The Public Relations Committee has once again found it necessary to purchase advertising space in the local newspapers to publicize many of the Grand Lodge's special events and awards. These expenditures seem to be paying some dividends as Albion Lodge was able to arrange an interview between a local reporter and M:W:B: Osborne L. Nason on the occasion of its 175th anniversary. The interview resulted in a fine news article appearing in the Telegraph-Journal weekend edition for their January 27th rededication ceremony.

The committee has placed considerable focus on assisting the New Brunswick Masonic Family Web Page into operation. This has been a cooperative effort with all of the major masonically affiliated bodies of New Brunswick, but, particularly the Eastern Star. While this endeavour is less than a year old, it already has more than 40 subscribers representing all branches of Masonry in New Brunswick. Even though the website is just now being listed with the major search engines, the site is already receiving continent wide attention.

Another project that deserves attention in this report is that of assistance provided to the Salvation Army by Masons of Moncton and Saint John. This project, providing manpower assistance to the

Salvation Army Christmas Kettle Drive, has for many years been promoted and coordinated in Saint John by M:W:B: J. Ralph Andrews, our Grand Secretary. A similar project was established a few years ago in Moncton by R:W:B: Michael Swetnam, and this past season transferred to W:B: Darrell Thurber. These two projects, although separately established and coordinated, have produced many accolades, not only from the Salvation Army, but from our own members and the public at large.

The projects reported on here, along with other like projects, initiated by individual lodges are, this committee believes, having a positive impact upon the image of Freemasonry in New Brunswick.

All Lodges have and are actively supporting the objectives of the N.B. Masonic Charities and Housing, through various fund raising projects and through these efforts have introduced neighbours and friends to the charitable nature of Masonry.

The District 6 Council has continued active, holding regular quarterly meetings hosted by different lodges of the District. REPORT OF THE CONSTITUTION REVIEW COMMITTEE

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE
GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A.M.

The Constitution Review Committee had three areas related to the Constitution on which it was requested to examine and prepare recommendations. The Board of General Purposes referred the concept of having a section added to the Constitution on the merging of

re-instatement of members suspended for more than a year be examined and if appropriate adopted. The third matter that the committee worked on was a referral by the Jurisprudence Committee in its report to Grand Lodge last year.

The Committee has met several times this year and has worked on each of the three referred problems.

1. A form was developed by the Committee to be used by Lodges for members under suspension, of longer than one year, who wish to rejoin the Lodge in good standing. This form was accepted by the Board and is available from the Grand Secretary. The section of the Constitution that covers reinstatement is article 34, Of Private Lodges, page 58.

2. The consolidation of Lodges was also worked on by the Committee members who examined the Constitutions of several other Canadian Grand Jurisdictions. From this research and an examination of the situations of some of our Lodges, the Committee has prepared a section for the Constitution that outlines the steps to be followed if two or more Lodges desire to consolidate. This section is in the notices of motion for this Grand Lodge and will be discussed further at that time.

3. The topic of referral from last year's Grand Lodge deals with the Lodges getting into high priced items for Lotteries to the public. The committee has discussed this issue and the Chairman has attended a meeting with the Housing and Charities Committee to inform them of the discussions and to get their feedback. One of the problems is that some commercial interests wish to partner with Lodges on money raising projects. "Section 53 Of Private Lodges" page 61 of the Constitution deals with a member, but not a Lodge getting involved in commercial projects. A further issue involves Lodges wanting to use the Registered Charity status of the Masonic Charities and Housing Company for registering a lottery (draw) to give tax credit. This can't be done and the holding of large lotteries or ticket sales without a lottery license will expose the Lodge to audits by the Provincial Tax Department.

We have not resolved this issue. It was planned to discuss this at the Board meeting in March, but the meeting was not held because of a snow storm.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE
GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A.M.

It is my pleasure once again to comment on the financial affairs of our Grand Lodge on behalf of the Grand Lodge Finance Committee.

You have before you the Grand Treasurer's report showing the revenue and expense for the year 2000 as well as the year end Balance Sheet. From this you will see that our Grand Lodge is in a very healthy financial position.

