

It is a great pleasure for me to submit my first report as District Deputy Grand Master for District #1.

District #1 is comprised of the nine Lodges from the West Side of Saint John to Sussex, with a majority (6) meeting in our Masonic Temple on Germain Street. At present, we are 1.023 Masons in number with this being a decrease from the past year and only one of our Lodges (The New Brunswick #22) showing an increase in membership. On a more positive note, in the months of February and March of 2004, thirteen Entered Apprentice Degrees have been conferred in the District with some of these new members being attributable to "Friend to Friend" nights held in the fall of 2003. We have great interest and will be looking more into the "Fellowship Night" concept of the Grand Lodge as we are ecstatic now with our new members but know we cannot get complacent as we build for the future.

This was another successful year of benevolence in the District with much money raised for Camp Goodtime. I would again encourage all Brethren throughout the province to plan to attend "Sponsor's Day" on Saturday, July 17th, to get a feeling for what we are raising funds for. The Annual District #1 Ron Hodgin Memorial Golf Tournament was another resounding success with the Lodge Trophy awarded to Cherry Mountain Lodge; the first time that a non-District #1 team has done so. We look forward to their return to defend the trophy and, as always, we are looking for more golfers to participate. The variety show held by Carleton Union Lodge #8, the breakfast held by Albion Lodge #1 and numerous donations from other Lodges in the District all contributed to the end result. It was always a special treat for me to visit the various Lodges throughout the District as each of them has its own particular character. It was also a pleasure to attend on the Grand Master on his four official visits, with his February evening in Union Lodge of Portland #10 being for the purpose of receiving the Annual Reports of the District Lodges.

During the past year, no requests for recognition have been received, nor has there been a request for withdrawal of formal recognition.





REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A.M.

On behalf of the Finance Committee, I present a brief commentary on the monetary affairs of Grand Lodge for the year 2003.

For the past two years, we budgeted for a small deficit on general account. Fortunately, with good expense control, we had a combined gain for the two years of \$96 on an average budget of \$100,000.

Once again this year, we are projecting a deficit, hoping that the final results will be positive as we continue to walk a very fine line between a gain or loss. Our dues revenue continues to drop, reflecting a decrease in our membership.

Dues in 1993 were \$61,000 and had dropped to \$45,000 in 2003. The trend should be reversed as our per capita gradually increases. The change will take the per capita from \$10.00 to \$15.00 per member over five years, effective with the reports for 2004. Hopefully the burden on our Private Lodges will not be too drastic.

Our investment income remained fairly steady, despite a very difficult investment climate and ever dropping interest rates. Investment income was \$38,000 in 1993 and grew to \$45,000 in 2003.

Expenses have been kept in check, at \$93,000 in 1993 and \$97,000 in 2003. If we maintain this course, with an increase in dues, our future should be secure. Our total assets have remained static.

We continue to help Lodges with short term financing where possible, and this often avoids bank financing.

Once again, we recommend a grant of \$200 be given to each Lodge and that an amount of \$10,000 be awarded in bursaries from the Fund of Benevolence.

I want at this time to thank all the Grand Lodge Officers and Brethren who attended on me at these visits. Your attendance is a show of support of the Grand Lodge to the visited Lodges. With the assistance of the Grand Lodge Officers I conducted rededication services for two Lodges that were celebrating one hundred and fifty years of service.

I attended all that I could or had a representative attend at times that I had previous engagements. This past year I had the good fortune of attending the annual communication of seven of our neighboring Jurisdictions and am pleased to report that I was well received at each of them. I also wish to thank the Deputy Grand Master and the Senior Grand Warden for each representing this Grand Jurisdiction at a sister Jurisdiction. Also Most Worshipful Brother James H. Pike took my greetings to the Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and represented me as an official visitor to the Grand Lodge of Connecticut.

Committees

I wish to extend many thanks to the various Committee Chairmen and Committee Members for the many hours of work that you donated to improve the operation of this Grand Lodge. Most Committees had a major restructuring this year with new Chairman and many new faces and above all many tasks to perform. I am pleased to report that the work of these committees was completed on time and to a high level. As they make their own reports please note how busy they

were this year. In particular the direction of the Awards Committee and the Ritual Commmittee were revised and approved by the Board of General Purposes. A new Committee this year developed a Grand Masters Award program for the Lodges, a program that outlines certain duties of a Lodge which when achieved will lead to recognition at the Annual Communication.

To members of the Board of General Purposes I offer my thanks for your dedication to the craft of New Brunswick and your support to me. Many kilometers traveled and many hours given so that Masonry in New Brunswick can continue to prosper.

