic" to the section of the constitution governing the display of emblems and adding language clarifying the penalties and methods of handling violations of this section.

The Grand Lodge computer is now connected into the Internet and the Grand Secretary may now be reached by E-mail at masonic@nbnet.nb.ca.

The Board asked the Grand Master to appoint a committee to explore the possibilities of rearranging the Grand Lodge office space for greater efficiency and possibly even establishing dedicated office space for the Grand Master. Reports on this will be returned at a later date.

It was unanimously decided that an extra bar for 3rd generation Masons would NOT be allowed to be added to the Lewis Jewel.

The Board approved limited financial support to assist in the establishment of the new Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador. This support was sent with our delegation to the instituting ceremonies, which was headed by M:W:B: Charles N. Hollett. A letter was later received thanking us for this support and requesting official recognition. The request for recognition was referred to the Committee on Recognition.

It was noted the letter "G" is not displayed on the 50-Year Pins currently being issued in New Brunswick. It was decided that the pin would be redesigned before being reordered.

The Jurisprudence Committee has been requested to review the office of District Deputy Grand Master and submit appropriate recommendations to the Board.

The Ritual Committee has been asked to review and make recommendation to the Board regarding the possible changing or removing the existing penalties from the Obligations of the 3 Degrees.

The Board authorized the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master and the Grand Secretary to attend the All Canada Conference in Winnipeg.

In remarks to the Board, the Grand Master noted that the Jurisprudence, Education, Masonic Renewal and Constitution Review Committees have been particularly active this year.

The Board has decided to require that all committee reports be submitted to the Grand Secretary, in writing (typed), at least 21 days prior to Grand Lodge, or in the case of 1998 by April 15th. The reports will then be printed or duplicated and distributed in the registration area at Grand Lodge. The report presenter at Grand Lodge will give only a very brief summary of the report and then move or cause to be moved the ACCEPTANCE of the report. If the report contains recommendations requiring action by Grand Lodge, they will be presented, moved and acted upon in the usual manner.

The Credentials Committee will also be asked to shorten and summarize its report as the complete report will be printed in the Annual Proceedings.

In order to help the Grand Secretary ensure the accuracy of the Proceedings, the Board authorized him to rent any necessary public address and sound recording equipment, which has been done.

The Board approved a motion that Annual Proceedings be reviewed and proof-read by the Grand Master of the session and by the Grand Historian prior to final printing. They also approved a motion that a complete list of all Past Grand Lodge Officers be printed in the Proceedings.

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The Board asked the Grand Secretary to investigate the advantages, if any, of changing the fomat in which the Annual Proceedings are printed.

On closing, I would like to thank all of the Members of the Board for their efforts in making this a productive year for Freemasonry in New Brunswick. I must particularly express my thanks to R:W:B: Andrews and R:W:B: Piercey for their stellar efforts with the records and agendas of the Board.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE
GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK F. & A.M.

For the benefit of the newer members of Grand Lodge, your Committee relies primarily on the Annual Report of the Commission on Information for Recognition prepared for presentation to the Annual Conference of the Grand Masters of Masons in North America. The following are extracts from the report.

The Commission was organized in 1952 as a facility to gather, collate and from time to time to revise information on Grand Lodges in other lands and as a service to the Grand Lodges of this Conference. Fundamentally, it determines whether or not a Grand Lodge seeking recognition, conforms to established standards. Briefly they are:

1. Legitimacy of Origin.

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- 2. Exclusive territorial jurisdiction; except by mutual consent and/or treaty.
- 3. Adherence to the Ancient Landmarks specifically a belief in God, the volume of the Sacred Law as an indispensable part of the Furniture of the Lodge and the prohibition of the discussion of Politics and Religion.

The Commission's investigation usually requires the gathering of information from various sources such as proceedings, written or oral information from knowledgeable individuals, other Grand Lodges and from discussions at meetings with representatives from foreign Grand Lodges.