The year 2000 was a challenging one financially. In 1998 and 1999 we managed to have a gain on operations totalling \$25,107 but in the year 2000 we had a net loss of \$10,251 and if our budget predictions are accurate, we expect a small loss of \$4,000 in the year 2001.

The other side of the story has seen total Assets in all Funds rise from \$915,073 in 1966 to \$990,385 in the year 2000. Our Treasurer has located several small investments belonging to the Hoar Memorial Account and this is reflected in the current balance sheet.

We continue to work with Brother Robert Dunn of CIBC Wood Gundy Securities to attain the greatest return possible while striving to maintain a secure investment portfolio. You will note that about 50% of our General Account income is from investment earnings and the reality is that with greatly reduced interest rates, our portfolio has a large weighting in good quality, high income mutual funds. The markets of late have been extremely volatile and it becomes increasingly difficult to attain the income expected while maintaining a risk free portfolio.

In addition, our membership continues to erode, with a consequent loss of revenue, but hopefully we will keep our expenses in check and end the year 2001 in a break even position.

We recommend that the unconditional grants to private lodges remain at \$400 and that \$10,000 be paid in bursaries from our Fund of Benevolence.

Brethren; again since our last meeting, several of our Brothers have been called to the Celestial Lodge above. We remember their presence and the contribution they made to our Fraternity. We extend to the bereaved families our sincere sympathy.

Our Grand Secretary will now read the names of our departed Brethren.

We will observe a moment's silence in their memory, following which our Grand Chaplain will offer a prayer.

Their memory we cherish in our hearts.

Visitations

As I did last year, I accepted all invitations on a first come, first serve basis. Unfortunately, due to a stormy winter, conflicting dates, and a short period of personal indisposition, I had to cancel several meetings. I attended 104 Masonic and Masonic related meetings of which a complete list is attached. I thank all the Grand Lodge Officers for their support on all my official visits.

It was a great privilege for me to represent this Jurisdiction at the Annual Communications of the Grand Lodges of Maine, Connecticut, New Hampshire, Vermont, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Ontario and Newfoundland and Labrador. On my behalf, M:W:B: Carr Graham visited the Jurisdiction of Massachusetts, and the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Connecticut.

On all my official visits, I was overwhelmed by the number of Grand Lodge and Past Grand Lodge members who accompanied me. On one occasion there were five Past Grand Masters in attendance, and it was very gratifying to have such support.

Again, it was with sadness that on February 1, 2001, Grand Lodge performed a ceremony of receiving back the Charter of Alley Lodge No. 14. After long deliberation, the Officers and Members decided that due to declining membership, to surrender their Charter.

Committees

I wish to extend many thanks to the Chairmen and members of the different committees for the work they have done for the betterment of our Jurisdiction.

Masonic Renewal Program

My sincere thanks to R:W:B: Wayne Hitchcock for his continued efforts in promoting this program and with the help of other Grand Lodge Officers this program has been divided into 17 modules, thus simplifying the program.

During my visits around the Jurisdictions, I noted that in spite of speeches, articles in Mostly Masonry, modules delivered to the Lodges and seminars delivered around the province, Masonic Renewal is still confusing people as to its content and its intent.

The intent is to create Lodges that provide an atmosphere to their members that the members find satisfying and rewarding. The re-

search that has been done shows that there are certain things that men look for in a Fraternal Organization, and these are:

Friendship

Fellowship

A chance to perform community service

A chance to socialize with friends

A chance to involve their families

An opportunity to make contacts

An opportunity to learn to lead

An opportunity to lead

Our Fraternity can offer all these things to a man, but all too often we don't. Masonic Renewal is trying to show us how we can improve our approach to our membership so that they are more satisfied and more excited and proud to belong.

The content of Masonic Renewal is a series of books and courses which work on six areas of the Lodge, and each critical to creating that all-important atmosphere.

These areas are Leadership, Membership, Fellowship, Education, Family Involvement and Community Involvement.

Leadership is important because strong organizations that move forward are well led by strong leaders, men who know the problems and are ready to face them with possible solutions.

Membership is important because it is our most prized asset, and one that grows smaller and older every day. We must not only increase our membership but also provide that rewarding experience so that we don't lose as many men to suspension and demits as we gain through our membership programs.