District Deputy Grand Masters

I started this year with six new District Deputy Grand Masters who I had the honor of appointing to their first year and one returning District Deputy Grand Master from District 3 who provided experience for the team. I am pleased with the work and support of my representatives in the Districts for it is through them that the Grand Master is kept informed of what is happening and what needs to be addressed. To Right Worshipful Brother Sterling Manderville of District three, who is retiring, I say thank you on behalf of the Grand Lodge and the Lodges in your District for the effort that you have put forth.

Conferences

On April 2, 2004, the Deputy Grand Master and myself attended a session of the Aldridge Conference in Winnipeg, Manitoba. It was decided by those in attendance, which included all the Grand Lodges with membership, that this conference had achieved all that it could and should be dissolved. By a unanimous vote the Aldridge Conference was dissolved and any monies it had in trust were to be handed over to the All Canada Conference.

On April 2-3, 2004, the Deputy Grand Master and myself attended the All Canada Conference in Winnipeg, Manitoba. The theme of this conference was the different types of Masons based on their particular interest in Masonry. I presented a paper to the Conference entitled "Traditional Masonry" which was very well received. The conference was well run and very informative. A highlight was a tour of the Manitoba Legislative building with a tour guide who pointed out very significant Masonic influences in the construction of the building.

State of Lodges

This past year has proven to be another year in which the Lodges of the Jurisdiction have worked very hard to revitalize themselves. This appears to be going very well for most of the Lodges. The number of candidates has gone up for many Lodges and attendance in their meetings is also improving. There are however some Lodges that are looking at their future with the realization that they do not have the membership base required to be successful. Some are putting together an action plan that includes Fellowship meetings to attract new candidates and meeting changes that will attract more of their membership to participate on a regular basis. Some others are looking to amalgamation with a neighboring Lodge to build one stronger Lodge in an area.

It is with regret that I must inform you that in December 2003 I received the Charter of Hartland #46 from a presiding Past Master at a meeting in Woodstock. This was done with emotion and dignity for the members present.

Acknowledgements

My Brethren, it has been a great privilege and honor to serve as your Grand Master for the last year. You have received me into your Lodges with dignity and fellowship for which I thank you. To those who have traveled with me it is hard to express the level of gratitude that I have for your company and support.

To the Officers and committee members that have contributed to the success of the year I also add my thanks. To the Grand Lodge office and the Most Worshipful Grand Secretary your work has greatly simplified my tasks and made the year so much easier. The short time that I had to work without the Grand Secretary while he convalesced made it very clear what he actually does to make the Grand Master's life easier.

A special thanks to my wife Lanah, who has spent many hours alone while I was on the road, without the support of our families the task of an Officer of this Grand Lodge would not be possible.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK MASONIC CHARITIES AND HOUSING COMPANY LTD.

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A.M.

Brethren, I take pleasure in presenting the Annual Report of the N.B. Masonic Charities & Housing Company Ltd. for the year 2003-2004.

At the Grand Lodge session held in May 2003, several Lodges presented cheques in support of our children's charity projects, totaling in excess of \$12,000. We were pleased to have Betty Hoyt, Director of Community Programs, N.B. Division of the Canadian Cancer Society, in attendance. At that time a cheque for \$24,000 was presented to fund the N.B. Masons Camp Goodtime 2003.

N.B. Masons Camp Goodtime: Approximately 50 campers ages 7 to 13, attended a one-week summer camp for children with a history of cancer. A large turnout of Masons, families and friends attended "Sponsor Day". The day's activities included camp tours, presentations of souvenirs, skits by the children, followed by a BBQ.

In 2004, Camp Goodtime will be extended to a seven day format (an extra day). Also this year a new Junior Leadership Program is being added for 13 and 14 year olds. This Junior Leadership Program will offer a unique opportunity for these youths to develop their leadership skills.

Deaf, Blind Rubella Summer Camp: Our registered charity increased our donations to \$5,600 to sponsor eight children together with their interveners to attend this one week summer camp held in the Richibucto area. The children and adults who attend the camp are deaf and/or blind, many since birth.

Fund Raising: The New Brunswick Masonic Lodges have again shown their dedication and enthusiasm by donating in excess of \$40,000 to fund our projects. Many of the fund-raising activities done by the Masons are providing great public relations at the local level and involve their community at large.

Quinn House, St. Andrews, N.B.: This eight-unit complex is located on Queen St., St. Andrews, N.B., and serves as an example of Masonic dedication to our seniors in the province. The daily operations are supervised by a management committee comprised of members from St. Mark's Lodge No. 5. Our congratulations to this committee for the continuing success of this first class facility.

