



Grand Master 2008-2009 Bill was born in Fosterville, N.B., on August 31, 1937, the oldest of three children. At a young age Bill moved to Forest City, N.B. where he received his early education in the one-room country school, moving on to Canterbury Regional High School in 1950.

On his 17th birthday, he joined the Royal Canadian Air Force, leaving immediately for basic training in St. Jean, Quebec, then on to trade training in Borden and North Bay, Ontario, graduating as an Air Frame Technician. After serving three years, all of it in Canada, Bill returned home to work in the building construction field for several years before joining the Fredericton Police Force as a constable in 1959.

The next 42 years would be spent working in the field of law enforcement; 20 years as a police officer in Fredericton, N.B., Oakville, Ontario and as Chief of Police in Hartland, N.B. In 1978 he went to work for the Federal Government as a Customs Officer, retiring from that position in 2000.

With his first wife, the former Shirley White of Fredericton, he had four sons, one of whom is currently working in China. Bill has been married 30 years to Linda Beck, from Coles Island.

In his spare (?) time, he lists computers, reading, and crossword puzzles as his favorite diversions.

Bill began his Masonic career when he was initiated as an Entered Apprentice in Carleton Lodge No 35, Florenceville, N.B., in January, 1979, being raised in March that same year. He was elected Tyler of the Lodge in 1980 and progressed yearly through the Lodge offices becoming Master in 1988. Over the next five years he served as Secretary and Treasurer of Carleton Lodge, District Deputy Grand Master for District 4, and Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

Due to work commitments and other demands, his Masonic work was put on hold for four years before once again becoming active in his Lodge. Following retirement, he devoted most of his time to Masonic work at the lodge, District and Grand Lodge levels in various capacities. He has filled in as a lodge officer for the past five years, usually in the Junior or Senior Warden's office and is presently the Senior Deacon. At the District level, he has worked closely with the District Deputy Grand Masters, assisting them in their duties; serving as the installing officer in the District Lodges and organizing and participating in the District Degree team. At the Grand Lodge level, he is a member of the Board of General Purposes, maintains the Grand Lodge Web Site, and has served as well on several committees, including Membership Renewal and Public Relations.

Bill is a Past Worthy Patron, and present Worthy Patron, of Carleton Chapter No 7, Order of the Eastern Star; 32° member of the Scottish Rite and 2^{nd} General, Rose Croix, Fredericton, as well as a member of Luxor Temple Shrine.







MORNING SESSION - MAY 10TH, 2008

The Grand Master called Grand Lodge from recess to labour again at 9:00 a.m.

The Grand Master gave direction to the Grand Director of Ceremonies to introduce those guests who had recently arrived, accordingly the following were escorted to the altar and introduced as follows; M:W:B Wayne Newson, Past Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island and R:W:B David Mosher, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island. Following the introductions, the brethren were escorted to the East to be greeted by the Grand Master and accorded seats in the East.

Following the reading of the nominees for elected office W:B: William Blatchford moved that the ballots close at 1:30 p.m. and that the election of officers take place at approximately 2:00 p.m. following the report of the Credentials committee. Seconded by W:B: Dean Marcoux. Carried.

The Grand Master extended his appreciation to the Grand Chaplain, V:W:B: Reverend Dana Dean for the Divine Service held on Friday afternoon at Trinity Church. The Deputy Grand Master R:W:B: Miles Graham moved that The Devotional address by V:W:B: Dana Dean, Grand Chaplain, be transcribed and placed on file in Grand Lodge. Seconded by R:W:B: Laurie Bishop. Carried.

The Grand Master, M:W:B: William C. Boone being about to deliver the annual address of the Grand Master turned the gavel over to the Deputy Grand Master, R:W:B: Miles Graham.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick Welcome:—

It is indeed an honor to stand here this morning as Grand Master and welcome you, my brothers, to this 141st annual communication of the Grand Lodge of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick. It is here that you, the voting members of this Grand Lodge, determine awards and resolutions in accordance with majority rule. Although distinction of rank and title may be necessary among men to distinguish certain rights and privileges, today, so assembled, we all stand equal with one voice, one vote. Focus your attention on the issues. Ignore the superfluous. Let the good of the Craft be foremost in all your deliberations, throwing by all resentments and prejudices toward each other. May your deliberations be thoughtful, your decisions just.

To our distinguished guests who have set aside this day to be with us, we welcome you with open arms. We do everything we can to make you feel at home, a part of the family and should there be anything we have neglected to do, or can do—other than lower your taxes or increase your pension—please feel free to ask. We do offer a tongue-in-cheek apology for not having lazy-boy chairs available for those moments when the proceedings tend to create heavy weights on each eye-lid. Undoubtedly somewhere during our deliberations I will be calling upon you for a few words but otherwise, please relax and enjoy your stay with us.

Necrology:---

A roll-call of the deceased brethren was read at the divine service last evening. Let us now pause for a moment for silent reflection on those departed members who have passed to the Celestial Lodge above during the past year.

Administration:-

Under the direction of the Grand Secretary, R.W. Randy Nelson, along with his capable assistant, R.W. Chesley Piercey, the Grand Secretary's office continues to seek better ways to serve the membership. The computer systems have been upgraded for more improved reporting; changed from dial-up to a high-speed internet connection for a continuous online presence able to handle large files sent by e-mail with ease as well as more timely contact.

We are still exploring ways to improve the membership reporting method. As you are aware, at the present the Lodge Secretaries submit an annual report on their membership status. The short-coming in this method is the statistics are not up to date, but always one year behind. In this age of instant communication, it is not unreasonable to consider a monthly reporting system. Working out the mechanics is not particularly difficult; however, there are other factors to be considered as well. When everything has been gone over, tested,

and re-tested, we will move into a transition stage where the two systems of reporting will over-lap. While no firm target date has been established, we are probably looking at 2010 for full implementation.

The Board of General Purposes continues to meet in regular session four times per year. A number of positions on the Board are filled by virtue of office or title according to the Constitution. The remainder are appointed by the Grand Master. In considering the appointees, I tried to balance between experienced and new members, to have all Districts represented while at the same time keeping the body to a manageable number. There are approximately 40 members on the Board.

The details of the Board's work the past year will be covered by the President's report, R:W: Miles Graham, DGM. I might add that at every meeting threequarter of the members, or more, were in attendance. It is a record to be proud of.

There were a number of dispensations granted during the year, many of which were for a semi-public installation of officers. There were also a few for permission to hold a special meeting for one purpose or another. In each case it was pointed out the Master of the lodge has full authority, granted by the Constitution, to call an emergent meeting rendering it unnecessary for the Grand Master to grant permission. A little research would disclose this fact.

However, I have been in Lodges where there appears to be no book of Constitution available at all, or is a number of years out of date. Part of the responsibility for this lies with Grand Lodge. We have been revamping our Constitution for the past two or three years holding off on any new printing until it is complete. Hopefully, the business today will be the final step in this process and a new constitution delivered to each lodge by September.

Careful planning by the Master and his officers will reduce the need for dispensations except in situations of unforeseen emergencies.

I also take this opportunity to draw attention to the Constitutional requirement regarding Masonic services for a deceased Brother:

No public procession of Masons shall be allowed without permission of the Grand Master. In case of a Masonic funeral, when the urgency of the case will not admit of delay necessary to communicate with the Grand Master, the Worshipful Master, or in his absence, the Brother ruling the Lodge, shall authorize and hold such Masonic funeral procession, and shall see that all things are conducted thereat decently and in order according to the constitutions and <u>he shall immediately after the service, report his proceedings</u> in full to the Grand Master through the Grand Secretary. — Sec 3, pg 73-4.

To my knowledge only one or two Lodges have complied with this requirement. T ask the Worshipful Masters to ensure this is done.

As a side note, public grand honors at a funeral service, it does not begin with the due-guard of a Master Mason, that is, the arms bent at the elbow with the

forearm parallel to the floor. The Masonic service booklet quite clearly states the arms are extended downwards, palms open. While there may be room for interpreting just what "palms open" means, there is no mistaking the position of the arms. Again, the Master is to ensure the proper instructions are given prior to the service.