Fellowship is important because it is the number one thing that men everywhere think they should get from a Fraternity like Freemasonry. Also, we look a bit hypocritical when we profess Brotherly Love, and then don't show it.

Education is a must so that our membership is more comfortable talking about the Fraternity to the outside world. Every member should have the confidence to speak as a goodwill ambassador for the Craft.

Family and Community Involvement are both important for new member satisfaction and for the improvement of the public perception of Freemasonry. 71% of the general population have no idea who or what Freemasons are. If we want membership to increase, that number has to drop.

Masonic Renewal will continue to try to help the Fraternity. As more Masons become aware that the program is more than just membership, more than leadership, and that the intent is to have better and stronger Lodges, then, hopefully, more Lodges will ask the Renewal Committee to come and visit and explain the concepts involved.

It was also noted that some of the Lodges are using the Friend to Friend program with success. I assure you, it is a good program, and I urge every Lodge to use it. You may be surprised at the results.

When Lodges begin to do this, we will be taking our first giant steps toward recovering our past glory.

District Deputy Grand Masters

Once again, the Grand Lodge has been very fortunate in having seven District Deputies who performed their duties in a very able manner.

Through their efforts, the visits of Grand Lodge were well attended, and they kept the Brethren of their districts informed of what was taking place at the Grand Lodge level. According to their reports they have been very busy, and may be looking forward to a rest. Their time and labour is greatly appreciated.

Conferences

On March 16, 2001, in the A.M., the Deputy Grand Master and myself attended the Aldridge Conference of Eastern Jurisdictions, held in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

During this session, the viability of this Conference was discussed. A consensus was reached that in its present form the Conference was not working as it was originally anticipated. It was moved, and seconded, that the Aldridge Eastern Conference be suspended for a period of three years, at which time this decision will be reviewed.

In the afternoon of March 16th and all day of March 17th, the Deputy Grand Master and myself attended the All Canada Conference held in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

There were 15 topics presented and discussed.

Brethren, it was a very interesting and educational program. I plan on speaking more about this Conference at the next meeting of the Board of General Purposes.

A very special thanks to the Members of the Communication Committee and their Associates. Their help in organizing the various functions for our Grand Communication was invaluable.

Last, but certainly not least, is my love and thanks to my wife, Ruby, whose confidence and support over the past two years has always given me strength and courage to fulfill my obligations.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK MASONIC CHARITIES AND HOUSING COMPANY LTD.

I am pleased to submit herewith the Annual Report of the N.B. Masonic Charities & Housing Company Ltd.

Subsequent to our last annual communication, quarterly board meetings have been held in Sussex, Fredericton, Miramichi and Saint John.

During the Grand Lodge session held in May 2000, several Lodges presented cheques in support of our children's charity projects, totalling in excess of \$7,000. Also, we were very pleased to have Betty Hoyt, of the Canadian Cancer Society, N.B. Division, attend at which time a cheque for \$24,000 was donated to fund the N.B. Masons Camp Goodtime 2000. A photograph of this cheque presentation was published in the Saint John Times Globe on June 10th.

N.B. Masons Camp Goodtime was held in July for an eight-day camping experience for children ages 7 to 13 who have a history of cancer. We are very grateful for the large turnout of Masons, family members and friends for the Sponsor Day on Saturday, July 8, 2000.

Gathering in the camp chapel, The Most Worshipful The Grand Master, James H. Pike, extended greetings on behalf of all the Masons of the jurisdiction. Both the Grand Master and W:B: Stewart Brenton, treasurer, and myself gave out Camp T-shirts as souvenirs. A large colour poster was signed by each camper and then presented to your executive and the Grand Master to say "Thank you N.B. Masons."

This year, all present were invited to stay and enjoy a barbeque and refreshments with the 52 campers and counsellors. Approximately 100 Masons and their family members were in attendance.

We also had a guest reporter attend during Sponsor Day, from the Grand Lake Mirror, and this was followed up with a news article published in the newspaper, complete with photographs.

Nicholas J. Pappas Memorial Play Garden: The official opening was held at the Saint John Regional Hospital on July 13, 2000. W:B: Brenton and myself were invited to attend and we were delighted to see the state of the art playground and park-like setting outdoors, just off the main floor of the hospital. A permanent plaque commemorates the major contributors, including the N.B. Masonic Charities. Please take a moment and examine this facility which has been erected for all children in the hospital to enjoy.