Festival of Trees: In late November, N.B.M.C.H. again participated in the Festival of Trees charity event, a one-week public event held at the N.B. Museum in Saint John. Our committee once again trimmed the "Camp Goodtime" Christmas tree. Funds raised a this event go to support Mind Care, Saint John Regional Hospital Foundation and the St. Joseph's Hospital Foundation.

Board of Directors: A special thank you to the Most Worshipful Grand Master and the dedicated Masons who faithfully attend our quarterly board meetings. These Directors provide both experience and timely advice and they are the Goodwill Ambassadors for our registered charity.

Masonic Charities and Housing Chairman W:B: Brian Francis reported that things were going well. Present costs were \$24,000.00, going up \$12,000.00 to \$36,000.00 this year, as McCains had withdrawn their support. Founder's Day this year will be July 17, 2004, at 10:30 a.m.

Sunset Lodge #56 has now secured title on the building that it had used when the Lodge was formed. The D:D:G:M: of District #5, R:W:B: Clifford Jackson, forwarded a request to the Board for a loan of \$5,000.00. After discussion, the \$5,000.00 loan was granted to Sunset Lodge #56, Campobello.

Awards Committee Chairman R:W:B: Leonard Bishop noted that changes have been made in the instructions for awarding Grand Lodge medals. Quinn Medals are mainly for Masters and Masons in Blue Lodges. Beardsley Medallions are for members in Grand Lodge who distinguish themselves in Grand Lodge.

The question of videotaping Installations and Lodge Meetings was discussed. It was moved, seconded and carried, that videotaping not be allowed without special dispensation by the Grand Lodge.

Website Master, R:W:B: Bill Boone, reported statistics on the use of the website, which is still a valuable asset to the fraternity.

Board of General Purposes would recommend that Lodges obtain an up-to-date Book of Constitution for Masters and the Secretary's desk. New members of the Fraternity, following their third degree, be given by the Mentor an explanation on the Constitution.

A request was received from Carleton Lodge #35 to amalgamae with Hartland Lodge #46. M:W:G:M: Gordon R. Rattray visited Hartland Lodge in November, 2003, advising the members of Lodge to attend to getting affairs in order. He returned in December, 2003, and found very little had been accomplished in the time allotted. Consequently, M:W:G:M: picked up the Charter and closed the Lodge. At the Board of General Purposes a lengthy discussion ensued. The Grand Secretary pointed out that several sections of the Constitution

had been violated, making it impossible to issue demits to all members of the former Lodge. The Lodge had not reported to the Grand Secretary for the previous two years. R:W:B: Boone presented some documents found concerning the Lodge at Hartland and the matter was left in abeyance until we can come up with a solution to some of the problems this Lodge has created for themselves.

The fourth meeting was held on March 13, 2004. In regards to action taken by the new M:W:G:M: Rattray, dealing with the closing of Hartland Lodge and the problems that had arisen from this matter, a motion was forthcoming and passed by the Board of General Purposes, ratifying the action taken by M:W:G:M: in this regard.

The two notices of motion at the upcoming Grand Lodge in May, 2004, were discussed.

R:W:B: Ralph Hatfield gave a report for the Grand Lodge Committee on the arrangements for the May 14-15, 2004, Communication.

A report was given in regards to Masonic Housing and Charities. The board was informed that some members and representatives are retiring or moving on to new challenges. New members and representatives are needed to fill these openings. A call will be given out to the Brethren to step up and give their time and talent to this important cause.

The Grand Lodge Proceedings for 2004 will be under the direction of the Grand Secretary.

In closing, I would like to thank the members of the Board for their attendance, partitipation and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A.M.

With permission, I present my report in this the third year of my tenure as Grand Historian. During that period of time there have been changes within the jurisdiction.

In the second month of this new century Tweedie Lodge No. 41, constituted as Lodge No. 41 of this Grand Lodge, moved into the darkness. Followed into darkness the same year by Alley Lodge, originally constituted in 1855 as Lodge No. 962 on the Registry of the Grand Lodge of England, in 1868 becoming New Brunswick Lodge No. 14.

Until 2003 there were no other reductions until Restigouche Lodge No. 25, which had been constituted in 1868, entered into darkness. The memories of that Lodge will continue to be remembered as its regalia was presented to Lodge St. John No. 27, hopefully to be worn for many years to come, while its furniture will grace the Lodge rooms of Sunset Lodge No. 56. December of 2003 saw the Master of Hartland Lodge, pursuant to his obligation, surrender his Lodge's Charter to the Grand Master as required, when that Lodge too went into history.