Many lodges request a dispensation to hold a semi-public installation of officers. So long as the Grand Master is assured the work can be done by the installing officer from memory, as attested by the District Deputy Grand Master, there is little reason to refuse such request. It is an excellent opportunity for friends and family members to see a part of our ceremonies. However, in my travels this past year I have noticed on several occasions where the semi-public installation has been carried out while the Lodge is at labor. Brethren, when there are non-masons present, the lodge must be at refreshment. While it is not necessary to close the VSL, do remove the S & C from their position, replacing them again on returning to labor. The rationale behind this is the admonition given the Tyler *to keep off all cowans and eavesdroppers and permit none to pass or re-pass but such as are duly qualified.*

State of the Craft:—

Declining membership is a concern, and there does not seem to be any viable solution on the immediate horizon. From December 31, 1961, when we had a recorded 8,945 registered members to December 31, 2006 when we stood at 3,919, the average loss per year is 117 members. This takes into account all deaths, demits, and suspensions as well as initiations, affiliations and reinstatements. If we continue to do what we have always done, the eventual outcome is pre-ordained. A sizeable number of these demits are for members of Lodges gone dark.

A number of lodges have been successful in attracting new members during the last five years or so, but even they show a deficit at the end of the period. Hibernia #3 is down a whopping 298 members, followed closely by Keith Lodge #23 with 286 during that 46 year period. Carleton Union #8 is the only other Lodge recording a loss of over 200 at 222. Only two Lodges, Coverdale #52 and Landmark #51 have shown an increase over the same period of time; 25 and 8 respectively. The question comes to mind: what are these two doing differently?

Totally pessimistic outlook, you might say. And you would be correct to a degree (no pun intended). However, if such a pessimist had said to my grandfather in the 1920's that his country lodge of Orangemen, a part of a strong, vibrant organization with a presence in most communities, would be reduced to a skeleton of itself 50 years hence, he would have scoffed at the suggestion. Why is the outlook of the Masonic Order, based on a 46 year trend any different?

The decline in membership may be but a symptom of a changing society. Each generation in the last 60 years has a different outlook on life. Loyalty to family,

work, church, club, was an integral part of the pre-boomer generation. They joined, they stayed, and they worked hard at whatever they did.

Later generations from the Boomer to the Flower Child to the generation-X, Y, etc., were basically of the "what's in it for me?" mentality. Indeed, they did tune out, and turn off most of the standards of their parents. Morals, virtue, and respect, basically boiled down to a simple declaration: if it feels good, do it. Consequently, fraternal organizations such as ours held little attraction. To be sure there were those who did not subscribe to this selfish doctrine, and did become part of a fraternity that still maintains the basic tenets of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. But their numbers were not enough to reverse the decline.

In addition, the 80/20 principle seems to be alive and well within Masonry.

- 80% of those who join, leave for one reason or another.
- 20% of those who remain do 80% of the work
- 20 % of the lodges are responsible for 80% of new members
- 80% of the lodges use 20% of the resources available to them.

At the moment there are a small number of lodges struggling to stay alive. They appear to be divided into two groups:

- An aging membership with only the occasional candidate to replace them. Attrition is taking its toll. Officers are recycled. Visitors help fill the chairs. "Teams" are requested to fill the offices for any degree work being done. The dedicated core is struggling valiantly to keep the ship afloat with water washing o'er the decks.
- The second group comprises all the elements of the above, plus there is an atmosphere of dissention within the ranks; in some cases outright hostility. The factions cannot agree on any plan of activity let alone lay out a blueprint for the future. In one particular case there is so much hatred and animosity against some of the members by the opposing group, they would rather see the lodge die than view the situation with Masonic charity. In either situation, the Craft as a whole suffers. Good men are lost. The bleeding accelerates.

Brethren, there is no place for private piques and quarrels within our fraternity. Not only are they divisive, they are time-consuming; time that could be better spent on improving programs, planning and execution; indeed, time that could be better spent on improving ourselves. It is not the events in our lives that shape our character, but how we react to them. We do not have any control over anyone else except ourselves; therefore, the only person we can change is our self. Not one of us is in a perfect mood at all times. Not one of us can say we haven't carried an ill-feeling from one relationship to another inflicting upon an innocent victim an uncharitable approach to his problems. Far too often we would rather vent our own frustrations than listen to a troubled brother. Let us resolve here and now to practice the tenets of Masonry during the troubled times as well as the more pleasant ones.

Brethren, let Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and Justice be your guide with a healthy dose of common sense thrown in for good measure.

Looking ahead:-

Is there a definitive solution to revive and revitalize Masonry in New Brunswick? If I had the answer to that, every organization in the country would beat a path to my door.

Five or six years ago, The Board of General Purposes adopted a five-year plan of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. Other than a perfunctory dusting off by my immediate predecessor, it lies in the vault of forgotten records. We need to examine why this was allowed to happen as well as how to correct the situation.

Just as no business can prosper without an Action Plan—a means of mapping where it wants to be in one year, five years or ten years down the road—so must we not only develop such a plan, but be prepared to commit to it, be prepared to adjust it as circumstances dictate, be prepared to see this as an opportunity to turn a negative into a positive. We need to examine where we have been, where we are now and where we want to go. The opening statements of this section are an indication of the urgent need that this be done as soon as possible.

To this end, I am recommending that a weekend conference on The Future of Masonry in this Jurisdiction be held this summer, probably in late July or early August. The conference will be open to any Master Mason in good standing in a lodge in New Brunswick with special emphasis on having newer, younger Masons to attend. By the blending of fresh ideas seasoned with experience we will attempt to set the course ahead. One suggestion I heard—and liked—is a special session for wives or significant others so they can share some of their experiences of being in a close relationship with a Mason.

If you the brethren of this Grand Lodge adopt this recommendation, the details of when, where and the agenda will be forthcoming before the end of May.

Visitations:---

Although there was no conscious decision to visit every lodge during the past year, the resulting schedule moved in that direction. It had been my intention to set up a schedule based on invitation from the various lodges so as not to disrupt the Master's plans for the year whether it was degree work or any other program on the agenda. I requested that degree work be postponed during an official visit, not because I don't enjoy watching well-performed ritual, but because of the time factor. I am happy to say all except one lodge complied with that request, even though it created some juggling.

In some instances the turn-out could have been larger, but without exception we were received with a warmth and friendliness that made for great fellowship. To those who prepared excellent meals preceding lodge, to those who provided a lunch afterward, to everyone who went out of their way to make us welcome, I say thank you from the bottom of my heart.

I also had the pleasure of visiting several sister jurisdictions this past year: The Grand Lodges of Maine, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Ontario. The Deputy Grand Master went to Newfoundland, New Hampshire and Rhode Island on my behalf and the Junior Grand Warden represented our Grand Lodge at the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts in December, 2007. Several other invitations were declined with regret due to conflicting schedules.

Inter-lodge visitation is one of the greatest ways to show each other support. Any officer, from the Master to the Tyler, is more apt to put on a sterling performance in the presence of a full house. There is just something about a large number that permeates the room with boundless energy. Visitation is also a learning experience. While there will be slight variations in ritualistic work on the technical side, there should be no variations in signs, words, etc. If indeed we permit different executions of the DG and S of a FC, for example, how can we be sure whether a strange brother is who he claims to be based on this and the G and W of a FC?

At least one jurisdiction I have attended, each brother passed through the portal into the Grand Lodge session only after exchanging the proper grip and giving the pw of the degree. New Brunswick may be small in comparison, but I doubt very much if the Grand Tyler or Grand Pursuivant personally knows everyone who attends Grand Lodge. To my knowledge, no one is asked to identify himself even to the registration desk. I don't think the matter is pressing, but how many brethren can go through the three degrees giving the grip and word without prompting? Perhaps we should consider implementing this at our Grand Lodge to encourage refreshment of memory.

To the lodge with new candidates, I say ensure they are taken to visit other lodges during their preparation between degrees. Set the habit early; it will pay dividends down the road.

The list of visitations is attached as Appendix A.

A summary is as follows:

- 110 Masonic functions;
- Approximately 48,00 kilometers traveled by car.
- Average meeting: 1 ½ hours (equivalent of 20 8-hr days)
- Average time on road: 4 hours (equivalent of 55 8-hr days)

Programs:-

Rather than introduce any new programs, I opted instead to review those established by my distinguished predecessors to see if any improvement could be made, or revised to meet the changing needs of the fratemity. To that end:

Mentor:--

Although a constitutional requirement, not all lodges are using this excellent program. Those who have not had a candidate for some time do not see the need. Others have difficulty with the material the way it is packaged. With this in mind, I instructed the committee responsible, under the able direction of M:W: Wayne Hitchcock, to make it more user friendly. I am pleased to report here today the revised material is pretty well complete and is now being tested by some willing students. We moved away from having the mentor read to the candidate, to having him doing his own study then answering some questions that accompany the material. When he is ready, he meets with his mentor to compare answers. We feel this will prompt a better understanding of the degree as well as foster discussions in greater depth. We are aiming at September for general distribution to the lodges.