We have received a request for recognition from the Grand Lodge of Burkina Faso, a western African country, formerly known as Upper Volta, located north of the Ivory Coast and Ghana. It is a French speaking country, having formerly been a colony of France. The Grand Lodge of Senegal, with the assistance of the Grande Loge Nationale Francaise, consecrated on September 13, 1997, the "GRAND LODGE OF BURKINA FASO" in their capital city. The Grand Lodge of Senegal is recognized by thirty members of the North American Conference including our own Grand Lodge, also by England, Scotland and most other European Grand Lodges. Based on the endorsement of its regularity by the Grande Loge Nationale Francaise, and its Constitution and Laws, the Commission is of the opinion that the Grand Lodge of Burkina Faso is regular and entitled to recognition.

Accordingly, your Committee recommends to this Grand Lodge that recognition be extended to the new Grand Lodge of Burkina Faso.

A request for recognition has been received from the recently consecrated Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador.

Early in 1997, the twenty-seven lodges of the United Lodge of England comprising the District Grand Lodge of Newfoundland, voted to form an independent Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador. This action met the approval of the Grand Lodge of England, and was subsequently consecrated on November 1, 1997, in the presence of representatives of both the United Grand Lodge of England and the Grand Lodge of Scotland.

The Grand Lodge of Scotland has a District Grand Lodge of Newfoundland with sixteen lodges and both the Grand Lodge of Scotland and its District Grand Lodge agreed to the formation of the new Grand Lodge, although only three lodges of the Scottish Constitution joined the new Grand Lodge.

Eighteen Grand Lodges of Canada and the United States of America were represented, including eight Grand Masters. Your Grand Lodge was represented by M:W: Past Grand Master W. H. Balser Jr., also M:W: Past Grand Master C. N. Hollett and R:W: Bro. J. H. Pike P.D.G.M.

The United Grand Lodge of England recognized the new Grand Lodge at its Quarterly Communication on September 10, 1997, in advance of and conditional on its consecration on November 1, 1997. This new Grand Lodge is regular and meets all the standards of Recognition.

Therefore, it is recommended that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick recognize the Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador and exchange representatives.

Most of the incoming correspondence dealing with Fraternal Relations is in the language of the country where the particular Grand Lodge is located. The cost of engaging professional translation services should be explored and a reasonable funding recommended through the Board of General Purposes.

REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A.M.

The committee was given several tasks for interpretation, clarification and/or recommendations.

The first task given to the Jurisprudence Committee was to review all Past Grand Master's Directives. We recommend several Directives be placed in the Constitution and notices of motion have been filed to cover these additions. The directives which are not included in the Constitution will expire as per Page 44, section 12, of the Constitution.

We also reviewed the Grand Lodge Office, including the positions of the Grand Secretary and the Deputy Grand Secretary. We submit the following recommendations:

- 1. The present updating of management, administration and technology continue in the Grand Lodge Office.
- 2. The Grand Secretary will be responsible for the Management and Administration of the Grand Lodge Office. The day-to-day operations of the office will be under the supervision of an Executive Assistant, reporting directly to the Grand Secretary.
- 3. The office of Deputy Grand Secretary will be omitted, with the provision should the need arise the Grand Master may appoint a Deputy Grand Secretary. We have filed notices of motion to cover the appropriate sections of the constitution.
 - 4. A private office will be made available for The Grand Master.
- 5. The Grand Lodge main offices are to be reorganized to achieve maximum efficiency of available space.

We held a meeting with the members of the N.B. Soaring Association. The Association expressed an interest to turn over approximately \$35,000.00 in assets to be used as a Bursary Revenue. Negotiations are continuing toward the successful transfer of these assets to Grand Lodge.

A notice of motion to change the constitution regarding the use of any Masonic emblem or device, for personal or commercial gain, has been filed. We also made a notice of motion providing for a memorial. The Grand Secretary will issue the memorial, and all Lodges in the Jurisdiction will drape the Charter, following the death of a Grand Master or Past Grand Master.

We reviewed the Grand Lodge regulations regarding the use of the Internet. It is suggested a letter be sent to all Lodges in the Jurisdiction, indicating, the Masonic use of the Internet, is governed by the Constitutions and General Regulations of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. All Brethren are requested to review Page 61 - sec. 63, Page 63 - sec. 3 and Page 64 - sec. 5 of the Constitution. All Internet inquiries regarding Masonic activity in this jurisdiction shall be directed to the Grand Secretary.