Fundraising: CIBC Wood Gundy Miracle Marathon continues to support the N.B. Masonic Charities and we are pleased this year to have received over \$2,500 from this corporate sponsor. The Lodges have continued to work diligently and through a variety of fund-raising initiatives raised in excess of \$36,000 for the year 2000, a record in our ten-year history.

Deaf Blind Rubella Summer Camp: Our registered charity continues to support this camp, by funding four children and their intervenors to attend this one-week camp held in Richibucto area in September each year. Children and adults who attend this camp have been afflicted with deafness and/or blindness since birth.

Quinn House, St. Andrews, N.B. The eight-unit seniors' housing project continues to operate efficiently and at full capacity under the leadership of W:B: Frank Langley and his committee from St. Mark's Lodge No. 5. A special thank-you to Bro. Robert Johnson, CA, for his financial guidance and assistance.

Festival of Trees: Once again in November, the N.B. Charities have donated and trimmed a Christmas tree in recognition of the N.B. Masons Camp Goodtime project. This charitable fund raiser is in support of community worthwhile causes such as Mind-Care, is well attended and is an excellent opportunity at public relations.

Our new colour brochures are a welcome addition to our promotional material and are available to all Lodges at no charge. Also, a limited number of colour posters to promote fund-raising events are available upon request.

Brethren, we are indeed indebted to the dedicated Masons from throughout the jurisdiction who comprise our Board of Directors. They faithfully attend our quarterly Board meetings and account for the overall success of the operation. A special thank-you to R:W: D. W. (Bud) Gillrie, Secretary, and W:B: Stewart Brenton, Treasurer, for their considerable time and efforts year round.

On behalf of the Board, I extend sincere thanks to the Masons of New Brunswick for your outstanding contributions and excellent support of Camp Goodtime and our other charitable projects.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE
GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK F. & A.M.

The Board of General Purposes held four meetings this past year 2000.

Honorary Titles were discussed at length with the Jurisprudence Committee, deciding that they would study the matter at a later date and report back.

R:W:B: Hitchcock expressed concern at the small attendance at some of his meetings that were held to promote Masonic Renewal. Members speaking in support of R:W:B: Hitchcock noted that this is a common failing in the Masonic Order and that as Masonic Renewal is the only tool that we seem to have it was the decision of the Board that they should support R:W:B: Hitchcock in his efforts.

It was also agreed that the District Deputies and members of Grand Lodge should approach the problem in a slower manner, encouraging Lodges to approach the implementation of the Modules one at a time and not try the complete job in one swoop.

The Education Committee is presently engaged in updating the Mentor Program to meet present day requirements and a copy of the new book has been produced for the members to examine. It was moved that the present Mentor Program remain in service until the new program is completed.

Some concern over the Order of Recognition given to the Grand Lodge Officers was expressed and the matter was given to the Jurisprudence Committee for an opinion. The Jurisprudence Committee at a later meeting were of the opinion that the present listing of Members in the Constitution should not be changed.

Members had been expressing some concern about the Web Page that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick sponsors and the matter was left in the hands of the Grand Master to investigate.

The matter was later settled by joining with the Masonic Family in producing a Masonic Family Web Page with the Concordant Bodies.

The reading of the Annual Reports was discussed and it was agreed that reports which do not require explanation would not be read and those requiring explanation would be highlighted by the presenter.

It was also recommended that a new form to be used for Reinstatement be approved by the Committee on Constitutional Review. This was attended to and the new form is now in use.

The matter of Grand Representatives accounted for at Grand Lodge was discussed and the matter was left with the Grand Master.

Masonic Charities and Housing have been very active. Camp Goodtime was again a great success and a cheque for \$24,000.00 was again presented to the Cancer Society.

The Grand Master had been approached by the Shrine for permission for the Shrine to go to the Craft Lodges and promote the Shrine. As this matter is already covered in Module 13 of the Masonic Renewal Program, it was agreed that there was no need to change the policy. The Shrine would be welcome to go to the Craft Lodges if invited by the Master.