Grand Master's Award:---

The focus here is on Education and Ritual, as well as visitation and attendance at Grand Lodge. The biggest change, and cause for some negative feeling about the program is the means of evaluation. Rather than leave the rating to the subjective opinion of an individual, we devised a score sheet whereby points may be earned, or lost, according to the criteria. Some lodges felt it too difficult to achieve; other declared it a form of competition with other lodges; still others simply decided to ignore it. I am happy to say that seven lodges did take it seriously, met the standard asked for and have today received an award recognizing their effort. To them we say well done.

Brethren, the Grand Master's Award is achievable by every Lodge in this jurisdiction with the right frame of mind and some diligent work. Do not be concerned where you stand with other lodges; no one sees the figures except the District Deputy Grand Master and the Grand Master. Work each of the criteria one by one, just as you would eat a loaf of bread: one bite at a time. No one ever achieved a score in basketball by shooting too low. If you cannot sink the ball, do not lower the basket, raise your sights then practice, practice, practice until you can "swish" the ball on demand.

Seven qualifying lodges this year. Let's double that, or more, next year.

Lodges of Instruction:-

Under the direction of the Committee Chair, RW Charles Bruce, SGW, and working with the Training and Education Committee, Lodges of Instruction have been held in each district. The team has been well received with brethren plying them with questions on ritual, protocol, practices; all those little things that may be considered basic to the enjoyment of the craft. I am happy to say they even let me play a small part at one of these sessions.

Public Relations:---

Our official publication, Mostly Masonry, has been revived under the capable direction of W:B: Macx McNichol with two issues already in circulation. One of the biggest problems we had in the past is distribution. By the time it came off

the press, given to the DDGM's for delivery to the lodges for secretaries to mail to members, months had passed. Many copies simply languished in the lodge. Although the preferred method is by subscription, mailing directly to each subscriber, we have taken a middle course. An electronic version is produced then emailed to those who have supplied the editor with an e-mail address, as well as being posted on the Grand Lodge website. In addition, a dozen hard copies are produced for each Lodge. This has kept our cost down. It reaches the majority of those who wish to receive it. W:B: McNichol is to be commended for his excellent work.

I have continued to maintain the Grand Lodge Website which has had over 6.4 million hits since its inception in 2001 for an average of 81,000 per month. We do our best to keep it current, interesting and informative. Several inquiries are received each year from viewers interested in becoming a Mason. All are referred to the lodge nearest them. To obtain full advantage of this medium, register as a member. This gives you access to the private area as well as permission to post your own articles or notice of events.

Grand Representatives:-

An informal survey of brethren in some of the lodges visited reveals the majority have had no contact with their counterpart or the Grand Lodge they represent in New Brunswick. In many cases there is a language problem. In conversation with other Grand Masters across this country, I find them with similar problems. The question is what to do about it. Should there be a defined term? What of those who remove from the jurisdiction? Is the appointment considered more of an honor than of practical use? If the appointment is made at the "recommendation" of the Grand Master, can he also remove that Representative? Or is that at the will and pleasure of the Grand Lodge represented? These are some of the more perplexing questions facing us at the moment.

A number of jurisdictions have eliminated the program including Alabama and Pennsylvania. Some Canadian jurisdictions are considering a partial elimination retaining only other Canadian Grand Lodges as well as some neighboring U.S. jurisdictions. Your committee on Foreign Relations will consider its options over the coming year and prepare a policy for your consideration.

Committees:—

To set the craft their work and give them necessary instructions is the guiding principle behind the committee work this past year. I am a firm believer in establishing a mandate as well as any time frame for tasks. With these guidelines, I cannot praise too highly the exemplary work done by the various committees to date.

Jurisprudence and Constitution:-

From a jurisprudence point of view, the committee under the capable chairmanship of W:B: Scott Ellsworth has considered several questions given

them by myself leading to circulars on such a subject as whether interrupted service on a demit or suspension for NPD counts against length of service for 50 year awards. (It does).

We may finally put the Constitution project to bed after this session of Grand Lodge. M:W:B: Gordon Rattray, PGM, has been instrumental in seeing this through to completion. Thank you brother, and thank you to all the members of the committee who have contributed so much.

Finance and Audit:-

A full report on our financial situation is provided elsewhere by the respective committee which does not bear repeating here. However, I draw your attention to the manner of reporting in past proceedings.

First there is frequent reference to the Library program whereby lodges may be reimbursed up to \$200 for the purchase of Masonic literature, the funds to come from the Quinn Trust Account. Since 1988 there has been no mention of such an account in the financial statements. There was a recommendation from the Finance Committee of the day to merge the investments into two accounts: Grand Lodge Investments and Benevolence. Apparently this was done but there is no indication by auditor's note or motion this was accepted and passed by Grand Lodge. I strongly suggest all reference to funding from the "Quinn Trust Account" be eliminated to avoid the impression of a hidden source of funds.

Second, the Audit Statement should contain notes to explain what may be obvious to the committee but less obvious to others. Notes of this nature seem to be a standard practice in various audit statements I have read, but which seem to be lacking in our own.

All too often Grand Lodge draws unwarranted criticism regarding its finances. In the majority of cases it is simply not understanding, or not having all the correct information to form a knowledgeable opinion. Full disclosure and a transparent system of reporting by the Finance and Audit Committees will go a long way to dispel erroneous ideas of a "fat" budget.

The only source of funds available to Grand Lodge is the per capita levied on the membership. The cost of living index keeps rising, the cost of running your Grand Lodge keeps rising; try as we might to eliminate unnecessary spending we can do little about price increases. It is a simple fact that when membership levels drop, the remainder must pick up the slack. We cannot continue dipping into the investment principal to balance the budget. The decision to put forth a motion to increase the per capita is not a decision taken lightly by the Committee, nor is it done without a great deal of thought. It is important that each of you give the matter serious consideration and base your decision on facts, not emotion.

A word of thanks:-

And finally, my brethren, as our association over the past year has been carried on with so much unanimity and concord, it is difficult to find words to express 2008

my appreciation. To my traveling companions who made the long trips much shorter by the cheerful exchanges, sometimes bordering on outright craziness, I say thank you. For all the warm receptions by the many lodges we visited, I again say thank you. Many fine lunches and delicious meals were prepared by willing hands to see than none went away unsatisfied. Thank you. And to all the brethren wheresoever dispersed, it is my hope that I met most of your expectations; if not, it was not for lack of trying. Thank you for the honor and privilege of serving as your Grand Master.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK MASONIC CHARITIES & HOUSING COMPANY LTD.

To: The Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, F & A.M.

It is my pleasure to present the Annual Report of the New Brunswick Masonic Charities & Housing Company Ltd. for the year ended December 31, 2007.

The Canadian Cancer Society, New Brunswick Division, was the recipient of a cheque for \$38,000 presented at the 140th Communication of this Grand Lodge to Miss Betty Hoyt Director of Community Programs. This cheque enabled the Cancer Society to provide an eight day summer camp in July, which is called "Camp Goodtime", for sixty children, aged 7 to 16, with or having a history of cancer. The camp will be shortened to seven days in 2008 at a cost of \$35,000, but with no significant change in programme.

The closing day for the camp in 2008, to which Masons in New Brunswick have been invited, is Saturday, July 19, with exercises beginning at 10:00 a.m. The camp location is the Rotary International Camp for Children with Disabilities on Route 690, on the north side of Grand Lake near Douglas Harbour.

During the year, Masons in New Brunswick raised in excess of \$43,000, which will enable us to continue supporting the Cancer Society in this project which has been held in New Brunswick since 1993, and other charities for children and youth.

A cheque for \$4,000 was given to the Deaf Blind and Rubella Association in support of their children's summer camp programme. Financial support started for the Scottish Rite Foundation for the Moncton learning centre for dyslexic children and is to continue for the next three years.

The Quinn House complex in St. Andrews providing eight units for seniors continues to be successfully managed by a team comprised of members of St Mark's Lodge #5. Thanks are once again extended to them for their time and effort.