The final duty given to the Jurisprudence Committee was to review the proposal from the Constitution Review Committee dealing with Masonic Offenses and Trials. We recommend a new section be added to the Constitution to include Masonic Offenses and Trials. This new section uses the applicable sections of our present Constitution. The power of suspending or excluding a member for unmasonic conduct remains within the jurisdiction of the individual Lodge. (Page 57 - sec. 31). Our present Constitution provides adequate coverage of Masonic offenses. They require no deletions or additions in this area. The appropriate sections of the Constitution should be used as a reference when considering the laying of a charge. Under this proposal considerable responsibility is placed on the Master of the Lodge. The office of Master is unique to our Fraternity. It is his responsibility to see those charges under Masonic Offenses are justified and a Masonic Trial is conducted as per our Constitutions.

We recommend the adoption of the proposal by the Constitution Review Committee.

The interest, dedication and enthusiasm of the members of the committee is very much appreciated.





PRESENTATION BY CHAIRMAN OF

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The chairman of Constitutional Review, R:W:B: John C. Dunham, spoke on the work of the committee in preparing their report which was mailed to the 1,400 members of Grand Lodge for their consideration.

CONSTITUTIONAL REVIEW

He noted the reasons why such a document was necessary, mainly to afford protection to both the Lodge and the Defendant.

This document will be presented to the Grand Lodge in 1999 for approval. During the coming year, lodges will be asked for their input.

I am John Dunham, Senior Grand Warden of the N.B. Grand Lodge, and last May was appointed to chair the Constitution Review Committee by the Grand Master, Osborne L. Nason.

First of all, let me give you some background of my personal life. I was a peace officer with the Saint John Police Force for 34 years. I retired in 1986 as Deputy Chief of Administration, having come up through the ranks, and from 1969 to 1974 I served as Court Sergeant under the late Chief Judge Harold S. Prince, and also under Chief Judge Andrew Harrigan. These were years I truly enjoyed, but moved on to Divisional Inspector, Superintendent of Traffic, then on to Deputy Chief.

This committee had been in existence for over a year when I became chairman. The Constitution Review Committee was made up of R:W:B: Ralph Andrews, R:W:B: Robert (Bob) Johnson, W:B: Ron Hodgin, R:W:B: Ches Piercey and myself as chair, and they had all served the previous year.

In March, a copy of Masonic Offences and Trials was submitted to you, the members of Grand Lodge, for your perusal. Please keep in mind that this draft is not the first one by any means and is not one that was drawn up in a few weeks. It is now in its third year.

It is not something that has been accomplished by one person or even one committee. In its early stages, Brother Bert Ljungstrom, Q.C., was involved in its review and helped in wording the charges in the first part of the offences. The Jurisprudence Committee was greatly involved in the final preparation and it has also been placed before the Board of General Purposes. So this gives you some idea of its preparation, as it was presented to you in March.

This is something that is needed in our Constitution, not only for the protection of the Grand Lodge and Private Lodges, but for protecting all brothers. I have been personally involved in two cases of theft in the concordant bodies and in reviewing The Quarterly, published by the Grand Lodge of England, eleven members were expelled from the lodge for charges of indecent assault, common assault, theft, conspiracy to defraud, blackmail, misappropriation of funds and failing to declare a previous application for initiation when making a further application to another lodge.

These offences all occurred in three months in the Grand Lodge of England and I realize they are much larger than us, but these are all offences that can happen here.

It is my intention to place the Masonic Offences and Trials before you today to use as a guideline and next year to present it for an addition to the Constitution.

This will give all the Brethren a chance to review it properly. To think that it will not be amended or not needed, you would be living in a dream world.

Keep in mind that to speak on the question will be an answer given as my opinion and not the opinion of the committee, and that you have a year to present any amendments that you feel are needed to improve this article.

I move that the Masonic Offences and Trials be used as a guideline for the lodges and brought before the next sitting of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick for an addition to the Constitution.

CONSTITUTIONS AND GENERAL REGULATIONS OF THE GRAND LODGE

MASONIC OFFENSES AND TRIALS

There are two classes of Masonic Offenses. First those which transgress civil and criminal law.