Discussion also took place in reference to Masons who belong to two Lodges. Some have requested permission to register at Grand Lodge under the name of the Lodge that they hold Honorary Membership or have become affiliated with.

It was moved that these Members may be registered under the Lodge they specify after producing the proper voucher to the Credentials Committee.

REPORT OF THE MASONIC RENEWAL COMMITTEE

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE
GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK F. & A.M.

The Masonic Renewal Committee this year has attempted to both teach and learn. Each Lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction has been receiving Renewal modules since October, at the rate of one every two months. The modules highlight different aspects of Renewal and are meant to be read by the line officers in each Lodge or any other Mason who is interested in the welfare of his Lodge. It is hoped that the officers will not only read them, but find the material interesting enough to talk about and ultimately act upon.

The committee has ceased giving District seminars in this Grand Jurisdiction, primarily due to poor attendance, but has been invited to speak in the Grand Jurisdiction of Maine twice this past year. The Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Maine, M:W:B: Wayne Adams, has found Renewal a nice compliment to his Membership Committee's efforts. Our willingness to share our experiences with Renewal has certainly helped to maintain the strong relations we have always enjoyed with the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Your Renewal Chairman has let it be known wherever he has gone that he is available to come to any private Lodge and discuss the specific problems of that Lodge with an eye to what Renewal might have for solutions. At the time of this writing, four Lodges have taken advantage of this offer and several more are considering it. These "private" sessions tend to be very effective. The Lodge officers can open-up and state their own problems without feeling embarrassed because "outsiders" are listening. On the part of the Chairman it makes things easier since he doesn't have to teach twenty things they don't need to get to one or two things they do. It has the added benefit that the Lodge officers see how they can get results. Results tend to activate people and pull them out of their cocoon. These private meetings are something we may wish to pursue more vigorously in the future.

Your Renewal Committee has acquired two new teaching aids in this fiscal year, "75 Ways to Attract and Retain New Members" and "The Essential Skills of Leadership". Both of these products are worthwhile additions to any Masonic Renewal Library.

The acquisition of these materials has raised a concern among some that there is simply too much material to read, understand and absorb. There is a certain amount of validity to this claim. However, for the Lodge who has decided to make the effort, these materials are valuable references. For those who find the quantity of material daunting, keep the following five steps in mind and relate all materials to them, always remembering that Leadership is required throughout.

1. Examine your Lodge and be honest with yourself about what you find, listing all its faults and shortcomings.
2. Form a plan that will correct these faults over time (6 or 7 years) and which will result in the type of Lodge and atmosphere that you want to have.
3. Endeavour to make the Lodge a place where all feel they are involved and important. This is where better meetings, family involvement and community involvement come in.
4. Activate a serious and conscientious Membership program. Even if steps 1 through 3 are not completed but only in the planning stages, your new members can be shown the vision and direction and help you achieve your goals. In doing this, they feel ownership of the "new" Lodge they helped to form.
5. Remember, in spite of the energy you expend getting through steps 1 to 4, your original goals are to make good men better and to promote the Golden Tenets of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

All the materials and methods of Renewal are geared to help, aid and assist this five-step process. Some Lodges are better prepared to begin reaping the rewards of Renewal than others but all should be doing something with these five steps.

The Renewal Committee, Education Committee and M.R.T. (Masonic Resource Team) of District No. 4 are currently developing and experimenting with a comprehensive Fellowship Night Program. If it is successful in the Lodges of District 4, it will be released to all the lodges in the province. It will be a hybrid program drawn from the best programs of several Grand Jurisdictions.

Finally, the Renewal Committee is investigating a program being instituted by the Grand Lodge of Alberta called the "Doric Plan". It is the cornerstone of their "Foundation for the Future" program. The

program involves a contractual deal between the Grand Lodge and the Blue Lodge whereby the Grand Lodge furnishes courses and plans and the Blue Lodge officers (top 5) agree to take the courses and implement the plans. They began with three contracted Lodges in Edmonton, Alberta, last fall. If they show the expected results, we will be looking very closely at implementing a similar program here.

As always, your Renewal Chairman and the members of the committee are only a phone call away and are ready to assist you in any way possible.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

It is my pleasure to present my report on the activities of this Grand Lodge for the past year.