To the Board of Directors, thank you for your dedicated time in support of this company, both at our quarterly meetings, and in your support in the Masonic Districts which you represent.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Brethren: It is evident from our balance sheet that our Investment Portfolio has suffered significant deterioration. In particular our 2007 Comparative Income Statement reflects a write down on investments of \$124,685.65. At first look it appears that this amount may represent a decline in Market Value over a one year period. It is not that bad; however the amount is accurate and does represent an accumulated decline in market value over a number of years.

During the 2007 fiscal year we determined the specific amount when we transferred our portfolio from one financial institution to another and yes, the decline / loss was more than 23% of our portfolio. A good portion of this loss can be attributed to the timing of an aggressive Investment Strategy adopted by Grand Lodge some years ago while we strove for a return of 8% to be used to cover annual expenses of Grand Lodge. When we changed investment firms in early 2007 our Investment Strategy also changed to a less aggressive approach. However you will also see the Note at the bottom of our balance sheet that indicates a further decline of \$19,000 in Market value as of December 31, 2007.

At the same time as we are losing Market Value we are compounding our difficulties by withdrawing funds from the portfolio to carry on the Grand Lodge operations. The Finance Committee will be meeting over the next several months to determine a reasonable strategy to stem the losses in the portfolio. This can be achieved through a very conservative investment strategy, however we feel that we must also, at least for the present time, reduce the heavy requirement placed on our portfolio to provide income to fund the operations of Grand Lodge. We will be presenting a motion at this year's Communication calling for an increased per capita assessment in order to reduce the burden on our portfolio. Depending on the outcome we will proceed with our plans to restore our portfolio to a position where we can count on a positive return to assist in meeting the annual expenses of Grand Lodge in the future.

Motion No. 1

Moved by R:W:B: Leonard Bishop that this Grand Lodge adopt a 50 year jewel with attached 50 year pin to honour 50 years of service and that the Constitution Committee make the necessary changes in the Constitution.

I will further move that this jewel will be worn after the past subordinate officer jewels. Seconded by W:B: Brian Gillcash.

An amendment to the motion was moved by R:W:B: James D. McKenna that the current lapel pin and 50 year certificate be continued as part of the 50 year award program.

Speaking further against the motions was M:W:B: Osborne Nason.

On calling for the vote on the amendment to the motion the amendment was declared defeated. On calling for the vote on the main motion it was declared defeated.

Prior to dealing with the amendments dealing with the proposed constitutional changes the Grand Master indicated that the motions, as printed as an attachment to the proclamation, would be dealt with in bloc as follows: motions 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 as the first bloc; motion 8 to be considered separately; motions 9, 10 and 12 as the second bloc and finally motion 11. Hearing no objections the Grand Master directed M:W:B: Gordon Rattray to proceed.

Motions No. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7

Moved by M:W:B: Gordon Rattray, seconded by M:W:B: R. Wayne Hitchcock, that the following amendments to the Constitution identified as motions 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 be adopted. Carried.

Motion 2a: Every member who has been regularly installed and served at least one (1) year as Master of a Lodge in amity with this Grand Lodge shall be eligible for every elective office in this Grand Lodge.

Motion 2b: The Grand Chaplain may be a Master Mason and shall be elected and, if present, invested at the annual communication, and shall attend all communications and other meetings of the Grand Lodge, and there to offer up solemn prayer suitable to the occasion, as established by the usages of the fraternity.

Motion 2c: The Grand Organist may be a Master Mason, and be appointed and invested at the annual communication and shall conduct the musical ceremonies of the lodge under the direction of the Grand Master or other presiding officer.

Motion 2d: The Grand Piper may be a Master Mason and offer piping services appropriate to the occasion; such as marches for processions, laments for memorial services, light airs for receptions, and sprightly tunes to encourage the dance, and to act as pipe major when other pipers are present, and he is to recognize the drummers who will keep his beat.

Motion 2e: The Grand Tyler may be a Master Mason, he is to attend all meetings of the Grand Lodge, assist in the arrangements and see that none be admitted but those properly entitled.

Motion 2f: A Grand Standard Bearer shall be appointed by the Grand Master at the annual communication, and he shall carry the standard of Grand Lodge.

Motion 3: Each member attending Grand Lodge will be issued a coloured voting card approximately 5cm \times 10cm. When a vote is taken each member for the motion will hold up the card with his right hand. Those against will do the same with their right hand and card. When the Grand Master asks for a counted vote, members will stand with card up raised until vote is taken. This will be done for votes for and against the motion.

Motion 4: Grand Lodge, by a majority vote at any annual communication, may fix upon any other place within the Province as the place at which the next annual session shall be held. Formal notice of motion must be given of a proposition to change the place of meeting and of the place to which the meeting is to be changed at least sixty (60) days prior to the first day of the annual session.

It is proposed that the following deletions be made:

Motion 5a: That a new office of Grand Piper be established with rank and title one below that of Grand Organist and the General Regulations relating to the Office of Grand Organist will also apply to the Grand Piper. (P36, 2a). (The office is written into the constitution in the appropriate sections)

Motion 5b: The Grand Treasurer, shall give bonds, with two sureties, to the Grand Master; himself for five thousand dollars, and the sureties in twenty five hundred dollars each, to the satisfaction of the Grand Master for the due performance of his trust; and shall renew or alter the same, and provide other sureties therein, whenever and as often as he shall be required so to do by the

Grand Master, or the Grand Lodge, or the Board of General Purposes. (P45,2). (This practice has not been done for many years)

Motion 5c: Current P 54, 10

The Master of every lodge is to cause the antient charges, and the regulations of the grand lodge relating to private lodges, to be read in open lodge once every year.

TO READ:

The Master of every lodge is to cause the antient charges, to be read in open lodge once every year.

Motion 5d: Current P 66, 6

Except in case of seafaring men - not including persons employed in vessels known as "coasters", or in any vessels plying between ports on the Atlantic seaboard of North America other than such as may be serving any ship of the Canadian Navy - no person shall be made a Mason unless he resided one year in the jurisdiction of the lodge to which he seeks admission immediately previous to his application, or shall produce a certificate of character from the nearest lodge to the place of his previous residence; nor until he has been properly proposed at one regular meeting of the lodge, and a committee of three has been appointed by the Worshipful Master to make the necessary enquiries into the character of the candidate; nor until his name in full, date of birth, occupation and address shall have been sent to all the members in the summons for the next regular meeting, when, after the committee have reported in writing to the lodge he must be balloted for, and if approved, he may be initiated into the first degree of Masonry.

TO READ:

No person shall be made a Mason unless he resided one year in the Grand Jurisdiction of the lodge to which he seeks admission immediately previous to his application, or shall produce a certificate of character from the nearest lodge to the place of his previous residence; nor until he has been properly proposed at one regular meeting of the lodge, and a committee of three has been appointed by the Worshipful Master to make the necessary enquiries into the character of the candidate; nor until his name in full, date of birth, occupation and address shall have been sent to all the members in the summons for the next regular meeting, when, after the committee have reported in writing to the lodge he must be balloted for, and if approved, he may be initiated into the first degree of Masonry.

Motion 5e: P 68, 14 (for deletion)

If there is any difference in the fee required by the lodge petition and the lodge or lodges nearest the residence of the petitioner, the greater fee shall be collected and retained by the lodge petitioned.

Motion 5f: P 67,12 (for deletion)

Jurisdictional lines of subordinate lodges in the Province of New Brunswick are abolished.

Motion 6: Current P 76

MAY

Grand Lodge will provide the following long service awards to a Master Mason with the following cumulative service in a Craft Lodge.

(a) 25 years cumulative service - Lapel Pin.

(b) 50 years cumulative service - Lapel Pin and 50-year Certificate.

(c) 60 years cumulative service - 60-year bar.

(d) 70 years cumulative service - 70-year bar.

(e) These awards will be provided by this Grand Lodge on application submitted to the Grand Secretary by the secretary of a subordinate lodge.

TO READ IN REGULATIONS:

Grand Lodge will provide the following long service awards to a Master Mason with the following cumulative service in a Craft Lodge:

(a) 25 years cumulative service - Lapel Pin.

(b) 50 years cumulative service - Lapel Pin and 50-year Certificate.

(c) 60 years cumulative service - 60-year bar.

(d) 70 years cumulative service - 70-year bar.