Secondly, offenses against the moral law and Masonry which include and are not limited to violations of the Landmarks, Masonic Obligations and the Constitutions and General Regulations of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

These offenses may all come under the charge of conduct unbecoming a Mason.

METHODS OF TRIAL

For any Masonic Offence, a Mason shall be tried firstly, by his own Lodge or by Grand Lodge if his own Lodge refers the case to Grand Lodge.

When a charge has been laid, the Master shall investigate the charge and determine if there are sufficient grounds for a charge. If sufficient grounds for a charge are found, the Master shall assemble the Lodge for the purpose of conducting a Masonic Trial.

The Master shall appoint a Secretary, who is not connected to the trial in any way, to record the proceedings.

The Master shall conduct the prosecution of the charge.

It shall be the duty of the Master to see that the accused Brother has reasonable opportunity to prepare and present his defense and that the matter is brought to trial and conducted in accordance with Masonic principles as expeditiously as reasonable.

LAYING THE CHARGE

A charge of a Masonic offence shall be made by a Mason only. The charge shall be in writing and signed by the accuser, who need not necessarily be a member of the Lodge of which the accused is a member.

The charge shall be delivered by the accuser to the Secretary of the Lodge.

The charge shall specify with reasonable certainty the particulars of the offence or offenses alleged, including the time and place of their commission.

SERVICE OF PAPERS

When service of any papers on any brother or papers in connection with a Masonic Trial or any appeal connected therewith is required by the rules, such service shall be effected in the following manner:

If the residence of the brother is known and he resides within the jurisdiction of the Lodge of which he is a member, he shall be served personally if possible.

If his residence is known and he resides out of the jurisdiction of the Lodge of which he is a member, he shall be served either personally or by registered mail addressed to him at his last known post office address.

When the party to be served cannot be served personally or where service is authorized by registered mail, service shall be deemed to have been effected seven days after mailing, by registered mail, to his last known address.

TRIAL

In the absence of a good reason to the contrary, the trial shall be held in the vicinity of the Lodge of which the accused is a member.

The Master of the Lodge shall appoint the time and place of trial, and shall cause the accused to be served with a copy of the charge and the particulars thereof, and notice stating the time and place appointed for the trial thereof. The time shall be so fixed as to give the accused reasonable time to prepare his defence.

The trial shall proceed on the date set by the Master of the Lodge and may be adjourned from time to time as necessary. Notice of any postponement or adjournment shall be given to all parties concerned.

The accused may choose counsel for his assistance but none but Master Masons shall appear as such.

The charge shall not be amended before or during the trial unless the accused is given notice of the amendment and given reasonable opportunity to meet the amended charge.

Only Master Masons of the trial lodge shall be entitled to attend the trial as spectators. Should the accused not attend at the time and place of trial after notice has been served on him, the Master shall proceed in his absence and conduct proceedings to a final conclusion.

The Master and the accused in person, or his representative, shall be entitled to examine and cross-examine the witnesses for the prosecution and the defence.

At the conclusion of the evidence the Master and the accused in person, or his representative, may address any relevant argument as to guilt or innocence to the Lodge.

WHEN THE EVIDENCE AND THE ARGUMENTS ARE CONCLUDED:

The accused shall retire and the doors shall be closed for deliberation.

The Brethren of the Lodge shall then decide the guilt or innocence of the accused by written ballot.

The Lodge shall then decide the punishment of the accused. The accused shall be re-admitted and the Master shall announce verdict and punishment.

A majority decision of the Lodge shall decide.

WITNESSES

The evidence of any Mason shall be received. They shall be bound by all their Masonic Obligations.

It shall be the duty of the Accuser and the Accused to secure the attendance of their respective witnesses.

EVIDENCE

The Master shall decide all questions as to the relevancy of the evidence and the regularity of the proceedings.

The Secretary appointed to assist the Master shall take down in writing a summary of the evidence submitted and note all objections made. All copies of the summary of the evidence, objection, rulings and decisions of the trial shall be forwarded by the Secretary to the Grand Secretary who shall thereupon file same.

JUDGEMENT

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

In the absence of the accused he shall be served with notification of the verdict and sentence by the Master in person or by registered mail.

The sentences that the Lodge may impose are:

Reprimand

Suspension for a definite time

Indefinite suspension.