The Grand Lodge was saddened to receive the surrendered charter of Alley Lodge #14. Alley Lodge held their first meeting on August 5th, 1855, under a dispensation issued by R:W:B: The Honorable Alexander Keith, Past Grand Master. Alley Lodge was originally #962 under the registry of England and later changed to #664 in 1862. The surrender of this charter marks the end of 146 years of activity.

Grand Lodge joined in celebrating 175 years of Masonry in Albion Lodge No. 1. Albion Lodge then #52, was formally constituted under its warrant on January 23, 1826, by R:W:B: Benjamin L. Peters under special authority granted him by R:W:B: Thomas Wetmore, Grand Master of New Brunswick.

The commitment of this Grand Lodge to the children of New Brunswick remains steadfast. Again this year we sponsored Camp Goodtime, a summer retreat for children with cancer, under the direction of the Canadian Cancer Society of New Brunswick. This eight-day event was held at Camp Rotary at Grand Lake.

Our Grand Master has continued to support as his major initiative the Masonic Renewal Program. R:W:B: Wayne Hitchcock served as the chairman of this committee touring our province and conducting presentations. In addition, this year modules have been sent to all lodges for benefit of the craft.

Masonic youth affiliates continue to be a major thrust of this Grand Lodge. The order of DeMolay has benefited from our ongoing support as we further assist in the training grounds of good citizenship and moral character.

All lodges in our jurisdiction were saddened at the passing of the Most Worshipful Past Grand Master, the Honourable John Stewart Brooks this past year and all charters were draped for two months. Most Worshipful Brother Brooks served as Grand Master of New Brunswick for the years of 1973 and 1974. His memory we cherish in our hearts.

Such nomination is to include a brief account of the nominee's Craft Lodge background which will be published in the Proclamation calling Grand Lodge. In the event no nominations are received for any given elective office, the Grand Master, soon after opening Grand Lodge, shall set, or cause to be set, an appropriate period of time during which written nominations for that office shall be accepted by the Grand Secretary. Every written nomination shall bear thereon the consent of the person nominated for the particular office. No person shall consent to be nominated for more than one office. He shall be deemed to have consented to the nomination for the highest office to which he has been nominated only.

CONSOLIDATION OF LODGES

When Lodges decide to consolidate they will inform their District Deputy Grand Master of their desire to proceed with the steps towards consolidation. The District Deputy Grand Master will monitor the process as the Lodges move towards union. The Lodges must select one of the Lodges to be the name, number and Charter of the consolidated Lodges. If this cannot be agreed upon then a new name may be selected and a number allotted by the Grand Lodge.

When the above matter has been agreed upon, a resolution proposing the consolidation under the name, number and Charter of the proposed new Lodge must be presented to each lodge involved at a stated meeting and acted upon at a subsequent meeting. All members concerned must be notified by mail at least ten days before the vote is taken. Each Lodge shall report to the Grand Secretary on the vote taken, stating the number of members for and against the motion and the number who have abstained from voting.

Each Lodge shall forward to the Grand Secretary a petition for amalgamation under the Seal of the Lodge, setting forth the terms of the proposed amalgamation.

The Grand Secretary shall refer the petitions for amalgamation to the Board of General Purposes for consideration. The Board by a majority vote may approve the petitions as presented or approve the petitions upon conditions to be accepted by the Lodges or reject the petitions.

If the Board approves the consolidation, the Grand Secretary will notify each of the involved Lodges. The Lodge or Lodges that cease to exist must hold no meetings after receiving notification of approval for amalgamation. The records and assets should be transferred promptly to the consolidation Lodge and the Charter and Seal returned to the Grand Master through the Grand Secretary. The memberships of both lodges will automatically be combined when all Grand Lodge returns are completed. The Secretaries concerned will make a final report to the Grand Secretary dating from January 1st to the date of consolidation. A lodge failing to attend to these matters will revert back to its original status.

The Grand Master, or such other Brother as the Grand Master may appoint, shall carry the amalgamation into effect by attending at the time and place named. The members of the Lodge, present, shall choose by ballot the elective officers who, with the officers appointed by the Master elect, shall be immediately installed, if present.