These awards will be provided by this Grand Lodge on application submitted to the Grand Secretary by the secretary of a subordinate lodge. With the exception of the 25-year pin, these should be presented by the Grand Master or his designate.

Motion 7: In the temporary absence of the Grand Master from the Province, notified by him to the Grand Secretary, the Deputy Grand Master shall possess all the powers of the Grand Master; and should the Grand Master die during his term of office or be rendered incapable to discharging the duties thereof, by sickness, permanent absence from the Province, or by any other cause, the Deputy Grand Master shall forthwith assume the functions of Grand Master until the next annual election, and shall possess all his powers and privileges. Should the Deputy Grand Master die previous to such election, the Grand Wardens shall immediately summon a Grand Lodge to elect a Grand Master.

Motion 8: No motion shall be considered at any communication of Grand Lodge which has as its purpose or effect the amendment, repeal, or addition of or to any part of the Constitutions of Grand Lodge unless prior written notice of such proposed motion has first been given at or before the Grand Lodge communication held one year prior to that at which it is proposed to consider the

motion in question. Such notice of motion shall state in full, and exactly, the proposed amendment, repeal, or addition, and a brief summary of the purpose or effect thereof. Upon receipt, the Grand Secretary shall immediately forward a copy of such notice of motion to every Lodge Secretary instructing that it be introduced to his Lodge at its next regular meeting. A notice of all proposed changes to the Constitutions shall also be inserted in the summonses issued to the members of Grand Lodge for the communication at which the same will be considered, and no such amendment, repeal or addition shall be adopted unless supported by two thirds of the votes cast at the ensuing Grand Lodge communication.

TO READ IN THE REGULATIONS:

No motion shall be entertained by Grand Lodge for expenditures in excess of \$5,000.00 that have not been recommended or approved by the Board of General Purposes unless it is submitted in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the Constitutions.

Bioc 2 Motions 9, 10, 12

Moved by M:W:B: Gordon Rattray, seconded by M:W:B: R. Wayne Hitchcock, that the following amendments to the Constitution identified as motions 9, 10 and 12 be adopted. Carried.

Motion 9: Current P 46- OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR- The fiscal financial year for the Grand Lodge Corporation will coincide with the calendar year -(i.e. 1 January-31 December).

TO READ IN REGULATIONS: OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR-The fiscal or financial year for the Grand Lodge will coincide with the calendar year - (i.e. 1 January-31 December). (The Grand Lodge cannot stipulate the fiscal period adopted by the Grand Lodge Corporation.)

Motion 10: Current P 47, 13. A Deputy Grand Secretary may be appointed and will report to understudy, assist, relieve and assume all duties and responsibilities of the Grand Secretary on a casual basis as required during periods of absence, vacancy, or heavy workloads. He will receive a modest remuneration for services rendered and expenses incurred as determined by the Grand Lodge Corporation.

TO READ: A Deputy Grand Secretary may be appointed and will report to understudy, assist, relieve and, assume all duties and responsibilities of the Grand Secretary on a casual basis as required during periods of absence, vacancy, or heavy workloads. He will receive a modest remuneration for services rendered and incurred expenses.

Motion 11: Current Regulation 11, Part 1, section 6

6. No motion shall be entertained for altering or amending the Regulations of this Grand Lodge, or for adding a new section thereto, without notice in writing to the Grand Secretary, at least 60 days previously to the communication at which it is to be considered.

(a) Such notice of motion shall state in full and exactly the proposed amendment or addition.

(b) The Grand Secretary shall immediately forward a copy of such notice of motion to every Lodge Secretary instructing that it be introduced at its next regular meeting.

(c) No amendment, alteration or addition to the Regulations shall be adopted unless supported by a majority (50%+1) of the votes cast. [Amended May 2007]

TO READ:

Subject to section 10 of this Part 1, no motion shall be considered at any communication of Grand Lodge which has as its purpose or effect the amendment, repeal, or addition of or to any part of the Regulations of Grand Lodge unless prior written notice of such proposed motion has first been given to the Grand Secretary at least 60 days before the communication at which it is to be considered. Such notice of motion shall state in full, and exactly, the proposed amendment, repeal, or addition, and a brief summary of the purpose or effect thereof. Upon receipt, the Grand Secretary shall immediately forward a copy of such notice of motion to every Lodge Secretary instructing that it be introduced to his Lodge at its next regular meeting. A notice of all proposed changes to the Regulations shall also be inserted in the summonses issued to the members of Grand Lodge for the communication at which the same will be considered, and no such amendment, repeal or addition shall be adopted unless supported by a majority (50%+1) of the votes cast at the ensuing Grand Lodge communication.

10. For the better government of the craft and to facilitate the carrying on of the business and affairs of Grand Lodge, the Board of General Purposes shall have the power to make and adopt new Regulations from time to time, provided always, however, that no such Regulation or any part thereof shall

continue to have any force or effect unless ratified and confirmed subsequently at the immediately ensuing communication of Grand Lodge by majority vote.

Whereas to change the date of a meeting now requires a dispensation from the Grand Master; and

Whereas, such decision to postpone or reschedule the meeting date may not be made until the afternoon of the date of the regular meeting; and

Whereas, the window of opportunity to request and receive such dispensation is extremely narrow, or non-existent,

Therefore, moved by M:W:B: William C. Boone, duly seconded that:

Notwithstanding Section (pg 55-13), when there exists on the date of a regular or emergent meeting of a Lodge, an unforeseen situation which, in the opinion of the Worshipful Master, and beyond his control, threatens the safety and wellbeing of the members, he may postpone such regular or emergent meeting to a later date, provided that such postponement is not later than the next regular meeting and that every effort has been made to inform all members of the postponement as soon as possible following the determination.

(a) For purposes of this section, electronic media, where applicable, may be used to notify the members.

(b) When such postponement occurs, the Master shall immediately notify, in writing, the Grand Secretary giving the full circumstances surrounding the postponement; and record the same in the minutes of the rescheduled meeting.

This topic will be an item for discussion at the All Canada Conference. The Grand Master indicated that he would like to see a policy created regarding Grand Representatives.
- iv. Mostly Masonry: W.B. MacNichol announced that the next edition would be distributed on the web page on the next day and he would email to anyone that provided an e-mail address (60 addresses at present) A few copies were to be printed for each Lodge to distribute.
- v. Public Relations: W:B: MacNichol suggested the creation of a Masonic Stamp as a fundraiser and on a motion from M:W:B: Rattray that this be considered in conjunction with Masonic Charities & Housing as a fundraiser for Camp Goodtime. Motion Carried.

- 6. Acacia Lodge #49, Moncton District 7
- 7. Hiram Lodge #6, Fredericton District 6

EDUCATION, TRAINING, MENTORSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

To: The Most Worshipful the Grand Master and the Officers and Members of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick;

The Education, Training, Mentorship Committee is a combined committee of this Grand Lodge and as such has accepted responsibility for completing several pieces of work. It is a small committee which should have been a large committee, but its call for volunteers fell on deaf ears. I will discuss here some of the responsibilities that the committee has undertaken and will in due course explain my last statement.

The first request we answered was to prepare an introductory course for those members of this Grand Lodge who had been asked to join the Board of General Purposes for the first time. This course, or exposure training session, was given in June, 2007, at the first Board meeting of the year. It was well attended and this committee would recommend the continuance of this session each June for those who are coming to the Board for the first time. Input on course content from our older and more experienced Board members would be greatly appreciated.

Our second challenge as a committee was to give a one day training session to the District Deputy Grand Masters. This instruction was to include not only the things that they should know to do their jobs effectively but also what the other committees of Grand Lodge had available for use in their Districts. This training session was completed in August, 2007. The committee would recommend that this training also become an annual event as it has proven beneficial to those in that office as well as to those who attended who aspire to one day holding that position.

Our third challenge as a committee was to continue to develop the Lodge Officer Training Program which was designed and used in previous years by this Grand Lodge committee. We have done this in combination with the Ritual Committee by developing a seminar for Lodge Officers which incorporates not only the desired training from our perspective, but also the finer points of ritual which the Ritual Committee needed to deliver. Our approach allows each committee to get their training across while using up only one session of the officers time. At a moment in our existence when time seems to be the limiting factor in nearly all our efforts we thought this combined effort stood the best chance of success. Reports and feedback have been very positive with at least one mason being so impressed that he has asked to join the committee.