At the time in the year 2000 that Tweedie Lodge surrendered its Charter, the Lodge membership was reported as 100 members, while that of Alley Lodge stood at 23. In the year 2003 when Restigouche Lodge closed its doors there was a reported membership of 52, while it is understood from the last reported figures listed in the Grand Lodge Proceedings of 2002, Hartland Lodge had a membership of 46.

What were the reasons that these Lodges relinquished their warrants, surrendering to darkness? A review of historical evidence would suggest a lack of interest or apathy by members; in some instances a lack of direction from those who were expected to lead may have paved the way to their demise.

Can the trend be reversed? Might I suggest a look at the efforts put forth some years ago by Lebanon Lodge, which was counted out but was revived. History shows that a District Deputy Grand Master strove extremely hard to have the Warrant of Salisbury Lodge transferred to Petitcodiac, as he considered the "field" there better able to host a Lodge.

It is possible that the trend can be reversed, but the question as Historian, has their history been preserved? It has been said that history is a series of mistakes and that one should learn from the mistakes! However, one can only learn from those mistakes if they can be recalled and if not recorded, while the talent of telling stories is or can be wonderful entertainment, the verbal story soon may become a legend and at some point no longer bear a resemblance to the truth or what had happened.

Tweedie Lodge had a written history to 1948. Other than minute books, which hopefully have survived, what other record is there of the fifty-two year period that existed to the time the lodge went dormant? Restigouche Lodge's written history went to 1968. Have the 35 years from then to its close been recorded, in other than the minutes of their meetings? These are only examples; Blackville Lodge's short existence appears presently to consist of one short paragraph in the history of Northumberland Lodge.

In Moncton, in the late 1940's or early 1950's, there was formed a Masonic Club of Moncton and Moncton Masonic Library Board. With what skimpy evidence is in the possession of the Grand Historian, they were organized to serve as a Masonic Education and entertainment medium. Recently, enquiries were made to Brethren in Moncton as to the club and board's history; how is was formed, why it was formed, who comprised its executive, its members, etc. Hard to realize but apparently there is no record of their formation, purpose or organization!

There is a need for Lodges to record their Lodge history in a narrative form. The minutes of a Lodge are a valuable archival source, whereas a written history as a narrative or novel can be made available to all of the Lodge's members. A Lodge history should be the work of the Lodge; the Master shouldn't be required to write it. However, a Lodge should have a committee with the responsibility to the Master and to the Lodge to maintain its history in a written form available to the members.

The writing or research of a Lodge history is or should be the province of the Lodge. There is one brother who is to be commended for his efforts in preparing the histories of many of the Lodges who have been swept to the sidelines. W:B: Stuart MacDonald has been doing an admirable job researching and preparing for publication histories of Lodges long past. However, it is the responsibility of the individual Lodge to see to the recording of the Lodge's history and it should be done by Lodge members and worked on by them with pride.

To quote the 1956 writings of Bro. H. D. Boyd of St. George Lodge, quote: "It is hard to find the right words to recreate the scenes of one hundred years ago even when one is in possession of every fact and detail to add colour to the event. And when one has only the brief minutes that mark the meeting of brethren—long since gone—it is nearly an impossibility to attempt it as far as a connected story is concerned. Today, such events have become history and because of that it has been neglected," unquote.

Of the Lodges now in existence within New Brunswick, there may be 16 to 18 histories with the majority of those ending sometimes in the late 1960's. Already then, those Lodges are missing forty or more years of their Lodge history. The history of each Lodge should be recorded now. In one case of record, the Secretary left the Lodge and proceeded to another country, taking the Lodge records and minute books with him. While away, he died and the records were lost.

The Grand Lodge Board of General Purposes is reviewing an archival policy statement which could be used as a basis for a Lodge to prepare policy for their own use to record and preserve their Lodge's records, memorabilia and artifacts. It is the responsibility of the Lodge to preserve this heritage, not as an individual but collectively.

It is the responsibility of the Grand Historian to record the history of the Grand Lodge and its jurisdiction. It is with this in mind that I began what is still an ongoing project, a narrative history of this Grand Lodge. I have been encouraging Lodges wherever I go to record and prepare their Lodge history. It is my feeling that whenever there is an event of historical importance, if at all possible the Grand Historian should be present. For that reason the Lodges, through the District Deputy Grand Master, were asked to request the Lodges send a copy of their Lodge's Trestle Board to the Grand Historian.

The Grand Historian's office is not one of supervision or direction, it is believed to be one which is better described as an observer. To do that one has to be made aware of what is happening in order to observe and note the happenings.

In closing, I thank you Most Worshipful Grand Master for appointing me to this pleasant task and now express my interest in continuing the function.