Suspension for any offence deprives the offender of all Masonic rights and during its continuance of privileges.

BOARD OF APPEAL

Within thirty days after the conclusion of the trial a Mason convicted and sentenced by the Brethren of his Lodge may appeal his conviction or his sentence or both by filing a Notice of Appeal with the Grand Lodge.

Within thirty days after the conclusion of the trial, the accuser may appeal the sentence by filing a Notice of Appeal with the Grand Lodge.

The Grand Master may extend the time for filing an appeal under this Section for such periods as he, in his sole discretion may deem just, not to exceed ninety days.

The Grand Master, upon being advised that an appeal has been filed, shall refer the Appeal to the Board of General Purposes, or appoint a committee to investigate the same.

REGULATIONS

The appeal shall be on the evidence as submitted at the Masonic trial. No new evidence shall be heard at the appeal except in unusual circumstances and then only by leave of the Board of Appeal.

When a case is remanded for a new trial no amendment shall be made to the original charges unless the accused shall have due and timely notice thereof.

GENERAL

A Masonic trial resulting in conviction or acquital shall be a bar to any other Masonic prosecution for the same offence.

Where a Mason has been expelled or has been suspended, either for a definite time or indefinitely, he shall cease to hold any office in his Lodge or in Grand Lodge, and on restoration shall not regain that office unless again elected or appointed to it.

RESTORATION AFTER SUSPENSION

Definite suspension shall expire at the end of the period ordered, and any member so suspended shall be entitled to resume membership and all rights and privileges thereof at the expiration of the time defined in his sentence, without vote or other action on the part of the Lodge of which the accused is a member.

A Mason seeking restoration after having been suspended indefinitely shall petition the Lodge from which he was suspended for his restoration, but no such petition shall be received until after one year from the time of the suspension or the time when a petition for restoration was last presented.

The petition shall be received at a regular meeting of the Lodge and shall be held over until the next regular meeting thereafter before final action thereon.

Notice of the application for restoration shall be inserted in the Notice preceeding the regular meeting at which the application will be voted upon.

The vote on the application for restoration shall be by secret ballot box.

In all cases of restoration by a Lodge, the brother shall be restored to all his Masonic rights and privileges, including membership in his Lodge.

If a Lodge has ceased to exist, the petition for restoration shall be made direct to Grand Lodge. In all cases of restoration by Grand Lodge, the restored brother shall have the status of a non-affiliated brother.

The Grand Secretary shall provide the Board of General Purposes or the Committee appointed by the Grand Master with the summary of the evidence, together with the objections, rulings and decisions of the Lodge Masonic Trial. Upon request by the accused and/or his representative, a copy of same shall be given to him or them.

The Grand Secretary shall notify all necessary parties of the date and place of the appeal hearing, giving the party appealing a reasonable opportunity to prepare his appeal or his answer thereto. The Master of the Lodge and the accused with his representative, if any, may attend to make such representations as they deem proper.

A notice and copy of the appeal must also be sent by the appellant to the party against whose decision the appeal is made.

When all parties shall have been summoned to attend thereon, and the case has been investigated, the Board of General Purposes or the appointed Committee shall report to the Grand Lodge, which shall have full power to deal therewith as a majority shall determine.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MASONIC EDUCATION

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK F. & A.M.

Your Committee on Masonic Education held a number of meetings during the past year. Although we were slow getting started, we did have several informal meetings prior to meeting as a committee. We wanted to look at what direction we should take and what type of educational material we should develop for the lodges throughout New Brunswick. At our first meeting it was suggested, "why re-invent the wheel", there was a lot of material around that has not been used in some time that could be updated and enhanced. We sifted through several sources of material and came up with the following:

- (1) A wallet card with What Masonry is and What Masonry is not.
- (2) Investigating a Petitioner for Masonry and Recommending a Petitioner. This information has been around for sometime but apparently was not being used. A supply of this material was sent to each Lodge Secretary along with the pamphlet, "Freemasonry a Way of Life". We suggested to the Secretaries that when someone is recommending a petitioner or investigating a petitioner they should be given a copy of this information.
- (3) Five quizzes. Entered Apprentice Degree. Fellowcraft Degree. Master Mason Degree. General Information and Balloting. The first four quizzes were produced by the Masonic Education Committee back in the early 1980's when R:W:B: Linkletter was chairman. The committee felt that if these quizzes were updated with explanations and references provided on the answer sheets, the quizzes would then become more user friendly and the District Education Officers would be more apt to use them. R:W:B: Swetnam took on the responsibilities for the updating of this material. We also revised the Balloting quiz, the question sheet is now only one page. This will cut down on the number of photocopies required when the quiz is presented to a lodge. A supply of this material was given to each District Deputy.
- (4) We are currently updating and enhancing the booklet **Approaching The East.** We hope to have this done within the next two months.
- (5) The Board of General Purposes has approved in principle a one-day or a part-day workshop on Leader Training. We have targeted the date of October 31, 1998, with the location to be chosen. R:W:B: Maurice Linkletter and R:W:B: Michael Swetnam have agreed to co-chair this event.

We wish to take this opportunity to express our gratitude to The Most Worshipful The Grand Master for the privilege of serving Grand Lodge and the Masons of New Brunswick for this past year.

REPORT ON MOSTLY MASONRY

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK F. & A.M.

As Chairman/Editor of "Mostly Masonry", I must apologize for the format changes and the quality of the photographic reproductions in past issues. I have been trying to find a fomat that will allow the most information in the least space in order to keep the cost of printing to a manageable level. The latest issue shows what I hope will be the continuing format and the improvement in the quality of photographic reproduction.

I wish to discuss some topics of relevance to the future of "Mostly Masonry."

The first topic concerns the amount of material that I receive from the Districts. The only two Districts that have good reportage are Nos. 1 and 6. District No. 1 receives good reportage because I live and am quite active in District No. 1; District No. 6 receives good reportage because W:B: 'Bud' Gillrie, Secretary/Treasurer of District No. 6 Council writes to me regularly following each of their meetings. I would appreciate receiving regular reports from the secretaries of all District Councils that would give me material to report in 'Mostly Masonry'. Not just on events that have happened, but on future plans as well.

The articles that appear in 'Mostly Masonry' should be of interest to brethren in the Grand Jurisdiction. This would include events of special interest that could give ideas to other lodges or districts for fund raisers, special recognition, 50-Year Pin and Certificate presentations, etc. For items of a more local interest, the District Deputy

Grand Masters can make mention of these on their visits or, as some lodges do, print a combination notice/newsletter to keep their brethren informed.

At present, the distribution process is haphazard at best. It is not a timely process. From the time the printing is completed to the time it is received by the lodge Secretaries can be quite a lengthy process, and in some cases delivery may not be effected at all. A better method must be found, perhaps one that doesn't place such a burden on the District Deputy Grand Masters and the lodge Secretaries.

'Mostly Masonry' should not be viewed as just a newsletter. It is, without doubt, the most important method of communications we have at present in this Grand Jurisdiction. We must make a commitment to it and it must continually improve in content, timeliness, format and distribution. It should be more newspaper than newsletter.

Recommendations:

1998)

Distribution: That the Chairman/Editor of 'Mostly Masonry' be given responsibility for investigating the possibility of direct mailing and its associated costs and make recommendations to the Board of General Purposes.

Format: The latest issue of 'Mostly Masonry' shows that as more information becomes available, more space will be needed to accommodate the articles. That the Chairman/Editor of 'Mostly Masonry' be granted permission, when space is required, to increase the number of pages.

Sponsors: To lessen, and possibly eliminate, the costs associated with the printing and distribution of 'Mostly Masonry' the Chairman/ Editor be granted permission to find sponsors within the fraternity and this Grand Jurisdiction willing to share the cost and be given mention in 'Mostly Masonry'.

Electronic Distribution: That the Chairman/Editor of 'Mostly Masonry' be granted permission to investigate the possibility of finding one member of the fraternity in each lodge of this Grand Jurisdiction who has the ability to receive electronic mail and having that individual designated as the person in his lodge to receive 'Mostly Masonry' by e-mail. Each lodge would then be able to print 'Mostly Masonry' and photocopy the number of copies they require for each membership.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK F. & A.M.

As chairman of the Grand Lodge Finance Committee, I am pleased to present my first annual report, succeeding our Grand Master, who was chairman for many years.