Our fourth challenge from the Grand Master was to rewrite the Officer's Manual, updating the material in the document, removing redundant material that could easily be found elsewhere and changing the format of the material back to a title and paragraph layout as opposed to the numbered, point by

point system we have been using for the last several years. This has been accomplished and the new version will be in print shortly.

Another of our challenges was to rewrite and/or reconstruct the current Mentorship Program for the Grand Lodge to make it a more user friendly program. This was a rather delicate chore as a great deal of effort was put into the first Mentor Program by some very learned members of this Grand Lodge. However, it was observed again and again that many Lodges were not using the program with their new candidates and the Mentor Books were in book shelves covered with dust. The Lodges who were using the program were getting great' results so it was obvious that the problem was not with the material in the program as much as it was in getting it delivered.

Our solution was to rewrite the Mentor Program incorporating virtually all of the information it previously contained, excluding or modifying only minor sections that had been pointed out to us by people who had actually used the program and adding many sections which we found in the Mentor Programs of such diverse Grand Lodges as Maine, Ontario, California and that issued under the banner of the Conference of Grand Masters of North America. The program is somewhat bulkier than before but contains very good information for the candidate not only on history and symbolism but in the mechanics of the running of his Lodge.

In addition to this, we are recommending and setting up a new delivery mechanism. The candidate will now be given the material in sections to read and answer questions on. When the candidate has accomplished that task he will contact his Mentor and arrange a meeting to look over and discuss the answers. The questions are of two types, those requiring an easily found answer in the material provided and those which require a small amount of reflection and thought from the candidate. It is hoped that the answers will give food for good solid discussions between the Mentor and the Candidate thus promoting curiosity, bonding and a desire to know more about our great Fraternity.

This new Mentor System is currently prepared and is being tested on several candidates throughout the province. The results of this testing will be analyzed, recommendations incorporated and flaws taken out before it is issued for general use. We, the Committee, feel it is entirely useless to issue this program if it is going to be put on the shelf to be ignored. Unless we are convinced that we have something that can be used easily and successfully, it would be useless to replace the existing program that at least some of our candidates are using now successfully.

It should be noted that this new program is on computer and can be easily adapted for use on a compact disk. Using a series of passwords the candidate can be given one compact disk with all the material on it and simply be given the appropriate password when the proper material needs to be accessed. This

would save the Grand Lodge and the subordinate Lodges a great deal in printing and publishing costs. If we really wanted to get fancy, non essential

materials and information could be added by adding video segments where a member of the Grand Lodge explains with pictures and demonstrations points not already covered in the basic written material.

One last statement needs to be made on the topic of Mentorship. At least one Lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction is currently installing a Lodge Mentor in its regular installation ceremonies. They have a ritual piece written for his official installation. This shows their complete commitment to the program. Mentorship is mandated by our Grand Lodge Constitutions and is one of the most important gifts we can give to a new candidate. We are taking a great deal of time and effort to maximize the effect of this Mentorship Program on the candidate. Please do not reject it out of hand. When the program arrives at your Lodge, at least give it a good honest try with your new candidates and if there are identifiable problems let us know. Modifications by computer are easy and can happen with very little turn-around time. Once these candidates come to us we must do all we can to keep them.

The final point of discussion in this report is the development of a network of educational officers throughout the province. This has proved elusive to sav the least but hope has not expired. We, the Committee, were charged with getting a District Education Officer set up in each District of this Grand Lodge. In addition we were to help this D.E.O. set up and establish a Lodge Education Officer in each Lodge. In addition we were to disseminate educational materials outward through these officers so that the Lodges had a steady stream of educational materials from which to choose those programs that they thought would be most beneficial to their segment of the Craft. We must beg the Grand Lodge's indulgence for the unfinished portion of this task. Materials have been assembled and await addresses to be sent to. We are at this time in possession of only one name for a possible District Education Officer and that is in District 6. We have no names as yet for any of the L.E.O. positions. This unfinished work will be moved up the priority list for the 2008-2009 season and hopefully at the next Grand Lodge sessions we will have a much more positive report on this task.

We thank the Grand Master for our appointment to this committee and for the trust he has shown in us. We have as always gained valuable experience from our efforts on behalf of the Grand Lodge and hope that our service may continue to bear valuable fruit for the betterment of the Fraternity and the advancement of the Craft in general.

A presentation by W:B: George Cooper on communicating the meaning of the Ritual. Other subjects covered in the seminar were under the Education and Training umbrella.

REPORT OF THE AD HOC COMMITTEE

To: The Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, F.& A.M.

The Ad Hoc Committee is currently reviewing the Grand Lodge voting process. Over the past several years comments and discussions among the membership require that considerations should be given to several points including, but not limited to, mail-in ballots, proxy voting, accommodation for more private balloting facilities and whether or not balloting privileges should be related to the number of per-capita dues paid by individual brethren.

Concerns arise from the fact that only a fraction of Grand Lodge voters can participate in the balloting process because of the existing requirement that a voter be present at the Grand Lodge Communication. Many well-governed professional organizations elect their officials by mail-in ballot thus permitting a larger representative vote from the general membership. The mail-in ballot process in these cases does not appear to detract from the personal attendance of dedicated members at annual meetings and permits those that cannot attend the meeting to be represented. Proxy voting may also be a possible option.

Further concern has been raised regarding the privacy afforded when casting a ballot for elected office. The committee is soliciting input in this regard.

Another concern is whether or not a per-capita dues payment entitles a voter to multiple ballots. For example if you are a member of three lodges in the Grand Jurisdiction should you have three ballots? There is nothing in our existing Constitution or Regulations to permit or deny such an entitlement.

The District Deputy Grand Masters will continue to present the issues to the various lodges in their districts. Once this step is completed the results will be compiled. Initial feedback from the membership is as varied as night and day and will require considerable analysis if the trend of responses continues. The final report to the Board of General Purposes is planned for the fall of 2008.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

Most Worshipful the Grand Master, with permission I submit my report as Grand Historian for the 2008 Grand Lodge Communication.

History of any organization is a fragile commodity subject to many interpretations. Edward Gibbon with his History of the Rise and Decline of the Roman Empire, an effort covering 13 Centuries while acclaimed, was in later years disputed by experts claiming factual errors.

Though raised in the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia slightly over fifty years ago, I affiliated with a New Brunswick Lodge in 1972. For various reasons active involvement in New Brunswick Masonry didn't began until some time in the middle 1980s. Since that time there has been a variety of Masonic offices, committees and allied bodies served with.

History has always been a magnet, drawing my attention as far back as when attending elementary schools in the Vancouver, British Columbia school system.

To begin this report, a view of the jurisdiction was taken to around the time I actually began involvement with New Brunswick Freemasonry. The view began with the strength of New Brunswick Masonry in 1966. The membership reported for 31 December 1966 was for 8,418 members; up to the 31 December 2006 reported membership of 3,919. Actually I don't believe the 2006 figures are accurate, it is possible they are slanted if the number of brethren who have dual or greater membership were to be looked at.

Not considering those brothers with multiple membership and accepting the two sets of figures of 8,418 and 3,919 the loss over that forty year period rests at 4,499 caused by deaths, demits, suspensions and withdrawals.

In that period Bethel Lodge, Alley Lodge, Tweedie Lodge Restigouche Lodge, Albert Lodge, Hartland Lodge, The Union Lodge of Portland and Centennial Lodge have all surrendered to darkness. Salisbury and Fownes lodges also surrendered, the difference being that they amalgamated as Harmony Lodge No 20.

Why the decline? Many theories abound, age of the members (26 % of my own lodge are aged 70 or more), family or social commitments, apathy, lack of challenge, disinterest, Craft Lodge members moving on to the Royal Arch, the Scottish Rite, the Shrine and withholding their time for their Craft Lodge in favour of belonging to a "higher" order.

Remedies at the Craft lodge level to turn the decline around have been plentiful, various Masonic Renewal programmes; Friend to Friend – Brother to Brother, one to seek new members, the other to recharge the interest of those non-active members of a lodge.

The 1997 programme to raise Master Masons in One Day, the Grand Master's Class which created 40 Master Masons in one day.

Around the same time the introduction of a Grand Lodge Web Page to inform, educate and discuss the Craft with New Brunswick Masons using the electronic net work.

From the old Masonic Digest mostly edited by the Grand Secretary has been developed "Mostly Masonry" an informative newsletter to be distributed to all Masons of the jurisdiction. Now an electronic publication with limited hard copy distribution.

The publication in 1952 of "More Light in Freemasonry", reprinted in 1985, a self study book for the new Mason.

In or around 1972, a four pamphlet series of self study was published, to be given to the candidate before receiving his first degree and then following each further degree received, to an extent still in use today.

The Education Committee didn't forget the lodge officers, publishing in 1974 "A Manual for Officers". The Grand Lodge Education Committee edited a completely revised manual in a different format in 1991, with a further revision in 2002. The word is now out another revision is in the works in 2008.

To create interest in Freemasonry, the William F Bunting Lodge of Research was erected under dispensation. The interest of a small core group struggled to see the lodge thrive, like the lodges mentioned, lack of interest by the many caused it to surrender.

1987 saw the mentor Programme introduced with a series of five semi formal discussions for the new candidate from before the first degree to after the third degree. Revised and slightly modified in 2000, the programme is once more being restructured, it is said to create a more interactive dialogue between a mentor and the new Mason.

In 2002, Train the Trainers seminar were introduced, the successful trainers were then to go on and train the lodge officers and those aspiring to be lodge officers in the tools and procedures required to operate a successful lodge.

During March/April of 2008 the Ritual Committee and Training/ Education Committee have conducted district meetings demonstrating a lodge business meeting process and delving into the conduct of ritual. There has been interest; unfortunately it appears to be a case of preaching the sermon to the converted.

To return Freemasonry to its place in the overall scheme of things there is a need to generate interest in each Freemason, young or old, interest in the lodge of each and every member, interest in the future of the Craft. To do this requires education in the history and protocol of Freemasonry.

The wheel is there, let it be shone and polished, not constantly being reinvented.

There is a need to do more than initiate the new members, there is a need to introduce them to the "so-called" mysteries of Freemasonry. A need to allow the new Mason to delve into the history, purpose of mystery; to understand there is a commitment once the application for membership has been accepted and the journey to "Light" has begun. Not all "Light" is garnered while at the altar or while being lead around a lodge room.

In the same vein there is a need to bring that knowledge or light back into the life of that brother who has had several years of membership. To reinstall the lessons of Freemasonry and the history of Freemasonry for those brothers who may, for whatever reason lost their enthusiasm for the ancient craft, those whose interest has waned and can no longer find the time to meet with his brothers.

Is it possible a time has come to consider some form of in-lodge education based on one or more of the many publications that have been published over the years? As this has been proposed before and proposed again and again every so many years. Possibly the time has come that this form of education should become part of each Master's agenda for each regular meeting. There may be a need to consider a directive from Grand Lodge requiring the inclusion of an item of Masonic Education, adopted from a Grand Lodge publication or a pattern of study recommended by the District Deputy Grand Master's appointed Education Officer, of five to ten minutes length in the Master's Agenda to be introduced prior to the Master asking, "Anything in the South Brother Junior Warden".

In considering this report and its vein of thought as this reports conclusion is being reached, and to where I am rapidly approaching the four score mark, I find that I am no longer attaining the standard that I had set for myself to achieve as a young military recruit so very many years ago and as a Freemason fifty one years ago, which I have endeavoured to achieve during those years now gone by.

It is with reluctance that I accept the facts and have requested the Grand Master to accept my resignation as Grand Historian and with the desire as to what is best for Masonry have recommended the name of a knowledgeable brother to assume that role.

GRAND LODGE ARCHIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

At the time the concept of a committee to study and catalogue the archive and artefact holdings of the subordinate lodges of the New Brunswick Masonic jurisdiction was proposed, there was a deep seated concern that many lodges within the jurisdiction held many articles of historical Masonic interest.

During several discussions from time to time it appeared to be obvious that there were cases where archive related materials were held on walls or in cabinets and even store rooms and the historical value, let alone the intrinsic value, was not even considered.

These discussions also appeared to indicate that some brethren were concerned that the Grand Lodge were seeking not only control, but ownership of the items of interest.

One factor which apparently did not concern many was the possible real value of the artefacts held. The replacement value, nor their insurance value, was not considered as relative to their lodges, or the need to properly list the items held.

With some thought a possibly workable solution was placed before the Board of General Purposes and accepted. Basically it called for an Archive Committee under the Chairmanship of the Grand Historian with a Committee representative appointed in each Masonic District of New Brunswick to co-ordinate the efforts of a lodge appointed historian/archivist.

With the appointments in place the lodges were then to be encouraged to inventory their archive and artefact holdings, record their findings, prepare two copies of their lists, retain one as a lodge copy and through the District Committee member forward a copy to the Grand Historian for inclusion in a Central Data Base. There was to be no intention of Grand Lodge assuming ownership of the items listed on the lodge inventory listings. It was expected that there would be periodic updates of the inventory listings as changes in the condition or possession of the items changed.

Several of the Districts did appoint representatives to the committee, unfortunately due to matters which occurred the progress has been slow to this time. With the acceptance of the proposal by the Board of General Purposes, and with the introduction of a new Grand Historian it is trusted that the programme will continue to grow and that all Masonic archive and artefact materials will at some future time become a firm data base of historical items for research and study into the Masonic history of the Masonic Craft in the Province of New Brunswick.

PUBLIC RELATIONS REPORT

Public Relations

In order to raise the profile of the Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons in the New Brunswick jurisdiction a couple of media presentations were arranged.

The first was to have the Grand Master William C. Boone interviewed on July 27, 2007 by a reporter from the Moncton Times and transcript for an article on Masonry. The second was the appearance of the Grand Master and Past Grand Master Wayne Hitchcock on the Rogers cable television show "Trevor Doyle Live" on October 24, 2007 for one hour which included thirty minutes of questions and answers followed by an equal segment of telephone call ins. Copies of the entire program have been obtained, with being one sent to the Grand Historian while the two remaining copies remaining with the Public Relations Committee to be used as promotional material.

The feedback received from those who reviewed the presentations was positive with many recommending these types of information sessions should continue when other opportunities present themselves to the PR Committee.

In the upcoming year it is the hope of the Public Relations Committee to arrange public speaking sessions for the Grand Master, Past Grand Masters and others who would accept to make a presentation to outside groups and interested persons in the community throughout the province.

Consideration is being given to hosting open public information sessions in areas where lodges no longer exist or where they have never been established in the hope of generating some new interest and growth in the Fraternity.

Mostly Masonry

After a period of time when there was no publication of Mostly Masonry the present administration of Grand Lodge has published two (2) editions (fall and winter editions) since September 2007 with the spring edition being prepared for publication for the second week of June 2007.

Many changes have been undertaken to reduce the waste of printed copies and reduce the costs and time for distribution of each edition.

Presently there are now over six hundred (600) copies distributed electronically through email distribution lists, each edition is now available on the Grand Lodge web site and an unknown number of brethren are printing copies from the Grand Lodge web site which they give to their friends who may not have access to a computer, lack the knowledge to operate a computer or to those who are sick and shut-in in places where the electronic media is unavailable.

The growing input from interested Brethren has grown through their submission of suggestions for articles or by the submitting of actual articles which allows for a very good overall collection of views and information which can only enhance future editions.

With each edition there is an attempt to project a theme or issue which directly relates to Masonry in the hope of creating healthy informative discussions within the jurisdiction.

The printed copies of future editions will remain at eight (8) pages with the electronic edition on the Grand Lodge web site being expanded with more information on individual lodge activities being presented. There will also be an album created which will allow for images of important and casual activities to be displayed.

In the future the administration and staff of Mostly Masonry hopes to encourage more Brethren to use the Grand Lodge web site not only for posting information but also to keep informed of what is taking place at other lodges and keep in contact with other Brethren throughout the Fraternity of Masonry.

Mostly Masonry can serve the members of the Fraternity only if the Brethren participate by reading and suggesting what content should be included in each edition. Therefore responses, either positive or negative, are welcomed by the administration and staff of your publication because they have been well prepared to accept criticism and deal with rejection.

In the next year it is the hope to increase the number of electronic mailings, have more viewers on the Grand Lodge web site and continue to present thought provoking issues in each edition to the Brethren.

It is my privilege to submit, on behalf of the committee on the Proceedings of Grand Lodge, the report for the past year.

After the 2007 Grand Lodge communication the Grand Master established a committee whose function was to co-ordinate the assembly and printing of the annual Grand Lodge proceedings. With this task in mind the various annual reports were gathered, the taped recordings of Friday and Saturday reviewed and transcribed and assembled into a draft copy of the proceedings. The members of the committee each received a copy of the draft which was put through an editing process. The corrected copy was forwarded to the printer where a final proof copy was produced and made available at the June 2007 meeting of the Board of General Purposes.