You have already received the report of the Grand Treasurer and I assure you that the financial position of Grand Lodge is very strong indeed.

We have investments of over \$850,000 at year end in our General and Benevolent accounts as well as some \$83,000 in cash. This large cash fund was the result of some high yield bonds being recalled by the issuers late in the year and these funds will be reinvested as quickly as possible. It is important, of course, that we keep a small cash reserve to meet our ongoing needs, but this is left with Wood Gundy in a banking arrangement which currently pays an attractive short term rate of 4.5%.

The majority of our investments are now managed by Wood Gundy and the results have been excellent. There is ongoing information presented to the Grand Treasurer and the Finance Committee and any changes contemplated are fully reviewed. At present our portfolio is invested at an average rate in excess of 8% and less than 15% is in Mutual Funds. Barring something unforseen, there are no investments maturing in 1998. At some point we may feel it necessary to move more into the Mutual Fund area, but this seems unlikely at the moment.

We continue to see some growth in the amount of our investments and, at present, some 50% of our income is from this source. If our membership continues to drop, our investment revenue will be critical. We have investments in the Saint John Masonic Temple and private lodges totalling \$120,000, which is down by \$16,000 from a year ago. Most of this is at 6.5%.

We have budgeted to keep our expenses in line with the previous year and have recommended to the Board of General Purposes that we once again make grants of \$400 to each private Lodge. In addition, we have recommended that \$10,000 in bursaries be paid from our Fund of Benevolence.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK F. & A.M.

It is my pleasure to again present my report on the activities of this Grand Lodge for the last year. This will be my ninth report to this Grand Lodge.

In 1997, the Masons of New Brunswick were again the sponsors of Camp Goodtime, a camp for children suffering from cancer. The camp is run by the Canadian Cancer Society and this year was again held at Camp Glenburn on the Belleisle. In 1997, sixty children were hosted at the camp for a week. In 1998, the camp is being moved to the Rotary Camp at Princess Park on Grand Lake. This new site will prove less challenging to the campers as it is on level ground. All Masons are invited to attend Founders Day at the camp, especially this year with a new site. This is a major charity that all Lodges and Masons can be proud of and continue to support as we have in the past.

In September, 1997, we were also again able to sponsor seven children to attend the camp of the New Brunswick Deaf/Blind Rubella Association.

A major activity this year has been the development of a Masonic Renewal program for the Lodges. This has been under the guidance of Right Worshipful Brother Rideout, Hartland Lodge No. 46. He and his committee have a manual with five major areas that can support renewal. Remember many of the Masons we lose are men who feel they have nothing to contribute or are never asked to contribute, thus they stay home. Perhaps a lesson can be learned from St. Martins Lodge No. 30 who put on a third degree with the degree team being made up of Masons who had reached or exceeded their seventy-fifth year. Nothing past about these former Masters.

Our youth continues to be a major part of what we want the public to see in us. Again this year we gave out \$10,000 in bursaries to students with Masonic affiliation. And the Lodges gave support to the boys in DeMolay and the girls in Rainbow. These two organizations need continued support if they are to survive. Do not think of these as training grounds for members, but as training grounds for good character and citizens that will later on be the type of people we wish to attract to our memberships.

District meetings with Official Visits of the Grand Master continue to be an excellent means for the Lodges and the Grand Lodge to share information and ideas. This has not in any way replaced the

visiting that the Grand Master does to individual lodges for special events of which there were many this year.

The Grand Lodge, through the Board of General Purposes, spent a lot of time this past year revising parts of the Constitution as a result of the Grand Lodge Communication of 1997. Many of these have been up for final debate at this session. On this topic, a major paper has been developed relating to Masonic Offences and Trials.

Finally, I would like to say that I enjoy getting Lodge bulletins and District news sheets that contain history of the local Lodges and sometimes broader history topics. Every area has history and by putting even small parts into print many can enjoy and appreciate our roots in masonry. One of these was a picture of the Bluenose showing the Masonic Emblem on the Fantail between the name Bluenose and Lunenburg. The picture was in the Centennial bulletin and contributed by Worshipful Brother Harrison. He says that a major part of the financing of the ship was by a group of Masons.