It should be pointed out that several changes were made in the production of the 2007 proceedings. A new printer, Mayday Fine Printing of Fredericton, was engaged to print the proceedings. A change was made to the binding process returning to the "perfect binding" that was used in past years rather than the coil binding that had been more recently used. The last change was a reduction in the number of copies being printed. For 2007 there were 200 copies printed for distribution to the subordinate lodges in the Province and the Canadian. Grand Lodges. To facilitate the distribution of our annual proceedings to the sister grand jurisdictions in the United States the proceedings were burned on compact discs all of which resulted in considerable cost savings to this Grand Lodge.

I would like to extend my appreciation to the committee members for their dedication in the timely completion of this project as well as to the Grand Master for the confidence he has placed in me in appointing me the chairman of this committee.

Many of these basic courtesies are being ignored in our lodges without comment or correction from Grand Lodge officers who witness the departure from well established protocols."

GRAND LODGE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

MAY

At the annual communication of this Grand Lodge to be held in June two motions of interest will come before that grand body; one is a motion dealing with Funds and Fees that would, if adopted, increase the Grand Lodge per capita to \$30.00 effective December 31, 2008. The other motion worthy of note concerns extending Grand Lodge membership to all Master Masons in the jurisdiction who are in good standing.

GRAND LODGE OF QUEBEC

During the 2006-2007 Masonic year the Grand Master introduced a new protocol allowing the candidates for elected office to publish their views on matters of Masonic interest so that the voting members could make a more informed choice at their annual Grand Lodge Communication. It was also interesting to note that the Past Grand Masters of the Grand Lodge of Quebec who reviewed the Grand Master's address expressed their concern about "personal piques and quarrels" which they stated have no place in Freemasonry. In their view Masonic disputes should be resolved with candor, friendship and mercy and that a Masonic Trial must be the court of last resort.

GRAND LODGE OF CANADA

- During the opening of the 2007 annual Grand Lodge communication the Grand Master, M.W. Bro. Gary L. Atkinson paid tribute to our late Grand Master, MWB Wayne McKay. In his address he wrote: "In January of 2007, our Canadian Masonic Family lost a longtime friend and true Mason. Passing suddenly to the Grand Lodge above, we lost M.W. Bro. Wayne McKay, the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. Scheduled to be the Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee at the Conference of Grand Masters of North America as well as the vice-president of the All Canada Conference, which is held every April in Winhipeg, Manitoba. His passing left a tremendous void, not only in eastern Canada, but across the eastern part of the United States. His wide smile and outstretched hand of friendship will certainly be missed. Our deepest sympathy is extended to his wife Karen, his immediate family members, as well as his Masonic family in the Province of New Brunswick."
- During the Grand Lodge communication the President of the Masonic Foundation of Ontario, Samuel Kalinowsky, announced that that Foundation had been advised that it had been named as the residual capital beneficiary of an estate and that the estimated residual value is an amount in excess of two million dollars.

GRAND LODGE OF MANITOBA

- It is of interest to note that twenty-four of the Board of General Purposes members are elected from the lodge membership in the Province for three year terms.
- This Grand Lodge faces the same budgetary problems as in New Brunswick. Declining membership combined with increasing costs is

 - making it difficult to maintain a balanced budget. In Manitoba the Per Capita assessment is in excess of \$40.00

GRAND LODGE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA AND YUKON

- During the opening the Grand Secretary drew the attention of Grand Lodge to two Brethren who were present hailing from the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, W:B: Ring and Brother Finney.
- Prior to the year 2006 the District Deputy Grand Masters filed a yearly report outlining the condition of the lodges within their respective Districts. Commencing with the 2005-2006 Masonic year ALL Grand Lodge officers were required to submit quarterly reports. This was done to give both elected and appointed Grand Lodge officers more responsibility and accountability to Grand Lodge while at the same time providing the Grand Master and the Board of General Purposes with further insights as to the condition and operations of lodges in the jurisdiction.

GRAND LODGE OF ALASKA

In 2005 this Grand Lodge established the Alaska Russian Relations Committee whose goal was to assist in establishing Freemasonry in Eastern Russia. To date two Masonic lodges have been established in areas of large populations where Freemasonry was previously unknown.

GRAND LODGE OF ARKANSAS

During 2004 the Grand began an exciting new program to endow the operations of the Grand Lodge of Arkansas. The program allows Arkansas Masons and others to purchase an "Arkansas Diamond" for fifty dollars (\$50). This money will be invested and only the interest earned will be used to offset the cost of Grand Lodge operations.

GRAND LODGE OF IOWA

The Grand Lodge of Iowa is one of the jurisdictions that is active in the laying of cornerstones. During the year 2006 this Grand Lodge participated in 10 cornerstone laying ceremonies for schools, libraries, a community center, fire station, social security administration office and the Iowa Speed Way.

GRAND LODGE OF LOUISIANA

- The Grand Master of Louisiana has issued an Edict whereby the Grand Master's authority to close a Lodge in a summary manner (short form) is extended to the Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden, and Grand Junior Warden, at open meeting when non-masons are present.
- This Grand Master elect in this jurisdiction publishes his planned program along with the job tasks assigned to the various Grand Lodge officers and committees in their annual Grand Lodge proceedings.

GRAND LODGE OF MASSACHUSETTS

- The annual Grand Lodge communication of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts held December 27, 2006 was the last official visit made by our late Grand Master, MWB Wayne McKay. During the banquet the Grand Master introduced Most Worshipful Wayne H. McKay, who made appropriate remarks on behalf of the out-of-country guests.
- The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts continues to be very proactive in attracting new members with State wide advertising programs on both TV and radio combined with the continued use of the One-Day-Classes.
- The committee on Fraternal Relations pointed out that there has been an increase in attempts of Irregular Grand Lodges to gain recognition by Grand Jurisdictions in the United States and throughout the world. Several of those irregular lodges of which we should be aware are: The Regular Grand Lodge of England, the United Grand Lodge of America of Accepted Free Masons, the Grand Lodge of All England and The Grand Orient of France.

GRAND LODGE OF MAINE

- Under Grand Master Claire V. Tusch the Grand Lodge of Maine has implemented a Masonic Ambassador program. The purpose of the program is to provide training to members of the craft that will enable them to communicate across the generations, improve listening skills, how to actively attract good men to Masonry and how to tell the Freemasonry's story.
- The Grand Lodge of Maine continues to promote the Child Identification Program (CHIP). As of the 2006 proceedings 24,000 children in the State of Maine have been processed by the program. The program has been well received by parents, teachers and administrators.
- The Maine Masonic College, inaugurated in 2005, continues to grow in popularity and acceptance and is designed to provide a broad base of Masonic knowledge through the delivery of lectures and seminars on a variety of Masonic Topics.

GRAND LODGE OF MONTANA

The Grand Lodge A.F.& A.M. of Montana has taken steps to recognize and to enter into full fratemal recognition with each of the following named Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodges, provided that each of the Grand Lodges grant reciprocal recognition: The Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodges F.&A.M. of California, Delaware, The District of Columbia, Indiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Virginia.

GRAND LODGE OF NEVADA

 The Grand Lodge of Nevada in addition to its per capita of \$15.00 charges \$10.00 for each degree conferred by the lodge. In addition there is a \$1.00 per member annual levy for the Masonic Charities of Nevada Inc.

GRAND LODGE OF WASHINGTON

Masons under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Washington may properly inquire of a worthy, qualified person 'if he had ever considered petitioning for membership in Freemasonry?' This, or a similarly phrased question, is a proper question to determine intent; this in addition to advising said person that 'he must petition of his own initiative – that he will not be asked to petition.

REPORT OF THE DEPUTY GRAND MASTER

To: The Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, F. & A.M.

It is with pleasure that I submit my report on my activities as Deputy Grand Master for the past year. I would like to thank the Brethren for the many courtesies extended to me and to express my sincere appreciation at having been provided the opportunity to serve in this office. It has been an active year with visits to other jurisdictions beginning right after Grand Lodge.

At the request of the Grand Master, I represented him and this Grand Lodge at the annual communication of the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire, The Grand Lodge of Rhode Island and The Grand Lodge of Newfoundland & Labrador and accompanied the Grand Master to the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia. 
